## A bomb greets a new US unit in Afghan countryside

TANGI VALLEY (Afghanistan), 1 May — Only a few Afghan villagers waved as the new American forces patrolled deep into this valley, a warning sign even in a region not exactly known for its love for foreign troops. As the 10th Mountain Division troops moved slowly down a rocky road that cuts through high cliffs and fertile land in the central province of Wardak, what awaited them were not smiles.

It was a bomb.

Fortunately, nobody was hurt.

But it was a reminder that in the cat-and-mouse game of insurgency warfare, the ultimate prize is the loyalty of the man on the street or in the bazaar.

In the Tangi Valley — a region just 40 miles south of Kabul that newly deployed

US troops entered this year — the people's sympathies for now are with the militants.

That's why Lt Col Kimo Gallahue, the commander of the 3rd brigade's 2nd Battalion, 87th Infantry Regiment, has been traveling this narrow stretch of road that passes by wheat fields, apple trees and small villages. He clears the road of bombs and tells any Afghan willing to listen that the Americans are here to stay.

Gallahue's unit is part of a brigade that was initially slated to go to Iraq. But a rapidly deteriorating security situation, along with an increased US focus on Afghanistan after the election of President Barack Obama, forced the Pentagon to rush new forces here.

### One German soldier killed, nine wounded in Afghanistan

BERLIN, 1 May—Two attacks on German forces in Afghanistan killed one soldier and wounded nine on Wednesday as Germany's foreign minister began a two-day visit to the country.

Frank-Walter Steinmeier arrived for the previously unannounced visit to meet with Afghan President Hamid Karzai, his foreign and interior ministers, and international representatives in Kabul. Shortly after Steinmeier touched down, a suicide bomber lightly wounded five German soldiers in near Kunduz city, the German Defence Ministry said.

Later in the day, another patrol came under fire northwest of Kunduz, in a deadly attack that left one soldier dead and four others lightly wounded, the ministry said. Steinmeier insisted that Germany would not allow such attacks to deter it from carrying out its mission in the Central Asian nation. Some 3,750 German troops are stationed in Afghanistan, where they serve in the relatively peaceful north.

### Taleban kill two Afghans for 'spying'

KHOST, 1 May—Taleban militants in Afghanistan on Thursday killed two car dealers they accused of spying for the government

and US-led coalition forces, an official said.

The men were shot dead in the eastern province of Khost, Yaqubi district governor Dawlat Khan Qayoumi told *AFP*. "They were two car dealers who were killed by armed men and they had no affiliation with the Afghan government or foreign forces," Qayoumi said.

A man who claimed to

be Taleban commander in the district telephoned *AFP* and claimed responsibility for killings. "They were spying for the government and the coalition forces, and we killed them," said the militant, refusing to be identified. The Islamist Taleban were in government between 1996 and 2001, when they were ousted in a US-led invasion.—INTERNET

### Iraqi refugees stay put despite relative calm

DAMASCUS, 1 May—The vast majority of Iraqis who fled their country have no plans to return even though violence is way down, many hoping instead to resettle in the West. The trends, uncovered on the basis of scores of interviews by *The Associated Press* and confirmed by Iraqi government and United Nations figures, raise the possibility that countries like Syria and Egypt — poor themselves — could face a significant refugee problem for years to come.

Iraq may never, or at least not for years, recover much of the urban, educated, predominantly Sunni Muslim and Christian middle-class whose skills would be vital to its rebuilding. The ranks of doctors and other medical professions have been particularly hard-hit by the refugee flight.

"Life here is better. My children can play outside and I know they'll come back. You never know what's going to happen there," said Taghrid Hadi, who fled Iraq in September 2006 after gunmen kidnapped and killed her husband, dumping his mutilated body outside their home just north of Baghdad.—INTERNET

### Power station in Iraq destroyed by gunmen

KUT, (Iraq), 1 May— A power station that supports the Ahdab oil field in Iraq's Wasit Province has been destroyed by unidentified gunmen, a provincial official says. The official, whose identity wasn't reported, said the attack appears to have been a warning to a Chinese firm that is developing the oil field in southern Iraq, *Azzaman*, an Iraqi newspaper, reported Thursday.

"Installations belonging to an important oil field have been subjected to a terrorist attack from unidentified gunmen," the official said.

"The attackers targeted the electricity system linked to the field as well as the lines carrying power. The damage is estimated at more than \$1 million," the anonymous official added

The Iraqi government signed a \$3 billion contract with China National Petroleum Corp in 2008 regarding the construction of the Ahdab oil field.

Azzaman said Iraqi officials are hopeful the new oil field will help Iraq boost its 2.5 million barrels of oil produced daily to 4.5 million barrels a day.

### Turkish warplanes hit Kurd rebel targets in Iraq

ANKARA, 1 May— Turkey's military says its warplanes struck Kurdish rebel targets overnight in northern Iraq.

A military statement says Air Force jets bombed targets in the Iraqi border regions of Zap and Avasin-Basyan on Wednesday night and Thursday morning.

Hours earlier 10 Turkish soldiers were killed in two separate attacks suspected of being launched by Kurdish rebels.

Turkish warplanes have often targeted rebel hideouts in northern Iraq from where guerrillas have staged hit-and-run attacks on Turkish targets for decades.

The Kurdistan Workers' Party, or PKK, has been fighting for self-rule in Turkey's southeast since 1984.

## Japan wary of Chrysler fallout on parts makers

TOKYO, 1 May— Japan's trade and economy minister said on Friday that his nation remained watchful of a possible fallout from Chrysler's bankruptcy because of possible damage to Japanese parts makers.

"We must take appropriate measures if they are being hurt," Economy, Trade and Industry Minister Toshihiro Nikai said in a news conference on nationally televised news. Nikai promised the

government will "respond appropriately," while declining to elaborate.

Government aid to troubled suppliers, mostly small and mid-sized companies in Japan, remains a possibility at a time that overall assistance to troubled businesses has been earmarked in response to the recession set off by the US financial crisis.

Chrysler, the third-largest US automaker, filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy

protection in New York Thursday after months of surviving on government loans. It is hoping to reorganize its business and build cleaner cars through an alliance with Italian automaker Fiat.

Japanese parts suppliers do business with major manufacturers like Toyota Motor Corp and Honda Motor Co, and also count on business with American companies, and have also set up offices and plants in the US.

### Japan's jobless rate rises to 4.8 percent in March

TOKYO, 1 May— Japan's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose to 4.8 percent from 4.4 percent in February, the highest in more than four years, the government said on Friday.

The rate is the highest since August 2004, although it is still below its post-World War II high of 5.5 percent, which was registered in April 2003.

For the fiscal 2008 which ended in March, 2009, the jobless rate averaged 4.1 percent, up from 3.8 percent in fiscal 2007, the Ministry of Internal Affairs and Communications said in a preliminary report.—Internet

### Eurozone unemployment rises to 8.9% in March

BRUSSELS, 1 May— Unemployment in the euro zone rose to 8.9 percent in March, up from 8.7 percent in the previous month, the European Union (EU)'s statistics bureau Eurostat said on Thursday.

It was also markedly higher than 7.2 percent registered a year ago.

It was the eighth consecutive month that the eurozone unemployment kept on the rise, a sign of the economic woes.

In the 27-nation EU, unemployment jumped to 8.3 percent, compared with 8.1 percent in the previous month and 6.7 percent a year ago.

### Brazilian aircraft maker Embraer's profit down 75% in Q1

RIO DE JANEIRO, 1 May— Brazil's Embraer, the world's leading manufacturer of small-sized aircraft, on Thursday announced profits of 38.3 million reais (17.7 million US dollars) in the first quarter of 2009, down 75 percent from the 152.1 million reais (70.4 million

dollars) registered in the same period last year.

The results, however, are very positive compared to the 40.6 million reais (18.8 million dollars) losses registered in the fourth quarter of 2008, showing the company is recovering.

Cash generation as

measured by Ebitda (earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation and amortization) totaled 209.6 million reais (97 million dollars) in the first quarter of 2009. In the first quarter of 2008, the cash generation totaled 227.7 million reais (105.4 million dollars).

### Experts to help overhaul industries in S China province

UANGZHOU, 1 May — South China's Guangdong Province will recruit more than 6,000 experts to assist in a technological overhaul of the local economy.

These experts will be assigned to 923 companies in the Pearl River Delta as the government pushes to upgrade the region's manufacturing-based industry, Friday's *China Daily* reported.

The English language newspaper attributed Guangdong's rapid development over the past three decades to its "numerous labour-intensive manufacturing businesses", saying the province now wants to restructure its economy to "one based on technology".—Internet

### Weight error caused Australia plane scare

SYDNEY, 1 May— Incorrect weight data on an in-flight computer caused the tail of an Emirates plane to scrape the runway during take-off from an Australian airport, according to officials.

The Dubai-bound Airbus A340 was forced to make an emergency landing an hour after taking off last month at Melbourne airport when the crew received a tail strike alarm.

Smoke began to enter the rear of the cabin as flight EK407 circled the

airport for more than 30 minutes to dump fuel before landing safely and without any injuries. There were 257 passengers and 18 crew on board.

A preliminary investigation by Australia's air safety regulator found that the weight was entered incorrectly into the onboard computer. "The result... was to produce a thrust setting and take-off reference speeds that were lower than those required for the aircraft's actual weight," the Australian Transport

Safety Bureau said.

The plane's tail was seriously damaged as the captain manually increased thruster pressure, scraping the rear fuselage along the tarmac and the grass verge beyond the runway.

An internal Emirates investigation had prompted review in a number of areas, including the potential introduction of a double-entry system for flight computers "to protect against single data source entry error," the ATSB said.—Internet

## Russian envoy vows firm response to NATO expulsion of diplomats

BRUSSELS, 1 May—Russian envoy to NATO, Dmitry Rogozin, said on Thursday that there will be a firm response from Moscow to NATO's decision to expel two Russian diplomats from its headquarters. Rogozin confirmed that two officials from the Russian mission to NATO have had their accreditation canceled.

"The response will be clear and tough," Rogozin told reporters in Brussels.

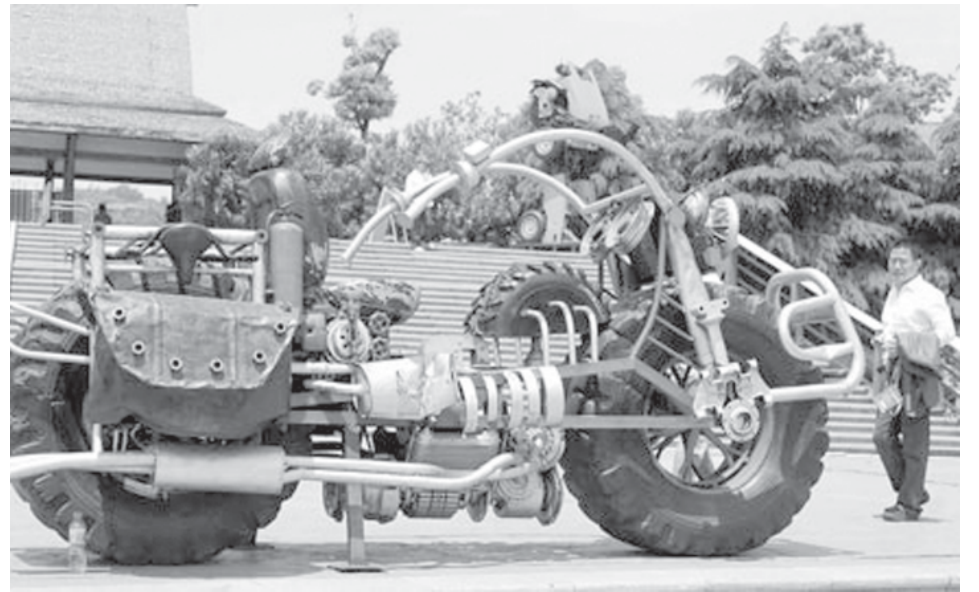
The two Russian officials were declared *persona non grata* by NATO for

alleged involvement in espionage. But Rogozin denied that they were spying. "We regard the decision taken by the alliance as a provocation. Its timing is in no way accidental," said the Russian mission in a statement.

"It appears that some members of NATO are discontent with the way Russia-NATO relations have recently been developing, and they provoke an international scandal on purpose, going all out in their attempt to disrupt Russian re-engagement with the

alliance along with a reset in relations between Russia and the United States," said the statement. The two diplomats—Viktor Kochukov, a senior counselor for political affairs, and Vasily Chizhov, an attache and security officer — were declared unwelcome by NATO on Wednesday, the same day when NATO and Russia resumed formal talks after a freeze of eight months.

## Two Palestinians die in tunnel collapse in Rafah

GAZA, 1 May—Two Palestinians died on Thursday in a tunnel collapse beneath the border between Egypt and southern Gaza Strip town of Rafah, medical sources said.

Mu'awia Hassanein, director of emergencies at the Health Ministry, said that two Palestinians were killed due to the collapse and three others went missing.

Abdallah Shehada, director of Abu Yousef al-Najjar hospital in Rafah, said that two dead bodies were brought to the hospital at 5:00 am (0200 GMT), refusing to give more details.

Hundreds of tunnels were dug under the border between Egypt and Gaza Strip and the Palestinians use to bring in a wide variety of goods and fuel that were not available in Gaza due to a tight Israeli blockade imposed since June 2007.—Xinhua

## Iran, Venezuela ink MoU on defence

TEHERAN, 1 May—Iran and Venezuela signed a memorandum of understanding (MoU) on bilateral defence ties on Thursday.

Iran's Defence Minister Brigadier General Mostafa Mohammad Najjar and his Venezuelan counterpart Ramon Carrizalez signed the document in Caracas, the official IRNA news agency reported.

The contract underlines an expansion of defense cooperation in education and exchanging experiences on defence issues, according to the report.

Najjar expressed Iran's readiness to assist Venezuela in developing its defense capabilities, it said.

Najjar also met Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez who highlighted Iran's "positive and constructive" role in the Middle East and its position in the foreign policy of Venezuela, according to the report.

Heading a high-ranking defence delegation, Najjar arrived in the Venezuelan capital of Caracas on Monday on a three-day visit.—Xinhua

## ADB approves plan to triple capital base

BALI, 1 May — The Asian Development Bank (ADB) said on Thursday that its Board of Governors had approved the plan to triple the lender's capital base, from 55 billion US dollars to 165 billion.

An overwhelming majority of ADB's 67 members endorsed the capital increase, the lender's largest one in history and also first one since 1994.

"This substantial increase is a resounding vote of confidence from our shareholders for what we can achieve as a premier development partner in the region," said ADB President Haruhiko Kuroda.

## Cuba calls on NAM to work coordinated, balanced form

HAVANA, 1 May — Cuban leader Raul Castro Wednesday called on the Non-Aligned Movement (NAM) to work in a coordinated and balanced form to deal with the global crisis. "We are affected with a deep economic, social, food, energy and environmental crisis, which has turned into a global one," Castro said when inaugurating a ministerial gathering of the NAM Coordination Bureau Meeting held here.

Castro said that the solution to the current global crisis demands the "universal, democratic and equitable" participation of all the countries, terming the forthcoming high level NAM conference scheduled for early June as an indispensable framework for such a wide participation. The Cuban leader also mentioned the need to change the international economic mechanism, noting a new order should be established. — Xinhua

## Hungary to focus on natural resources, people, culture at Shanghai Expo

BUDAPEST, 1 May— Hungary's aim at the Shanghai World Expo is to introduce the country's natural resources, people, economy and culture to visitors from different countries, the Hungarian prime minister's commissioner said.

"We don't want to exhibit too many products, (and) our goal is to introduce our country, including natural resources, people, economy and culture," said Andras Huszty, the PM's commissioner for Hungarian-Chinese economic rela-

tions and coordination of participation in the Shanghai World Expo.

Huszty said that the Hungarian pavilion will be beautiful with a decoration of wood rods, and visitors will feel they are having a walk in a forest, he said.

"The message we would like to send to the visitors of the Shanghai World Expo is that Hungary is a good place and we welcome Chinese people to our country," said Andras Huszty.

KABUL, 1 May — A Taliban local commander along with four of his armed men laid down arms and joined the reconciliation process in Badghis Province, northwest of Afghanistan, police said Thursday.

"Mullah Mohammad Isa along with his four men surrendered the government in Balamirghab District Wednesday and vowed to defend the government thus working for peace," police spokesman in west Afghanistan Abdul Rauf Ahmadi told Xinhua. — Xinhua

### 'Seven killed' in DR Congo plane crash

BANGUI, 1 May— All seven crew members were killed in the crash of a Boeing 737 in western Democratic Republic of Congo, the transport minister of the Central African Republic, where the plane was registered, said on Thursday.

The accident happened Wednesday as the plane was landing at Kenge, 320 kilometres (200 miles) east of Kinshasa on its way from Bangui to Harare, in Zimbabwe.

Minister Parfait Anicet Mbay said the aircraft was flying to Zimbabwe for

repairs after spending two years in Cameroon.

He indicated that although the Central African Republic did not have the facilities to repair the plane it had been checked and given the all clear to make the flight.

### French, Canadian aid workers freed in Darfur

PARIS, 1 May— Two aid workers held hostage in Darfur, one French and one Canadian, were freed Thursday after three weeks in captivity, France's foreign minister said.

The two women, sent to Darfur by non-governmental group International Medical Aid were in good health, Foreign Minister Bernard Kouchner said. They were brought to the Sudanese capital, Khartoum.

The two women, Stephanie Jodoin, of Canada, and Claire Dubois, of France, were seized 4 April in southwest Darfur and released Wednesday, International Medical Aid said in a statement.

Kouchner expressed

thanks on Thursday to those who helped free the workers. Neither he nor the aid group would elaborate on the release.

The semiofficial Sudan Media Center said 13 kidnappers traveling in two vehicles and on a camel seized the hostages and

took them to an area about 100 kilometres (60 miles) east of the town of al-Genaina in west Darfur.

The Sudan Media Center said no ransom was paid to free them, and that a tribal chief mediated the release.

### Italy frees hijacker of Achille Lauro ship

ROME, 1 May— One of the Palestinians who hijacked the Achille Lauro cruise ship and killed an American passenger in 1985 has been released after more than 23 years in jail, officials said on Thursday.

Youssef Magied al-Molqui left prison in Palermo, Sicily, on Wednesday and was transferred to a holding centre for immigrants in nearby Trapani while officials work to expel him, police in the Sicilian capital said.

Al-Molqui, a member of the four-man team that hijacked the Achille Lauro off the Egyptian coast, had been serving a 30-year sentence, which was reduced for good behavior.

He was convicted of shooting Leon Klinghoffer, an elderly Jewish man from New York, and ordering him to be dumped in the sea while in his wheelchair.

Klinghoffer's daughters and the Anti-Defamation League condemned Al-Molqui's early release.

"We are outraged at the news of the release of Youssef Magied Al-Molqui for good behavior. He is the terrorist who was responsible for actually shooting our father, Leon Klinghoffer, in cold blood, in his wheelchair," daughters Lisa and Ilsa Klinghoffer said in a statement.—Internet

### Three killed in air crash in Russia's Siberia

MOSCOW, 1 May— An An-2 aircraft crashed in northeastern Siberia's Yakutia on Thursday, killing all three crewmembers, news agencies reported, citing a local emergency spokesman.

"The plane crashed at 0:48 am Khabarovsk time (1348 GMT)," the RIA Novosti news agency quoted the spokesman as saying.

The single-engine biplane was heading from Lensk to Magan, the Itar-Tass news agency reported, citing the Far Eastern regional center of the Emergency Situations Ministry.

It crashed near the village of Pokrovka, 16 km away from the final destination.

Firefighters and rescue workers have arrived at the scene.

The cause of the crash remains unclear.

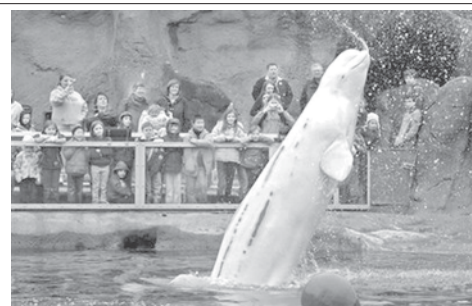
### Tobacco spit leads to charges in Wis safe theft

protect low-lying areas in Kyauktan and Thongwa townships from floods when the river is swollen in the rainy season, to let the unnecessary water in the interior areas flow back

into the river when the tide subsides, to supply the farmlands with freshwater stored in the late monsoon, to supply water to plantations of cold season crops, to supply additional water to the farmlands in summer, to prevent seawater and silt from entering the farmlands, and to prevent silting up of nearby creeks.

Kadappana Sluice Gate Project, about five miles from Kayan, Yangon Division, was launched in 2006-2007 and completed in 2008-2009.

Assistant Staff Officer of Construction (6) U Win Khaing in an interview said that it took only two years for them to construct the irrigation facility; that each gate was installed with two flat gates on the upstream side and with four silt gates on the downstream side; that previously, the areas around the facility were flooded in the rainy season and water was scarce in the hot season; that in the areas, underground water tapping was impossible; that the sluice gate would benefit 15,000 acres of arable lands.

We also interviewed some locals.

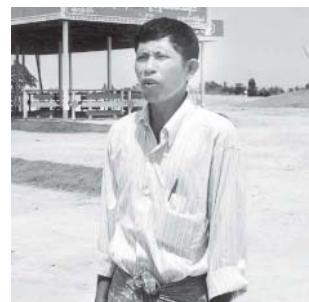
**Q:** Well, ma'am, what is

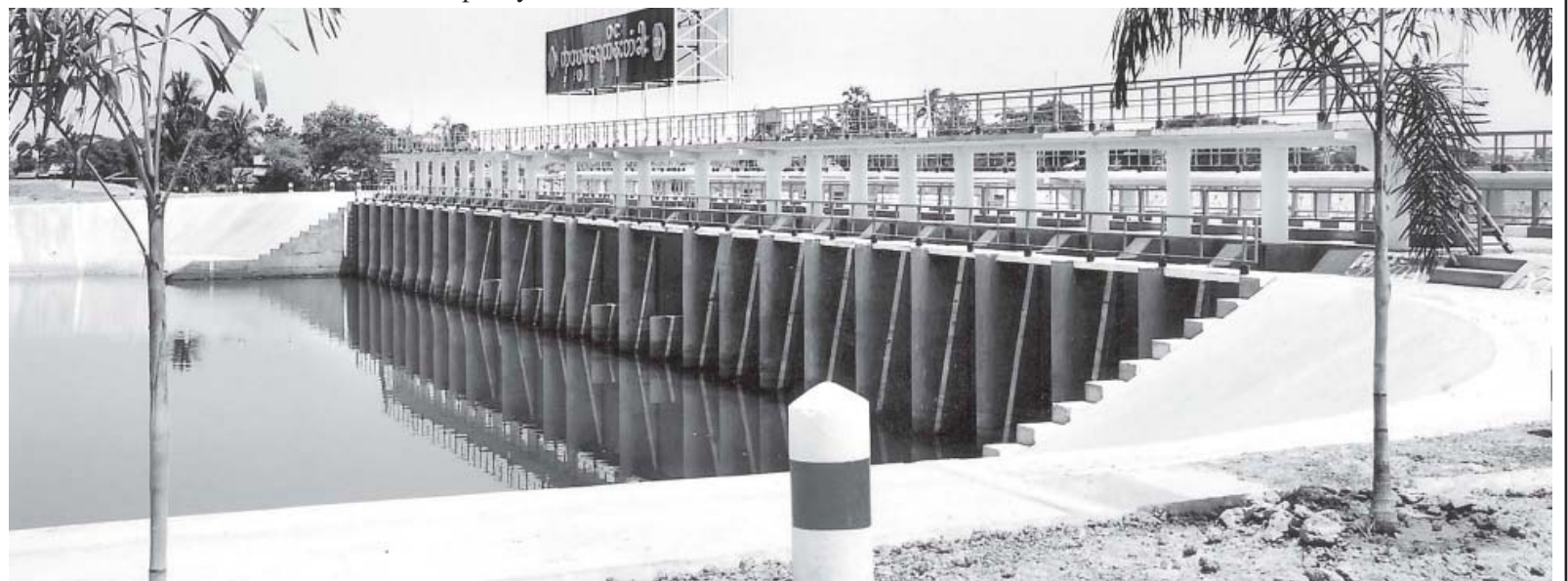

## Health Ministry taking preventive measures against outbreak of swine influenza

### Preparations made to provide health care services for suspected swine flu patients

NAY PYI TAW, 1 May—Swine influenza has broken out since 17 April. So far, the swine flu has killed 160 persons and the virus has spread to 16 countries including Mexico.

Swine influenza may be transformed into global human flu. Since 25 April, the Ministry of Health has been taking preventive measures against the swine flu transmitting to humans.

The Ministry of Health has carried out preventive measures against outbreak of Swine influenza A (H1N1) in Myanmar, made preparations for medical treatment, provided medicines and medical equipment and laboratory apparatuses to the hospitals and prepared the private wards at the hospitals.

With regard to situations of outbreak of Swine Influenza, the preventive measures and dissemination of health knowledge are being released to the people through TV, radio and dailies in time.

Since 29 April, the passengers have been under medical checks at airports, seaports and exits of borders.

Up to now, there has been no case of swine flu in Myanmar, according to the Ministry of Health.—MNA

## L&F Ministry carrying out necessary preventive measures against outbreak of swine flu virus in pigs

NAY PYI TAW, 1 May—Swine influenza has broken out in 16 countries from 17 April to date and it killed 160 people.

There has been no case of H1N1 virus in pig in the regions where swine flu breaks out in humans, according to the news release of World Organization for Animal Health (OIE).

The Ministry of Livestock and Fisheries is carrying out necessary preventive measures against outbreak of swine flu virus in pigs of Myanmar.

Immediately after receiving the news about the outbreak of swine flu in humans in Mexico, the Ministry of Livestock and Fisheries is undertaking the releasing of warnings to State/Division LBVDs and different levels of the Myanmar Livestock Breeding Federation, making field trips to check the health condition of animals at pig farms, performing the surveillance of virus and raising the bio-security.

News and information on knowledge about animal health are being announced to the people in time through dailies, radio and TV.

The inspection for safe consumption of pork and related products imported through border gateways and the educative talks on animal health are being held in States and Divisions.

The Ministry of Livestock and Fisheries today issued news that so far there has been no case of swine flu infected to pigs in Myanmar.

### Warning on global human flu

1. Swine flu in humans: Swine flu has been detected in the people in Mexico, the US, Canada and New Zealand from 17 April to date. A total of 160 persons were killed in infection of virus.
2. The flu is caused by a new virus. It is mixed with four genes and can spread quickly. Now there are cases of such flu in some countries. Regarding the disease, the World Health Organization announced that it is international public health State of emergency. The Ministry of Health is undertaking preventive measures against transmitting to humans through avian flu. In some countries there was an outbreak of swine flu among the people. The Ministry of Health is carrying out the tasks to fight against the disease.
3. The symptoms of swine flu are body heat, runny nose, coughing, aching, headache, lethargy, difficult breathing. They are like the symptoms of other diseases. If these symptoms appear, do not go to crowded public places such as worksites and schools. Take a rest at home. Make contact with the nearest health centres. Go to the hospital when one has high fever, long coughing, difficult breathing and lethargy. If the disease is serious, go to the hospital immediately. Wear surgical masks in order not to spread the disease.
4. It is found that the disease spread from people to people. Like SARS, it can become a pandemic. Therefore, the people are requested to keep the following points.
  - (a) Using handkerchief when coughing
  - (b) Proper washing the hands with soap properly
  - (c) Carrying out personal hygiene measures
  - (d) Sleeping well
  - (e) Eating nutritious food
  - (f) Taking exercises
  - (g) Breathing fresh air
5. In order to prevent flu infection, those who take care of the people infected with flu, wear surgical masks.
6. The Ministry of Health has made arrangements for prevention of the spread of such flu from other countries. News and information will be announced in time and the people are requested to follow the notice of the ministry.

#### Warning on Swine flu

1. Swine flu in humans: Swine flu has been detected in the people in Mexico, the US, Canada and New Zealand from 17 April to date. A total of 160 persons were killed in the infection of virus.
2. Symptoms in swine: The symptoms of the swine flu are sudden illness, mopping, coughing, runny nose, sneezing, difficult breathing, red eyes, inflammation, loss appetite. These symptoms can also be found in normal coughing and other sickness due to the weather changes.
3. Points to be followed in prevention against swine flu
  - (a) If found symptoms of sickness in pigs, they are to be kept in quarantine, and inform the LBVD.
  - (b) Take care of bio security in the farm where a large number of pigs are raised
  - (c) Wash hands and legs clean after cleaning the pigsty
  - (e) Use face masks and gloves when handling the unhealthy pigs
  - (f) Ban the sale of unhealthy pigs in the markets.
  - (g) Do not raise the pigs of unknown origin, especially those smuggled from other country
  - (h) If pork is cooked at 70°C and above, there will be no infection.
4. Prevention of swine flu: There is no case of swine flu in Myanmar. It is necessary for pig breeders and those who keep pigs on commercial scale and seller to participate in the preventive measures against the disease in cooperation with Myanmar Livestock Breeding Federation, Development Committees and local authorities.

## French nuclear power plant evacuated in bomb alert

PARIS, 1 May — A nuclear power station at Chinon in central France was evacuated on Thursday after a phone call warning of a bomb, power supplier EDF said.

EDF said the anonymous phone call was made at 0355 GMT and that, while searches continued, the core area of the plant had been secured. The nuclear plant was still functioning, EDF added.

“We will know at the start of the afternoon (around 1200 GMT) whether there is a bomb or not,” an EDF spokeswoman said by telephone. The Chinon plant, which has four 900-megawatt nuclear reactors, supplies electricity to around 6 per cent of the French population. — MNA/Reuters

## Iran says could cope with US fuel trade sanctions

TEHERAN, 1 May — Iran would find gasoline supplies even if the United States imposes sanctions targeting companies that ship fuel to the Islamic Republic, a senior Iranian oil official said on Thursday.

Twenty-five US senators from both parties on Tuesday proposed giving President Barack Obama new leverage in the dispute over Teheran’s nuclear ambitions: the authority to sanction companies supplying gasoline to Iran.

There was “no doubt” that Iran could cope with any such US measure, said

Ali Asghar Arshi, executive director for international affairs at National Iranian Oil Co (NIOC).

“We can manage ... we have alternatives and we can do something about consumption and also production”, Arshi told *Reuters*. “The market is very big. It is not a market handled by a few companies”.

Iran is the world’s fourth-largest oil exporter but lacks the refining capacity to meet domestic demand so relies heavily on international imports to guarantee fuel at the pumps. — MNA/Reuters

## At least 18 dead in severe heat wave in India

NEW DELHI, 1 May — At least 18 people have died in a scorching heat wave that has swept through more than a dozen Indian states, the weather department and officials said Friday.

The highest temperature of about 118 degrees Fahrenheit (47.5 Celsius) was recorded Thursday at Khandua in the central Madhya Pradesh state.

The heat wave has hit

the western state of Rajasthan, the northern state of Uttarakhand and at least a dozen other states, the India Meteorological Department said.

Authorities have confirmed at least 18 people died from heat stroke in the eastern state of Orissa, according to Manoranjan Choudhary, an official at the state revenue department, which monitors heat-related deaths. Thirty-six other suspected heat wave deaths are being investigated, he added.—*Internet*



## April marks bloodiest month for civilian death in Iraq

BAGHDAD, 1 May — April is the bloodiest month for civilian death toll in Iraq this year, according to Iraq officials.

Civilian death toll across Iraq rose remarkably in April compared with previous months, Iraqi officials said.

At least 355 Iraqis including 290 civilians and 65 members of Iraqi security forces were killed in April, Interior Ministry and Defense Ministry officials said.

The number of Iraqis killed in violent attacks rose to 355 from 252 in March, making April to be the bloodiest month this year. At least 70 Iranian pilgrims were also killed in two suicide bombings in Diyala and Baghdad last week.

At least 18 US soldiers have been killed in Iraq in April, bringing the US

death toll to about 4281 since the outbreak of US-led invasion in 2003, according to media count based on the independent website of icasualties.org. The figure is also the highest death toll for US troops in Iraq this year.

A series of deadly bombings struck Iraqi cities recently, raising fears that Iraq could again

go back to earlier stages of chaos and bloodshed.

The recent bombings targeted US soldiers, Iraqi security forces and civilians in Baghdad and several other provinces, including Nineveh, Anbar and Diyala, claiming the lives of hundreds of Iraqis, along with US soldiers.

## Confirmed H1N1 flu cases in Canada rise to 34

OTTAWA, 1 May — Fifteen new cases of confirmed human infection of influenza A/H1N1 were reported Thursday in Canada, bringing the total in the country to 34, including eight patients who contracted the illness in Canada.

An elementary school was closed after one student was found to have caught the disease, becoming the first school to be closed in Canada. Health officials said although the numbers are going up fast, they will not change their approach in combating the illness. While all 34 cases are described as mild ones, health officials have warned against complacency, saying the virus may mutate. A pandemic is highly likely, but it remains unclear how severe it will be, Canada’s chief public health officer David Butler-Jones said.

## US swine flu cases rise to 109

WASHINGTON, 1 May—The number of confirmed human swine flu cases in the United States has risen to 109, including a Mexican toddler who became the first fatality from swine flu in the country, the US Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reported on Thursday.

According to data posted on the CDC’s website, the states with confirmed cases are Arizona, California, Indiana, Kansas, Massachusetts, Michigan, Nevada, New York City, Ohio, South Carolina and Texas. South Carolina had confirmed 10 new cases, the CDC said.—*Internet*

## Elderly man arrested in Italy for coke in oranges

ROME, 1 May—The elderly man claimed he needed the oranges in his suitcase to keep up his vitamin C level, but Italian police soon realized the “C” stood for cocaine.

Customs officers in Rome on Thursday arrested a 76-year-old Dutch man who tried to smuggle in more than 13 pounds (six kilograms) of cocaine packed into oranges that had been emptied of their pulp.

The man arrested on international drug trafficking charges at Rome's Leonardo da Vinci airport had arrived from Buenos Aires, Argentina and said he was on his way back to the Netherlands after a vacation.

Police at the airport said the drugs would have had a street value of euro5 million (\$6.6 million).

## Iraq to kill three wild boars at zoo amid flu fears

BAGHDAD, 1 May—The Iraqi government decided Thursday to kill three wild boars at the Baghdad Zoo amid worldwide fears of swine flu, officials said.

No cases of swine flu have been reported in Iraq, and global health officials have said there is no evidence that people have contracted swine flu by eating pork or handling pigs. But Iraqi officials say they don't want to take any chances.

Iraq has few, if any,

pigs used as livestock because its dominant religion, Islam, considers the animals impure. Wild boars roam the countryside in some areas.

“The ministry of agriculture made a decision today to kill the three pigs in Baghdad Zoo as a precautionary measure,” Dr Sabah Jassim Mozan, the head of the ministry's veterinarian department, told *The Associated Press*.

No date has been set for their killing, according to Dr Ihssan Jaafar Ahmed,

who heads Iraq's swine flu committee. Zoo officials could not be reached for comment. Earlier Thursday, the mud-covered boars grazed quietly inside their large pen at the zoo.

Iraq's decision is among several drastic measures governments have taken to combat swine flu. Egypt began slaughtering the roughly 300,000 pigs in the country even though no cases have been reported there.—*Internet*

## Australian nursing home patient mauled by mice

SYDNEY, 1 May—A pack of mice mauled a bedridden 89-year-old man at an Australian nursing home, shredding parts of his ears and prompting the government on Thursday to launch an investigation into the facility. Federal Minister for Aging Justine Elliot ordered a probe into what the government-run nursing home in Queensland state was doing to protect residents, saying in a statement that the attack was “extremely disturbing and traumatic for residents and their families.”

Ray Hopper, a state opposition legislator who was alerted to the mauling by the man's family earlier this week, said the resident was found covered in blood by nursing staff Saturday. “An elderly, bedridden gentleman had the tops of his ears severely chewed, his head badly bitten and a very

bad wound in the throat,” Hopper said. “His hands were covered in blood when they found him; he'd obviously been so distressed trying to get the mice away.” Hopper accused health officials of being slow to respond to an out-of-control mouse infestation at Dalby Hospital, where Karingal Nursing Home is located. “It is the most disgusting, horrific thing,” Hopper said. “There wasn't a wall of mice suddenly hitting the place — this has been building up for three weeks. They had plenty of time to act.”

## Suspected serial killer wanted in 30 murders arrested in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, 1 May—Police said Thursday that they have arrested a man who is suspected in the sexual assault-slayings of 30 women and probably the “most prolific serial killer” the Los Angeles area has ever seen.

John Thomas Jr was arrested on the night of 31 March and has been held with bail, according to the website of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department. The 72-year-old man was charged on 2 April with murder in connection with the deaths of two women, aged 68 and 67, in 1970s in Los Angeles.

Thomas' DNA has been tied to the two murder cases and three other homicides, two in 1970s and one in 1986, according to Richard Bengston, a cold case detective of the Los Angeles Police Department.

## Africans have world's greatest genetic variation

WASHINGTON, 1 May—Africans have more genetic variation than anyone else on Earth, according to a new study that helps narrow the location where humans first evolved, probably near the South Africa-Namibia border. The largest study of African genetics ever undertaken also found that nearly three-fourths of African-Americans can trace their ancestry to West Africa. The new analysis published Thursday in the online edition of the journal *Science*.

“Given the fact that modern humans arose in Africa, they have had time to accumulate dramatic changes” in their genes, explained lead researcher Sarah Tishkoff, a geneticist at the University of Pennsylvania.—*Internet*

## Flu brings less crime, blue sky to Mexico City

MEXICO CITY, 1 May — The sound of leaves rustling in the wind replaces a cacophony of commuter car horns.

The lone bark of a dog echoes from a far-off balcony into the normally bustling restaurant district, suddenly empty of lunchtime crowds and late-night revelers.

Swine flu is scary, but it has also brought an unusual calm to this city that never shuts up. Crime is down and even the smoggy skies have turned a shade approaching blue.

Throughout Mexico City, a megalopolis of 20 million, hustle and bustle

has given way to shuffles and sighs.

Mexico has taken drastic steps to prevent the flu's spread: By presidential decree, almost all businesses and government services nationwide will shut for five days starting with the May Day holiday Friday. Only "essential services" such as transportation, supermarkets and hospitals are being kept open. Schools were already closed nationwide.

In the Bohemian Condesa neighbourhood, sidewalks usually crowded with diners sharing loud gossip and blowing clouds of cigarette smoke were

empty on Thursday. "Takeout service only" signs plastered restaurant doors.

In well-heeled neighbourhoods, security guards wearing blue face masks stood outside apartment buildings where tenants were heeding the advice to stay home, avoid crowds, rest up and keep their germs to themselves.

Bike messengers, street cleaners and dog walkers strolled easily along quiet streets, emptied of the exhaust-belching, horn-blowing Hummers, SUVs, moving vans and trucks that normally crowd them.—INTERNET

## More schools close, swine flu cases pass 100

WASHINGTON, 1 May — Hundreds of schools scattered around the country closed as the nation's swine flu caseload passed 100 Thursday, and US authorities said they eventually could produce enough vaccine for everyone if necessary — but that shots couldn't begin until fall at the earliest.

The outbreak penetrated over a dozen states and even touched the White House, which disclosed that an aide to Energy Secretary Steven Chu apparently got sick helping arrange President Barack Obama's recent trip to Mexico but that the aide did not fly on Air Force One and never posed a risk to the president.

An estimated 12,000

people logged onto a Webcast where the government's top emergency officials sought to cut confusion by answering questions straight from the public: Can a factory

worker handling parts from Mexico catch the virus? No. Can pets get it? No.

And is washing hands or using those alcohol-based hand gels best? Washing well enough is the real issue, answered Dr Richard Besser, acting chief of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. He keeps hand gel in his pocket for between-washings but also suggested that people sing "Happy Birthday" as they wash their hands to make sure they've washed long enough to get rid of germs.

It is safe to fly, US officials found themselves stressing after Vice President Joe Biden got off message Thursday.

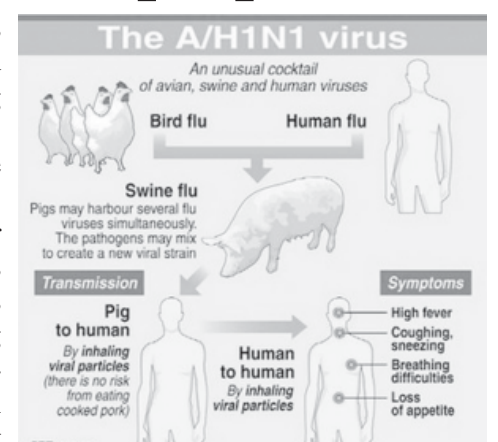
## Farmers fear pigs may get swine flu from people

KANSAS CITY, 1 May — Humans have it. Pigs don't. At least not yet, and US pork producers are doing everything they can to make sure that the new H1N1 virus, known around the world as the "swine flu," stays out of their herds.

"That is the biggest concern, that your herd could somehow contract this illness from an infected person," said Kansas hog farmer Ron Suther, who is banning visitors from his sow barns and requiring maintenance workers, delivery men and other strangers to report on recent travels and any illness before they step foot on his property.

"If a person is sick, we don't want you coming anywhere on the farm," Suther said. Those sentiments were echoed by producers around the nation this week as fears of a possible global flu pandemic grew, with more than 200 people sickened, including more than 100 in the United States, and at least 177 dead, all but one in Mexico.

"There is no evidence of this new strain

## First suspected case of swine flu detected in Japan

TOKYO, 1 May — The first suspected case of swine flu has been detected in Japan, the Japanese Health, Labour and Welfare Ministry said late Thursday night.

The patient, a 17-year-old high school student in Yokohama, is subjected to further examination to de-

termine whether he is infected with the new type of influenza, the ministry said.

The patient, who had been on a school trip in Canada's British Columbia Province on 10-25 April, suffered from a fever and cough and underwent a medical

checkup Thursday at a Yokohama municipal hospital.

According to the municipal government of Yokohama, he has already been hospitalized and his symptoms are not serious. And none of his family members has any flu-like symptom.—INTERNET

## No suspected case of swine flu in India

NEW DELHI, 1 May — The Indian Government Thursday said it was screening around 50,000 passengers coming from swine flu-affected countries even as it assured that there was no suspected case of the disease in the country as of now.

"There is no suspected case of swine flu in the country so far," Joint Sec-

retary Ministry of Health, Vineet Chaudhary told reporters here. The clarification came in the wake of reports that a Hyderabad resident had come back from Mexico with flu like symptoms. "The patient is not showing any symptoms now. In fact he had reported to a nearby health centre for check up after he developed flu like symp-

toms after coming back from Mexico," Chaudhary said.

Director, NICD, Shival said fresh samples have been taken from the Hyderabad resident and are being flown to Delhi and the results will be available in the next 24 to 48 hours.

The Centre has also decided to increase its Tamiflu stock from one million to 10 million doses over the next seven days, he said, adding the stockpile would be decentralised all over the country so that any emergency situation can be dealt with quickly.

A total of 50,000 passengers who have come from countries affected by swine flu have been traced and checks would be carried out on them.

Chaudhary said 8 counters have been set up at the Delhi airport and each counter will be manned by one doctor and two nurses. — MNA/PTI

## WHO confirms 257 swine flu cases worldwide

GENEVA, 1 May — The World Health Organization (WHO) on Thursday confirmed a total of 257 human infections of swine flu, which were officially reported from 11 countries. Of those cases, 109 were from the United

States, including one death, and 97 were from Mexico, including seven deaths, the UN agency said in a latest update.

Countries that have reported laboratory-confirmed cases with no deaths include Austria (1), Canada (19), Germany (3), Israel (2), the Netherlands (1), New Zealand (3), Spain (13), Switzerland (1) and Britain (8).

# More illegal Indian workers leave Dubai

Thousands of Indian workers are employed informally in the United Arab Emirates, the second-largest Arab economy, entering the country without proper work permits and often working as day labourers for construction companies. He said one way of tracking the movement of illegal Indian workers was through emergency certificates, the documents issued by the consulate in lieu of missing passports which permit Indian citizens to return home.—*MNA/Reuters*

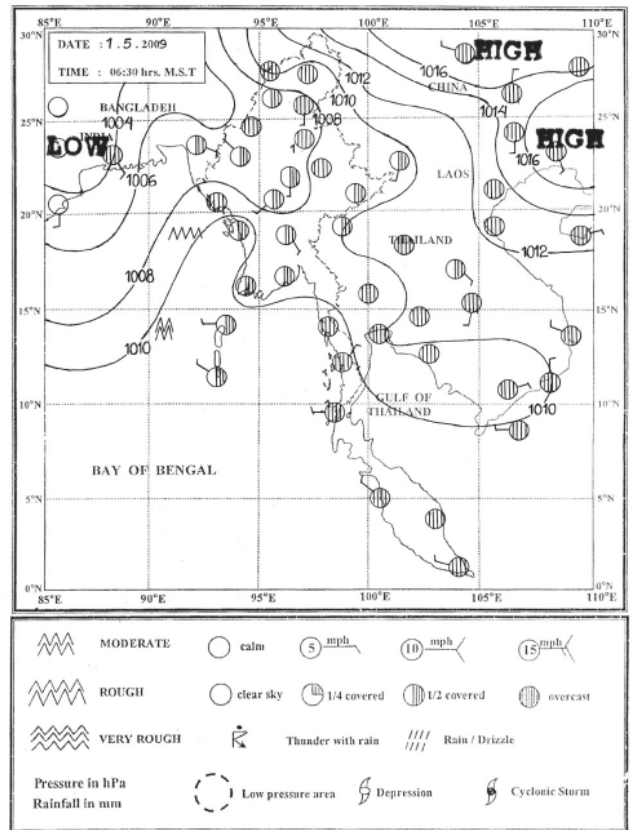

**Southern glaciers grow out of step with North**

AUCKLAND, 1 May — The vast majority of the world's glaciers are retreating as the planet gets warmer. But a few, including ones south of the equator, in South America and New Zealand, are inching forward.

A new study in the journal Science puts this enigma in perspective; for the last 7,000 years New Zealand's largest glaciers have often moved out of step with glaciers in the

northern hemisphere, pointing to strong regional variations in climate.

Conventional wisdom holds that climate during the era of human civilization has been relatively stable, but the new study is the latest to challenge this view, by showing that New Zealand's glaciers have gone through rapid periods of growth and decline during the current interglacial period known as the Holocene.

"New Zealand's mountain glaciers have fluctuated frequently over the last 7,000 years and glacial advances have become slightly smaller through time," said lead author Joerg Schaefer, a geochemist at Columbia University's Lamont-Doherty Earth Observatory. "This pattern differs in important ways from the northern hemisphere glaciers."

**Indus script encodes language**

MUMBAI, 1 May — The Rosetta Stone allowed 19th century scholars to translate symbols left by an ancient civilization and thus decipher the meaning of Egyptian hieroglyphics. But the symbols found on many other ancient artifacts remain a mystery, including those of a people that inhabited the Indus val-

ley on the present-day border between Pakistan and India.

A University of Washington computer scientist has led a statistical study of the Indus script, comparing the pattern of symbols to various linguistic scripts and nonlinguistic systems, including DNA and a computer programming language. The results, pub-

lished online April 23 by the journal Science, found the Indus script's pattern is closer to that of spoken words, supporting the hypothesis that it codes for an as-yet-unknown language. "We applied techniques of computer science, specifically machine learning, to an ancient problem," said Rajesh Rao, a UW associate professor of computer science and engineering and lead author of the study.
