### Say no to tobacco to become healthy, fit citizens

The World Health Organization designated 31<sup>st</sup> May as World No Tobacco Day.

Health and fitness deserve careful attention from everyone, as only with health and fitness can a person improve his social life.

A notable point for public health is that the danger posed by smoking has adverse effects not only on smokers but also on passive smokers.

Once, smoking claimed casualties more than any other cause. If a person smokes for many years at a stretch, the membranes in his tongue and oral cavity will get thicker and lose sense of feeling taste of the food. In addition, smoking makes oral cavity dry and that encourages proliferation of bacteria that do not live on oxygen. If so, the smoker may get pyorrhoea in his gums.

Smoking also can cause lung cancer, cardiovascular disease, heart failure and paralytic stroke.

Women are more vulnerable to smoking. If a woman smokes while pregnant, she will be likely to suffer abortion and premature birth.

Now, a variety of ways are applied to control the abuse of cheroots and tobacco products with the aim of easing the social and economic problems, evil consequences of smoking.

The people are therefore exhorted to say no to tobacco in order that they can keep themselves healthy and fit with better social life; married persons can lead a happy married life; and the youth of the nation will become reliable citizens with high physical and intellectual calibres.

## US military deaths in Afghanistan region at 618

WASHINGTON, 30 May —As of Friday, 29 May, 2009, at least 618 members of the US military had died in Afghanistan, Pakistan and Uzbekistan as a result of the US invasion of Afghanistan in late 2001, according to the Defence Department. The department last updated its figures Friday at 10 am EDT.

Of those, the military reports 456 were killed by hostile action.

Outside the Afghan region, the Defence Department reports 67 more members of the US military died in support of Operation Enduring Freedom. Of those, three were the result of hostile action. The military lists these other locations as Guantanamo Bay Naval Base, Cuba; Djibouti; Eritrea; Ethiopia; Jordan; Kenya; Kyrgyzstan; Philippines; Seychelles; Sudan; Tajikistan; Turkey; and Yemen.

There were also four CIA officer deaths and one military civilian death.—*Internet*

## US military deaths in Iraq war at 4,304

WASHINGTON, 30 May — As of Friday, 29 May, 2009, at least 4,304 members of the US military had died in the Iraq war since it began in March 2003.

The figure includes nine military civilians killed in action. At least 3,448 military personnel died as a result of hostile action, according to the military's numbers.

The British military has reported 179 deaths; Italy, 33; Ukraine, 18; Poland, 21; Bulgaria, 13; Spain, 11; Denmark, seven; El Salvador, five; Slovakia, four; Latvia and Georgia, three each; Estonia, Netherlands, Thailand and Romania, two each; and Australia, Hungary, Kazakhstan and South Korea, one death each.—*Internet*

## Taleban kill 4 truckers, set fire on 10 trucks in S Afghanistan

KABUL, 30 May— Taleban militants fighting Afghan and the US-led forces in Afghanistan, attacked a supplying convoy in the southern Zabol province, killing four drivers and set on fire 10 trucks, provincial police chief Abdul Rahman Sarjang said Friday.

“A group of Taliban militants attacked a convoy of trucks in Shinkai district Thursday evening, killing four truckers and burning 10 trucks,” Sarjang told Xinhua.

All the victims were Afghans, he said. He said that the trucks belonged to locals and supplied non-military lo-

gistic items to the international troops stationed in south Afghanistan.

Troops from several countries including the US, Canada, Australia, Britain and Holland have been serving in the southern region to stabilize security there.

Meantime, a Taleban purported spokesman Qari Yusuf Ahmadi in talks with media from an undisclosed location claimed that 15 drivers and guards of the convoy were killed in the attack.

Taleban fighters have vowed to intensify attacks and activities this year in Afghanistan.—*Internet*

## Twin roadside bombings kill four Afghan civilians, wound three police

KABUL, 30 May— Two roadside bombings rocked Kandahar, the former stronghold of Taleban in south Afghanistan on Saturday, leaving four civilians dead and injuring three police constables, an official said.

The first attack, which hit a civilian car in Khakriz district killing four civilians including a woman Saturday morning while the other attack targeted a police van in Dand district wounding three police constables, a police officer Ghulam Hazrat, told Xinhua.

He blamed Taleban fighters for the incidents, adding the militants carried out such attacks to destabilize the province.—*Internet*

## Seven killed, 14 injured in separate bomb attacks NE Baghdad

BAGHDAD, 30 May — Seven people were killed and 14 others were injured in separate attacks on Friday in Diyala Province, northeast of Baghdad, a well-informed police source said.

Five people were killed and 12 others were injured in the first attack when a parked minibus was ripped apart by blast in Khalis town in Diyala, about 75 km northeast of Baghdad, the police source told Xinhua on condition of anonymity. People were getting on the minibus to travel to other nearby towns when the bomb exploded on the bus at mid-day. Four women and three children were among the wounded, the source added.

Several cars and buildings nearby were damaged by the explosion, the source added.

Separately, two people were killed and two others were injured when a car were struck by a roadside bomb near Khanaqeen town in Diyala, about 60 km northeast of Baghdad.

Diyala has long been the hotbed of insurgency since the US-led invasion of Iraq in 2003, despite the ongoing security crackdown in the province conducted by US-backed Iraqi security forces.—*Internet*

## Bomb kills four north of Baghdad, say Iraqi police

BAGHDAD, 30 May —A bomb exploded inside a bus station north of Baghdad on Friday, killing at least four people and wounding 10, police said, the deadliest in a series of attacks in northern Iraq.

A US soldier also was killed Friday in a grenade attack, raising to at least 22 the number of American troop deaths so far in May. That's the deadliest month for US forces in Iraq since September, when 25 died.

The grenade detonated near a US patrol in the northern province of Ninevah, the military said in a statement, providing no further details.

Insurgent activity has persisted in northern Iraq despite several US-Iraqi military operations.

Friday's bus station bomb was attached to a car parked inside the station in the Shiite enclave of Khalis, according to local police and a report from the provincial security headquarters. Police officers gave the casualty toll on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to release the information.

The US military said the attack occurred near a vegetable market, killing at least one person and wounding 14. Conflicting casualty tolls are common in the chaotic aftermath of bombings in Iraq.

## US economy shrinks at 5.7% pace in Q1

WASHINGTON, 30 May—The US economy sank at a 5.7-percent rate in the first quarter, slightly less deep than the 6.1-percent annualized decline estimated last month, the Commerce Department reported Friday.

Despite the slight improvement, the first-quarter performance was still grim. It marked the second straight quarter where the economy took a big hit. At the end of 2008, the economy shrank at a whopping 6.3-percent pace, the most in 25 years.

In the first quarter, American consumers, who had tightened their purse strings for two consecutive quarters, boosted their spending by 1.5 percent but less than the 2.2-

percent growth rate estimated a month ago.

“The decrease in real GDP in the first quarter primarily reflected negative contributions from exports, equipment and software, private inventory investment, nonresidential structures, and residential fixed investment that were partly offset by a positive contribution from personal consumption expenditures,” the Commerce Department said.

Meanwhile, business spending on equipment and software plunged 33.5 percent. That was steeper than the 28.1-percent drop in the final quarter of last year and the most since the first quarter of 1958.—*Internet*

## Two bombs explode in Ecuador, causing no injuries

QUITO, 30 May—Two pamphlet-bombs exploded Thursday night targeting the buildings of a TV channel and the Ecuadorian Education Ministry without reports of victims and major damages, Ecuadorian police said on Friday.

Both explosions were registered at around 23:00 local time on Thursday (0500 GMT on Friday) in the north of Quito. The first explosive device blew up at the gardens of the right-wing TV channel Teleamazonas, where some 50 people were working, but none of them were injured.

The second was detonated at the headquarters of the Education Ministry. The pamphlets found at both explosion sites were against the government, police general commander Freddy Martinez said.

Jorge Ortiz, Teleamazonas' presenter of the morning news, said that the TV channel wanted “to announce, once again, that despite all the threats, attacks and incomprehension, the channel will not change by any means its decision of continuing being an independent channel from the political power, to inform without fear, with objectivity, pluralism and opening.”—*Internet*

## NY off-duty police officer killed by fellow cop

NEW YORK, 30 May—An off-duty rookie police officer was killed by a fellow cop Thursday night in a shooting in East Harlem of New York City in what appears to be a case of mistaken identity. Police said the 25-year-old officer, Omar Edwards, married and father of two small children, was confronting suspect Miguel Santiago, who has five prior arrests for drugs, assault and robbery.

When Edwards was approaching his car at about 10:30 p.m. local time, he saw Santiago breaking into his car. Edwards called 911, drew his gun and started chasing Santiago. Plainclothes officers responded to the scene and fired six rounds at Edwards, hitting him in the arm and chest. He was not wearing a bullet proof vest at the time.—*MNA/Xinhua*

## Hezbollah leader promises stronger Lebanon

BEIRUT, 30 May—Hezbollah leader Hassan Nasrallah told supporters Friday in Beirut his group will strengthen the Lebanese Army if it wins political power.

Nasrallah also said Lebanon and Israel could become involved in armed conflict again, although he called the possibility “far off,” Ynetnews reported.

In his speech, which commemorated the ninth anniversary of the Israeli withdrawal from southern Lebanon, Nasrallah promised Hezbollah would “arm the Lebanese Army and make it strong.” He also said Iran would “gladly” offer military aid.

Nasrallah accused Israel of trying to create sectarian conflict in Lebanon by blaming Hezbollah for the assassination of former Prime Minister Rafik Hariri. A story suggesting evidence points to Hezbollah ran recently in the German magazine Der Spiegel.

Many in the audience of thousands chanted “Death to Israel” during the speech.—*Internet*

## 18 Taliban fighters, six Afghan soldiers killed in clash

KABUL, 30 May—24 people including 18 suspected Taliban militants have been killed as fighting flared up in Afghanistan's northwest Badghis province, provincial governor Dulbar Jan Arman said Saturday.

“Taliban fighters ambushed a unit of national army soldiers in Balamurghab district Friday and troops returned fire leaving 18 Taliban rebels dead,” Arman told *Xinhua*. Six Afghan soldiers were killed in the firefight lasted for several hours, he added. Several Taliban insurgents and five Afghan troopers sustained injuries in the conflicts, he added.—*Internet*

## Indian Navy foils attack on Cargo ship, two pirates killed

NEW DELHI, 30 May—An Indian Navy ship has thwarted a pirate attack on a merchant vessel with 10 Indian crew in the Gulf of Aden in which two of the eight Somali sea brigands are feared killed and the rest arrested, Navy sources

said Friday. The attack on the Norwegian-owned merchant vessel — *M V Maud*, flying the Liberian flag — took place about 225 nautical miles east of Aden around 1300 hours IST Thursday, the sources said.

INS Talwar, a guided missile frigate, was escorting a three-vessel group in the international recommended transit corridor in the Gulf of Aden when *Maud* crew noticed an eight-member pirate gang in a skiff approaching towards it. The vessel's captain sent a distress signal to Talwar, which rushed a helicopter to ward off the piracy attack.—*MNA/PTI*

## Schwarzenegger proposes 5% cut in California employee salaries

LOS ANGELES, 30 May—Amid a worsening budget crisis, California Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger has proposed a 5-cent cut in state workers' salaries, a newspaper report said on Friday.

The governor's proposed salary reduction would affect 235,000 state workers who already are taking mandatory unpaid furloughs to help the state grapple with a projected budget gap of 24.3 billion US dollars, according to

the *Los Angeles Times*.

Combined with the furloughs, ordered by Schwarzenegger earlier this year, the new proposed salary cuts would push many state employees' wages down by about 15 percent, saving the state 470 million dollars, said the paper.

"Everyone in the state is cutting back right now — businesses, families," said Matt David, a spokesman for Schwarzenegger. "The governor feels it's very important that state workers

do the same thing."

Meanwhile, Schwarzenegger is considering to close 220 California state parks that draw nearly 80 millions of visitors every year.

Schwarzenegger this week recommended eliminating 70 million dollars in parks spending through 30 June, 2010. An additional 143.4 million dollars would be saved in the following fiscal year by keeping the parks closed.

### Sino-Arab relations are very much valued

UNITED NATIONS, 30 May—The exponential growth in trade and strategic relations between China and the Arab world is highly valued at the League of Arab States and will not come at the expense of relations with the United States, the secretary-general of the League of Arab States said at a press conference here on Friday.

"We value very much our relationship with China," Secretary-General Amre Moussa, told Xinhua. "We can have

good relations, growing trade and growing economic investments with China and America at the same time."

China is now the largest exporter to the Arab world, overtaking the United States for the first time since the 1960s. Trade between China and Arab countries jumped from 36.7 billion US dollars in 2004, when the Sino-Arab Cooperation Forum was launched, to 132.8 billion dollars last year.

In the past, particularly during the Bush adminis-

tration, the Arab world became increasingly disenchanted with America's lackluster role in the Israel-Palestine conflict. But US President Barack Obama offers renewed hope that peace talks will progress.

"The previous administration waited six years (before addressing the crisis)," said Moussa. "Now (the Obama) administration has started engaging right away. This is encouraging because all of us have suffered from certain policies in the past."

### Major US car parts suppliers file for bankruptcy

DETROIT, 30 May—Two Michigan-based major US auto parts suppliers have filed for bankruptcy, as demand for cars plunged to decades' low levels in North America.

Visteon, former parts-making unit of Ford Motors, has filed for bankruptcy protection in Delaware. The company confirmed on Thursday that it will get financing support from Ford during bankruptcy.

Ford is the only one of the three largest US

automakers that is not being driven into bankruptcy.

Meanwhile, chassis manufacturer Metaldyne Corp, a unit of Japan's Asahi Tec Corp, announced on Wednesday that it was filing to the New York bankruptcy court.

Metaldyne, whose largest unsecured creditor with a 27.5-million-US-dollar claim is Chrysler, has accumulated 929 million dollars in liabilities since 31 Dec. Asahi Tec

said in a statement to the Tokyo Stock Exchange.

Visteon has been losing money in the past nine years since its spinning-off from Ford in June 2000. According to its Chapter 11 filings, the company has 4.58 billion dollars in assets and 5.32 billion dollars in liabilities, including 862 million dollars owed to bondholders.—Xinhua

### Renault, Nissan to strengthen alliance for 1.5 bln euro cost savings

PARIS, 30 May—French second largest auto maker Renault SA and Japanese Nissan Motor Co announced Friday they will strengthen their alliance with a goal of an extra 1.5 billion euros (about 2.1 billion US dollars) in cost savings this year, the two companies said in a statement.

Renault-Nissan Alli-

ance was to "accelerate and deepen" the cooperation, which was expected to get both companies through the global economic crisis, the statement said. "Today, we must move faster," said Carlos

Ghosn, the chairman of the alliance. "Seeking synergies is no longer optional, but mandatory." According to the statement, the 2009 savings will be shared equally between the two partners.—Xinhua

### Brazil launches rocket to test launching base

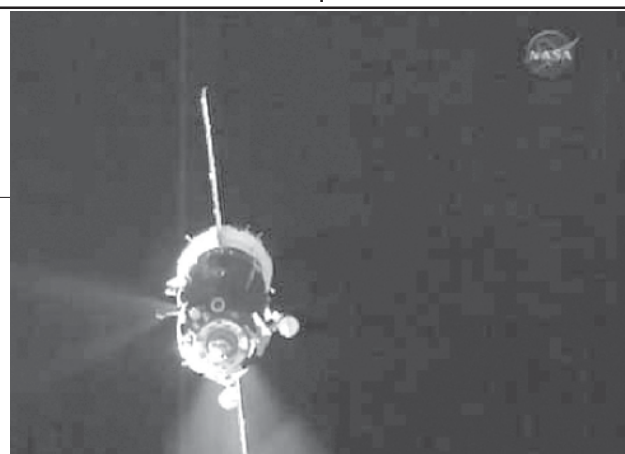
RIO DE JANEIRO, 30 May—The Brazilian Space Agency (AEB) on Friday launched a rocket to test the facilities at the Alcantara Launching Center, the AEB said. The launching, which took place on Friday afternoon, was "a complete success", AEB said in a statement.

The mission was code-named Maracati 1 under a partnership between Brazil and Germany. It was the first launch from the Alcantara base since 2007.

The rocket, named Orion 1, was developed by Germany. It was equipped with tracking devices and reached 93 kilometers high before falling into the sea about 80 kilometers off the Brazilian coast.

### Two killed in Nigerian military aircraft crash

LAGOS, 30 May — A military aircraft belonging to the Nigeria Air Force (NAF) crashed Thursday in northern Nigeria's Kaduna State, killing two officers, the Lagos-based Guardian newspaper reported Friday. The officers are a Group Captain and a Flying Officer. The aircraft which is known as Air Beetle is used for training by the NAF. It crashed at about 3:00 pm local time.

As at press time, the reason for the crash was unknown.—*Internet*

rights is common across Sudan, but the violence has grown worse over the years with the number of arms left over from the two-decade long civil war between the north and the south that ended in 2005.

The Messariah and Rezeigat tribes that clashed Tuesday and Wednesday straddle the border region between southern Kordofan and neighboring Darfur, where

a separate conflict that has claimed 300,000 lives has raged for more than six years. Interior Minister Hamed Ibrahim told the Cabinet on Thursday that in addition to the police, 169 tribesman were killed in the fighting, including 89 from the Messariah and 80 from the Rezeigat. Calm has now returned to the area, he was quoted as saying by the state news agency.—*Internet*

### Ship sinks off Indonesia's coast, at least nine dead

JAKARTA, 30 May — Rescuers searched for survivors Friday after a wooden boat packed with Afghan migrants sank off western Indonesia, killing at least nine people and leaving 11 others missing, the Navy said.

More than a dozen Afghans have been found alive in the Malacca Strait, about 30 miles (50 kilometers) from land, said Al Muhfid, a navy second lieutenant. Most were plucked from the choppy waters by fishermen immediately after Thurs-

day's accident.

The Afghan men, including several who were badly hurt, told authorities they had flown from Afghanistan to Malaysia, where human traffickers offered to help them get by boat to Australia, where they hoped to start a new life.

But nine hours into the journey, as they were nearing Indonesia's coast of Sumatra to refuel, they encountered a dark, thick haze triggered by land-clearing forest fires. They slammed into a fishing platform,

putting the boat off balance.

"Just then, they were hit by high waves and the boat capsized," said Muhfid, adding that at least nine people were killed and 11 others remain missing.

Survivors told investigators they wanted to seek political asylum in Indonesia because of the security situation in their homeland, he said, but no decision has yet been made. More interviews need to be carried out with immigration officials, he said.—*Internet*

### Oil hits 6-month high above \$66 on economic hopes

NEW YORK, 30 May — Oil rose to a six-month high above \$66 per barrel on Friday, marking its largest monthly percentage gain in more than a decade, after US, Japanese and Indian data suggested the economic downturn may be easing.

Oil prices jumped around 30 percent this month, the largest monthly rise since March 1999, buoyed by expectations of a global economic recovery later this year, which helped push stock markets higher.

US crude oil for July delivery settled up \$1.23 at \$66.31, its highest settlement since 4 November, after earlier hitting \$66.47, the highest intraday trade since 5 November.

London Brent crude settled up \$1.13 at \$65.52, its highest settle since 4 November.

### Bong! Big Ben rings in its 150th anniversary

Defiantly low-tech yet accurate to the second, Big Ben is having its 150th birthday Sunday 31 May, 2009, its Victorian chimes carrying the sound of Britain into the 21st century.

It's a birthday the world can share in. The peals of London's favourite clock are carried globally by BBC radio, and its 315-foot tower, roughly 16 stories, is the city's most famous landmark.

But getting inside and seeing Big Ben, the sonorous main bell that gives its name to the whole contraption, isn't easy. Security measures mean few are granted admission, and there's no elevator, so those who are escorted in must climb 334 winding limestone stairs.

Catherine Moss, who took journalists on a pre-anniversary tour, said that in

one year as a Big Ben guide, she had climbed the height of Everest three times over. "It's my own private step machine," the trim-looking 51-year-old called down from the top of the tower.

No special events are planned, aside from an exhibition opening 19 Sept in the nearby parliamentary offices.

A man has been arrested in the Iowa City area after police say he tried to eat a bag of marijuana to avoid drug charges. University Heights police said the man was pulled over early Sunday for a traffic violation. Police said the officers noticed a marijuana odor on his breath, and a green, leafy substance on his shirt.

Police Chief Ron Fort said the officers then discovered the man had a partially eaten plastic bag in his mouth.

Fort said the suspect eventually gagged, and a medium sized bag came out of his mouth.

The man was charged with preventing apprehension and obstructing prosecution and third-offense drug possession.

### Pittsburgh student used snake as jump rope

Pittsburgh police say a high school student is facing charges for using a biology class snake as a jump rope.

Police say the incident happened Monday at Taylor Allderdice (ahl-DER'-dys) High School.

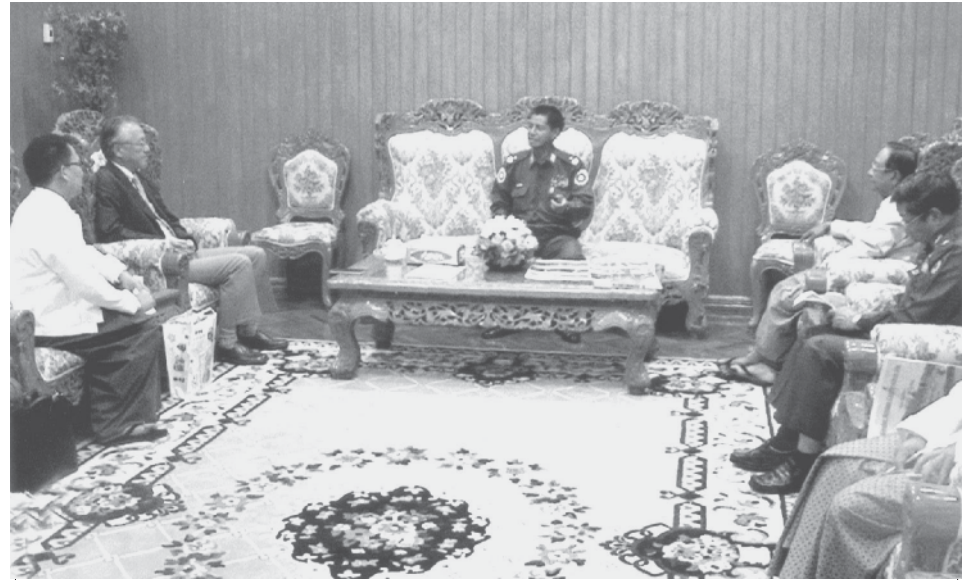

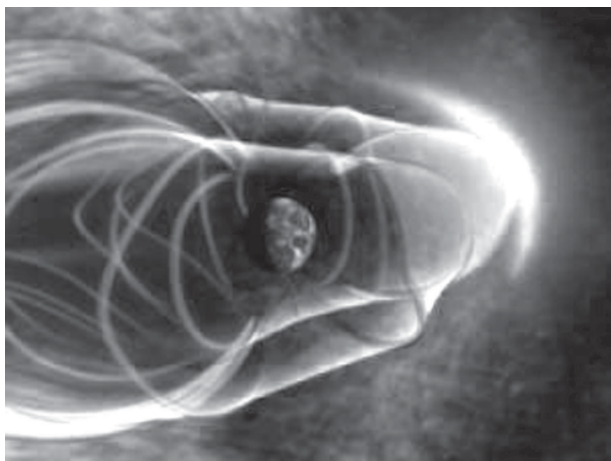

## Magnetic tremors pinpoint impact epicenter of earthbound space storms

EDMONTON, 30 May — Using data from NASA's THEMIS mission, a team of University of Alberta researchers has pinpointed the impact epicenter of an earthbound space storm as it crashes into the atmosphere, and given an advance warning of its arrival.

The team's study reveals that magnetic blast waves can be used to pinpoint and predict the location where space storms dissipate their massive amounts of energy. These storms can dump the equivalent of 50 gigawatts of power, or the output of 10 of the world's largest power stations, into

Earth's atmosphere.

The energy that drives space storms originates on the sun. The stream of electrically charged particles in the solar wind carries this energy toward Earth. The solar wind interacts with Earth's magnetic field. Scientists call the process that begins with Earth's magnetic field capturing energy and ends with its release into the atmosphere a geomagnetic substorm.

"Substorm onset occurs when Earth's magnetic field suddenly and dramatically releases energy previously captured by the solar wind," said David Sibeck, project scientist for the Time History of Events and Macroscale Interactions During Substorms (THEMIS) mission at NASA Goddard Spaceflight Center in Greenbelt, Md.—Internet

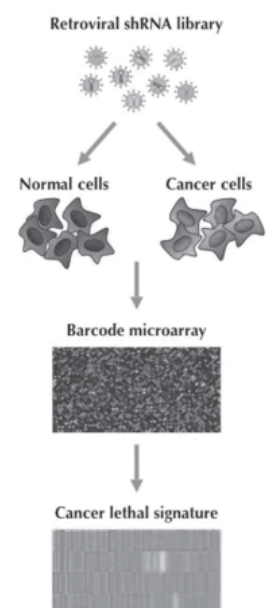
This is less than the overall losses of about 36 percent from 2007 to 2008, and about 32 percent from 2006 to 2007, that have been reported in similar surveys.

"While the drop in losses is encouraging, losses of this magnitude are economically unsustainable for commercial beekeeping," said Jeff Pettis, research leader of the Agricultural Research Service (ARS) Bee Research Laboratory in Beltsville, Md. ARS is USDA's principal intramural scientific research agency. The survey was conducted by Pettis; Dennis van Engelsdorp, president of AIA; and Jerry Hayes, AIA past president.—Internet

## New studies reveal broad, hidden network that lets tumors thrive

CHEVY CHASE, 30 May — Howard Hughes Medical Institute researchers have identified many potential new drug targets for cancers long deemed "untouchable" due to the type of genetic mutation they contain. These studies are beginning to reveal new ways of attacking cancer by targeting a largely hidden network of normal genes that cancer cells rely on for survival.

The researchers studied cells with mutations in KRAS, the most commonly mutated gene in human cancers. KRAS, which was discovered nearly 30 years ago, is mutated in 30 percent of human tumors, including 90 percent of pancreatic cancers, 50 percent of colon cancers, and 30 percent of non-small cell lung cancers.—Internet





## China, India hold seminar on better cooperation

BEIJING, 30 May — Around 100 officials and scholars from China and India Saturday gathered in Beijing to discuss how to boost cooperation between the two Asian giants.

“Dragon and elephant have danced together in recent years,” Feng Zuoku, vice president of the Chinese People’s

## An Iraqi child shot dead in restive Diyala despite massive offensives

BAQUBA, 30 May — A six-year-old child was shot dead and four Iraqi soldiers were wounded in two attacks in the volatile province of Diyala, which witnesses a month-long security operation, a local security source said on Saturday.

Unknown armed men opened fire on the child near his house in a village near the city of Baquba, some 65 km northeast of Baghdad, the source told Xinhua on condition of anonymity.

The police is investigating the motive behind the murder, although the police believe that it could be that his father is a member of the Awakening Council group, which fights Qaida militants in the village, the source said. —Internet

## Two murderers escape Ark prison in guard uniforms

GRADY (Ark), 30 May — Arkansas authorities are searching for two convicted murderers who walked out of a prison after dressing up like corrections officers.

Corrections department spokeswoman Dina Tyler says Jeffrey Grinder and Calvin Adams escaped Friday evening from a prison in Grady. Both men were serving life

sentences without the possibility of parole.

Tyler says the guard uniforms the inmates put on are made in the prison. She says the men put them on in the prison library and walked out of the prison during a shift change.

Tyler says 32-year-old Grinder and 39-year-old Adams drove away in a maroon or burgundy colored, 4-door sedan that had been left for them.

Grinder was convicted of murder in 2004, and Adams was convicted in 1995. Both men have family in Arkansas and out of state.

## Dozens of whales beach on South African shore

CAPE TOWN ( South Africa), 30 May—Scientists decided to kill more than 30 beached whales that resisted frantic efforts to push them back out to sea near South Africa’s storm-lashed southern tip, media reported Saturday.

Nan Rice, head of the Dolphin Action and Protection group said 20 pilot whales were successfully rescued, but there was no alternative but to euthanize 34 others, according to the South African Press Association.

“I feel quite sad, but it is the right thing to do,” Rice told SAPA.

One whale died early during the rescue efforts, its body lying motionless on the sand as hundreds of volunteers rushed around trying to rescue the rest of the school.

Braving high winds and rough waves, the rescuers tried to push and drag the three-meter (10-foot) whales out of the knee-deep water and back to sea, but often their struggles were to little avail. Most of the rescuers wore wet suits, but some rushed into the icy waters in normal clothes. Authorities brought in six bulldozers to push the whales back into the water.

“As soon as we put them back into the sea, they swim back to the beach again,” said National Sea Rescue Institute spokesman Craig Lambinon. “It’s not a very easy situation,” Lambinon said. —Internet

## Death toll rises to 30 in SW China colliery gas burst

CHON QING, 30 May — Death toll rose to 30 after five more bodies were recovered in a colliery gas burst Saturday in southwest China’s Chongqing Municipality, according to local coal mine safety authorities.

The accident happened around 11 am at Tonghua Coal Mine in Anwen Town of Qijiang County, when 131 miners were working underground. One hundred and one miners were rescued.

Of the rescued, 59 miners were injured, including four in serious condition. —Internet

## Russian plant to destroy nerve gas shells

SHCHUCHYE, 30 May— A plant described as the largest in the world opened Friday in Siberia to destroy Russian artillery shells containing nerve agents.

The 250-acre Chemical Weapons Destruction Facility in Shchuchye, near the Russian border with Kazakhstan, was built with \$1 billion from the United States, *The Washington Post* reported Friday. Officials from both countries attended the opening ceremony.

A US inspection team stumbled on about 2 million shells filled with deadly nerve agents like sarin and VX in a group of warehouses in 1994. Sen Richard Lugar, R-Ind, who was present Friday in Siberia, was photographed in 1999 carrying a briefcase that held

a VX-filled shell to dramatize how easily a weapon capable of killing thousands of people could be removed.

"In Washington, that photo became an important symbol of the challenge we faced," Lugar said Friday. "Today, we must ensure that the weapons are never used and never fall into the hands of those who would do harm to us or others." —*Internet*

## Mexico's most-wanted drug lord's power waning

MEXICO CITY, 30 May—Mexico's most-wanted drug lord has an increasingly less-powerful role in his cartel, the country's Attorney General said Friday.

Eduardo Medina-Mora said Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman remains an emblematic figure in the Sinaloa Cartel but he's not as involved in day-to-day drug trafficking.

Guzman lost his leadership role while serving a 20-year sentence at a Mexican prison, Medina-Mora said. Guzman escaped in 2001, and has been on the run ever since.

Mexico is offering \$2 million and the US \$5 million for information leading to Guzman's arrest.

Also Friday, soldiers arrested a lieutenant of the Sinaloa drug cartel who received direct orders from Guzman, said Gen. Luis Arturo Oliver, the Mexican Defence Department's deputy chief of operations.

Oliver said Roberto Beltran Burgos was in charge of conveying Guzman's orders to other cartel members and coordinating a group of 14 lawyers working for the crime syndicate.

Beltran Burgos was arrested in Culiacan, capital of Sinaloa state, after soldiers received complaints of armed men in a residential area.

Meanwhile, a judge on Friday ordered 10 mayors and 20 other top officials from the central state of Michoacan held for 40 days pending an investigation of their alleged ties to La Familia drug cartel.

## Argentina's dengue cases rise to 25,833

BUENOS AIRES, 30 May—The number of dengue cases in Argentina reached 25,833, Argentine Health Ministry said on Friday.

Despite 3,107 more people have been infected with the disease since the last report was released on 30 April, Argentine authorities said the dengue epidemic is being controlled.

From February to April, the country has seen a large number of mosquitoes of all kinds, including the *Aedes aegypti*, which is a carrier of dengue.

The northern province of Chaco, where 10,796 cases have been registered, is the worst hit area in the country. While in Catamarca, another northern province, 8,703 cases have been registered.—*Internet*

## British man killed in hot air balloon crash in central Turkey

ANKARA, 30 May—A British man was killed and seven other tourists injured when a hot air balloon crashed in central Turkey on Friday, the semi-official *Anatolia* news agency reported.

The accident took place in the tourist region of Capadocia in the central province of Nevsehir early on Friday, according to the report.

It added that the injured have been taken to the hospitals for medical treatment.

## Cancer relies on proteins to stay alive

BEIJING, 30 May — US researchers say they have identified new ways of attacking cancer by targeting a largely hidden network of normal genes that cancer cells rely on for survival.

Researchers at the Harvard Medical School and Brigham and Women's Hospital said they reduced the production of thousands of normal proteins to determine which were required for cancer cells to survive.

They found cancer cells growing in a dish rely heavily on many normal proteins and when some of those protein

levels drop, cancer cells die.

The researchers studied cells with mutations in KRAS, the most commonly mutated gene in human cancers. KRAS, which was discovered nearly 30 years ago, is mutated in 30 percent of human tumors, including 90 percent of pancreatic cancers, 50 percent of colon cancers, and 30 percent of non-small cell lung cancers.

"Efforts to develop drugs that inhibit oncogenic RAS proteins have been largely unsuccessful, despite the fact that RAS gene family mem-

bers are mutated in about 30 percent of human tumors," said scientists.

More than 18 months ago, the researchers decided to see if they could use the powerful RNAi technology to seek out genes that KRAS-mutant cancer cells need for survival. Their efforts, culminating in two reports in the 29 May, 2009 issue of the journal *Cell*, have led to the identification of potentially promising drug targets: serine/threonine kinase 33 (STK33) and polo-like kinase 1 (PLK-1), as well as a host of other proteins.

## French union denounces fruit-picking "slavery" case

STRASBOURG (France), 30 May — Around 50 women from Eastern Europe were employed as fruit pickers in Alsace in eastern France under conditions that approached "slavery", the CGT trade union said on Friday.

The women were paid 0.25 euros (0.350 US dollars) a kilo for picking strawberries, well below the legal rate and housed in "unfit" conditions in temporary barracks, Jacky Wagner, a local CGT official told Reuters.

A local police official said an investigation had been opened into the case but would focus on what the women were paid and how they were employed rather than the conditions in which they were housed.

The CGT said one group of Romanian women had been replaced by another group made up of Poles, Ukrainians and Romanians after a disagreement with their employer, a German national.

## Value of taking aspirin to cut heart risk varies

LONDON, 30 May — Taking aspirin reduces heart attack risk in people with no previous history of vascular disease but increases the risk of internal bleeding, say British researchers who analyzed the results of 22 clinical trials.

This means the net effect in this group of patients is uncertain because the benefits and risks may cancel each other out. However, the researchers found that aspirin's benefits generally outweigh its risks among people who have vascular disease.

Colin Baigent, of the University of Oxford, and colleagues looked at serious vascular events (heart attack, stroke or vascular death) among 95,000 low-risk patients in six primary prevention trials and among 17,000 high-risk patients in 16 secondary prevention trials.

Among patients in the primary prevention trials, aspirin was found to reduce the risk of serious vascular events by 12 percent but increased the risk of internal bleeding by about one-third.

## Venezuela declares state of emergency to avoid A/H1N1 spread

CARACAS, 30 May—Venezuelan health authorities declared on Friday a state of emergency after reporting the first case of A/H1N1 influenza in the country on Thursday.

President from the National Institute of Hygiene (INH) Jesus Querales said the Health Ministry gave orders to all private and public doctors "to be on alert."

Querales said that the first case of A/H1N1 flu in the country is a male patient who arrived from Panama and the health authorities monitor the rest of the passengers who were on the same flight.

Querales also called on people to go to health centers when having any of the symptoms.

"These virus are characterized for their high capacity to reproduce, but the mortality rate is low," Querales said.

According to the INH, till Thursday there have been 198 samples tested in the country and only one was positive.

## Colouring, or makeup, provides gender cues

MONTREAL, 30 May—The brain is wired to identify gender based on facial cues and coloring, which may explain why women wear makeup, Canadian researchers said.

Psychology Professor Frederic Gosselin and his University of Montreal team found the luminescence of the eyebrow and mouth region is vital in rapid gender discrimination.

"As teenagers, dimorphism — systematic difference between sexes — increases in the nose, chin, mouth, jaw, eyes and general shape of faces," lead author Nicolas Dupuis-Roy said in a statement. "Yet we aren't conscious of how our brain recognizes those differences."

The researchers showed photos of 300 Caucasian faces to some

30 participants. Subjects were asked to identify gender based on images in which parts of faces were concealed.

The study, published in the Journal of Vision, found that eyes and mouths are paramount in identifying gender. The investigation found the shades of reds and greens around mouths and eyes led to faster gender discrimination.—Internet

## 23 new H1N1 cases reported in Panama, raising total to 130

PANAMA CITY, 30 May—Twenty-three new cases of A/H1N1 flu were reported in Panama Friday, raising the country's infection toll to 130 cases, the Health Ministry said in a statement.

Of the confirmed cases, 81 have recovered and returned to their normal daily lives, the ministry said. Panama City remains the worst hit region in the country, with 107 cases, followed by Colon province with 22 cases and Cocle province with one case.—Internet

## Canada adds 218 new cases of A/H1N1 flu in two days

OTTAWA, 30 May—Canada added 218 new cases of A/H1N1 flu during Thursday and Friday, bringing the country's total to 1,336, according to the latest figures from the Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC). The outbreak has spread to the sparsely-populated northern Territory of Nunavut, which reported its first case on Friday. The person has preexisting medical conditions, local health officials said.

Out of Canada's 10 provinces and three territories, 9 provinces and 2 territories now have reported infection cases. The Province of Ontario added 131 new cases, bringing its total to 626, which is by far the most among the provinces. Health officials said despite the surge, most cases are mild.—Internet

## 12 new A/H1N1 flu cases confirmed in UK

LONDON, 30 May—UK's Department of Health confirmed on Friday 12 new cases of A/H1N1 flu infections, bringing the total number of cases in the country to 215. The newly confirmed cases were all from England, with 10 children from west Midlands region linked to the ongoing investigation of a school outbreak. Two additional cases include one child in London who was linked to a previously confirmed case and an adult in the northwest region whose source of infection remains under investigation.

"The localized cases of swine flu found in the UK have so far been mild, and we have not seen evidence of widespread community transmission," said a spokesperson from the Health Department.—Internet

## Confirmed, probable A/H1N1 flu cases in US rise to 8,975

WASHINGTON, 30 May—The number of confirmed and probable human A/H1N1 flu cases has risen to 8,975 in 48 US states plus the District of Columbia, with 15 deaths, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reported on Friday.

The CDC anticipates that there will be more cases, more hospitalizations and more deaths associated with this new virus in the coming days and weeks.—Internet

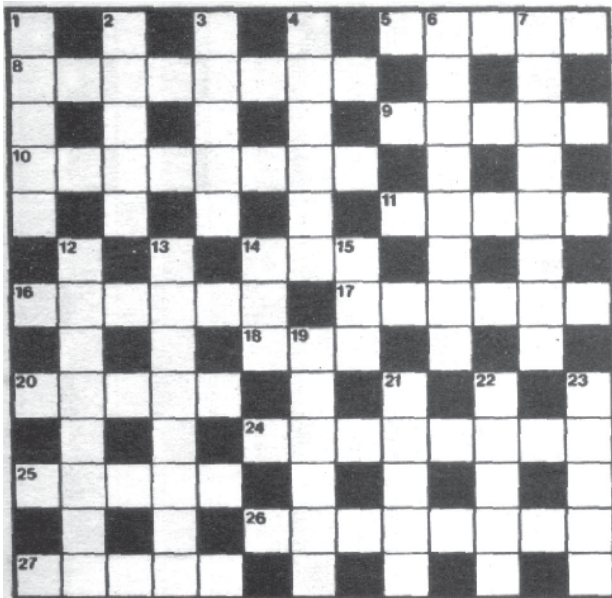
## Keane earns Ireland friendly stalemate with Nigeria

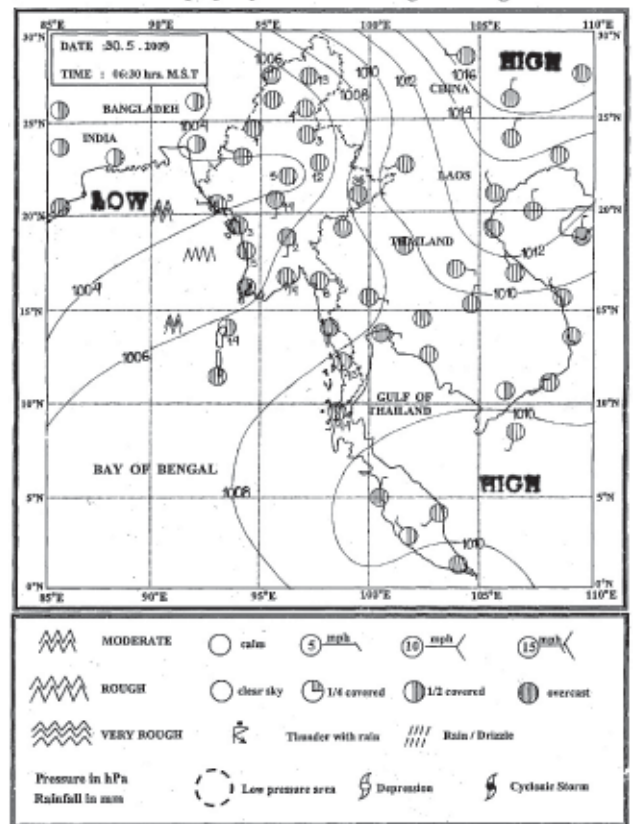

Traditional handicraft, floating vegetable plantations and floating houses in the lake and beautiful bungalows are wonderful scenes in Inlay Lake located in Nyaungshwe Township, Shan State (South).

Inlay Lake emerged naturally. The lake contributes to economic and social status of Intha national race. The natural beauties and traditional handicraft attract the local and foreign tourists.

On 12 May morning, we arrived at Nyaungshwe to write articles on Inlay Lake. Head of Nyaungshwe Township Information and Public Relations Department Ko Tun Lin took us to Inlay Lake for

enjoying the natural beauties of the lake.

We left the jetty for Inlay Lake by boat. We saw some boats carrying water hyacinths after transporting passen-

gers and asked Ko Tun Lin about it. He explained that the ferry boats carry water hyacinths as an act of cleaning around Inlay Lake when they transported the passengers. It

is a sanitation task on a manageable scale for cleaning the lake.

Inlay Lake is 63 square miles or 40,137 acres. Nine main creeks—three from the

east of the lake and six from the western bank—flow into the lake. The Project Supervisory Committee was formed with township level departmental officials to undertake

the tasks of greening 20-mile radius of Inlay Lake and protection of forest, water and land resources and endangered species of birds and animals.
