Militants use teenagers in attacks in Iraq

BAGHDAD, 7 June — Iraqi militants have increasingly used teenagers in their attacks against US troops and Iraqi security forces, the US military said on Saturday. A military statement provided details about five teenagers between 14 to 19 who have been involved in grenade attacks and suicide bombings.

It said the teenage attackers are “part of a growing trend of children carrying out attacks on Iraqi security and US forces” in Kirkuk Province in northern Iraq.

In the town of Hawijah, some 30 km west of Kirkuk, a teenage boy was seen on Thursday throwing a grenade at a joint US and Iraqi police patrol, but the grenade failed to detonate, the statement said.

Days earlier, two teenagers, aged be-

tween 14 to 16, separately attacked two joint patrols in the same town, one of the attackers was captured, the statement said.

The military also said that a boy possibly aged 14 was the driver in a suicide car bombing that killed five Iraqi policemen in oil-rich city of Kirkuk.

Also in Kirkuk, a 19-year-old man was captured by Iraqi police while attempting to detonate his explosive vest at a Shiite mosque on 1 May, it said.

Col Hugh McNeely, the deputy commander of 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 1st Cavalry Division, based near Hawijah, said the “terrorists actively recruit them (teenagers) to risk their lives for goals that the child probably doesn’t even understand.”—*Internet*

Police chief escapes suicide car bombing in W Iraq

BAGHDAD, 7 June — The police chief of Iraq’s western province of Anbar survived a suicide car bomb attack on Saturday, wounding two of his bodyguards, an Interior Ministry source said.

A suicide car bomber drove his explosive-laden car into the convoy of Major General Tariq al-Assal, while he was leaving the provincial police headquarters in central the city of Ramadi, some 110 km west of Baghdad, the source told *Xinhua* on condition of anonymity. Assal survived unhurt, but one of his convoy’s vehicles was damaged and two of his bodyguards were wounded, the source said.—*Internet*

Roadside bombings kill Afghan soldier, wounds six others in E Afghanistan

KABUL, 7 June — One Afghan National Army (ANA) soldier was killed and six other including five Afghan border police sustained injuries on Saturday morning in three separate roadside bombings in eastern Afghanistan, officials said.

Roadside mines planted by insurgents struck a vehicle of ANA in Dumanda district of Khost Province on Saturday morning, killing one ANA soldier and wounding another, a senior ANA officer, Gen Mohammad Hisrar told *Xinhua*.

In the second incident, roadside bomb planted by militants hit a vehicle of Afghan border police in Dand-e-Patan district of Paktia Province wounding five policemen, provincial administration spokesman Rohullah Samon told *Xinhua*.—*Internet*

US military deaths in Iraq war at 4,311

WASHINGTON, 7 June —As of Saturday, on 6 June, 2009, at least 4,311 members of the US military had died in the Iraq war since it began in March 2003.

The figure includes nine military civilians killed in action. At least 3,454 military personnel died as a result of hostile action, according to the military’s numbers.

The British military has reported 179 deaths; Italy, 33; Ukraine, 18; Poland, 21; Bulgaria, 13; Spain, 11; Denmark, seven; El Salvador, five; Slovakia, four; Latvia and Georgia, three each; Estonia, Netherlands, Thailand and Romania, two each; and Australia, Hungary, Kazakhstan and South Korea, one death each.—*Internet*

Two Taliban commanders detained, three others killed in W Afghanistan

KABUL, 7 June — Security forces after clash with Taliban fighters in west Afghanistan on Saturday arrested two militants’ commanders and killed three others, police spokesman in western region Abdul Rauf Ahmadi said.

“The clash took place

in Dilaram district of Farah Province today morning during which three Taliban fighters were killed and two others sustained injuries,” Ahmadi told *Xinhua*.

In clash with insurgents, he added, Mullah Amanullah and Mullah Naeeb, both commanders of Taliban in the area were detained, while efforts to chase down another Taliban commander Mullah Akhtar is continuing.—*Internet*

Taliban militants kill three guards of Afghan private company in West

KABUL, 7 June — Taliban militants ambushed convoy of a private Afghan company in Nimroz Province, west of Afghanistan on Saturday, provincial governor Ghulam Dastgir Azad said.

“Militants attacked a convoy of Angar private security company on Zaranj-Dilaram road at 11:00 am today leaving three guards of the company dead,” Azad said. One guard was also injured in the clash, he further said. This is the second attack on the above company over the past two weeks.

Previous attack against Angar Security Company, which provides security to logistic convoys of US-led forces, left nine guards dead in the western region two weeks ago.—*Internet*

Iran launches new missile production line

TEHERAN, 7 June—Iran on Saturday launched production line of a new homemade supersonic ground-to-air missile system, local English-language *Press TV* reported.

The smart missile system called “Shahin (hawk)”, which has a range of more than 40 kilometres, is capable of targeting fighter jets and helicopters, Iran’s Defence Minister Brigadier General Mostafa Mohammad-Najjar who inaugurated the production line was

quoted as saying.

The research and production phases of the defense system, including missile, missile interceptors, hardware and software networks and launch pad have been carried out by Iranian experts, Mohammad-Najjar said, adding that it will promote Iran’s defence capabilities against possible air attacks.

Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad announced last month that Iran has successfully launched an advanced

surface-to-surface missile named “Sejil 2” with a range of about 2,000 km.

Mohammad-Najjar announced last year that the Islamic Republic has successfully test-fired a new generation of surface-to-surface missile named Sejil which has a range of about 2,000 km.

Iran had already test-fired its another Shehab-3 missile capable of hitting targets within a range of 2,000 km, vowing that its missile capabilities are “a defensive tool against invasions.” —*Internet*

Japan auto-makers race ahead with green cars

TOYOTA CITY, 7 June—The world economy may still be in deep crisis, and the global auto sector in the doldrums, but Toyota Motor’s vice president Takeshi Uchiyamada has some good news.

After months of cutting output, closing plants and laying off staff as its car exports crashed, the world’s biggest automaker has resumed overtime work to ramp up production of its new

Prius hybrid.

Last month, an industrial survey said the low-emission car for the first time topped Japan’s monthly domestic car sales — knocking its main rival, Honda Motor’s Insight hybrid, from first to third spot.

While US car-makers like General Motors are on life support, struggling under the dead weight of

their fuel-guzzling sports utility vehicles, the plant here is humming to the tune of next-generation car technology.

Japan’s auto giants hope that, amid the global recession, brisk domestic sales and a worldwide trend towards tougher regulations on carbon dioxide emissions will keep them in international pole position.—*Internet*

Jobless rate in UK to keep rising long after end of recession

LONDON, 7 June—There were fresh signs that the British economic outlook may be brightening but unemployment in the country will carry on rising long after the recession ends, *The Economist* said in its latest issue seen on Saturday.

So far the British employment has fallen by 1 percent since it peaked at 29.5 million in the second quarter of 2008.

That is about the same drop as at a similar stage in the economic downturn of the early 1980s, and a bit less than the 1.5-percent decline in the early 1990s, said *The Economist* in an article in the 6-12 June issue.

Hamas: High-ranking contacts held with Egypt to defuse tension with Fatah

GAZA, 7 June—Islamic Hamas movement is holding high-ranking contacts with Egypt, which sponsors the inter-dialogue, in a bid to defuse tension with rival Fatah movement, a Hamas spokesman said on Saturday.

Ayman Taha, a spokesman for Hamas in Gaza said in a press statement that there are mutual contacts held on high levels with Egypt to carry its responsibilities following last-week violent incidents in the West Bank.

Nine Palestinians, including four Hamas militants and four security officers belong to President Mahmoud Abbas security forces were killed in two separate violent incidents on Sunday and Thursday in the West Bank city of Qalqilya.

“Two days ago, there have been contacts with Hamas politburo Khaled Meshaal and Egypt,” Taha said, adding that Meshaal spoke with high-ranking Egyptian security officials who sponsor a Palestinian reconciliation dialogue.—*Internet*

WASHINGTON, 7 June —A strong earthquake of 6.0 magnitude shook the northern mid-Atlantic Ridge on Saturday, the US Geological Survey (USGS) said.

According to a report posted by the USGS on its website, the tremor, which occurred at 2033 GMT, was epicentered some 1,340 miles (2,160 km) east-northeast of San Juan, Puerto Rico at a depth of 6.2 miles (10 kilometres).

The USGS, which monitored the quake, did not indicate any necessity of issuing a tsunami warning.

China, Japan seek closer cooperation on various economic, trade issues

TOKYO, 7 June — Visiting Chinese Commerce Minister Chen Deming met here on Sunday with his Japanese counterpart Toshihiro Nikai on various economic and trade issues and reached broad consensus on future cooperation.

During their talks, the two ministers exchanged of views on such issues as cooperation on the protection of intellectual property, the promotion of the WTO Doha Round negotiation and the prevention of trade

Nikai, for his part, voiced his hope that the two sides will take concrete steps in a concerted effort to create a favourable commercial environment for enterprises of both countries to conduct cooperation in areas such as trade and investment.

Russia seeks leading position on world grain market

ST PETERSBURG, 7 June— Russia will boost domestic grain production in a bid to consolidate its position on the global market, President Dmitry Medvedev said here on Saturday.

"We are preparing to strengthen our position on the world grain market and to put financial and organizational support behind it," Medvedev said in his opening remarks to the World Grain Forum held in St

Petersburg.

The Asia-Pacific region is of great significance for Russia's grain exports, Medvedev told an audience of agricultural business representatives.

Russia's measures to diversify its export destinations are not only beneficial to trade partners, but also conducive to the development of the eastern Siberia and the Far East region, he said.

The Russian president

called for joint efforts by major grain exporters to ensure reasonable grain prices. "We could discuss forming a new policy in grain production and international grain trade," he said.

Medvedev also noted that Russia's grain harvest could reach 80-90 million tons this year, with 20 million going to exports.

In 2008, Russia saw a record high grain harvest of 108 million tons.

China launches assembly center for large aircraft programme

SHANGHAI, 7 June— Commercial Aircraft Corporation of China Ltd (COMAC) unveiled its manufacturing and assembling centre here Saturday, the latest step towards the goal to manufacture China's homegrown large aircraft.

The Final Assembly Centre of the COMAC was based on the Shanghai Aircraft Manufacturing Co, with a registered capital of two billion yuan (292.7 million US dollars),

said COMAC's general manager Jin Zhuanglong.

It was one of the COMAC's three key entities which were responsible for aircraft design, manufacturing and service. Jin said the Final Assembly Centre's new base in Shanghai's Pudong area will be constructed within this year.

By 2010, the centre will be able to produce 30 ARJ21-700 model planes a year, and the capacity will be expanded to 50 jets

by 2012, Jin said.

The ARJ21, an acronym for "Advanced Regional Jet for the 21st Century," is the first regional jet that China has fully developed independently, in accordance with the standards set by General Administration of Civil Aviation of China (GACAC), Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and Joint Aviation Authorities (JAA).

China urged to invest more in Africa's manufacturing sector

VICTORIA FALLS, (Zimbabwe), 7 June—Africa needs more Chinese investment in the manufacturing sector so that it can move up the value chain and increase the incomes of its people, a senior COMESA official said on Saturday.

The Common Market

for Eastern and Southern Africa (COMESA) secretary-general Sindiso Ngwenya told Xinhua in an exclusive interview that although Chinese companies had invested mainly in the services sector, Africa would want them to do more in the manufacturing sector so that less wealth is exported abroad. "With regard to trade, the trade between COMESA countries and China has been growing more than 50 percent to 100 percent depending on the country but on average more than 50 percent annually, and this can be

reflected by the trade figures themselves where by the end of 2008 China-Africa or Africa-China trade was approaching the 100 billion US dollar mark," Ngwenya said.

"But regarding investment, yes, Chinese companies are in the region. For example in Zambia when other companies were closing the mines the Chinese companies have continued to operate because they are not there for the short term but they are there for a long term partnership that is mutually beneficial to all of us," he said.—Xinhua

A dream of domestic salt security

Rice, edible oil and salt are the three consumer goods. I have heard fluctuation in the prices of rice, edible oil and meat and fish, but not in salt. In the meal expenses of a family, the expense on salt is nothing, if compared with that of rice, edible oil and meat and fish.

Salt is, in fact, a necessary consumer product for man. Man can consume flour, corn and tapioca in place of rice, but salt can be replaced with nothing. Since the world saw industrial development, oil has become a strategic type of fuel. In the world, many wars have broken out due to rivalry for oil. Salt has stood as a strategic consumer good since the Stone Age. The world saw many wars, following rivalry for salt.

Having coasts with a total length of about 1500 miles, Myanmar has not seen shortage of salt. In the time of Myanmar kings, some regions around Bago such as Waw, Thanatpin, Kawa, Kayan and Thongwa produced salt on a large scale. The salt produced in Bago District was enough for consumption of the whole nation. At that time, in Bago, salt earth was collected and dissolved in water. Then, the saltwater was baked in pots.

After Myanmar fell under the rule of the British colonialists, Burma Salt Company, a British company, and Chinese entrepreneurs exposed seawater to the sun in fields, and then baked it with iron pots in Kyaikkhami, Ye and Labutta regions. That salt had better quality than the salt produced in Bago region, and could be produced on a commercial scale at low expenses. Later, Bago salt became less popular. Waw, Kawa, Thanatpin, Kayan and Thongwa had many fields and firewood was scarce there. So, it was impossible for the regions to produce salt by baking it with firewood.

Myanmar's neighbours have produced sun-baked salt with seawater since the colonial time, but the colonial government did not prohibit the people from baking seawater with firewood to produce salt. Many alien-owned companies manufactured salt with firewood, thereby wasting the forest resources of Myanmar. In consequence, large areas of evergreen forests in Kyaikkhami and Ye and mangroves in Labutta deteriorated.

In 1962, the Salt Division of the People's Pearl and Fisheries Enterprise under the Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry established a model salt farm near Kyaikkhami, and organized salt farmers to practise the process of producing sun-baked salt in place of the method of producing salt by baking seawater with firewood. Since 1963, salt farmers

have exercised the method of sun-baked salt production.

Then, the Salt Division was reconstituted into the Salt Corporation, and the corporation set up Thamei-byu salt farm in Ngapudaw Township, Ayeyawady Division; Sanei salt farm in Kyaukpyu Township, in Rakhine State; Thauyngon salt farm in Kungyangon Township, Yangon Division; and Laba salt farm in Thayetchaung Township, Taninthayi Division, with the aim of disseminating the sun-baked production methods to the salt farmers of the seaside states and divisions. However, Bago Division, a coastal region, was exclusive in the plan. Bago Division, which once used to be a salt production region, came to rely on Mon State and Ayeyawady Division for salt.

The State Peace and Development Council promulgated a law on salt farming and banned salt production with firewood so as to avert deforestation. So, the producing of salt with firewood was almost given up. State level officials occasionally visited salt farms and encouraged salt farmers to boost production of salt. The total area of the nation's salt farms has risen to about 40,000, from only about 15,000 in 1988. So, the salt supply exceeded the domestic consumption, and the salt surplus of Ayeyawady Division and Rakhine State was exported to Bangladesh.

The cyclone "Nargis" that took place on 2 and 3 May 2008 ravaged the salt farms in Ayeyawady Division, whose salt output made up 70 per cent of that of the entire nation.

If the people do not have access to sufficient amount of salt, they will become weak with no mood to work. If so, the productivity and national

defence capacity will fall. If a man do not consume sufficient amount of salt for long, he may lose his life. Shortage of salt can have negative impact on the nation's economy, education, health care and security. It is not wise to rely on foreign countries for salt. With that concept in view, the Head of State gave guidance on assistance to be rendered by the government for ensuring quick recovery of the salt farms in Ayeyawady Division that were destroyed by the storm "Nargis".

As part of the programme, the government provided small loans to salt farmers to restore the salt farms in Ayeyawady Division. Now, all the salt farms in the division have been restored, and Mon State and Rakhine State are stepping up salt farming. However, the nation saw heavy rains in November, which is the first month of the salt season. Therefore, it was some time late to begin salt farming. To make things worse, very often it rained and it was cloudy in the salt season. So, the salt output was less than it used to be.

Now, the nation is seeing a flow of salt from abroad. So, to produce salt surplus locally is on target. And it is needed to stockpile the salt surplus in order that the nation can avert import of salt even if it faces climate changes. According to hydrologists, it has changed a lot in the global weather pattern. If Mon State and Ayeyawady Division face equator-like weather pattern, their salt output can drop by about 50 per cent. If so, the acreage of salt farms is to be doubled for salt security of the nation.

The Head of State also gave guidance on regeneration of the salt lands in Bago Division to help fulfil the salt requirement of the nation. To be honest, salt farmers including I failed to produce salt in Bago area. As a result, the sun-baked salt farms in Bago did not prove successful till 2008. Under the supervision of the chairman of Bago Division Peace and Development Council and the minister, in-charge of the division, and technical assistance of the Myanma Salt and Marine Chemicals Enterprise of the Ministry of Mines, Kawa Township Union Solidarity and Development Association launched a 43-acre model salt farm at Thanbanseik Village in Kawa Township, Bago Division, in October 2008.

The newspapers and television programmes carried news about the inspection tour of high ranking officials looking into salt produced by a salt farm of Kawa Township USDA in Thanbanseik Village, Kawa Township, Bago Division. I was desirous of visiting the salt farm. So, I became interested to engage in salt industry in Bago Division whenever opportune. I left Mon State for Bago on 5 May. And I arrived at Ohnne Village on Kayan-Yangon road via Bago. On arrival at Ohnne Village, I phoned U Kyi Win of Myanmar Salt Industry who is in-charge of the Thanbanseik salt farm. As U Kyi Win was in Yangon, I was given the number of the salt farm. I hired a motorcycle taxi and went down to the Thanbanseik salt farm. As there was poor transport due to bad weather, I had to take about one and half hours to reach Sarphyusu Village.

When I arrived at Sarphyusu Village I saw Thanbanseik Village from a distance. At the exit of Sarphyusu Village, the motorcycle was unable to go further as the road was muddy due to the recent rains. The salt farm is still far away from Sarphyusu Village. To know the length of the trip to continue, I contacted the salt farm by my CDMA phone. As I was told that someone would be dispatched to fetch me, I waited at the cemetery of the village. There is no rest house at the cemetery but a small tomb under a tree. Being tired, I sat against the small tomb. At that very moment, an idea struck me that **it is sure that I will die one day in the very future like the one entombed. When I die I will have to give up all my possessions. But to be an unselfish and reliable person, I will have to exert efforts to the best of my ability in the interest of posterity before my death.** At that time, I saw a man with a bamboo stick and a red hat heading to me. He was the person who was going to fetch me.

It was about 6 pm when I arrived at the salt farm of Kawa Township USDA. Workers were busy with the functions of the salt farm. Although the salt farms of Mon State closed their businesses, it is surprising to see that the Thanbanseik salt farm, the only one in Bago Division, is still in operation. Braving the bad weather, the salt farm was in action. This can be attributable to the favourable geographical conditions of Bago Division and the skills of salt workers.

Under the moon light of Kason, I happened to have a long chat with U Bo Win, the deputy supervisor of Htanbingyaung salt farm of Paung Township, Mon State. I learned that assigned by Myanmar Salt Industry U Bo Win was at the Thanbanseik salt farm and he was well-versed in salt making. In the course of the friendly informal conversation I further found out that there were also two salt workers who are locals. The two locals said that they have now become qualified in salt making thanks to U Bo Win although they have no knowledge about salt making in the past.

In early morning, there arrived U Maung Myint, the chairman of Thanbanseik Village PDC. U Maung Myint said that he was there to assist an entrepreneur who is desirous of engaging in salt business as he was told that the entrepreneur had arrived. After having breakfast, U Maung Myint, U

Bo Win and I viewed round the soil where salt can be produced near Thanbanseik Village. There were discarded farmlands where salty water entered as there was no embankment and virgin and fallow land near the village.

It is found that there are about 1,000 acres in the environs of Thanbanseik Village that can be used as the soil for making salt. It is estimated that 10,000 acres of land for salt business can be reclaimed in villages adjacent to the coast in Kawa and Thanapin Townships of Bago Division. If 10,000 acres of land can be reclaimed, about 100,000 tons (0.6 million viss of salt) can be produced. The salt produced can satisfy the demand of 25 million people. Bago region that produced salt for the people in the time of the successive Myanmar kings will soon become a region capable of producing a great deal of salt for the State and the people.

On 6 May, I together with U Maung Myint went to TadaU Village after lunch. After about one hour walk, we arrived TadaU Village where we met with U Aung Myint (a) U Ohn Hmok, an elder of the village. U Aung Myint said that he wished his region could make remarkable progress in salt business. U Aung Myint sent us to the house of U Aung Man, the chairman of TadaU Village PDC, who provided us with meals and accommodation.

After dinner, we discussed salt business. Witnessing progress of salt business in Thanbanseik salt farm of Kawa Township USDA, most of local

farmers would like to do salt business on a manageable scale. Bago region is blessed with favourable weather and geography for salt industry. **The region possesses a large number of workforces with ready market for the salt produced. Bago region costs less than Ayeyawady Division and Mon State in the transportation of salt to Yangon and Mandalay markets. Bago region could become again a region where a great deal of salt can be produced if the encouragement of the government and the interest of local salt workers and farmers are combined.** As the car to leave TadaU for Bago would set off 3.30 am, we ended up our chat and went to bed at about midnight.

There were salt farms stretching along the coast in Thanbanseik Village. The salt workers were busy with the process of loading and transporting the salt. I myself drove a heavy truck loaded with salt from TadaU Village to Bago Railway Station. At the station, workers were loading bags of salt onto a cargo train. The cargo train made the signal in order to leave the station. But I heard nothing but a long horn of a car. Only then, had I realized that they were all my dreams, and I woke up and sat up. U Aung Man said to me that the bus would soon leave. After that, U Aung Man and U Maung Myint saw me off at the bus terminal where I took a truck for Bago. I have made up my mind to extend my salt business in Bago region. I firmly believe that my dream of doing salt business will come true in the early 2010.

Death toll of Mexican daycare centre blaze rises to 38

MEXICO CITY, 7 June — The death toll in a Mexican daycare centre blaze has risen to 38, officials said on Saturday.

The death toll rise came after several children died overnight, and the figure is expected to go even up as over 40 children and six adults were still hospitalized, said local officials.

Most of the victims died from smoke inhalation, local media quoted officials as saying, noting the injured adults included staff members at the daycare centre and people who tried to help.

Some of the injured children had third-degree burns, said fire department officials.

There were some 142 children and six staff members in the privately-run centre when the fire occurred.

A fire at a nearby warehouse leased by the state government spread to the centre and caused the tragedy, and firefighters spent two hours to control the blaze, local media said.—*Internet*

Air France accelerates replacement of faulty speed sensors on A330s

PARIS, 7 June — Air France said on Saturday it was speeding up replacement of faulty speed sensors on all of its Airbus A330s which problem was feared to have possibly

downed its Flight 447 with 228 people on board. In a statement, Air France said that in May last year it began noticing “incidents of loss of airspeed information during cruise

flight” on its twin-engine A330s and four-engine A340s. The company said it had begun changing all speed monitors, or pitot tubes, on both aircraft types in its fleet on 27 April — five weeks before Flight 447 went down.

French investigators said Airbus had recommended to all its airline customers that they replace speed-measuring instruments on the A330.

“They hadn’t yet been replaced” on the plane that crashed, said Paul-Louis Arslanian, the head of the French accident investigation agency, BEA.

According to Arslanian, it was inappropriate to swiftly tie the pitot tubes to the crash, saying that “it does not mean that without replacing the pitots that the A330 was dangerous.”

The Air France Airbus 330 vanished over the Atlantic Ocean early on Monday after leaving Rio de Janeiro for Paris. Debris and two male bodies have been found.—*Internet*

California’s draught expected to end due to incoming El Nino

LOS ANGELES, 7 June — Weather patterns over the Eastern Pacific may be setting up for an El Nino

pattern this fall, possibly portending an end to California’s recent drought, scientists said in remarks published on Saturday.

Longterm forecasts generated at the Scripps Institution of Oceanography at the University of California in San Diego indicate that an El Nino is forming, as the conditions seem ripe for an increase in sea temperatures and ocean levels off Peru, climate researcher David Pierce told the *San Diego*

Union-Tribune.

“We are forecasting an El Nino this year,” said Pierce. “Hopefully, it will bring a little more rain, not only to San Diego but to the entire Southwest.”

“That would be quite nice,” he told the *Union-Tribune*.

That forecast was echoed by the lead scientist at the Climate Prediction Center in Maryland, as well as the University of Washington’s Climate Impacts group.—*Internet*

Palestinian killed in Gaza explosion

KHAN YOUNIS, 7 June — A Palestinian was killed on Saturday afternoon in a blast in southeast Gaza Strip town of KhanYounis, security sources said.

The sources said that Sami al-Daghma, 25, died and a second man was injured when a home-made rocket exploded.

The rocket was fired earlier towards Israel but prematurely landed in al-Faraheen area in eastern Khan Younis, near al-Daghma’s house, and did not went off until the two men tried to evacuate it. The slain and wounded people were members of Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas’s Fatah party.

Security and policemen from Islamic Hamas movement, which has been controlling Gaza since routing pro-Abbas forces in 2007, were called to the scene of the blast and opened an investigation.—*Internet*

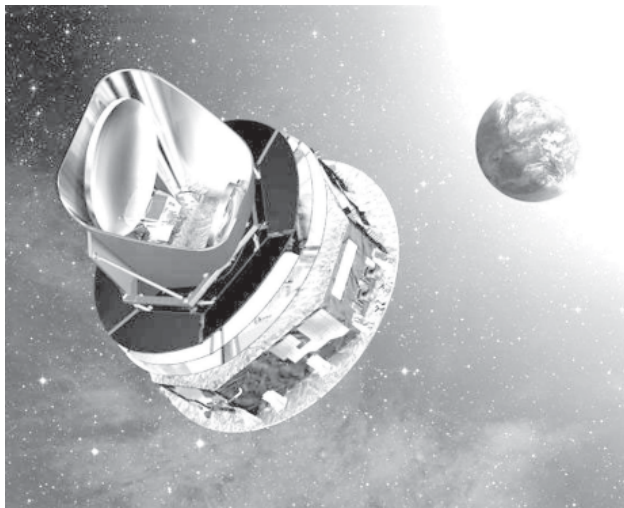
Planck satellite maneuver aims at L2 arrival

DARMSTADT, 7 June—Beginning June 5, ESA's Planck satellite will carry out a critical mid-course manoeuvre that will place the satellite on its final trajectory for arrival at L2, the second Lagrange point of the Sun-Earth system, early in July. The manoeuvre is scheduled to begin at 19:28 CEST on 5 June 2009, and will last for up to 30 hours.

Planck's main thrusters will conduct repeated 'pulse burns' during this time, switching on then off for 6 seconds every minute.

This pulse-burn technique is necessary because Planck is slowly spinning as it travels through space, rotating at 1 rpm. The thrusters, which are fixed to the spacecraft and are not steerable, can only burn when they are oriented in the correct direction, which occurs for 6 seconds during each 60-second rotation.

The manoeuvre is expected to provide an overall change in speed of 550.8 km/hour. As of 5 June, Planck was travelling at a speed of 105 840 km/hour with respect to the Sun and was located 1.19 million km from Earth.—*Internet*

India seeks strong bilateral relations among BRIC nations

NEW DELHI, 7 June—India has stressed the need for the four-nation grouping, BRIC, comprising Brazil, Russia, India and China, to strengthen their bilateral relationships that will help them to be more effective collectively.

"The world is on the cusp of a new type of multipolarity. And it is becoming clearer and clearer that international decision-making on global economic issues must necessarily be democratized to reflect present realities," Menon told local journalists on Sunday.—*Internet*

Iraq detains five US security contractors

BAGHDAD, 7 June—Iraqi security forces detained five U.S. security contractors for involving in the killing last month of a fellow citizen in Baghdad's heavily fortified Green Zone, CNN said on Sunday.

The US embassy in Baghdad confirmed that five US citizens have been arrested by Iraqi security forces, but there were no charges against them so far, an embassy spokesman told CNN.

It said that the five had been taken into custody on Friday following a pre-dawn raid on their company's office in the Green Zone.

The men were arrested in connection with last month's killing of James Kitterman, 60, who owned a construction company working in Iraq, the channel said.

On May 22, Kitterman's body was found bound, blindfolded and fatally stabbed in a

car in the Green Zone.

The names of the five captured and the name of their company were not released, it said, adding that the US Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) has been involved in the probe of the victim's death.

The United States and Iraq have signed an agreement that control the US troops withdrawal from Iraq and set guidelines for the activities of foreign contractors while they remain in the country.

The agreement allows US troops and contractors to be tried in Iraqi courts for only serious crimes that committed while they are off-base and off-duty.

The US combat troops are scheduled to leave Iraqi cities and major towns by June 30, and to completely pullout from Iraq by December 31, 2011.

China to hold national antiterror drills in areas around Beijing

BEIJING, 7 June—China will hold a national antiterror exercise "Great Wall-6" beginning on June 9, less than four months ahead of the celebrations of the 60th founding anniversary of the People's Republic of China, according to official sources.

The exercise, composing a series of specialized drills, will be carried out in the Inner Mongolia Autonomous Region and Shanxi and Hebei provinces that surround Beijing, the national capital, said a

spokesman of the headquarters of the "Great Wall-6" Sunday.

The exercise, which will last through the middle of this month, is aimed to test the capabilities of these areas as well as the national capital to combat terrorism and deal with emergencies, according to the official.

The national antiterror exercise will involve several areas, adopt various forms, and use various levels and sorts of antiterror forces, he noted.—*Xinhua*

India's first stemcell transplant for traumatic brain injury

BANGALORE, 7 June—A 27-year old woman, suffering from severe disability for the past one year following an accident, has successfully underwent brain stemcell transplant surgery, the first such case in India, doctors at a superspeciality hospital claimed Saturday here in the capital of southern state of Karnataka.

A team of neurosurgeons led by Dr N K Venkataramana, Chief Neurosurgeon and Vice-Chairman, BGS Global Hospitals, carried out the complex surgery on Madhu Mallika who sustained the severe brain injury in an accident last year.

"The patient was suffering from altered sensorium, severe cognitive dysfunction and lack of movement in limbs. Following the surgery, she has now regained full consciousness, memory, communication abilities and purposive movements in limbs," Venkataramana told reporters here.—*MNA/PTI*

IAEA discovers traces of uranium in Syria

CAIRO, 7 June—The International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) said on Friday that it has found traces of processed uranium in a second site

in Syrian capital Damascus, *Pan-Arab Al-Arabiya TV* reported on Saturday.

The IAEA is investigating a US intelligence report which claimed that a secret DPRK-designed nuclear reactor that Syria has almost completed for the production of plutonium.

The IAEA said in 2008 that it found similar traces of uranium at Al-Kibar site in Damascus which has been shelled by Israel in 2007 over worries that it was used for processing plutonium.

The new find in addition to the earlier one increased worries over undeclared nuclear activity in Syria.—*MNA/Xinhua*

The report did not identify whose body had been found. Wade Johnson, 24, of Arden Hills, Minnesota, and Micah Dash and Jonny Copp of Boulder, Colo, were last heard from 20 May at the base camp of Mount Edgar, a peak of Mount Gongga, according to an e-mail his parents sent to friends.—*Internet*

China leads Asia-Pacific in new flu cases on 6 June

HONG KONG, 7 June—The Asia-Pacific region reportedly had 9 new confirmed Influenza A/H1N1 cases on Saturday, with China taking the lead by 6 cases, 3 in the mainland and another 3 in Hong Kong. Japan, Singapore and Malaysia also reported new cases on the same day.

Three more A/H1N1 flu cases were confirmed on the Chinese mainland Saturday, bringing the total number to 70.

In Hubei Province, a 18-month-old girl was tested A/H1N1 positive Thursday, the provincial health administration said Saturday. The Chi-

nese-American, the third confirmed case of the virus in the province, arrived in the provincial capital of Wuhan on 30 May via a flight from Dallas, the United States.

In Guangdong Province, a 19-year-old man was tested A/H1N1 positive Friday, the provincial health administration said. The man, Guangdong's 23rd confirmed case, left Canada with symptoms of cough, headache and sore throat and arrived in Shenzhen city Thursday. The administration has quarantined 24 people who had close contact with him and is tracing others. So far, 12 A/H1N1 flu patients have recovered and left hospital and 11 are still being treated in Guangdong.

Somali battle kills 123, rebels deny leader Aweys dead

MOGADISHU, 7 June—Battles between rival Islamist groups in central Somalia have killed 123 people, a rights group said on Saturday, and a pro-government militia said militant rebel leader Sheikh Hassan Dahir Aweys had died in the fighting.

Aweys' militia denied that as propaganda.

Witnesses said scores of bodies lay in the streets of Wabho town after fighters from the hardline al Shabaab and Hizbul Islam groups battled moderate Islamist group Ahla Sunna Waljamaca for control. Most of the deaths were on Friday.

The local Elman Peace and Human Rights Organization said it had confirmed 123 fighters killed in one of the

worst flare-ups of the year in the conflict-riven Horn of Africa nation.

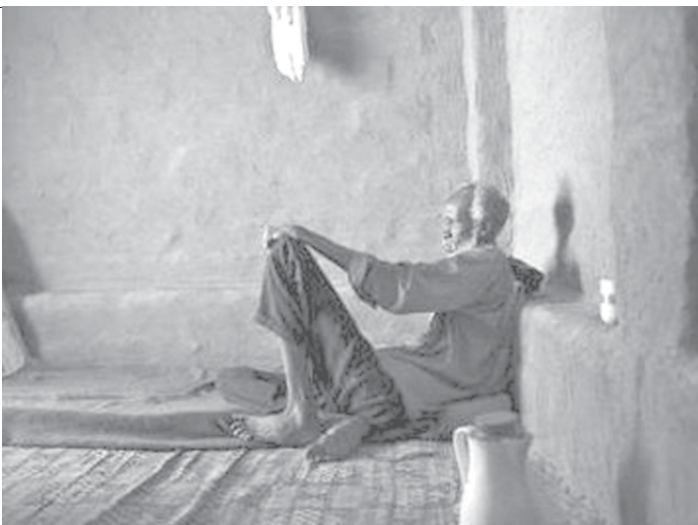
An Islamist insurgency that broke out in early 2007 — the latest in 19 years of conflict in Somalia — has killed around 18,000 civilians and thousands more fighters.

It has also drawn foreign jihadists into Somalia, enabled piracy to flourish offshore, and unsettled the whole region, putting East African neighbours on high security alert.

In Mogadishu, al Shabaab have been battling the security forces of President Sheikh Sharif Ahmed. In the central region, pro- and anti-government Islamist militia have been fighting all year, with towns changing hands regularly.

Two killed in attack on CAR army base

BANGUI, 7 June—At least two people were killed and several wounded in an attack early Saturday on a military base in Central African Republic, said the army and a rebel force involved in the peace process.

A spokesman for the Union of Democratic Forces (UFDR), which has signed a peace deal with the Bangui government, told *AFP* the attack had been directed against their base in Birao, in the northeast of the country.

"Very early this morning, a group of individuals from an unidentified zone attacked the UFDR base at Birao," said Djarnib Ngrebaye.

"Our forces, supported by the army, managed to fight off the attackers," he added.

"There are two dead on the side of the attackers and several wounded, but that is just a provisional toll." Commander Emmanuel Ngboya of the CAR armed forces confirmed the attack to *AFP*.

"They had weapons.

They came to kill, not to look for food," he said. "There are two dead on the side of the UFDR and about 10 wounded."

Another military source, who asked to remain anonymous, blamed the attack on ethnic Kara rebels of the UFDR opposed to the group's involvement in the peace process. According to this source, it was a settling of scores between the Kara and the majority ethnic Goula, who dominate the UFDR and who are led by Zakaria Damane.

Bird flu virus can survive two years in landfill

LOS ANGELES, 7 June—Carcasses of birds infected with the bird flu virus continue to be infectious for up to two years, a new study has found.

The bird flu virus can survive in landfill leachate — liquid that drains from a landfill — for at least 30 days and up to two years, according to the study that appears in the June issue of the journal *Environmental Science & Technology*.

Factors that most reduced the virus' survival times were elevated temperatures and acidic or alkaline pH, said Nebraska public health researchers who conducted the study.

Hundreds of millions of chickens and ducks infected with bird flu have

died or been killed worldwide in an effort to control the spread of the disease.

The remains are disposed of in different ways, including burial in landfills. For example, the carcasses of more than 4 million poultry that were culled or died during a 2002 outbreak in Virginia were placed in municipal landfills, according to the American Chemical Society.—INTERNET

Scientists eye glowing volcano crater in Hawaii

VOLCANO, HAWAII, 7 June—The summit of Hawaii's Kilauea volcano is glowing brightly as molten lava swirls 300 feet below its crater's floor, bubbling near the surface after years of spewing from the volcano's side.

The expanding vent of Halemaumau crater helps confirm scientists' belief that the lava is close to the surface of the summit, said Janet Babb, a geologist and spokeswoman for the US Geological Survey's Hawaiian Volcano Observatory.

Park rangers have begun keeping the overlook at the Jaggar Museum open later at night to accommodate the growing number of visitors arriving at dusk or after dark to view the glow.

Kilauea has been erupting for more than 25 years, with its lava creating a plume of steam as it spills into the Pacific Ocean. But this recent activity is coming from the top of the volcano, not its sea-level side. This is the strongest glow coming from the crater since October, but scientists don't know if lava will ever erupt in a fountain from within the crater, Babb said.

“There's no way to know if that will ever materialize,” she said. “It would be grand to see some fountaining here.”—INTERNET

Sixty-three new A/H1N1 flu cases confirmed in Europe

STOCKHOLM, 7 June—A European health agency said on Saturday that 63 new A/H1N1 flu cases were reported in European countries within the last 24 hours.

Of the new cases, 58 were confirmed in Britain, four in the Netherlands, and one in Belgium, the European Center for Disease

(ECDC) said in its daily situation report.

The total number of confirmed cases of the A/H1N1 flu virus in the EU (European Union) and EFTA (European Free Trade Association) countries rose to 1,034, with 291 cases in Spain and 486 in Britain, 56 in France and 49 in Germany, the ECDC said.—INTERNET

SINGAPORE, 7 June—Singapore reported one more confirmed case of Influenza A/H1N1 on Saturday, bringing the number of total cases in the city state to 15.

According to a statement issued by Singapore's Ministry of Health, the 15th confirmed case is a 39-year-old Indonesian female, who is the aunt of the 11th case here. On 1 June, she went to

Singapore's Changi Airport to fetch her niece when the latter arrived here from New York via Frankfurt. Her niece, who developed symptoms on 2 June, was confirmed positive on 3 June.

The Indonesian female was confirmed positive after laboratory results on Saturday, and three of her household members have already been placed on home quarantine order.

India reports first case of human-to-human transmission of A/H1N1 flu virus

NEW DELHI, 7 June—The first case of human-to-human transmission of the deadly virus of A/H1N1 flu in India was reported Sunday in Hyderabad, central India, taking the number of persons afflicted by the disease to seven in the country, reported the semi-official *Press Trust of India*.

The human-to-human transmission took place when a man, who came back from the United States on 31 May, infected his younger brother living in Hyderabad, said the report.

Probe shows autopilot off before Air France jetliner crashed

PARIS, 6 June—The agency investigating the crash of Flight 447 said on Saturday that signals from the missing Air France jetliner suggest that its autopilot was not on before it vanished.

Paul-Louis Arslanian, the director of France's air safety investigation agency, said at a press conference in Paris that the plane sent 24 failure signals in the five minutes before contact was lost, suggesting that the aircraft experienced multiple systems failures before it plunged into the sea.

Arslanian said investigators are analyzing the 24 messages as they are still not sure whether the automatic pilot was shut off by the pilots or by the on-board computer because of the different data from the speed-measuring instruments.

He said some problems had been detected with the speed-measuring instruments on the Airbus A330 of which the manufacturer Airbus had recommended a replacement.

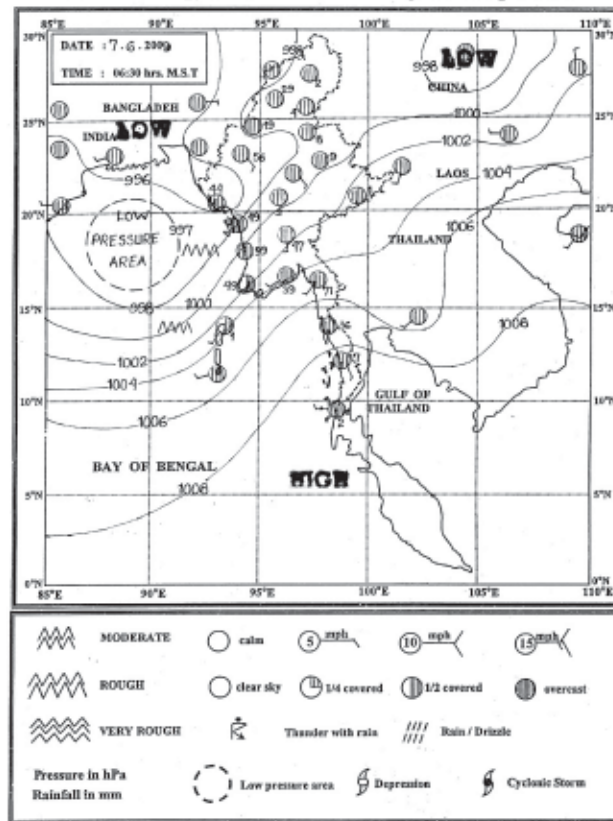

Sunday, 7 June, 2009

Summary of observations recorded at 09:30 hr MST:

During the past 24 hours, rain or thundershowers have been isolated in Kayah State, fairly widespread in Mandalay and Magway Divisions and widespread in the remaining States and Divisions with locally heavyfall in Rakhine and Mon States. The noteworthy amounts of rainfall recorded were Gwa (7.05) inches, Bilin (5.12) inches, Thandwe (4.80) inches, Theinzayat (4.65) inches, Thaton (3.46) inches, Bago (3.35) inches, Ye (3.19) inches, Mudon and Kawkareik (2.99) inches each, Mawlamyine (2.79) inches, Kyaukpyu (2.52) inches, Hmawbi (2.48) inches and Hpa-an (2.44) inches.

Maximum temperature on 6-6-2009 was 85°F. Minimum temperature on 7-6-2009 was 69°F. Relative humidity at (09:30) hours MST on 7-6-2009 was 93%. Total sunshine hours on 6-6-2009 was (1.1) hours approx.

Rainfall on 7-6-2009 was (1.78) inches at Mingaladon, (1.53) inches Kaba-Aye and (2.33) inches Central Yangon. Total rainfall since 1-1-2009 was (23.94) inches at Mingaladon, (29.09) inches at Kaba-Aye and (35.16) inches at Central Yangon. Maximum wind speed at Yangon (Kaba-Aye) was (10) mph from West at (18:30) hours MST on 6-6-2009.

Bay inference: According to the observations at (12:30) hrs M.S.T today the low pressure area still persists over Central Bay and adjoining Northwest Bay. Monsoon is strong to vigorous in the Andaman Sea and Bay of Bengal.

Forecast valid until evening of 8th June 2009: Rain or thundershowers will be fairly widespread in Shan and Kayah States, widespread in the remaining States and Divisions with likelihood of isolated heavyfalls in Rakhine, and Mon States, Bago, Magway, Mandalay and lower Sagaing Divisions. Degree of certainty is (80%).

State of the sea: Squalls with rough seas will be experienced at times off and along Myanmar Coasts. Surface wind speed in squalls may reach (40-45) mph.

Outlook for subsequent two days: Likelihood of increase of rain in the Central Myanmar areas.

Forecast for Nay Pyi Taw and neighbouring area for 8-6-2009: One or two rain or thundershowers. Degree of certainty is (80%).

Forecast for Yangon and neighbouring area for 8-6-2009: Some rain. Degree of certainty is (80%).

Forecast for Mandalay and neighbouring area for 8-6-2009: Some rain. Degree of certainty is (80%).

Breast cancer gene can be blocked

ANN ARBOR, 7 June — Researchers have identified a gene that is overexpressed in up to 20 percent of breast cancers and that could be blocked in the lab by a currently available blood pressure drug, according to a new study from the University of Michigan Comprehensive Cancer Center.

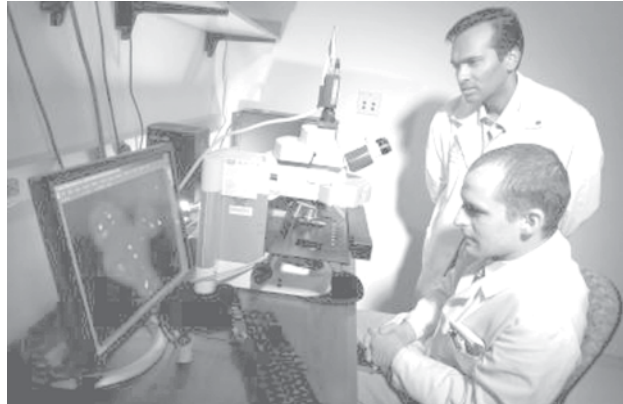
The gene, called AGTR1, caused normal breast cells to behave like cancer cells.

This behavior was reversed by treatment with the blood pressure

drug losartan. Tumors in mice that expressed AGTR1 shrunk by 30 percent eight weeks after treatment with losartan, a

drug approved by the US Food and Drug Administration to treat high blood pressure.

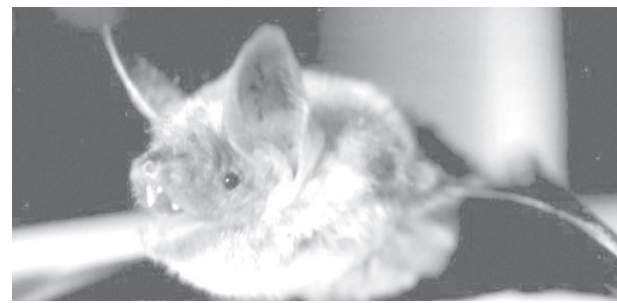
Bats recognize individual voices of other bats

BERLIN, 7 June — Bats can use the characteristics of other bats' voices to recognize each other, according to a study by researchers from the University of Tuebingen, Germany and the University of Applied Sciences in Konstanz, Germany. The study explains how bats use echolocation for more than just spatial knowledge.

The researchers first tested the ability of four greater mouse-eared bats

to distinguish between the echolocation calls of other bats. After observing that the bats learned to discriminate the voices of

other bats, they then programmed a computer model that reproduces the recognition behaviour of the bats.—Internet
