Harness natural resources expeditiously for greater economic growth

Ten killed in Czech flash floods

PRAGUE, 26 June — At least 10 people have died in floods that have wreaked havoc in the eastern Czech Republic.

Towns and villages were lashed by torrential rain in North Moravia, causing rivers to burst their banks. The victims included two brothers who drowned in a house as they tried to save their mother. Several elderly people apparently died from heart attacks as rescuers could not reach them in time. About 1,000 soldiers are helping the relief effort.

Hundreds of residents have been evacuated. The BBC's Rob Cameron in Prague says these are the worst floods in North Moravia for more than a decade. The town of Novy Jicin witnessed up to 80mm (three inches) of rain within two hours.

Floodwaters in the area are now receding, but forecasters say there is more heavy rain to come, and the major city of Ostrava is bracing itself for the worst. Neighbouring Austria has also been hit by floods in areas west of Vienna. Priceless artworks have been rescued from a basement storage facility that was leaking in the capital's Albertina Museum.

US says weapons sent to Somalia

WASHINGTON, 26 June — The US has confirmed that it has sent weapons to Somalia's UN-backed transitional government.

The state department said the move followed an urgent call for help from the government, which has been fighting Islamist militias.

The insurgents control swathes of Somalia and US officials have been alarmed at their gains, analysts say.

The US would also provide logistical support for training Somali troops, officials said.

"At the request of that government, the state department has helped to provide weapons and ammunition on an urgent basis," spokesman Ian Kelly said.

The arms would help the government "repel the onslaught of extremist forces which are intent

Britain mulled using poison darts in WWII

LONDON, 26 June — British and Canadian scientists in World War II tested poison darts to be dropped on German soldiers, documents released by the National Archives indicate.

The darts were never used except on sheep and goats in Canada, *The Times of London* reported on Thursday. Mark Dunton, a historian at the archives, said British leaders may have feared the enemy would retaliate in kind.

Four years of memoranda and letters show the project was a serious one and got far enough along for a correspondence between an

official at Porton Down near Salisbury, then a top-secret weapons development official, and managers at Singer Sewing Machine. The replies from Singer were somewhat confused because the scientist could not disclose the intended use of the needles he was seeking.

"We are afraid we do not quite understand your requirements," a letter

from Singer dated 24 Dec, 1941, said. "From your remarks it would seem that the needles are required for some other purpose, other than sewing machines. In any case, we should like to help you if at all possible."

The darts would have been dropped in canisters like bombs, spreading them out over a wide area.

Israel gives Abbas forces freer hand in WBank cities

JERUSALEM, 26 June — Israel agreed on Thursday to give Palestinian security forces a freer hand to operate in four West Bank cities and to limit its own military activities there in a US-backed move to bolster President Mahmoud Abbas.

Palestinian officials said the changes were inadequate because the Israeli army still reserved the right to re-enter the cities of Qalqilya, Ramallah, Bethlehem and Jericho to counter what it called any "urgent" threats by militants.

The announcement coincided with efforts by Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to ease tensions with US President Barack Obama over stalled peace-making with the Palestinians.

Israel has rebuffed US calls for a halt to Jewish settlement building in the occupied West Bank. On Monday, Israeli Defence Minister Ehud Barak will meet Obama's Middle East envoy, George Mitchell, in Washington to try to narrow differences.—*Internet*

Sri Lankan reporter 'kidnapped'

COLOMBO, 26 June — A Sri Lankan journalist says she was kidnapped from outside her home in the capital Colombo and held for a day by people claiming to be the police.

Krishni Ifam, a Tamil reporter who works for media development NGO Internews, said the men had warned her to give up journalism altogether.

She said she was then released in the central city of Kandy late on Wednesday with a tiny amount of cash. Police in Sri Lanka could not be reached for comment.—*Internet*

Crude prices end above \$70 on supply concerns

NEW YORK, 26 June — Oil prices ended above 70 US dollars a barrel on Thursday as one of Royal Dutch Shell's pipeline junction points was attacked by militants in Nigeria, stirring concerns about supplies.

Light, sweet crude for August delivery rose to 70.93 dollars a barrel before retreating to settle at 70.23 dollars a barrel, trading up 1.56 dollars, or 2.3 percent, on the New York Mercantile Exchange.

Crude prices moved higher Thursday after the Shell company said one of its pipeline junction points had been shut down because of militants attack in Nigeria, the largest oil producer in Africa.

The Nigerian militants have escalated their activities recently, which have forced foreign oil companies, including US oil major Chevron and Italy's Agip, to shut at least 133,000 barrels per day of oil production in the last month.

Oil also gained support from robust performance of the stock market, which increased for a third day after the US Commerce Department said the economy may be better than previously thought.

In London, Brent crude for August delivery rose 1.87 dollars to 70.20 dollars a barrel on the ICE Futures exchange.

Capitalism, IMF and World Bank under fire at UN

UNITED NATIONS, 26 June — Ecuador's left-wing President Rafael Correa blamed capitalism on Thursday for the global financial crisis, suggesting at a UN conference that the International Monetary Fund and World Bank be abolished.

Criticism of the IMF and other so-called Bretton Woods institutions established during World War Two has become a running theme at a three-day meeting of the UN General Assembly on the crisis.

"Patching up the Bretton Woods system, which we do not control,

makes no sense for (developing) countries," Correa said in a speech on the second day of the conference.

Reforming the IMF and World Bank "would be an insufficient stopgap solution," he said, adding that "we are faced with a crisis unlike those (previously) provoked by capitalism."

If the Bretton Woods institutions cannot be abolished, he said, then they should be changed and given less authority over the world's poor countries.

More financial decision-making power,

Correa said, should go to the United Nations instead.

Cuban Trade Minister Rodrigo Malmierca Diaz had said on Wednesday that the IMF and World Bank had "impoverished" nations around the world and should be scrapped.

The UN meeting was originally set for 1-3 June but General Assembly President Miguel D'Escoto, a leftist former foreign minister of Nicaragua, delayed it to this week because of arguments over a set of draft proposals on reforming the world financial system.

India to launch 'ID card' scheme

NEW DELHI, 26 June — The Indian government has begun moves to provide a Unique Identification (UID) number to its citizens, the central government has announced.

It has appointed Infosys Technologies co-

chairman Nandan Nilekani as head of a new body to determine how the scheme will be implemented.

The project will mean that all Indian adults will have to carry what is in effect an identity card.

It was a key commitment in the election manifesto of the Congress party.

In its manifesto, Congress said it may be possible to provide every Indian adult with a card after the publication of the national population register in 2011.

French youth unemployment rises

PARIS, 26 June — France saw its unemployment total grow by 36,400 in May, with young jobseekers suffering the biggest rises, official figures have shown.

The increase, which was smaller than rises seen in previous months, took the jobless count to 2.543 million.

It marked a 1.5% rise on a monthly basis and a 26.4% rise year-on-year, the Economy Ministry said.

Unemployment among

jobseekers under the age of 25 in mainland France has risen by 41.1% in the last 12 months.

Workers have been striking in France in reaction to job cuts, as firms seek to reduce costs in the face of the wider slowdown.

Italy may raise women's retirement age

ROME, 26 June — Italian women may have the same retirement age as men within 10 years or so, an official said on Thursday.

Civil Service Minister Renato Brunetta said a European Union directive banning gender discrimination was the final incentive to make the change, the Italian news agency ANSA reported.

Women can now start collecting pensions at 60 while men must wait until 65.

Brunetta said the later retirement age would be phased in over a decade.

The European Commission recently said Italy could face penalties if it did not take action within six months on the pension disparity.

“Transformers” sequel scores best opening ever for Wednesday

LOS ANGELES, 26 June—Paramount's action sequel “Transformers: Revenge of the Fallen” scored the best opening day ever for a Wednesday release in the United States and Canada, taking in about 60.6 million dollars, preliminary estimates showed on Thursday.

The first day in release of “Transformers 2,” which was directed by Michael Bay and produced by DreamWorks, also became the second best of all time after “The Dark Knight,” which grossed 67.2 million dollars on its first day, a Friday, last summer. Previous record holder for a Wednesday

release was “Harry Potter and the Order of the Phoenix,” which grossed 44.2 million dollars when opening in July 2007.

“Transformers 2” also opened No 1 Wednesday in almost every overseas market, where box office estimates indicated the sequel outperformed the original “Transformers” film, which was released three years ago. The first “Transformers” film grossed more than 708 million dollars worldwide. Like its predecessor, the “Transformers” sequel is based on a line of toy action figures from toy maker Hasbro.

China, Uzbekistan to improve ties, cooperation

ALMATY, 26 June — China and Uzbekistan are seeking further development of friendly and cooperative relations 17 years after the two countries established diplomatic ties. Chinese Vice Premier Li Keqiang is scheduled to visit Uzbekistan on Saturday, the third leg of his three-nation tour which includes Finland and Turkmenistan.

Relations between China and Uzbekistan improved in 1990s after the two countries established diplomatic ties in January 1992. In June 2001, Uzbekistan joined the Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO), which comprises China, Russia, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan and Tajikistan. In June 2004, the SCO launched a regional anti-terror structure in Uzbekistan's capital Tashkent.

Since then, China and Uzbekistan have maintained active and effective cooperation within the SCO framework and achieved further development of bilateral ties. In May 2005, Chinese President Hu Jintao and Uzbek President Islam Karimov signed a treaty on friendly and cooperative partnership in Beijing, signaling new determination on both sides to further consolidate their traditional friendship and cooperation.

China nominates two sites for World Heritage

BEIJING, 26 June—The World Heritage Committee is reviewing the latest list of applicants. 30 new properties have been submitted. They include Mount Songshan and Mount Wutai in China.

One of the properties is Germany's Dresden Elbe Valley. The committee decides whether to remove it from the list because of the building of a bridge in the heart of the landscape.

The nine-day meeting will also review the state of conservation for the 178 current sites, as well as the state of conservation of the 30 properties on the Danger List. It may also decide to add to new properties whose preservation requires special attention.—Xinhua

Indonesia's Pertamina to build 2 methanol plants

JAKARTA, 26 June—Indonesia's state-owned oil and gas firm PT Pertamina said it would collaborate with PT Arrtu MegaEnergie (AME) to build two methanol factories worth US\$ 1.9 billion to supply domestic needs, a paper said here on Friday.

“We expect that the plant will begin production in 2012 at the latest,” Pertamina's trading and marketing director Achmad Faisal quoted by the Jakarta Post as saying here.

AME president Christoforus Richard said construction of the two factories in Indramayu in West Java Province and in Peranap of Riau Province would start in September.—Xinhua

A booming market for domestic animation

BEIJING, 26 June—Staying on the small screen the domestic cartoon industry has made great progress in recent years. And, the industry has ambitions of breaking into the overseas market by learning from and collaborating with its foreign counterparts.

The Cartoon Network, an American channel, recently signed a contract with the Zhejiang Zhongnan Cartoon Corporation Limited. They agreed to buy the company produced cartoon series, “Fairy Land”. The head of

the Corporation says the deal was clinched, in part, due to the originality and creativity of the animation.

In recent years, the Zhejiang Zhongnan Cartoon Corporation Limited has spent effort recruiting talented designers from across the country. It has also established research centres for developing home-made cartoons. The Group also collaborates with Zhejiang University and China Academy of Fine Arts to cultivate young cartoon talent. Now the Group boasts a team of

over 5 hundred professionals. Their new series of cartoons called “The Magical Town”, is now in the final phase of post production.

Zhejiang Zhongnan Cartoon Corporation Limited was established five years ago. Over the years the firm has produced 14 animations covering a wide range of subjects. The results are remarkable, with some of the cartoon works winning trophies at major competitions both at home and abroad.—Xinhua

Solar plane to make public debut

LONDON, 26 June — Swiss adventurer Bertrand Picard is set to unveil a prototype of the solar-powered plane he hopes eventually to fly around the world.

The initial version, spanning 61m but weighing just 1,500kg, will undergo trials to prove it can fly at night.

Mr Picard, who made history by circling the globe non-stop in a balloon in 1999, says he wants to demonstrate the potential of renewable energies.

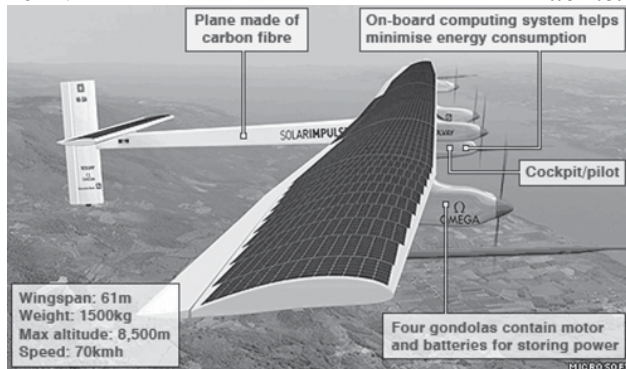
He expects to make a crossing of the Atlantic in 2012.

The flight would be a risky endeavour. Only now is solar and battery technology becoming mature enough to sustain flight through the night - and then only in unmanned planes.

But Picard's Solar Impulse team has invested tremendous energy—and no little money—in trying to find what they believe is a breakthrough design.

"I love this type of vision where you set the goal and then you try to find a way to reach it, because this is challenging," he told *BBC News*.

Dogs break barking world records

BEIJING, 26 June—A British dog has set a new Guinness World Record for the loudest bark in history before joining over 50 canines to also beat the existing collective record.

Daz from London tipped the metre at 108 decibels at the event organized by Disney to mark the DVD and Blu-ray release of Bolt.

He then took part in the group effort which reached 115 decibels, four higher than the previous record set last year in the US state of Vermont.

Marco Frigatti of Guinness World Records said: "Dogs bark for a variety of reasons, to attract attention or express excitement. Today they barked to become Guinness World Record holders. Congratulations."

US probes altitude, speed data on two Airbus A330s

WASHINGTON, 26 June — US aviation safety investigators are looking into possible anomalies with air speed and altitude indicators on two Airbus A330 jetliners, officials said on Thursday.

The National Transportation Safety Board, which is helping French authorities determine if speed sensors were a factor in the crash of an Air France A330 this month, said it is also investigat-

ing incidents involving a TAM Airlines flight from Miami to Sao Paulo in May and a Northwest Airlines flight between Hong Kong and Tokyo on Tuesday.

Both flights experienced cockpit readings showing a loss of primary speed and altitude information, the safety board said in a statement. Both planes landed without incident.

Investigators are look-

ing at flight data recorder information as well as crew statements and weather information.

Airbus spokesman Clay McConnell said the manufacturer would "provide all support to the NTSB" as it reviews the two incidents. Further, the company said procedures are in place that would allow pilots to maintain safe operations in the event of unreliable air-speed data.—*Internet*

People begin enjoying music 35,000 years ago

BEIJING, 26 June— People in fact began enjoying music some 35,000 years ago, according to the prehistoric bird-bone flutes unearthed in southwest Germany.

Researchers said on Wednesday they had found a five-hole flute made from the radius bone of a griffon vulture and two fragments of ivory flutes in a cave in the Swabian Jura mountains.

The flute has a 22-centimetre instrument with

five holes and a notched end. Archaeologist Nicholas Conard, from Tuebingen University, said the flute was 35,000 years old. Other archaeologists agreed with Conard's assessment.

The flute is the oldest handcrafted musical instrument yet discovered, offering the latest evidence that early modern humans in Europe had established a complex and creative culture.

"These finds demon-

strate the presence of a well-established musical tradition at the time when modern humans colonized Europe, more than 35,000 calendar years ago," Conard and colleagues reported in the journal *Nature*.

Another flute excavated in Austria is believed to be 19,000 years old, and a group of 22 flutes found in the French Pyrenees mountains has been dated at up to 30,000 years ago.—*Internet*

The technician said she and the customer argued over the design on the girl's nails and the girl tried to leave without paying.

Once a police officer arrived, the 13-year-old girl and her mother agreed to pay \$10. The technician said the nails and her labor were worth about \$30.

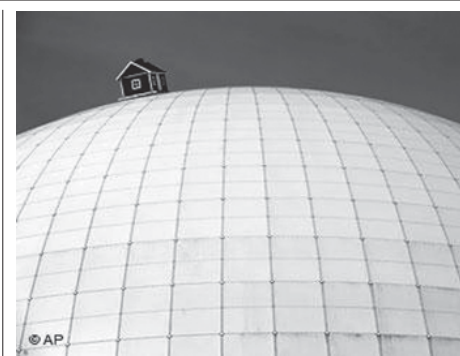
Police spokeswoman Jill Boudreau said police are referring the case to the city's prosecutor for a possible misdemeanor assault charge.

Cocaine haul found hidden in frozen sharks

Mexico's navy has seized more than a tonne of cocaine stuffed inside frozen sharks, as drug gangs under military pressure go to greater lengths to conceal narcotics bound for the United States.

Armed and masked navy officers cut open more than 20 shark carcasses filled with slabs of cocaine after checking a container ship in a container port in the southern Mexico state of Yucatan, the navy and Mexican media said Tuesday.

"We are talking about more than a tonne of cocaine that was inside the ship," Navy Commander Eduardo Villa told reporters after X-ray machines and sniffer dogs helped uncover the drugs. "Those in charge of the shipment said it was a conserving agent but after checks we confirmed it was cocaine," he said.

Therefore, for all the people not to abuse illicit narcotic drugs in any form and in any circumstances, it is vital that emphasis be placed on the implementation of educational tasks and agitation campaigns to arouse the public, especially that youths on the danger of narcotic drugs. In implementing these anti-drug campaigns and activities to penetrate deeply into the masses, the most successful way is to employ the cultural sector. Therefore, literature, music, painting, cartoon, poster and photography competitions are being held across the nation to raise awareness of the danger of narcotic drugs. Today, the first, second, third and special prize winners of the competitions will be awarded prizes at this ceremony, which is the 12th of its kind which has been held consecutively every year.

The CCDAC was tasked to draft the 15 Year Narcotic Drug Elimination Plan, which was successfully formulated and enacted. Starting from the 1999-2000 fiscal year the plan which is divided into (3) Five Year Phases is being implemented.

This year is the time when the last year of the Second Phase ends and the first year of the Third Phase starts. The CCDAC has drawn up and laid down plans based on the successes achieved during the implementation of the First and Second Phases and will strive all out to implement the tasks successfully in the Third 5-Year Phase.

Moreover, according to the ground survey which Myanmar has been jointly implementing in cooperation with the UNODC, the cultivation of opium poppy was 105,000 hectares in 2001, has declined yearly and in 2006 the cultivation decreased to 21,500 hectares, which is a 61% decrease. In 2008 the cultivation of opium poppy was 28,500 hectares and if compared to 2007 the cultivation was 27,700 hectares, there was an increase of 3% in 2008. With regard to production of opium as 460 tons was produced in 2007 and in 2008 the production declined to 410 tons, there it is evidenced that production could be reduced by an appreciable 11% in 2008.

However, Amphetamine Type Stimulants-ATS,

which are modern synthetic drugs such as Ketamine, ICE and Ecstasy etc produced by scientific methods, that has nothing to do with the cultivation and production of opium poppy but based on illicit precursor chemicals has supplemented and taken the place of the opiates. Therefore enforcement and suppression tasks are being implemented with added momentum. In implementing enforcement tasks, to ensure success, Myanmar has been stepping up cooperation with foreign agencies of neighbouring countries, in the exchange of information and intelligence and could expose, arrest and prosecute an increasing number of local and international narcotic drugs trafficking gangs.

Myanmar has been striving to eliminate the production of narcotic drugs and has at the same time stepped up its enforcement tasks, on reducing drug use and comprehending the fact that the elimination of drug abuse is also important, three Rehabilitation Centres under the supervision of the CCDAC has been opened and are implementing treatment and rehabilitation tasks, these centres are Shwe Pyi Tha, Shwe Pyi Aye and Shwe Pyi Thit Rehabilitation Centres, thus Myanmar has been implementing the necessary tasks to effectively eliminate the abuse of narcotic drugs.

Knowing that tasks on elimination of narcotic drugs cannot be implemented by acting alone but must be implemented in cooperation with the international community, Myanmar has accordingly entered into agreement by signing MoUs and treaties on cooperation to control and suppress narcotic drugs, with countries of the region, sub-region and neighbouring countries. Examples of the cooperation are the six-nation MoU of the Mekong Countries, which was signed in 1993 and starting from 1995 with financial and technical assistance of the UNODC Myanmar has been actively implementing anti-narcotic drugs projects in the designated narcotic drugs control areas. Moreover, beginning from 1997, after becoming a member of the ASEAN Myanmar has been enhancing its cooperation with the ASEAN member countries.

Myanmar has fully implemented and is continuing to implement tasks on the objectives on reduction of narcotic drug production, drug abuse and to step up cooperation on the prevention and suppression

of narcotic drugs, contained in the Political Declaration issued by 1998 UN General Assembly, 20th Special Session on Narcotic Drugs. Furthermore, Myanmar and China have been jointly cooperating in the survey of opium poppy cultivation by Remote-sensing and satellite imagery and jointly conducting ground survey after signing the MoU on 27 May, 2006. the opium poppy fields discovered by the satellite imaging and ground surveys teams were destroyed by the enforcement teams.

Myanmar has been actively cooperating with the international community and at the same time has been implementing anti-drug campaigns with added momentum, based on its own strength and resources. I wish to urge all the people of the country and the world to harmoniously strive with all their might to rid their environment of the menace of narcotic drugs in accord with the 2009 motto of the UN "No individual, family or community is safe where illicit drugs take control".

I would like to inform you that the ceremonies to mark the International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking are also celebrating at the cities of states and divisions respectively. Particular information, I would like to focus is that destructions of narcotic drugs seized by Law Enforcement Agencies will be held at 10 a.m. in two cities and at noon in one city today. There are 23 items of illicit drugs worth 42405.71 million kyats in Taunggyi, 69 items of illicit drugs worth 20177.16 million kyats and 19 items of illicit drugs worth 41499.09 million kyats in Kengtung respectively and the total street price of illicit drugs seized is 104,081.98 million kyats.

Next, Chairman of Enforcement Working Committee of the CCDAC Vice-Chief of Myanmar Police Force Police Brig-Gen Zaw Win accepted K 2.5 million donated by the UNODC for prize presentation ceremony presented by Assistant Resident Representative Daw Khin Hla Mon and the ceremony came to an end.

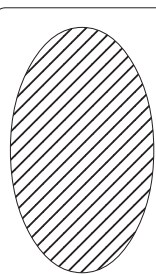

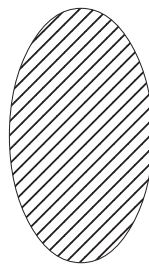

When it comes to the communication sector of Nawngkhio, previously, manual exchange phone was the only means of communication in the township. Since last March, local people have had access to digital exchange phones. So far, the township has got 480 auto telephones. So, its communication sector has made a great deal of progress.

In order to help improve the transport sector of the township, Public Works is building and maintaining tarred roads, gravel roads, laterite roads and earth

agricultural sector. Last year, we put 337 acres under oil radish. We have a plan to increase the sown acreage of oil radish to 1100 acres coming cold season. On average, we get 15 to 20 baskets of oil radish an acre. We can extract edible oil from oil radish at the rate of six viss a basket. Coming cold season, our township will distribute oil radish seeds to the

hospitals. Now, we have got four hospitals. So, we can provide better health care to local people."

"In the education sector, till 1988, our township got one basic education high school, eight middle schools and 154 primary schools. Now, we have three high schools, seven middle schools and 156 primary schools. Due to the new schools, the youth of the

roads. Not only urban roads but also rural roads have been upgraded in the township.

Nawngkhio was equipped with a TV retransmitting station in July 1997. Since December 2008, the station has also retransmitted the broadcasts of Myawady TV Station.

So, Nawngkhio Township is enjoying regional development at the unprecedented level. And local people will soon be able to enjoy higher living standard thanks to the progress in the education, health care, transport and agricultural farming.

LOS ANGELES, 26 June—Pop star Michael Jackson has died in Los Angeles, aged 50.

Paramedics were called to the singer's Beverly Hills home at about midday on Thursday after he stopped breathing.

He was pronounced dead two hours later at the UCLA medical centre. Jackson's brother, Jermaine, said he was believed to have suffered a cardiac arrest.

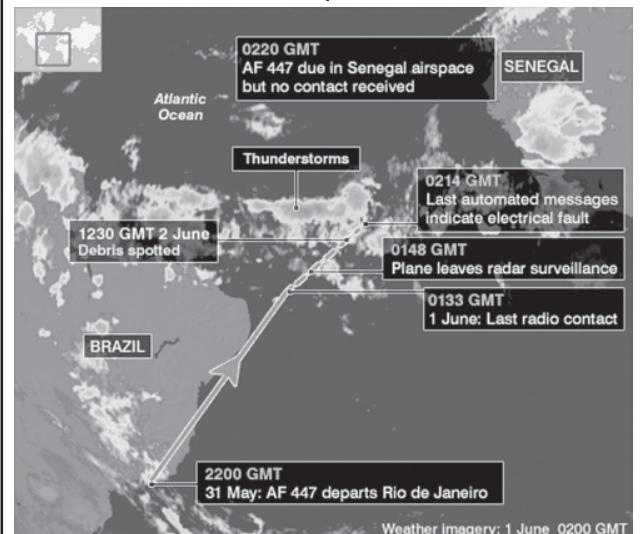
Cyclone victims 'still homeless'

DHAKA, 26 June — One month after the devastating Cyclone Aila hit Bangladesh, many people have not still been able to return home.

Nearly 300 people were killed by the cyclone and there was a massive amount of damage caused to embankments, roads and houses. The government has launched a big relief effort for the four million people affected by the cyclone.

But some 125,000 affected people are still living in the open, as large areas remain flooded with sea water.

The head of aid agency Oxfam in Bangladesh, Heather Blackwell, told the AFP news agency that the homes of 75,000 families were damaged or under water. She said many of the families were living in "camp-like settlements", and others living in schools and cyclone shelters.—Internet

Air France pilot body identified

PARIS, 26 June—The body of the chief pilot of the Air France plane that crashed into the Atlantic on 1 June has been identified, the company has said.

It said the remains of the pilot and also a flight attendant were among some 50 bodies recovered by search teams.

All 228 people on board the Airbus 330 flying from Rio de Janeiro to Paris are believed to have been killed.

There has been speculation that faulty data on the old-style speed sensors may have caused the crash.

"Among the victims who have been recovered from the ocean, two members of the crew of flight AF447 have been identified to date: the captain and a steward," Air France said in a statement.

It did not provide any further details.—Internet

Twin sisters get the same exam scores: telepathy or not?

BEIJING, 26 June — Do twins have telepathy? When twin sisters got the same scores on this year's national college entrance examination, villagers in Shaoxing, east China's Zhejiang Province started to wonder if the girls read one another's minds, according to a story on Zjol.com.

The twin sisters, Zang Jiahuan and Zang Jiale, took the annual college entrance exams at the beginning of this June. When they received the results showing they both scored 644 points, they were shocked.

"We never expected it," the girls said in unison, telling a reporter who asked if anything like this had ever happened before, "this is the only case."

The reporter became even more curious when he found the pair repeatedly finished one another's sentences. Wondering if the twins could have telepathy, the reporter conducted an experiment on them.

When asked questions about their lives, the sisters always answered in one voice, which stunned the onlookers and made the reporter conclude that telepathy did exist

between the sisters.

However, Xu Yi, a doctor in Zhejiang No 1 Hospital denied the conjecture.

He said it was not unusual for twins to get the same or similar scores on tests because identical twins are born with the same genes, which decide their personality, intelligence and ways of thinking.

Xu added that the twins also have the same family and education background; therefore, they would find the same solutions to solve problems in the exams.

Many sharks 'facing extinction'

LONDON, 26 June — Many species of open ocean shark are under serious threat, according to an assessment by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN).

The Red list gives the status of 64 types of shark and ray, over 30% of which are threatened with extinction.

The authors, IUCN's Shark Specialist Group, say a main cause is overfishing. Listed as endangered are two species of hammerhead shark, often subject to "finning" — a practice of removing the fins and throwing away the body. This is the first time that IUCN Red List criteria, considered the world's most comprehensive inventory of the conservation status of plants and animals, have been used to classify open ocean, or pelagic, sharks and rays.

The list is part of an ongoing

international scientific project to monitor the animals.

The authors classified a further 24% of the examined species as Near Threatened. Sharks are "profoundly vulnerable" to overfishing, they say. This is principally because many species take several years to mature and have relatively few young.—Internet

Germany's Dresden deleted from UNESCO's World Heritage List

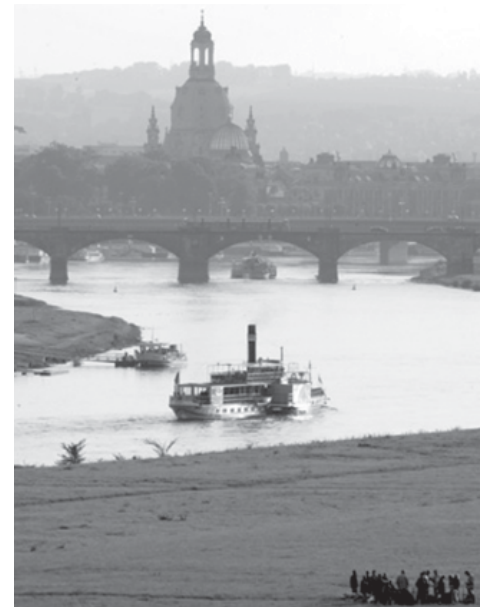
SEVILLE, 26 June — With four year's warning unheeded, Germany's heritage site in Dresden was deleted on Thursday from UNESCO's (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization's) World Heritage List.

The ongoing 33rd Session of the World Heritage Committee voted to delete Germany's Dresden Elbe Valley from the List due to the building of a four-lane bridge in the heart of the cultural landscape which meant that the property failed to keep its "outstanding universal value as inscribed."

"Every time we fail to preserve a site, we share the pain of the State Party," declared Mara Jess San Segundo, the Ambassador and Permanent Delegate of Spain to UNESCO who is chairing the session in Seville.

"We feel the sense of responsibility and sadness" in making the decision, she added at a Press conference on Thursday afternoon.

Francesco Bandarin, director of UNESCO's World Heritage Centre, blamed Dresden's removal on the "unsuccessful interchange" between UNESCO experts and Germany, in particular the unwillingness on the part

of the German authorities to listen to UNESCO's warnings in the past four years.

WHO says H1N1 virus is stable

MOSCOW, 26 June — The World Health Organization said on Thursday that the H1N1 virus was stable and there was no sign yet of it mixing with other influenza viruses.

Some health officials have raised concerns that if H1N1, known by many as swine flu, combined with the much deadlier H5N1 bird flu virus then the pandemic could claim many more lives.

"The virus is still very stable," WHO Director-General Dr Margaret Chan told reporters at a news briefing in Moscow when asked if there were any signs of the virus mixing with other strains such as avian flu.

"But as we all know the influenza virus is highly unpredictable and has great potential for mutation," Chan said after meeting Russian Health Minister Tatyana Golikova.

Chan's remarks are some of the first comments by the WHO leadership since the United Nations agency declared an influenza pandemic on 11 June.

Chan said the viruses needed to be closely monitored to make sure there was no mutation.—Internet

Mexico reports three more deaths of A/H1N1 flu

MEXICO CITY, 26 June — Mexico's Health Ministry on Thursday reported three new deaths from the new strain of A/H1N1 flu in a statement that also raised the total of those infected to 9,028, up 749 cases since the last report. Documents released with the statement showed that the disease was spreading fast in the south eastern state of Yucatan, which now has 913 confirmed cases, up 230 from the last published report.

Earlier this week, the ministry said the Yucatan state government had closed schools where the disease had been confirmed in a bid to halt contagion. Although Mexico City has the largest number of cases, or a total of 2,085, the number only increased by 25 since the last report.

The ministry urged residents to visit their doctors as soon as possible if they present any flu-like symptoms, including muscular pain,

headaches, a sudden increase in temperature and excess nasal mucus. The virus can be treated with standard antiviral medicines and is unlikely to be fatal if it is caught within the first five days of infection.

The United States, with 21,449 cases, remains the world's most infected nation. The disease, first identified in Mexico on 23 April, has now spread to 108 countries or regions and infected 57,047 people.—Internet

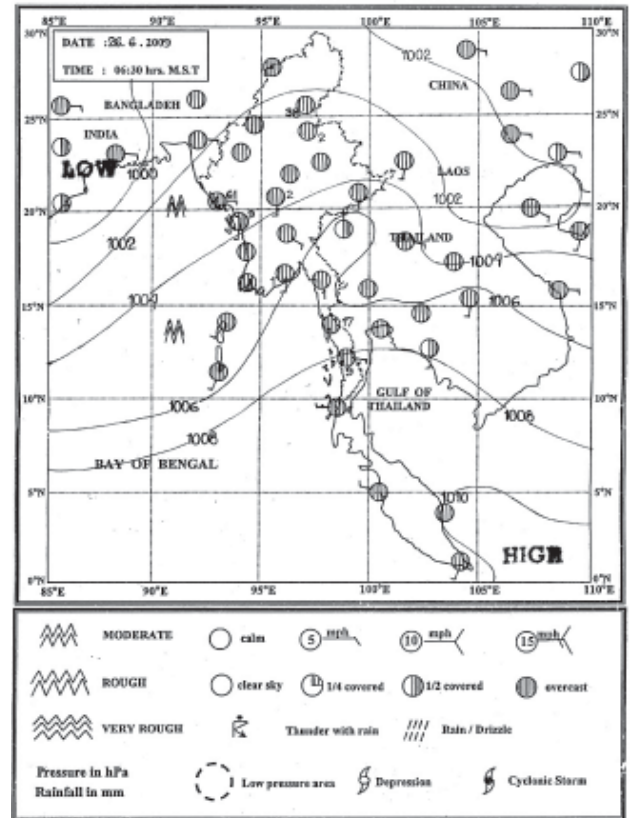
