Magway Division made up of five districts,

26 townships, 1,534 village-tracts and 4,774 villages and 160 wards has an area of 17,305.32 square miles. A total of 712,911 households of 4,898,905 families reside in the division.

As the majority of

people in the country live in rural areas, the majority of people in Magway Division are rural dwellers. Therefore, the Magway Division Development Affairs Committee is actively engaged in successful

realization of the five rural development tasks for enhancing the socio-economic status of rural dwellers.

In 2009-2010 fiscal year, the committee has made arrangements to build over 144 miles of gravel roads, earth roads and laterite roads and 35 bridges including eight concrete bridges, wooden bridges and culverts for the development of rural regions. And steps are

## French soldier killed in Afghanistan, two wounded

PARIS, 2 Aug—The French presidential office confirmed that a French soldier was killed and two others wounded in an attack by insurgents in eastern Afghanistan on Saturday.

The attack occurred in the Ghayne valley, where French soldiers were in an operation supporting the Afghan troops.

Earlier, the French military in Afghanistan said a French soldier “was hit and died of the injury.”

“The fighting lasted one and a half hour and two other French soldiers were wounded. The insurgents eventually retreated,” it added.

The Elysee Palace confirmed the incident, saying, “The president learned with deep regret of the death today of a French soldier in Afghanistan.”

The death brings the total number of French soldiers killed in the country since 2001 to 29.

SEOUL, 2 Aug—Korea has rescheduled its first space rocket launch from its soil to 11 August after repeatedly postponing it due to technical reasons, officials said Saturday.

The Ministry of Education, Science and Technology said South Korea and Russia, a co-builder of the rocket, set the new launch date after talks.

“Both sides have set 11 August for blast-off,” Kim Hong-Gab, a spokesman for the Korea Aerospace Research Institute affiliated with the ministry, told AFP.

He added weather conditions on the day would be “a decisive factor” to determine if the launch would go ahead as scheduled. The previously-scheduled launch for around 30 July was postponed — for a third time — as Russians who had built the first stage of the Korea Space Launch Vehicle-1 called for more time for testing.—Internet

## Raul Castro warns US, EU he will defend Cuba socialism

HAVANA, 2 Aug—Cuban President Raul Castro warned the United States and the European Union that the country’s socialist

political system was non-negotiable, adding he would not “restore capitalism” in Cuba.

In a speech Saturday marking the end of the annual parliamentary session, which has been dominated by Cuba’s grave economic crisis, Castro said he would be willing to “discuss everything” except the island’s political and social system.

The Cuban leader, who succeeded his ailing brother Fidel Castro as president three years ago, said he wanted to respond to US Secretary of State Hillary Clinton’s statements linking dialogue

with Cuba to democratic reform in the country.

“With all due respect, in response to Mrs Clinton, but also to the European Union... I was not chosen as president to restore capitalism to Cuba or to renounce the revolution,” he said to applause from lawmakers. “I was chosen to defend, maintain and continue to perfect socialism, not to destroy it,” said Castro.

The former army chief, 78, reiterated that he would be willing to conduct a “respectful dialogue, between equals” with the United States.

## Russia signs deal to open 2<sup>nd</sup> base in Kyrgyzstan

CHOLPON-ATA, 2 Aug—Russia clinched a tentative deal Saturday allowing it to establish a second military base in Kyrgyzstan, where the United States also has an important air base.

Under the terms of a joint memorandum, Russia could significantly boost the number of troops it has deployed in the Central Asian nation for a period of up to 49 years. Russian forces will be charged with “protecting Kyrgyz sovereignty” and repelling attacks by international terrorist groups, it said.

A definitive agreement detailing the status of the proposed base and Russia’s existing Kant base will be signed by November.

No specifics on the location of

the base or the amount of troops were given, but the document signed Saturday by the leaders of the two countries indicated that Russia may be allowed to deploy the equivalent of a battalion.

Media reports have suggested a base could be set up in Batken province, near the border with Uzbekistan. That is on the fringe of the Ferghana Valley region that spreads across Tajikistan and Uzbekistan, an area that has been an incubator of Islamic militancy over the past decade.

The memorandum also stipulated that Russian troops stationed at the two bases in Kyrgyzstan may be granted diplomatic status, giving them immunity from local laws.—Internet

## Roadside bomb kills three in N Afghanistan

KABUL, 2 Aug—A senior security officer and two other persons were killed as a roadside bomb struck their vehicle in Baghlan Province north of Afghanistan on Saturday, police said. “The device planted by enemies struck an official vehicle in Eightenkotal area this morning as a result director of intelligence department of Dahnai Ghor district along with his body guard and driver were killed,” senior police officer in the province Shams Raman told.

## Fire in Canary Islands forces evacuation of 4,000

LA PALMA, 2 Aug—A forest fire fanned by high winds has forced the evacuation of about 4,000 residents on the Canary Island of La Palma, the Spanish government said on Saturday.

Flames raging on steep hillsides southeast of the island’s dormant San Antonio volcano have engulfed several houses and could damage wildlife habitats, environmental worker Narciso Lorenzo said by telephone.

A plume of smoke rose from the island to an estimated height of more than 1,000 meters (3,300 feet). It could be seen clearly from aircraft landing at La Palma airport.

The cause of the fire is unknown. Several days of high temperatures have contributed to dry conditions on the normally verdant La Palma — one of the least developed and greenest of Spain’s Canary Islands, off the West African coast. Pop singer Madonna praised La Palma by its local name in her song “La Isla Bonita.”

Virtually all the island’s firefighting forces, including several aircraft, have been deployed to combat the blaze at three points around the town of Fuencaliente.

Spain sent a Military Emergency Unit from the nearby island of Tenerife, and a battalion was preparing to depart for La Palma from a mainland military base near Seville, the Interior Ministry said in a statement.—Internet

## Mitsubishi UFJ arranges \$5 bln loan to UAE

TOKYO, 2 Aug — Mitsubishi UFJ Financial Group (MUFJ) has put together a syndicated loan worth five billion dollars for a sovereign wealth fund in Abu Dhabi, a report said on Sunday.

Bank of Tokyo-Mitsubishi UFJ, part of the MUFJ group, has arranged the multibank credit for International Petroleum Investment Co (IPIC), the business

daily Nikkei reported, without citing sources.

The syndicate also involves 15 other banks, including Santander of Spain, HSBC Holdings Plc of Britain and Sumitomo Mitsui Banking Corp of Japan, the report said.

Japanese banks are hoping to increase their presence in the Middle East, the Nikkei said, adding that many Middle Eastern sov-

ern wealth funds need large loans which major US and European banks have grown cautious about providing in the global financial crisis.

IPIC will most likely use the one-year loan to acquire Canada-based Nova Chemicals Corp and to take a stake in CEPSA, Spain's number two oil company, the Nikkei report said.

## G20 Pittsburgh Summit to promote world economic recovery

WASHINGTON, 2 Aug — The G20 summit of world leaders in Pittsburgh this September should help promote the world economic recovery, said Chinese Vice Foreign Minister He Yafei recently.

During the first coordinating meeting, which kicked off on Thursday, the participating countries agreed that they should strengthen the coordination and coopera-

tion to help the summit achieve positive and pragmatic outcomes.

The Pittsburgh Summit should continue to promote all sides to strengthen the coordination of their macro economic policies and to boost the world economic recovery, said He during the two-day meeting.

He also urged the upcoming summit to implement actively the outcomes of the G20 London

Summit, to speed up the reforms of the international financial institutions, and to expand the representations of the emerging and developing countries.

China hopes the summit will pay more attention to the development issue and to boost the world economy to achieve long-term and sustained growth by promoting common development, said He.—Internet

## Turkey's export decline slows in July

ANKARA, 2 Aug — Turkey's exports in July fell 27.2 percent year-on-year to 8.8 billion US dollars, the semi-official *Anatolia* news agency reported on Saturday.

Exports increased by 9.6 percent in July compared with June, showing Turkey would be able to reach the 104-billion-US dollar export target for 2009, the agency cited a statement by Turkish State Minister Zafer Caglayan as saying.

Quoting Turkish Exporters' Assembly (TIM) chairman Mehmet Buyukeksi, the agency said July's export volume was the highest monthly figure so far in 2009 and exports to Africa and the Middle East countries saw increases and would continue to grow.—Internet

## Air China forecasts profits in first half

BEIJING, 2 Aug — Air China, the country's national flag carrier, is expecting profits in the first half of this year, an unidentified official of the company told *Xinhua* over the weekend.

The company's profits in the first half were a result of its strategy to reduce costs, said the official, who declined to be identified, without elaboration.

The official also did not give specific figures of the profits.

The company is scheduled to release its first-half report on 26 Aug.

As one of the three major airlines in China, Air China posted a loss of 9.15 billion yuan (about 1.34 billion US dollars) in 2008.

But it enjoyed a business recovering to report a net profit of 981 million yuan in the first quarter.—Internet



## Honda expands airbag recall

TORRANCE, 2 Aug — Honda Motor Co says it is expanding a safety recall of driver's airbags to include an additional 440,000 Accords, Civics and Acuras.

The Japanese automaker's US headquarters in Torrance, Calif, said on Friday the recall expansion includes certain 2001-2002 Honda Accord, 2001 Civic and 2002-2003 Acura TL driver's airbags. The recall

was originally initiated in November 2008.

Honda said the recall will require the replacement of the driver's steering-wheel-mounted airbag inflator. It said that in some vehicles, the airbag inflators can produce over-pressurization of the driver's (front) airbag inflator mechanism during airbag deployment.

If an affected inflator deploys, the increased internal pressure may cause its casing to rupture, possibly sending metal fragments through the cloth airbag cushion material and into vehicle occupants. The fragments, Honda said, could possibly cause an injury or fatality to the occupants.

## NY's LaGuardia Airport reopens following bomb scare

NEW YORK, 2 Aug—The central terminal at New York's LaGuardia Airport was evacuated for several hours on Saturday after a man with a bag

containing wires and a battery entered the airport, authorities said.

According to a CNN report, port authority said the man is in custody, and

authorities have allowed passengers back into the terminal.

Most of the airport's main terminal was closed at 5:30 am EDT (0930 GMT) and travelers were allowed to return some four hours later.

A law enforcement official close to the investigation said the man is a 32-year-old New Yorker Scott McGann.

## China to launch Shanghai-Tianjin high-speed trains

BEIJING, 2 Aug—China will launch the high-speed Electric Multiple Unit (EMU) trains on railway linking the eastern financial hub of Shanghai and northern Tianjin City, shortening the trip to nine hours, Tianjin railway authorities said on Saturday.

The EMU trains, coded D341 and D342, are expected to shorten the trip

time from the current 10.5 hours to nine hours and 14 minutes, said an official with Tianjin Train Terminal.—Xinhua

## One dead as light plane crashes in Kenya

NAIROBI, 2 Aug—One person died on Saturday when a light aircraft crashed in Nairobi's residential estate, injuring three others on board. According to eyewitnesses, the Cessna 206 light aircraft belonging to African Inland Air Service exploded into flames 20 metres near High rise residential estate, leaving three others with severe burns.

The three injured were rushed to hospital as the police secured the area to prevent the public from tampering with the scene before any investigations were done.

Josephat Kariuki, an area resident, told Xinhua that the plane developed problems while airborne, knocked down an electricity post before crashing into the flat, damaging part of the building.

Kariuki who witnessed the incident said the plane was preparing to land at the Wilson Airport, one of the busiest airports in East and Central Africa, before it crash-landed.—Xinhua

## Six dead, four missing as tropical storm Jolina leaves Philippines

MANILA, 2 Aug—At least six people were killed and four went missing as tropical storm swept across the Philippine archipelago, the country's disaster-relief agency reported on Sunday.

The six, including two 4-year-olds, drowned in the flood and land-slide triggered by the storm in northern and central Philippine villages, the National Disaster Coordinating Council said in a bulletin.—Xinhua

## Fatah decides to hold its congress on 4 Aug in Bethlehem

RAMALLAH, 2 Aug—Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas Fatah party Central Committee decided on Saturday to hold the long-awaited General Assembly on 4 August, in the West Bank city of Bethlehem for three days.

President Abbas, who is also Fatah chief, chaired a meeting of his group's central committee in Ramallah on Saturday, to prepare for holding the conven-

tion in Bethlehem on Tuesday.

At the end of the meeting, Fatah central committee decided that the number of the General Assembly members, who have the right to attend and to vote is 2,260 members, representing the Palestinian territories and the Diaspora.

Apparently, the group's congress will be held in the West Bank without the participation

of 400 Gaza Strip members, after Hamas rulers of Gaza decided not to lift the travel ban on them unless Abbas frees Hamas prisoners in West Bank.

The committee said in a statement sent to reporters that it discussed the mechanism of Gaza Fatah leaders' participation in the conference "if Hamas insists to prevent them from leaving the Gaza Strip."

## More than 500 wildfires burn in Canadian British Columbia

VANCOUVER, 2 Aug—An aggressive wildfire is ravaging near Lillooet in Canada's western British Columbia, leaving nearly 3,000 residents at evacuation alert, local media reported on Saturday.

Meanwhile, more than 500 wildfires are burning in the province, fueled by record-high temperature combined with lightning.

The fire near the southwest interior town of Lillooet is nearly tripled in size from an estimated 1,000 hectares last Monday to about 2,600 hectares on Saturday. Officials said the blaze is less than one kilometer from the town and is in danger of growing even larger given the tinder-dry conditions and thunderstorms in the forecast.

The fire is one of the most serious among hundreds of wildfires the province is suffering.

British Columbia Premier Gordon Campbell issued a rare warning on Friday, saying the wildfire risk across the province has reached a critical level due to continued hot and dry weather and urging people to refrain from entering the forest in order to avoid any risk.—Xinhua

## Three killed in Tel Aviv club shooting

JERUSALEM, 2 Aug—A shooting incident happened in a Tel Aviv club on Saturday night, causing three dead and at least 10 wounded, local media reported.

A police spokesman

told Israeli television Channel 10 that a man and a woman were killed on the spot.

A third victim died in hospital, Israeli emergency services said.

Medical care workers

said that at least ten people were wounded, six of whom seriously, local news service *Ynet* reported.

Witness said that a man dressed in black entered the club and began to shoot in every direction with a handgun, and then fled.

The incident was "criminal, rather than nationalistic," the police spokesman said.

## 10 dead in rebel attacks in Central Africa

BANGUI, 2 Aug — Members of a Ugandan rebel group have launched attacks against towns in the Central African Republic that have left at least 10 people dead in the last two weeks, humanitarian groups said on Saturday.

The attacks by the Lord's Resistance Army (LRA), launched from its rear bases in the Democratic Republic of Congo, have also forced hundreds of people to flee their villages, UN and aid group officials said.

In the worst incident, LRA rebels stormed the market of the city of Mboki on 24 July, the groups said.

Some of the shopkeepers fought back and chased the rebels into the bush, according to the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs.

Two traders and three Ugandan rebels were killed on the spot while the bodies of four other soldiers were found in the bush, the UN agency said. Six shopkeepers and an unknown number of rebels were also injured.

At least one other person has been killed since the LRA began its attacks on 15 July, said Alexis Mbolinani, coordinator of the non-governmental organisation Jupedec.

## Japan's tobacco habit runs into court challenge

YOKOHAMA, 2 Aug—One plaintiff is a cancer patient. Another is represented by his widow. The third, has emphysema and rolls into the courtroom on a wheelchair with tubes trailing out of his nose. The three Japanese are waging a minnow-vs.-whale battle against Big Tobacco in one of the world's most smoker-friendly countries. But precedent suggests they're likely to lose, and they hope their suit will at least draw attention to the dangers of smoking.

Even if they win, they're unlikely to dent the finances of Japan Tobacco Inc, a former monopoly still half-owned by the government. The three are asking for a total of 30 million yen (\$320,000) from a company with 6.8 trillion yen (\$72.8 billion) a year in sales.—*Internet*

## Hand bomb explosion kills two in Sri Lanka

COLOMBO, 2 Aug—Two people were killed by a hand bomb explosion in western Sri Lanka, the police said on Sunday.

The police at Baduraliya, about 48 km south of the capital Colombo, said the explosion occurred on Saturday night in a jungle patch in the rural part of the Western Province near Baduraliya.

Another seriously wounded woman was admitted to the hospital, the police said.

## Tourists miss isle after GPS blunder

Two Swedes expecting the golden beaches of the Italian island of Capri got a shock when tourist officials told them they were 650 km (400 miles) off course in the northern town of Carpi, after mistyping the name in their GPS.

"It's hard to understand how they managed it. I mean, Capri is an island," said Giovanni Medici, a spokesman for Carpi regional government, told *Reuters* Tuesday. "It's the first time something like this has happened."

The middle-aged couple, who were not identified, only discovered their error when they asked staff in the local tourist office how to drive to the island's famous "Blue Grotto."

"They were surprised, but not angry,"

Medici said. "They got back in the car and started driving south."

The picturesque island of Capri, famed as a romantic holiday destination, lies in the Gulf of Naples in southern Italy and has been a resort since Roman times. Carpi is a busy industrial town in the province of Emilia Romagna, at the other end of Italy.

## Ancient warrior's skeleton found near Rome

Archaeologists have found the skeleton of a warrior from up to 5,000 years ago floating in a tomb filled with sea water on a beach near Rome, Italy's art squad said.

The bones — believed to date from the 3rd millennium BC — were discovered in May as art hunters were carrying out routine checks of the region's archaeological areas, Carabinieri art squad official Raffaele Mancino said.

Archaeologists believe the warrior was likely killed by an arrow, part of which was found among his ribs, Mancino said. There was also a hole in the back of the skull, and six vases and two daggers were found buried nearby.

The tomb of the warrior, nicknamed "Nello" after the archaeologist who found him, could be part of a wider necropolis lying just a few steps from the sea, Mancino told a news conference.

"We will check the area to see whether this tomb is isolated and the warrior was buried here because this was the battlefield where he died," Mancino said. "Or maybe there is a bigger necropolis, as we indeed believe."

## Foot-long baby croc causes scare in the air

An official at Cairo airport says a foot-long baby crocodile wriggled out of a passenger's hand luggage and caused panic on a flight from the United Arab Emirates.

A crew member on the EgyptAir flight from Abu Dhabi rounded up the wayward reptile and calmed passengers. The airport security official says the animal was seized and given to the Cairo Zoo.

Transporting exotic animals in and out of the Egypt is illegal, and none of the passengers on Friday's flight claimed ownership of the baby croc.

The airport official spoke on condition of anonymity because he is not authorized to speak to the press.

## Alcohol-fueled brawl clouds Maine cod fish races

The annual Cod Fish Races in coastal Maine were disrupted when police say alcohol-fueled fighting led to a brawl involving up to 60 people, sending two to the hospital. State Police Trooper Barry Curtis said Saturday's melee in Milbridge stemmed from a dispute earlier in the afternoon over someone's driving.

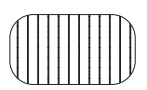

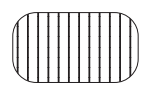

In response to my question, a farmer at a creeper patch told the *Myanma Alin*, "I am U Inn Htay . My creeper farm is 250 feet long and 80 feet wide.  
"Indeed, running a creeper farm doesn't take long, so we can harvest it in a short term. And we don't need much investment to grow creeper. So, creeper is grown on a commercial scale here."  
The lifespan of a creeper plant is short. It can be at harvest when it is 25 to 30 days old. Farmers pick creepers once every four days.  
He collected about 4500 creepers from his

farm in a season.  
Po Tha Aye Village has about 35 creeper farms. The village's vegetables surpluses go to Pyapon, Bogale and Mawlamyinegyun townships.  
There radish plantations stretched as far as we could see. According to farmers, the village produced millions of viss of radish a season.  
After observing the vegetable plantations of Po Tha Aye Village in Mawlamyinegyun Township, I was deeply impressed by the hard work and resilience the dwellers had showed to recover from the catastrophe.

## Study finds that lung cancer patients respond to erlotinib following cetuximab therapy

SAN FRANCISCO, 2 Aug—Non-small cell lung cancer patients who have progressed on a cetuximab-containing regimen may respond to erlotinib, Fox Chase Cancer Center researchers reported today at the annual meeting of the International Association for the Study of Lung Cancer.

Both cetuximab (Erbix) and erlotinib (Tarceva) inhibit the epidermal growth factor receptor (EGFR) and the assumption has been that once a patient progresses on one EGFR inhibitor

they will not respond to another EGFR inhibitor. The new data suggests that may not be the case.

“Just because a patient received and progressed on one EGFR inhibitor doesn’t necessarily mean they will not derive clinical benefit from another one,” says Hossein Borghaei, D.O., medical oncologist at Fox Chase. “And for patients who don’t have a lot of treatment options, we think this is a good thing. It gives them one more drug to try when their disease is progressing.”

To find out if patients whose disease is no longer

controlled by cetuximab can respond to erlotinib, Borghaei and colleagues examined the treatment and clinical outcomes for a subgroup of patients who had participated in a Fox Chase clinical trial that tested a combination of carboplatin, paclitaxel and cetuximab as first-line treatment for advanced non-small cell lung cancer. Out of 53 patients who had participated in that trial, the investigators identified 15 individuals who had received erlotinib during subsequent therapy.

## Man dies from plague in China, 11 others infected

BEIJING, 2 Aug — Thousands of people have been placed under quarantine in a town in northwest China after a man died of pneumonic plague and 11 others were confirmed infected with the deadly lung infection, health authorities said.

The 32-year-old herdsman died in Ziketian in Qinghai province, the provincial health bureau said in a statement posted on its Web site on Saturday. It did not say when he died. Most of the others infected are relatives of the deceased and are in stable condition in a hospital, the bureau said. The town of 10,000 people has been placed under quarantine and a team of experts has been sent to the area, it said.

## Floods leave thousands homeless in eastern India

NEW DELHI, 2 Aug—Thousands of people were rendered homeless in India’s eastern state of Bihar after a river driven by monsoon rains breached its embankment, flooding nearly 200 villages, news reports said on Sunday. An estimated 100,000 people were affected after the swollen Bagmati river inundated the northern Sitamarhi district bordering Nepal, the IANS news agency reported.

The stranded villagers were living under open skies without food and drinking water, waiting to be rescued.

Teams from the National Disaster Response Force began rescue on Sunday morning as the river breached over a 100-foot embankment in Sitamarhi a day earlier. More villages were likely to be flooded, authorities said.

At least half a dozen people were feared drowned but officials confirmed only a woman was killed. Major rivers in north Bihar, especially the Kosi, Gandak, Budhi and Bagmati are in spate following heavy rains in their catchment areas. With heavy rainfall recorded in the catchments areas in neighbouring Nepal, the water levels of these rivers have risen to dangerous levels in the last four to five days.—Internet

## American Air inspects jets after FAA audit

WASHINGTON/NEW YORK, 2 Aug—American Airlines pulled three Boeing 737 jets from service this week and is inspecting the rest of its fleet after a routine safety audit flagged unusual scratches found on some planes, a spokesman for a federal regulator said on Friday. The damage was found on the “skin” of jets above the main passenger doorway, and was caused by a bolt or piece of metal protruding from a jetway

curtain in Phoenix, Arizona, said Lynn Lunsford, a spokesman for the Federal Aviation Administration.

“American is voluntarily doing the inspections, but it’s with the full concurrence of the FAA,” Lunsford said. Scratches on the outside of jets are of concern because, left unchecked, they can weaken the metal and turn into a hole in the fuselage, Lunsford explained. “Because the skin at that part of the

aircraft is pretty thin, the tolerances for how much damage you can have there is pretty small,” he said.

The problem came to the light this week when an FAA inspector noticed an “unusual repair” in a log for one of American Airline’s jets, Lunsford said. Further review of records turned up a “handful” of similar repairs, he said, with the first one logged in February. The precise number is still under investigation, he said.

## Moderate quake hits eastern Indonesia

JAKARTA, 2 Aug — An earthquake measuring 5.5 on the Richter scale rocked eastern part of Indonesia on Sunday morning, but there was no report of damage or casualties, said the local meteorology and geophysics agency.

The quake struck at 08:07 Jakarta time (0107 GMT) with epicenter at 161 km northwest Saumlaki of Maluku Province and 10 km in depth, the agency said.—*Internet*

## Nissan unveils 'Leaf' electric car

YOKOHAMA, 2 Aug—Nissan unveiled on Sunday its first all electric car, the Leaf, vowing to open a new chapter for the troubled auto industry and take a lead over its bigger rivals in zero emission vehicles.

The mid-sized hatchback, which will go on sale in late 2010 in Japan, the United States, and Europe, represents a bold bet by

Nissan that hybrids are merely a passing fad on the road to pure electric vehicles. The Leaf, described by Nissan as "the world's first affordable, zero-emission car," can travel more than 160 kilometres (100 miles) on a single charge, at a top speed of 140 kilometres per hour, the company said.

It will "lead the way to

a zero emission future, opening a new era in the automotive industry," chief executive Carlos Ghosn said, unveiling the car at the group's new headquarters in Yokohama, southwest of Tokyo.—*Internet*

## Six mourners wounded in funeral shooting

CHICAGO, 2 Aug—A gunman opened fire on Saturday outside a gang member's funeral in Chicago, putting six people in the hospital, police said.

The shooting occurred as mourners gathered at the Gospel Truth Life Changing Ministries for a funeral service for Cornelius Robinson, 28, the *Chicago Tribune* reported.

Robinson, described as a "self-admitted" gang

member, died of natural causes last week.

Police Officer Kevin Kilmer, a spokesman for the department, said a group of people were on the sidewalk outside the church on the city's West Side. "An offender approached on foot, walked up to the intended target and shot multiple times," Kilmer said. "The offender then proceeded to fire at the crowd as he fled the scene."—*Internet*

## 2000-year-old ancient tombs discovered in C China

BEIJING, 2 Aug—More than 80 ancient tombs, which can be dated back to more than 2,000 years ago, have been discovered recently in Xiangfan city, south-central China's Hubei Province.

Up to now, nearly 1,000 tombs between West Zhou Dynasty (about 1029 BC to 771 BC) and Han Dynasty (206 BC-220 AD) have been unearthed at the site named Shengang Tombs.

The newly discovered tombs on a construction site buried low-class aristocrats and civilians during the Spring and Autumn and the Warring States Periods, covering an area of 61 mu (about 4 hectare).

The archaeologists said that it was probably a cem-

etry. Some of the tombs that were placed in the same direction, side by side, of the same size, were probably the couple's tombs. Soundbite: Wang Xianfu, vice-director of Xiangfan Archaeological Institute "The tombs' distribution is special, as part of the graves were comparatively centralized. In that way, that part could belong to a certain family of Chu Dynasty."

The discovery is believed to push forward the archeological research in Hubei Province, especially its ancient culture studies.

Hubei is home to the ancient state of Chu, a state during the Spring and Autumn and Warring States Period with its unique culture.—*Internet*

## Rain storms hit China, leaving three dead, one missing

KUNMING/WUHAN, 2 Aug—Rain storms hit southwest and central China, leaving three dead, two injured and one missing, local authorities said on Saturday.

The landslide triggered by rain storm hit Fugong County in southwest China's Yunnan Province at 5:30 am Saturday, leaving two dead, two injured and one missing, said Hu Rong, head of the county.

Rescuers had arrived at the county to search for the missing, Hu said.

Another death was caused by flood amid heavy rain from Thursday to Fri-

day in Shiyan City of central China's Hubei Province, said an official of the provincial flood control and drought relief headquarter.

More than 43,000 people had been affected by the rain which triggered flood and landslide and the direct economic loss was estimated to be 18.35 million yuan (About 2.7 million US dollars), the official said.

Nearly 1,500 people had been evacuated, the official said. Other areas in north, east, southwest and central China, including Beijing and Shanghai had also been hit by heavy rain.

## Scientists discover secrets of red wine's health benefits

LOS ANGELES, 2 Aug—Red wine's health benefits lie in resveratrol which works as an effective therapy for life-threatening inflammation, a new study has found.

The study not only explains resveratrol's one-two punch on inflammation, but also shows how it, or a derivative, can be used to treat potentially deadly inflammatory disease, such as appendicitis, peritonitis, and systemic sepsis, said a team of scientists from Scotland and Singapore.

The study was published in the August 2009 print issue of *Journal of the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology* (The FASEB Journal).

In the study, the researchers administered an inflammatory agent to

two groups of mice. One group was pretreated with resveratrol and the other group was not. The mice that were not pretreated with resveratrol experienced a strong inflammatory response, simulating disease in humans, while the group pretreated with resveratrol was protected from the inflammation.

The scientists then examined the tissues of the mice to determine exactly how resveratrol was able to protect the mice from inflammation. They found that resveratrol used a one-two punch to stop inflammation in the mice by preventing the body from creating two different molecules known to trigger inflammation, sphingosine kinase and phospholipase D.

This finding suggests that

resveratrol may be harnessable as a treatment for inflammatory diseases and may also lead to entirely new resveratrol-based drugs that are even more effective, said the researchers.

“Strong acute inflammatory diseases such as sepsis are very difficult to treat and many die every day due to lack of treatment,” said Alirio Melendez, senior lecturer on the faculty of medicine at Glasgow Biomedical Research Centre in Scotland and one of the researchers involved in the work.

## Pesticide linked to leukemia

BEIJING, 2 Aug—Patients with childhood leukemia have elevated levels of household pesticides in their urine, according to a new study by the Georgetown University Lombardi Comprehensive Cancer Center.

The researchers compared urine samples from 41 pairs each of children with ALL (acute lymphoblastic leukemia)

and their mothers with healthy children and their moms.

“We found elevated levels of common household pesticides more often in the mother-child pairs affected by cancer,” said lead researcher Offie Soldin. “We shouldn't assume that pesticides caused these cancers, but our findings support the need for more research in this area.” —Internet

## Sperm bank rejects single woman

BEIJING, 2 Aug — The Shanghai Sperm Bank has turned down several requests from single woman wanting to have a baby. The city's only sperm bank, at Renji Hospital, is always short of donated sperm, which must be provided to infertile couples according to Ministry of Health rules.

Officials said yesterday that they had received a few requests

earlier this year for sperms from single woman, who were either celibate or couldn't find a suitable partner. The centre refused all these requests, since the ministry has clear regulations on recipients of donated sperm, said Dr Li Zheng, the sperm bank's director. Giving sperm to single woman could result in social problems frustrating both the woman and such

children, he added.

In fact, delivering an extramarital baby itself violated the nation's population and family planning law and was punishable by a fine.

According to the law, only a legal couple are allowed to have children and there are detailed rules on the number of children allowed by provincial population authorities.

## Infrared cameras reveal ancient city

VENICE, 2 Aug —An ancient Italian city destroyed by Attila the Hun and now hidden underground has been

mapped for the first time via infrared photography, officials said.

Infrared aerial photography, combined with 3D reconstruction techniques, has revealed Altinum's spectacular coastal architecture, complete with bridges, walls, canals, houses and large public buildings, the Italian news agency ANSA reported on Saturday.

“Until now we only knew that Altinum was there, we didn't know

what it was like,” team leader Paolo Mozzi said.

Writing in the journal *Science*, Mozzi said the maps show the existence of a complex urban structure and how inhabitants adapted to life on a lagoon.

The maps suggest the Romans exploited the watery environment centuries before the city of Venice began to emerge on the archipelago in the middle of the lagoon,” he said.—Internet

CLEVELAND, 2 Aug — Natural redheads tend to fear the dentist more than most because of a genetic variant that makes them sensitive to pain, a Cleveland Clinic researcher said. The variant responsible for red hair stimulates a brain receptor that makes them more aware of pain, Dr

Daniel Sessler told The Plain Dealer in a story published on Saturday.

The variant also makes natural redheads more resistant to general and local anesthesia, Sessler said, noting redheads need about 20 percent more anesthesia than others.

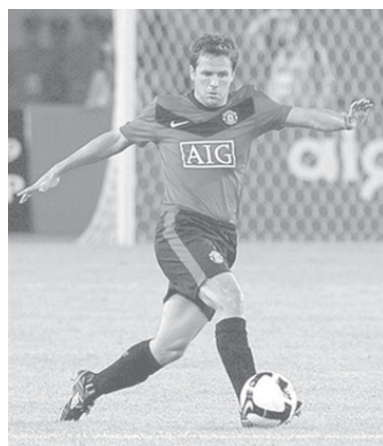

### Americans ready to buy Indian, Chinese cars

WASHINGTON, 2 Aug—Americans are ready to buy cars from India and China, a survey in the US has revealed. Results of the survey called ‘Opportunity for Chinese and Indian Brands in the USA’ shows that 15 per cent of the new car buyers in the US say they would consider purchasing their next vehicle from China, and 11 per cent would consider buying a car from India.

More than 30,000 buyers from around the country were interviewed in this survey conducted by AutoPacific. “As Hyundai and Kia have been on the American scene for decades now, it’s surprising that consideration for Chinese and Indian brands would be about as strong as it is for the Korean brands,” automotive research firm AutoPacific President and author of the study George Peterson said.

“It appears that buyers in America are willing to give Chinese and Indian vehicles a chance right out of the box. Understanding these consumers will be critically important to the success of any newcomer,” he said. “Not only are a significant number of people willing to consider Chinese and Indian brands, this group consists of highly desirable buyers who would be coveted by any manufacturer,” Peterson said.

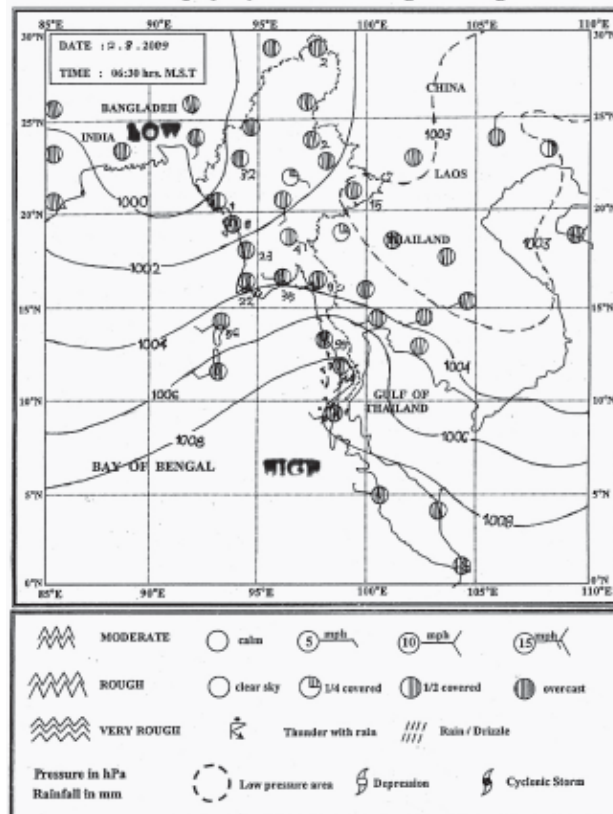

**Summary of observations recorded at 09:30 hr MST:** During the past 24 hours, weather has been partly cloudy in lower Sagaing and Magway Divisions, rain have been scattered in Mandalay and Bago Divisions, fairly widespread in Rakhine State, upper Sgaing, Ayeyarwady and Taninthayi Divisions and widespread in the remaining areas with locally heavyfall in Taninthayi Division and isolated heavyfall in Mon State. The noteworthy amounts of rainfall recorded were Thaton (5.95) inches, Lounglon (5.04) inches and Dawei (3.90) inches.

Maximum temperature on 1-8-2009 was 84°F. Minimum temperature on 2-8-2009 was 69°F. Relative humidity at (09:30) hours MST on 2-8-2009 was 96%. Total sun shine hours on 1-8-2009 was Nil.

Rainfall on 2-8-2009 was (1.26) inches at Mingaladon, (1.42) inches at Kaba-Aye and (0.95) inch at Central Yangon. Total rainfall since 1-1-2009 was (73.23) inches at Mingaladon, (81.46) inches at Kaba-Aye and (83.94) inches at Central Yangon. Maximum wind speed at Yangon (Kaba-Aye) was (4) mph from South at (15:30) hours MST on 1-8-2009.

**Bay inference:** Monsoon is strong in the Andaman Sea and Bay of Bengal.

**Forecast valid until evening of 3<sup>rd</sup> August 2009:** Rain will be isolated in Kayah State, lower Sagaing and Magway Divisions, scattered in Shan State and Mandalay Division, fairly widespread in Rakhine State and upper Sagaing Division and widespread in the remaining States and Divisions with likelihood of isolated heavyfall in Taninthayi Division. Just as news crew members of us disembarked the motorized boat and got to the bank in Bogale Township, seven miles from Mawlamyinegyun, we were impressed by thriving vast stretches of plantations of vegetables.

Along the bank just outside Po Tha Aye Village were so many large-scale patches of such vegetables as radish, creeper, bitter gourd, cucumber, roselle, and ridged gourd.

### Robotics insights through flies' eyes



Specific flight patterns are simulated by controlling optical "flux fields" presented to the fly.

SCIENCE DAILY, 2 Aug—Common and clumsy-looking, the blow fly is a true artist of flight. Suddenly changing direction, standing still in the air, spinning lightning-fast around its own axis, and making precise, pinpoint landings – all these maneuvers are simply a matter of course. Extremely quick eyesight helps to keep it from losing orientation as it races to and fro. Still, how does its tiny brain process the multiplicity of images and signals so rapidly and efficiently?

To get to the bottom of this, members of a Munich-based "excellence cluster" called Cognition for Technical Systems or CoTeSys have created an unusual research environment: a flight simulator for flies.—Internet

### Three more persons found infected with A (H1N1)

#### 13 have been infected with virus in Myanmar

NAY PYI TAW, 2 Aug—The Ministry of Health is screening those who have arrived here from abroad for new influenza A (H1N1). Three men, who arrived from Malaysia, were transferred to hospitals after they had been found to have been ill. National Health Laboratory detected them and they were found to have been infected with the A (H1N1) virus. The patients are receiving treatment at Yangon General Hospital, Insein General Hospital and Waibagi Hospital.

Seventeen family members of the patients are kept in home quarantine and under surveillance. Authorities concerned have put under surveillance all those who had arrived on the same flight with the patients in their respective places. They are 172 passengers who arrived by TG-303 Flight, 151 by MH-740 Flight and 118 by 8M-502, and 138 airport staff.

There have been 13 A (H1N1)-infected persons in Myanmar. Six have been discharged from the hospitals as they have recovered fully from their illness and the remaining seven are being given special treatment by specialists. The National Health Laboratory detected 120 flu-suspected persons and 13 were found to have been infected with the virus.—MNA
