Fire—good servant but bad master

Fires mainly break out in the dry season, so each and every person needs to be well aware of and prevent the danger of fire. Local authorities concerned are to cooperate with the people in taking fire preventive measures.

A total of 89 fires broke out in the nation in January due to negligence, electric short circuit, arsons and forest fire. Most of the fires broke out because of negligence.

The Fire Services Department is conducting a public campaign for fire prevention. It is also collaborating with development affairs committees in preventing fires at markets and high-rise buildings. Moreover, people are being informed about the danger of fire and preventive measures through media such as radio, TV, newspapers and journals. Fire prevention talks are also being given in townships, wards and villages.

The department is carrying out fire drills and door-to-door fire inspections. As authorities concerned are taking nationwide fire preventive measures extensively to reduce fire breakouts, the people on their part are to follow and respect rules and regulations.

Every one is duty-bound to take fire preventive measures. Townships, wards and villages and markets are to build a 5000-gallon brick tank each and always fill it with water without fail. Every house and building is to have fire extinguishers and equipment, water buckets and bags of sand. Fire check-points are to be set up systematically and the people need to cooperate with the fire brigade in fire preventive measures.

All cities, wards and villages will be able to thwart the danger of fire only when they use fire carefully and systematically by taking measures such as putting out fire remnants and mosquito coils when going to bed and avoiding the use of plastic containers in filling petrol in the hot, dry season.

Three US soldiers killed in S Afghanistan

KABUL, 14 Feb — Three American soldiers with the NATO-led International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) were killed in a roadside bomb in south of Afghanistan on Saturday, a Press release issued by the alliance said.

“Three ISAF service members from the United States died following an IED (Improvised Explosive Device) strike in southern Afghanistan today,” the press release said. However, it did not give more details.

A suicide bomber riding a motorbike, according to a local official Captain Abdul Rahman, targeted a joint patrol of Afghan and NATO soldiers in Taliban birthplace Kandahar this morning inflicting casualties on US troops and civilians.

Today’s attack occurred in the wake of Afghan and US-led NATO forces launched a major operation against Taliban militants in the neighbouring Helmand Province on Friday night which has left five insurgents dead so far.—Xinhua

Egypt to manufacture first fighter, drone plane

CAIRO, 14 Feb — Egypt is set to produce its first fighter and drone “in cooperation with a foreign side”, official MENA news agency reported on Saturday.

“Talks and negotiations are underway about a project to produce Egypt’s first fighter and drone plane,” MENA quoted Lt General Hamdy Waheba, Chairman of Arab Organization for Industrialization (AOI), Egypt’s state-owned company specialized in producing civilian goods as well as military products.

The official did not name the foreign party which will take a hand at the process.

“Local production of the aircraft will meet the demand of the Egyptian

Armed Forces, as it will be sold at a very competitive price,” Waheba added.

The AOI was established in 1975 with the aim of building an advanced technology industrial base.

27 Taliban militants killed as massive operation going on in S Afghanistan

LASHKAR GAH, 14 Feb — As the joint NATO-Afghan military operation entered its third day in Taliban bastion Marja district of Helmand province in south Afghanistan, over two dozen Taliban insurgents have been killed so far, commander of Afghan 205th Corps in the region said on Sunday. “During the cleanup operation until now, 27 insurgents were killed and 11 others detained by joint forces,” Shir Mohammad Zazi told a press conference here in Lashkar Gah capital of Helmand province.

There has been a little resistance but the operation will go ahead until the security is ensured in the area, he said, adding “a women caught in cross fire and was injured.”

Marja, a town with a population of 80,000, is a Taliban stronghold in Helmand while military analysts are of the view that over 1,000 insurgents including some 100 foreign fighters might be hiding in the town.

He also added that two international troopers had been killed in operation dubbed as “Mushtarak” or together in both Dari and

Pashto languages spoken in Afghanistan.

Speaking at a press conference, Helmand’s provincial governor Gulab Mangal said that the troops found and defused over 2,500 kg of explosive device which has been planted by militants in Marja’s bazaar and roads to target the security forces.

The operation Mushtarak, launched on late Friday night with the involvement of nearly 15,000 Afghan, NATO and US Marines, aims to pave the way for reestablishing government control in the area. —Xinhua

Woman, 60, in serious condition after shark bite

BRISBANE, 14 Feb — A 60-year-old woman is in serious condition after being bitten by a shark off northeastern Australia and losing several pints (liters) of blood.

A spokeswoman for the Department of Community Services says the woman has severe lacerations to her buttocks from the Saturday afternoon attack.

She was being transported by dive boat from Dent Island in the Whitsunday Islands of Queensland state to the Australia mainland where she will be airlifted to a hospital, the spokeswoman said on condition of anonymity because she was not authorized to talk to the media.

No other information was immediately available.

It is the second shark attack in Australia this week. On Thursday, a man was bitten in the leg at a Sydney beach and was treated for minor injuries.—Internet

At least 20 killed by electrocution in Nigeria

PORT HARCOURT, 14 Feb — At least 20 bus passengers were killed in Nigeria on Saturday when a cable fell onto the bus and electrocuted people inside, police said.

Police confirmed 20 deaths, but spokeswoman Rita Abbey said the toll could climb further.

An Associated Press cameraman saw more than 10 bodies, some charred beyond recognition, at a local hospital in the provincial capital of Port Harcourt. Another 10 people were seen being treated for gashes and burns.

Most of the dead had been passengers aboard the bus, though some had been passing nearby when the cable came tumbling down during heavy rains that have pummeled southern Nigeria.—Internet

Deficit forces LA schools to cut school days

LOS ANGELES, 14 Feb — Due to an estimated 640-million-dollar deficit, six school days will be cut off from the school year in Los Angeles, it was reported on Saturday.

The move, proposed by Los Angeles schools Supt. Ramon C. Cortines, was designed to avoid the need for widespread layoffs in the nation’s second-largest school system, according to the *Los Angeles Times*. Cortines said the move would save the district 90 million dollars and could spare up to 5,000 jobs.

The alternative to this drastic action, he said, would be to let the district go bankrupt. “Do I think (this) is good edu-

cation policy? No,” he said. “But we are in a real crisis.” Cortines has repeatedly said that he did not want to shorten the school year. This is the first time in recent history that a Los Angeles school superintendent has made such a suggestion.

Five of the affected days would be classroom days and the sixth would be a noninstructional day, according to the report.

Union leaders would have to agree to the move. Nonunion employees, including senior district staff, have been ordered to take four furlough days by May, and Cortines criticized groups that have not been willing to make concessions, said the paper.

Blast kills three in S Pakistan

ISLAMABAD, 14 Feb — At least three persons were killed and 15 others were injured as a powerful blast occurred in a rickshaw in south Pakistan on Sunday morning, local TV channels reported.

The blast shattered the windowpanes of closely located shops and buildings on New Chowke area in Dadu, a town of Sindh province, the private Geo news reported. The residents of the areas caught a suspected person from the blast site and handed him over to police, eyewitnesses said.

Senegal's cattle sidelined for imported powder milk

DAKAR, 14 Feb—Senegal has three million cattle, but it is imported European powdered milk that is found at the breakfast table, in coffee or local yoghurt as poor infrastructure keeps fresh milk from consumers.

In a Dakar suburb, "milk powder with vegetable fat content" from France is poured into large tanks and mixed with filtered water at the Jaboot factory to make local favourites like curdled milk and yoghurt and

cereal mix, or "thiakri."

Reducing dependence on imported foodstuffs is a challenge on the continent, and new African Union leader, Malawi President Bingu wa Mutharika has prioritised food security to ensure "Africa is able to feed Africa."

In five years, Senegal has more than doubled its bill for imported milk from 25 billion CFA Francs (38 million euros, 52 million dollars) in 2002 to 58 billion in 2007, said Djiby Dia, researcher with the Senegalese Institute of Agricultural Research.

Salmonella concerns prompt pet food recall

LINCOLN, 14 Feb—Nature's Variety of Lincoln, Neb said it has voluntarily recalled certain pet food products amid concerns the items may contain Salmonella.

The company said in a release Thursday the recall is for Chicken Formula Raw Frozen Diet products for dogs and cats. The products either contain chicken medallions, patties or chubs, and each features a "Best If Used By" date of 10 Nov.

The recalled products may be returned for full refund or replacement to local retailers, the company said.

A consumer complaint alerted Nature's Variety to the possibility of Salmonella contamination in the named products, but no people or pets have been reported sickened by the products.—*Internet*

Unsafe conditions prompt 4.9 million pound meat recall

CHICAGO, 14 Feb—Unsafe conditions have prompted a California meat company to recall another 4.9 million lbs of beef and veal, expanding its previous recall to nearly 5.8 million lbs, the Agriculture Department said on Saturday.

No illnesses have been linked to the meat, produced as early as January 2009, but US Department of Agriculture said the expanded recall was in connection with a criminal investigation.

Huntington Meat Packing Inc of Montebello, California, initially recalled 864,000 lbs of beef on 18 January due to suspected E coli contamination. The recall was expanded because the beef and veal were not produced in accordance with the company's food safety plan, US Department of Agriculture said.—*Internet*

Yanukovich says to form gas consortium with Russia, EU

Moscow, 14 Feb—Ukraine will seek to establish a gas consortium with Russia and the European Union, Viktor Yanukovich, who won the country's presidential polls, told a Russian TV on Saturday. Yanukovich, who beat incumbent Ukrainian Prime Minister Yulia Tymoshenko last Sunday in the run-off by a narrow margin, told the state TV channel Russia-24 that gas relations with

Russia did not move in the right direction during the last five years.

He hoped that the Ukraine-Russia relationship would be restored to a friendly strategic one and Ukraine would properly handle its gas relations with Russia and the EU.

Ukraine, along with Russia, should become major gas suppliers of EU countries, said Yanukovich. Ukraine and EU countries are consum-

ers of Russian gas.

A gas consortium will help update Ukraine's gas pipeline network, while the EU will get energy security guarantees, he said.

Russia and the EU, which gets a quarter of its gas supplies from Russia, have begun to build new pipelines to reduce gas transit through Ukraine due to repeated gas disputes between the two former Soviet neighbours in recent years.—*Xinhua*

Profits in China's non-ferrous metal sector fall in 2009 despite rising output

BEIJING, 14 Feb—Profits in China's non-ferrous metal industry declined in 2009 despite rising output due to low prices, according to statistics from the Ministry of Industry and

Information Technology (MIIT). Output of 10 kinds of non-ferrous metals, including copper, alumina, zinc and lead, increased 5.8 percent in the country from a year earlier to 26.81 million tonnes last year.

However, combined profit of 70 major enterprises in the sector totaled 17.6 billion yuan (2.58 billion US dollars), down 1.46 percent year on year, the MIIT said. Although the industry maintained a good development momentum in 2009, many challenges remained, including the problems of excess capacity and outdated production capacity.—*Xinhua*

Air Arabia announces \$123 m 2009 net profit

SHARJAH, 14 Feb—Sharjah-based Air Arabia posted a net profit of 452 million dirhams (123.1 million dollars) for 2009, the company said on Saturday.

The Emirati airline served 4.1 million passengers in 2009, up 14.2 percent from 3.6 million in 2008, a statement on the company's website said.

The company's turnover for all of 2009 was two billion dirhams (544 million dollars), down 4.5 percent from the company's 2.066-billion-dirham (562-million-dollar) turnover in 2008, it said.

"The previous 12 months represented one of the most challenging periods in the history of the global aviation sector," the company's chairman Sheikh Abdullah bin Mohammed al-Thani said in the statement.

"During that time of great instability, Air Arabia nevertheless continued to chart a path to profitability," he said.—*Internet*

Business area in NY's Queens Borough catches big fire

NEW YORK, 14 Feb—A bustling business area in Queens Borough of New York City caught a big fire Saturday, when the city is bracing for Valentine's Day.

No one was injured, according to fire department officer.

The fire began at 10 am in a row of stores on 37th Avenue and the affected businesses include a furniture store, a frame

shop, an art supply store, a packaging store, a liquor store, a grocery store and a beauty supply store.

Maria Lalita, the owner of a grocery store, told *Xinhua* that she was bringing flowers and toys to the outside when she noticed the fire. She yelled and dragged her husband out of the basement to safety.

"All is gone," she said, with tears in her

eyes.

Firemen, numbered at dozens, are still struggling to control the fire, which is still burning when the story is filed. One helicopter was hovering above the affected area and left afterwards.

Huge clouds of smoke can be seen from kilometres away.

The cause of the fire is still unknown.

European missile defence system must be conceived together with Russia

BUCHAREST, 14 Feb—The issue of missile defence system must be discussed primarily at European level and the deal must not draw anger from Russia, visiting French

Deputy Foreign Minister Pierre Lellouche said here on Friday.

"I would like to primarily see Europe interested in and debating this issue at its level," said the offi-

cial at a press conference, stressing that "a defensive system against proliferating countries is not meant to affect our Russian neighbour. On the contrary, a shield must be conceived together with Russia and I would like to see us working together in this problem."

Romanian President Traian Basescu announced on 4 February that Romania decided to participate in the development of the United States' missile defence system and host components on its territory, adding that the system would be operational by 2015.

Two Yemeni soldiers killed in the south

SANAA, 14 Feb—Two Yemeni soldiers were killed and four others wounded in an ambush southeast of the country on Saturday, security officials said.

The incident occurred in Yemen's southeast province of Shabwa when gunmen ambushed an army patrol, officials said.

"This kind of unrest was not related to the separatist Southern Movement, but rather it's a sort of attacks that al-Qaeda always stands behind, said an official of the Interior Ministry, who asked not to be identified because he is not authorized to speak to media.

The official confirmed two Yemeni army soldiers had been killed in the ambush.

Meantime, death toll from the clashes between security forces and demonstrators that took place Saturday during a protest in southern Yemeni province of Lahij rose to two, according to witnesses and local sources.

Singaporeans must remain vigilant in 2010

SINGAPORE, 14 Feb—Singapore's Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong on Saturday urged Singaporeans to remain vigilant in the year of the tiger.

"We must remain vigilant in the year of the tiger. The tiger is a force of nature, and this year holds some risks and uncertainties," Lee said in his Chinese new year message.

The year of the ox began on a challenging note as Singapore faced the worst economic crisis

since its Independence, he said, adding that in the first quarter of 2009, the city state's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) fell 10 per cent, but its economy pulled back up so that for the whole year GDP only declined 2.1 per cent.

Lee praised Singaporeans for facing the difficulties with resolution and fortitude.

"We were apprehensive, but did not panic. Instead, we calmly made a collective effort to find

practical solutions, to keep companies viable and get workers properly skilled to hold on to jobs. Because we responded as one people, we prevailed, Lee said. However, he warned that although economies have largely stabilized, there may still be surprises and close calls. For example, property values in Dubai have fallen sharply. Greece is in severe financial distress, and Spain and Portugal are under pressure too.—*Xinhua*

Nine killed, 45 injured in major bomb attack in India

NEW DELHI, 14 Feb—At least nine people, four of them female foreigners, were killed when a powerful bomb exploded in a terrorist attack on a restaurant popular with tourists in the western Indian city of Pune on Saturday evening, police said.

This is the first major

terror attack in India since the November 2008 Mumbai attacks, said officials.

Meanwhile, more than 45 people were rushed to hospital with varying degrees of injury in the attack caused by a home-made improvised explosive device, said Indian security officials.

The blast took place at 19:15 pm local time when the restaurant was full of people, many of them foreigners.

Indian Home Secretary G K Pillai told local media there was an unattended packet which exploded when a waiter tried to open it.

20 million children in Bangladesh to be vaccinated against measles

DHAKA, 14 Feb — More than 20 million children will be vaccinated against measles during a two-week measles campaign across Bangladesh, starting Sunday and ending on 28 February.

All children aged nine months to less than five years will be given measles vaccines, while all children aged 0 to five years will be given two drops of polio vaccines, leading English newspaper *The Daily Star* reported on Sunday.

More than 50,000 health staff, 600,000 volunteers and NGO workers have been mobilized in order to carry out the campaign. They will work in 120,000 vaccination sites.

To cover all the 20 million children through this fortnightly campaign, 23 million doses of measles vaccines, 29 million doses of polio vaccines, 23 million auto-disabled syringes, 2.3 million reconstitution syringes and 150,000 safety boxes have already been procured and distributed.

The show featured multiple world and North American introductions, including a complete range of domestic and imported passenger cars, trucks, sport-utility vehicles, minivans, and experimental and concept cars.—Xinhua

Cyclone misses American Samoa, turns toward Tonga

PAGO PAGO, 14 Feb — A powerful tropical storm missed American Samoa early Saturday morning, causing heavy rains and high winds but sparing more devastation to the US territory battered by a deadly autumn tsunami.

Tropical Cyclone Rene was about 110 miles south of Pago Pago and moving southwest on a track that will take it into central and southern Tonga, said cyclone forecaster Alipate Waqaicelua of the Nadi Tropical Cyclone Center in Fiji. The storm center was about 485 miles northeast of the island chain.

Strong winds from the

storm were still expected to batter American Samoa, which prompted forecasters to replace the hurricane warning with a gale warning that predicted winds of 30 to 45 mph, said meteorologist Mase Akapo Jr with the National Weather Service in Pago Pago.

"The public still needs to continue to take precautionary measures due to the strong winds," Akapo said, adding that the high surf will continue, with waves of 15 to 18 feet expected through Saturday evening.

"We are still faced with high waves," he said.

Rare white jackdaw in Ukraine spurned by flock

In a story that could have come straight out of Aesop's Fables, a rare white jackdaw in eastern Ukraine has been spurned by its flock.

The albino bird, called Katya, was spotted by Lutsk resident Alexander Moiseyenko, who tosses her scraps of bread from his apartment window.

"She flies together with other jackdaws, but stays apart. The black jackdaws usually steal the food and fly away," Moiseyenko said. Ornithologists say there have been only 15 confirmed sightings of white jackdaws in the world over the past three decades. And this is the first time that one has been seen in Ukraine.

"There is a certain set of genes that leads to albinism," said Mikhail Khimin, an ornithologist and conservationist in the Volyn regional government. "These kinds of birds are a result of degeneration and gene mutation." Katya's plight bears shades of Aesop's tale about the envious jackdaw that painted himself white to fit in with the well-fed farmyard pigeons. As soon as the deception was exposed, he was chased away, but then shunned by his fellow jackdaws, who no longer recognized the bird as one of their own.

Man fined \$50 for sniffing bakery cakes

A Canadian man in Regina, Saskatchewan was fined \$50 Friday for sniffing and touching cakes in a supermarket bakery department.

Alexander Rodrigue, 23, was also ordered to make restitution for the cakes and stay away from the supermarket for four months, the *Regina Leader-Post* reported.

He had previously pleaded guilty to a mischief charge relating to the June 15 incident in which staff claimed he had been licking the cakes, the newspaper said.

However, at his sentencing, Rodrigue told the judge he had not licked the cakes, but admitted to sniffing and touching them, but did not explain why.

If he pays the fine, the offense won't be recorded as a conviction, the report said.

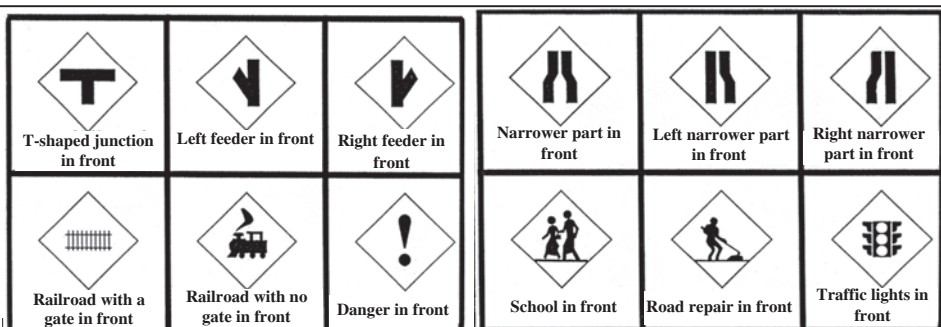

The speed limit of 120 kmh is designated for first-class ASEAN highways, each of which comprises the central line between the two lanes, along with traffic diversion systems. The speed limits for urban areas are as follows:-

First-class highways	80-100 kmh
Class (1) highway	60-80 kmh
Class (2) highway	50-60 kmh
Class (3) highway	40-50 kmh

That is according to the special limits on road/bridge designs and construction in Appendix (11) of Greater Mekong Sub-Region Treaty.

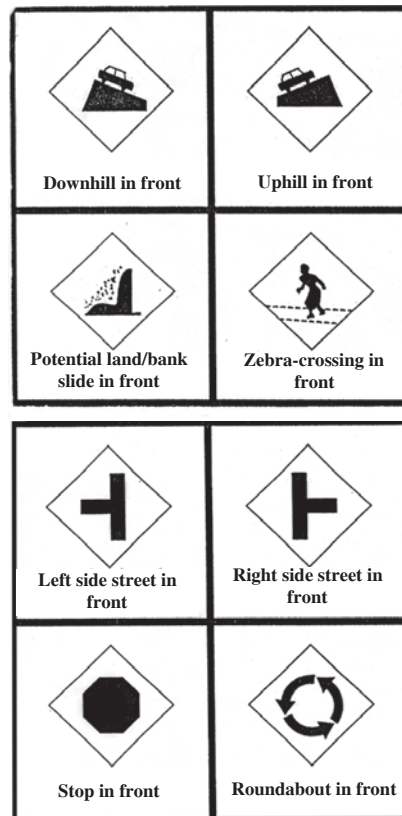

ROME, 14 Feb — Police in Italy have made a major seizure of counterfeit goods. The haul included clothes and leather goods, which officers say are of amazing quality.

The fake goods were discovered in eight industrial hangars east of Rome.

They included clothes, shoes, leather goods and other accessories.

Police say they could

have come from Asia. Italy has had a series of counterfeit scams in recent years.

It is believed that the items would have been given Italian designer labels and sold in markets and on the streets of Italy's cities, where fake handbags, wallets and belts can be seen around tourist attractions.

It is the latest in a massive haul of counterfeit goods in recent years. Italy's national retailers association say around 6.9bn euros (£6bn) of fake products are sold each year.

Train fire shuts down NE Corridor line

MORRISVILLE, 14 Feb — A fire on a train carrying passengers from Atlantic City, NJ, to New York shut down the busy Northeast Corridor rail line for two hours north of Philadelphia. The ACES train is a special service operated by New Jersey Transit under contract to a group of Atlantic City casinos. It was running behind schedule when the fire was reported in the engine at about 5:45 pm EST, *The Philadelphia Inquirer* reported.

The fire in the engine damaged the overhead electrical line in Morrisville, Pa, across the Delaware River from

Trenton, NJ and about 30 miles from Philadelphia, officials said. Penny Bassett Hackett, a spokeswoman for New Jersey Transit, said 62 passengers and the four members of the train crew were evacuated. Three people were taken to a hospital.

An Amtrak spokeswoman, Karin Romero said the line was completely closed for just over two hours.

Two of the four tracks reopened at 7:55 pm. Amtrak owns the rail line, which is also used by local trains from Trenton, NJ, to Philadelphia and the ACES service.

Spectators hurt by waves at US surfing contest

MAVERICKS BEACH, 14 Feb — Thirteen spectators at a leading surfing contest in California have been hurt, some seriously, after big waves hit the seawall they were standing on. Two 6m (20ft) walls of water crashed into the breakwater at Mavericks Beach, destroying scaffolding and sweeping dozens of people onto the rocks below. The most serious injuries involved broken bones, emergency personnel said.

After the incident, one stretch of the

beach was evacuated and the main viewing area was closed to newcomers. Hundreds of people nevertheless remained to watch South African Chris Bertish win the \$50,000 (£32,000) first prize. The Mavericks Surf Contest is the most lucrative big-wave contest in the world, but is only held when conditions are ideal, such as on Saturday. Some of the waves were reportedly 12m (40ft) high.

Study urges start obesity prevention in the cradle

WASHINGTON, 14 Feb — A team of US doctors has urged that obesity screening start in the cradle after a study they conducted showed that half of US children with weight problems became overweight

before age two.

The "critical period for preventing childhood obesity" in the children observed in the study would have been in "the first two years of life and for many by three months of age," said the study, published in *Clinical Pediatrics*.

"Unfortunately, the chubby healthy baby myth is alive and well despite the high prevalence of childhood obesity, with only 20 percent to 50 percent of overweight children being diagnosed and even fewer receiving documented or effective treatments," the authors of the study said.

For the study, which was conducted to try to pinpoint the "tipping point" for when a child first became overweight, researchers looked at 480 medical records for patients between the ages of two and 20 at a private medical practice and a teaching hospital, both in Virginia.—Internet



Truck recall adds to Toyota's troubles

TOKYO, 14 Feb — Toyota was facing more unwanted publicity Saturday after the world's

biggest automaker said it was voluntarily calling in about 10,000 pickups in North America, the latest in a series of recalls.

The Japanese giant has recalled millions of vehicles worldwide in past months due to problems linked to accelerator and brake functions, sullying the company's safety reputation.

The latest vehicle cast into the spotlight is the 2010 model of Tacoma four-wheel drive pickups in the North American market, including 8,000 in the United States and 1,500 in Canada.

The voluntary recall was to inspect their front drive shafts, which may

include a component that contains cracks that developed during the manufacturing process, the company said.

Earlier global Toyota recalls covered models with "sticky accelerators" that can cause cars to race out of control, a defect cited in several deadly crashes, and later widened to brake system problems in the Prius and other hybrid models.

On Friday a US woman filed a federal lawsuit in Los Angeles against Toyota, blaming the company for the death of her husband when the Prius she was driving suddenly accelerated.

Four sea lions, one seal shot near Seattle

SEATTLE, 14 Feb — A harbour seal and at least four sea lions, including one listed as endangered, were shot to death near Seattle, authorities said on Friday. One was a Steller sea lion protected by the federal Endangered Species Act. The others were smaller, more common California sea lions listed under the Marine Mammals Protection Act.

National Marine Fisheries Service spokesman Brian Gorman said an investigation was under way because it's illegal in most cases to shoot any kind of sea lion or seal. Shooting these mammals can result in fines of up to \$50,000, he said.

Wildlife photographer Robin Lindsey

said she was shocked at the sight of the dead male Steller sea lion that appeared to be 8 to 10 years old and weigh about 1,200 pounds. "It's really heartbreaking to think anybody would shoot a creature because they're out there trying to survive," said Lindsey, who also volunteers with a group called Seal Sitters. "I hope to God it's not a trend."

Seal Sitters gets calls from federal officials when a seal or sea lion death is reported. Lindsey is often asked to check out the animal and take photographs. West Seattle residents have reported at least one other sea lion carcass was floating in Puget Sound, Gorman said.

CAPE CANAVERAL, 14 Feb — US astronauts aboard the International Space Station say they're putting the finishing touches to a module that offers a 360-degree view of space.

"We will have the most spectacular view of the Earth anyone's ever had from the inside of the station," astronaut Steve Robinson said of the module Tranquility.

The \$400 million Tranquility and its Italian-built cupola — a domed-shaped annex with seven windows — is the last major US addition to the station, which is now 98 percent complete.

NAIROBI, 14 Feb — Helping the world's smallest farms stay abreast of climate change and competition is key to feeding the planet's growing population, scientists in Kenya said.

Small farmers are neglected by agricultural aid policies, yet collectively they feed most of the world's 1 billion low-income people, said the Kenyan-based International Livestock Research Institute.

Small farmers need help in understanding and coping with climate change, which will alter growing conditions, institute officials said in a recent issue of Science. They also need help in dealing with finite natural resources, including water, arable land and fossil fuels needed to produce fuel and fertilizer.—Internet

Homeless Haiti quake victims get tarps, want tents

PORT-AU-PRINCE, 14 Feb—Ask any of the hundreds of thousands of earthquake victims living outdoors in Haiti's shattered capital and you're apt to get the same plea: "Give us a tent."

Few will get one. Aid agencies and Haitian officials have given up plans to shelter the homeless in tents, even if that means many will likely face hurricane season camped out under flapping sheets of plastic. Tents are too big, too costly and too inefficient, aid groups say. So Haitians must swelter under flimsy tarps until fixed shelters can be built — though no one believes nearly enough can be will be up in time for spring storms.

"A tent would give us more space. There are too many people in here," said Marie-Mona Destiron, sweating under the hot blue light of her family's donated plastic tarp. When it rains, she said, water slides through the gaps and turns the dirt floor to mud.

Destiron, 45, got her tarp from US soldiers with the 82nd Airborne Division. Her husband, Joselin Edouard, tied it to a thin mahogany tree on a dusty slope below the country club that the soldiers use as a forward-operating base. It is home to them and their six children.

Lack of sleep increases disease risk

BOSTON, 14 Feb — If people usually wake up groggy and grumpy, they're probably not getting enough sleep and increasing their risk of disease, a US report says.

A newly updated report from Harvard Medical School, "Improving Sleep: A guide to a good night's rest," explains how lack of sleep does more than make a person bleary — it can put a person at risk for heart disease, diabetes, obesity and other health problems.

For some people, late-night TV watching or Web surfing is to blame, but for many others, the culprit is insomnia or sleep apnea, a condition in which the airway closes and breathing stops or becomes shallower hundreds of times each night. "Sleep apnea can also wreak havoc on the cardiovascular system, because the heart must work harder every time the brain sends out a 'wake up and breathe' signal," the report said.

"People with sleep apnea are prone to high blood pressure, heart failure and stroke. Although more than half of the estimated 18 million American who have sleep apnea are overweight, many are not. By age 65, about one in 10 people has sleep apnea."—Internet

MEXICO CITY, 14 Feb — German automaker Volkswagen said it was recalling some 20,000 cars in Mexico, a day after it announced the recall of nearly 200,000 cars in Brazil over potential wheel malfunctions.

The company said the recall in Mexico had been ordered over the "possibility that the rear wheel bearings could be insufficiently lubricated, causing them to make noise."

"If the situation is not addressed, it could cause the wheel bearings to lock," the company said in a statement released by its Puebla factory.

The company said it was recalling "approximately 20,000 cars," all of them Gol and Gol Sedan models, the statement said.

A day earlier, the company said it was recalling nearly 200,000 of its Novo Gol and Voyage model cars in Brazil over the same issue.—Internet

Beer may help prevent osteoporosis

DAVIS, 14 Feb—Researchers at the University of California, Davis, said beer may help prevent osteoporosis — the loss of bone density that can result in fractures.

Lead author Charles Bamforth says the study suggests that beer is a significant source of dietary silicon, a key ingredient for increasing bone mineral density.

Bamforth and colleagues studied commercial beer production to determine the relationship between beer production methods and the resulting silicon content.

Silicon is present in beer in the soluble form of orthosilicic acid, which yields 50 percent bioavailability, making beer a major contributor to silicon intake in the Western diet.—*Internet*

Hair sample reveals picture of ancient man

COPENHAGEN, 14 Feb—Scientists from the University of Denmark say they've reconstructed the first detailed genome of an ancient human by analyzing a tuft of hair.

The hair was found in Greenland in the 1980s and its owners nicknamed "Inuk," meaning "man" in Greenlandic.

"Inuk's receding hairline, brown eyes, dark skin and shovel-shaped front teeth are all dictated by his 4,000-year-old genetic coding," said Nuka Godfredtsen, who used the genome results as a blueprint to put together a picture of how Inuk might have looked.

The genome results indicate Inuk's ancestors crossed into Greenland from northeastern Siberia between 4,400 and 6,400 years ago, The Copenhagen Post reported on Friday.

Drug halts tumour growth in mice

SAN DIEGO, 14 Feb—Scientists in California say they've developed a drug that stops the growth of kidney and pancreatic tumors in mice.

The drug binds to a molecular "switch" found in cancer cells to keep it in the "off position," researchers at the University of California, San Diego, said in a recent issue of the

Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences. The drug halts a growth signaling enzyme, known as kinase, which can foster growth in tumors and cancer-associated blood vessels, said David Cheresh, a pathologist who led the research for the university's Moores Cancer Centre.

The research combi-

ned chemistry with supercomputer technology to allow for rapid screening and development of drugs that selectively target tumors, Cheresh said.

The novel approach, which custom designs molecules, could be a useful strategy in developing future cancer drugs, Cheresh said.

Toy makers' crystal ball: High-tech on the cheap

NEW YORK, 14 Feb — If the Zhu Zhu Pets taught a lesson, it's that a bit of technology and a low price tag can go a long way. Toy makers are taking that experience to heart.

From a digital Scrabble game that checks the words to a hovering UFO to miniature radio-control cars, toy makers are amping up the tech quotient but not prices.

Zhu Zhu Pets, the furry mechanical hamsters that zoom around, were the runaway hit of the holiday season. One key to their success: a price tag under

\$10. The American International Toy Fair begins Sunday. This is the annual event where toy makers show off new offerings that will make their way into next year's stockings. Previews from toymakers and interviews with analysts make clear that the focus is on innovation and price. Few toys will retail for more than \$100, and most will be priced below \$30.

"There's still going to be some hesitancy to raise prices too much," said Needham & Co analyst Sean McGowan. "Last year the feeling was under \$30

Report blames Eurostar for not winterizing trains

LONDON, 14 Feb—A review concluded Friday that Eurostar must do more to protect electronic gear on its high-speed trains from melting snow to avoid debacles like one that stranded five trains in the undersea tunnel between France and Britain.

The review said fil-

ters apparently failed to prevent moisture from causing short circuits in the December incidents and needed to be improved. It also said the company had to improve communication during emergencies in the tunnel.

Eurostar said it planned to spend euro 30 mil-

lion (\$41 million) to deal with the issues, including euro12 million already earmarked for new communications systems in the tunnel.

"Our duty now is to ensure that we quickly regain the trust of our customers," said Eurostar Chief Executive Richard Brown.—*Internet*

Chocolate may lower stroke risk

HAMILTON, 14 Feb — Eating chocolate may lower your risk of having a stroke, but more research is needed, Canadian researchers found.

Study author Sarah Sahib of McMaster University in Hamilton and colleagues examined three studies involving stroke and chocolate.

One study involved 44,489 people who ate one serving of chocolate per week were 22 percent less likely to have a stroke than people who ate no chocolate. A second study found that 1,169 people who ate 50 grams of chocolate — about 5 ounces — once a week were 46 percent less likely to die following a stroke than people who did not eat chocolate.—*Internet*

Obese mom-to-be may risk preterm birth

BOSTON, 14 Feb — US researchers say pre-pregnancy obesity and gestational weight gain increase preterm birth risk in African-American women.

The researchers at Boston University looked at mothers of 1,000 babies born at less than 37 weeks and mothers of more than 7,000 full-term infants. All mothers were part of the Black Women's Health Study.

Scientists find way to stop cell migration

ADELAIDE, 14 Feb — Australian medical researchers say they've found a new way to block the movement of cells that can spread cancer and produce autoimmune diseases. The University of Adelaide researchers led by Professor Shaun McColl said they have identified molecular "receptors" on the surface of cells that are involved in helping a cell migrate to sites where it can cause disease.

"Our research shows that these receptors ... can be blocked pharmacologically, preventing the cell migration which causes the disease," said McColl, who added his team has identified a number of such receptors in multiple sclerosis and have developed potential therapeutic drugs that could control the disease, and other autoimmune diseases.—Internet

The study, published in the journal *Epidemiology*, found weight gain within the range of Institute of Medicine recommendations — between 0.4 to 0.6 pounds per week in the second and third trimesters — was optimal in reducing the risk of having a baby born at less

than 37 weeks.

"Our data suggest that it is especially important for obese women to adhere to the Institute of Medicine guidelines for pregnancy weight gain to reduce their risk of preterm birth," study lead author Lauren Wise said in a statement.—Internet

Self-cannibalizing cancer cells studied

PRINCETON, 14 Feb — US cancer researchers say they have started a major study to determine the role of self-cannibalizing cancer cells found in tumours.

The scientists from Princeton University and The Cancer Institute of New Jersey said such cells become dormant and self-cannibalize to apparently survive periods of stress. The researchers said their work might help produce new cancer therapies to stem changes that render cancer cells dangerous and resistant to treatment.

"We want to know: What role is this self-cannibalization playing in the middle of a tumour?" said Princeton Assistant Professor Hilary Collier. "To treat cancer, it may be that you want to get rid of this ability in tumor cells, so we're searching for inducers and inhibitors of this process."

Rhubarb shows promise in fighting cancer

SHEFFIELD, 14 Feb — Rhubarb, especially when cooked, shows potential for killing or preventing cancer cells, researchers at Britain's Sheffield Hallam University said.

As with many red vegetables, rhubarb contains cancer-fighting polyphenols, The Daily Telegraph reported Saturday.

Baking rhubarb for 20 minutes, as is done with some recipes, increases

the concentration of polyphenols, Nikki Jordan-Mahy, a Sheffield biomedical researcher, wrote in a recent issue of the journal *Food Chemistry*.

Oriental medicinal rhubarb has been used in traditional Chinese medicine for thousands of years. Now, Jordan-Mahy said, garden rhubarb grown in Britain has shown medicinal promise, especially a va-

riety grown in South Yorkshire.

Jordan-Mahy's team is studying a combination of rhubarb polyphenols and chemotherapy agents needed to kill leukemia cells.

"Cancer affects one in three individuals in (Britain) so it's very important to discover novel, less toxic, treatments, which can overcome resistance," she said.

Smoking, low IQ top cardio risk factors

GLASGOW, 14 Feb — Researchers in Scotland say lower intelligence was second only to smoking as a predictor of cardiovascular disease.

The study, published in the *European Journal of Cardiovascular Prevention and Rehabilitation*, quantified the associations of cardiovascular disease and nine risk factors, including cognitive ability assessed using a standard test of general intelligence.

The researchers found the Top 5 risk factors predicting cardiovascular death were smoking, low IQ, low income, high systolic blood pressure and low physical activity.

"It may also be worthwhile for health promotion campaigns to be planned with consideration of individual cognition levels," Dr David Batty of the Medical Research Council in Glasgow and the University of Edinburgh said in a statement.

Batty also noted intelligence may well be one important factor behind the place of social class as a fundamental determinant of inequalities in health.

Batty and colleagues analyzed data collected for the West of Scotland Twenty-07 Study — a population study investigating the influence of social factors on health. The researchers looked at data collected in 1987 of 1,145 men and women about age 55 and tracked for 20 years.—Internet

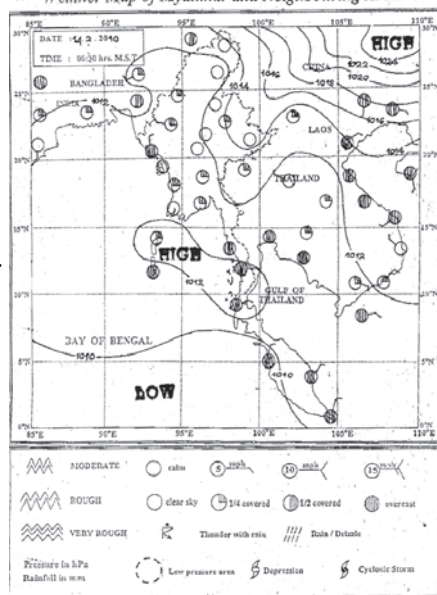

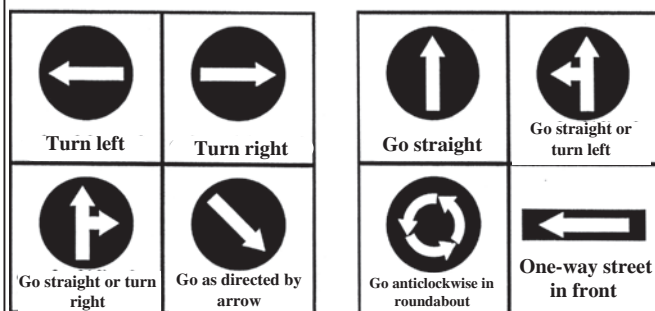
