New bridge in Toungoo Township facilitates transport to over 80 villages

NAY PYI TAW, 28 March—As a gesture of honouring the 65th Anniversary Armed Forces Day, a bridge was opened in Toungoo Township on 26 March to facilitate transport to over 80 villages in the area all year round. The bridge over Chaunggyi creek near Htanbingauk village is 191 feet long with a 140-ft long approach structure. Minister for Rail Transportation Maj-Gen Aung Min spoke at the ceremony to open the

bridge which was built within 40 days beginning 12 February 2010. It has an eight-foot wide platform.

Htanbingauk village where the bridge lies is in Pechitgon village-tract in the township which is over 100 miles north of commercial city Yangon.

The bridge is opened by Myanma Railways under the Ministry of Rail Transportation.

U-Sin Jewellery explained the purpose of her donation. "Another reason is to facilitate health improvement of local people. I spent over K 50 million on construction to make sure the durability of the building."

I visited the extension site of the strand road and beautifying of the bank with the help of heavy machinery as the retaining wall had been completed. The construction of retaining wall is implemented with the funds of Sagaing Division PDC and local people.

On 20 February morning, 100-bed Katha District People's Hospital, 25-bed extended ward donated by U-Sin Jewellery, rural library in Moetargyi village and 16-bed station hospital in Moetarlay model village were opened in parallel with the inauguration of Katha-Moetargyi railroad section.

US deaths double in Afghanistan as troops pour in

KABUL, 28 March—The number of US troops killed in Afghanistan has roughly doubled in the first three months of 2010 compared to the same period last year as Washington has added tens of thousands of additional soldiers to reverse the Taliban's momentum.

Those deaths have been accompanied by a dramatic spike in the number of wounded, with injuries more than tripling in the first two months of the year and trending in the same direction based on the latest available data for March.

US officials have warned that casualties are likely to rise even further as the Pentagon completes its deployment of 30,000 additional troops to Afghanistan and sets its sights on the Taliban's home base of Kandahar Province, where a major operation is expected in the coming months.

"We must steel ourselves, no matter how successful we are on any given day, for harder days yet to come," Adm Mike Mullen, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said at a briefing last month.

Crane strikes 25-story NYC building; no injuries

NEW YORK, 28 March — A listing crane struck the side of a 25-story building near Wall Street on Saturday, sending debris cascading to the ground, disrupting traffic and leading to evacuations at five buildings.

There were no injuries reported after the crane hit a ledge near the top of the mixed-use building on Maiden Lane, three blocks from Wall Street, the Fire Department of New York said. Part of the lower Manhattan building's facade broke off and fell into the street, police Lt John Grimpel said.

The crane was in a plaza about half a block from the struck building. The base of the crane was on the other side of the street from the building, and the crane was leaning diagonally across the street onto the building.

A neighbouring building's porter, Jose Hernandez, said he heard a crashing sound around 7 pm.

"When the crane fell, it went 'Boom!' and rocks fell," he said.—Internet

NATO chief seeks Russia's cooperation on missile defence

BRUSSELS, 28 March — NATO Secretary General Anders Fogh Rasmussen said on Friday that NATO members should agree on a missile shield that includes Russia at the alliance's next summit in November.

He made the appeal while addressing the fifth Brussels Forum, an annual high-level forum on transatlantic relations and hosted by the German Marshall Fund of the United States.

"We need a decision by NATO's next summit in November that missile defence for our populations and our territories is an alliance mission and that we will explore every opportunity to cooperate with Russia," he said, adding "one security roof, that we support together, and that we operate together. One security roof that protects us all."

Russian building collapses, three reported killed

PAVLOVSKAYA SLOBODA, 28 March — An apartment block west of Moscow partially collapsed following a suspected gas explosion Saturday, killing three people and possibly trapping others under the rubble.

Some of the supporting walls of the three-story building gave way and a fire broke out in the building in the small Moscow-area town of Pavlovskaya Sloboda.

Emergency Situations Ministry spokeswoman Vero-nika Smolskaya was quoted by Russian news agencies as saying seven people were injured and

three may still be trapped under concrete.

The blaze engulfed several apartments but firefighters quickly brought it under control, she said.

Emergency officials trawled through the rubble in the hazy spring sun-

shine as shocked locals looked on. Gas explosions are relatively frequent in Russia, especially outside the big cities, where infrastructure is underdeveloped and few apartments are hooked up to gas mains.

Geely, Ford to sign Volvo accord on Sunday

STOCKHOLM, 28 March—Zhejiang Geely Holding Group, China's largest private-run car maker, will sign an agreement on Sunday with Ford Motor to buy the carmaker's Volvo car unit, a Volvo spokesman said on Saturday.

Geely and Ford plan to announce the details of the deal — China's biggest overseas auto purchase — at a news conference in the west coast Swedish city of Gothenburg.

"This is to talk about the stock purchase agreement between Ford and Geely," Volvo spokesman Per-Ake Froberg told *Reuters*.

The deal will not be closed for a number of months, probably in the third quarter, he said.

Geely chairman Li Shufu will be in Sweden to sign the agreement, as will Volvo Cars Chief Executive Stephen Odell and Ford's Chief Financial Officer, Lewis Booth.

Geely, parent of Geely Automobile Holdings, was already named by Ford as the preferred bidder for the Swedish unit in October 2009.—*Internet*

GM recalls 5,000 heavy-duty vans because of engine fire risk

CHICAGO, 28 March—General Motors Co is recalling about 5,000 heavy-duty vans because of a risk of engine fire, the company said Friday.

The vans involved in the recall are the 2010 Chevrolet Express and

GMC Savana passenger and cargo vans. The company also is halting production and sales of the vehicles "until a fix for a suspected faulty alternator can be determined."

GM spokesman Alan Adler said there have been no injuries or accidents reported in connection with the vans.

The company warned customers who purchased the vans, which were built in February and March, to stop driving them and park them outside away from buildings and other vehicles and, if possible, disconnect both battery cables.

Relatively few of the recalled vans are in the possession of retail customers, with about 1,300 in rental and other fleets, the company said.

GM issued a stop sale order on Friday, preventing the fleet-owned vans from being rented or those on dealer lots from being sold. Others are being held at dealerships or in ports before being exported.

Only the 2500, three-quarter ton, and 3500, one-ton, Series vans are affected. Light-duty (half-ton) Express and Savana vans use a different alternator.—*Xinhua*

GCC investment agency posts \$91 mln net profits in 2009

KUWAIT CITY, 28 March—An investment agency owned by the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) said Saturday its net profits in 2009 stood at 91 million US dollars.

The Gulf Investment Corporation (GIC) said in a statement its shareholders equity totalled 1.75 billion dollars at the end of 2009, seeing an increase of 1.1 billion dollars over 2008, despite that the global financial market was ravaged by a spreading turmoil. As of 31 Dec, 2009, the company's total balance sheet reached 6.1 billion dollars, and with a capital adequacy ratio of 27 percent, it continues to

be one of the most strongly capitalized financial agencies in the region.

"GIC emerged strongly from the financial turmoil of 2008, reaffirming its re-

silience and ability to rapidly adapt to changing environments," Faisal Al-Mansouri, chairman of the Board of GIC said.

Driving into history: India's original small car

MUMBAI, 28 March—Back in the mid-1980s, Ashutosh was a young student enjoying life in the then-Bombay and the freedom to cruise the streets in a new Maruti 800.

"Those were great times," recalled Ashutosh, now a chartered accountant in the city renamed Mumbai. "It was my first car. I used to zip around in it with friends listening to Stevie Wonder's 'Part-Time Lover'." But India's first small car, hailed as a triumph of engineering that revolutionised transport for millions and kick-started economic liberalisation in the world's biggest democracy, is reaching the end of the road.

From April, the Maruti 800 is to be phased out as new auto emission standards are introduced to cut pollution on India's increasingly clogged roads.

Orders for new cars will be stopped in Mumbai, New Delhi, Kolkata and Chennai and nine smaller cities, with plans to completely phase out the car within five years.

"Fresh investment in a car 25 years old does not make sense," a Maruti Suzuki spokesman told

AFP, requesting anonymity in line with company policy.

The decision not to upgrade the boxy, four-door hatchback that was once the company's best-selling car makes business sense, the firm and analysts said.—*Internet*

Merchants start from scratch in tsunami-hit Chilean town

TALCAHUANO, 28 March—Merchants in this port city are struggling to recover a month after Chile's monster earthquake, dealing with destroyed buildings, mud-caked stores and merchandise depleted from looting.

Concepcion and the nearby port of Talcahuano, with a combined

population of half a million, along with the town of Constitution suffered the heaviest damage in the 8.8-magnitude quake and ensuing tsunami, which killed at least 452 people and caused some 30 billion dollars in damage.

Nearly 100 people are still missing after the quake, one of the most powerful on record, struck a broad region south of Santiago on 27 February. It was followed by more than 200 aftershocks.

A month later, Talcahuano businesses are starting from scratch as they struggle to reopen and get things back to normal.

Peruvian glaciers reduce by 30 percent due to climate change

LIMA, 28 March—The Peruvian glaciers have reduced by 30 percent in the last 30 years as a result of climate change, a group of specialists warned Saturday on Peru's radio station Radio Programas de Peru.

According to one of the specialists, the decrease of the ice caps has caused that those glaciers retain less water, and therefore less water available for the population. Moreover, Bernex Nicol, director of Research Cen-

tre of Catholic University, warned about the waste of water from rivers which end to the Pacific sea, caused by deforestation of the springs in the Northern Andes.

"We see that in our territory, which is mega-diverse, there are many-induced climate change.

Not only global climate change. Over 50 percent of the springs in the northern Andes are being reduced by deforestation," said the specialist.

It is reported that there are so far 10 million people without access to drinking water in Peru.

KAMPALA, 28 March—One person died and about 150 others were injured during a stampede at Kasubi Tombs as tens of thousands of people ended a week of mourning over the destruction of the royal mausoleum by a fire, police said here on Saturday.

Vincent Sekate, deputy police spokesperson, told Xinhua by tel-

ephone that the Friday incident at the tombs located in a suburb of Kampala occurred as the crowd tried to catch a glimpse of the presiding Ronald Mutebi II, King of Buganda Kingdom, one of the country's four traditional kingdoms reserved as cultural institutions.

Cargo ship collision leaves two missing in Japan

TOKYO, 28 March — Two Japanese sailors went missing after two cargo ships collided in the Naruto Strait between Japan's Fukushima and Hyogo Prefectures early Sunday morning, the state broadcaster NHK reported. The collision between a Japanese vessel and one from Marshall Islands occurred at round 0:00 am Sunday (1500 GMT Saturday), and the Japanese ship sank shortly after the accident, said the report, citing the Japan Coast Guard.

Two other Japanese sailors were rescued by the crew of the Marshallese ship.

The search and rescue operation by the Japan Coast guard is still under way for the missing. And investigation has been launched to determine the causes of the accident.—Xinhua

It's important to talk to baby

EVANSTON, 28 March—US researchers found even for infants as young as 3 months, words play an important role in their cognition.

Alissa Ferry, Susan Hespos and Sandra Waxman, all from the psychology department in the Weinberg College of Arts and Sciences at Northwestern University, said the infants were shown a series of pictures

of fish that were paired with words or beeps.

Infants in the word group were told, "Look at the toma!" — a made-up word for fish, as they viewed each picture.

Other infants heard a series of beeps carefully matched to the labeling phrases for tone and duration. The infants were then shown a picture of a new fish and a dinosaur side by side as the re-

searchers measured how long they looked at each picture. If the infants formed the category, they would look longer at one picture than the other, the researchers said.

The study, published in the journal *Child Development*, found that although infants in the word and tone groups saw exactly the same pictures for exactly the same amount of time, those who heard words formed the category fish; those who heard tones did not.—*Internet*

Obesity accelerates liver damage in heavy drinkers

BEIJING, 28 March—Obesity compounds the harmful effects of heavy drinking on the liver, new research in more than 9,000 Scottish men shows.

Based on the findings, the investigators argue that lower limits for "safe" alcohol consumption in heavier people may be necessary.

Deaths from liver disease have risen in certain parts of the world, and alcohol consumption pat-

terns don't completely explain this observation, Dr Carole L Hart of the

University of Glasgow and her colleagues write in the *British Medical Journal*.

Given that obesity is on the rise, and that excess weight has been linked to disease, Hart and her team investigated whether alcohol consumption and being overweight act together to increase the risk of liver disease.

The researchers looked at two studies including a total of 9,559 men from Scotland.

At least seven dead in north China cargo sinking

SHUIAZHUANG, 28 March—Seven bodies were recovered after a cargo loaded with 3,000 tonnes of sand sank on the Bohai Sea off north China's Hebei Province on Saturday, local authorities said.

The vessel from the coastal city of Penglai in Shandong Province sank at about 5 am. The number of the crew members was unknown, according to the Huanghua Maritime Safety Administration.

The maritime search and rescue centre of Cangzhou City received a message asking for help from the vessel at about 5:15 am, but lost contact with it from then on. The centre was organizing ships and helicopters to conduct the rescue, but the efforts were hindered by strong wind and waves up to four metres, officials said.—*Xinhua*

Militant group calls for foreign forces withdrawal from Afghanistan

KABUL, 28 March—The delegation of a major militant group has called for the withdrawal of NATO-led troops from Afghanistan, a private television channel reported Saturday.

"Hizb-e-Islami wants the foreign troops to withdraw from Afghanistan as a precondition for peace,"

Tolo broadcast in its main news bulletin.

Quoting Hizb-e-Islami sources, Tolo said that foreign forces should begin pullout in July and complete the process within four to six months.

A delegation of Hizb-e-Islami brought a 15-point peace plan to Kabul two weeks ago and met

with President Hamid Karzai and other Afghan officials and politicians including some parliamentarians.

Second only to Taleban, the Hizb-e-Islami led by former premier Gulbudin Hekmatyia has been fighting the Afghan security forces and NATO-led troops.—*Xinhua*

First tyrannosaurus rex bone discovered in southern hemisphere

Tyrannosaurus rex might once be the resident of the southern hemisphere, according to a latest paleontological study released Thursday in the journal *Science*.

The sensational discovery broke the view that Tyrannosaurus rex only lived at the areas of the north of the Equator.

Researchers found a hip bone belonging to a Tyrannosaurus rex ancestor in Dinosaur Cove in Victoria, Australia, which sheds new light on tyrannosaurs' evolutionary lineage.

"This is an exciting discovery because tyrannosaur fossils had only ever been found in the northern hemisphere before and some scientists thought tyrannosaurs never made it down south," said Roger Benson, from the Department of Earth Sciences at the University of Cambridge, who identified the find.

"The bone is unambiguously identifiable as a tyrannosaur because these dinosaurs have very distinctive hip bones," Benson said.

"Although we only have one bone, it shows that 110 million years ago small tyrannosaurs like ours might have been found worldwide. This find has

major significance for our knowledge of how this group of dinosaurs evolved," he added.

DNA from Sebria may signal new species of human ancestor

Scientists used a DNA-decoded method to investigate an ancient human who has been discovered in a cave in southern Siberia, according to British newspaper *Daily Mail*.

The mysterious human, who lived alongside our ancestors tens of thousands of years ago, earned a nickname "X-Woman".


Through analysing DNA from a fossilized finger bone, researchers found it doesn't match modern humans or Neanderthals, two species that lived in that area around the same time - 30,000 to 50,000 years ago.

The Siberian species lineage may split off from the branch leading to moderns and Neanderthals a million years ago, the researchers calculated.

And they also said that it doesn't seem to match the history of human ancestors previously known from fossils.

Researchers presumed that the Siberian species may be brand new, although

they cautioned that they're not ready to make that claim yet.

Expansion of universe speeding up

A survey of 446,000 galaxies shows the universe is expanding faster with time as predicted by Einstein's theory of relativity, Dutch scientists said.

Using the Hubble telescope, the galaxies were surveyed to see how matter was distributed and how quickly it expanded, said astronomer Ludovic Van Waerbeke of Leiden University in the Netherlands.

Scientists believe the universe comprises three compounds: normal matter, which includes physical objects such as planets; dark matter, which is invisible matter that creates the gravitational pull that causes galaxies to form; and an unknown compound referred to as "dark energy" — the force that causes the universe to expand.

Russia, IAEA to jointly establish first nuclear fuel reserve bank

VIENNA, 28 March—Russia and the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) will jointly establish a nuclear fuel reserve bank, in order to meet the demand of developing countries for peaceful use of nuclear energy, said the IAEA on Friday.

It will be the first nuclear reserve bank in the world, providing low enriched uranium for nuclear reactors at civilian level, said the agency.

Rosatom's head Sergei Kirijenko and IAEA Di-

rector General Yukiya Amano would sign relevant agreements on the creation of the nuclear fuel reserve bank.

Although the plan has met with opposition from some developing countries, the Board of Governors of the IAEA gave greenlight to the project at a conference held in November last year.

The IAEA explained that the plan could improve supervision of nuclear safety and prevent the proliferation of nuclear technology and ma-

terial for military purposes. The agency expected that this measure can induce some countries to give up enriching their own uranium.

According to earlier reports, Russia will with the IAEA's support establish a nuclear centre in Angarsk, near the city of Irkutsk in Siberia, to produce nuclear fuel at civilian level.

The price of the nuclear fuel would then fluctuate in line with market conditions.



MADRID, 28 March—Two freight trains collided in the central Avilla Province in Spain early Friday, killing a driver on one of the trains, the *European News Agency* reported.

Six killed in stone mine collapse in India

NEW DELHI, 28 March—At least six labourers were killed and a dozen injured on Friday when a stone mine they were working in collapsed in the western Indian state of Rajasthan, reported the *Press Trust of India*.

The incident took place at the state's Pratapgarh District. Bodies of six persons have been pulled out while around 16 others were hospitalized in critical condition, said the report, quoting local officials.

Rescue operation was still underway in the mine which is about 200 feet (about six metres) deep, said the report.—Xinhua

Pirates attack Turkish-flagged ship off Nigeria

ANKARA, 28 March—Pirates off the shores of Nigeria attacked a Turkish-flagged ship *Ozay-5*, wounding two Turks and one Nigerian who were part of the crew, a Turkish Press release said on Friday.

The Press release issued by the Turkish Undersecretariat of Maritime Affairs said *Ozay-5* was attacked on Thursday night by at least eight pirates.

The pirates seized all cash, mobile telephones and other valuable items in the ship, said the Press release.

The clashes between the pirates and the crew members erupted when a crew member pushed the alarm button of the ship, according to the Press release.

The pirates escaped from the ship after spraying bullets on the personnel saloon, said the Press release, adding that there were no mass property damage in the ship.—Xinhua

Colonies of bacteria fight for resources with lethal protein

SCIENCE DAILY, 28 March—Rival colonies of bacteria can produce a lethal chemical that keeps competitors at bay, scientists report. By halting the growth of nearby colonies and even killing some of the cells, groups of bacteria preserve scarce resources for themselves, even when the encroaching colony is closely related.

It supports the notion that each colony is a superorganism, a multicellular organism with its own identity,” said Eshel Ben-Jacob, an adjunct senior scientist at UC San Diego’s Center for Theoretical Biological Physics and professor of physics at Tel Aviv University. Ben-Jacob and

lead author Avraham Be’er of the University of Texas, Austin, and other colleagues at these institutions report their discovery in the early online edition of the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences.

Alone in a dish, colonies of the bacterium *Pseudomonas aeruginosa* will send branches of cells in all directions. But when forced to share a plate of limited nutrients with another colony, the branching patterns of both colonies become lopsided, leaving a space between the two.

It’s not a lack of food that halts the growth. The researchers found nutrients in the gap, but they also found a protein there that

wasn’t present elsewhere on the dish.

When they dabbed a bit of the purified protein on a fresh dish inoculated with *P. dendritiformis*, the bacteria formed a lopsided colony that shied away from the spot. And the cells at the edge of the colony closest to the suspect protein were dead.

They named the protein “sibling lethal factor,” for its ability to kill even closely related colonies derived from a single original colony, and identified its gene. But the gene made a protein that was too large, heavier than the lethal factor by two-thirds and harmless. They concluded that some other factor must be in play.

How 1918 flu antibodies fend off swine flu

SCIENCE DAILY, 28 March—The absence of a sugary viral shield could explain why immune responses to the 1918 influenza virus also work against the 2009 H1N1 (swine flu) pandemic strain.

Researchers have found that the two viruses, although separated in time by nearly a century, are structurally similar in a region that is recognized by the immune system. In seasonal flu viruses, that region — a part of the haemagglutinin protein often used to create flu vaccines — is dotted with sugar molecules; however, the two pandemic flu strains lack this sweet spot. This might explain why seasonal flu vaccines don’t protect against swine flu.

The results, published today in Science 1 and

Science Translational Medicine 2, could also explain an unusual feature of swine flu: its tendency to hit the young hardest, rather than the elderly population that is usually most at risk from flu viruses. Scientists thought that older people might have benefited from exposure to the 1918 flu virus and its immediate

descendants. That previous exposure seems to have produced antibodies that cross-react with the 2009 strain. Indeed, earlier this year, researchers identified antibodies from 1918 flu survivors that could target both the 1918 and the 2009 viruses. But it was unclear exactly how the immune responses to the two viruses overlapped.—Internet

Chinese official says China-US trade is win-win game

WASHINGTON, 28 March—A sound and stable China-US economic and trade relationship is more important than ever and the trade between the two countries is a win-win game, said Chinese Vice Commerce Minister Zhong Shan in an article published on Friday's *Wall Street Journal*.

"China-US trade and economic cooperation has generated huge and real benefits for the United States, while China has been gaining a lot from it

as well," Zhong stated in the article.

In 2009 China jumped to become the third biggest market for US exports. American companies have cumulatively invested over 62.2 billion dollars in 58,000 projects in China and reaped bumper harvests. Their profits in China amounted to nearly 8 billion dollars in 2008 alone, according to the data released by the Chinese government.

Zhong said that since the outbreak of the inter-

national financial crisis, China has been supporting the efforts of the American people to tackle the crisis. "On the one hand, China has increased imports from the US," said the Chinese official.

While overall US exports dropped 17.9 percent in 2009, exports to China hardly decreased. Many US manufacturing firms have found comfort in the Chinese market as a shelter against the global financial storm.

World's crops must double by 2050

LONDON, 28 March—More money must be earmarked for agriculture to avoid a global hunger crisis in coming decades, a British food policy expert said. "It's a huge problem," said Gordon Conway of the Centre for Environmental Policy at Imperial College London.

Conway is the keynote speaker at next week's Global Conference on Agricultural Research for

Development. The meeting, to be held in France, features scientists, farmers, aid groups and businesses working to ward off hunger in the world's poorest countries, the BBC reported Friday.

Crop yields must double if the world is to feed the estimated 9 billion people living on the planet by mid-century, Conway said. The effort is being hampered by climate change and a lack of basic agricultural knowledge, he said.—*Internet*

India sees business in US healthcare law

NEW DELHI, 28 March—Companies in India say they will benefit from the new US healthcare bill by handling more administrative work for insurers.

"The healthcare reform bill is a very, very big opportunity for us," said Ananda Mukerji, Managing Director of Firstsource Solutions, which handles so-called back-office operations for dozens of US insurance companies.—*Internet*

World trade to grow 9.5% in 2010

GENEVA, 28 March—World trade is expected to grow 9.5 percent in 2010, after suffering its biggest collapse since World War II in 2009, the head of the World Trade Organization Pascal Lamy said on Friday.

"Our economists are forecasting a world trade growth for 2010 of 9.5 percent with developing countries' trade growing 11 percent and industrialised countries' trade growing by 7.5 percent," the WTO Director-General said.

"This means that trade-wise, there is light at the end of the tunnel and it's certainly a good forecast, good news for the world economy," he added.

World trade plunged 12 percent in 2009 due to a "sharp contraction in global demand" during the economic crisis.

Amid last year's slump, China overtook Germany to become the world's top exporter with some 1.20 trillion dollars worth of merchandise exported in 2009, according to WTO data.—*Internet*



California unemployment remains unyielding at 12.5%

LOS ANGELES, 28 March—California's unemployment remained unchanged at 12.5 percent in February, indicating that the recession is dragging into 2010, the state's Employment Development Department announced on Friday.

That rate was the same as January's, and was up from 10.2 percent one year ago.

Nearly 2.8 million Californians were unemployed in February, compared with 2.2 million a

year earlier.

In February, California lost 20,400 jobs after a gain of 25,400 jobs in January.

The number of jobs in California have fallen 4.1 percent from the same time last year, with many of those losses occurring in the construction industry, which lost 21,500 jobs. Professional and business services grew more than any other sector, gaining 10,000 jobs.

During this week, VN-Index experienced a fluctuation with three downs and two ups. The index gained the highest point at 511.58 points on Monday but dipped to the lowest level of 503.39 points on Thursday. Last week, VN-Index ranged from 510.85 to 531.83 points.—*Xinhua*

French consumer confidence declines amid job worries in March

PARIS, 28 March — French consumer confidence dived again in March on the back of unemployment worries, its third straight monthly fall this year, official statistics institute INSEE said on Friday. The consumer confidence index dropped one point from February to minus 34 in March, the lowest level this year, INSEE said in its monthly report.

The March index re-

flected increasing domestic anxiety over the worsening labour market and future living standards.

Compared with the highest consumer sentiment index of employment posted in June 2009, the index has now fallen 35 points, the report showed.

On Thursday, the national statistics bureau cut its estimate of economic growth in the first quarter to 0.2 percent from a previous 0.4-percent forecast.

For the upcoming second quarter, INSEE maintained a forecast of 0.3-percent growth.

However, as the still weak domestic demand and labour market drag down the recovery, the following third and fourth quarters need to see growth of 0.5 percent to 0.6 percent to secure the annual 1.4-percent economic growth predicted by the government, the agency said.—Xinhua

Euro zone leaders: Greece plan to stabilize euro

BRUSSELS, 28 March — A hard-won deal to provide a safety net for Greece provided the debt-ridden country with some welcome relief on Friday, with its cost of borrowing on international markets edging down slightly and labor unions at home saying they would hold off on any further strikes — at least for now.

Prime Minister George Papandreou said that while Greece still faced problems, the new plan would give it breathing space to implement his Socialist government's harsh austerity programme, designed to

reduce its massive budget deficit and pull Greece out of a financial crisis that has rocked the European Union's common currency.

Greece's 12.7 percent deficit for 2009 is four times over the EU limit, pointing to the euro zone's inability to restrict members' debt and deficits. Worries of a Greek default also highlighted the lack of a European only safety net for euro zone countries that can't pay their bills. "Europe and Greece come out of this crisis much stronger," Papandreou said.

Zambia's largest nickel mine resumes operation

LUSAKA, 28 March — Zambia's largest nickel mine, Munali Nickel Mine, which is run by China's Jinchuan Corporation, resumed operation on Friday and is expected to reach an output of 750,000 tons nickel ore in 2010. Zambian President Rupiah Banda attended a ceremony to mark the resumption at the mine, about 85 kilometres south from the Zambian capital city Lusaka.

Banda highly praised the efforts made by Jinchuan, the largest nickel producer in Asia, in taking over the ever closed

mine, which led to unemployment of over 1,000 miners. "I am pleased to know that the mine planned to increase the number of employees once the mine boosted its output," the president said.

The mine is planning to upgrade the mine from the current 750,000 tons per annum of ore to 1.2 million tons of ore by 2011. The Zambian leader commended Chinese investment in the country, saying that "the Chinese investors have dedication to develop Africa and we need to welcome them."

Singapore reports record visitors in Feb.

SINGAPORE, 28 March — Visitor arrivals to Singapore grew by 24.2 percent year-on-year in February 2010 to reach 857,000 visitors, the highest ever recorded in the month of February, official figures showed on Friday.

According to the Singapore Tourism Board, this also marks the third consecutive month of record visitor arrivals for Singapore.

For the top 15 markets, China registered the highest growth of 78.7 percent, followed by Malaysia (50.0 percent) and China's Taiwan (39.2 percent) in February, which can be largely attributed to the Chinese New Year holiday. Thirteen out of the

top 15 markets also registered positive year-on-year growth in February this year, reflecting the general improvement in travel sentiment to Singapore.—Xinhua

EIB to allocate 80 million euro for Black Sea power line project

TBILISI, 28 March — The European Investment Bank will allocate 80 million euros (107.15 million US dollars) for the construction of the Black Sea power line. Georgia's Deputy Finance Minister and EIB vice president signed the agreement on Thursday in Tbilisi.

The high-voltage power line will connect electric grids of the two sides. Last week, Georgia signed a similar agreement with the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development, which also pledged to allocate 80 million euros (107.15 million US dollars) for the project.—Xinhua

US economic growth reaches 5.6% in Q4

WASHINGTON, 28 March — The US economy increased at an annual rate of 5.6 percent in the fourth quarter of 2009, according to the second revised estimate released by the Commerce Department on Friday.

The new reading for the October-to-December quarter was 0.3 percentage points lower than the 5.9 percent growth rate previously revised on 26 Feb, and 0.1 percentage points lower than the first estimate figure of 5.7 percent released on 29 Jan.

The 5.6 percent increase, still the best showing since 2003, was lower than economists' expectation of 5.8 percent growth.

11 killed when tractor-trailer, van crash in Ky

MUNFORDVILLE, 28 March—A tractor-trailer loaded with auto parts crossed a highway median on Friday and slammed head-on into a van carrying a Mennonite family, killing 11 people before dawn on a hilly stretch of interstate. The dead included an engaged couple and several members of their family, whose house burned down in December. Two children in the van were the only survivors of the crash about 75 miles south of Louisville. After the collision, the truck smashed into a rock wall and burst into

flames. The driver, the lone occupant, was also killed. A pastor for the family said they were travelling to a wedding in Iowa, and the engaged couple planned their own wedding for July. “They’ll have a wedding in heaven, I guess,” said Leroy Kauffman, pastor of Marrowbone Christian Brotherhood. The crash was the deadliest single accident in Kentucky since a 1988 bus crash in which 27 people died when a church bus carrying a youth group was hit by a drunken driver.

Russia endeavors to find energy-efficient road

Moscow, 28 March—Russia’s energy-efficient policies were expected to lead the country to a road of “green” development, a World Wildlife Fund (WWF) official told *Xinhua* on Friday on the eve of Earth Hour campaign. Evgeny Shvarts, director of conservation policy in WWF’s Russian branch, said Russia used to give inadequate attention to energy saving and the building of a low-carbon economy because of its rich gas and oil resources. But in recent years, the government had realised the great importance of energy efficiency and changed its approach, he said. Russian President

Dmitry Medvedev has for many times criticized the country’s slow progress on energy efficiency, ruling that enterprises without energy-saving measures would receive no financial support from the government.—*Xinhua*

China overtakes US in green investments

WASHINGTON, 28 March—China in 2009 for the first time led the world in clean energy investments, with Britain jumping up to the No. 3 spot. China spent a staggering \$34.6 billion in clean energy over the past year, almost double the United States’ \$18.6 billion, a study by the Pew Charitable Trusts said. With \$11.2 billion spent, Britain surprisingly

claims the No. 3 spot, followed by Spain and Brazil. South Korea impressed with a 250 percent growth of installed capacity. Overall, global investments in the sector more than doubled since 2005 and are projected to reach \$200 billion in 2010. “Countries are jockeying for leadership,” said Phyllis Cuttino, who heads Pew’s climate change division. “They know that investing in

clean energy can renew manufacturing bases, and create export opportunities, jobs and businesses.” Over the course of a few years, China became the world’s largest producer of solar cells and has a huge wind turbine production sector. It has set a goal of having a 30 gigawatt renewable energy capacity installed by 2020 but it will soon exceed that target.

Chile tsunami costs Japanese fisheries \$68 mln

TOKYO, 28 March—The Pacific-wide tsunami generated by the massive undersea earthquake off Chile’s coast last month caused 68 million dollars of damage to Japan’s fishing industry, a report said on Saturday. Scallop, oyster and seaweed farms off the northeast coast of Japan were hit when waves up to 1.45 metres high smashed into Japan following the quake thousands of kilometres (miles) away. More than six billion yen of damage was caused to the facilities, *Kyodo News* reported, citing fisheries industry officials. Local authorities were asking the central government to provide a package of support measures to help businesses to recover, *Kyodo* said. Japanese authorities ordered more than half a million people to evacuate seaside areas as the wave bore down on Japan. However, no deaths or injuries were reported from the tsunamis. The 8.8-magnitude quake, one of the most powerful on record, struck along the coast south of Santiago on 27 February, causing widespread death and destruction.

Women, men respond differently to stress

MONTREAL, 28 March—Women who are more defensive are at increased cardiovascular risk, whereas low defensiveness appears to damage the health of older men, US researchers say. Researchers at the Universite de Montreal, the Montreal Heart Institute in collaboration with colleagues from the Universite du Quebec a Montreal and McGill University said defensiveness is a trait characterized by avoidance, denial or repression of information perceived as threatening. In women, a strong defensive reaction to judgment from others or a threat to self-esteem will result in high blood pressure and heart rate, the researchers said. Bianca D’Antono, a professor at the Universite de Montreal and a Montreal Heart Institute, said contrarily, older men with low defensive reactions have higher cardiovascular rates. “Our findings suggest that socialization is innate and that belonging to a group contributed to the survival of our ancestors,” D’Antono said in a statement.

Droughts bring severe damage to some Asian countries

HONG KONG, 28 March—Severe droughts are hitting some east and southeast Asian countries, causing damages to crops, drop of water level of rivers and reservoirs and economic losses.

Southwest China, including Yunnan, Sichuan and Guizhou provinces, Guangxi Zhuang Autonomous Region and Chongqing Municipality, has been experiencing the worst drought in 60 years

since autumn last year, as it has received only half its annual average rainfall and water stores are depleted. About 4.348 million hectares of farmland were affected and 940, 200 hectares would yield no harvest. The direct economic losses are estimated at 19 billion yuan (2.8 billion US dollars).

In the Philippines, 23 provinces were reportedly affected by the dry spell this year, which was de-

scribed by some people as the worst they could remember since another El Nino-induced drought in 1998.

A report prepared by the Philippine Department of Agriculture's Central Action Centre (DACAC) placed total damages at 11.2 billion pesos (244.4 million US dollars), with the damage in paddy rice production already nearing 300,000 metric tons.—Xinhua

Fruit compound may help those with asthma

AUCKLAND, 28 March—Natural chemicals from blackcurrants may help reduce lung inflammation in those with allergy-induced asthma, researchers in New Zealand said.

The study, published in Molecular Nutrition and Food Research, found in laboratory experiments the blackcurrant compound enhances the natural defence mechanisms in lung tissue by both suppressing inflammation-causing reactions and minimizing inflammation.

Dr. Roger Hurst of New Zealand company Plant & Food Research said fruit consumption has been shown to reduce symptoms in allergy-induced asthma, yet this research is the first to give insights into the mechanism by which this may occur.

It may take more than a facelift

ROCHESTER, 28 March—It takes more than tightening loose skin via a facelift to restore a youthful look, US researchers suggest.

Dr Howard N Langstein of the University of Rochester Medical Centre suggests that the future approach to facial rejuvenation may be two-fold, first restoring structure underneath before performing skin-tightening procedures.

Reviewing a collection of 120 facial computed tomography scans taken for other, unrelated medical reasons, plastic surgeons measured changes that occurred to facial bones over time. The computed tomography scans were divided equally by gender and age, 20 men and 20 women in each of three age groups: 20-36, 41-64 and 65 and older.

Pregnancy safe after breast cancer

BARCELONA, 28 March—Pregnancy is safe for breast cancer survivors, but they should wait as long as five years after treatment before becoming pregnant, a British study said.

Pregnancy may even have a protective effect for breast cancer survivors, said the report from the Royal College of Obstetricians and

Gynecologists.

Survivors considering pregnancy, however, should wait for as long as five years after treatment, depending on the aggressiveness of their cancer, to allow for assessment of long-term survival from the cancer, said the report presented on Thursday at the European Breast Cancer Conference in Barcelona, Spain.

The report analyzed 14 trials in Belgium and Italy conducted between 1970 and last year, The Times of London reported on Friday. The analysis suggested that women who became pregnant after a diagnosis of breast cancer had a 42-percent reduction in the risk of death compared with those who did not become pregnant.

Researchers suggest elderly happier

AUCKLAND, 28 March—New Zealand researchers say the image of the aging grouch may be inaccurate with a study showing the elderly have a more positive attitude than the young.

The team at the University of Auckland presented the same set of pictures to a group of people ranging in age from 61 to 80 and to a group two generations younger, aged 19 to 31, The Daily Telegraph reports. Researchers did brain scans of the subjects while they viewed pictures of skiers winning races and similar triumphant images and those of unhappy subjects like wounded soldiers.

Kids with autistic traits not diagnosed

EXETER, 28 March—A British researcher says many children with autistic traits may currently be undiagnosed. Ginny Russell of the University of Exeter in England says the finding also determined a gender bias in diagnosing children with Autistic Spectrum Disorders.

Boys are more likely to receive a diagnosis than girls, even when they display equally severe symptoms, Russell says.

Russell is lead researcher in a study published in the Journal of Child Psychology and Psychiatry that finds a large number of undiagnosed children displaying autistic traits — such as repetitive behaviors, impairments in social interaction, and difficulties with communication.—Internet

PARIS, 28 March—Marseille ended their long, 17-year wait for a major title by beating rivals Bordeaux 3-1 in a fiercely contested League Cup final at the Stade de France on Saturday.

All the goals came in the second half, with Souleymane Diawara - who left Bordeaux last summer - putting Marseille in front just after the hour and substitute Mathieu Valbuena firing in the second minutes later.

Mathieu Chalme deflected an inswinging Valbuena free-kick past his own goalkeeper to make it 3-0 in the 77th minute before Ludovic Sane reduced the arrears with a header six minutes from time.

The result dashed Bordeaux's hopes of becoming the first side to successfully defend the trophy, while coach Laurent Blanc must hope morale has not been damaged ahead of Tuesday's Champions League clash at Lyon.—Internet

Structure of Insulin's Docking Point Identified

SCIENCE DAILY, 28 March—Walter and Eliza Hall Institute scientists have determined the structure of a previously unseen part of the insulin receptor, making possible new treatments for diabetes

The insulin receptor is a large protein on the surface of cells to which the hormone insulin binds. Insulin controls when and how glucose is used in the human body. Understanding how insulin interacts with the insulin receptor is crucial to the development of treatments for diabetes.

Australian scientists revealed the

structure of the major part of the insulin receptor in 2006 but the structure of a key segment to which insulin binds remained elusive. Now, Drs Mike Lawrence, Brian Smith, John Menting, Geoffrey Kong and Colin Ward from the institute's Structural Biology division, together with colleagues from the Case Western Reserve University and the University of Chicago, have worked out the molecular structure of this previously unseen region.

Their findings have been published in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences (Early Edition).



Comet crash creates potential for life

NATURE NEWS, 28 March—Striking a glancing blow to a planet could create the perfect conditions in a comet's icy core to create amino acids—molecules that are vital to forming life on Earth.

This shock-compression theory for making amino acids has been developed by Nir Goldman and his colleagues at the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory in Livermore, California. Goldman presented their results on 24 March at the American Chemical Society meeting in San Francisco, California.

The researchers wanted to find out what chemical events might occur in an ice grain trapped inside a comet glancing off a planet. They used around one million computer hours on the powerful Atlas computer cluster at Lawrence Livermore to simulate the possible chemical processes occurring in a single ice grain during such an impact. In particular, they were looking for amino acids—markers of potential life.—Internet

Mother birds know best—even before birth

MASSACHUSETTS, 27 March— Mother birds communicate with their developing chicks before they even hatch by leaving them messages in the egg, new research by a team from the Department of Zoology, University of Cambridge, has found.

By changing conditions within the egg, canary mothers leave a message for their developing chicks about the life they will face after birth. In response, nestlings adjust the development of their begging behaviour.

If chicks get a message that they will be reared by generous parents then they beg more vigorously for food after hatching. But chicks that are destined to be raised by meaner parents end up being much less demanding. By attending to messages in the egg, nestlings gain weight more rapidly because they match their demands to the parents' supply of food, and can avoid either begging too little or wasting effort on unrewarded begging.—Internet
