## Russia to resume Bulava missile tests in November

Moscow, 22 May—Russia will not resume testing of the Bulava intercontinental missile until November at least, Russian Defence Minister Anatoli Serdyukov said on Friday.

Bulava is being designed as a principal strategic nuclear weapon for deployment on the submarines. The construction of the submarines has already begun.

Still, seven of a total of 12 tests of the Bulava failed. The next testing had been scheduled for June before Serdyukov's Friday announcement.

"The only reason for the failure is the technology of the missiles' assembling. The only problem we see is the quality of works," the minister told the RIA Novosti news agency.

Currently, three new missiles are being built, Serdyukov said.

The missiles are identical, which would enable engineers to find a flaw in the assembling process.

## Eight survive plane crash in south India; 158 dead

MANGALORE, 22 May—An Air India Express passenger plane from Dubai crashed outside an airport in southern India on Saturday, killing 158 people when it burst into flames after overshooting the runway and

plowing into a forest.

There were only eight survivors after the Boeing 737-800, with 166 people on board including crew, appeared to have skidded off the runway in rain at Mangalore Airport in Karnataka

state, Air India director Anup Srivastava said.

All the passengers were Indian nationals, an Air India official in Dubai said.

Air India Express is the budget arm of the loss making state-run carrier Air India, which has been fending off growing competition from private airlines. First indications are that the crash was an accident, officials say.

Television channels said the plane crashed around 6:30 am (0100 GMT). TV images showed it struck a forested area.

Flames were seen blazing from the wreckage as rescue workers fought to bring the fire under control.

## US missile kills 10 in NW Pakistan

DERA ISMAIL, 22 May—An overnight US missile strike killed two foreign militant suspects and eight Pakistanis near the Afghan border, two intelligence officials said on Saturday.

The attack late Friday targeted the house of a local resident in Boya village near Miran Shah, the main town in North Waziristan.

US drones often hit suspected hide-outs of militants in troubled Pakistani tribal region, which Washington considers a center for the remnants of Taleban, al-Qaeda and Pakistani militants.

## Iraqi car bomb toll in Diyala rises to 30

KHALIS, 22 May—The death toll from a car bomb which exploded at a market in Iraq's northern Diyala Province, has risen to

30, officials say.

Friday's blast took place in the mainly Shia town of Khalis, about 80km (50 miles) north of Baghdad.

Earlier this month, a spate of attacks killed more than 100 people.

It was initially said the blast had killed at least 23 people and wounded another 53.

A man who was being treated for leg wounds after the bombing blamed the police.

"Policemen were securing the market like they always do, but... how did that car enter the market?" said Haitham Hussein al-Tamimi.

Two months ago, the same town was hit by a double bombing in which at least 40 people were killed.

## US Patriot missiles arriving in Poland in coming days

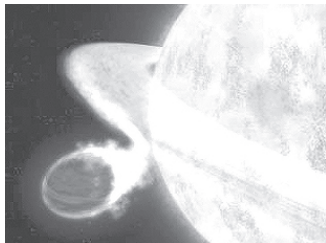
WARSAW, 22 May—A battery of US Patriot missiles will arrive in Poland in the next few days, Polish Defence Minister Bogdan Klich announced on Friday. Klich said the Patriots will arrive in Poland on 24 May and will be stationed in Morag in the northern lake District of Masuria, some 60 kilometres from the Russian enclave of Kaliningrad. In February, Poland ratified the so-called SOFA deal on the stationing on its soil of US troops who will crew the surface-to-air Patriot battery. They are also due to train Polish soldiers to use the system.

The Patriots together with about 100 US military personnel will be stationed in Poland under the Obama administration's new missile defence plan, which replaced an earlier strategy foreseeing the installation of a US missile interception system in Poland and the Czech Republic. A Russian foreign ministry spokesman said last month that Russia is concerned about the US "anti-missile activity" in the Polish territory and the planned deployment of the Patriot anti-aircraft missiles there.

## Hubble finds a star eating a planet

LONDON, 22 May—The hottest known planet in the Milky Way Galaxy may also be its shortest-lived world. The doomed planet is being eaten by its parent star, according to observations made by a new instrument on NASA's Hubble Space Telescope, the Cosmic Origins Spectrograph (COS). The planet may only have another 10 million years left before it is completely devoured.

The planet, called WASP-12b, is so close to its sunlike star that it is superheated to nearly 2,800 degrees Fahrenheit and stretched into a football shape by enormous tidal forces. The atmosphere has ballooned to nearly three times Jupiter's radius and is spilling material onto the star. The planet is 40 percent more massive than Jupiter.

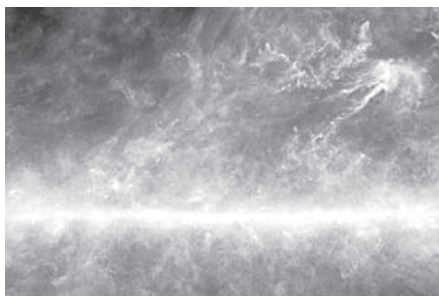
This effect of matter exchange is commonly seen in close binary star systems, but this is the first time it has been seen so clearly for a planet.

"We see a huge cloud of material around the planet, which is escaping and will be captured by the star. We have identified chemical elements never before seen on planets outside our own solar system," says team leader Carolee Haswell of The Open University in Great Britain.—Internet

## Probing the dark side of the universe: In search of primordial gravitational waves

CHICAGO, 22 May—Advancing into the next frontier in astrophysics and cosmology depends on our ability to detect the presence of a particular type of wave in space, a primordial gravitational wave. Much like ripples moving across a pond, these waves stretch the fabric of space itself as they pass by. If detected, these weak and elusive waves could provide an unprecedented view of the earliest moments of our universe. In an article appearing in the 21 May issue of *Science*, Arizona State University theoretical physicist and cosmologist Lawrence Krauss and researchers from the University of Chicago and Fermi National Laboratory explore the most likely detection method of these waves, with the examination of cosmic microwave radiation (CMB) standing out as the favored method.

During the past century, astronomy has been revolutionized by

the use of new methods for observing the universe, but still today the origin of dark energy and dark matter is unknown.

The answer to these and other mysteries may require us to probe back to the earliest moments of the Big Bang expansion. Questions of origins, such as 'how did the Universe begin,' provoke fascination and are at the forefront of ASU's Origins Project, which Krauss directs.

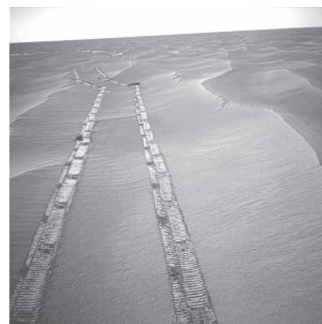

## NASA's Mars Rovers set surface longevity record

WASHINGTON, 22 May—NASA's Mars Exploration Rover Project will pass a historic Martian longevity record on 20 May. The Opportunity rover will surpass the duration record set by NASA's Viking 1 Lander of six years and 116 days operating on the surface of Mars. The effects of favourable weather on the red planet could also help the rovers generate more power.

Opportunity's twin rover, Spirit, began working on Mars three weeks before opportunity. However, Spirit has been out of communication since 22 March. If it awakens from hibernation and resumes communication, that rover will attain the Martian surface longevity record.

Spirit's hibernation was anticipated, based on energy forecasts, as the amount of sunshine hitting the robot's solar panels declined during autumn on Mars' southern hemisphere. Unfortunately, mobility problems prevented rover

## I am treefrog, feel me shake

WASHINGTON, 22 May—Using experiments involving a mechanical shaker and a robotic frog, researchers reporting online on 20 May in *Current Biology* have found new evidence that male red-eyed treefrogs communicate with one another in aggressive contests by using vibrations they send through their plant perches.

The findings open the door to further study

vertebrate communication.

"In the case of red-eyed treefrogs, tremulation displays in which the frogs shake their entire bodies convey information about the status and aggressive intent of the signaler," says Michael Caldwell of Boston University.

"They also appear to carry information about the size of the signaler."

## Geometry drives selection date for 2011 Mars Launch

WASHINGTON, 22 May—Planners of NASA's next Mars mission have selected a flight schedule that will use favourable positions for two currently orbiting NASA Mars orbiters to obtain maximum information during descent and landing.

Continuing analysis of the geometry and communications options for the arrival at Mars have led planners for the Mars Science Laboratory, or Curiosity, to

choose an Earth-to-Mars trajectory that schedules launch between 25 Nov and 18 Dec, 2011. Landing will take place between 6 Aug and 20 Aug, 2012. Due to an Earth-Mars planetary alignment, this launch period actually allows for a Mars arrival in the earlier portion of the landing dates under consideration.

"The key factor was a choice between different strategies for sending communica-

tions during the critical moments before and during touchdown," said Michael Watkins, mission manager at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, Calif. "The shorter trajectory is optimal for keeping both orbiters in view of Curiosity all the way to touchdown on the surface of Mars. The longer trajectory allows direct communication to Earth all the way to touchdown."

## How to avoid gout-triggering foods

PITTSBURGH, 22 May—Experts at a US health education group advise changing diet to avoid foods that may trigger gout.

Health professionals at the Gout & Uric Acid Education Society invite those suffering from gout—the most common form of arthritis—to consult their updated, simplified dietary guidelines at: [www.gouteducation.org](http://www.gouteducation.org). “The revised dietary guidelines for gout

are easy to incorporate into daily life,” nutritionist Madelyn Fernstrom of the University of Pittsburgh said in a statement. “These guidelines comprise a lifetime model for eating—whether or not you have gout.” Some of the dietary guidelines recommended for gout management include:

— Avoiding red meat, shellfish and alcohol, especially beer. These foods are high in purine, a

chemical that can contribute to elevated uric acid levels associated with the pain of gout. Uric acid is also a marker for diabetes and kidney disease.

— Avoiding soft drinks, fruit juices and prepackaged baked goods with high sugar content. These often include high-fructose corn syrup, which increasingly is being associated with gout.

## Austrian experts warn of obesity among population

VIENNA, 22 May—Austrian medical and social experts warned on Friday that 42 percent of the Austrian population aged 18 to 65 years are overweight, which would cause very tough medical and social problems.

At the round table held

by the Chamber for Pharmacists in Vienna, the continually increasing body weight of the Austrians as well as the universality of obesity became the main topics. The figures showed that in the group of 18 to 65 years of age, the proportion of

obese patients have even accounted for 11 percent.

Over the past few years, the proportion of obese children has also increased by 7 percent. The experts said that obesity must attract sufficient attention of all social parities.—Xinhua

## IV treatment may thwart advanced cancers

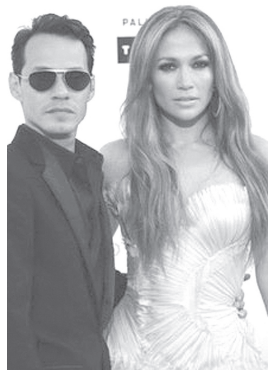
SAN FRANCISCO, 22 May—New preliminary research suggests that intravenous delivery of a cancer-destroying virus—a form of gene therapy—can destroy tumor cells throughout the body.

Twenty-three patients whose colorectal, skin, ovarian and lung cancers had spread through their bodies received one of five dose levels of IV treatment.

In 75 percent of those who received the highest doses, the treatment reached tumors and stopped cancer growth, the researchers said in a news release. Cancer was also suppressed in some who got lower doses.

The patients reported mild side effects, such as symptoms similar to that of flu.

“This is the first time that we’ve been able to treat patients intravenously and had proven success in targeting and destroying metastatic cancers in the body with an armed oncolytic virus product,” said Dr David H Kirn, president and chief executive officer of Jennerex Biotherapeutics in San Francisco. “This opens up a whole new world of systemic approaches to therapy.”—Internet

## Nepal records 20 diarrhea deaths for water-borne diseases

KATHMANDU, 22 May—Epidemiology and Disease Control Division (EDCD) under the Nepali Ministry of Health and Population, has so far recorded 20 diarrhea deaths due to water-borne diseases this year.

According to Saturday's *The Himalayan Times* daily, Dr Vishwo Raj Khanal, senior public health officer at EDCD said no outbreak had been recorded as yet. But with continued increase in temperature, scarcity of safe drinking water and lack of proper sanitation, there were some cases of water-borne diseases.

According to EDCD, 20 people out of 441 infected with diarrhea died last month in remote

districts of the mid and far-western regions.

Khanal said that they had recorded less number of people suffering from water borne diseases in comparison to the same period last year.

While government records put the death toll between mid-April to mid-October last year at 366, non-governmental

organizations recorded 394 deaths for the same period.

EDCD has formed Community Rapid Response Teams in 20 vulnerable districts to respond immediately to any outbreak. The Division has also formed rapid response teams nationwide.

## Heart disease among childhood cancer survivors tied to gene mutations

DUARTE, 22 May—A new study finds that survivors of childhood cancer with certain genetic variations are more likely than other survivors to develop heart disease.

Researchers say the findings could help them personalize treatment for certain children with cancer to prevent the toxic effects of anthracycline

chemotherapy upon the heart.

“Although we depend heavily on anthracyclines for treating children with cancer, we are fully aware of their toxic effects to the heart. We also know that some patients—despite being exposed to higher doses—don’t develop heart problems, while others with little exposure have considerable cardiac damage,” said study senior author Dr Smita Bhatia, professor and chair of the department of population sciences at the City of Hope National Medical Centre in Duarte, Calif., in a news release.

“Our results are a good example of how understanding a cancer patient’s genetic makeup can help us better tailor individual therapies,” Bhatia said.

## Creativity, schizophrenia share similarities in the brain

STOCKHOLM, 22 May—What do creative people and people diagnosed with schizophrenia have in common? According to new research out of Sweden, both share similar dopamine systems in the brain.

Dopamine, along with serotonin, is a key neurotransmitter—chemicals that are vital to transmitting messages via nerve cells in the brain.

“We have studied the brain and the dopamine D2 receptors, and have shown that the dopamine system of healthy, highly creative people is similar to that found in people with

schizophrenia,” Fredrik Ullen, associate professor at Karolinska Institute’s department of women’s and children’s health in Stockholm, said in a news release.

Ullen and his team gleaned their finding, which was published online 17 May in *PLoS One*, from work with schizophrenia patients and healthy individuals who were deemed creative after completing psychological testing that focused on problem-solving.

“The study shows that highly creative people who did well on the divergent tests had a lower density of

D2 receptors in the thalamus than less-creative people,” Ullen said. “Schizophrenics are also known to have low D2 density in this part of the brain, suggesting a cause of the link between mental illness and creativity.”

The thalamus region of the brain, the authors noted, is a kind of filter for information before it moves on to the cortex region, which handles understanding and reasoning.—Internet

## India, Thai bilateral trade to reach 10 bln US dollars in 2012

BANGKOK, 22 May—India and Thailand are confident to meet a target of their bilateral trade's value of 10 billion US dollars in 2012, Thai Deputy Commerce Minister Alongkorn Polbutr said Friday.

Alongkorn's remark was made after he returned from India, where he paid a two-day official visit during May 18-20, the Thai News Agency (TNA) reported.

"The visit has made both the Indian

government and private sector understand Thailand's actual situation very well, hence they are still confident in Thailand," he said.

The bilateral trade between Thailand and India in 2009 was totally valued at 4.95 billion US dollars.

For January March period of 2010, the bilateral trade was totally valued at 1.71 billion US dollars, or 80.46 percent year-on-year higher.

## Toyota gets Tesla stake, Tesla gets Toyota factory

PALO ALTO, 22 May—Toyota Motor Corp said it would take a \$50 million stake in US electric carmaker Tesla Motors, a move that gives the Japanese automaker a chance to repair its dented public image and vaults the California start-up on to the world stage.

The two companies said on Thursday they would cooperate on the development of electric vehicles, parts and production system. Separately, Tesla will take over a plant Toyota closed in the San Francisco area and build its upcoming all-electric Model S sedan at

the site from 2012.

The David-and-Goliath handshake highlights a changing dynamic in the auto industry, where newcomers such as Tesla and BYD Co of China are challenging established players in the uncharted field of mass-produced all-electric vehicles.

At a joint news conference in California, Tesla Chief Executive Elon Musk described the investment as a "gesture of support" from Toyota Chief Executive Akio Toyoda, who approached him in a whirlwind corporate romance that included dinner at Musk's house and a test ride around Los Angeles in Tesla's pricey electric Roadster sport car over the last month.

## Greece, Libya seek closer cooperation in energy, tourism

ATHENS, 22 May—Prime Minister George Papandreou met with his Libyan counterpart Al-Baghdadi Ali Al-Mahmudi on Friday, seeking closer economic cooperation.

"New ways to boost bilateral ties opened today," Papandreou said after his meeting with Al-Mahmudi.

The Libyan premier invited Papandreou to

visit Tripoli soon to sign development agreements.

During their meeting, the two leaders discussed prospects for additional cooperation in renewable energy sources, natural gas, constructions, sea transportation, and tourism.

Stressing Libya's "significant role in the Mediterranean Sea as a gate to Africa and the Arabic world," Papan-

dreou referred to traditional friendly ties between the two countries and thanked Al-Mahmudi for Libya's will to strengthen cooperation with Greece.

The Libyan premier said his country is currently going through a major development phase and suggested setting up an economic trade zone between the two countries.—Xinhua

## Ford recalls 170,000 cars in Argentina, Brazil for ignition problem

BUENOS AIRES, 22 May—The US Ford Motor Company has recalled more than 170,000 cars of model "Ka" in Argentina and Brazil for a problem in the electrical ignition device, which can cause a fire, the company said Friday. The company said in a statement to the two countries that the cars produced between 27 Nov 2007 and 31 Jan 2010 with certain serial numbers will be examined.

The problem could cause "ineffectiveness of security tools in the car. In an extreme case it could produce a short-circuit and a fire in the engine," the company said.

Some 155,000 cars of this model have been sold in Brazil, according to Brazil's National Federation of Motor Vehicles Distribution. And at least 14,369 were sold in Argentina between 2008 and 2009, according to the country's Automotive Distributors Association.

## Chrysler adds 1,100 jobs at Detroit Jeep plant

DETROIT, 22 May—Chrysler Group LLC gave a big boost to the battered Michigan economy on Friday when it announced plans to add about 1,100 workers to help build the new Jeep Grand Cherokee.

The company made the announcement at a Detroit factory as it celebrated the start of Grand Cherokee production. Chrysler said it expects strong sales of the new sport utility

vehicle, which is due in showrooms next month.

Almost all the workers will be new hires, which Chrysler can pay about \$14 per hour, about half the hourly rate received by current workers represented by the United Auto Workers union. The workers will staff a second shift at the factory, called the Jefferson North Assembly Plant, starting on 19 July.

## Turkey warns of spreading piracy threat along African coasts

ISTANBUL, 22 May—Turkish Foreign Ministry on Friday warned in a statement of spreading piracy threat along the African coasts.

The statement was made by Foreign Ministry spokesman Burak Ozugergin to the press at the preparatory meeting of the International Conference on Somalia in Istanbul.

He said that piracy in Somalia should be stopped before it spread

to other African coasts.

Up to now, he added, five Turkish ships have been taken hostage by Somali pirates, and one of them was still in the hand of pirates.

"We think that piracy should be prevented from spreading to other African coasts. We also contribute to this goal with active efforts. Turkey has contributed to the operations waged under UN and NATO," said Ozugergin.

Turkey has sent six frigates to Somalia since February 2009 to serve international anti-piracy mission in the Gulf of Aden.

Turkish navy ships captured seven pirates and fended off many pirate attacks since then.

According to semi-official Anatolia news agency, Turkish President Abdullah Gul met his Somali counterpart in Istanbul on Friday.

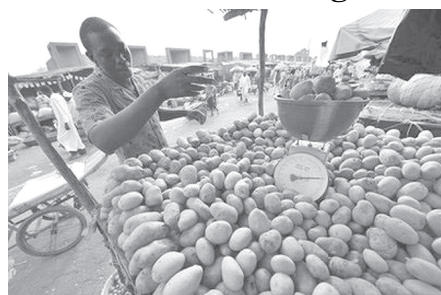

"We are aware of the

recent influx of people from Niger into some parts of (southern) Katsina State," Sani Makana, the state agriculture commissioner told AFP by phone from the state capital Katsina.

The number of Niger

nationals in northern Katsina state, which shares a land border with Nigeria, has soared in the past two months, residents said. Makana said some were so desperate they had been forced to beg door-to-door.

"It is a pathetic sight. They just have nothing to live on and have to beg to eat," said Katsina resident, Abubakar Shehu.

"When you ask them why they came here they tell you that they were starving in Niger... and would die if they stayed," Shehu said.

According to the United Nations around 7.8 million Nigeriens are in need of food, out of the around 10 million affected by a crisis in the Sahel region.—Internet

## Bangladesh, Russia sign 5-year agreement on nuclear cooperation

DHAKA, 22 May—Bangladesh and Russia on Friday signed in Moscow a 5-year Framework Agreement on Cooperation in the Field of the Use of Nuclear Energy for Peaceful Purposes.

State Minister for Science and ICT Yeafesh Osman signed the deal on behalf of the Bangladeshi government, making ways for nuclear power plants and meet the growing power demand in Bangladesh, a message of the Bangladeshi Foreign

Ministry said.

Bangladesh requested the Russian authorities to assist in establishing two nuclear reactors with the capacity of 1000 MW each.

A high-level delegation from Russia will visit Bangladesh soon to take forward next steps in implementing the Rooppur Nuclear Power Plant Project in Bangladesh's northern District of Pabna, about 170 km from capital Dhaka.

As per the framework agreement, the future

cooperation between the two countries would include design, construction and operation of nuclear power and research reactors, nuclear fuel supply, taking back the spent nuclear fuel and nuclear waste management and personnel training and capacity building for operation and maintenance of the plants.

The agreement was signed for a five-year term with possible tacit extension every five years.

PARIS, 22 May—Prosecutors said on Friday that Continental Airlines should be fined 175,000 euros (\$218,800) for manslaughter over its role in the 2000 crash of an Air France Concorde plane which killed 113 people.

The Concorde, carrying mostly German tourists, caught fire as it roared out of Paris's Charles de Gaulle Airport on 25 July, 2000 and crashed just minutes later

into a nearby hotel.

Investigators believe a Continental DC10 triggered the disaster when a small metal strip fell from it onto the runway. This punctured the Concorde's tyres during take off, spraying debris into the underwing fuel tanks and sparking the fire.

Prosecutors added they were seeking a two-year suspended prison sentence for Henri Perrier, an 80-year-old former Concorde director who headed the plane's testing programme.

Perrier, who was involved in the first Concorde flight in 1969, and American airline Continental have denied any wrongdoing. Continental has questioned the safety record of the aging Concorde model as part of its defence.—Internet

## Atlantis astronaut complete final spacewalk

WASHINGTON, 22 May—Two US astronauts completed their final spacewalk Friday at the International Space Station, replacing batteries before heading home.

Garrett Reisman and Michael Good reentered the orbiting station's decompression chamber at 1:13 pm (1713 GMT) after the Atlantis crew's third spacewalk in five days. Their sortie lasted six hours and 46 minutes.

The pair plugged a new ammonia jumper cable into the orbiting space station's huge framework and installed two new batteries that store energy collected by the

station's large solar panels.

Each battery weighs 375 pounds (170 kilograms) and measures about the size of a three-foot (one-metre) box. Good and another fellow astronaut swapped out another four batteries

during another spacewalk on Batteries usually last five to six years but the ones that were replaced had functioned for nine years. The old batteries will be brought back to Earth aboard Atlantis.

Yeboke Creek and Kasaing Creek near Htilon Village and is nearly completion.

The main embankment is 17,720 feet long (over 3 miles) and 46 feet high that it can be seen from a distance. The saddle dyke is 4,960 feet in length and 34 feet in

height. The earthworks has completed by 98 per cent and laying of stones by either side of the dam still needs 730 per cent to be completed.

According to an official of Construction Group-6 of Irrigation Department, Hlaingbwe Township is rainy and its annual rainfall is 180

inches on average; that Yeboke Dam will benefit 5,452 acres of farmlands; that the dam will prevent farms in wet-land from being flooded; that Hlaingbwe farmers will be able to cultivate 3,000 acres of summer paddy, 280 acres of beans and pulses and 720 acres of edible oil crops in addition to 4,000 acres of monsoon paddy when the dam is in service.

A civil engineer at the construction site said that the dam, conduit and spillway are almost complete now and that tunnels are being dug to irrigate 1,000 acres of farmlands between the dam and Hpa-an-Hlaingbwe motorway in 2010 summer paddy cultivation season as the dam will start storing water in coming rainy season.

with maximum water storage capacity of 36,000 acre-feet has 57,000 acre-feet annual average water inflow. The RC type spillway is 275 feet in length and 40 feet in width and construction of 129-foot conduit has 90 per cent completed. The dam is scheduled to be completed in 2010-2011.

The dam is believed to contribute to Hlaingbwe Township to practise double and mixed-cropping patterns and is can be seen as a shot in the arm for farmers of Hlaingbwe Township.

## Brazil prolongs vaccination against A/H1N1 flu

RIO DE JANEIRO, 22 May—Brazil's Health Ministry announced on Friday its decision to prolong the national campaign of vaccination against the A/H1N1 flu until 2 June.

The campaign, which started in early March, was due to end this Friday.

The ministry also decided to extend the vaccination to children aged two to five years old. Initially, the campaign targeted only children aged six months to two years old, adults

aged 20 to 39, elders, pregnant women and people with chronic health conditions such as diabetes or heart diseases.

In order to include the children aged two to five in the campaign, the Brazilian government will need 10.8 million extra doses of the flu vaccine. The children will take the vaccine in two turns, with a gap of three weeks between the doses.

Health Minister Jose Gomes Temporao also made a balance of the

campaign so far. According to him, since March over 61 million Brazilians have been vaccinated against H1N1 flu.

That represents about 70 percent of the campaign's goal. Among pregnant women, 68 percent were vaccinated, much lower than the 80 percent expected by the Ministry. Among adults aged 20 to 29, 77 percent were vaccinated, and among those aged 30 to 39, only 37 percent were immunized against the H1N1 flu.—Xinhua

## Russia to install explosive detectors in metro

Moscow, 22 May—Russia is to install explosives detectors in the country's major metros as a part of security measures, the Emergencies Minister said on Friday. The move follows the deadly blasts in Moscow metro in March, which claimed more than 40 lives and injured about a hundred. The twin blasts have sparked a national outcry

as they proved insecurity of Moscow residents.

The new measures are believed to protect the citizens from possible terrorist attacks, and scientists and security services are developing new explosive detectors as the old ones allegedly do not detect all the explosive compounds, the minister Sergei Shoigu told a news conference.—Internet

Arab countries' aid for Haiti has reached 100 millions US dollars, Mohieddin said, stressing that the summit is very important to Arab countries because it shows that the Arab world doesn't separate from the international community in the frame of crisis.

The participation of the Arab League represents the presence of Arab countries and reflects the positive role of AL in supporting Haiti, the AL official said.

## Floods cause heavy damage in Czech Republic

PRAGUE, 22 May—Floods in the Czech Republic this week had caused damage estimated at one billion korunas (48 million US dollars), Czech TV reported on Friday.

According to the Firefighters' Corps General Directorate, the floods, triggered by days of torrential rain, drowned an elderly woman and injured 11 people. Around 1,200 people have been evacuated from their homes and more than 2,100 buildings have been flooded.

The Chamber of Agriculture reported that at least 120 square kilometres of farmland were inundated with crops destroyed.

These numbers are expected to grow. Water levels in affected rivers are receding but danger

remains around the lower reaches of the Morava River. Landslides were reported in 20 places, mainly in northern Moravia.

Thanks to the anti-flood measures taken since a similar calamity 13 years ago, damage is much less this time.

But these measures could not be put into effect in all endangered areas. Politicians now demand a new law that would allow for expropriation of land in such cases. Poland, Slovakia and Hungary have also been hit badly by the floods.

## Homecoming for Tanzania rhino species kept alive in S Africa

SERENGETI NATIONAL PARK, 22 May—A group of Tanzanian rhinos, extinct in their natural habitat, was airlifted home on Friday from South Africa where some of the species were taken two decades ago.

The Tanzanian government asked South Africa to return some of the black rhinos, of the east African *Diceros bicornis michaeli* species, after they went extinct in their original home range, South Africa's government news agency said.

South Africa had imported five of the *michaeli* rhinos more than 20 years ago, *BuaNews* agency said. While the

species is not native to South Africa, the rhinos thrived there, multiplying to 61.

"I thank very profoundly all those who have supported Tanzania's wildlife conservation efforts over the many years," Tanzanian President Jakaya Kikwete said when the five rhinos arrived at an airstrip in Serengeti National Park.

"This event is a stark reminder of what went wrong in the past and a lesson about what needs to be done to prevent it from happening again.

## Jakarta to totally ban smoking in public building

JAKARTA, 22 May—Jakarta, the capital of Indonesia will totally forbid smoking in all public building, a media said here on Saturday. Jakarta Governor Fauzi Bowo was quoted by the *Jakarta globe* as saying that the rules on that would soon be finalized.

Should the ban is treated seriously, unlike earlier attempts to restrict smoking in public areas, Jakarta could finally join the growing list of major cities around the world that have virtually eliminated smoking inside bars, restaurants, offices and shopping malls.

As an interim measure, Fauzi on Friday issued a decree to revise a widely ignored 2005 bylaw on smoke-free areas that mandated the creation of smoking rooms in public buildings.

## One of world's rarest stamps to be auctioned

One of world's rarest stamps is going up for auction this weekend and could fetch a record-breaking price, the head of a Geneva auction house said.

The Swedish "Treskilling Yellow" is believed to be the only surviving misprint of an 1855 three shilling stamp that was

supposed to be green. It has fabled status among collectors and is considered one of the world's most valuable objects pound for pound.

"I'm hoping it will be a new record," auctioneer David Feldman said on Friday. He oversaw its last official sale in 1996 for 2.875 million Swiss francs (then about

US\$2.3 million).

Saturday's auction will involve several undisclosed telephone bidders whose credentials have been checked, Feldman told *The Associated Press*.

All who take part have been sworn to secrecy, but the buyer will have the right to decide whether his name and the purchase price can be revealed after the sale, said Feldman.

The Treskilling Yellow is "one of about a half dozen highly notorious stamps in the world," according to noted US stamp expert Robert Odenweller.

The 1856 "British Guiana 1 cent Magenta" is the best-known of all unique stamps, but has been locked away in a vault since 1980 when it was bought for nearly US\$1 million by John du Pont.

## 13-year-old American boy becomes youngest to top Mount Everest

A 13-year-old American boy became the youngest climber to reach the top of Mount Everest on Saturday, breaking the former record as part of his quest to climb the highest peaks on all seven continents.

A spokesman for Jordan Romero says the boy's team called him by satellite phone from the summit of the world's highest mountain, 29,035 feet (8,850 metres) above sea level.

"Their dreams have now come true. Everyone sounded unbelievably happy," a new statement on Jordan's blog said on Saturday morning.

## Woman, 31, gives birth to first sextuplets in England for 25 years

LONDON, 22 May — A mother has defied huge odds by giving birth to the first sextuplets in England for nearly quarter of a century. Surrounded by a team of doctors and nurses, Vicky Lamb, 31, gave birth to four girls and two boys, 14 weeks early. The tiniest of the babies, born last Friday at 11.05 pm, weighed under 1lb 5 ounces and the biggest just 1lb and 15 ounces.

Last night the precious new arrivals were under the care of experts in the neonatal intensive care unit of Oxford's John Radcliffe Hospital. Live births of such a high number of babies are incredibly rare and sextuplets is estimated to occur

in just one in every 4.5million pregnancies. The next few days and weeks are said to be 'critical' for the siblings, who are dependent on a vast array of medical equipment and the devotion of experts for their survival.

## Older patients can skip breast radiation

BOSTON, 22 May — They said the finding, to be presented next month to a meeting of the American Society of Clinical Oncology, may save many women and

their doctors a lot of trouble, not to mention the costs of radiation. "This study confirms that for older women with early stage breast cancer, lumpectomy without

radiation is a viable alternative, and tamoxifen may replace the need for radiation," said Dr Kevin Hughes of Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston, who led the study.

Hughes and colleagues now have 12 years of data on 636 women aged 70 or older who had stage I breast cancer, the easy-to-cure type that has not spread and that is so-called estrogen receptor-positive. The women had the tumors removed in an operation called a lumpectomy. Half got radiation treatment and then took five years of tamoxifen, a pill that has been shown to cut in half the risk that breast cancer will return.

The other half went straight to tamoxifen. Twelve years later, 12 women who got radiation had died from their breast cancer, compared to eight who got tamoxifen only, Hughes told reporters in a telephone briefing. Many of the women died, but more than 95 percent died from something other than breast cancer.

## Doctors remove half of infant's brain to relieve seizures

OMAHA, 22 May — A baby boy, suffering from a rare brain disorder that left him having up to 200 seizures a day, is recovering after doctors removed part of his brain, WOWT-TV in Omaha, Neb, reported. When little Aaron McDonald and his twin brother, Conor, were born in March — their parents couldn't have been happier. But that joy soon turned into fear when doctors discovered Aaron had Ohtahara syndrome, which is a neurological disorder characterized by seizures.

It affects newborns, usually within the first three months of life in the form of epileptic seizures, the National Institutes of Health said on its Web site. "You go from being so excited that you have two sons born, and then you go to that drop-off-a-cliff feeling of horrible sadness when you find out what's wrong," Aaron's dad, Dan McDonald, said. Because the seizures were so severe, doctors were left with no other choice but to operate. On 17<sup>th</sup> May, Aaron underwent a 12-hour surgery at Children's Hospital in St Paul, Minn.

"Now they don't take out the entire brain, but they do remove part of it, and they disconnect the other parts," McDonald said. "And then if the right side is not specialized yet, it's able to partially or fully pick up functions."

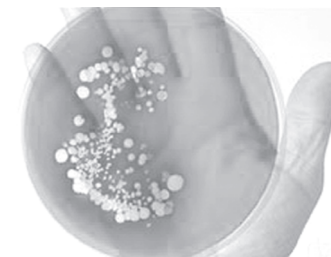
## Genetics of body germs revealed

NEW YORK, 22 May — The entire DNA sequences of 178 microbes that live in, or on, the human body have been decoded. Researchers want to understand how the vast array of bugs that share our skin, mouth, stomach and chest can cause disease. A US consortium aims to crack the genomes of 900 bacteria and viruses.

The initial findings, reported in *Science*, will be used as a "reference library" to help put new sequences into context as they are unravelled. The typical person is home to millions of microbes — the human gut alone is thought to contain at least 100 times more microbial genes than human ones.

Many flora on the human body have never been grown in the lab or identi-

fied. Some are essential to us — playing a role in digesting food and developing the immune system. And, while people are very similar to one another genetically, the colonies of microbes we host appear to differ from one person to the next.—Internet

## 'Unintended' statin side-effect risks uncovered

LONDON, 22 May — GPs should think more carefully about prescribing cholesterol-busting drugs say researchers who highlighted a range of "unintended" side effects. Some doses and types of statins

are linked with a greater risk of adverse effects, including liver problems and kidney failure, the UK research showed.

Doctors will have access to a computer programme based on the findings to help spot those most at risk. Millions of UK adults take the drugs to reduce heart attack and stroke risk. The researchers, from the University of Nottingham, stressed that for many people the benefits of statins outweighed any adverse effects, but the findings would help weigh up the pros and cons in each patient.

There are plans to prescribe statins on the NHS in around one in four adults aged over 40.

The Department of Health had predicted prescriptions for the drugs would rise by 30% a year, as GPs find more and more people eligible. At the moment, anyone judged to have a one in five or greater risk of developing cardiovascular disease over 10 years is advised to take a statin. But there has been much debate over side effects and the latest research set out to confirm where the problems may lie in a "real life" population.—Internet

## Putin says Russian economic situation visibly better

Moscow, 22 May—The economic situation in Russia became visibly better in comparison with the last year, Russian Prime Minister Vladimir Putin told the interstate council of the Euro-Asian economic union, the *RBC news agency* reported on Friday.

Putin expected that Russia's budget deficit in 2010 would be 5.5 percent of gross domestic product (GDP). This is less than the previous forecast of 6.8 per

cent. Oil prices are rising faster and they are "quite comfortable" for the economy, while the volume of mortgage loans was twice that of last year, Putin said during the council's meeting in St. Petersburg.

He also noted that Russian banks had no problem with the liquidity and the government expected the volume of bank loans to rise by five to the percent in 2010. The Prime Minister pointed out that the interest charged by the banks decreased to 11-14 per cent. He did not exclude that the federal budget deficit would drop below the 3-percent level for 2012.

Putin also mentioned that the national car market had been recovering thanks to the government subsidies and utilization programme. However, he stressed, the main engine of that growth was the rise of social well-being of the citizens who are "ready to buy the goods of the long use again."

## Earth's oceans are becoming warmer

PASADENA, 22 May—A NASA-led study has determined the upper layer of Earth's global ocean has warmed since 1993, indicating a strong climate change signal.

The international study, co-authored by Josh Willis of NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, determined the energy currently stored in the ocean is enough to power nearly 500 100-watt light bulbs for each of the roughly 6.7 billion people on the planet.

"We are seeing the global ocean store more heat than it gives off," said John Lyman, an oceanographer at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Joint Institute for Marine and Atmospheric Research.

Lyman led the study that analyzed nine different estimates of heat content in the upper ocean from 1993 to 2008.—*Internet*

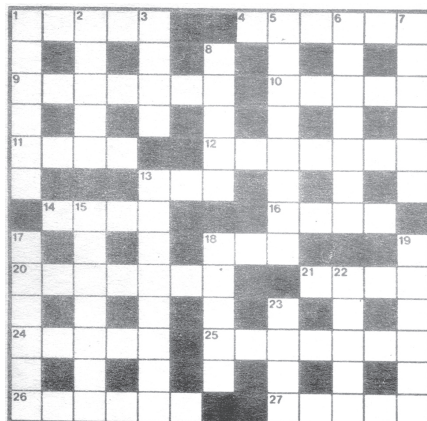
## FIFA to reconsider World Cup ticket sales

## Mexico reports nearly 4,000 prairie fires this year

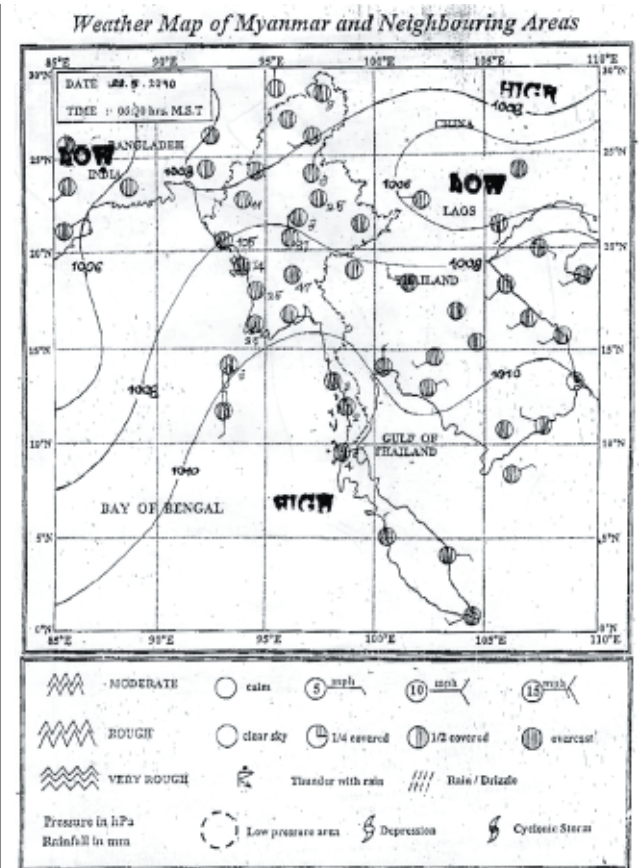
MEXICO, 21 May — Mexico has registered 3,995 cases of prairie fire so far this year, the country's National Forest Commission (Conafor) said on Friday.

The wildfire, with a daily average of 36 cases, has affected a total of 64,381 hectares of fields, it said.

The Conafor, affiliated to the Environment and Natural Resources Ministry, said that 39 percent of those affected fields were pastureland, 47.56 percent were bush and shrubbery, and 13.38 percent were forests.

The National Centre of Forest Fires Control said five of the country's 31 states were affected most with the wildfire from 2003 to 2009.

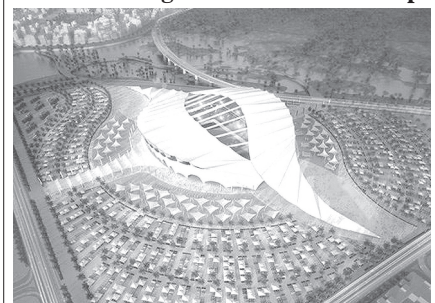
