## Kyee-Ohn Kyee-Wa Multi-Purpose Dam Project contributes to greening of Magway Region

The government has been building a lot of dams across the nation for agricultural development. At the same time, extension of sown acreage, boosting the production of paddy and other crops and cultivation of quality crops and double and mix-cropping patterns are being carried out. In addition, hydro power projects are being implemented in conjunction with construction of

dams.

Kyee-Ohn Kyee-Wa Multi-Purpose Dam Project, which includes both construction of dam and hydro power station, is being constructed on Mone Creek near Wonlo village, about 15 miles downstream of Mone dam project about five miles upstream of Maezali diversion dam, in Pwintbyu Township, Minbu District, Magway

The main purpose of implementing the project is to generate 74 megawatts of electricity, to supply sufficient water to 96,777 acres of monsoon paddy through Maezali diversion dam, to supply water to more farmlands in addition to 74,007 acres of summer paddy to be able to launch double-cropping crops and to green the region.

Construction of the dam's buildings and production of electricity are being undertaken by Construction No. 3 of Irrigation Department.

### Beef up medical research

Today, the world faces many challenges of addressing health issues due to many new strange diseases, which puts pressure on the international community to produce medicines to prevent the diseases from spreading worldwide. Many related tasks are underway to address the global health issues.

In Myanmar, the Ministry of Health is trying to improve its public health care in order that the people enjoy longevity and survive illnesses. At the same time, it is stepping up its giving health talks, taking disease preventive measures, and giving quick treatment even in rural areas.

Now, medical research has become one of the priorities in the health field. Medical research is carried out constantly and on a wider scale. Findings of medical research are compiled into papers which are then submitted to symposiums.

Findings of research on medical science and health care contribute to medical treatment, prescription of medicines and preventive measures against diseases. As a result of medical research, sufferers from some diseases can survive the diseases longer, and new effective approaches have been sought.

Research needs labour, time and funds. Laboratory-scale research, scale-up production and mass production or commercial-scale production are to be put at the centre stage step by step. Research was done increasingly to produce Hepatitis B vaccine (Purified Hbs Ag). Now, a Hepatitis B vaccine factory has been established, and the vaccine is distributed nationwide.

Medical researchers are therefore to work harder than ever to achieve more findings, submit them for discussion, and apply satisfactory results broadly.

## Double petrol bomb attack in N Ireland

BELFAST, 9 Jan—Two attacks in a Northern Irish town Saturday, which police believe may have been sectarian, sparked calls for tougher punishments for petrol bombers.

One took place outside the home of a Catholic woman, burning out a car, while the home of a Protestant-Catholic couple suffered scorch damage in the other.

No-one was injured in the attacks in Garvagh, in the north of the province.

John Dallat, a local lawmaker in the devolved Northern Ireland Assembly, called for tougher jail terms for petrol bombers.

“The hate laws are totally inadequate to deal with thugs who specialise in filling bottles with petrol and throwing them not knowing if they will burn out a car, burn down a house or murder someone,” he said.

“The sell-by date for

petrol bombers is long over.”

The Home Office interior ministry has set the threat level for Northern Ireland-related terror at “severe” in the province, meaning that a “terrorist attack is highly likely”.

## US lawmaker gravely injured in shooting; 6 dead

TUCSON, 9 Jan—A US lawmaker was in critical condition after being shot in the head by a gunman in Tucson, Arizona, in an attack which killed six including a federal judge and a nine-year-old girl.

President Barack Obama called the attack on Democratic Representative Gabrielle Giffords Saturday a “tragedy for our entire country,” while police said the gunman may not have acted alone.

The gunman — named by media as Jared Lee Loughner, 22 — had a criminal past and was unstable but not insane, said Sheriff Clarence Dupnik, adding the man was not talking to police

officers in custody.

“There’s some reason to believe that he came to this location with another individual,” he added, saying the gunman “has kind of a troubled past, and

we’re not convinced that he acted alone.”

Initial media reports suggested that Giffords, 40, had died following the shooting outside a Safeway grocery store.

## French soldier killed in Afghanistan

PARIS, 9 Jan—A French soldier was killed on Saturday afternoon during a military operation in Afghanistan, the Elysee Palace confirmed in the evening.

This brought the number of French soldiers killed in the restless country to 53 since 2001, when the Afghan war started with US troops’ invasion. The French noncommissioned officer was killed in an explosion when he was in a mission near an armed vehicle in Tagab District of Afghanistan, the Elysee Palace said in a statement.

According to official data, France has some 3,750 troops in Afghanistan. Ex-defence minister Herve Morin announced last October that the French troops may start their withdrawal from Afghanistan in 2011.

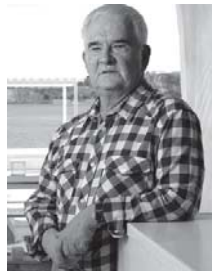

## Portuguese journalist killed in New York hotel

NEW YORK, 9 Jan—Prominent Portuguese journalist Carlos Castro, 65, was beaten to death and mutilated at a luxury Manhattan hotel on Friday and a young man reported to be his companion was being held at a psychiatric hospital.

Local media quoted police sources as saying Castro had been castrated and was left lying in a pool of blood. The medical examiner’s office did not confirm that but said the cause of death was trauma to the

head and strangulation.

A man was being held as a “person of interest” at New York’s Bellevue psychiatric hospital, a police spokeswoman said.

A police source identified him as Renato Seabra.

The New York Times quoted detectives as saying Seabra, a model from Portugal who recently appeared on a modeling reality show, had checked into the hotel with Castro about 10 days ago.

## NATO soldiers’ death toll in Afghanistan soars to 10 since beginning of 2011

KABUL, 9 Jan—Taliban-linked activities claimed the life of another NATO soldier on Sunday, bringing the alliance fatalities to 10 since the beginning of

this year, said a statement released here by the alliance force.

“An International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) service member died following an improvised explosive device attack in southern Afghanistan today,” the ISAF statement admitted on Sunday.

This is the second fatality the military alliance suffered over the past two days.

However, it did not

identify the nationality of the victim, saying it is ISAF policy to defer casualty identification procedure to the relevant national authorities.

By Saturday, according to iCasualties, a website tracking NATO-led forces casualties in war on terror, nine soldiers of the alliance including six Americans, one Briton and two from other nations, had been killed in Afghanistan.

## Key soldier in Afghan war crimes case faces court-martial

SEATTLE, 9 Jan—An Army staff sergeant was ordered on Friday to be tried by a military court to face charges that include murdering three unarmed Afghan civilians, keeping body parts as grisly war trophies and beating a whistle-blower who told superiors about widespread hashish use in his unit.

Joint Base Lewis-McChord Commanding Officer Major General Curtis Scaparrotti ordered Stryker Brigade Staff Sergeant Calvin Gibbs, 25, of Billings, Montana, to stand trial. No date was set.

Gibbs is one of five soldiers from the brigade charged with murder. Twelve soldiers in all face charges in the most serious prosecutions of alleged war atrocities by US military deployed in Afghanistan since the war began in late 2001

The Stryker Brigade cases, with some 4,000 photographs sealed from public view including some reportedly of soldiers posing with Afghan casualties, have drawn comparisons to the inflammatory Abu Ghraib prison scandal in Iraq in 2004.

### Could chemicals in flood waters harm Barrier Reef?

QUEENSLAND, 9 Jan—After heavy rain caused hundreds of thousands of kilometers of flooding, environmentalists are now concerned about run-off containing fertilizers, pesticides and sediment that could negatively affect the Great Barrier Reef off the coast of Queensland, Australia.

Queensland, home to large sugar and coal production industries, borders the 2,600 km of coastline where the Great Barrier Reef is found. The large agricultural presence in the state could be creating algal blooms that could cut the amount of sunlight reaching the coral turning it white, an effect called bleaching.

Rick Smith, executive director of Environmental Defence Canada, told Canada AM that the potential for an environmental disaster is huge.

“These algal blooms from the fertilizer are cutting down on the sunlight depriving the coral of nutrients,” said Smith. “Then when you have a huge flood like this they pour into the ocean.”

Environmental Defence Canada is an organization that hopes to inspire change by tackling environmental issues that impact everyday life, championing such causes as the removal of bisphenol A from plastic baby bottles and the creation of the Greenbelt in Ontario.

### Scientists construct synthetic proteins that sustain life

PRINCETON, 9 Jan—In a groundbreaking achievement that could help scientists “build” new biological systems, Princeton University scientists have constructed for the first time artificial proteins that enable the growth of living cells.

The team of researchers created genetic sequences never before seen in nature, and the scientists showed that they can produce substances that sustain life in cells almost as readily as proteins produced by nature’s own toolkit.

“What we have here are molecular machines that function quite well within a living organism even though they were designed from scratch and expressed from artificial genes,” said Michael Hecht, a professor of chemistry at Princeton, who led the research. “This tells us that the molecular parts kit for life need not be limited to parts — genes and proteins — that already exist in nature.”

The work, Hecht said, represents a significant advance in synthetic biology, an emerging area of research in which scientists work to design and fabricate biological components and systems that do not already exist in the natural world.

### Astronomers flock to Seattle for big space conference

SEATTLE, 9 Jan—Thousands of astronomers are headed to chilly, cloudy Seattle for their annual winter meeting of all things space and science.

The 217<sup>th</sup> meeting of the American Astronomical Society runs from Sunday (9 Jan) through 13 Jan. Approximately 2,500 scientists are expected to assemble for the cosmic five-day conference to discuss more than 1,800 of the latest discoveries of black holes, alien planets, near-Earth asteroids and

more. The conference returns to Seattle every fourth winter for the meeting.

About 80 science journalists are also expected to attend the meeting, according to AAS press officer Rick Fienberg.

“There are always lots of fascinating discoveries being unveiled at our meetings that’s why we attract so many reporters and so much media coverage,” Fienberg told *SPACE .com* in an email interview.—*Internet*

### PC-free MagicJack coming soon

WASHINGTON, 9 Jan—The voice-over-IP company that owns MagicJack — the USB stick that enables phone calls on a PC — is getting ready to release a new version of the device that doesn’t need the PC.

The MagicJack Plus plugs into a power outlet and requires only a network connection — either to a Wi-Fi or 4G adapter, or an Ethernet port on a router — to enable voice-over-IP phone service.

VocalTec, which merged with MagicJack creator YMax last summer, demonstrated the MagicJack Plus to journalists at the Consumer Electronics Show this week. The company says it expects to ship the device within 90 days at an expected price of \$50, which will include a year of free local and long distance calls. (The original MagicJack costs \$40, also including a year of free service.) After that, service costs \$20 a year.

You can opt to have your own phone number, and you can still choose to power the new version by plugging it into a USB port on a PC, the way the original version works. Either way, you plug a standard phone into the RJ-11 port at the other end of the device to make the actual calls.

### Researchers store data in bacteria

HONG KONG, 9 Jan—The US’ national archives occupy more than 500 miles (800 kilometres) of shelving; France’s archives stretch for more than 100 miles of shelves, as do Britain’s.

Yet a group of students at Hong Kong’s Chinese University is making strides towards storing such vast amounts of information in an unexpected home: the E.coli bacterium better known as a potential source of serious food poisoning.

“This means you will be able to keep large datasets for the long term in a box of bacteria in the refrigerator,” said Aldrin Yim, a student instructor on the university’s biostorage project, a 2010 gold medallist in the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT)’s prestigious iGEM competition.—*Internet*



### Motorola Xoom tablet crowned best CES gadget

LAS VEGAS, 9 Jan—Motorola Mobility’s Xoom tablet computer powered by new “Honeycomb” software from Google was crowned the best gadget at the giant Consumer Electronics Show (CES) on

Saturday.

Along with being declared the top creation at the dazzling gadget extravaganza, Xoom was also honored as the best of the scores of tablets introduced here as fresh competitors in a market dominated by Apple iPads.

Motorola also scored a victory with its Atrix smartphone designed to work with high-speed 4G wireless networks and which can be used in a dock to power a laptop.

Atrix won the top spot in a smartphone category at the official Best of CES awards.

“We took big risks and they paid off,” said Motorola Mobility chief software engineer Seang Chau. “We didn’t know if people would get it; but obviously they got it.”—*Internet*

## Health Tip: Help prevent COPD

Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) is a general term for the narrowing of the small bronchi, the smaller airways that carry air to the lungs. The two prime diseases that make up COPD are chronic bronchitis and emphysema.

The American Lung Association suggests these steps to help protect you from COPD:

- \* Don't smoke, and quit if you currently smoke.
- \* Stay away from secondhand smoke, and don't allow other people to smoke in your home.
- \* Avoid exposure to lung-damaging chemicals.
- \* Take steps to help promote clean air in your community.
- \* Schedule a visit with your doctor if you suspect that you may have COPD, particularly if you are 45 or older and have a history of smoking.

## Bike-riding ability may distinguish 'atypical' Parkinson's

NEW YORK, 9 Jan—The ability to ride a bicycle can determine whether a patient has atypical or "regular" Parkinson's disease, according to researchers in the Netherlands.

Dr Bastiaan R Bloem and colleagues used brain imaging and other tests to assess 45 patients with Parkinson's disease and 66 with atypical Parkinsonism. The patients were also asked if they could still ride a bicycle. Only two (4 percent) of those with regular Parkinson's said they could no longer ride, compared with 34 (52 percent) of those with atypical Parkinsonism.

The researchers found that asking patients if they could still ride a bike had better diagnostic value than the tests. This suggests that asking about bike-riding could save money and reduce the burden for patients, said the researchers at the Parkinson Center Nijmegen.

The research is described in a letter published in the 7 Jan issue of *The Lancet*.

"Cycling requires a highly coordinated interplay between balance, coordination, and rhythmic pedaling of the legs," they wrote in a journal news release.

## Nose may be best place to screen for MRSA infection

WASHINGTON, 9 Jan—A new study finds that people with high levels of methicillin-resistant staphylococcus aureus (MRSA) bacteria in the nose are more likely to have other areas of the body colonized by MRSA, which can cause potentially fatal infections. Researchers at Rhode Island Hospital wanted to assess the quantity of MRSA at different locations on the body and the relationship between the quantities of MRSA at different locations.

The investigators found that MRSA was more likely to be found in the nose than under the arms, the groin, or the perineum (skin between the rectum and genitals). They also found that people with high levels of MRSA in the nose were more likely to have MRSA in the other three locations.

"This study shows us that the quantities of MRSA at different body sites are highly correlated. Also, if screening cultures are to be done for MRSA, it is best to screen the nose and groin to get the highest yield," lead author Dr Leonard Mermel, medical director of the epidemiology and infection control department, said in a hospital news release.

The study was released online 5 Jan in advance of publication in an upcoming print issue of the *Journal of Clinical Microbiology*.—Internet

## Duke Energy in talks to buy Progress Energy

NEW YORK, 9 Jan—Duke Energy Corp (DUK.N), the third-largest US power company, is in talks to acquire rival Progress Energy Inc (PGN.N) in a deal worth more than \$13 billion that could be announced as soon as Monday, *the Financial Times* reported on Saturday.

Citing unnamed people familiar with the situation, the newspaper said the stock-based deal could happen at a modest premium to Progress' current market value of \$13.1 billion.

Duke spokesman Tom Williams declined comment on the report. Progress

did not immediately return a phone call seeking comment.

The companies are hoping to announce the deal before the opening bell on Wall Street on Monday but some details still need to be worked out so the talks could still be delayed or even derailed, the paper said.

Both electricity generating companies are based in North Carolina and serve clients in North and South Carolina. Duke serves some markets in the Midwestern United States and Progress also supplies customers in Florida.—Internet

## Germany and France want Portugal to accept aid

BERLIN, 9 Jan—Germany and France want Portugal to accept an international bailout as soon as possible in order to prevent its debt crisis spreading to other countries, German magazine *Der Spiegel* reported on Saturday.

Without citing its sources, the magazine said government experts from both European heavyweights were concerned Lisbon will soon not be able to finance its debt at reasonable rates, after its borrowing costs rose at the end of last year.

Berlin and Paris also want euro zone countries to publicly commit to do whatever it takes to protect the bloc's single currency, including topping up a 750 billion euro (\$968 billion) rescue fund if necessary.

Portugal is viewed by many economists as the peripheral euro zone country that is most likely to follow Ireland and Greece to seek an international bailout as it grapples to cut its debts and borrowing costs. It holds its first bond auction of the year next week.

## TD Ameritrade CEO's pay grows to \$6M in 2010

OMAHA, 9 Jan—TD Ameritrade's president and CEO was paid nearly \$6 million last year, 23 percent more than in fiscal 2009, as the online brokerage continued to perform well in unpredictable economic conditions.

The Omaha-based company disclosed details of the compensation Fred Tomczyk and other top executives received in fiscal 2010 in documents filed with the Securities and Exchange

Commission on Friday.

Ameritrade's board said the company's managers were rewarded for continuing to grow new client accounts and net new assets last year in the face of difficult operating conditions. Ameritrade reported net income of \$592.2 million, or \$1 per share, on \$2.56 billion in revenue for fiscal 2010.

## Iran has produced 40 kg of 20% enriched uranium

TEHERAN, 9 Jan — Head of the Atomic Energy Organization of Iran (AEOI) and acting Foreign Minister Ali Akbar Salehi announced Saturday that the country has so far produced almost 40 kg of 20 percent enriched uranium to supply fuel to the Teheran research reactor, local semi-official Fars news agency reported.

"We have produced about 40 kg of 20 percent (enriched) uranium and we hope to witness the injection of the first batch of Iran-made 20 percent fuel to the Teheran research reactor soon," Fars quoted Salehi as saying.

Salehi also said that Teheran is preparing to resume talks with the Vienna Group (the US, Russia, France and the International Atomic Energy Agency) on the swap of nuclear fuel for the Teheran research reactor.

The more they (the Vienna Group) delay in holding a new round of negotiations with Iran, "the more progress we make in fuel production and after a while the issue of fuel swap will become meaningless," Salehi said.

## Small earthquake hits California's San Jose area

SAN FRANCISCO, 9 Jan — A small earthquake measuring 4.1 hit the Californian city of San Jose and the surrounding area on Friday afternoon, The Los Angeles Times reported.

The epicentre of the quake, which occurred at about 4:10 pm (0010 GMT Saturday), was located about 13 miles (20 kilometres) southeast of downtown San Jose, the report said.

There were no reports of injuries or damage, the paper noted. The reading was based on the open-ended Moment Magnitude scale, now used by US seismologists, which measures the area of the fault that ruptured and the total energy released.

## Mortar wounds two foreign workers in southern Israel

GAZA, 9 Jan — Palestinian militants on Saturday fired mortar shells from the Gaza Strip into Israel, wounding two foreign workers, the militants and Israeli media said.

The website of Israel's Yediot Ahronot newspaper reported that one of the mortars landed in Sha'ar HaNegev Regional Council in Western Negev and wounded two foreign workers.

The initial report did not reveal the condition and the identity of the victims.

## Magnitude-5 earthquake hits Indonesia

HONG KONG, 9 Jan — An earthquake measuring 5.0 on the Richter scale struck Indonesia at 0820 GMT, Hong Kong Observatory announced Saturday afternoon.

The epicentre was initially determined to be in Sulawesi, at 1.1 degrees south latitude and 120.1 degrees east longitude, which is about 450 km north of Ujung Pandang.—Xinhua

## Four dead in shootingspree in northern Italy

ROME, 9 Jan—A 74-year-old Italian retiree shot dead two neighbors and then his wife Sunday before turning the gun on himself, police said. Jealousy appeared to be behind the rampage in the northern city of Genoa.

Carlo Trabona, a retired bricklayer, first went to a coffee bar where he shot one of his neighbors. As the other one ran away, Trabona followed him, shot him and then went back home where he killed his wife, according to a police reconstruction reported by Italian media.

After police surrounded his building, Trabona shot himself, said Alfredo Federici of the Genoa police. The two neighbors, who were brothers, and the shooter died later in hospital, he said.

Federici said an alleged infidelity may have triggered the shooting spree, as Trabona suspected that his 72-year-old wife had been having an affair with one of the neighbors, who were also his longtime friends. Italian news reports also said the shooter had a history of mental problems.—Internet

## Nearly 600,000 people marooned by floods in Sri Lanka

COLOMBO, 9 Jan — Floods situation in east Sri Lanka has seen no improvement as continuous rains lashed the area over the last two weeks, relief officials said Saturday. "In terms of numbers 588,000 people have been affected. Over 4, 800 are in relief camps. There have been three deaths. We maintain 18 camps for the floods displaced", said Pradeep

Kodippily, deputy director of the National Disaster Management Centre. Meteorologist Merrill Mendis said that a low depression situation has developed in the atmosphere which can cause more rains. "We expect the continuation of the rainy climate in the north and east provinces while sporadic rains can also be experienced in other

parts of the island", Mendis said.

In the central district of Badulla, the residents said no sunshine was experienced during the last 14 days.

The bad weather forced mud slips and landslide warnings with some of the roads covered in mist making it difficult for motorists, authorities said.

## Global fears rise over German meat

BERLIN, 9 Jan—Global fears mounted on Saturday over the safety of German meat due to contaminated animal feed, with South Korea banning pork imports and Slovakia suspending poultry sales.

As the European Union insisted there was no

need for a ban, Germany moved to calm the concerns over food safety with test results showing acceptable levels of dioxin, a potentially cancer-causing chemical compound, in poultry and meat.

The European Commission said South Korea had become the first country to suspend imports of German pork and accused Seoul of overreacting.

“It is a decision which is out of proportion as to what is going on in Germany, but we are going to try to talk with the South Koreans to reassure them,” said Frederic Vincent, spokesman for European health commissioner John Dalli.

Brussels does not consider there are grounds for declaring a ban on exports of German meat or other products from Germany “because the farms have been closed and farm products which have been delivered are blocked, awaiting analysis,” Vincent said.

Slovakia became the first EU country to impose restrictions on German meat, after it suspended sales of poultry meat and eggs while it conducted tests to assess dioxin levels.—*Internet*

## India and Pakistan foreign secretaries may meet in February

NEW DELHI, 9 Jan—Indian foreign secretary Nirupama Rao is likely to meet her Pakistani counterpart in Bhutan’s capital next month, India’s foreign office said on Sunday, as the two nuclear-armed neighbours try to take forward a stalled peace process.

The meeting is likely to take place on the margins of the South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC) standing committee meeting at Thimphu on 6-7 February, the foreign office statement said.

Last week, Indian Foreign Minister SM Krishna said he expects his Pakistani counterpart Shah Mahmood Qureshi to visit India by March.

The two countries’ prime ministers, interior ministers and foreign ministers all met last year, but failed to revive the peace process.—*Reuters*

## Beyond smoking scenes on China’s TV screens

BEIJING, 9 Jan—Smoking pipes, tobacco threads, cigarettes, and dazzling smoking gestures, which are commonly seen on China’s TV screens, have emerged as a clear concern for many supporters of tobacco control.

*Xinhua* reporters, while monitoring seven Chinese television channels, spotted 49 screen shots of smoking from four TV series being aired from 8 pm to 10 pm on 4 Jan.

Of those smoking scenes, some last less than one second while others went on for as long as five seconds. However, these findings were only a small part of the picture.

The China Association on Tobacco

Control (CATC), a non-profit organization, issued a report in August 2010 after monitoring 40 domestic Chinese movies and 30 local TV series.

The results indicated that smoking scenes appeared in 31 movies, with an average of 15 screen shots, while smoking scenes were found in 28 TV series, with an average of 85 such screen shots.

Yang Gonghuan, director of the National Office for Tobacco Control, said though smoking scenes on TV could not be fully counted as tobacco advertisements, they could easily mislead adolescents and leave them without a correct understanding as to what harm tobacco is responsible for.—*Xinhua*

## Fears over readiness of India World Cup venues

NEW DELHI, 9 Jan—Just six weeks before the cricket World Cup, several venues including India’s most famous stadium are chaotic scenes of cranes and rubble, raising fears they will not be ready in time.

The tournament, being held in India, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh from 19 February, will attract huge crowds and worldwide television audiences drawn by the best international players

competing in 49 matches.

But it threatens to be a replay of New Delhi’s recent Commonwealth Games, which instead of marking the arrival of a new, modern India on the world stage became a national embarrassment of delays, shoddy works, and alleged corruption.

As the cricket clock ticks down, anxiety is growing over the preparedness of organizers, with

a ten-million-dollar upgrade to the 80,000-seater Eden Gardens stadium in Kolkata causing the biggest headache.

Amid the diggers, dust and bare concrete, hundreds of labourers wearing virtually no safety equipment are toiling day and night to finish off two new blocks of stands which are still covered in scaffolding.

## China’s homemade jet ARJ21-700 starts cold-weather trial

XI’AN, 9 Jan—The country’s first home-grown regional jet ARJ21-700 is being tested to see how well it performs in the extreme cold of Inner Mongolia Autonomous Region, China’s flight testing establishment said Sunday.

The 78- to 90-seat aircraft completed a 3-

hour flight from Xi’an in Shaanxi Province to Manzhouli City, Inner Mongolia, Thursday, according to the jet’s manufacturer — the Commercial Aircraft Corporation of China (Comac).

A spokesman with the company confirmed the jet’s cold-weather trial would continue for a week to test the performance of its hydraulics and other functions in Manzhouli, where the daily average temperature is 30 below zero.

The jet has a maximum flight range of 3,700 kilometers and maximum altitude of 11,900 meters.

So far, ARJ21-700 has completed more than

900 hours of tests during 400 trial flights since November 2008, when the plane made its first trial flight in Shanghai.

Comac is working to get US Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) certification. If achieved, the ARJ21 will be the first Chinese commercial aircraft to receive US approval.

China’s AVIC International Holding Corporation signed a deal with Comac to sell 100 ARJ21-700 baseline models overseas at an air show held last November in Zhuhai, Guangdong Province, which brought the number of the jet orders to 340 in total.

## Robots massage, clean, and amuse at CES

LAS VEGAS, 9 Jan—The world's first massage robot was at the Consumer Electronics Show (CES) in Las Vegas to soothe those sore from dashing about the gargantuan gadget extravaganza.

Palm-sized WheeMe massagers made by Israel-based startup DreamBots were in a newly established

CES robotics zone with creations ranging from therapeutic mechanical seals to playful lifelike baby dinosaurs.

"It gives you a nice tickling feeling," Karen Slutzky of DreamBots said as a WheeMe maneuvered independently on the back of a woman laying on a massage table at CES, which ends Sunday.

"It is a gentle skin massage; very relaxing. And, it doesn't fall off."

Curvy, car-shaped WheeMe units have wheels designed with "fingerettes" and the robots vibrate.

Invented by Slutzky's husband, Eyal Avramovich, the robots use feedback from sensors to not ride off backs or stomachs and to stop at waistlines.

"It doesn't know where it has been, but it knows where not to go," Slutzky said. "We are working on making it smarter so it can go up onto the bum and down onto the leg."

The couple was showing prototypes at CES and looking for a partner to bring models to the US market late this year.

## Fog in Pakistan diverts visiting German FM plane

ISLAMABAD, 9 Jan—Fog stopped a plane of the German foreign minister from landing in Islamabad on Saturday and diverted it to the eastern city of Lahore, officials said.

Guido Westerwelle was scheduled to arrive in the Pakistani capital of Islamabad on Saturday morning on a two-day visit for talks on bilateral and regional issues, the Foreign Ministry said.

A joint press stakeout by Pakistani Foreign Minister Shah Mahmood Qureshi and the German foreign minister was scheduled to be held at the Foreign Office on Saturday at 2 pm local time, but it may be delayed for several hours, officials said.

The German foreign minister will wait in Lahore unless the fog is reduced or he may travel on road, official sources said.

The German FM is also to meet Prime Minister Syed Yousuf Raza Gilani, sources said.

Dozens of flights have been delayed since the onset of seasonal fog this year which reduced visibility to zero in several areas, making take-off and landing virtually impossible at the Islamabad international airport.

Winter fog has gripped many Pakistani cities including the capital, which has also disrupted traffic on motorways and main highways, officials said.

## Wealthy trader kidnapped in southern Philippines

COTABATO, 9 Jan—Gunmen kidnapped a wealthy Chinese-Filipino trader outside a busy hotel in the southern Philippines, the latest in a rash of abductions in the area in recent months, police said Sunday.

The hotel's security camera showed the men forcibly taking Yuloyu Lim Yu, 56, to a waiting getaway vehicle in Cotabato city late Saturday, regional police spokesman Chief Inspector Alexander Yap said.

"The security guard initially engaged with the kidnappers but they sped off," Yap said.

He said the kidnappers' vehicle was later recovered by authorities, but the whereabouts of the victim was unknown.

Nobody has claimed responsibility for the abduction, but several armed groups, including Muslim separatist rebels, are known to operate in the city and in nearby

In October, gunmen seized Conchita Atienza Tan, 73, the wife of another wealthy trader in Cotabato.

A family driver and a bodyguard were killed when they traded fire with the suspects before they sped away. Tan however was subsequently freed after her family paid ransom.—Internet

## Four Loko to become ethanol

RICHMOND, 9 Jan—A Virginia company said it is recycling the alcohol from leftover stores of banned beverage Four Loko to make ethanol.

MXI Enterprises of Richmond said the Four Loko, which was made by Phusion Projects of Chicago and was recently banned in several states because of its combination of high alcohol and caffeine levels, would be recycled, KSWB-TV, San Diego, reported Friday.

Mike Lewis, owner of Pearson Fuels in San Diego, said it is not unusual for beverages to be recycled into ethanol.

## 10-year-old girl survives Venezuela plane crash

CARACAS, 9 Jan—A 10-year-old girl has survived a plane crash in western Venezuela that killed the five other people on board, apparently her family members.

Amilcar Mendes, the civil protection director in western Cojedes state, says the small, PN68 plane crashed on the edge of a farm in the municipality of Lima Blanco.

Mendes says two men and three women on board died, while the girl survived without injuries. The six were apparently from the same family.

The plane apparently took off from the Caribbean island of Margarita en route to an airport in Valles de Tuy, about 20 miles (30 kilometres) southeast of Caracas. The cause of the accident has still not been determined.—Internet

## 14 decapitated bodies found in Mexico resort city

ACAPULCO, 9 Jan—The bodies of 15 men, all but one of them headless, were found on a street outside a shopping centre in Acapulco on Saturday as police reported 27 people slain in the Pacific resort in less than a day.

The decapitated victims, all of whom appeared to be in their 20s, were discovered in an area not frequented by tourists.

Handwritten signs left with the bodies were signed by "El Chapo's People" — a reference to the Sinaloa cartel, headed by drug lord Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman — said Fernando Monreal Leyva, director of investigative police for Guerrero state, where Acapulco is located.

The narco-messages indicated the Sinaloa cartel killed them for trying to intrude on the gang's turf and extort residents. Authorities said there were at least three minors among the dead.

Mexico's drug cartels have increasingly taken to beheading their victims in a grisly show of force, but Saturday's discovery was the largest single group of decapitation victims found in recent years.

Acapulco has been the site of fierce battles between drug gangs, and this weekend got off to a bloody start with 27 people killed there from Friday evening to early Saturday, Leyva said.—Internet

## Alaska pipeline shut down after leak discovered

ANCHORAGE, 9 Jan—The Trans Alaska Pipeline shut down on Saturday after an oil leak was discovered at the intake pump station at Prudhoe Bay, the system's operator said. Alyeska Pipeline

Service Co, the operator of the 800-mile (1,280 kilometre) line, said the leak was discovered Saturday morning and oil producers have been instructed to cut output to 5 percent of normal rates.

Alyeska is owned by oil companies with interests on the North Slope. Major owners are BP, Conoco-Phillips and Exxon Mobil Corp. BP, which operates the Prudhoe Bay field, has started the process of reducing production, said company spokesman Steve Rinehart.

"I can't give you an estimate of how long it will take to get down to 5 percent, but we are working quickly and safely to do that," he said. Tasks include freeze-protecting lines and facilities, he said.

The leak appears to be from a second pipeline encased in concrete adjacent to the pump station building and a response crew has been sent to the site to assess ways to contain the oil leak and start cleanup and repairs, Alyeska said.

## 'Dramatic' rain warning for flood-soaked Australia

SYDNEY, 9 Jan—Heavy rains falling on Australia's flooded north-east could have a "dramatic" impact, officials warned Sunday, stretching already swollen rivers and creeks to their limit across the devastated region.

Queensland police commissioner Alistair Dawson said that severe weather lashing the already sodden northeastern state could bring flash flooding to currently dry areas with little warning.

"Waters will rise quickly—you may not be aware of that rise," Dawson told reporters. "Those places which have gone under before, especially on the road system, could well flood

again within an hour."

Emergency chief Warren Bridson said the unprecedented deluge — which has hit an area larger than France and Germany combined, paralysing the key agricultural and coal-mining region — meant the rain's impact was unpredictable.

"The ground is so waterlogged, the catchme

nts so primed, the rivers so full, the creeks are all flooding, and it will mean something more dramatic than it has in the past," Bridson said.

"That 200 millimetres (eight inches) of rain could mean the difference between a minor flood and a major flood," he added.

## Brazil government says 100K displaced by floods

RIO DE JANEIRO, 9 Jan—Brazilian authorities say the number of people left homeless by flooding has risen to about 100,000 in four southeastern states.

Reports from regional civil defence authorities show Minas Gerais state has been hit the hardest, with 16 dead there as of Friday. More than 4,000 homes have been

damaged by rising water and landslides, and about 170 destroyed.

Eleven more are dead in Sao Paulo state, where 57 cities are in a state of emergency, including the capital.

Main thoroughfares in Sao Paulo city were swamped Saturday, and some smaller towns were entirely submerged.

 They may be living the good life here in captivity but, in the wild, the South African penguin

is in trouble. It is the only penguin species that breeds in Africa and it's numbers are plummeting.  
 In 2010, the penguin was added to the US Endangered Species list. In a little over a century, their numbers have dropped from more than a million to fewer than 80,000 and if current trends continue - experts say none will be left in the wild in a few short decades.  
 Biologists at the California Academy of Sciences, along with zoos across North America are

working to ensure that the penguins have a fighting chance. Brooke Weinstein is a biologist at the Academy.

We work together with numerous other zoos and aquarium in North America just to make sure that we are maintaining a genetically viable population of these birds in captivity."

The bus takes workers from the towns of Neskaupstadur and Eskifjordur on Iceland's east coast to the smelter

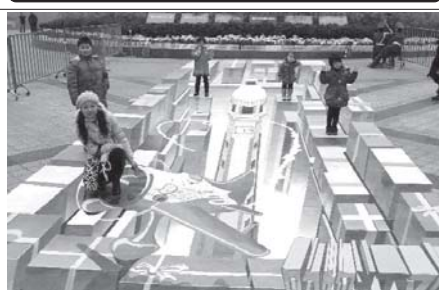
in Reydarfjordur, *Iceland Review* said.

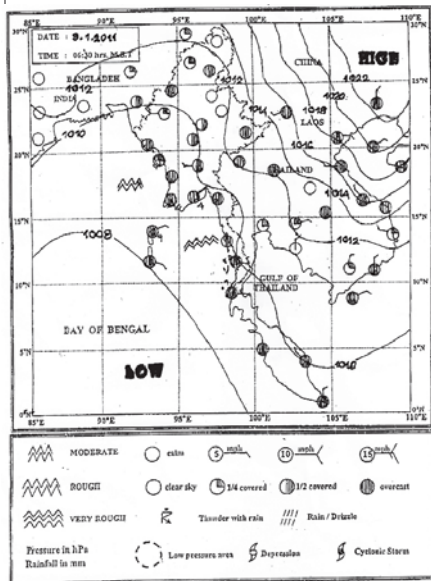

M.S.T.** During the past 24 hours, rain has been fairly widespread in Yangon and Ayeyawady Regions, scattered in Shan State, isolated in Chin, Kayah and Kayin States, Upper Sagaing, Mandalay, Magway and Bago Regions and weather has been partly cloudy over the remaining States and Regions. Night temperatures were (4°C) below January average temperature in Kachin State, (3°C) to (4°C) above January average temperatures in Chin State, Yangon and Ayeyawady Regions, (5°C) to (6°C) above January average temperatures in Shan, Rakhine, Kayin and Mon States, Lower Sagaing, Mandalay, Magway and Bago Regions and about January average temperatures in the remaining States and Regions. The significant night temperatures were Putao (3°C), Machanbaw (4°C) and Haka (5°C). The noteworthy amount of rainfall recorded were Nahsam (0.39) inch, Cocogyun (0.35) inch, Taunggyi (0.32) inch and Yangon (Kaba-Aye) (0.16) inch.

**Nay Pyi Taw**

Maximum temperature on 8-1-2011 was 82°F. Minimum temperature on 9-1-2011 was 68°F. Relative humidity at (09:30) hours MST on 9-1-2011 was (66%). Rainfall on 9-1-2011 was (Tr).

**Yangon (Kaba-Aye)**

Maximum temperature on 8-1-2011 was 82°F. Minimum temperature on 9-1-2011 was 67°F. Relative humidity at (09:30) hours MST on 9-1-2011 was (88%). Total sunshine hours on 8-1-2011 was (Nil).

Rainfall on 9-1-2011 was (0.04) inch at Mingaladon, (0.16) inch at Kaba-Aye and (0.12) inch at Central Yangon. Total rainfall since 1-1-2011 was (0.12) inch at Mingaladon, (0.20) inch at Kaba-Aye and Central Yangon. Maximum wind speed at Yangon (Kaba-Aye) was (5) mph from Northeast at (12:30) hours MST on 8-1-2011.

### Highly-recommended Innzin Village bean curd

Bean curd, one of the Myanmar traditional foods, is consumed as salad, crispy or dish.

For Myanmar people, it is mouthwatering to see bean curd salad which is made of bean curd sticks, cooked oil with turmeric power, onion and garlic, and cut *nannan* or lemon leaves. It can also be used as a side dish.

Bean curd is also consumed as crisp. Green tea makes an excellent accompaniment to bean

curd crisp. In Shan State, bean cured crisp is consumed as an additional food after *si-chet* noodles (boiled noodles with cooked oil added and garnished with shredded meat), rice noodles, and Shan noodles. In upper Myanmar, it is consumed as a rich dish.

We sometimes go shopping in Myoma Market in Tatkon Township, Nay Pyi Taw District. Many of the shops in the market are bean curd shops. Bean curd sellers are hospitable to shoppers. Like sales assistants of Hto-mont (pudding made of glutinous rice, sugar, coconut and oil) shops in Mandalay, keepers of bean curd shops in the market present shoppers some bean curd to try it, which is to lure shoppers into buying their product.

Bean curd in Myoma Market is recommended. Being fairly hard, bean curd in the market does not go bad easily, lasting for several days. Some buy and carry it to other townships for consumption.

Observing bean curd shops in Myoma Market in Tatkon Township, I became curious about the product. When asked about her product, seller Daw Khin Htar told the Myanma Alin, "Shopkeepers of the bean curd shops in this market are all from Innzin Village. Innzin Village is in the south of Yamethin. Most of the houses in our village make bean curd for their main business. Here, there are about 30 bean curd shops. Villagers also run their bean curd shops in downtown Yamethin,
