Bomb kills 9 wedding guests in Afghanistan

Violence across Afghanistan at its worst since 2001

PUL-E-KHUMRI, (Afghanistan) 16 Jan —A roadside bomb destroyed a car carrying nine people to a wedding in northern Afghanistan on Sunday, killing everyone inside including one child, the provincial governor said.

The previous day, six civilians were killed by a roadside bomb in southern Helmand Province and another six died after an airstrike by foreign forces in mountainous eastern Kunar, local officials said.

Three children were among the dead in the airborne attack on two houses in the Kodagai area which straddles Kunar's Dangam and Shigal Districts, Sultan Sediqi, a member of the provincial council, told *Reuters*.

Violence across Afghanistan is at its worst since the 2001 overthrow of the Taliban government, with the insurgency spreading rapidly in previously peaceful areas such as the north, and civilian and military casualties at record levels.

S Lanka mine fears as floods recede

COLOMBO, 16 Jan— Unexploded mines planted during Sri Lanka's Tamil separatist war may have shifted during recent floods, officials said Sunday, as residents started to return to their badly-damaged homes and farms.

More than one million people were initially displaced in the flooding, with the east of the island worst affected by a week of unusually heavy monsoon rains. The disaster management centre in Colombo said that 37 people were confirmed dead with another 12 missing, as

water levels fell in some areas and residents ventured back home to survey the devastation.

"Floods and receding waters may unearth mines and explosive remnants of war and carry explosives from contaminated areas into areas thought to be safe," the United Nations situation report said. It warned that local authorities had advised residents and aid workers to keep alert for shifted mines, and added that mine clearance agencies were deciding whether areas needed to be re-surveyed after the flooding.—Internet

Iran says two downed spy planes were US-operated

TEHRAN, 16 Jan—Iran said Saturday it has determined that two pilotless spy planes it claims to have shot down were operated by the United States, and offered to put them on public display.

The air force of Iran's powerful Revolutionary Guard said earlier this month that it shot down two highly advanced spy planes that had violated Iranian airspace. It provided no timeframe or proof. The US Navy's 5th Fleet, which is based in the Gulf, said at the time that it had no reports of any aircraft downed recently.

On Saturday, Iran's semiofficial *Fars* news agency quoted the head of the Guard's naval force, Gen Ali Fadavi, as saying Teheran will show the two small reconnaissance planes publicly.

"These aircraft are now in our possession," Fadavi was quoted as saying. "We will definitely display them at an appropriate time." It was not clear when Iran downed the pilotless planes, but Iranian officials have hinted that they deliberately didn't make an announcement at the time to avoid tensions with the US.

Four moderate earthquakes hit Indonesia's Aceh

JAKARTA, 16 Jan— Four moderate earthquakes measuring 5.0-5.9 on the Richter scale rocked Indonesia's Aceh Province on Saturday, with the strongest one being felt at Sinabang city that lies near the epicenter, the Meteorology, Climatology and Geophysics said in a statement.

The earthquakes were centered at 14-265 kilometres southwest and west of Sinabang city and at depth of 14-23 kilometres under seabed.

According to the agency, the earthquakes were occurred at 18:23 local time (1123 GMT), 18:36 (1136 GMT), 18:45 (1145) and 23:26 (1626 GMT).

The agency did not release a tsunami warning. *Xinhua*

Two militants killed in Afghan operation

KABUL, 16 Jan— NATO forces say international and Afghan troops have killed two militants during a raid on a compound in eastern Afghanistan. NATO says in a statement that the troops were searching for a local Taliban leader in eastern Wardak Province when they came under fire Saturday in Nerkh District.

They shot back, killing two militants. The troops also detained two suspected militants. The international military coalition did not say in Sunday's statement if the targeted Taliban leader was among those killed or captured.—Internet

Three US service members killed in Iraq

BAGHDAD, 16 Jan— Three American soldiers were killed and one wounded in Iraq on Saturday, raising to five the number of service members from the United States killed here since the beginning of the year.

At the Ghazlani Training Centre, south of Mosul, American soldiers were training Iraqi forces Saturday morning when a trainee opened fire on his trainers, according to an Iraqi Army officer.

The exercise was meant to be conducted without live fire, said the officer, who was speaking on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to speak to the news media, but the Iraqi soldier had stolen live ammunition for his AK-47 rifle. He killed two American soldiers and wounded one, according to Iraqi and American military officials. The Iraqi trainee was killed, the Iraqi military officer said. The wounded service member was evacuated to Joint Base Balad, according to the United States military.—Internet

Rocks in Canada gives clues to deep Earth

REGINA, 16 Jan—Scientists say an area of exposed rock in northwest Saskatchewan is a window into the formation of the Earth’s crust billions of years ago.

The area, dubbed the Athabasca granulite terrane, is exciting geologists who say they would have to somehow transport themselves 25 miles below the planet’s surface to see features they can observe underfoot while strolling around hundreds of acres of rocky outcrop. *Postmedia News* reported this week.

The formation was created when a vast amount of molten rock was thrust up from the Earth’s lower crust before solidifying at the surface 2 billion years ago.

While similar features exist around the world, none are as expansive or

varied in the clues they offer into the planet’s hidden depths, scientists say.

“We do not have the technology to drill anywhere near to the lower crust,” Michael Williams, a geoscientist at the University of Massachusetts, says.

“But in northern Saskatchewan, we can walk around on lower crust, mapping and sampling. Even if we could drill that deep, we would only get a small round core of rock to look at. In Saskatchewan, we have acres of exposure.”—*Internet*

Extra shuttle mission this year in doubt

CAPE CANAVERAL, 16 Jan—Delays in the space shuttle *Discovery*’s mission for repairs to its fuel tank raise doubts about an extra shuttle mission this year, US officials say.

Two more shuttle trips were planned before the aging three-orbiter fleet was to be retired when a third, final mission was approved by Congress last year in a NASA authorization bill signed by President Barack Obama, SPACE.com reported.

But funding for the measure has not been appropriated as the country operates under a continuing resolution, freezing NASA at 2010 funding levels until Congress can agree on a formal budget.

Sen Bill Nelson, D-Fla, said the issues with *Discovery*’s fuel tank and its ongoing repairs don’t bode well for the extra mission.

“If worst came to worst and they felt like this tank was not safe, they would stand down and at that point would only fly two more shuttle flights instead of the three that are authorized,” Nelson said.

Overfishing blamed for ocean reef loss

SANTA CRUZ, 16 Jan—Overfishing of reefs leads to explosions in populations of sea urchins, which destroy coral algae that build tropical reef systems, US researchers say.

An 18-year study of Kenya’s coral reefs by the Wildlife Conservation Society and the University of California at Santa Cruz has found in contrast, reef systems closed to fishing have fewer sea urchins because predatory fish keep them under control, with resulting higher coral growth rates and more structure, a WCS release said Friday.

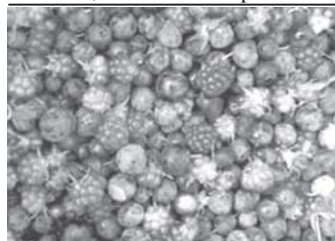
Large numbers of grazing sea urchins reduced the abundance of crustose coralline algae, a species of algae that produce calcium carbonate, the basic

building material of ocean reefs, researchers found.

“These under-appreciated coralline algae are known to bind and stabilize reef skeletons and sand as well as enhance the recruitment of small corals by providing a place for their larvae to settle,” WCS Senior Conservationist Tim McClanahan says. “This study illustrates the cascading effects of predator loss on a reef system and the importance of maintaining fish populations for coral health.”

The study shows improving the management of tropical fisheries can help reefs to grow and persist in a changing climate, researchers say.

Researchers create software for designing genetic circuits

SAN FRANCISCO, 16 Jan—Creating your own genetic circuits may sound like science fiction, but that’s what they said about the sun being the center of the galaxy. Researchers the University of California, San Francisco, along with the company Life Technologies, are working together to create the first software that would let bioengineers (and mad-scientists) design complete

genetic circuits.

Technology Review has a video and the scoop on the latest in building pathways that cells use to run a task. Basically, genes, proteins and other molecules would use these pathways to do things like turn sugar into fuel or make a certain drug for pharmaceuticals. Voigt and his team say that with their software, designing a microbe for a particular task will be like writing a new computer programme (DNA++?). Be sure to give the full story a read.

British company using E-Ink to make tanks invisible

LONDON, 16 Jan—E-ink isn’t just for reading anymore. Scientists with BAESystems are developing technology that would use electronic ink to camouflage tanks.

According to a report in *The Telegraph*, high-tech sensors would be fixed to the body of the tank that would mirror the vehicle’s surroundings, making it essentially invisible.

“Highly sophisticated electronic sensors attached to the tank’s hull will project images of the surrounding environment back onto the outside of the vehicle enabling it to merge into the landscape and evade attack,” wrote Sean Rayment, *The Telegraph*’s defence correspondent. “The electronic camouflage will enable the vehicle to blend into the surrounding countryside in much the same way that a squid uses ink to help as a disguise.”

Traditional personal camouflage is limited in its function because it lacks versatility; it can’t just change colours or forms. But personal camouflage has evolved since it was first used in the 19th century.

Smoking causes gene damage in minutes

WASHINGTON, 16 Jan—Those first few puffs on a cigarette can within minutes cause genetic damage linked to cancer, US scientists said in a study released Saturday.

In fact, researchers said the “effect is so fast that it’s equivalent to injecting the substance directly into the bloodstream,” in findings described as a “stark warning” to those who smoke.

The study is the first on humans to track how substances in tobacco cause DNA damage, and appears in the peer-reviewed journal *Chemical Research in Toxicology*, issued by the American Chemical Society.

Using 12 volunteer smokers, scientists tracked pollutants called PAHs, or polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons, that are carried in tobacco smoke

and can also be found in coal-burning plants and in charred barbecue food.

They followed one particular type — phenanthrene, which is found in cigarette smoke — through the blood and saw it form a toxic substance that is known to “trash DNA, causing mutations that can cause cancer,” the study said.

Researchers developing new malaria vaccine

LONDON, 16 Jan—A vaccine that nearly halves the chance of catching malaria could save hundreds of thousands of lives annually, scientists in Britain said.

Research published Friday online in *The Lancet Infectious Diseases* said the vaccine cuts the risk of infection by the parasite that causes severe malaria by 46 percent over 15 months, *The Daily*

Telegraph reported.

The vaccine attacks the parasite that causes malaria when it first enters the bloodstream or liver cells, and even though it doesn’t offer complete protection, it could save countless lives, the report said.

The vaccine “shows promise as a potential public health intervention against childhood malaria in malaria endemic countries,” said Dr Ally

Olotu of the Kenya Medical Research Institute-Wellcome Trust Research Programme, which led the study.

Malaria is passed to humans by infected mosquitoes and is one of the biggest killers of children in Africa.

Of the nearly 1 million people killed by the disease across Africa each year, the majority are children under 5.

TORONTO, 16 Jan—A Canadian company is developing scents aimed at keeping customers inside businesses longer, giving them more time to spend money, officials said.

Mood Media, a Canadian company listed on the London Stock Exchange, has already developed scents called “Lotus Flower” and “Enchanted Apple” and is working with over 20,000 shops in Britain to

boost their sales, *The Daily Telegraph* reported. Mood Media has created scents for Habitat, the furniture shop, Timberland, the outdoor clothing retailer and Guess, a fashion chain. “If a shop smells bad, a customer will walk out. It’s as simple as that. The longer you can get a customer to stay in the store, the more likely they are to buy,” said Mood Media’s chief executive, Lorne Abony.—Internet

China should be cautious of inflation, excess liquidity

BEIJING, 16 Jan—China should be cautious of inflation and prevent the effects of excess liquidity, Fan Gang, a former advisor to the country’s central bank, said Saturday.

The loose credit policy of the United States is pumping money into the market and increasing expectations for the depreciation of the US dollar and the appreciation of other currencies, including the Chinese yuan, Fan told the annual meeting of China’s economy (2010-2011) in Beijing.

The policy is reasonable for its own economy but will cause serious problems for the world, he said.—Xinhua

UK economy faces 20% risk of slipping back into a recession, CEBR Says

LONDON, 16 Jan—The UK economy faces a 20 percent chance of slipping into another recession as rising unemployment and faster inflation weigh on growth, the Centre for Economics and Business Research said.

The UK economy will grow 1.1 percent this year, the London-based research group said in an e-mailed statement today, revising an October forecast for expansion of 1.3 percent. The lower pace of growth raises the risk of a second slump from an earlier assessment of 10 percent, it said.

The revision is due to “persistently weak labour-market indicators and large

rises in consumer prices,” said Scott Corfe, an economist at the CEBR. “It is difficult to see where significant growth will come from given that domestic demand is likely to be weak.”

The CEBR said the Bank of England will probably have to expand bond purchases, though doing so will depend on a drop in the inflation rate, which at 3.3 percent in November was above the government’s upper limit. The central bank yesterday held its bond plan at 200 billion pounds (\$317 billion) and its benchmark interest rate at a record low of 0.5 percent.—Internet

The Kumily government hospital, around 15 km from the accident site in the Idukki District, deployed a team of 60 doctors to conduct post mortem only.

“As many as 20

autopsies are being conducted at a time,” the hospital sources informed.

“Around 71 bodies have so far reached the Vandiperiyar hospital, where all the bodies are being brought, after which their autopsy is being conducted at Kumily,” Idukki Congress Member of Parliament (MP) PT Thomas told *Xinhua*.

Additionally, 86 doctors and 305 other health staff from various hospitals in Alappuzha, Idukki, Pathanamthitta, Ernakulam and Kottayam Districts are attending to stampede victims. Thirty-three ambulances were deployed to bring the dead and injured ones from the spot and send them to their native places.—*Xinhua*

Green schools combat bad diets in Philippines

MANILA, 16 Jan—The Philippines is transforming primary school yards into vegetable gardens in a bid to fight US-inspired junk food addictions that are causing an explosion of health problems throughout society.

At one of the showcase schools in Manila for the burgeoning health food project, teachers and students are joined by parents in tending lush plots that have an assortment of vegetables.

Every available space is used to grow nutritious greens that are harvested in cycles as free food for the school's mostly poor students or sold as part of a livelihood project for

their families.

Where there is no soil, portable hydroponic gardening is promoted using discarded plastic bottles as water receptacles for plants that hang symmetrically in rows.

“It's amazing what

many things you can do with a little innovation, and a little bit of imagination,” Paranaque Central Elementary School principal Edita Baggayan, 65, told *AFP* while inspecting some tomatoes in a mini-greenhouse.—*Internet*

10 Bangladesh policemen killed in road accident

DHAKA, 16 Jan—An official says 10 policemen have been killed when their jeep collided head-on with a truck in eastern Bangladesh.

Local police official Bijoy Basak says the policemen were on their way Saturday to a meeting to discuss law and order in Narsingdi district, about 40 kilometers (25 miles) east of Dhaka.

He says one policeman in the group survived with minor injuries.

Fatal road accidents, often blamed on poor driving and faulty vehicles, claim more than 10,000 lives in Bangladesh every year.

Five fishermen missing, six saved after fishing boat sinks off south China coast

GUANGZHOU, 16 Jan—Six fishermen have been rescued while five remain missing after their boat sank in high waves off the south China coast near Guangdong Province Saturday morning, reported rescuers.

The South China Sea Rescue Bureau of the Ministry of Transport received a report at 6:23 am that a fishing boat with 11 people aboard sank near Wanshan island. The bureau sent a rescue boat and a helicopter to the scene, according to the bureau spokesman.

Six fishermen on a life raft were picked up by the helicopter at 1:15 pm, said the spokesman.

Further, one body was spotted by the crew on the rescue boat, but they failed to retrieve it due to gusting winds and strong waves. It is unknown whether the body was one of the missing fishermen, said the spokesman.

Brazil slide survivors left to fend on own

TERESOPOLIS, 16 Jan—Pointing at the cliff of crumbling red clay, Renato Motta de Lima described a landscape that now existed only in memory: here, his grandmother's house; there, the church; below, a banana grove and the home of an aunt, uncle and the shy teenager who was his cousin.

They and scores of neighbours from Cascata do Imbui lay buried underneath mud and debris at the bottom of the once-lush hillside, victims of massive mudslides that killed at least 610 people this week. Body parts were visible in the muck Saturday, with one hand jutting out from under a

massive tree trunk as if reaching for help. Officials fear the death toll could climb once they can fully access remote villages like this one.

No help — food, water, medication — had reached the survivors here by Saturday other than what little residents in flip-flops could haul in by foot from the centre of Teresopolis, slung over their shoulders in supermarket bags. Two avalanches wiped out the road leading to the Cascata do Imbui neighbourhood, leaving in places only a cracked ribbon of asphalt perched over an abyss. “This was a beautiful place. It was a happy place,” Motta de Lima said.

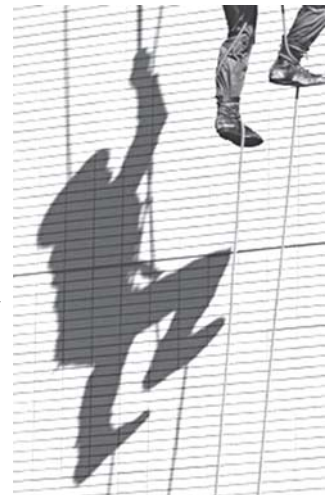

Toyota may shift to foreign production

TOKYO, 16 Jan—Toyota Motor will consider shifting factories overseas if the yen stays high and puts pressure on its profits, the company president said.

“We do not wish to relocate production sites because of currencies and foreign exchange alone,” Akio Toyoda said in a Japanese-language online message dated Friday.

However, he added, “if profits cannot be generated” despite efforts towards efficient, good-quality manufacturing and training, “we have no choice but to consider relocation of production sites as a real possibility.”

The company plans to release a fresh medium-term business plan in April, he added.

Japanese exporters, led by automakers and electronics producers, have come under pressure from the rising yen in recent months.

A strong yen makes Japanese exports relatively more expensive in foreign markets, while shrinking the value of Japanese firms’ overseas earnings when repatriated.

Meanwhile, Japanese automakers have been shifting more of their production and sales overseas — particularly to growing Asian markets — as younger Japanese motorists avoid car purchases due to the high costs of fuel, maintenance and tax.

Lance Armstrong set for ride ‘into the sunset’

ADELAIDE, 16 Jan—International cycling icon Lance Armstrong says he will not be expecting a ticker-tape farewell ahead of his competitive swansong at the Tour Down Under this week.

Australia’s premier cycling event has been steadily gathering in stature and Armstrong’s presence gives the Adelaide-based race, which begins with a hectic street criterium on Sunday, an extra boost.

After years of courting almost as much controversy as he did success on seven golden years on the Tour de France, it will be the American’s final

international cycling event. Cancer survivor Armstrong retired in 2005, only to return to cycling three-and-a-half years later ahead of what became a futile bid for an

eighth yellow jersey. Having finished an impressive third overall on the Tour de France in 2009, the 2010 edition proved a step too far for the now 39-year-old, who colla-

psed spectacularly on the first day in the high mountains.

There is no question of Armstrong aiming for victory this week, never mind success in one of the six stages that will be coveted by a strong sprint field. Indeed, organisers may be wondering how much of a starring role Armstrong will play.

As retirement looms, he remains the subject of a federal investigation, launched in the wake of arguably the most serious doping allegations — levelled by former teammate Floyd Landis — to blight his stunning career.—Internet

GM expands recall of some 2011 trucks and SUVs

NEW YORK, 16 Jan—General Motors is expanding an earlier recall of some 2011 model-year trucks and SUVs to fix a problem that could cause the vehicles’ rear axles to lock.

The recall, originally announced in December, now covers 26,751 Cadillac, Chevrolet and GMC trucks and SUVs. The models affected are: Cadillac Escalade, Escalade ESV, Cadillac EXT, Chevrolet Avalanche, Colorado, Silverado, Suburban, Tahoe; and GMC Canyon, Sierra, Yukon and Yukon XL.

GM said rear-axle cross pins, used to hold the axle in place, weren’t properly heat-treated and may not be durable. They can fracture, interfere with the axle and cause it to lock. The driver could then lose control of the vehicle.

One customer has reported a loss of power to the axle, GM says. But no crashes have been reported.

GM says owners of the vehicles are being contacted and urged against driving the trucks until the axle pin is replaced.

More than 80 skiers rescued after Ohio lift stalls

CHESTERLAND, 16 Jan—A chairlift stalled Saturday at a northeast Ohio ski resort, leaving more than 80 people stuck for several hours until emergency crews used ropes and a pulley to lower them to safety, authorities said. No injuries were reported.

The ski lift at Alpine Valley in Munson Township malfunctioned at about 2:30 pm, leaving the skiers and snowboarders dangling at least 30 feet from the ground, said Chief Scott Hildenbrand of the Hambden Fire Department, one of the agencies that

responded. Crews threw blankets and hand warmers to the skiers so they would stay warm until they were rescued, which Hildenbrand said took about three hours. Medics checked the skiers after they were on the ground; none needed to go to the hospital, Hildenbrand said.

“If this is the worst that happens, I’ll take this,” said Rich Gent, a skier who was among the 85 or so people stranded on the lift. “We weren’t stuck in an avalanche or anything crazy like that.”

Germany bans 934 more farms in dioxin scare

BERLIN, 16 Jan—Germany’s dioxin-tainted food scandal widened Saturday, as authorities banned another 934 farms from selling eggs, poultry and pork after finding out that one company had hidden its deliveries of contaminated livestock feed.

Prosecutors in Lower Saxony state have opened an investigation after finding out about the tainted feed deliveries to those farms, Agriculture Minister Ilse Aigner said. “This is a scandal within the scandal,” she said.

Lower Saxony’s agriculture ministry said products from those farms have likely been sold over the past ten days, “mostly

eggs.” But it reiterated its assessment that “consumption of these goods does not pose a health risk” given the low contamination level.

The scandal broke last week when investigators found excessive levels of dioxin in eggs and chickens, leading authorities to slaughter hundreds of animals and freeze sales

from more than 5,000 farms. Excessive dioxin levels were also found in some pork.

As of Friday, all but 400 farms had been cleared and allowed to resume selling their products, but South Korea and China kept their bans on imports of German pork and poultry.

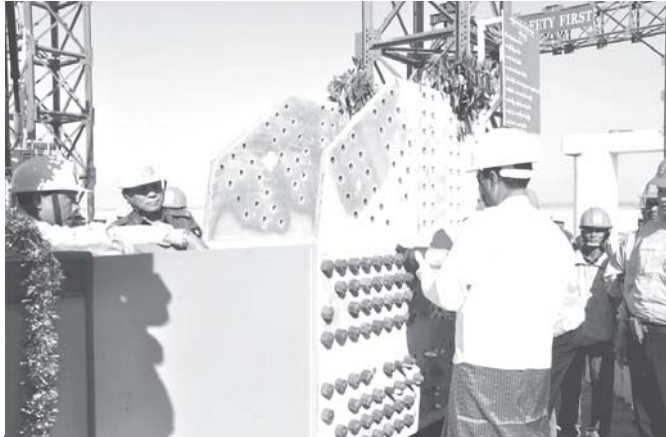

China gets first overseas order for LNG ships

BEIJING, 16 Jan—China State Shipbuilding Corporation (CSSC) signed a contract with Exxon Mobil and Mitsui & Co, Ltd on Saturday to build four LNG ships (liquefied natural gas), the nation's first overseas order for such an advanced carrier.

Hudong-Zhonghua Shipbuilding (Group) Co, Ltd, a subsidiary of CSSC, will build the ships for Mitsui, a Japanese shipping giant.

The ships are scheduled for delivery between 2015 and 2016. The fleet will be used for shipping China's imports of liquefied natural gas from Australia and Papua New Guinea.

In 2009, Exxon Mobil contracted with China's major oil and gas producer PetroChina and refiner Sinopec to transport exports about 425 tonnes of liquefied natural gas per year.

A liquefied natural gas carrier is a tanker ship designed for transporting liquefied gas at a temperature of minus 163 degrees Celsius, and marks an important part in the LNG supply chain.

Only a handful of nations, such as the United States, Japan and the Republic of Korea, have the ability to build such ships.—Xinhua

BRISBANE, 16 Jan—Brisbane is a travel hub for tourists and the gateway to the pristine beaches, rugged outback, tropical rainforests and Great Barrier Reef of Australia's famed 'Sunshine State'.

But the floodwaters that surged through the city last week, depositing tonnes of putrid mud and debris, have shut down Brisbane's arts precinct, closed cafes, damaged hotels and scarred the image of tourist friendly Queensland.

"We depend on backpackers, yes, they are scared, they don't want to go to Fraser Island or the Whitsundays, or the Gold Coast, they are afraid of being stuck on the road," explains Lindsey Frazer of backpacker specialist Wicked Travel.

At the Cloud 9 hotel, which caters to backpackers, guest numbers are down.

"We were pretty much full at the start of the flooding," says receptionist Andrew Josey. "But people have been scared of the lack of electricity."

In Brisbane's Transit Centre, shops and travel counters are closed, and tourists scramble for the latest information on roads and transport.

How to combat test anxiety

CHICAGO, 16 Jan—A US expert on "choking under pressure" advises anxious test-takers to write about their worries before taking an exam.

Senior author Sian Beilock of the University of Chicago says students prone to test anxiety who wrote out what caused their fears ahead of a "high-stakes test" improved scores by nearly one grade point.

"We reasoned that if worries lead to poor test performance and writing helps regulate these worries, then giving students the opportunity to express their thoughts and feelings about an impending examination would enhance test performance," Beilock says in a statement.

The study published in the journal *Science* found exam-takers known to choke under pressure showed a 12 percent accuracy drop from pre-stress testing to post-stress choking under pressure testing.

However, students under the same stress but allowed to write about their anxieties experienced improved test scores.

"Despite the fact that people are often motivated to perform their best, the pressure-filled situations in which important tests, presentations and matches occur can cause people to perform below their ability level instead," Beilock says.

US automakers draw big crowds at Detroit auto show

DETROIT, 16 Jan—Sharp designs with pizzazz, power and elegance helped pull in crowds during the public opening Saturday of the North American International Auto Show, with US automakers doing their best to impress consumers looking for signs of the industry's recovery.

Thousands of people from around the world filed from exhibit to exhibit inside the sprawling Cobo Centre in Detroit. They perused the newest models from General Motors, Ford Motor Co and Chrysler, as well as top competition from Europe and Asia.

"The last two years, people would come and look. But now, they are sitting in the vehicles and asking questions," said 43-year-old Sherry Fedewa, a manager in an auto parts company. "People can

actually afford to buy something."

New car and truck sales came in last year at 11.6 million, up 11 percent from 2009. December sales rose to 1.14 million, an 11 percent leap from a year earlier.

The annual auto show often gives consumers and car enthusiasts their first close look at the new

vehicles, engine upgrades and gadgets coming off the assembly line each year.

Amid renewed optimism in the American auto industry, organizers expect higher attendance than last year's 714,000 visitors — and auto companies worked to convince them that the industry and region were recovering.—Internet

Somali pirates hijack Norwegian owned chemical tanker

NAIROBI, 16 Jan—Somali pirates have hijacked a Norwegian owned chemical tanker in the pirate-infested waters off the coast of the Horn of Africa nation, a regional maritime official confirmed on Saturday.

Andrew Mwangura, East Africa Coordinator of the Seafarers Assistance programme said the South Korean operated, Malta-flagged *Samho Jewelry* was hijacked on Saturday with 21 crew members onboard. "The ship was 10,000-dwt chemical tanker, *Samho Jewelry* with 21 crew members" Mwangura told *Xinhua* by telephone from Mombasa.

He said the vessel was on her way from the United Arab Emirates to Sri Lanka.

The pirates have intensified their action in the Indian Ocean and Gulf of Aden and most of hijackings end without casualties when a ransom has been paid, but often after several months of negotiations.

Doctors open breathing hole in Giffords' throat

TUSCON, 16 Jan—Doctors performed a tracheotomy on Congresswoman Gabrielle Giffords on Saturday, inserting a breathing tube through a hole in her neck and removing her from a ventilator, hospital officials said.

It was the first time Giffords was removed from the ventilator since last Saturday, when she

arrived at University Medical Centre after a gunman shot her through the head.

Giffords, 40, remains the only patient in critical condition from the shooting that wounded 12 others. Six more victims were killed in the rampage.

One patient was discharged on Saturday, and two remain hospitalized in good

1.5 mln sit China's graduate school entrance exam

BEIJING, 16 Jan—Some 1.5 million Chinese began sitting this year's graduate school entrance examination Saturday, a 7 percent increase over last year.

The number of test takers was the highest since 2001, Ministry of Education statistics show.

Chinese college students and college graduates have to take a written examination to enter graduate school.

Since landing a job after graduation has been

difficult in recent years, the number of college graduates applying for graduate studies has increased.

China has expanded graduate studies for professional degrees, asking graduate schools to shift students out of research-oriented degrees into profession-oriented ones. Of the 1.5 million test takers, around 20 percent, or 305,000, hope to enter professional degree programmes.

Bus veers into stream, killing 20 in South Africa

JOHANNESBURG, 16 Jan—Police say 20 people died when a burst tire sent a passenger bus out of control in central South Africa and caused it to veer into a muddy stream.

Police said Saturday the dead included a child of about eight months and the driver. Another 18 passengers were injured. Transport Minister Sibusiso Ndebele sent experts to investigate and offered condolences to the victims. Reckless driving — sometimes fueled by alcohol — and poor maintenance of mass transportation vehicles are often cited in deadly accidents. The transport minister launched a crackdown in October, stepping up spot checks of vehicles and drivers and urging South Africans to be cautious on the roads.

Europe meets under pressure to boost crisis fund

BRUSSELS, 16 Jan—Eurozone finance ministers head into a meeting Monday under pressure to ramp up the firepower of a debt rescue fund even after markets backed off pressure on vulnerable nations.

Europeans are divided over how quickly they need to act and how much added muscle they should give to the financial safety net that was created last year to provide cover to weak countries, following a huge bailout of Greece.

European Commission president, Jose Manuel Barroso, who heads the European Union's executive arm, urged leaders to take a decision by their next summit on 4 February to appease markets nervous about the fate of Portugal and Spain.

The EU's rescue mechanism was used to pull Ireland from the abyss last November after a banking disaster, but analysts have repeatedly warned it would be too small to rescue Spain if it ever needs a bailout.

Belgian Finance Minister Didier Reynders called this week for the safety net to be doubled to 1.5 trillion euros (\$2 trillion) and said he hoped to raise the issue at the eurozone ministers' monthly meeting in Brussels.

"I think that doubling the resources would be a reasonable objective," Reynders told *AFP* in a telephone interview.

But German counterpart Wolfgang Schaeuble, whose country has the biggest commitment in the European Financial Stability Facility (EFSF), the main component in the rescue mechanism, said a debate on increasing the size of the pot was "not realistic."—*Internet*

One in five cancer survivors have pain

ANN ARBOR, 16 Jan — Twenty percent of cancer survivors may be experiencing cancer-related chronic pain two years after diagnosis, US researchers said. The survey of nearly 200 cancer survivors, conducted by researchers at the University of Michigan Health System in Ann Arbor, also indicated the pain experience was worse for blacks and for women.

The most significant source of pain was cancer surgery in whites and cancer treatment in blacks. The survey, sponsored by the Lance Armstrong Foundation, indicated blacks with pain had higher pain severity, more concern about harmful pain treatment side effects and greater pain-related disability. Women had more pain flares than men, more disability due to pain and were more depressed because of pain. The study, published

online ahead of print in *Cancer*, suggested patient and physician knowledge/attitudes may lead to poor pain management.

For example, worries about painkiller side effects may lead patients and their doctors to minimize pain complaints.

At that scale it is likely to be the biggest

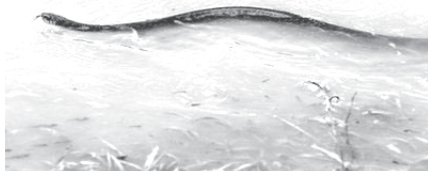
N Zealand flood rescuers get Aussie snake catcher

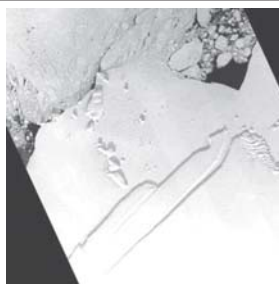

Three bottles of whisky abandoned in Antarctica by British explorer Sir Ernest Shackleton more than a century ago will be sent to Scotland for scientific analysis, reports said Friday.

The bottles of Mackinlay's whisky were part of a cache recovered last year from beneath Shackleton's Antarctic hut, built in 1908 as part of his failed attempt to reach the South Pole, national news agency NZPA reported.

It said the whisky would be sent to the

Whyte & Mackay distillery in Scotland, which now owns the Mackinlay's brand, where it would be analysed in an attempt to recreate the original recipe.

The wooden crate containing the whisky, marked British Antarctic Expedition 1907, was frozen solid in the minus 30 degrees Celsius (minus 22 degrees Fahrenheit) temperatures but the whisky in the bottles was still liquid.

Miss Nebraska wins 2011 Miss America pageant

LAS VEGAS, 16 Jan—A 17-year-old aspiring politician from Nebraska captured the Miss America crown on Saturday after beating 52 other young women from across the United States. Teresa Scanlan won a \$50,000 scholarship and a yearlong run with the crown at the competition at the Planet Hollywood casino-resort in Las Vegas, giving the Cornhusker State its first-ever win at the pageant.

Colin Firth was named best actor for his role as stammering King George VI who must prove to the United Kingdom that he can be a leader in the dark days ahead of the World War Two in "The King's Speech," which also claimed best original screenplay.—Reuters

LONDON, 16 Jan—British actress Susannah York, one of the most memorable film faces of the 1960s, has died from cancer aged 72. British media reported late on Saturday. York was best known for her role opposite Jane Fonda in the 1969 film "They Shoot Horses Don't They?" for which she was nominated for an Oscar.

"She was an absolutely fantastic mother, who was very down to earth," her son, actor Orlando Wells, told the *Sunday Telegraph* newspaper. "She loved nothing more than cooking a good Sunday roast and sitting around a fire of a winter's evening. In some sense, she was quite a home girl."

A quintessential English rose with her blonde hair, blue eyes and fresh-faced complexion, along with Julie Christie and Sarah Miles, she was one of the most recognizable actresses from films in the 1960s, winning a swathe of male admirers.—Reuters

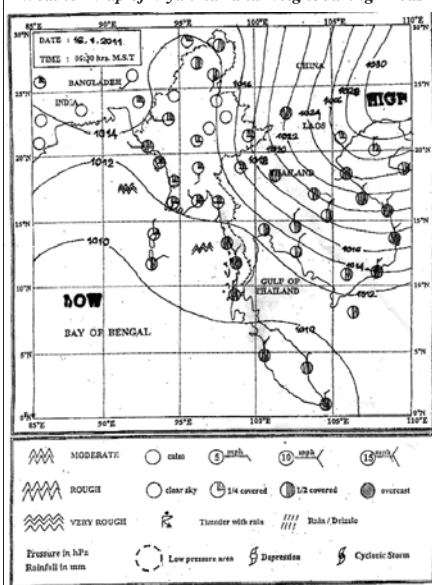

London Olympics tickets to go on sale this March
