Have an optimistic view of Myanmar's real situation

The 10th Session of Universal Periodic Review of Human Rights Council took place in Geneva, Switzerland, from 24 January to 4 February. Universal Periodic Review, part of work programme of Human Rights Council, is held once every four years to review human rights movements being implemented by all the 192 countries.

At the review, countries present their health, education, cultural and human rights issues and other member countries take part in discussions and give suggestions without having any intention to criticize politically. At the 10th session, the Myanmar delegation explained objective conditions of Myanmar.

The constitution of Myanmar carries a separate chapter about fundamental rights of citizens whose standards and norms are on a par with that of international constitutions. The power to issue five writs is vested in courts so that the citizens can enjoy their rights.

Now, sessions of Pyidaungsu Hluttaw and Region/State Hluttaws elected by the people are taking place. From the Hluttaw sessions, executive, judiciary and legislature will emerge and they are initial steps for democratization. Myanmar will be able to carry out democratization process step by step depending on its objective conditions and exercise discipline-flourishing democracy system effectively.

The international community has long misunderstood Myanmar regarding human rights because anti-government groups and some of their supportive powers are one-sidedly manufacturing fabrications.

Myanmar is carrying out human rights programmes in line with the provisions included in the constitution and international norms and standards. At the 10th session of the review, the majority of the countries recognized Myanmar's positive developments. So, the international community will understand Myanmar's objective conditions.

UN chief hails election in Myanmar

UNITED NATIONS, 4 Feb—UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon on Friday said the election of the new president and vice-presidents of the Union Government of Myanmar “represents an important opportunity” for the southeast Asian country, UN spokesperson Farhan Haq told reporters here.

The newly convened parliament of the Union of Myanmar announced on Friday of the election of U Thein Sein as president and of Thiha Thura U Tin Aung Myint Oo and Dr Sai Mauk Kham as vice presidents.

In a statement issued by Ban’s spokesperson, the secretary-general voiced his hope that the announcement marks the beginning of change in the status-quo.

The president-elect is expected to form a new government, according to the state constitution.—MNA/Xinhua

Chinese leaders congratulate newly elected Myanmar leaders

BEIJING, 5 Feb—Chinese President Hu Jintao on Friday sent a congratulatory letter to U Thein Sein on his election as Myanmar’s president.

Chinese Vice President Xi Jinping sent congratulatory messages to Dr Sai Mauk Kham and Thiha Thura U Tin Aung Myint Oo on their election as Myanmar’s vice presidents.

U Thein Sein was elected president by Myanmar’s new parliament from among the three designated vice presidents earlier Friday.

British soldier killed in Afghanistan accident

LONDON, 5 Feb— A British Army soldier was killed Friday in an accident in southern Afghanistan, the Ministry of Defence in London announced.

The soldier, from 1st Battalion The Royal Irish Regiment, was on duty in the Nad-e Ali District of the troubled Helmand Province when the incident occurred.

The death brings to 351 the number of British troops killed since operations in Afghanistan began in October 2001. Of these, at least 309 were killed through hostile action.

“He died as a result of an operational accident, which is currently under investigation,” said Task Force Helmand spokesman Lieutenant Colonel David Eastman.—Internet

Reporter says Cameron’s ex-aide knew about hacking

LONDON, 5 Feb— Prime Minister David Cameron was “either a liar or an idiot” to believe that his former media chief was not involved in phone hacking, a reporter claimed in newly published evidence Friday.

Freelance journalist Paul McMullan claimed that Andy Coulson, who until last month was Cameron’s chief of

communications, knew that reporters were hacking celebrities’ phones when he was editor of the News of The World.

In written evidence to a parliamentary committee investigating the hacking scandal, McMullan said “everyone in the schoolyard did it” when Coulson worked at The Sun tabloid, before he moved to the News of The World.—Internet

KANDAHAR, 5 Feb— A suicide car bomb struck outside the house of the police chief in southern Afghanistan’s largest city Friday, wounding at least two people.

It was the second attack on him this week.

Chief Khan Moham-mad Mujahid was inside the house but wasn’t hurt when the bomb went off.

He said he believes the attack was aimed at him following efforts by his force and the NATO-led coalition to root out Taleban militants in areas surrounding

Kandahar city.

“They want to scare the people from joining the government,” Mujahid said.

US and NATO officials have said they believe they are making progress in routing militants from Kandahar city and its environs since a surge of forces into the area this past summer.

The recent spate of attacks on officials in the city serve as a reminder that the militants are still very much a force in their long-time stronghold.

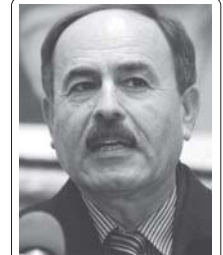
Plane crashes in northern Iraq, killing seven

SULAIMANIYAH, 5 Feb— A small private plane caught on fire and crashed Friday, shortly after taking off from a regional airport in northern Iraq, killing all seven passengers on board, officials said.

The plane had just lifted off from the Sulaimaniyah airport around 5 pm when the fire broke out in one of its

engines, officials said. It tried to land but crashed in a heavy snowstorm.

Airport head Tahir Abdullah Qadir said the private twin-engine plane carried four foreign businessmen working for AsiaCell, one of Iraq’s largest mobile phone companies. He would not say what nationality the passengers were but said

the plane was headed to the Turkish capital of Ankara.

Three crew members aboard also died, Qadir said. Qadir said the initial investigation indicated the fire was the result of a mechanical problem and was not linked to the bad weather.—Internet

Six people injured by falling ice at Super Bowl venue

DALLAS, 5 Feb—At least six workers who were trying to get Cowboys Stadium ready for the Super Bowl

were taken to hospitals on Friday after being struck by falling ice, a National Football League spokesman said.

The six were taken to different hospitals and the two most seriously injured were in stable condition.

“Melting ice and snow on the Cowboys Stadium roof slid onto several plaza areas earlier today,” said Michael Signora, the

NFL’s vice president of communications.

“The snow on the roof is in the process of being cleared away in preparation for Sunday’s Super Bowl.”

The Dallas-Fort Worth area was hammered with back-to-back winter storms this week which brought ice and bone-chilling winds then dumped six inches (15 centimeters) of snow early Friday morning.

Australia faces weather woes with southern storms

CAIRNS, (Australia), 5 Feb—The tail end of one of Australia's largest-ever cyclones triggered wild storms and flash flooding at the other end of the country Saturday, while residents in the cyclone zone picked through what was left of their homes.

The tropical low that was Cyclone Yasi, which tore through the northeast earlier this week, was active over central Australia and making a series of thunderstorms over the southern city of Melbourne and other large towns in Victoria state much worse, the Bureau of Meteorology said.

More than 7 inches (175 millimetres) of rain fell in just a few hours overnight Friday in some Melbourne neighbourhoods and winds gusting to 80 mph (130 kph) knocked down trees, the Bureau of Meteorology said. Drains were overwhelmed, causing flash flooding that covered streets and swamped some homes.

The State Emergency Service said 84 people were rescued from cars that stalled in flooded streets, or from inundated properties.

A 26-year-old English tourist was taken to a hospital after part of a tree fell on the tent she was camping in, SES spokesman David Tucek said.

Thirteen dead in fresh Sri Lanka floods

COLOMBO, 5 Feb—Renewed rains in Sri Lanka have flooded a large number of towns and villages and killed at least 13 people, officials said Saturday.

Heavy monsoon downpours have driven some 800,000 people out of their flooded homes and into state-run welfare centres or to stay with friends and relatives on higher ground, officials said.

"The situation in the Eastern, North and North Central Provinces is serious as monsoon rains continue," the Disaster Management Centre (DMC) said in a statement.

Police said the number of people killed in the latest flood-related incidents had risen to 13 after five people who went missing after a boat accident

on Thursday night were later declared dead.

The DMC said that floods were widespread and were flowing over roads, agricultural land and town centres, worsening the damage already caused by rains that began in December.

At least 43 people were killed and a million driven out of their homes last month by flooding.

On Friday, a flood victim gave birth in mid-air minutes after she was plucked to safety by a Bell-212 military helicopter in the north-central region of the country, the air force said.

The woman had been among a group of villagers marooned in the town of Horowpathana, air force spokesman Janaka Nanayakkara said.—Internet

'Superman' producer at hospital near Mexico City

CUERNAVACA, 5 Feb—A health official in Mexico says the producer of the Superman films of the 1970s and '80s is recovering at a hospital after being admitted in a state of disorientation and suffering facial and head injuries.

Ilya Salkind had been staying at a home near Mexico City and his friends reported him missing earlier this week.

Arturo Torres of the Morelos state medical office said Friday that the 63-year-old Salkind didn't have identification when he was admitted Sunday at a hospital in Cuernavaca.

Morelos Attorney General Pedro Luis Benitez Velez says Salkind was hurt while in Tepoztlan, a town about 55 miles south of Mexico City. It was unclear how he was injured.

Salkind produced "Superman" in 1978 and two sequels.—Internet

Ten more dead in Philippine floods

MANILA, 5 Feb—Ten more people have been killed in floods and landslides after nearly a week of heavy rains in the southern Philippines, raising the death toll to 20, according to the government.

The island of Jolo was the latest area to suffer from bad weather late Thursday, when flash floods and storm surges killed five people, said Jolo mayor Amin Hussin.

As floodwaters ebbed on the main southern island of Mindanao, rescue workers unearthed the remains of five people who had been buried by landslides earlier in the week, the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council said.

Some 73,000 people are still in evacuation camps after the latest round of heavy rains began to lash Mindanao on 31 January, the council said in a bulletin.

It was the second time the region had been hit by torrential rains this year.

Flooding across the southern and central Philippines last month claimed 75 lives, according to the disaster council.

Quake hits Japan's Kanto region

TOKYO, 5 Feb—An earthquake with a preliminary magnitude of 5.2 on the Richter scale rocked Japan's Kanto Region Saturday, said the Japan Meteorological Agency.

The focus of the quake, which occurred at 10:56 am (0156 GMT), was located some 70 km under the sea southeast of Chiba Prefecture, said the agency.

There were no immediate reports of casualties or damage to properties, and no tsunami warning was issued.

How diabetes hurts blood vessels

ST LOUIS, 5 Feb—US researchers suggest the lack of interaction of two enzymes may lead to blood vessel damage in those with diabetes.

Xiaochao Wei, a postdoctoral research scholar, and researchers at Washington University School of Medicine in St Louis say avoiding diabetic-linked blood vessel damage in mice involved two enzymes — fatty acid synthase and nitric oxide synthase.

Wei discovered fatty acid synthase makes a lipid that attaches to nitric oxide synthase, allowing it to hook to the cell membrane and help make blood vessels normal and healthy.

"In animals that don't have fatty acid synthase and normal nitric oxide synthase in endothelial cells, we saw a lot of leaky blood vessels," researcher Dr Clay Semenkovich says in a statement. —*Internet*

Cosmetic surgery may lessen migraine

CLEVELAND, 5 Feb—Ninety percent of migraine headache patients get at least partial pain relief after cosmetic surgery, US plastic surgeons say.

Study leader Dr Bahman Guyuron of University Hospitals Case Medical Centre and Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine in Cleveland says almost 30 percent of patients no longer suffered from migraine headaches after surgery.

Guyuron, a plastic surgeon, developed the migraine surgery techniques after noticing that some migraine patients had

reduced headache activity after a cosmetic forehead-lift procedures. The techniques consist of "surgical deactivation" of "trigger sites" in the muscles or nerves that produce pain, Guyuron says.

The study, published in *Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery*, finds 29 percent of patients said surgery eliminated migraine headaches and 59 percent reported significant decreases during the five years following surgery. The remaining patients reported no change in headache activity.

It's no secret to any person with arthritis that pain comes with the territory.

But what makes arthritis so painful? The Arthritis Foundation offers this list of contributing factors:

- Arthritis causes painful inflammation (swelling) of the joints.

- Arthritis leads to a feeling of fatigue, which makes pain feel worse and more difficult to manage.

Borders receives delisting warning from NYSE

SAN FRANCISCO, 5 Feb—Troubled bookseller Borders Group Inc (BGP.N) said on Friday that the New York Stock Exchange warned it its low share price

did not meet listing requirements.

The company said it was notified on Thursday it was not in compliance with a standard requiring shares to maintain an average closing price of \$1.00 over a 30 day trading period. Borders has six months to fix the problem.

Shares last hit \$1.00 on 28 January.

Borders, which operates 500 namesake stores, is the second-largest book chain in the United States that has been struggling for years with sliding sales and most recently with a cash crunch. It has said that it may need to explore a restructuring under court supervision, which could mean a bankruptcy filing.

Record revenues for luxury retailer LVMH in 2010

PARIS, 5 Feb—Global luxury retailer LVMH said Friday that strong demand for its champagnes and Louis Vuitton leather bags helped it make a 73 percent leap in full-year profit, and said prospects for 2011 were good.

"2010 was a great vintage for LVMH," said chairman and CEO Bernard Arnault in a statement as the firm's annual earnings were announced. Annual net profit rose to 3.03 billion euros (\$4.13 billion) from 1.76 billion euros a year earlier, when many affluent consumers were spooked by the financial crisis.

LVMH, which owns the Fendi

fashion house and the TAG Heuer watch brand, posted a 19 percent rise in revenue to 20.32 billion euros from 17.05 billion a year ago, matching analysts' expectations.

Revenue in the fourth quarter, the industry's most important period of the year, rose 20 percent to 6.11 billion euros, further reflecting strong demand for luxury goods over the holiday period.

Sales in its fashion and leather goods division, home to Louis Vuitton, rose 20 percent to 2.12 billion euros in the fourth quarter, and the company said all its champagne brands recovered strongly over the year.—*Internet*

DeVilbiss air compressors recalled

WASHINGTON, 5 Feb —Jackson, Tenn, firm DeVilbiss Air Power Co is recalling 460,000 air compressors due to a fire hazard, a federal watchdog agency said.

The US Consumer Product Safety Commission said the air compressors sold under Craftsman, Delta Shopmaster, DeVilbiss, Husky and Porter-Cable brand names can overheat, posing a fire hazard.

The Craftsman-brand compressors were sold at

Sears stores from September 2000 through December 2005 for about \$215. All other brands were sold from January 2003 through December 2004 for between \$200 and \$300.

A variety of models are involved in the recall. The Craftsman and were sold as red 15-gallon models. The Porter-Cable compressors were sold in red 4-gallon and 6-gallon models. Delta Shopmaster sold gray 12-gallon models.—*Internet*

Rare Madagascar predator disappearing

ANTANANARIVO, 5 Feb—The fossa, a rare and unusual cat-like predator on the island of Madagascar, is endangered and faces an uncertain future, researchers say. In areas that were once strongholds, few fossas can be found as villagers hunt and kill the animals in an effort to protect livestock, including chickens, the BBC reported on Friday.

The fossa, genetically related to the mongoose, is an expert climber and well-equipped for chasing down lemurs, small shrew-like creatures called tenrecs and almost

any other animal in Madagascar's forests.

Official estimates suggest fewer than 2,500 fossas survive and the animal should be considered endangered, researchers say.

Mia-Lana Luhrs from the University of Gottingen in Germany says she has recorded a substantial drop in the number of fossas living in the Kirindy nature reserve in the west of the island nation. In 2007, Luhrs recorded 18 different males regularly visiting a particular tree to mate with females. In 2010, only two males were seen.

Luhrs says she believes no more than 30 fossas of either sex now exist in the reserve. "That is not sufficient for the population to survive without management," she says.—*Internet*

'Armchair' archaeologist sees Saudi sites

PERTH, 5 Feb— An Australian researcher says he's found many potential archaeological sites in Saudi Arabia — from his office in Perth, using satellite images from Google.

"I've never been to Saudi Arabia," David Kennedy at the University of Western Australia says. "It's not the easiest country to break into."

So Kennedy, sitting in his office chair, scanned 475 square miles of Saudi Arabia from his desktop computer using high-resolution satellite images from Google Earth and found 1977 potential archaeological sites, including 1082 "pendants" — ancient tear-drop shaped stone tombs,

NewScientist.com reported Friday.

Comparing the images with structures Kennedy has seen in Jordan, he says he believes the sites may be up to 9,000 years old, but that ground verification is critical. "Just from Google Earth it's impossible to know whether we have found a Bedouin structure that was made 150 years ago, or 10,000 years ago," he says. The science of "armchair archaeology" has blossomed since Google Earth was launched five years ago, and in 2008 researchers from Melbourne, Australia, found 463 potential sites in the Registan Desert in Afghanistan using the programme, NewScientist.com said.—*Internet*

DNA evidence yields new fish species find

WASHINGTON, 5 Feb — US researchers examining three species of a fish called a blenny, studied for 100 years, say they've found they're actually looking at 10 distinct species.

Scientists from the Smithsonian Institution say a century of study of blennies, native to shallow coral and rock reefs in the western Atlantic and eastern Pacific oceans, would suggest there was little left to discover about them, but modern DNA techniques have proved them wrong, a Smithsonian release said on Friday.

The longstanding classification of the three species was contradicted by DNA studies of coral reef fish from larvae to adults, finally yielding seven previously unclassified species new to science, the researchers say.

"DNA analysis has offered science a great new resource to examine old questions," said Carole Baldwin, a zoologist at Smithsonian's National Museum of Natural History. "This discovery is a perfect example of how DNA barcoding is illuminating species that we've missed before, particularly small cryptic reef fishes like *Starksia* blennies.—*Internet*



Galaxy Tab gets hacked, finally runs Gingerbread

NEW YORK, 5 Feb—Owners of the Samsung Galaxy Tab have so far waited pretty patiently for Google to upgrade the tablet from Froyo (a not-so-tablet-friendly version of Android) to Gingerbread. But it would seem one developer got a little too impatient waiting for the update, so got to work adding Android 2.3 themselves.

XDA Developers Forum member "Technomancer" managed to devise a hack that allows the Samsung Galaxy Tab to successfully run Gingerbread. All the hack takes is one downloadable file and an unprotected bootloader that can run Euro ROMs. Sadly, it appears to be a little fiddly.

There are minimal instructions on how to run this hack so is best left to more confident tinkerers. It is also still a little buggy, with only basic functions like WiFi, voice calls and 3G data and GPS working fully for most. Though Technomancer and the XDA crew are currently working on the bugs, so stay tuned for an even more stable update or at least make a backup.

A Nintendo DS emulator for Android OS that works?

NEW YORK, 5 Feb—Nintendo DS emulators have been around for awhile on PCs, but a proper touchscreen version for a mobile platform like Android OS? That's new, and in this case, not a gimmick like the "shell" iPhone app DS Double Sys. This time we're talking about an actual handheld-based DS emulator.

Okay, it's not really ready for prime time, and in fact designer Tiger Lab calls it a "very early prototype version (beta) for demo only," but hey, you want a DS emulator on your Android phone, Tiger Lab's put it up for download (though only "for limited days").

Tiger Lab really just wanted to demonstrate it could be done and says

the emulator is "very very slow so you shall not expect to play NDS game [sic] with this emulator." You'll need a pretty powerful Android phone to get it working, and even then, you'll want to "just try some small [non-3D] games."

You'll also need Nintendo DS ROMs, software copies of the original Read Only Memory chips used in Nintendo's video game cartridges. They're also generally illegal, and whether you own a copy of the original game or not, downloading them's a legal no-no.

Tiger Lab says it plans to pour "huge efforts" into getting the DS emulator up to grade by adding a dynamic recomplier, simulating a graphics processor (GPU), allowing OpenGL hardware rendering, and adding a floating point unit (FPU).

Incidentally, the game on the right in the image up top is obviously Mario Kart DS, but the game on the left? I had to dig, but apparently it's a shoot-em-up called Geo Wars released back in 2007, though I'm pretty sure you need an R4 or M3 card to play it.

Sessions of respective hluuttaws (parliaments) are being held successfully at the hluuttaw halls of the grand Hluuttaw Building in Nay Pyi Taw. Representatives of national races are holding talks to decide the future of the nation. Region and State hluuttaws are also convening sessions systematically. It is safe to say that Myanmar is on its path to the goal of democracy through hluuttaws.

Of the seven steps of Road Map, the sixth and seventh are being implemented successively. Superficially, the sixth and seventh steps seem to be not very effective, but in practice, they work very well as they are implemented in line with the constitution and hluuttaws. Therefore, I say that the sixth and seventh steps are in the process of being implemented at a stretch through the political trend by the people of all national races.

Hluuttaw sessions are being held in accordance with the constitution, and in return, the constitution has come into force due to the hluuttaw sessions. The first session of Pyidaungsu Hluuttaw took place at noon on 31 January. Since then, the constitution has being brought into force across the nation. Therefore, all the affairs of the nation and the people have to be decided in consistence with the constitution.

I watched the holding of the sessions of Pyithu Hluuttaw, Amyotha Hluuttaw and Pyidaungsu Hluuttaw on TV. Mostly, I did it with great interest. I am interested in what the new era, new system and new nation are like in their infancies.

All representatives of national races are present at the sessions of the hluuttaws. They are in their traditional costumes. And Defence Services personnel representatives are in military uniforms. From time and again, I see some representatives from my home town on TV. Representatives are of different national races, different ages, different occupations and are from different regions, but they are found self-confident because they are serving as public representatives. Due to their high sensibility, hluuttaw representatives win trust and reliance from and have been elected by local people of their home regions. Overall, hluuttaws serve as public forum in which representatives of the whole Union and entire people are sitting together for national and public affairs.

Nonetheless, certain unscrupulous persons are commenting that members of parliaments are all yes-men, and MPs have to do nothing, but just to clap in hluuttaw sessions. Indeed, they are saying that grapes are sour, because the position of a member of parliament is too high for them to reach.

I have presented that hluuttaw representatives win trust and reliance from local people of respective regions and are vested responsibilities. Thanks to their high calibers and expertise, they are elected by the public as public representatives. That is common knowledge. The people believe in the capabilities of hluuttaw representatives. If hluuttaw members had not been competent enough or they had been jobless, no need to say, the people would not have elected them as their representatives. The people have decided their future in a democratic way. So, they should have understood that point. Even if they overlook that fact, they should not say so with the intention of harming the image of hluuttaw representatives. Tarnishing the image of public representatives means insulting the people who have elected their representatives. Therefore, they should be careful about what they say.

At hluuttaws, chairpersons, speakers and deputy speakers have been elected. Now, vice-presidents and president have been elected. In the process of nomination, some MPs nominated their counterparts they favoured, and their nominations were seconded by other MPs systematically. There was no post for which only one MP was nominated. The number of nominees ranged from two to four. It was found that candidates competed with one another democratically for the posts. votes. Opinion polls were carried out and decisions were made democratically to meet the stances of the majority. In the process, there were some disagreements. But, the character of democracy: the minority must comply with the stances of the majority: was witnessed at the hluttaws.

However, pessimists are making reasonable comments endlessly. They claimed that representatives of the party that won the majority of seats, and Defence Services personnel representatives, who make up 25 % of the entire hluttaw representatives, had prearranged the processes and the programmes were carried out according to their prearrangements, and so the representatives of the parties that won only small number of seats did not have any rights to make submissions or decisions. They should bear in mind that today, the nation is in the transition to democracy. If one wants to enjoy or favours democracy, one should not ignore the practice of democracy. 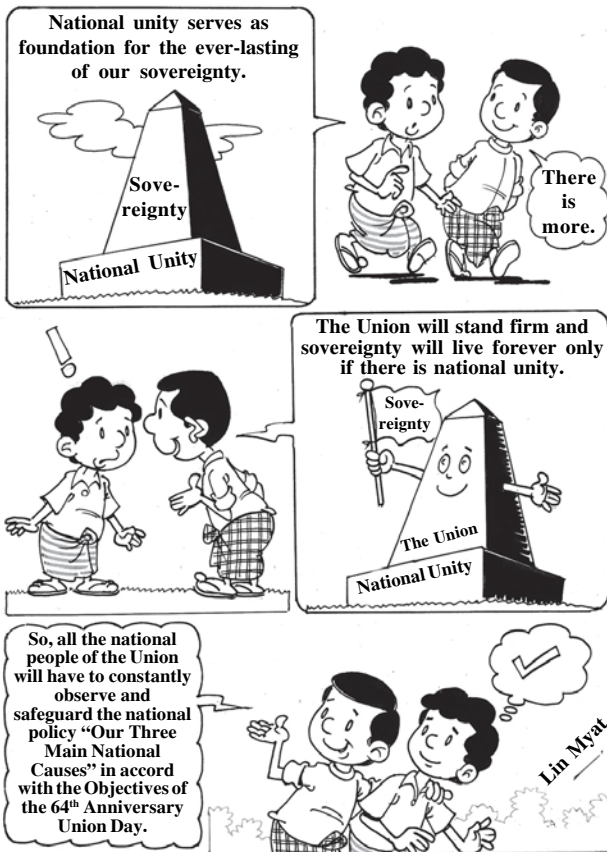

'Fat cancers' also hitting developing nations

ATLANTA, 5 Feb — "Fat cancers" usually associated with wealthy countries are becoming more common in the developing world, too, according to new reports. Obese people are thought to be at higher risk for many so-called "fat cancers," including breast and colon cancer. A separate report out Friday shows obesity rates worldwide have doubled in the last three decades, especially in the West but also nearly everywhere else.
"Sadly, changing ways of life, such as reduced physical activity, are making people unhealthier and in turn prone to such diseases as cancer," Dr. Eduardo Cazap, president of the Union for International Cancer Control, said in a statement released by the World Health Organization.
For decades, health officials have worried about the impact of cigarette smoking — another nasty habit common in industrialized countries — on lung cancer deaths in developing countries.
But now, they say, it's becoming increasingly urgent that those nations also do something about overeating and poor health habits. The WHO on Friday recommended 2 hours a week of moderate physical activity for reducing the risk of breast and colon cancers.

Snails sniff out pollution levels

ST PETERSBURG, 5 Feb — Russian scientists are using giant African snails to monitor pollution from a sewage incinerator. They are attached to sensors that will show them getting sick if they take in too much bad air at the St Petersburg waterworks.
Some environmentalists say it is a publicity stunt but waterworks company Vodokanal says the 8in-long snails can detect compounds produced in concentrations too low for conventional gauges to detect. The same company is also using crayfish to monitor the quality of city water.

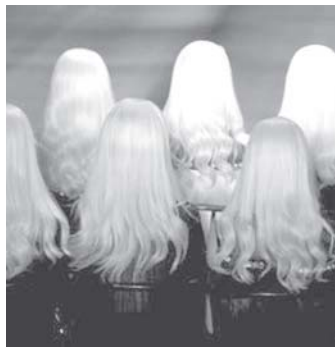

The Maldives requires foreign developers to hire at least 50% local staff but Olialia brand manager Lauryna Anuseviciute says "staff who are not blonde will wear a blonde wig to make everyone look similar".
She insists Olialia already has secured financing but Maldives tourism officials say they have not received any details about the resort and have not issued any permits.—INTERNET

Sumatran tiger mauls worker to death

JAKARTA, 5 Feb — A rare Sumatran tiger has mauled an Indonesian man to death Amir, a morgue officer at Jambi's Public Hospital, said on Friday that the body of a 52-year-old plantation worker called Ketani was found in southern Sumatra. He says the victim's fellow workers told him that Ketani had spotted the tiger on Thursday near their lodgings on the plantation.
He had shouted at the others to flee, but as he was running he fell and was attacked by the animal. Indonesia is home to some 400 Sumatran tigers, which are on the brink of extinction because of rapid deforestation, poaching and clashes with people.

WASHINGTON, 5 Feb — he fled after his arrest in a 2001 slaying that the Marshals Service called one of the "most grisly" in recent American criminal history.
The Marshals Service originally apprehended Eischeid — described in a Justice Department statement as a former stockbroker and member of the Hells Angels motorcycle gang — in 2007 for questioning in the 2001 killing of 44-year-old Cynthia Garcia of Phoenix.
Garcia was attacked while attending a party at the Hells Angels' clubhouse in Mesa, Arizona, severely beaten, thrown in the trunk of a car and taken to the desert, where she was stabbed and left to die, said David Gonzales, US marshal for the Arizona District.

Thomas Weber, chief executive officer of Perfusion Solutions, said the company stopped doing business at the former office 1 Dec but many objects remained as the rent was paid through 17 Jan.



Patients get pans and spoons to call help

A Swedish hospital has become so overcrowded that young patients have been given pans and spoons as a substitute for emergency buzzers, a union says.

The Swedish Association for Health Professionals said the pans and spoons were issued in the children's ward at Ostra Hospital in Gothenburg to cheer them up, The Local reported. Hospital employees purchased bells at a hardware store for adult patients because there are not enough emergency buzzers for all.

All nine hospitals with emergency rooms in western Sweden are desperately overcrowded, a report by the Swedish National Board of Health and Welfare said. Maria Tenggren, a union official and employee at Sahlgrenska University Hospital in Gothenburg, said the hospitals "long ago passed the limit of what is acceptable."

"We have for years nagged about the problem of overcrowding, but nothing happens," she said.

Conn man asks cops about growing pot, is arrested

Police say a Connecticut man called 911 to ask a dispatcher how much trouble he could get into by growing one marijuana plant, then was arrested. Farmington police say a dispatcher told 21-year-old Robert Michelson on Thursday night that he could get arrested for growing pot, and Michelson said thank you and hung up.

Officers went to Michelson's house and seized a small amount of marijuana and drug paraphernalia. Michelson has admitted he bought seeds and equipment for growing. Michelson was released on \$5,000 bail after being charged with marijuana possession and other crimes. A woman who answered the phone at his home Friday said he wasn't available for comment.

Africa's biggest film fest takes aim at piracy

OUAGADOUGOU, 5 Feb—Africa's biggest film festival will stress the threat from pirated movies when it opens in the capital of Burkina Faso on 26 February with 475 films being shown, its organizer said Friday.

"The cultural AIDS which is piracy is slowly killing our cinema industry," Michel Ouedraogo told a Press conference.

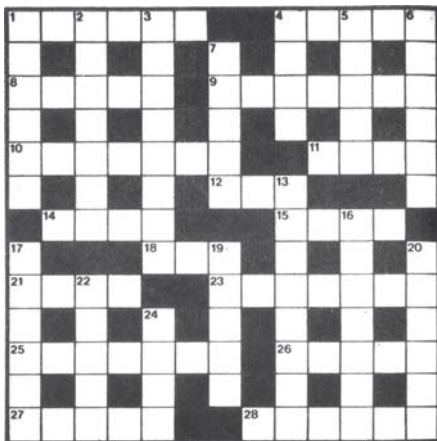
The Chinese men's surfers were much

The Reds' decision to splash out £35 million on Carroll, still in only his first Premier League season, raised eyebrows but Henry said the fee was always contingent upon the money they

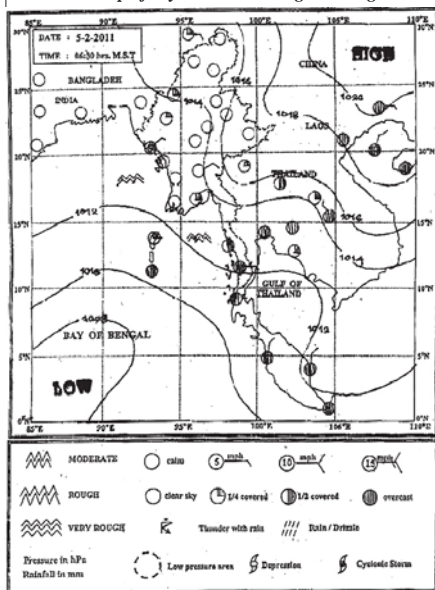
received for Torres.

Tulsa residents trapped by snow four days after storm

TULSA, 5 Feb—Marnie Fernandez had four children and a sick husband at home Friday but almost no milk or toilet paper. The blizzard that dumped 20 inches of snow, sleet and ice on Tulsa on Tuesday still had the area paralyzed, and while Fernandez had her driveway shoveled, several inches of snow and higher drifts blocked the streets of her neighbourhood. She had only a few granola bars and fruit snacks for the kids and worried that a new storm would collapse her roof. Looking outside, she watched water leak through the lights on the roof's overhang as it started to snow again.

"I've never seen anything like this where people literally can't get out of their houses," said Fernandez, 39, who's lived in Oklahoma most of her life. "You just realize you're not in control and you're at the mercy of Mother Nature."

Colourful Kachin State

Kachin State lies at the northernmost part of Myanmar and covers an area of 34379.22 square miles. It is home to diverse national races such as Kachin, Bamar, Chin, Shan, Naga and so on who have been living in unity and amity. Kachin State is

thickly forested and mountainous region. The most prominent distinguishing feature of Kachin State is its snow-capped mountains; Mt. Khakaborazi (19,296 feet) and Mt. Ganlanyazi (19,142 feet) are also the highest mountains in Myanmar.
