NAY PYI TAW, 15 Feb — The sixth-day regular session of First Pyidaungsu Hluttaw was held at Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Hall of Hluttaw Building here at 10 am today, with the attendance of Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Speaker U Khin Aung Myint, Pyithu Hluttaw Speaker Thura U Shwe Mann, Pyithu Hluttaw Representatives and Amyotha Hluttaw Representa-

tives.

Director-General U Myint Thein of Hluttaw Office acted as master of ceremonies.

After taking position, Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Speaker U Khin Aung Myint announced the validity and start of the sixth-day regular session of First Pyidaungsu Hluttaw as 656 Pyidaungsu Hluttaw

Representatives out of 659 who have right to attend the session were present at the session, accounting for 99.54 per cent of attendance.

Small commercial plane crash kills 14 in Honduras

TEGUCIGALPA, 15 Feb—A small Honduran commercial airliner crashed Monday near the capital, killing all 14 people aboard, including a senior government official and a top union leader, authorities said.

Two Americans and a Canadian were listed as passengers on the Central American Airlines' flight to Toncontin Airport in Tegucigalpa, said Melvin Duarte, spokesman for the Attorney General's office. US and Canadian embassy officials said they would release details on the victims after notifying their families.

The *Let L-410 Turbolet* crashed on Monday morning in the town of Las Mesitas, about three miles (five kilometers) south of the airport.

Argentina, US in diplomatic spat after cargo seized

BUENOS AIRES, 15 Feb—Argentina accused the United States of being un-cooperative with a probe into why undeclared weapons and drugs were sent the South American country on a US military aircraft last week.

The diplomatic spat went public after Buenos Aires authorities seized what they said were undeclared weapons and drugs, but US officials described it as routine equipment for training the Argentine federal police. Argentine Foreign

Minister Hector Timerman on Monday told CNN that the United States has not provided sufficient answers.

"They must give an explanation," Timerman said. "The United States must understand that they can't send war materials without informing the government. And now they refuse to cooperate with the investigation."

But the US State Department on Monday said it was "puzzled and disturbed" by the seizure of what it said was routine equipment for police training.—Internet

Brazil, Germany, India, Japan demand UN change

UNITED NATIONS, 15 Feb—Brazil, Germany, India and Japan said Friday that they would press for "concrete" work towards concrete

Foreign ministers from the four nations met at the UN headquarters to step up their campaign even though there is no broad acceptance within the 192 UN members on how to reform the world body's supreme peace

and security body.

"Pressure is mounting here at the United Nations for the UN membership to finally face the challenge of addressing Security Council reform in a realistic manner, adjusting it to the current geo-political realities," said Brazil's Foreign Minister Antonio de Aguiar Patriota after the meeting.

The four nations believe "that we should

work towards concrete outcome in the current session of the general assembly," which ends in September, he added.

India's Foreign Minister SM Krishna said "the response that we are getting is overwhelming and we feel confident that we can move in that direction."

He said the four would "press ahead for reform of the Security Council on an urgent basis."—Internet

Moderate quake rumbles near Mount St Helens

SEATTLE, 15 Feb—An earthquake measured at a magnitude of 4.3 struck near Mount St. Helens in Washington state on Monday, shaking an area extending north to Puget Sound and south across the Oregon border, geologists said.

It was the biggest tremor to hit the geologically active seismic zone around Mount St. Helens since 1981, a year after the volcano erupted in a catastrophic blast that decimated over 200 square miles of forest, said Carolyn Driedger, a hydrologist for the US Geological Survey's Cascades Volcano Observatory in Vancouver, Washington.

There were no reports of damage or injuries, but the main tremor was felt over a distance of roughly 120 miles from north to south, said Bill Steele, a spokesman for the University of Washington's Pacific Northwest Seismic Network. Reuters

Moderate quake rocks eastern Java, Indonesia

JAKARTA, 15 Feb—A shallow earthquake with magnitude of 5.5 struck off eastern Java in Indonesia on Monday, the Meteorology and Geophysics Agency reported here.

The quake jolted at 18:43 Jakarta Time (1143 GMT) with epicentre at 212 km southeast of Jember in East Java Province and the depth at 10 km, the agency said.—Xinhua

Colombia nabs fully submersible drug submarine

BOGOTA, 15 Feb—Colombian soldiers have for the first time seized a fully submersible drug-smuggling submarine capable of reaching the coast of Mexico, authorities announced Monday.

Last July, another fully submersible "narcosub" was seized just across the border by authorities in neighbouring Ecuador.

Previous drug-carrying vessels found in Colombia were only semi-submersible, meaning part of the structure always remained above the surface.

But the sub discovered Sunday can operate completely underwater, Col Manuel Hurtado, chief of staff of Colombia's Pacific Command, told *The Associated Press*. He estimated it could hold eight tons of drugs.

10,000 lose homes in Philippines slum fire

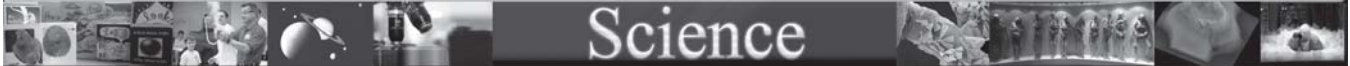

MANILA, 15 Feb—Around 10,000 people lost their homes and one child was killed when a fire swept through one of the Philippines' largest shantytowns in Manila on Tuesday, an arson investigator said.

The authorities had yet to determine the cause of the blaze that destroyed about 500 houses in the Bahay Toro slum, fire inspector Catherine Albino said.

A five-year-old boy was killed, six other people were injured and about 2,000 families were left homeless, she added. Firemen battled for more than three hours before the blaze was brought under control.—Internet

Human DNA found in gonorrhoea genome

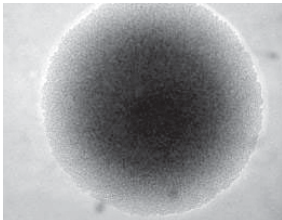
EVANSTON, 15 Feb—US researchers say they have found the first evidence of a transfer of human DNA to a bacterial genome — in this case, the bacterium that causes gonorrhoea.

Researchers at Northwestern University say this is the first evidence ever seen of a direct transfer of DNA from human to bacteria, a university release said on Monday. Scientists say the discovery offers insight into evolution as well as gonorrhoea's singular ability to continually adapt and survive in its human hosts.

"This has evolutionary significance because it shows you can take broad evolutionary steps when you're able to acquire these pieces of DNA," Hank Seifert, Northwest professor of microbiology, said. "The bacterium is getting a genetic sequence from the very host it's infecting. That could have far reaching implications as far as how the bacteria can adapt to the host."

Scientists have long known of gene transfers between different bacteria, and even between bacteria and yeast cells.

Mich students win satellite competition

DETROIT, 15 Feb—A team of Michigan college students has won a competition to have the US Department of Defence launch their custom-built satellite into orbit, officials said.

Michigan Technological University students took first place in the University Nanosat 6 competition sponsored by the Air Force Research Laboratory, which handpicked 11 university teams from dozens of applicants for the competition, WWJ-TV, Detroit, reported on Monday.

Michigan Tech's satellite, *Oculus-ASR*, will serve as an orbiting eye to assist scientists on the ground with satellite attitude and shape recognition.

"The DOD wants to know what's orbiting the Earth, who owns it, what it's doing, and what it might do in the future," team adviser professor L Brad King said. "In general, our role will be to calibrate their telescopes," by releasing targets which both *Oculus* and air force scientists on the ground can photograph, King said.

"It's a very capable little vehicle. There's a lot packed into it."—Internet

Phosphorous overused, running out

MADISON, 15 Feb—US researchers say world stocks of phosphorous, a fertilizer vital to agriculture, are low but its overuse has become a leading cause of water pollution.

Scientists at the University of Wisconsin-Madison report the human use of dwindling supplies of phosphorous, primarily in the industrialized world, is causing widespread eutrophication, or algae "blooms" in fresh surface water, a university release said Monday.

Excess phosphorous from fertilizer that washes from farm fields and suburban lawns into lakes and streams is the primary cause of the blooms that throw freshwater ecosystems out of kilter and degrade water quality, Stephen Carpenter, a UW-Madison professor of limnology, says.

"Phosphorous stimulates the growth of algae and weeds near shore and some of the algae can contain cyanobacteria, which are toxic, Carpenter says. "You lose fish. You lose water quality for drinking."

Artificial retina helps some blind people

LONDON, 15 Feb— For two decades, Eric Selby had been completely blind and dependent on a guide dog to get around. But after having an artificial retina put into his right eye, he can detect ordinary things like the curb and pavement when he's walking outside. "It's basically flashes of light that you have to translate in your brain, but it's amazing I can see anything at all," said Selby, a retired engineer in Coventry, central England.

More than a year ago, the 68-year-old had an artificial implant called the Argus II, made by US-based company Second Sight, surgically inserted into his right eye.

The implant works with a tiny video camera and transmitter in a pair

of glasses and a small wireless computer. The computer processes scenes captured by the camera and converts them into visual information in the form of an electronic signal that's sent to the implant. The device stimulates the retina's remaining healthy cells, causing them to relay the data to the optic nerve.

Zevrix solutions releases BatchOutput PPT 2.0 for Mac

TORONTO, 15 Feb— Toronto-based Zevrix Solutions today announced a new point release of BatchOutput PPT 2.0, a handy tool for Mac OS X users that automates the creation of PDFs from Microsoft PowerPoint.

BatchOutput PPT's main purpose is that it removes the time and effort associated with post-processing in generating professional quality PDFs, especially when working with large batches of files. BatchOutput supplies a simple interface where users can set up their file output preferences and then run the processes on a huge number of files in

one shot.
Version 2.0 adds some new features, including the ability to easily divide PowerPoint documents into single-page PDFs and apply Quartz filters to batches of documents to adjust the colour, tone, brightness, and file size. The tool also lets users control image resolution and compression, as well as add encryption and password protection to the final PDFs to restrict copying, printing, and viewing.
Another aspect of the new release is that you can assign variable file names based on the page number, user name, current date, and other attributes associated with the files.—Internet

Intel's six-core I7-990X is its fastest desktop chip yet

NEW YORK, 15 Feb—Intel started shipping the six-core Core i7-990X Extreme Edition processor on Monday, calling it the fastest Intel desktop processor ever.

The processor runs at a clock speed of 3.46GHz and has overclocking features that allow users to manually crank up the speed, Intel said. The chip includes 12MB of cache and draws 130 watts of power. The processor's overclocking features could appeal to hardcore gamers, 3D artists and media enthusiasts, Intel said in a blog entry on Monday.

In addition to manual overclocking, the chip includes a feature called Turbo Boost, which can ratchet up the clock speed to as high as 3.73GHz, depending on the power drawn and the performance demanded by an application.—Internet

Eating more fiber could mean longer life

CHICAGO, 15 Feb—Eat more fiber and you just may live longer.

That's the message from the largest study of its kind to find a link between high-fiber diets and lower risks of death not only from heart disease, but from infectious and respiratory illnesses as well.

The government study also ties fiber with a lower risk of cancer deaths in men, but not women, possibly because men are more likely to die from cancers related to diet, like cancers of the esophagus. And it finds the overall benefit to be strongest for diets high in fiber from grains.

Most Americans aren't getting enough roughage in their diets. The average American eats only about 15 grams of fiber each day, much less than the current daily recommendation of 25 grams for women and 38 grams for men, or 14 grams per 1,000 calories. For example, a slice of whole wheat bread contains 2 to 4 grams of fiber.

In the new study, the people who met the guidelines were less likely to die during a nine-year follow-up period.

Hand movements may give clues to ADHD severity

BALTIMORE, 15 Feb—Measuring hand-movement control in children with attention-deficit hyperactivity disorder may reveal insights into the brain-based differences of those with the condition, according to two new studies.

In joint research, scientists from Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Centre and the Kennedy Krieger Institute in Baltimore performed sequential finger-tapping experiments on youngsters with ADHD, noting that they exhibited more than twice the amount of unintentional extra or "overflow" movements than typical children on one of the two measures

used. The researchers also used a device emitting magnetic pulses to children with the disorder to measure cortical inhibition — the brain's "braking system." They found that children with ADHD were 40 percent less able than typical children to inhibit resulting hand movements.

"We now have a real, quantifiable measure of a problem with controlling behaviour in these children," said Dr Stewart Mostofsky, senior author of the finger-tapping study and director of the Laboratory for Neurocognitive and Imaging Research at the Kennedy Krieger Institute.—Internet

Overweight women show lower glaucoma risk

NEW YORK, 15 Feb—Overweight older women may be less likely than their thinner peers to develop the potentially blinding eye disease glaucoma, a study published on Monday suggests.

Researchers found that of nearly 4,000 older Dutch adults followed for a decade, heavier women were less likely to be diagnosed with so-called open-angle glaucoma. There was no clear link, however, between weight and glaucoma risk among men.

Open-angle glaucoma is the most common form of glaucoma. It arises when fluid buildup increases pressure in the eye, damaging the optic nerve that runs from the eye to the brain.

The new findings, reported in *the Archives of Ophthalmology*, may sound counterintuitive, since obesity would seem likely to boost pressure in the eye. And, in fact, overweight and obese women in the study did have somewhat greater pressure within the eye — called intraocular pressure.

But the researchers speculate that there may be something protective about extra fat tissue in women — like increased estrogen levels — that helps lower their risk of glaucoma.—Reuters

LOS ANGELES, 15 Feb— Starbucks Corp and Green Mountain Coffee Roasters are in partnership negotiations, a source close to the talks told *Reuters* on Monday, sending Green Mountain shares to a lifetime high.

Starbucks, the world's biggest coffee chain, has been looking for growth beyond its namesake cafes and

wants to be a big player in the new and fast-growing single-serve coffee segment. Green Mountain dominates the US single-cup market with its Keurig brewer.

Starbucks said on Sunday that it planned to announce a new product for the single-cup coffee market in the near future, reviving speculation of a tie-up between the two companies. The person close to the partnership talks would not say if the pending announcement would involve Green Mountain, and declined to describe the type of partnership that Starbucks and Green Mountain were exploring. A Starbucks spokesman declined comment on the negotiations.—Internet

GM to add over 20 new, upgraded models in China: CEO

BEIJING, 15 Feb— General Motors Co will add over 20 new and upgraded models in China, its CEO said Tuesday at the US automaker looks to use its leading position in the world's biggest car market to reclaim the No.1 carmaker spot from Toyota Motor Corp.

"China is clearly a crown jewel in the GM universe," said GM Chief Executive Daniel Akerson.

years."

GM, which completed its IPO last year, is the largest overseas automaker in China, where it operates auto manufacturing ventures with state auto groups SAIC Motor and FAW Group. It lost the top global automaker spot to Toyota in 2007.

Global industry giants, from Bayerische Motoren Werke AG to Volkswagen, have in the

past two years racked up eye-popping sales in China, where growing national wealth has pushed auto sales to record highs.

But the once-booming market is settling into a more rational growth pattern of 10-15 percent this year after the government scrapped most of its auto incentives at the end of 2010.

Marriott announces plans to split business

NEW YORK, 15 Feb—Marriott International Inc is splitting into two publicly traded companies.

The company said as it reported on its earnings Monday that it will spin off its struggling timeshare development and management company later this year. The remaining business will concentrate on lodging management and franchising.

Marriott said the move will help both companies focus on opportunities in their respective industries.

It also helps the hotel chain shed the timeshare business. Marriott will continue to receive franchise fees from the timeshare company's use of the Marriott

and Ritz-Carlton brands.

Marriott curbed its development of timeshares in 2009, but revenue from the segment continued to fall in 2010. The company recently tried to increase its appeal by allowing customers to purchase timeshares in smaller increments and offering more flexible terms. "It's unexpected because people didn't know what the fix for timeshare was going to be," said Janet Brashear, an analyst for Sanford Bernstein. "The spinoff is kind of a neat solution: You get rid of the business and clean up your model so that it is purely lodging."—Internet

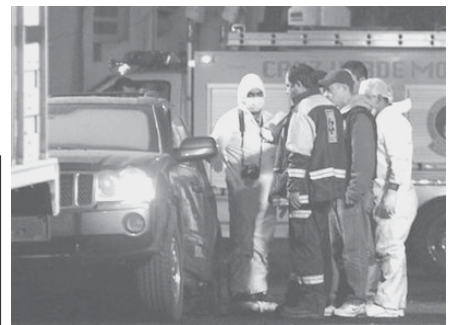
18 killed cartel-plagued northern Mexican town

CIUDAD VICTORIA, 15 Feb—A series of shootings left 18 people dead Monday in a town in northern Mexico where a turf war has raged between two brutal drug cartels.

The violence damaged the city hall, a court and the police headquarters in Padilla, a town just north of the Tamaulipas state capital of Ciudad Victoria, the state government said in a statement.

Seven bodies were dumped in Padilla's main square on Monday, another five people were shot to death inside their car, and another person was killed in an attack on a passenger bus, the statement said. Five other inhabitants of the town were killed, but the statement did not specify how.

Tamaulipas, a state bordering Texas, has seen some of the worst atrocities in Mexico's drug war since fighting broke out last year between the Gulf cartel and a gang of its former enforcers known as the Zetas.—Internet

Motorola Mobility buys mobile software firm 3LM

WASHINGTON, 15 Feb—Motorola Mobility has made its first acquisition since being spun off as a separate company, buying mobile software maker Three Laws Mobility in a bid to expand corporate use of Android phones.

Financial terms of the transaction were not disclosed.

Three Laws Mobility, known as 3LM, develops mobile enterprise security software and solutions and mobile device management products for Google's Android operating system.

Motorola Mobility, which split off from parent company Motorola on 4 January to become a separately traded entity, has been betting on Android handsets to power its bid to return to

Floods in eastern Australia to increase numbers of feral animals

CANBERRA, 15 Feb—Scientists on Tuesday said recent big rain and flooding across parts of eastern Australia is expected lead to an increase in the numbers of feral pigs, rabbits, wild dogs and cane toads.

According to Associate Professor Steve Lapidge from the Invasive Animals Cooperative Research Centre, a decade of hard work in controlling feral animals and weeds could be about to come undone because of the recent rainfall and flooding in parts of Australia.

He said feral pigs, in particular, are likely to take advantage of the wet conditions to breed.

"Species like feral pigs thrive after floods go through," he told ABC News on Tuesday.

"It is an unfortunate fact that after the tsunami in Indonesia about the only species that benefitted from that tsunami was feral pigs."

Danish teacher presumed dead after boat accident

COPENHAGEN, 15 Feb—Danish police have abandoned the search for a 44-year-old teacher who went missing after a dragon boat with two adults and 13 teenagers capsized in a chilly fjord.

Six of the teenagers are in critical condition with severe hypothermia.

Copenhagen University Hospital chief surgeon Michael Wansher says their body temperatures dropped to between 60-65 Fahrenheit (16-18°C) following the accident Friday in the Praestoe Fjord, some 50 miles (80 kilometers) south of the Danish capital.

Survivors who swam ashore told Danish media they spent more than an hour in the water, which was just above 36 degrees Fahrenheit (2 degrees Celsius).

I had already presented that West-imposed sanctions had impact on the ordinary people of Myanmar to a certain extent and that Myanmar has been able to rise like a phoenix thanks to earnest efforts of the government and the people, rich resources and development contributed by economic cooperation with regional countries.

Now, I would like to present the effectiveness of sanctions showing how the West Bloc realized the aims they expected by imposing sanctions against Myanmar.

It is mainly said that sanctions against Myanmar by the West Bloc aimed to flourish human right and democratization in Myanmar and to contribute towards better living standard of Myanmar people. These are the aims they usually announce.

With their foreign policy as usual, there may be ulterior motive and objectives as usual. Obviously, they are to put the nation into pretty trouble till there is regime change.

It is apparent that the sanction-leader US administration is using various ways and means intentionally to make the entire Myanmar people poor.

The US administration started imposing sanctions against Myanmar on the pretext of human rights and democratic cause in 1997. The International Emergency Economic Powers Act of 1977-IEEPA was used in imposing sanction against Myanmar at that time. The IEEPA authorizes the president to impose sanctions against the nation which posed threats to the US after declaring the national emergency in response to the existence of an unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security, foreign policy or economy of the United States.

In accord with the Act, every US President from Bill Clinton to Barack Obama, the incumbent president, maintains sanctions against Myanmar by issuing national emergency in May every year starting from 1997 saying Myanmar poses a

threat to the national security, foreign policy or economy of the United States.

Here, I have to think about who is posing a threat to whose national security, foreign policy or economy.

Even in the view of ordinary people to compare powers of two nations, how can anyone say that Myanmar with a population of 50 million and which is still a least developed nation can threaten a super power with a population of 300 million and the largest economy in the world and the highest military spending that is equivalent to the half of defence expense of world nations.

Practically, it is the US that was conducting military drills with the use of a fleet of aircraft carriers at the area adjacent to the Myanmar Sea in 1988 uprising.

Although it was known through data sent by the Satellite in early May, 2008 that the severe Cyclone Nargis was heading toward Myanmar and there would be heavy casualties due to the storm, it was a US President who signed order to renew the sanctions saying that Myanmar is threatening security and economy of the United States.

Due to sanctions, philanthropic NGOs in the US found it very difficult to conduct rescue work and render humanitarian aids to Myanmar. But, Myanmar government was blamed for not allowing the US warships to enter her territorial waters in order to carry out rescue works in storm-hit areas.

I would like to know the goodwill of the US which sent two aircraft carriers including Kitty Hawk flanked by a number of escort ships in the disaster period of Myanmar which is said to be threatening the security of the US. When Katrina hit US coast the US not only failed to use its naval ships but also denied help offered by Cuba with the help of Russian naval forces. So, what is the aim of shouting for R2P or "Right to Protect" at that time?

The US declared national emergency under

the IEEPA saying Myanmar is threatening it. Actually, the victim is mistaken for the aggressor. The aggressor is taking the place of the victim.

In 1857 when King Mindon ruled Myanmar, he sent the US a message of amity stating that 'Myanmar wishes to form an alliance with America with a view to benefiting the two peoples of the two countries in the long run'. Since the establishment of bilateral relations, Myanmar had never aimed at the US even with a pin. But the US government blatantly supported Chinese Kuomintang troops in invading Myanmar in the 1950s. The very first air strikes broke out between a CIA-owned military cargo plane in the name of the American Airline ownership and a fighter of Myanmar Defence Services (Air) in Southeast Asia in the post war period. The enemy's plane could be shot down but fighter pilot Lt Peter from Myanmar side had to sacrifice his life for the nation. However, the Myanmar government out of magnanimity remained normal relations with the US as it had been dealing with all world countries by upholding the non-alignment policy.

It is very difficult to understand why the US has repeatedly regarded Myanmar as a threat to international security. Actually, Myanmar has no capability to harm the US security, no history of doing so and no motive to do so. But one-sidedly, the US has remained an alliance with Vietnam against which it waged war from 1962 to 1975 and with Saudi Arabia whose nationals were mainly involved in the September 11 attack in 2001 in which the hijacked planes intentionally crashed into the important US buildings killing over 3000 Americans.

Likewise, the US included Myanmar, which worked hard to reduce poppy cultivation significantly, in the list of 'Countries that have no reluctance to fully cooperate in the drug elimination' annually published by the US State Department by excluding some Latin America countries smuggling narcotic drugs most into the US and Afghanistan producing 98 percent of world's opium. It's so incredible!

What's more, an official of the US's DEA to Myanmar came under fire by the US Embassy and CIA officials for reporting that the Myanmar government actually and affectively worked for reduction in the poppy cultivation. His phone was tapped. When he came back to America, he sued them for defamation. But they tried to stop him from suing. Finally, the case was settled through a deal worth US\$ 3 million made under-the-table. In reality, they do not want to make known to the world that the Myanmar government is effectively carrying out drug eradication tasks.

Drawing an overall picture of the abovementioned true facts, it can be revealed that the US and the West Bloc are imposing sanctions against Myanmar as an instrument of foreign policy with a political motive to install a puppet government by toppling the Tatmadaw government rather than on the grounds of 'democracy cause' and 'human rights'.

How effective are acting or imposing sanctions with political motive? To what extent can they be done to accomplish the motive? Amidst the various sanctions and challenges,

Myanmar has been carrying out national development tasks day in, day out, and anyone cannot deny the fact that the nation could have built firm economic and political foundations. Many a foreign affairs officials and experts from the West Bloc countries have even publicly disclosed that there is no way the unilateral sanctions against Myanmar are effective against their political motive and that it can affect the ordinary people only.

23 fishermen missing in Russia

Moscow, 15 Feb—A Russian fishing trawler with at least 23 people on board has gone missing in the Sea of Okhotsk off the Kamchatka Peninsula, the *ITAR-TASS* news agency reported on Monday.

The *Ametist* vessel stopped transmitting daily position reports on Friday, with the search mission being hampered by heavy storms and poor visibility, the news

agency quoted rescue official as saying.

The *Interfax news* agency said the trawler had 24 crew members on board and enough fuel to last until Tuesday.

An *Il-38* maritime patrol aircraft and a helicopter had been dispatched to the region to help locate the trawler, whose crew had been fishing for crab, news reported said.

But wind gusts of up to 55 miles (88

kilometres) per hour had forced officials to temporarily call off their search Monday evening.

"The search and rescue mission will resume as soon as weather conditions improve," *Interfax* quoted a local rescue official as saying.

The vessel did not issue a distress signal before losing radio contact with the ground, *ITAR-TASS* said.

The total amount of forest covered by the colonies millions of orange-and-black butterflies that hang in clumps from the boughs of fir trees more than doubled from last year's historic low.

But concerns persist about the monarchs' long-term survival, because their numbers remain well below average. This winter, there are 9.9 acres (4 hectares) of colonies, more than double the 4.7 acres (1.9 hectares) last year, the lowest level since comparable record-keeping began in 1993.

"These figures are encouraging, compared to last year, because they show a trend toward recovery," said Omar Vidal, director of the conservation group World Wildlife Fund Mexico, which sponsored the study along with the government Commission on Natural Protected Areas and the cell phone carrier Telcel.—Internet

Chilean miners considered cannibalism

WASHINGTON, 15 Feb—The trapped Chilean miners contemplated suicide and were days away from cannibalism before rescuers made contact with them, according to a new book.

Veteran American journalist Jonathan Franklin writes in "33 Men" that nearly all of the miners have suffered from post-traumatic stress disorder since being rescued last fall after 69 days deep underground.

They had to survive on dwindling rations of tuna in the first 16 days after the mine collapsed.

"Food, or no food, I was going to get out of there," Mario Sepulveda told CBS television's "60 Minutes" in a Sunday broadcast.

"How? I had to think about which miner was going to collapse first and then I started thinking about how I was going to eat him, I promise you, I wasn't embarrassed, I wasn't scared."

But on the 17th day, rescuers made contact when a drill punched through the ceiling of the shaft in the San Jose Mine. "They told me that they had a pot and a saw ready," Franklin said.

Victor Zamora said he and the other miners became so desperate that they strongly considered taking their own lives.—Internet

Shell, Brazil's Cosan form \$12 billion ethanol unit

SAO PAULO, 15 Feb—Anglo-Dutch energy giant Shell and Brazilian sugar-production group Cosan said Monday they were forming one of the biggest joint ethanol fuel ventures in the world, with an estimated market value of \$12 billion.

The new entity, to be called Raizen, will employ around 40,000 people and produce over 2.2 billion liters (580 million gallons) of ethanol per year to Brazilian and international markets, the two companies said in a statement.

Raizen should be launched in the first half of this year, they said.

"Due to the size of its operations, Raizen will help sugar cane ethanol, a sustainable, clean and renewable source of energy, to consolidate itself worldwide and strengthen Brazil's position in the international biofuels trading business," said the venture's chief executive, Vasco Dias. Raizen will have 23 mills able to crush 62 million tonnes of sugar cane per year to produce the ethanol.—Internet

Nokia CEO says Co to get billions from Microsoft

BARCELONA, 15 Feb—Nokia Corp will get billions of dollars from Microsoft Corp to ditch its current smart-phone software in favour of Windows Phone 7, Nokia CEO Stephen Elop said Sunday, in a defence of the deal.

On Sunday, a day ahead of the start of the Mobile World Congress cell phone trade show in Barcelona, Elop told press, analysts and industry players that apart from the benefits of the alliance that were laid out Friday, Microsoft is paying Nokia billions of dollars to switch to Windows Phone 7.—Internet

China moves to reduce smoking scenes in films, TV dramas

BEIJING, 15 Feb—China's film and broadcast watchdog has issued a circular ordering to reduce smoking scenes in films and TV dramas following complaints last month about the nation's failure to honour the tobacco-control commitment of the World Health Organization(WHO).

"Frequent smoking scenes in films and TV dramas do not accord with China's stance on tobacco control and will mislead the public, especially the young," read the circular posted on the website of the State Administration of Radio, Film and Television (SARFT).

Tobacco brands or signs and

smoking scenes with juveniles present should not be allowed to appear in films or TV dramas, it said.

Scenes which have to show smoking should "last as short as possible," said the circular. The circular also urged censoring and broadcasting institutions to intensify supervision of films and TV dramas before their screening and "try their best to cut smoking scenes."

A survey conducted among 11,000 middle school students by Beijing Municipal Centre for Disease Control and Prevention, showed 32.87 percent of the students wanted to try smoking after seeing actors smoke on TV.—Xinhua

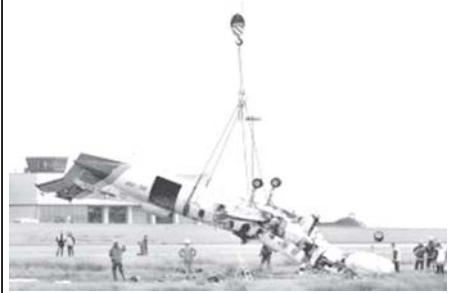

No trace of fire or failure on tragic Flight NM7100

CORK, 15 Feb — Preliminary inspections by aviation safety experts have revealed no trace of a fire or major structural failure on board the Manx2 plane before it crashed on landing at Cork Airport in dense fog, killing six passengers. Six passengers were also injured when the 19-year-old Fairchild Metroliner ploughed into the concrete runway while attempting its third landing at 9.52am last Thursday. Visibility was reported to have been low at 300 metres.

Those killed included Brendan McAleese, 42, a cousin of President Mary McAleese's husband Martin; Pat Cullinan, a partner in the Belfast office of the accountancy firm KPMG, who was from Omagh, Co Tyrone; Michael Evans, Deputy Harbour Commissioner in Belfast; pilot Jordi Sola Lopez, 31, from Spain; co-pilot Andrew Cantle, 27, from England; and Richard Noble, a businessman from Derbyshire in the UK, who was living Belfast.

The bodies of the six victims were expected to be released to the families over the next 24 hours, with funerals expected to be staged early next week. Ireland's Air Accident Investigation Unit (AAIU) is leading the probe into the crash, which includes experts from Ireland, the UK, Spain and the US.

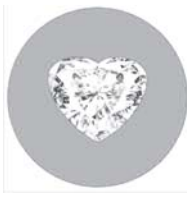

Hero pilot declares Airbus A380 'indestructible' and 'absolutely safe'

SYDNEY, 15 Feb — The pilot who managed to land a new Airbus A380 after one of its engines exploded in mid-air has declared the aircraft "absolutely safe". Captain Richard de Crespigny was hailed a hero when he managed to land the Qantas aircraft after the engine exploded over Singapore, resulting in more than 60 separate system failures. He said the Airbus flew on almost normally, despite one of its wings being "clusterbombed".

"No aircraft is ever designed to take the beating that this aircraft got," Mr de Crespigny told Australia's 60 Minutes TV show. "The wing was clusterbombed, the aircraft had phenomenal damage to all systems — and it didn't just recover, it performed brilliantly." Just minutes into the Qantas QF32 flight from Singa-

pore on 4 November last year there was a small oil leak in the intermediate pressure turbine of engine number two. The oil ignited, causing a turbine disk to explode at high speed.

LONDON, 15 Feb — The number of people admitted to hospital in the UK because of problem drinking could rise to 1.5 million a year by 2015, a charity says. Alcohol Concern estimates that it will cost the NHS £3.7b annually if nothing is done to stop the increase. It wants alcohol special-

ists to be employed in all hospitals and GP practices. The Department of Health said it would publish a new alcohol strategy in the summer. Thousands of people die each year as a result of their drinking, mostly as a result of alcoholic liver disease. Drinking is also associated with an increased risk of heart disease, stroke and some cancers. The charity says the number of people being treated in hospital for alcohol misuse has gone from 500,000 in 2002-3 to 1.1 million in 2009-10.

Alaska Airlines had to delay a flight about to leave Seattle-Tacoma International Airport when a rat was seen scurrying in the cabin.

The airline says the flight from Seattle to Denver had just pulled away from the gate Thursday morning when the little stowaway was spotted. The 737

jetliner returned to the terminal and passengers and crew boarded another plane about 90 minutes later.

Airline spokesman Bobbie Egan says the plane won't be returned to service until maintenance workers make sure the rat didn't damage equipment or chew any wires — and an

exterminator certifies the plane is rodent-free.

Egan says workers also are trying to figure out how the rat got aboard. She says in cold weather, “sometimes rodents can seek shelter in strange places.”

In October 2007 Radiohead caused a major stir in the music industry when they parted company with EMI's Parlophone label and told listeners they could pay whatever they wanted to download their album “In Rainbows”. At the time the website said “It's up to you” in place of a price.

A survey soon after-wards showed that about a third

"The most important thing is to finish in the top four. I think we will be able to do this if we play like we did tonight.—Internet

It was also an unusual encounter in that both players showed ambidextrous abilities — Bartoli striking the ball with two hands on both wings, and Date-Krumm occasionally using her left hand to return a wide ball on her double-handed backhand side.—Internet

Woods apologizes after fine for spitting in Dubai

VIRGINIA WATER, 15 Feb — Tiger Woods apologized after he was fined an undisclosed sum by the European Tour on Monday for spitting on the green during the final round of the Dubai Desert Classic.

The tour said in a statement that tournament director Mike Stewart reviewed the matter and "feels there has been a

breach of the tour code of conduct."

"The Euro Tour is right — it was inconsiderate to spit like that and I know better," Woods said on Twitter. "Just wasn't thinking and want to say I'm sorry."

The tour would not give the amount of the fine but it is probably between \$400 and \$16,000 for a minor breach.

Woods spit on the 12th hole after missing a par putt on his way to a 3-over 75. He began the final day one shot off the lead but never recovered after making two bogeys in his first three holes.

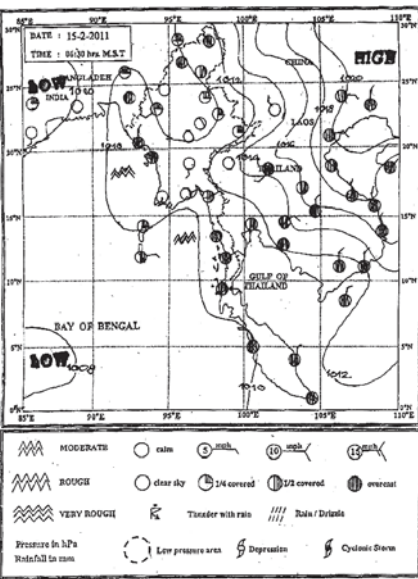
