NAY PYI TAW, 21 Feb — The tenth-day regular session of the First Pyidaungsu Hluttaw was held at Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Hall in Hluttaw Building, here, 11 am today, attended by Speaker of Pyidaungsu Hluttaw U Khin Aung Myint, Speaker of Pyithu Hluttaw Thura U Shwe Mann and representatives of Pyithu Hluttaw and Amyotha Hluttaw.

Director-General of Hluttaw Office U Myint Thein acted as master of ceremonies.

After taking position, Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Speaker U Khin Aung Myint announced the validity and start of the session as 654 out of 658 Pyidaungsu Hluttaw representatives who have the right to attend the today's session were preset, accounting for 99.39 per cent.

The Speaker of Pyidaungsu Hluttaw announced that although an announcement was issued for Pyidaungsu Hluttaw representatives to raise

objection with clear evidences, if any, in accord with sub-section (a) of Article 242 prescribed in the constitution of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar regarding the nomination of Dr Tun Shin for the post of Attorney-General of the Union made by the elected President, there was no objection to the nominee. Accordingly, Pyidaungsu Hluttaw approved the nominee.

New bridges add impetus to transport

With a growing number of roads, railroads and bridges around the nation, Regions and States are more easily accessible by land from one another, thus leading to significant commercial growth region-wise.

The Ministry of Construction is building roads and bridges on a large scale. It is needed to carry out constant maintenance work on transport facilities. Some roads are eroded in the rainy season, which causes hindrances to transport. So, earthen roads are being upgraded to gravel ones, and then to tarred ones. Pyinyaung Bridge, the 257th among the above-180 feet long bridges constructed by Public Works in the nation, and the 15th in Mandalay Region, will contribute towards improvement in the economic, education, health care and social sectors of the areas along it.

Commodity flows get swifter and swifter between Regions and States, and local people are enjoying better living conditions and greater development due to emergence of networks of transport facilities throughout the country.

Philippine volcano blast prompts hundreds to flee

MANILA, 21 Feb— Hundreds of villagers fled to safety Monday after a restive volcano belched ash and smoke into the sky after a monthlong lull, officials said.

Despite Mount Bulusan's ash explosion, its 13th since November, there were no signs of an imminent eruption involving magma pushing out of the cone, said government chief volcanologist Renato Solidum.

The huge plume of grayish smoke shot up to more than a mile (2 kilometres) toward the

blue sky, with the ash drifting southwest toward four farming towns in Sorsogon Province, where about 1,200 villagers fled to emergency shelters and houses of relatives, said Benito Ramos, who heads the government's disaster-response agency.

Army trucks helped villagers move from communities hit by the ashfall and emergency teams handed out protective masks, Ramos said. There have not been any government orders to evacuate communities near the mountain. While

many scrambled to safety, residents streamed out of houses in Irosin town to gaze or take pictures of the mid-morning spectacle using their cell-phones.

At least 31 killed in suicide blast in Afghanistan

KABUL, 21 Feb—A suicide bomber blew himself up at the entrance to an Afghan government office Monday, killing at least 31 people — many who were waiting in line to obtain government identification cards,

police said.

The attack occurred around noon in Imam Sahib District of Kunduz Province in northern Afghanistan where there has been a sharp slide in security in recent months, said district police chief Abdul Qayum Ebrahimi. At least 40 people were wounded in the blast, he said. "We were in a meeting. It was a very powerful explosion," said Ebrahimi, who works in the district police office next door to the blast site. "People had gathered in the front of the department to get identification cards."

He said the explosion occurred in the District centre on a day when people gather to shop. "They become the target of the terror today," he said.

MINNEAPOLIS, 21 Feb— Hundreds of flights were canceled at Minneapolis-St Paul International Airport and officials in several states

advised people to stay off the highways as a winter storm blew through the upper Midwest on Sunday.

Even before the

worst of the storm hit, Delta Airlines canceled about 700 flights to and from the Twin Cities Airport and other airlines thinned out their schedules, said airport spokeswoman Melissa Scovronski. She said Sunday afternoon the storm had shut down two of the airport's four runways.

In Detroit, airlines canceled roughly 230 flights though the city's Metro Wayne County Airport, while more than 200 flights through Chicago's O'Hare Airport were off.

Suspected US missiles kill seven in northwest Pakistan

DERA ISMAIL KHAN, 21 Feb—Suspected US missiles killed seven alleged militants, including some thought to be of Arab origin, in a Pakistani tribal region along the Afghan border early Monday, Pakistani intelligence officials said.

The strike was the first since the arrest of a US Embassy employee who shot two Pakistanis in late January. There had been speculation that Washington had put a hold on the disputed tactic as it wrestled with Pakistan over whether the American has diplomatic immunity and should be freed.

The Pakistani intelligence officials said three missiles hit a house overnight Monday in the village of Kaza Panga in the Azam Warsak area of South Waziristan tribal region. Arabs and Turkmen were believed to be among the dead, the officials said, speaking on condition of anonymity because they are not authorized to speak to reporters on the record.

Global arms sales passed \$400 billion in 2009

STOCKHOLM, 21 Feb—The world's 100 largest arms dealers, excluding Chinese vendors, sold weapons for \$401 billion in 2009, with US vendors remaining in first place, according to a report published on Monday.

"Despite the continuing global economic recession in 2009, the total arms sales of 100 of the world's largest arms-producing companies increased by \$14.8 billion from 2008," the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI) said in a statement upon releasing the report.

That amounts to a year-on-year increase of eight percent, and "an increase of a total of 59 percent in real terms since 2002", the think tank said, pointing out that 61.5 percent of all 2009 arms sales made by the top 100 arms dealers could be attributed to 45 companies based in the United States.

Russian defence satellite in wrong orbit

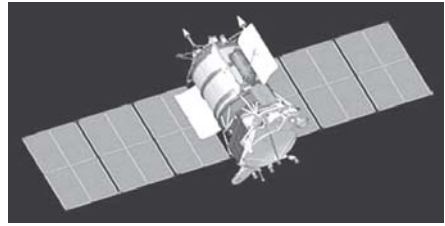
ABU DHABI, 21 Feb—A Russian defence satellite sent into the wrong orbit can't perform its mission, said First Deputy Defence Minister Vladimir Popovkin. The Geo-IK-2 defence satellite was launched from the Plesetsk spaceport earlier this month by a Rokot rocket.

Popovkin said the commission investigating

the failed launch hasn't completed its work, but preliminary data indicates the booster unit and possibly the control system were responsible for its failure to go into the proper orbit.

Popovkin said the satellite is "incapable of fulfilling its mission because its orbit is wrong."

China Mars probe set for November launch



China's first Mars probe will be launched from a Russian rocket in November, two years later than originally planned, state media reported on Monday.—INTERNET

SHANGHAI, 21 Feb—China's first Mars probe will be launched from a Russian rocket in November, two years later than originally planned, state media reported on Monday.

China's Mars explorer, *Yinghuo-1*, marks the country's first attempt at deep space exploration after sending a probe to the moon, the state-run *China Daily* reported, citing comments from a

China Academy of Space Technology official.

The 110-kilogram (240-pound) micro-satellite was originally due to blast off in October 2009 with Russia's "Phobos Explorer" from the Baikonur Cosmodrome in Kazakhstan but the launch was postponed, according to previous reports. The orbiter is due to probe the Martian space environment with a special focus on what happened to the water that appears to have once been abundant on the planet's surface, previous reports said.

China is aiming to

build a space exploration programme on par with those of the United States and Russia.

It currently has a probe — the *Chang'e 2* — orbiting the moon and carrying out various tests in preparation for the expected 2013 launch of the *Chang'e-3*, which it hopes will be its first unmanned lunar landing.

It became the world's third nation to put a man in space independently — after the Soviet Union and the United States — when Yang Liwei piloted the one-man *Shenzhou-5* space mission in 2003.

Using asteroids as space ships to voyage to Mars

NEW YORK, 21 Feb—A study conducted by Gregory Matloff, an adjunct professor of physics at the New York City College of Technology, suggests the best way to travel to Mars might be to hitch a ride on a passing asteroid.

The advantage of such a method would be that an asteroid would provide plenty of radiation shielding for Mars-bound astronauts. Current studies suggest a 1,000-day round trip to Mars would increase the chances of the astronauts contracting cancer by 1 percent to 19 percent, not to mention DNA damage and the possibility of cataracts caused by exposure to cosmic background radiation.

The downside to hitching a ride on an asteroid is that rocks that pass close enough to the Earth and then close enough to Mars are few and far between. One candidate would be suitable for a journey in 2037 and two more in 2086. The other problem is that each of these asteroids would not be available for a return trip for many years. So, they would likely only be useful for Earth people who intended to colonize Mars rather than just explore the Red Planet and then return.—Internet

Cars soon will roll into the app store

NEW YORK, 21 Feb—Auto engineers, racing to keep up with rapid computer innovation, are designing smartcars that can talk to smartphones.

To ensure that electronics, governing everything from navigation to braking, do not become obsolete in months, they are crafting vehicles flexible enough to adapt to unforeseen advances.

"Cars need to be upgraded — over the air — and they have to have smartphone connections now," Erik Goldman, president of Hughes Telematics, told *The New York Times*.

That means being able to draw

diagnostic information from a car by a satellite link, or to reprogramme a transmission controller or recalibrate braking while the car is parked at home, without a trip to the dealer.

Cisco has developed an experimental dashboard that consists of LCD panels instead of dials and buttons. It is one big touch screen where drivers can drag and drop instruments and information displays. It will be able to accommodate yet-to-be-invented systems that could give vehicle-to-vehicle collision warnings or apprise drivers of dangerous intersections ahead.—Internet

Printers used to produce human skin

WINSTON-SALEM, 21 Feb—US medical researchers are using modified printers to produce skin for burn victims, the project's leader says.

"We started out by taking a typical desktop inkjet cartridge. Instead of ink we use cells, which are placed in the cartridge," Dr Anthony Atala, director of the Wake Forest Institute for Regenerative Medicine in Winston-Salem, NC, told *CNN*.

The process may be five years away from clinical use, he said.

Scientists from Wake Forest, Cornell University and the Medical University of South Carolina are to present findings Sunday at an American Association for

the Advancement of Science conference in Washington. The Wake Forest research is funded by the Institute of Regenerative Medicine, which hopes to use skin printing to treat the wounded on the battlefield one day.

A small piece of skin is taken from the patient using a chemical solution. The cells are then separated. "We expand the cells in large quantities. Once we make those new cells, the next step is to put the cells in the printer, on a cartridge, and print on the patient" without touching him, Atala said. "It's like a flat-bed scanner that moves back and forth and puts cells on you."—Internet

Portal 2 supports PlayStation Move, until it doesn't

NEW YORK, 21 Feb—It looks like Valve's *Portal 2* won't support PlayStation Move, after the company reportedly said it would. *Portal 2*? You know, the first-person puzzle game about a guy with a gun that puts holes in things that connect by means of non-Euclidean space. Think wormholes with people instead of starships.

By "the company," I mean Valve's Chet Faliszek, listed on Valve's "people" page as a writer for the games publisher. The German

PlayStation blog—that's the official German Sony PlayStation blog—reportedly listed Faliszek as confirming exclusive features for the PS3 version of *Portal 2*, including online saves, a special PC-version code (not sure what it unlocks), and "complete PlayStation Move support."

Turns out it may not be so complete after all.

"There's a story making the rounds regarding *Portal 2* support for PS3 Move," wrote Valve in a followup statement.—Internet

Many stick with fast food after heart attack

NEW YORK, 21 Feb— It would seem logical for patients who have had a heart attack to cut back on fast food.

Some devoted fast food eaters do. But six months later, more than half can still be found at their favourite fast food places at least once a week, according to a study in the *American Journal of Cardiology*.

Of nearly 2,500 heart attack patients studied by John Spertus, at the University of Missouri at Kansas City, 884 — or 36 percent — reported in a survey while still hospitalized that they had eaten fast food frequently in the month before their heart attack. “Frequently” was defined as once a week or more. When Spertus and his colleagues checked back six months later, 503 were still eating fast food every week.

“Fast food consumption by patients with AMI (acute myocardial infarction) decreased 6 months after the index hospitalization, but certain populations — including younger patients, men, those currently working, and less educated patients — were more likely to consume fast food, at least weekly, during follow-up,” he wrote.—*Reuters*

VANCOUVER, 21 Feb— The concept of wellness and how a person can live a good mental and physical life through exercise, diet and positive outlook proved the major attraction of the Wellness Show in Vancouver over the weekend as about 30,000 people turned out for the three-day event.

With about 250 booths set up in the Vancouver Convention Centre, the range of exhibitors proved wide as visitors could check out the latest in holistic healing, vitamins and supplements, massage therapy, fitness, cooking and food, and even wellness for domestic pets.

Jeanette Savard who has been organizing the Wellness Show for the past 19 years, said she started the event because of her long interest in fitness, eating well and lifestyle and wanted to get the concept under one roof.—*Xinhua*

Gene test for prostate cancer could prevent overtreatment

CLEVELAND, 21 Feb—Researchers are making progress in the development of a genetic test that is purported to have the potential to help in determining when men need immediate treatment and when they can take the watchful waiting approach. Many men with prostate cancer are overtreated. They are sent into surgery, when surgery is not actually needed at the time.

“The biggest challenge with newly diagnosed prostate cancer is deciding what to do for men with low-grade, nonaggressive tumors on biopsy”, reports chairman of the Cleveland Clinic’s Glickman Urological and Kidney Institute, Dr Eric Klein. He goes on to say, “even low-grade tumours have lethal capabilities. So right now, about 90 percent of men with low-risk cancer choose treatment, typically surgery to remove the prostate or radiation therapy.”

CIC, Blackstone buys Morgan Stanley Japan loan portfolio

HONG KONG, 21 Feb—China Investment Corp (CIC.UL), the country’s \$300 billion sovereign wealth management fund, has teamed up with private equity fund Blackstone Group LP (BX.N) to buy a Japanese loan portfolio from Morgan Stanley (MS.N) at a steep discount, the *Financial Times* reported on Monday.

CIC and Blackstone paid 35 cents on the dollar for the portfolio, which had a face value of \$1.1 billion, the newspaper reported, citing sources familiar with the matter, adding that CIC had put up most of the money.

S Korean airlines post record high sales in 2010

SEOUL, 21 Feb — South Korea’s airlines posted record sales last year on the back of the global economic recovery and growing travel sentiment, a government report showed on Monday.

According to the report released by the Ministry of Land, Transport and Maritime Affairs, seven South Korean airlines registered a combined 17.44 trillion won (15.68 billion US dollars) in sales last year.

Their total operating profit also stood at a record high of 1.74 trillion won. These airlines include Korean Air Lines Co and Asiana Airlines Inc, the nation’s two largest national flag carriers, along with smaller budget carriers, such as Jeju Air Co, Jin Air Co and T’way Airlines. Korean Air, the nation’s top flag carrier, posted 11.46 trillion won in sales, a 22 percent jump from a year earlier, with its operating profit surging 739 percent to 1.12 trillion won, the ministry said.—*Xinhua*

McDonald’s selling stake in Indian JV

MUMBAI, 21 Feb— McDonald’s Corp (MCD.N) is selling its 50 percent stake in one of its Indian joint ventures to the local partner for an undisclosed amount and converting it into a franchisee operation, the *Economic Times* reported on Monday.

The world’s biggest restaurant chain will exit Hardcastle Restaurants Private Ltd, one of McDonald’s two 15-year-old equal joint ventures that run its outlets in India, the newspaper said citing the vice chairman of Hardcastle Restaurants.

“We are excited. It gives us the freedom to grow aggressively and take quick decisions,” Amit Jatia told the newspaper.

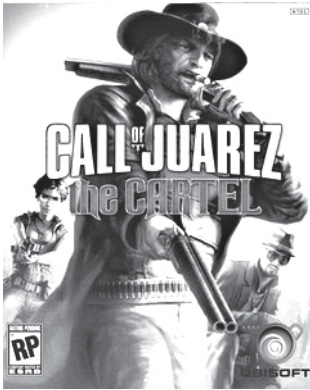
Hardcastle Restaurants owns the restaurant chain in west and south India. In northern and eastern part of the country the chain is owned by Connaught Plaza Restaurants Private Limited.

A spokesman for Hardcastle Restaurants in India said he could not immediately comment on the report, and Jatia did not respond to a mail by *Reuters* seeking comment. The *Economic Times* said the change in ownership at one of the Indian joint ventures meant McDonald’s would no longer invest in Hardcastle Restaurants, but would lend its brand name and help with training, development and knowledge.—*Reuters*

Mexico state congress asks ban of video game

CIUDAD JUAREZ, 21 Feb—A shoot-em-up video game set in the border town of Ciudad Juarez has angered local officials who are busy fighting all-

too-real violence.

Chihuahua state legislators said Sunday they have asked federal authorities to ban the game, "Call of Juarez: The Cartel," which is based on drug cartel shootouts in Ciudad Juarez.

About 6,000 people died in drug-related violence in Ciudad Juarez in 2009 and 2010, making the city, located across from El Paso, Texas, one of the deadliest in the world.

The web site of game developer Ubisoft Entertainment SA says the title is due for release this summer. Screen shots from the game show three characters armed with a pistol, an assault rifle and a shotgun ready to open fire on a city street.

The game's promotional slogan urges players, "Take justice into your own hands and experience the lawlessness of the modern Wild West." No one answered a message left at the company's San Francisco office.—*Internet*

Crocodile kills boy in Outback community

DARWIN, 21 Feb—A crocodile attacked and killed a 14-year-old boy who was swimming in a creek in an Outback Aboriginal community, police said Monday.

Police, park rangers and residents spent Monday combing the remote area for any trace of the boy, who was attacked while playing in the creek with his brothers in the Northern Territory's Milingimbi community, east of Darwin, on Sunday.

Northern Territory police Superintendent Helen Braam said officials were interviewing the young Aboriginal witnesses, who speak limited English, to get more information on what happened.

"As you can imagine, the community is quite devastated and shocked by what's happened," Braam said. Both saltwater and freshwater crocodiles were hunted to near extinction in Australia, but have become plentiful in the tropical north since they became protected by federal law in 1971.—*Internet*

Natural gas pipeline explodes in northern Ontario

VANCOUVER, 21 Feb—A natural gas pipeline ruptured in northern Ontario, igniting a fireball that sent flames hundreds of feet into the air, but service was slowly being restored, officials said on Sunday.

A section of the TransCanada Corp mainline exploded near Beardmore, Ontario late on Saturday, forcing "a few hundred" people to briefly evacuate their homes, the Ontario Provincial Police said. No injuries were reported, and the fire burned itself out after several hours, Sgt Greg Moore said.

TransCanada said the rupture involved pipe No 2 of its three-pipe mainline system linking western and eastern Canada, and pipes No 1 and No 3 do not appear to have been damaged in the incident.

India brings hope to stalled fight against polio

TILKESHWAR, 21 Feb—Tilkeshwar is one of India's forgotten villages.

It's 20 miles (30 kilometres) from the nearest paved road, untouched by electricity, running water, sanitation and even the barest of health care. Life is so bleak that nearly all adult men leave to search for menial work for their families' survival.

Here, deep in the floodplains of the Kosi River, the polio virus has stubbornly hidden. And it is here where the long-stalled global fight to eradicate the crippling disease might be on the verge of a badly needed victory.

The sudden optimism has been stoked by a startlingly effective campaign by the government and aid groups to finally drive polio out of India.

Italy stops new boatloads of migrants

ROME, 21 Feb—Italian police intercepted two boats carrying around 60 illegal immigrants as European Union experts began helping authorities manage the inflow of migrants fleeing turmoil in North Africa, police and reports said.

Police spotted the first boat carrying 13 immigrants earlier in the day several miles off the islet of Lampedusa south of Sicily, but did not reveal the nationalities of the migrants.

Authorities stopped another boat carrying some 50 people and

"I believe the time has come for New Zealand, the US and Australia to dramatically step up our collective surveillance activity in the region to provide a comprehensive assault on illegal activity," he said.—*Internet*

Orphanage blaze kills ten children in Estonia

TALLINN, 21 Feb—A fire raced through an orphanage for disabled children in western Estonia on Sunday, killing 10 of them, a rescue service spokesman said.

There were 37 children and nine adults inside the wooden building when the fire started at 2:30 pm (1230GMT) in the coastal town of Haapsalu, said Viktor Saaremets, a spokesman for the Western Estonia Rescue Services Centre.

"By the time rescue workers and firefighters arrived at the scene three or four minutes later the building was completely in flames," he said.

Ten children were killed, one adult was injured, Saaremets said. Most of the victims were wheelchair-bound and were unable to escape the rapidly spreading fire, he said. The others were evacuated to a nearby building and were not hurt, Saaremets said. The cause of the fire was not immediately clear.—*Internet*

"Thieves! Thieves!" 68-year-old Exume Fleurentis yells from a dusty porch nearby, swinging a broken crutch over his head.

Hungry themselves, the youths ignore the partially blind man. They scamper off after kitchen workers give them some food, leaving a little less for the residents of the Asile Commune.

Woman's cells keep on fighting cancer

DETROIT, 21 Feb—A Michigan bus driver's cells are being used to fight breast cancer decades after they were taken from her.

"It's the weirdest feeling," Sue Cutting of Northville told the Detroit Free Press. "My son called one day and said, 'Mom, I'm watching your cells on YouTube.'"

In 1984, a Michigan Cancer Foundation scientist put a scraping of her non-malignant breast cells, taken during surgery for fibrocystic disease, into a standard culture solution. While most cells divide a few dozen times and die, Cutting's began reproducing without stopping or mutating.

The Karmanos Cancer Institute in Detroit patented the tissue, known worldwide as MCF-10. As the first known non-cancerous human epithelial breast cell line to spontaneously reproduce, it offers an endless supply of tissue that can be studied to trace the progression of breast cancer.—*Internet*

SoCal truants monitored by GPS devices

ANAHEIM, 21 Feb—A technology company says a pilot programme using the Global Positioning System to monitor truants in Southern California isn't a punishment.

The Anaheim Union High School District is issuing kids who are chronically late for school a handheld GPS device that requires them to check in at regular intervals and ensures they are where they are

supposed to be when they are supposed to be there.

"The idea is for this not to feel like a punishment, but an intervention to help them develop better habits and get to school," Miller Sylvan of AIM Truancy Solutions told The Orange County Register.

The GPS device is being field tested on middle-school kids with four or more unexcused absences in lieu of

detention or other traditional remedies.

PC Magazine said Sunday the devices, which cost as much as \$400 each, require the user to check in when leaving for school in the morning and then four more times into the early evening. As an added incentive to get to school on time, each kid gets a morning wake-up call telling them to hit the deck and get to class.

Planet could be 'unrecognizable' by 2050, experts say

WASHINGTON, 21 Feb—A growing, more affluent population competing for ever scarcer resources could make for an "unrecognizable" world by 2050, researchers warned at a major US science conference on Sunday.

The United Nations has predicted the global population will reach seven billion this year, and climb to nine billion by 2050, "with almost all of the growth occurring in poor countries, particularly Africa and South Asia," said John Bongaarts of the non-profit Population

Council. To feed all those mouths, "we will need to produce as much food in the next 40 years as we have in the last 8,000," said Jason Clay of the World Wildlife Fund at

the annual meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS).

"By 2050 we will not have a planet left that is recognizable" if current trends continue, Clay said.

The swelling population will exacerbate problems, such as resource depletion, said John Casterline, director of the Initiative in Population Research at Ohio State University.

**Daewoo Shipbuilding wins 1.8 bln dollar
containership order**

SEOUL, 21 Feb — Daewoo Shipbuilding & Marine Engineering, South Korea's second-largest shipbuilder, won a 2 trillion won (1.8 billion US dollars) worth of deal to build 10 record-sized containerships.

The local shipyard

agreed with AP Moller-Maersk, the world's biggest container line, to build vessels able to carry 18,000 containers in London, Daewoo Shipbuilding said in an e-mailed statement on Monday.

The deal also includes options for 20 more ships with the same size, estimated to be worth about 4 trillion won assuming the options are exercised.

"This deal is a momentous event to change the whole landscape in the containerships market," Daewoo Chief Executive Officer Nam Sangtae said in a statement. "This order is the prelude to fierce competition for fuel efficiency among shipping lines across the globe as fuel prices will likely stay higher down the road," Lee Sok-je, a shipbuilding analyst at Mirae Asset Securities in Seoul, told Xinhua.—Xinhua

**Extreme tides flood
Marshall's capital**

MAJURO, 21 Feb—Extreme high tides have flooded parts of the low-lying Marshall Islands capital Majuro with a warning Sunday of worse to come because of rising sea levels.

Several areas of the city were flooded Saturday and forecasters pre-

dicted more to come on Sunday evening before the current high tide levels ease.

Flooding of the Marshall Islands atolls, many of which rise less than a metre (three feet) above sea level, will increase in "frequency and magnitude" in the coming years, University of Hawaii marine researcher Murray Ford said.

Ford, who is studying rising sea levels in the Marshall Islands, said the weekend's extreme tides of 1.67 metres were exacerbated by La Nina, a weather phenomenon that has caused the base sea level to rise by 15 centimetres (six inches) in recent months.—Internet

100 whales die in New Zealand mass stranding

WELLINGTON, 21 Feb—More than 100 pilot whales died in a mass stranding at a remote New Zealand beach, conservation officials said on Monday. Hikers on Sunday reported finding 107 whales beached on Stewart Island, off the South Island's southwest coast, a Department of Conservation (DoC) spokesman said.

He said some of the

whales were already dead and DOC rangers had to euthanise the 48 remaining survivors as there was no prospect of refloating them. "We were quickly aware that it would be at least 10 to 12 hours before we could attempt to refloat them and that given the hot, dry conditions many more would soon perish," he said.

The spokesman said a storm was also bearing

down on the beach near Mason Bay where the whales were stranded, making it too dangerous to try to get them back into the sea.

"We were worried we would be endangering the lives of staff and volunteers," he said.

Pilot whales up to six metres (20 feet) long are the most common species of whale seen in New Zealand waters.—Internet

At around 08:00 am local time, the bus skidded off the road and fell from a 300-metre ridge in Nan's Songdwaee district during its way from northern province of Chiang Rai to a school in Nan, Pol Lt Col Kiatthiyot Suwan-khasri said. From the total of 31 passengers, 11 were killed, 17 injured and three other missing, news website of local newspaper Matichon reported.

The police suspected that the driver was speeding and was not familiar with the road.

District heating, a system that connects residential buildings to centralised municipal heating, is widespread in Russian cities.

Australian city to expel 22,000 bats from downtown gardens

A colony of 22,000 bats may be coming to a neighbourhood near you after an Australian court served the flying foxes with an eviction notice and allowed the government to chase

them away with loud industrial noise. The court ruled that the grey-headed flying foxes, the largest bats in Australia, could be driven out of the Royal Botanical Gardens in the heart of Sydney as the colony grew too big and threatened hundreds of

rare and protected trees.

But conservation groups say the gardens are a critical roosting habitat for the bats, listed as a "vulnerable" species by the government, and, if chased away, they have few places to go other than the city.

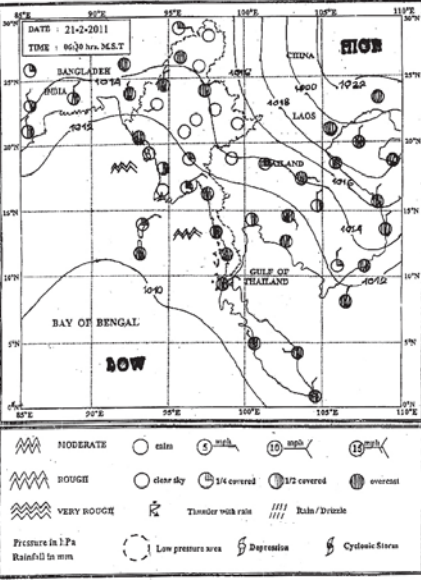

DAYTONA BEACH, 21 Feb—Daytona 500 winner Trevor Bayne says he's probably not going to attempt to run for the Sprint Cup championship this year.

The 20-year-old became the youngest winner in Daytona 500 history Sunday with a surprise victory in NASCAR's biggest race.

He's scheduled to run only 17 Cup races this season for the Wood Brothers while he competes for the Nationwide Series title for Roush-Fenway Racing.

NASCAR rules this season made drivers pick just one series to collect points, and Bayne chose the second-tier Nationwide Series.

He can change his mind, but he would not be given retroactive points for the Daytona 500.

NASCAR officials were still discussing Monday if his win would count toward seeding in the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship.
