17 killed, over 50 wounded by roadside bomb in Tikrit, Iraq

Baghdad, 3 June—A roadside bomb claimed 17 lives and injured more than 50 on Friday in Iraq's northern city of Tikrit, hometown of the toppled leader Saddam Hussein, a local police source said.

The explosion happened near a mosque in the well-known Presidential Palace site when people finished their noon prayer and headed for home.

The incident killed 17 people and wounded over 50 others, some of

whom were government officials, the source told Xinhua on condition of anonymity because he is not authorized to speak to the media.

The extravagant Presidential Palace which was once occupied by US Military now houses many government offices and a police headquarter. Tikrit, some 170 km north of Baghdad, is the capital city of the Sunni-dominated Salahuddin Province which is rife with violence and attacks.—MNA/Xinhua

Mexico seizes 154 rifles from buried cartel cache

MEXICO CITY, 3 June—Mexican soldiers found a large buried cache of weapons apparently stockpiled by a drug cartel, including 154 rifles and shotguns and more than 92,000 rounds of ammunition, the Defence Department said Friday.

The cache included four mortar shells, two rocket-propelled grenades, dozens of assault rifles, sniper rifles and two bows.

It was found in an underground chamber at a ranch near the industrial city of Monclova in the northern state of Coahuila earlier this week and included more than 4,600 rifle magazines, said Army Gen. Edgar Luis Villegas. He did not specify what day. Villegas said the weapons apparently belonged to the Zetas cartel, which has been fighting the Sinaloa cartel and other drug gangs for control of the border state.—Internet

Four killed in Welsh refinery blast

LONDON, 3 June—Four people have been killed in an explosion at a Chevron oil refinery near Pembroke, Wales, police said Friday.

"Mid and West Wales Fire and Rescue Service received a call (Thursday) at 18:22 pm (17:22 GMT) reporting an explosion at Chevron Oil Refinery at Pembroke Dock," chief superintendent Gwyn Thomas said in a statement.

"Paramedics have confirmed that four people lost their lives as a result of the incident," continued the Dyfed Powys police statement.

According to the force, a 730 cubic metres storage tank exploded while maintenance work was being carried out.

A police investi-

gation was launched Friday into what Thomas described as "a tragic industrial incident". Around 50 fire fighters extinguished the resulting blaze, the fire service said.

"Crews from Mid and West Wales Fire and Rescue assisted the onsite Chevron fire personnel throughout the operation," assistant chief fire officer Chris Davies said in a statement. "The fire itself was extinguished quickly and the crews



worked to make the scene safe for police to start their investigation," he added.

Chevron earlier released a statement saying "all appropriate action" had been taken in response to the situation.—Internet

US soldiers cite buried toxic chemical in S Korea

SEOUL, 3 June—Steve House can't stop thinking about the day in 1978 when he says he helped bury toxic Agent Orange at a US military base in South Korea, hauling rusting drums to a ditch from a warehouse that soldiers called "voodoo land."

After decades of silence and countless hours of suffering that he links to exposure to the dangerous herbicide, House is one of three former American soldiers whose accounts have sparked a joint US-South Korean investigation.

The allegations have set off a media firestorm in South Korea,

fueling daily TV news shows, front-page newspaper stories and worries among people near the base about groundwater safety, cancer and drops in land prices.

House claims that soldiers at Camp Carroll in southern South Korea took a large number of 55-gallon drums, fragile with rust and stamped with the words "Agent Compound Orange," from the mysterious, restricted warehouse and carried them over crisp dead grass into a deep ditch the length of a soccer field.

Nine killed in series of explosions in western Iraq

BAGHDAD, 3 June—A series of bombings ripped through the capital of Iraq's western Anbar Province Thursday night, killing nine people, Iraqi officials said.

The blasts in what was the heartland of the al-Qaeda-led militancy are a reminder of the danger still facing Iraq, as it prepares for the departure of the remaining US troops by the end of this year.

A police officer and hospital official said at least 25 people were also injured in the explosions.

The bomb explosions appeared coordinated to maximize deaths. A police official said two roadside bombs went off near the market, and then a parked car bomb exploded when police arrived on the scene. Then another parked car bomb exploded near the hospital where the injured were taken, the official said.—Internet

Pakistani-Afghan border clashes kill 70

BEIJING, 3 June—Over seventy people have been killed in one of the deadliest clashes in months along the Pakistani-Afghan border. Among the dead are 27 Pakistani troops

and 45 militants.

Violence erupted after hundreds of militants from Afghanistan stormed a Pakistani checkpoint. The assault went on for almost 24 hours.

Police say many of the attackers have now fled back to Afghanistan. Pakis-tan's northwestern border with Afghanistan is home to thousands of local and international al-Qaeda and Taliban fighters.

In the wake of the latest attack, Pakistan is calling for stern action against militants in Afghanistan by the US-led foreign forces.

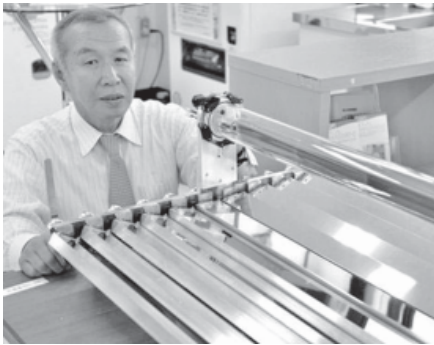

Yangtze River dolphin population to decrease by 80% in 30 years

YUEYANG, 3 June—The population of finless porpoises, an endangered species of freshwater dolphin that lives in China's Yangtze River, may decrease by over 80 percent over the next 30 years, experts said on Thursday after conducting a field survey along the river.

The rare species will edge closer to extinction if no action is taken, said Wang Ding, a dolphin expert from the Hydrobiology Institute of the Chinese Academy of Sciences.

Wang's team conducted a survey on Poyang Lake, Dongting Lake and other locations along the Yangtze from Sunday to Wednesday this week.

The dolphin population currently stands at 1,000, even lower than that of the giant panda, Wang said.

The dolphin population is decreasing by a rate of 6.4 percent annually, Wang said.—Xinhua



Truck-size asteroid zips close by Earth

NEW YORK, 3 June—An asteroid the size of a small motorhome zoomed near Earth (1 June), coming closer to us than the moon ever does.

The 23-foot-long (7-metre) space rock, named 2009 BD, came within 215,000 miles (346,000 kilometres) of Earth at around 8:51 pm EDT (0051 GMT on 2 June). The moon's average distance from us is about 239,000 miles (385,000 km).

2009 BD never threatened to hit Earth on this pass, researchers said. But even if the asteroid had slammed into us, it wouldn't have been a big deal.

NASA to measure salt in world's oceans

PASADENA, 3 June—A NASA instrument will measure salt levels in Earth's oceans, a factor considered a key driver of ocean processes and the world's climate, researchers say.

The Aquarius instrument, set to launch this month aboard a satellite built by Argentina's space agency, will use its salt-seeking sensors to make comprehensive measurements of ocean surface salinity with the precision needed to help researchers better determine how Earth's ocean interacts with the atmosphere to influence climate, a release for NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, Calif, said Thursday.

This salinity is a key indicator of how Earth's freshwater moves between the ocean, land and atmosphere, the release said. "We ultimately want to predict climate change and have greater confidence in our predictions," Aquarius principal investigator Gary Lagerloef said. "But, a climate model's forecast skill is only as good as its ability to accurately represent modern-day observations." Density-driven ocean circulation, Lagerloef said, is controlled as much by salinity as by ocean temperature. Sea salt makes up only 3.5 percent of the world's ocean, but its relatively small presence introduces huge consequences.—Internet

Search giants make websites easier to find

SAN FRANCISCO, 3 June—Google, Bing and Yahoo are working together to enable websites to tag content in a way that lets search engines better categorize and prioritize the information in results.

The Internet rivals launched a schema.org initiative to promote a common format to "markup" Web pages with data detailing for search engines exactly what sites contain.

A variety of options are available to website makers when it comes to marking up pages, and the search engines believe a common standard will mean less work for publishers and more accuracy in ranking results.

"We want to continue making the open Web richer and more useful," Google fellow Ramanathan Guha said in a blog post.

"We know that it takes time and effort for webmasters to add this markup to their pages, and adding markup is much harder if every search engine asks for data in a different way." The schema.org website was intended as a "one-stop shop" for website makers when it comes to creating the data tags to describe content to search engines.

"We want to enable publishers to give us hints about what things they are describing on their sites," Bing partner programme manager Steve Macbeth said in an online post. "We at Bing see this as a major step forward for the Web, simplification for webmasters and richer more informative search results for consumers."

Microsoft unveils "Windows 8"

SAN FRANCISCO, 3 June—Microsoft on Wednesday gave a preview of its next-generation operating system code-named "Windows 8."

The software giant introduced the successor to Windows 7 at the ninth edition of *The Wall Street Journal's* Digital: All Things Digital in Rancho Palos Verdes, California, some 48 km south of Los Angeles.

With an interface quite different from legacy Windows, Windows 8 looks more like Windows Phone 7 and features an app management from Windows mobile operating system.

Lenovo intends to buy control of Germany's Medion

BEIJING, 3 June—Lenovo Group Ltd, China's biggest maker of personal computer, aimed to buy control of Medion AG, a multimedia and consumer electronics maker, to double its market share in Germany, the *China Daily* reported Thursday.

The purchase will be Lenovo's biggest acquisition since it acquired International Business Machines Corp's PC business in 2004. Lenovo estimated that after the acquisition, it will be the third-largest PC company in Germany, which is Europe's largest PC market. Lenovo will have more than 14 percent of the German and 7.5 percent of the Western European PC market, the newspaper said.

Chief Executive Officer Yang Yuanqing said the deal will complement both Lenovo's core PC business and new businesses, which are key areas for development.

The Chinese PC maker said it hopes the deal will be completed in August and that it will acquire 50 to 75 percent of the Medion AG's stock, according to the newspaper.

Lenovo was ranked the fourth-largest PC company and held a 9.9 percent market share worldwide in the first quarter of 2011.—Xinhua

Health Tip: Signs that you may have pinkeye

Conjunctivitis, commonly called pinkeye, is an infection or inflammation of the membrane that lines the eyelids.

The cause is most often a virus, but a bacterial infection, allergies, exposure to chemicals or use of contact lenses also may be triggers.

Pinkeye is not only uncomfortable, but usually very contagious.

The ADAM Encyclopedia says these are common symptoms of pinkeye:

- * Red eyes.
- * Crusty eyelids that develop overnight.
- * Eyes that itch and tear up more than usual.
- * A feeling of grit in the eyes.
- * Blurred vision.

Second possible E coli patient hospitalized in Poland

WARSAW, 3 June — A possible second E coli infection patient has been hospitalized in Szczecin, northwestern Poland, Health Minister Ewa Kopacz said Thursday.

The man, who recently returned to Poland from Germany, has been diagnosed with exudative diarrhea and is currently being tested for E coli bacteria.

Poland's first E coli case, a 29-year-old woman permanently residing in Germany and

diagnosed with the bacteria over a week ago, is currently in the same hospital.

Kopacz said sanitary teams were running E coli checks countrywide, especially on marketplaces and in warehouses.

The E coli epidemic originated in Germany, where it has taken 17 lives.

One death has so far occurred in Sweden, bringing the total death toll to 18.

Clot risk spurs FDA review of birth control pills

WASHINGTON, 3 June—US regulators will assess the safety of Bayer birth control pills as a result of two new studies suggesting they pose a higher-than-expected risk of serious blood clots.

Expressing concerns about the hormone drospirenone found in Bayer's Yaz, Yasmin, Beyaz and Safyral products the Food and Drug Administration said in a statement Tuesday it has commissioned an 800,000-person study to review the risks. Drospirenone is a type of progestin used in combination with another female hormone, estrogen.

Women taking the drospirenone-containing birth control pills had a two to three times greater risk of blood clots compared with women taking pills containing a different type of progestin, according to the studies published in *BMJ*, the *FDA* said. Because other studies have had conflicting results, the agency said it wants to conduct its own review. It expects to have the results this summer.

All birth control pills carry some clotting risk. Symptoms include leg or chest pain or sudden shortness of breath. Women with concerns should talk to their doctor, the *FDA* said.—*Internet*

US seals deal to sell Chrysler stake

WASHINGTON, 3 June —The US Treasury has said it reached an agreement to sell the government's stake in Chrysler Group for an estimated \$560 million to Italian automaker Fiat.

With the deal, the Treasury "will have fully exited" its investment in Chrysler under the Troubled Asset Relief Programme (TARP).

"As Treasury exits its investment in Chrysler, it's clear that President (Barack) Obama's decision to stand behind and restructure this company was the right one," Treasury Secretary Timothy Geithner said in a statement.

"Today, America's automakers are mounting one of the most improbable turnarounds in recent history creating new jobs and making new investments in communities across our

country."

Fiat agreed to pay Treasury \$500 million for its 98,461 shares of Chrysler.

Treasury also held the right to proceeds above a certain threshold received by the United Auto Workers retiree trust from the trust's sale of Chrysler equity, as well as a right to purchase all of the shares retained by the UAW

retiree trust that Fiat will purchase for \$75 million.

Treasury will receive 80 percent of the proceeds (\$60 million) from that \$75 million, while the Canadian government will obtain 20 percent of the proceeds (\$15 million).

In May, Chrysler repaid \$5.1 billion in Treasury loans six years ahead of schedule.

Canada, Russia reinforce aerospace, economic ties

OTTAWA, 3 June — Canada and Russia have agreed to strengthen their economic ties and increase cooperation in both aerospace and scientific research in the Arctic, the home of vast hydrocarbon reserves.

Canadian Minister of International Trade Ed Fast and Russian First Vice-Premier Viktor Zoubkov signed the joint declaration in Ottawa between the two countries with the biggest territories in the world as part of their Eighth Intergovernmental Economic Commission meeting.

"With trade representing some 60 percent of our economy, deepening our relationship with key countries like Russia is vital to our economic recovery," said Fast.

"As a fast-growing economy,

Russia offers great potential for Canadian companies, which would strengthen our economic growth and lead to more jobs." Bilateral trade with Russia totaled \$2.8 billion in 2010, an increase of 12.3 percent from the previous year, according to Canadian government figures.

The two countries also signed a memorandum of understanding on aerospace to develop strategies to make the sector in both countries more globally competitive. In addition, the land giants signed a statement on science and technology cooperation to map out possible collaborative areas in climate studies, energy, nanotechnology, biomedicine and Arctic research.

Cyber attacks constant, Australia says

SYDNEY, 3 June—Australia’s attorney-general said cyber attacks had become so frequent that government and private networks were under “continuous threat”, testing online security defences.

But Robert McClelland on Friday declined to single out China, at the centre of hacking allegations from Internet giant Google, saying the “Australian government’s position is not to identify a source of suspected espionage.”

“The reality is espionage can be unquestionably undertaken by other countries, by organised criminals, or indeed by business competitors,” he said.

McClelland said it was “unquestionably” in Australia’s interest to stay ahead of the evolving, and mounting, cyber threats, as he

announced a white paper on the future of Australia’s Internet security to be published in 2012.

“Security agencies are finding malicious activity is increasing to a point where systems in both government and the private sector are under continuous threat,” he said in a speech to business leaders on cyber crime.

“The cyber threat to Australia is real, evolving and continuing to test our defences.”

Foreign intelligence agencies, criminal organizations and commercial competitors were all to blame, with electronic spying cheap and low risk but with huge potential gains, he added.

Philippines files charges over smuggled corals

MANILA, 3 June—Philippine officials have filed criminal charges against several people linked to a huge shipment of endangered sea turtles and rare black corals.

The shipment’s seizure last month has raised alarm that the archipelago’s rich marine life is being devastated by the illegal trade.

Customs Commissioner Angelito Alvarez filed the case Friday at the Justice Department against the owner, consignee, shippers and haulers of the 35 million peso (\$808,000) cargo.

They are facing charges of violating the ban on coral exploitation and exportation and related offences. Exequiel Navarro, who is listed in the shipment’s manifest as the consignee, has denied the charges saying he was not aware what was in the cargo.—Internet

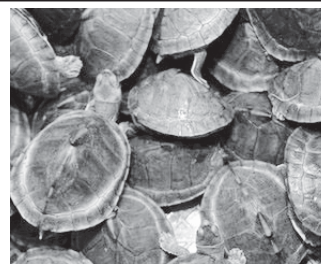


Filipino workers arrange rare black corals and endangered green sea turtles as they are presented to media in Manila, Philippines on 30 May, 2011. INTERNET

Forest fire area reduced in Russia’s Far East

VLADIVOSTOK, 3 June—Firefighters have managed to reduce the area of forest fires by about 20 percent in Russia’s Far Eastern Region of Yakutia over the past week, local forest authorities said Thursday. Thirty-four fires burned 86,500 hectares of Yakutia forests last week. Firefighters had put out nine spots of fire over an area of more than 15,000 hectares, sources said.

Planes and helicopters dropped more than 750 tons of water on forest fires. More than 1,000 people joined the efforts to put out wildfires on the ground, and 106 smoke jumpers, wildland firefighter who parachute into the area are leading the efforts. To prevent the reoccurrence of wildfires, people are prohibited from entering the forests. A state of emergency was declared last week in eight districts of Yakutia and in the city of Yakutsk. —Xinhua

BANGKOK, 3 June—Thai customs authorities say 431 turtles and other rare reptiles were stuffed into four suitcases and smuggled into the Bangkok Airport.

Ghariahs a type of crocodile native to India — and Indian star and roofed tortoises were among the species found in the luggage Wednesday.

Customs Department Director-General Prasong Poontaneat says many of the reptiles are endangered

and international trade is banned. They were discovered when an Indian traveller arriving from Bangladesh failed to retrieve his bags.

Prasong said the animals would be held for evidence and taken care of by wildlife officials. Thailand is a hub for the illegal wildlife trade. A smuggling attempt thwarted last month involved two leopards, two panthers, an Asiatic black bear and two macaque monkeys all juveniles about the size of puppies.

Dubbed a “flesh-eating” bacteria in media reports, methicillin-

resistant Staphylococcus aureus (MRSA) has emerged as a major threat in hospitals around the world, becoming potentially deadly when it infects wounds.

MEXICO CITY, 3 June—Mexico has filed charges against the alleged leader of a ruthless cell of the Zetas drug cartel who authorities say masterminded the mass killings of more than 250 people in a northern border state.

The federal Attorney General’s Office says Martin Estrada Luna is charged with organized crime, kidnapping, drug trafficking and illegal possession of firearms.

Prosecutors said after Estrada Luna’s April arrest that he was responsible for the slayings of 72 migrants last August and 183 people months later in Tamaulipas state, but he has not been charged with the killings.

The 34-year-old high school dropout was born in Mexico and grew up in the US, where he had a rap sheet of petty crimes. He was deported to Mexico in 2009.

Hackers claim new Sony cyberattack

WASHINGTON, 3 June—Hackers have claimed to have compromised more than one million passwords, email addresses and other information from SonyPictures.com in the latest cyberattack on the Japanese electronics giant.

The claim was made by a group of hackers calling themselves "Lulz Security," who published a number of files online containing lists of thousands of stolen email addresses and passwords. "We recently broke

into SonyPictures.com and compromised over 1,000,000 users' personal information, including passwords, email addresses, home addresses, dates of birth, and all Sony opt-in data associated with their accounts," Lulz Security said. "Due to a lack of resources on our part we were unable to fully copy all of this information," the group said. "In theory we could have taken every last bit of information, but it would have taken several more weeks."—*Internet*

30 years after first AIDS cases, hope for a cure

WASHINGTON, 3 June—Sunday marks 30 years since the first AIDS cases were reported in the United States. And this anniversary brings fresh hope for something many had come to think was impossible: finding a cure.

The example is Timothy Ray Brown of San Francisco, the first person in the world apparently cured of AIDS. His treatment isn't practical for wide use, but there are encouraging signs that other approaches might someday lead to a cure, or at least allow some people to control HIV without needing medication every day.

"I want to pull out all the stops to go for it," though cure is still a very difficult goal, said Dr Anthony Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases. For now, the focus remains on preventing new infections.

With recent progress on novel ways to do that and a partially effective vaccine, "we're starting to get the feel that we can really get our arms around this pandemic," Fauci said. More than 25 million people have died of AIDS since the first five cases were recognized in Los Angeles in 1981.

Russia lays out conditions for EU vegetable ban removal

Moscow, 3 June—Russia said Thursday it would need to be convinced that Europe has a lethal bacteria outbreak under control before lifting a ban on vegetable imports from the European Union.

The Russian consumer watchdog said that "the competent structures" from Germany or the European Union should confirm the "reasons for the epidemic" of supposed E coli in Germany and a number of other European countries.

They should also establish how and through which foodstuffs the bacteria was being transmitted and pinpoint the origin of contaminated foods, the consumer watchdog, Rospotrebnadzor, said in a statement.

European officials should also prove the situation has been taken under control and release a list of measures that have prevented the disease from spreading further.

"Receiving the above-listed information will allow to drastically correct the situation and prevent the disease from spreading among the Russian population, with traders sustaining minimal losses," the consumer watchdog known said in the statement posted on its website.—*Internet*

Mexico finds possible US remains from 1846-48 war

MEXICO CITY, 3 June—Archaeologists said Thursday they have found 10 sets of skeletal remains that may belong to US soldiers who died during a battle in the 1846-48 Mexican-American war. The government experts said the shape of the skulls and bone measurements suggest the skeletons belonged to Americans who were killed in the battle of Monterrey on 21-23 Sep, 1846. Archaeologist Araceli Rivera said the height of the skeletons — between 5 feet, 7 inches (175 centimetres) and 5 feet, 9 inches — and "Caucasian" skull features indicated they were Americans.

The finds made during digging between January and mid-May came in the same area of the northern city of Monterrey where a total of 10 other sets of remains have been discovered during excavations since 1995. The archaeologists are digging in the area because a construction company plans to build there.

Red colour increases speed, strength of reactions

WASHINGTON, 3 June—When humans see red, their reactions become both faster and more forceful, according to a new study published this week in the US bimonthly journal *Emotion*.

The findings may have applications for sporting and other activities in which a brief burst of strength and speed is needed, such as weightlifting. But the authors caution that the colour energy boost is likely short-lived.

The study measured the reactions of students in two experiments. In the first, 30 fourth-through-10th graders pinched and held open a metal clasp. Right before doing so, they read aloud their participant number written in either red or gray crayon. In the second experiment, 46 undergraduates squeezed a handgrip with their dominant hand as hard as possible when they read the word "squeeze" on a computer monitor. The word appeared on a red, blue, or gray background.

Mass towns give thanks tornado toll wasn't worse

MONSON, 3 June—The sight of flattened homes, peeled-off roofs and the toppled steeple of a 140-year-old church stunned New Englanders after deadly tornadoes swept through Massachusetts, striking an area of the country that rarely sees such severe twisters.

The storms, which came with fair warning but still shocked with their intensity, killed at least three people, injured about 200 and wreaked damage in a string of 18 cities and villages across

central and western Massachusetts.

If the National Weather Service agrees Wednesday's three deaths are tornado-related, it would bring the year's US toll to 522 and make this year the deadliest for tornadoes since 1950. The highest recorded toll was 519 in 1953; four deaths from Joplin, Mo., that were added Thursday tied the record. There were deadlier years before 1950, but those counts were based on estimates.

WASHINGTON, 3 June— There's a new US symbol for healthful eating: The Agriculture Department unveiled "My Plate" on Thursday, abandoning the food pyramid that had guided many Americans but merely confused others.

The new guide is divided into four

slightly different-sized quadrants, with fruits and vegetables taking up half the space and grains and protein making up the other half. The vegetables and grains portions are the largest of the four. Gone are the old pyramid's references to sugars, fats or oils. What was once a category called "meat and beans" is now simply "proteins," making way for seafood and vegetarian options like tofu. Next to the plate is a blue circle for dairy, which could be a glass of milk or a food such as cheese or yogurt.

Some critics, including congressional Republicans, have charged the Obama administration of reaching too far in trying to make Americans eat healthier, especially when it comes to new rules that tell schools what children can eat on campus.—*Internet*

Australia says Japan E coli outbreak from processing

SYDNEY, 3 June— Australian livestock officials said an E coli outbreak in Japan may have involved Australian meat, but that it was most likely contaminated during processing in Japan.

Some 15 diners were infected with the O157

strain of E coli bacteria after eating at a Korean-style barbecue restaurant a Japanese outlet on 6 May. All have since recovered.

Meat and Livestock Australia regional manager in Japan Melanie Brock on Friday said the outbreak was being investigated but there had been no official confirmation of the source of the beef involved.

"At this stage what

we need to determine is at exactly what point the contamination has taken place," she told ABC Radio.

"We believe it has taken place during processing in Japan of Australian beef, but it's still very early here. We're working through the details." The strain involved in Japan is not the same as the one involved in the current deadly outbreak in Europe.—*Internet*

Mexico seizes 150 m USD in illicit cash

MEXICO CITY, 3 June— The Mexican military has seized nearly 150 million US dollars in cash from various criminal organizations over the past four and a half years, the defence ministry said Thursday. Of the total, 4.13 million dollars were confiscated in the first five months of 2011, including 1.95 million dollars in May, the ministry said in a statement.

The Mexican government said its military has played a key role in its ongoing war against drug cartels and the organized crime, as it has detained 33,440 suspects and seized 85,551 weapons, 31,331 vehicles and 490 aircraft during the same period.—*Xinhua*

May US job numbers expected to show struggles

WASHINGTON, 3 June— Analysts were expecting that sharp cuts in local and federal government spending will translate into some grim numbers Friday when the Labour Department releases its figures on national employment for May.

After two weeks of glum sectoral data, the figures on just how many Americans had jobs last month are expected to confirm a sharp slowdown in economic growth despite White House efforts to power up a job-creating recovery.

That could add to the raging political battle over government spending and how to repair the economy while nine percent of the country

remains unemployed, more than a year after the country's deep recession ended.

So far this year the monthly figures on the number of employed Americans have risen steadily, but hardly fast enough to significantly push down the overall jobless rate.

After about 1.1

million jobs were added last year, in the first four months of 2011 some 768,000 new positions have been created.

But a combination of weak reports on corporate hiring and high figures for new layoffs since April suggest that the economy has lost momentum.—*Internet*

Shooting in Yuma, Arizona, leaves six dead

PHOENIX, 3 June— A man apparently angry over a divorce case went on a shooting spree in and around Yuma, Arizona, on Thursday, killing five people and wounding another before taking his own life, authorities said.

One of the dead was identified as attorney Jerrold Shelley, who was shot inside his downtown law office, Yuma Police Chief Jerry Geier told *Reuters* by telephone.

The gunman, identified as Carey Hal Dyess, 73, also knew

the other victims, Geier said, but their names were not immediately released. All of the dead appeared to be adults, he said.

Details of the incident were sketchy, but police said the shootings unfolded over several hours at six different locations in and around the city, located in the southwestern corner of Arizona near the border with Mexico.

Yuma Mayor Alan Krieger said the gunman's motive was not entirely clear, but that he was believed to be upset over a divorce case.

The first shooting occurred at about 5 am local time in a rural area outside Yuma, authorities said.

The gunman then drove in a rented car to several other rural locations to shoot other people before driving to Shelley's Yuma law office, where he opened fire on the attorney, Geier said.—*Reuters*

Chinese, German researchers identify sequence of deadly E coli

BERLIN, 3 June— The recent outbreak of deadly E coli in Europe was caused by an entirely new super-toxic strain, Chinese and German researchers said Thursday, after finishing sequencing its genome.

By now, 17 Germans and one Swede have been killed after the outbreak, while more than 2,000 people across Europe were sickened. The number of people suffering from serious hemolytic-uremic syndrome (HUS) due to the infection has reached 470 in Germany. In its latest report, the Beijing Genomics Institute in Shenzhen (BGI-Shenzhen), China's flagship genome centre, said it "has just completed the sequence and carried out a preliminary analysis that shows the current infection is caused by an entirely new super-toxic E coli strain." BGI-Shenzhen was collaborating closely with the University Medical Centre Hamburg-Eppendorf in Germany by using their genomic technology.—*Xinhua*

3G phones less harmful for brain than previous avatars

SYDNEY, 3 June—3G phones used by iPhones, BlackBerries and other smart phones give a much lower dose of radiowaves to the brain than earlier models, a health expert has claimed.

However, Professor Bruce Armstrong from the University of Sydney, says that their frequent use could still cause cancer, reports the *Sydney Morning Herald*.

Armstrong who worked on the report with 30 other experts said researchers studied radiowave activity on

those who used phones the heaviest and for the longest period, and health risks for average users was "really quite small".

The 3G technology also appeared to emit less harmful radiowaves, he said.

But research on these new technologies was still in its infancy.

"A very important observation, really, just based on the technology, is that the 3G phones in fact give a much lower dose to the brain than the previous generations," Professor Arm-

strong said.

Professor Armstrong said while health agencies tended to err on the side of caution it was still important people avoided heavy mobile-phone use.

"I think that's a very common principal of public health, that in the face of uncertainty it's good to take precautions," he said.

"I would say that the main message out of this study is to avoid exposing your brain to radiowaves from mobile phones," he added.

Vulture comeback: Rebirth among birds of death

DANGPLAT, 3 June—A wake of vultures perches on the bare branches of a towering tree, dark shapes silhouetted against a pale sky, sharp beaks and talons ready to tear apart a dead cow laid out in a Cambodian jungle clearing. This manmade "vulture restaurant" is part of efforts across Asia to save the critically endangered bird from extinction. Now there are tentative signs they may be paying off. The population of vultures in Cambodia has doubled to 300 from as few as 150 in 2004. In India, they are still dying off, but their rate of decline has fallen.

These super scavengers may be regarded as messengers of death and doom, but in Asia, it is they who have suffered one of the natural world's greatest population crashes of recent times.

From tens of millions, numbers of the three main species have plummeted to well below 60,000, says British expert Richard Cuthbert. —Internet

Continental, US Airways fined for deceptive price advertising

WASHINGTON, 3 June—The US Department of Transportation (DOT) Thursday imposed civil penalties against Continental Airlines and US Airways for violating the rules prohibiting deceptive price advertising in air travel. Continental was given a civil penalty of 120,000 US dollars and US Airways 45,000 US dollars, the DOT said in a statement.

Any advertising that includes a price for air transportation is required to state the full price to be paid by the consumer, including all carrier-imposed surcharges, according to DOT's rules.

However, a review of Continental's website by DOT revealed instances in which the carrier failed to include fuel surcharges in its listed fares.

With respect to US Airways, its homepage advertisement has an asterisk next to the fare and a statement that additional taxes and fees might apply, but there was no information on the type or amount of fees in either the ad or on the homepage, noted the department. "Passengers have the right to know how much they will have to pay when they buy an airline ticket, and we will continue to take enforcement action when these rules are violated," said US Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood.—Xinhua

Europe's 2018 Lunar Lander aims to finally solve Moon's water mystery

WASHINGTON, 3 June — Recent investigations by NASA's Lunar Crater Observation and Sensing Satellite (LCROSS) satellite revealed in late 2009 that massive amounts of water-ice can be found at the lunar south pole.

Researchers and astronomers at the European Space Agency (ESA) are already planning a mission to the location to find out where the water comes from.

"We certainly don't

know where the water comes from until we get down there and do more experiments.

That's why the Lunar Lander is so important," notes Colin Pillinger, professor of planetary science at the Open University in the UK.

Finding the right landing site is also crucial for science. "You have to go to the exact places where we think these valuable resources might be concentrated,"

he said.

Expected to be launched in 2018, the unmanned craft will land near the lunar South Pole.

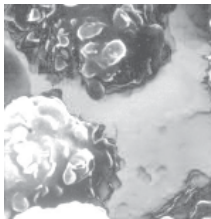

Hopes raised of blocking return of leukaemia

LONDON, 3 June — Scientists are working on a way to stop one of the most aggressive forms of acute leukaemia returning after a patient has received treatment. Recurrence of the blood cancer caused by rogue leukaemic stem cells is a major problem for doctors.

But a team at King's

College London, working on mice, have raised hopes of a solution. They describe in the journal *Cell Stem Cell* how they eliminated the stem cells by suppressing two key proteins.

It is hoped the work, funded by Cancer Research UK and Leukaemia Lymphoma Research, will lead to new treatments which will enable complete remission for patients with a form of acute leukaemia called MLL. Cancer stem cells appear to be more resistant than other leukaemia cells to standard treatments, such as radiotherapy and chemotherapy. So even after treatment appears to have been initially successful, they can remain to trigger a new round of disease, which often reappears in a more aggressive form.—*Internet*

German police train vulture 'detectives' to find bodies

BEFLIN, 3 June — German police are trying out a new weapon in the fight against crime — vultures that can find hidden corpses. Three feathered detectives — called Sherlock, Miss Marple and Columbo — are being trained in Walsrode bird park in northern Germany.

The birds' keen eyesight and acute sense of smell might make them as skilful as their fictional namesakes.

But worryingly Sherlock sometimes prefers to hunt on foot, rather than scan the ground from above. Police used a piece of shroud from a mortuary for the training exercise, German media report. The vultures are thought to be better than sniffer dogs at finding bodies when a large area has to be searched and the terrain is difficult, for example if it is densely overgrown.

Debate rises over death toll in Mexico drug war

MEXICO CITY, 3 June— The debate over how many people have died in Mexico's 4 1/2-year-old drug war is intensifying as the government's silence over the figure grows longer.

The last official count, more than 34,600 dead, came almost six months ago, and the number of lives lost is now obviously far higher, with daily reports of slayings and shootouts in drug hot spots and the occasional horror of mass graves containing hundreds of bodies.

Some Mexican news media are reporting that their counts show the death toll has risen past 40,000, a number that includes rival gang members killed in turf battles, as well as innocent bystanders, extortion victims, police and soldiers.

The most recent official count came in January, when the government released a database of drug-related deaths as a gesture of openness about President Felipe Calderon's military assault on drug cartels, which began as he took office in December 2006.

SAN JOSE, 3 June—A 16-year-old US high school student was shot and killed at a Costa Rican hotel by a security guard who mistook him for a thief, authorities said Thursday.

High school senior

Justin Johnston of McLouth, Kansas was shot in the chest before dawn Thursday at the La Cangreja Lodge hotel in the city of La Fortuna de San Carlos, Costa Rican police said in a statement.

The security guard,

who was identified as a 34-year-old man by the last name of Guevara, has been detained, police said.

Police said the students had been sent to bed at 10 pm Wednesday but a group left their rooms and went to another building on the premises.—*Internet*

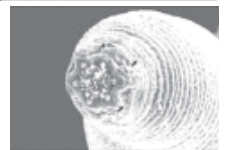
Deepest-living land animal found

NEW YORK, 3 June — Worms have been found living at depths in the Earth where it was previously thought animals could not survive. Discovered in South African mines, the roundworms can survive in the stifling 48C (118F) water that seeps between cracks

1.3km beneath the Earth's crust. The find has surprised scientists who, until now, believed only single-celled bacteria thrived at these depths.

Writing in the journal *Nature*, the team says this is the deepest-living "multi-cellular" organism known to science. The re-

searchers found two species of worm. One is a new species to science, which the scientists have named *Halicephalobus mephisto* after Faust's Lord of the Underworld. The other is a previously known roundworm known as *Plecticus aquatilis*.—*Internet*

Police shoot concrete alligator

A police officer in Independence, Mo., who thought he was killing an alligator on the loose, discovered he had shot a life-size concrete lawn ornament. The police department ended up apologizing to Rick Sheridan, the cement gator's owner, WDAF-TV, Kansas City, reported. Sheridan said he heard gunfire as he worked in his garage last weekend and went out to investigate, discovering several police officers with their guns drawn. "The officer fired two rounds, and killed my concrete, ornamental alligator," Sheridan said.

The police department said a man called to report his children had seen an alligator. The department checked with state conservation officials and were told they should kill the animal if they could find it. Sheridan said Wednesday he has found the alligator to be more effective than "No Trespassing" signs at keeping strangers from wandering onto his property. He said vandals simply rip the signs down.

Stolen laptop sends clues to recovery

Joshua Kaufman had his stolen MacBook back in hand on Thursday after the laptop sent clues that led police to the suspected thief.

Kaufman won fans online by using Hidden software to capture pictures of the apparent culprit taken with the stolen MacBook's built-in camera and posting images at his ThisGuy-HasMyMacbook.tumblr.com blog along with commentary.

One picture showed a man snoozing on a couch while another featured the same fellow

shirtless in bed starting intently at the laptop.

Kaufman said he began piecing together clues after the MacBook was stolen from his apartment in the California City of Oakland on 21 March.

A photo posted to his blog apparently shows the suspected thief driving away with the laptop. "I immediately began to gather photos, network and location information about my stolen MacBook using Hidden," Kaufman said at his blog.

He shared his

detective work with police officers who on

Tuesday arrested a cab driver said to be the man in the MacBook pictures and found the laptop in the suspected thief's home. "BOOYA!" Kaufman wrote in his blog,

using a local expression of triumphant enthusiasm. "The police used my evidence (email which pointed to a cab service) that he was a driver and tricked him into picking them up."

The story turned out so well that some of those following along online suspected it was staged as a promotion for Hidden, software that spies on laptop thieves and pinpoints their whereabouts.

Parents make Facebook page for fetus

A Texas couple said they announced the impending birth of their daughter by setting up a Facebook profile for the girl while she is still in the womb.

Matt and Ellie Greene of Whitehouse said their daughter, who they have already named Marriah and is due 9 June, already has 268 Facebook friends, ABC News reported Thursday.

"We weren't sure how to tell all

our friends the baby was coming," Matt Greene said. "We'd held off on telling people we wanted to make sure everything was fine with the pregnancy. We thought the quickest way to tell everyone would be to use Facebook." The profile is filled with tongue-in-cheek information, including Marriah's education being listed as studying "labour and delivery at Tummy University" and her interests being primarily "swimming."

Federer-Djokovic, Nadal-Murray in French semis

PARIS, 3 June—Even Rafael Nadal acknowledges his French Open semifinal against Andy Murray is not nearly as intriguing as the one between unbeaten Novak Djokovic and 16-time Grand Slam champion Roger Federer. "It's the best player of today against the best player in

history. ... It's going to be a beautiful match," Nadal said. "I would watch it — if I was a spectator.

"Top-seeded Nadal, for example, is bidding to tie Bjorn Borg's record of six French Open championships. No 4 Murray is dealing with an injured right ankle as he hopes to win his first Grand Slam title — and give Britain its first male champion at a major tennis tournament since 1936. No 3 Federer, meanwhile, has gone more than 16 months without reaching a Grand Slam final, which doesn't sound too bad unless you consider it's the guy's longest gap since he won Wimbledon in 2003.

In the women's final Saturday, No 5 Francesca Schiavone of Italy, the defending champion, will face No 6 Li Na of China.

Li eliminated Maria Sharapova of Russia 6-4, 7-5 on Thursday, while Schiavone beat Marion Bartoli of France 6-3, 6-3. Djokovic has had plenty of idle time to ponder things: He hasn't played a match since winning in the fourth round Sunday. Federer was the last player to beat Djokovic, back in November at the ATP World Tour Finals in London, and holds a 13-9 edge in their career series. But Djokovic is 3-0 against Federer this season, all on hard courts.— *Internet*

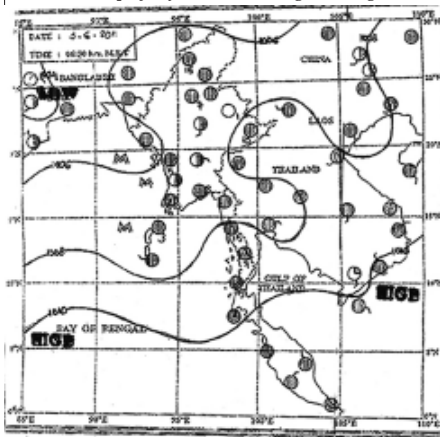

Power alone is not enough on clay, says Schiavone

PARIS, 3 June— While the women's game is becoming more and more power-based in recent years, simply bludgeoning the ball across the net will not be enough to win the French Open, champion Francesca Schiavone said on Friday.

Venus and Serena Williams, along with Maria Sharapova are just some of the players

who have taken power-hitting to a new level over the past decade but their limited success on clay proves that players cannot simply rely on flexing their muscles to win the Suzanne Lenglen Cup.

The trio have won 23 majors between them since 1999 but only one of them Serena's success at Roland Garros in 2002 has been achieved

on the red stuff.

Italian fifth seed Schiavone, who will take on Chinese sixth seed Li Na in Saturday's final, is on a 13-0 streak at Roland Garros and credited her success to a combination of her sliced backhand and spinning forehand, along with her ability to quickly switch tactics.
