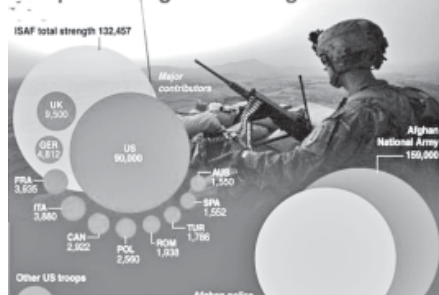
He said that as a result of the explosion, Muqur District Chief Mohammad Daud was killed and seven others including five police and two civilians were injured.

Three NATO soldiers killed in Afghanistan

KABUL, 10 July—Continued militancy claimed the lives of three more soldiers with the NATO-led International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) on Sunday, bringing the fatalities of the alliance to 297 so far this year, a Press release of the military alliance said.

Rebel attack kills three, injures 70 in Colombia

BOGOTA, 10 July— Three people were killed and 70 others injured in an alleged rebel attack in the southwestern Colombian Province of Cauca Saturday, local authorities said.

“We have three people dead and 70 others injured,” as a result of an attack in the town of Toribio, said town mayor Carlos Banguero.

Banguero said the attack was conducted by men who apparently belong to the sixth faction of the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia (FARC), the largest and best-equipped rebel group in Colombia.

It appeared the rebels used a car bomb and set off at a market in the center of the town at around 10 am (1500 GMT), the mayor told local radio station RCN.

Israeli warplanes strike E Gaza

GAZA, 10 July—Israeli war jets launched missile strike early on Sunday in an area east of Gaza City, no injuries were reported, according to witnesses and security sources. KANDAHAR, 10 July—Three policemen were killed and six people injured when a mine went off in Kandahar City, the provincial capital of southern Kandahar province on Sunday morning, said a statement issued by local government here.

“Anti-government elements planted a mine in a roadside in precinct fifth of Kandahar City and detonated it at around 08:00 am local time when a police van was passing-by. As a result three policemen were killed and six people including three civilians were injured,” said the statement.

Police has initiated an investigation into the case and all injured people were shifted to a provincial capital hospital in Kandahar City, 450 km south of the capital City of Kabul, the statement added.—*Xinhua*

Militants kill four deminer hostages in W Afghanistan

FARAH, 10 July—Armed militants killed four deminer hostages in Afghanistan’s Farah Province, provincial police chief said on Sunday.

“Police have found the bodies of killed four deminer hostages late on Saturday,” police chief of Farah Province, Syed Mohammad Roshandil told *Xinhua*.

Armed militants abducted 28 people including 24 de-miners and four drivers in Farah Province, 695 km west of the Afghan capital city of Kabul on 6 July.

Soon, smart specs to help 'blind navigate'!

LONDON, 10 July—Oxford University researchers, who have been inspired by the technology in Xbox Kinect games consoles and iPads, are developing 'cheap', 'smart spectacles' which promises to change the lives of thousands of blind people by allowing them to 'see'. The spectacles use tiny cameras and a pocket computer to alert wearers to objects and people ahead, reports the *Daily Mail*.

They will make it easier for the blind to navigate shopping centres and busy train stations, and could even allow them to 'read' bus numbers and the computerised displays on cash machines. Elderly people with age-related macular degeneration are likely

to be the biggest beneficiaries of the glasses, which could be ready for general sale as early as 2014 if tests are successful.

Importantly, a price tag of less than 1,000 pounds should make them affordable, the Royal Society's Summer Science Exhibition heard.

Dr Stephen Hicks, a clinical neuroscience researcher who is being funded by the Department of Health, said: "It is satisfying to think that we will be able to produce this at a cost that is going to make it available to the people who will benefit the most."

However, the bionic spectacles rely on the wearer being able to perceive light, so will not be suitable for those who are totally blind.—*Internet*

World's narrowest house in an alleyway in Poland is just 60 inches wide

LONDON, 10 July—Architects of a house built in an alleyway in Poland have claimed that it is the world's narrowest as it is just 60 inches wide.

The home, which comes complete with bedroom, lounge, bathroom and kitchen, is so narrow that the builders have abandoned a traditional staircase in favour of a ladder. Each of the four storeys goes back nearly 40ft with a room on each floor of the apartment, crammed into an alley between an old tenement block and a tower block in Warsaw, Poland.

"I saw the gap and just thought it needed filling. It will be used by artists," the *Daily Mail* quoted architect Jakub Szczesny as saying.

The first resident will be Israeli writer Etgar Keret after British historian Norman Davies turned down the chance to live there.

The world's official narrowest house, The Wedge, on the island of Great Cumbrae off Scotland's North Ayrshire coast, measures just 47 inches at the front - but spreads to 22ft as it moves back from the road.

It was sold as a holiday home in 2000 for 27,000 pounds.

"Ours is the same all the way through, so we are narrower for longer," one of the Polish design team said.—*Internet*

Rare monkey steals camera, snaps himself in Indonesia

LONDON, 10 July—In a rare incident, a monkey stole a camera from an award-winning British photographer in Indonesia and started clicking himself in different poses. The crested black macaque got fascinated seeing his reflection in the lens of the camera and hijacked it from 46-year-old David Slater, from Coleford, Gloucestershire.

And, soon the critically endangered monkey started snapping himself along with his kith and kin erratically, taking ill-focussed photographs.

Slater was on a trip to a small national park, north of the Indonesian island of Sulawesi when he met the incredibly friendly bunch. "One of them must have accidentally knocked the camera and

set it off because the sound caused a bit of a frenzy," the *Telegraph* quoted him as saying. "At first there was a lot of grimacing with their teeth showing because it was probably the first time they had ever seen a reflection.

"They were quite mischievous jumping all over my equipment, and it looked like they were already posing for the camera when one hit the button," he added. It was only after the primate clicked nearly a hundred snaps, that Slater got his gadget back.

"He must have taken hundreds of pictures by the time I got my camera back, but not very many were in focus. He obviously hadn't worked that out yet," he explained.—*Internet*

Now, hackers target Washington Post website, affecting 1.27 million users

WASHINGTON, 8 July—In the latest cyber-attack on US government agencies and corporations, hackers have targeted an online jobs database maintained by the flagship website of the Washington Post, that has affected about 1.27 million user IDs and emails.

The media company

informed users of its job board that an unknown third party had gained access to certain user IDs and email addresses in two separate incidents in June, *Fox News* reports.

No passwords or other personal information were accessed, according to the company.

The Washington Post said it is reviewing the

attack with law enforcement agencies and conducting an audit of its job site. The attack follows a spree of online break-ins that have targeted governments and corporations across the world. Earlier this week, a computer hacking group claimed to have defaced 74 Turkish government websites.—*Internet*

Five dead in fire in Russia's Siberian city

MOSCOW, 10 July—Five people died in a fire that broke out in a highrise building in the town of Omsk in southern Siberia, the *Interfax* news agency reported on Friday.

The fire on the eight floor of the nine-story building killed two women and three men, according to a local police source. One of the women died after throwing herself out of a window.

Firefighters evacuated 15 residents of the highrise, the source said. Investigators are trying to find out if the fire was caused by negligence or an arson. They said all people in the apartment were drunk.

This is at least the third largest fire which has caused heavy casualties in this city so far in 2011. In March, two separate fires in Omsk killed nine people in total, including four children.—*Xinhua*

Researchers successfully reprogramme brain cells into heart cells

LONDON, 10 July—Researchers have long anticipated that heart cells—the most sought-after cells in regenerative medicine—may help to repair injured hearts by replacing lost tissue and save millions of lives. While researchers have spent more than a decade trying to reprogram cell types in general, changing them into heart cells has so far been a stubborn challenge.

Now, a team at the

Perelman School of Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania is the first to demonstrate the direct conversion of a non-heart cell type into a heart cell by RNA transfer.

Working on the idea that the signature of a cell is defined by molecules called messenger RNAs (mRNAs), which contain the chemical blueprint for how to make a protein, the investigators chang-

ed two different cell types, an astrocyte (a star-shaped brain cell) and a fibroblast (a skin cell), into a heart cell, using mRNAs.

“What’s new about this approach for heart-cell generation is that we directly converted one cell type to another using RNA, without an intermediate step,” says James Eberwine, a pharmacology professor at Penn.

Sports help ease aggression in children

WASHINGTON, 9 July—A Tel Aviv University researcher has found that sports help to ease aggression in children, particularly in boys.

Keren Shahar, a PhD student at Tel Aviv University’s Bob Shapell School of Social Work, has statistical evidence that sports participation is beneficial to a child’s cognitive, emotional and behavioural well-being.

Shahar conducted her study, which included 649 children from low socio-economic backgrounds, under the supervision of Prof Tammie Ronen and Prof Michael Rosenbaum.

She stated that over the course of her study, a

continuous program of various sports helped improve self-control and discipline and lowered feelings of aggression in the children overall. Shahar’s research showed that boys benefited most from the sports programming than their female counterparts.

Shahar reasons that girls do not often suffer from the same aggression problems as boys, and are less likely to exhibit a passion for sport. The study was recently presented at TAU’s Renata Adler Memorial Research Centre for Child Welfare and Protection Conference.

Atlantis crew to inspect heat shields

CAPE CANAVERAL, 10 July—The agenda Saturday for the four astronauts on the final US space shuttle mission included inspection of the heat shields on the *Atlantis*.

The programme for the first full day in orbit includes inspection of the heat shields to make sure they were not damaged during liftoff Friday, *Florida Today* reported. Analysts at National Aeronautics and Space Administration headquarters in Houston reported no obvious damage from a preliminary inspection of images of the blastoff.

Visual inspection of the shields has been standard operating procedure since 2003, when the *Columbia* broke up on re-entry.

The mission is commanded by Chris Ferguson and piloted by Doug Hurley, joined by specialists Sandy Magnus and Rex Walheim. They were wakened at 4 am EDT by “Viva la Vida” by Coldplay.

Atlantis blasted off Friday morning from the Kennedy Space Centre in Florida. The mission’s main purpose is to carry a load of supplies to the International Space Station.—*Internet*

SEATTLE, 10 July—US researchers say they’ve found why predatory fish have a far greater digestive capacity than they actually need, and it’s all about feast versus famine.

Scientists at the University of Washington say extra-large guts allow them to gorge on food when it is plentiful so they can store the calories for use in lean times, *PhysOrg.com* reported Friday.

The researchers studied 38 species of predatory fish and found their digestive systems were around two or three times larger than they need to be in average conditions.

The large gut allows them to capitalize on “pulses of food abundance,” which requires a high digestive capacity, the researchers said, but maintaining that capacity is costly in energy terms when food is scarce and a large gut is not needed.

Numerical simulations of the trade-off between having excess digestive capacity and the metabolic cost of the extra guts suggest it benefits fish only if they experience irregular periods of feast and famine, the researchers said.

Singapore museum raises funds to buy three dinosaur fossils

SINGAPORE, 10 July—The upcoming Natural History Museum in Singapore launched a drive on Sunday to raise 12 million Singapore dollars (9.8 million US dollars) by the end of the month to buy three dinosaur fossils from a company in Wyoming, the United States.

The three dinosaurs on offer from the company Dinosauria International, thought to be a family, were found between 2007 and last year in the United States, *the Straits Times*

reported on Sunday.

Appollo and Prince, the two adult diplodocid sauropods, is about 24 meters long, while the baby Twinky is about 12 meters.

The natural history museum is expected to be completed by 2014. The three dinosaur fossils will cost 870 million Singapore dollars, and an additional 370 million Singapore dollars will be spent to set up the exhibition.

The app is extremely easy to use: Click on schedule and scroll through the acts playing on each of the three days of the fest. Click on a band for more info and tap the “Plus” sign to add a show to your calendar.

Your calendar comes in the form of three clocks — one for each day — with the bands situated around the face at the time they perform. You can also share your schedule or an individual band via Facebook or Twitter, and check out a map of Union Park, where the fest takes place.

Although the Pitchfork 2011 app [iTunes link] is lovely, it lacks some features that would have made it a more complete package — like the option to listen to tracks by bands at the festival.

Push notification reminders would have been a handy addition as well. Still, as Kaskie says, this is a relatively small music festival.

Rural development at core of national development

In Myanmar, about 70 per cent of the population of about 60 million are rural people, the majority of whom live at or below the poverty line. Living on agricultural farming and raising farm animals, rural folks are the major workforce of the country. Local people in rural areas live in poverty not because they are lazy but because they lack capitals for their businesses.

Due to the five rural development programmes adopted and implemented by the State Peace and Development Council (Tatmadaw government), rural areas enjoyed development to some extent, but are still poor. According to the statistics collected jointly by the United Nations Development Programme and the Ministry of National Planning and Economic Development, Myanmar's poverty rate has dropped from 32 to 26 per cent. To meet the Millennium Development Goal (MDG), Myanmar's poverty rate will have to be reduced to 16 per cent by 2014-2015.

Formation of microfinance institutions is aimed at providing loans to alleviate poverty and improve the socioeconomic status of people of ordinary class. Microfinance institutes have two major functions: to provide microfinance and save money. To get micro loans, people of ordinary class do not need to mortgage anything.

In general, banks cannot provide loans for people of ordinary class who have nothing to mortgage. So, many cottage and small-scale industries have to get money from lenders and mortgage entrepreneurs at the monthly interest rate of 20 per cent. Farmers and workers also have to borrow money from capitalists at the same interest rate.

To encourage development of microfinance industry in Myanmar, UNDP introduced Human Development Initiative (HDI), a preliminary project, to Myanmar through a special memorandum of understanding in 1997. As part of HDI, micro loans were provided through non-governmental organizations in Ayeyawady Region (Delta), arid zones and Shan State.

At present, banks, cooperative societies, entrepreneurs, NGOs, INGOs and social organizations are running microfinance enterprises in their targeted regions. So, not all the regions have access to that opportunity. According to data, the organizations that run microfinance industry are the Central Cooperatives Syndicate Ltd, Region and State Cooperative Syndicates, rice and peas trading

companies, Chancellor Agricultural Merchandising, the Republic of the Union of Myanmar Economic Holdings Ltd, the Myanmar Women's Affairs Federation, the Myanmar Maternal and Child Welfare Association, Microfinance Scrutiny Board, the Myanmar Economic Bank, the Myanmar Agricultural Development Bank, Private Agency Collaborating Together (PACT Myanmar), Save the Children (Dawn Microfinance Project), Group de recherche et d'Charge Technologies (GRET), Association of Medical Doctors of Asia (AMDA), Agency for Technical Cooperation and Development (ACTED), CARE Myanmar (Care International in Myanmar), World CONCERN (World Concern Myanmar), Total (Yadana Suboo Microfinance), National YWCA, World Vision, and Pyoe Pin Program. They operate their functions with their own plans, rules and regulations and procedures. However, Myanmar has yet to lay down a systematic system to operate the entire microfinance.

The three-day National Workshop on Rural Development and Poverty Alleviation was conducted in Nay Pyi Taw on 20 May with the aim of improving the socioeconomic life of rural folks and relieving their poverty by creating more job and business opportunities in rural areas.

At the opening of the National Workshop on Rural Development and Poverty Alleviation on 20 May 2011, the President said that microfinance industry was an important drive for the nation; that poverty meant insecurity of food, lack of secure shelters, having not enough medical fees in spite of illness, and being worried about the future due to the fact that they could not afford school fees for their children; and that microfinance was a tool for alleviation of poverty.

The workshop adopted the eight tasks for rural development and poverty alleviation: development of agricultural productivity, development of livestock breeding and fisheries, development of small-scale rural productivity, development of microfinance institutions, development of cooperative tasks, development of rural socio-economy, development of rural energy, and environmental conservation. To implement these tasks, the Central Committee for Rural Development and Poverty Alleviation was formed with the President as chairman on 10 June.

Then, the Work Committee for Rural Development and Poverty Alleviation was formed with Vice-President Dr Sai Mauk Kham as chairman to speed up implementation of the eight tasks laid

down by the Central Committee in cooperation with the work committees of Regions and States.

To implement one of the eight tasks, the Union government formed the Subcommittee for Development of Microfinance Institutions on 7 July. The subcommittee chaired by the Minister for Finance and Revenue is pursuing Action Plans it has adopted.

Myanmar needs to draw and promulgate necessary laws and rules to run microfinance institutions and to form an organization to supervise and expedite the tasks of the institutions in line with the laws and rules.

Experts, scholars, departmental officials and representatives from microfinance institutions held talks several times for systematic operation of microfinance enterprises. Now, they have formulated the fifth draft for Microfinance Law. So, Microfinance Law will soon be brought into force.

The subcommittee plans to launch microfinance industry in accordance with the notifications and directives before the Hluttaw approves the Microfinance Law.

Now, the government is taking measures for providing legal protection on microfinance. So, the people should take part in the measures with heart and soul. In particular, the people should save money individually or in groups in microfinance institutions in the interest of the nation, the borrowers and in their own, instead of saving their money in banks for interests, keeping their money in their home, or investment in other businesses such as housing estates and the auto market. In the past, loans could not be provided if a borrower did not mortgage a belonging. Now, related laws have guaranteed loans. So, microfinance industry is worth it to invest in as it keeps good balance between the interests of the lenders and borrowers.

In conclusion, the new government is implementing the tasks for rural development and poverty alleviation in all seriousness as a national duty. The Millennium Development Goal—to alleviate poverty by 2015 is expected to pick up momentum soon, when good governance goes faster.

In the near future, people of ordinary class will have easy access to microfinance. Only with development of microfinance industry will it be possible for farmers and workers who are of ordinary class to enjoy high socioeconomic status of resulting from, and it will bring credit to the nation.

A glass of milk could contain painkillers, antibiotics

LONDON, 10 July —Scientists have found that a glass of milk may contain up to 20 painkillers, antibiotics and growth hormones.

Through a highly sensitive test, scientists found a host of chemicals used to treat illnesses in animals and people in samples of cow, goat and human breast milk, Daily Mail reported.

Though the doses of drugs were far too little to create an effect on anyone drinking them, the results highlight how man-made chemicals were now found throughout the food chain.

The highest quantities of medicines were found in cow's milk. Researchers believe some of the drugs and growth promoters were given to the cattle, or got into milk through cattle feed or contamination on the farm.

A Spanish-Moroccan team analysed 20 samples of cow's milk bought in Spain and Morocco, along with samples of goat and breast milk.

Their breakdown, published in the *Journal of Agricultural and Food Chemistry*, revealed that cow's milk contained traces of anti-inflammatory drugs niflumic acid, mefenamic acid and ketoprofen - commonly used as painkillers in animals and people.

It also contained the hormone 17-beta-estradiol, a form of the sex hormone oestrogen. The researchers claim their new 30-minute test is the most sensitive of its kind. If the findings are true for Spanish and Moroccan milk, they could equally be true for milk produced in Britain and northern Europe.

New electronic musical instrument called 'AlphaSphere' unveiled

LONDON, 10 July —A brand new electronic musical instrument called the AlphaSphere, which was invented by a team of Bristol sound engineers, has been unveiled.

Adam Place came up with the idea at his university after growing bored with conventional keyboards to play synthesized music.

"On a keyboard, the keys are just controllers, they're not really like notes on a piano," the BBC quoted Place as saying.

"But with the AlphaSphere, the notes change as you press harder and harder, you really engage with the instrument, and you can perform with it," he said.

Forty-eight pressure pads are arranged round a sphere, like a large football, and when one pad is pressed the sphere plays a drumbeat. But press a little harder and the beat accelerates.

Another might be programmed with a chord with added harmonics coming in when you press the pad harder.

The Alphasphere may or may not take off with musicians but as a business idea it is already winning approval.

Adam and his friends will be showing off their invention at a garden party in Bristol, which brings hi-tech entrepreneurs and inventors together with investors and big firms.—Internet

"Priceless" 12th-century book stolen in Spain

MADRID, 10 July—The Codex Calixtino, an illustrated manuscript in twelfth century, has disappeared from the Cathedral in Santiago de Compostela, local authority said Thursday.

The Codex Calixtino used to work as a guide to pilgrims making the journey to the city of Santiago de Compostelain in the middle age.

The beautifully illustrated book included introduction and advice, as well as sermons, miracles and associated religious writings.

The Codex Calixtino is made up of five books and two appendices and is widely considered as one of the most important works of Spain's

religious and artistic heritage with an incalculable value.

The book was kept in a sealed chamber and protected by an alarm system in the Cathedral.

Its disappearance was first noticed by one of the workers responsible for the Cathedral archives at 8 PM Tuesday. After three hours of searching he notified the police of the disappearance.

Early indications were that the book had been stolen, possibly by an organized band who could be working under orders of a specialized collector, but as yet no further details have emerged.

Fukushima cleanup will take decades : Japan

TOKYO, 10 July—Decommissioning of Fukushima nuclear power plant, crippled by the March 2011 quake and tsunami, will take decades, said Japan's Prime Minister Naoto Kan Saturday.

It was the first government announcement about a long-term timeframe for the cleanup.

A 9.0-magnitude quake struck off Japan's northeast coast 11 March, triggering a tsunami and explosions at the Fukushima, which caused the worst nuclear crisis since Chernobyl in 1986.

The Japan Atomic Energy Commission and Fukushima plant operator Tokyo Electric Power Company (TEPCO) have set a goal of starting the removal of melted nuclear

fuel at about 2021, public broadcaster NHK said.

The TV channel reported that the authorities, the operator and equipment manufacturers also expect "several decades" to pass before the reactors are ready to be dismantled, citing a long-term roadmap for bringing the plant under control.

In late June the Japanese government announced that the double natural disaster could cost the country up to 16.9 trillion yen (about \$210 bln). The estimates do not include the damages from a nuclear crisis at the Fukushima nuclear power plant, the government said.

Second small plane intercepted near Obama's weekend getaway

WASHINGTON, 10 July—US Military on Saturday evening said a second small plane was intercepted near Camp David, where President Barack Obama is spending the night.

A Cessna 210 was intercepted at 6:56 pm near the Presidential retreat in Maryland. Two F-15 fighter jets were sent to escort the plane out of the restricted area, said the North American Aerospace Defence Command (NORAD).

Earlier in the afternoon, another civilian aircraft was

escorted out of the Camp David area. It was out of radio communication, and flew into the area just after noon. Fighter jets intercepted the plane and directed it out of Camp David airspace. The plane landed without incident.

Obama is spending part of the weekend at the presidential retreat. According to the White House, he left Washington D.C. earlier in the day, and is to head back Sunday to broker a deficit deal with congressional budget negotiators.—Internet

Tsunami warning issued after quake hits Japan

TOKYO, 10 July —A powerful earthquake measuring 7.1 on the Richter scale struck off the eastern Japan coast Sunday, prompting the authorities to issue a tsunami warning.

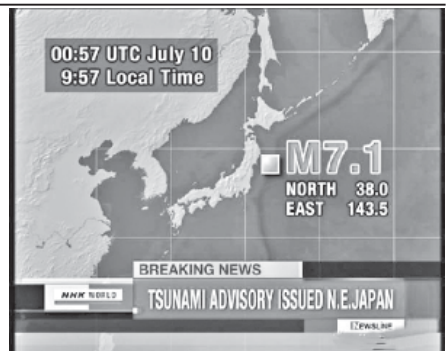
The quake occurred at 9:57 am (0057 GMT), Xinhua reported. There were no immediate reports of injuries or damage to property.

The epicentre was some 200 km from the coast of Miyagi Prefecture and occurred at a depth of 10 km under the seabed, said Japan's meteorological agency.

The tremor was felt in Tokyo and many eastern cities. The bullet train service was temporarily halted in northeastern Japan, media reports said.

A tsunami warning was issued for Iwate, Miyagi and Fukushima Prefectures. A small tsunami of up to 50 cm was expected along the affected region.

No abnormalities were reported by the Tokyo Electric Power Co at the Fukushima nuclear power plant following the quake, said Kyodo news agency.

HONG KONG, 10 July—An earthquake measuring 5.7 on the Richter scale jolted Kermadec Islands region at 19:35:20 GMT on Saturday, the US Geological Survey said.

The epicentre, with a depth of 21.70 km, was initially determined to be at 29.3593 degrees south latitude and 176.9830 degrees west longitude.

Suspicious package in Chicago turns out to be false alarm

CHICAGO, 10 July—Authorities said a suspicious package which led to an evacuation in the Millennium Park in downtown Chicago turned out to be a false alarm, Chicago Sun-times reported on Saturday.

Police said in a statement issued on Saturday that the package they found near the Cloud Gate sculpture turned out to be two bricks. The bricks were wrapped in duct tape, said a police officer at the scene.

"Further investigation revealed the device apparently had been left behind by subjects participating in a role-playing event," the statement said.

Three suspects were questioned in

connection with the incident. Two were released late on Saturday, but one remained in custody, an officer on the scene said.

The incident caused a huge response from local police and fire departments. The Bomb and Arson Unit was called to investigate, and a Level 1 Hazmat was called by the Chicago Fire Department.

The area surrounding the sculpture and a restaurant in the Millennium Park had been evacuated as fire and police officials investigated the suspicious package. Besides, part of the Michigan Avenue had also been closed to northbound traffic.—Xinhua

Manchester City strike deal to rename Eastlands

MANCHESTER, 10 July—Manchester City have confirmed the City of Manchester Stadium will be renamed the Etihad Stadium after signing a 10-year deal with the airline. The Abu Dhabi-based company is already the club's shirt sponsor. "We are delighted to be expanding our relationship with Etihad Airways through this partnership agreement," said City chief executive Garry Cook. City, who won the FA Cup in May, were taken over by a consortium from Abu Dhabi in 2008.

In total, owner Sheikh Mansour has ploughed over £1 billion into the club, helping City to win their first trophy since 1976 and finish third in last season's Premier League, earning a place in the Champions League. However, last season City posted losses of £123.3m. This sum would cause City to fall foul of Uefa's new financial fair play regulations, which come into force this summer but will

Clue to pain of sunburn discovered by UK researchers

LONDON, 10 July — A chemical in the body that triggers pain from sunburn has been pinpointed by UK experts in a discovery that could lead to new painkillers. Scientists hope one day to be able to knock out the substance with drugs, helping people who suffer from chronic pain.

Tests on volunteers showed CXCL5, as it is called, is produced when skin is burnt by UV rays from the sun. The research is published in the journal *Science Translational Medicine*.

Exposure to ultraviolet light from sunlight causes premature skin ageing, cancer and other skin changes. UVB affects the outer layer of

skin, and is the main agent responsible for sunburn. In the study, scientists at King's College London exposed small patches of the 10 volunteers' skin to UVB. Areas of sunburn were produced which became increasingly tender over a few days.

Kestrels nest on site of M25 road-widening in Essex

ESSEX, 10 July—A family of kestrels have made their home alongside major motorway widening works in Essex. Two adult birds have reared six chicks after taking up residence at a site compound next to junction 29 of the M25, the interchange with the A127. After seeing the birds roosting nearby, workers at the site made a nesting box, which has been fixed to the side of a concrete silo. A webcam has also been installed to keep track of the birds.

The kestrels were first spotted by Brent Erwin, a plant supervisor for concrete suppliers, Lafarge. He said: "I think the kestrels were attracted to the batching plant by the warmth from the heaters that are used in the concrete production process. "It looked like they were searching for somewhere to nest and I thought that maybe I could help." The nest box will be moved to a

nearby tree in the winter in the hope the birds will use them in future years.

There are estimated to be 38,000 breeding pairs of kestrels in the UK and the species are on the RPSB's amber list of protected species. Mr Erwin explained a webcam was put inside the box in April to monitor the progress of the birds. He said: "It was really interesting to see the bird settling in. "The female would sit on the six eggs while the male went hunting.

Smokers, less joint replacement surgery

ADELAIDE, 10 July — Men who smoke have less risk than those who never smoked of undergoing total joint replacement surgery, researchers in Australia found.

However, George Mnatzaganian, a Ph.D. student from the University of Adelaide in Australia, and colleagues, also found men who were overweight or who engaged in vigorous physical activity were more likely to need arthroplasty.

The researchers examined clinical data for 11,388 male study participants and integrated it with hospital

morbidity data and mortality records from baseline through March 2007, identifying 857 men who had joint replacement surgery. Of those having surgery, 59 percent had total knee replacement and 41 percent had total hip replacement.

Men who smoked 48 years or more were as much as 51 percent less likely to undergo total joint replacements than those who never smoked, and vigorous exercise increased risk of joint replacement in men ages 70-74.

The study, published in the *Arthritis & Rheumatism*, showed being overweight independently increased total joint replacement risk, while smoking lowered the risk, which was most evident after 23 years of smoking exposure.

There was no explanation of why he walked away empty-handed.

CBS used fake footage for 4 July fireworks

The CBS broadcast of Boston's Fourth of July fireworks showed rockets bursting over Boston landmarks that viewers say were clearly faked. The fireworks were set off from a barge in the Charles River after the traditional Boston Pops outdoor concert. One viewer e-mailed *The Boston Globe*, pointing out that footage of fireworks with the Quincy Market in the foreground would be impossible in real life since Beacon Hill is in the way. Other shots used the State House and Fenway Park, home of the Boston Red Sox. David Mugar, the businessman who has been the show's executive producer for almost a decade, told *the Globe* this was the first time altered footage was used for the broadcast. He argued the fireworks show is entertainment, not news.

Police: Man broke pumps to give free gas

Authorities said they arrested a Miami man accused of damaging pumps at several gas stations to dispense free fuel and selling access to the pumps. Fort Pierce police said Elton Carter, 27, manipulated, damaged or altered pumps at three St. Lucie County gas stations to dispense free gas in incidents beginning 29 April and would charge people to fill up their cars at the pumps, *TCPalm.com* reported Friday. Workers at the gas stations identified a photo of Carter as the man "running the fuel theft operation," police said. Carter was arrested Tuesday and charged with robbery, organized dealing in stolen property, communication fraud of \$300 or more and third-degree grand theft.

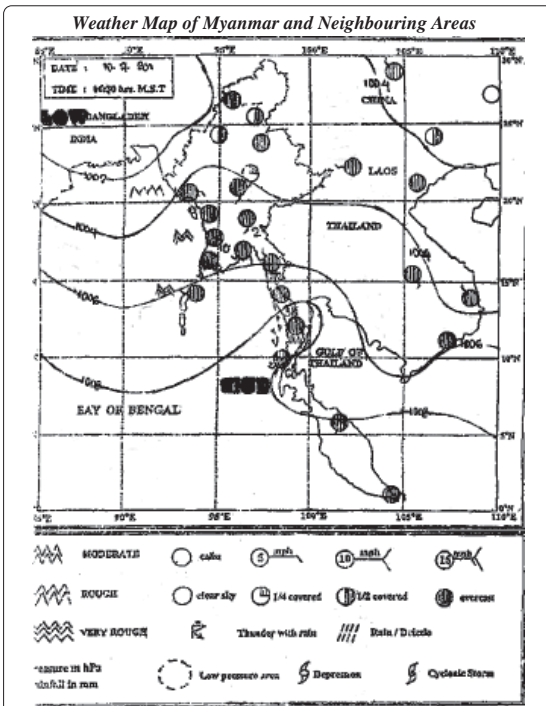
