13 killed in ambush in western Mexico

MEXICO CITY, 16 July—At least 12 police officers and a bystander were killed in a highway ambush in western Mexico, security authorities said.

The attack, which occurred around 6 pm Friday, happened when a police convoy was passing a fake checkpoint set up by a group of gunmen on a highway in the country's western state of Sinaloa.

A bystander was caught in the cross fire and shot to death.—Xinhua

US soldier killed in southern Iraq

BAGHDAD, 16 July—The US military says an American soldier has been killed while conducting military operations in southern Iraq.

The military gave no further details in a statement released late Friday, and the name of the dead service member is being withheld pending notification of next of kin.

The death brings to 4,473 the number of American troops who have died in Iraq since the war started in 2003. That's according to an *Associated Press* count.

It is also the fourth US military fatality this month.

Shiite Muslim militias have stepped up attacks on US forces with the approach of the year-end planned withdrawal of all American troops.—Internet

Ten killed, 70 wounded in bomb attacks during Shiite rite in Iraq

BAGHDAD, 16 July—A total of 10 people were killed and 70 wounded in series of bomb attacks on Friday and Saturday morning in the Iraqi holy city of Karbala during a major Shiite rite, police said.

The attacks started on Friday afternoon when two car bombs exploded at a garage near the Shiite shrine in northern part of Karbala, some 110 km southwest of Baghdad, killing three people and wounding 15 others, a local police told *Xinhua* on condition of anonymity. Another booby-trapped car detonated late Friday in the town of al-Hindiya, some 30 km east of Karbala, targeting groups of Shiite pilgrims heading

to the holy shrine of Karbala, killing six pilgrims and wounding 28 others, an Interior Ministry source told *Xinhua* on condition of anonymity.

On Saturday morning, a motorcycle bomb struck a crowd of Shiite pilgrims in Karbala's southern

neighborhood of al-Mulhaq, killing a worshipper and wounding 27 others, the source said. Karbala is the scene for a major Shiite ceremony commemorating the birth of Imam Mohammed al-Mahdi, the last of the 12 most revered Shiites' Imams.—Xinhua

Two killed in two suicide attacks east of Algiers

ALGIERS, 16 July—Two people were killed and 15 others injured in two suicide bomb attacks Saturday in Bordj-Menaïel, 70 km east of Algiers the capital, Algerian newspaper *El Watan* reported.

The first attack killed a security staff when a suicide bomber on board a car blew himself up near a police station early in the morning, the source said.

Soon, another

suicide bomber riding a motorbike crossed a mass and headed up to the town hall before being stopped by a police officer on the spot. The explosion killed the police officer and injured many civilians.

The two attacks caused considerable damages to surrounding buildings and houses, including the town hall, the CPA bank and others located along the Amirouche Boulevard.

The attacks occurred just two days after other attacks in the locality of Baghliia, in Boumerdes province, 45 km east of Algiers, which killed two soldiers and injured six others.—Xinhua

ISLAMABAD, 16 July—At least ten people were killed when a passenger bus was attacked Saturday in Pakistan's northwest Hangu district, reported local Urdu TV channel Geo.

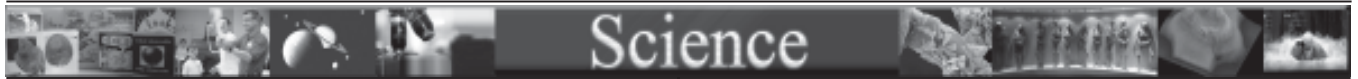
According to the report, the incident took place in the Upper Karram area of Hangu where is some 80 kilometers southwest of Peshawar when some unknown gunmen fired at a bus heading towards Nowshera from Kurram Agency, a tribal area bordering Afghanistan. Seven people including three women were killed on the spot. Three of the injured people died later at hospital. No group claimed responsibility for the attack.—Internet

Explosion injures 14 people in Israel

JERUSALEM, 16 July—Fourteen people were injured on late Friday evening after an explosion rocked a building in the Israeli City of Netanya, *Ynet news* reported.

The blast occurred in an apartment complex located above a restaurant in a three-storey building in Netanya's industrial zone, causing some parts of the building to collapse. Additional explosions were reported following the first blast, with glass shards spreading across the scene.

Initial reports said that the explosion was apparently the result of an electrical malfunction, but later officials said that the cause was not yet clear.—Internet



Conservationists sound alarm over macaque

RIO DE JANEIRO, 16 July—The long-tailed macaque is being threatened with extinction by a huge surge in international trade and the destruction of its habitat in Southeast Asia, conservationists said on Friday.

Species Survival Network (SSN), an international coalition of over 80 charities, says trade in the species had more than doubled in the second half of the last decade.

The group is pressing countries taking part in a meeting of the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES) in Geneva this month to review the impact on the macaque of the trade.

“The long-tailed macaque is the most heavily-traded mammal currently listed on the CITES appendices and our research findings raise alarming questions concerning the long-term viability of targeted populations of the species if this trade is allowed to continued at current levels,” Ian Redmond, chairman of the SSN Primate Working Group said in a statement.

Traders sold more than 260,000 long-tailed macaques — found mainly in Cambodia, Indonesia, Laos, the Philippines and Vietnam — between 2004 and 2008, a huge rise from the nearly 120,000 between 1999 and 2003. The breeding and supply of the monkey has developed into a large scale business enterprise mainly in Southeast Asia with most exported for medical and scientific purposes.

Male, female pandas seek separate habitats

BEIJING, 16 July— Male and female giant pandas in the wild prefer to be in different habitats, Chinese researchers say.

Researchers at the Institute for Zoology at the Chinese Academy of Sciences say female pandas frequent high-altitude conifer forests and mixed forests on steeper slopes, whereas males roam more widely, the BBC reported Friday.

Scientists have identified the basic type of habitat pandas need to survive, which tends to be forests above 5,000 feet rich in bamboo, the pandas’ main food.

But the specific habitat preferences of males and females

have been largely ignored until now.

Female pandas tend to limit their movements to within high-altitude conifer forests and mixed forests that slopes at between 10 and 20 degrees, as such areas provide den sites for birthing and dense bamboo cover in which baby pandas can hide.

Males, on the other hand, range more widely, covering areas that overlap the ranges of several females, researchers said.

This segregation of the sexes needs to be considered in conservation and management efforts to safeguard the giant panda, they said.—Internet



Google+ social network membership tops 10 million

SAN FRANCISCO, 16 July—Google chief Larry Page said Thursday that the Internet giant’s freshly launched Google+ social network already has more than 10 million members.

“Over 10 million people have joined Google-Plus,” Page said during a quarterly earnings conference call. “That is a great achievement for the team.”

He added that more than a billion items are shared daily at Google+.

Google launched its rival to Facebook on 28 June, with membership limited to invitation-only while the service remains in a test phase.

“Online sharing is awkward. Even broken. And we aim to fix it,”

Google’s senior vice president for engineering Vic Gundotra said in a blog post about the social-networking initiative.

Unveiling Google+, Gundotra stressed the ability it gives users to separate online friends and family into different “Circles,” or networks, and to share information only with members of a particular circle.



“We’d like to bring the nuance and richness of real-life sharing to software,” he said.

One of the criticisms of Facebook is that updates are shared with all of one’s friends unless a user has gone through a relatively complicated process to create separate Facebook Groups.

“Not all relationships are created equal,” Gundotra said. “So in life we share one thing with college buddies, another with parents, and almost nothing with our boss.”

Apple software update thwarts iPhone-iPad hack

WASHINGTON, 16 July—Apple on Friday released a software update to patch a vulnerability that hackers could use to break into the company’s popular iPad, iPhone and iPod Touch gadgets.

The flaw made it possible for hackers to infiltrate Apple mobile devices by duping users into opening

PDF document files booby-trapped with malicious computer code.

Although no attacks have been observed, it was feared that hackers would exploit the weakness. The update to iOS software running Apple mobile gadgets fortified defences. The update was available free at Apple’s online iTunes shop.—Internet

Twitter marks fifth anniversary of public launch

SAN FRANCISCO, 16 July—Twitter marked the fifth anniversary of its public launch Friday with a slew of statistics demonstrating the explosive growth of the real-time blogging service.

“There were 224 Tweets sent on 15 July, 2006. Today, users send that many Tweets in less than a tenth of a second,” Twitter said in a message on its @Twitter-GlobalPR account.

“Yesterday, we saw more than 600,000 signups. It took us more than 16 months to reach the first 600,000 Twitter accounts,” Twitter said.

Twitter Engineering said it is delivering 350 billion tweets a day.

The San Francisco-based Twitter said last month that Twitter users are sending 200 million

messages a day, most of which have to be delivered to multiple accounts. Twitter co-founder Jack Dorsey fired off the first tweets on 21 March, 2006 and the service opened to the public on 15 July, 2006.

Twitter now has more than 200 million users. According to a recent study by the Pew Research Centre, 13 percent of online US adults use Twitter, up from eight percent in November 2010.

Younger kids respond better to 'Lazy Eye' treatment

ROCHESTER, 16 July — Younger children respond better to treatment for lazy eye (amblyopia) than older children, according to an analysis of previous studies.

The meta-analysis of data from 996 children who took part in four clinical trials conducted by the Pediatric Eye Disease Investigator Group found that children aged 3 to 7 years old responded better to treatment for both moderate and severe amblyopia than those aged 7 to less than 13.

There were no differences in treatment response between children aged 3 to less than 5 and those aged 5 to less than 7

with moderate amblyopia.

However, children aged 3 to less than 5 with severe amblyopia had a greater treatment response than those aged 5 to less than 7.

Despite the lower treatment response in older children, they still showed improvements in vision acuity (clarity) and some achieved significant benefits, the researchers said.

"In conclusion, while there is improvement in visual acuity across all age ranges from 3 to under 13, children 7 to less than 13 years of age are least responsive to amblyopia treatment," wrote review author Jonathon M Holmes, of the Mayo Clinic in

Rochester, Minn, and colleagues.

"Despite reduced mean average treatment response in children 7 to less than 13 years of age, some children in this age group showed marked improvement with treatment."

The study appears online 11 July in *the Archives of Ophthalmology*.

In related news, a research letter published in the same issue of the journal concluded that an intensive final treatment effort (using eye patches and atropine) does not appear to improve visual acuity in children who still have mild amblyopia after initial treatment.—*Internet*

Oil rises as market eyes earnings, US data, imports

NEW YORK, 16 July—Oil rose on Friday as lower supplies for a key Canadian export pipeline and strong earnings reports by Google and Citigroup buoyed prices despite a rash of weak US economic data.

Oil got an early lift after Google and Citigroup reported earnings. Oil prices got further support from expiry of options on the New York Mercantile Exchange, market players said.

"There is pre-weekend short-covering going on as nobody wants

to be short at this time with so many things going on," said Phil Flynn, analyst with PFBEST Research in Chicago. But US economic data limited the upside, as consumer confidence plummeted to its lowest level in more than two years in early July and factory output stalled in June.

The premium of Brent to US futures narrowed to below \$20 a barrel, pulled down in part by news TransCanada Corp will cut nominated crude volumes on its Keystone pipeline to the United States from Canada by 20 percent next month for maintenance.

US crude lead the oil complex higher, rising \$1.75 to \$97.44 a barrel at 12:04 EDT (1604 GMT). Brent crude gained \$1.19 to trade at \$117.45 a barrel.

The market was also weighing the possibility of a second round of strategic petroleum reserve releases. Germany and Italy are likely to oppose a second release, a French government source said on Friday.

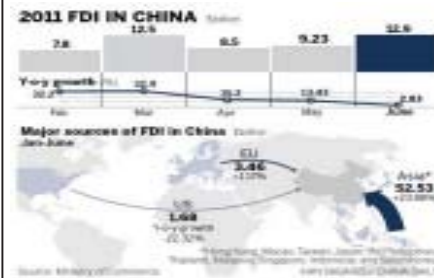

US Companies invested less in China in June

WASHINGTON, 16 July—US companies invested less in China last month as the global economy turns sour.

China's foreign direct investment, or FDI, for declined 2.8%, the lowest rate since last September, according to the Ministry of Commerce on Friday.

Yao Jian, spokesman for the ministry, told the *China Daily* that the country will remain an

attractive destination for corporate investors in the mid- and long-term and said there was no sign of a decline trend.

In June, China brought in \$12.9 billion in FDI, up 2.8% from June 2010. By comparison, May FDI rose over 13% from the same period last year.

All told, China's FDI in the first half of 2011 rose by 18.4% year-on-year to \$60.9 billion,

showing that China remains the growth story for multinationals and private investors looking long term.

"The general picture is China's FDI growth has been fluctuating for several months, but the foreign-investment environment has never changed," Yao said at the monthly news briefing on Friday.

Jiangsu Province, which traditionally has absorbed the most FDI, has seen the FDI growth rate slow to 10 percent this year. Zhu Min, director of the department of commerce of Jiangsu, told *China Daily* that the country's attractiveness for foreigners is still there, and that the region's annual FDI growth in 2011 should come in close to 10%.—*Internet*

China, Russia celebrate 10th anniversary of friendship Treaty in Moscow

BEIJING, 16 July—The Chinese Embassy in Russia has held a reception in Moscow, to celebrate the 10th anniversary of the China-Russia Treaty of Good Neighbourliness, Friendship, and Cooperation.

China's Ambassador to Russia, Li Hui, said the pact has become more vigorous as time has gone by, and bilateral relations have reached an all-time high. He also pledged to cherish the achievements made so far in Sino-Russian relations, and increase efforts to boost people-to-people contacts.

Friday's reception gathered nearly 600 representatives from the two countries, including Russian Deputy Prime Minister Alexander Zhukov.

Six die, 17 injured in east China road accident

NANJING, 16 July—Six people died and 17 others were injured in a road accident Saturday afternoon in east China's Jiangsu Province, local publicity officials said.

The accident happened at about 1:38 pm when a coach hit into the side of a semi-trailer at a crossroad in the town of Daxu in Xuzhou City, the Publicity Department of Xuzhou Communist Party Committee said in a statement. Six people on the coach died on the spot, including the driver, according to the statement.

The injured were rushed to local hospitals, yet their conditions are not immediately known.

An investigation into the cause of the accident is under way.

Five mountain climbers fall to their deaths in Swiss Alps

VALAIS, 16 July—Five mountain climbers were killed on Friday as a result of three separate incidents in the Pennine Alps mountain range in Switzerland, police said.

The deadliest accident happened at around 10 am local time on Grand Combin in the western Pennine Alps. Grand Combin is with its 4,314 meters (14,154 ft) high summit one of the highest peaks in the Alps and the second most prominent of its range.

According to a statement from Valais Canton Police, one of the three climbers fell and likely caused his two fellow climbers to fall as well. "The victims fell down several hundred meters down a snowy lane while hitting the rocks," the statement said, adding that the identification process is ongoing.

Another accident happened on the Petit Mont Collon mountain as

two climbers descended from the summit.

The men had installed a rope around a rock and, after the first climber went down, the second climber fell about 20 metres (65 feet) when the rope broke. "He died at the scene of the accident," police said.

The third accident happened on the 4,010 meters (13,156 feet) high Lagginhorn mountain when seven German climbers had almost reached the summit.

One of them was killed when he lost his balance and fell, falling hundreds of metres.

Valais Canton Police described Friday as an unusually deadly day. Since the beginning of the season, a total of 13 climbers have died in the region, including eight during the month of July.

Nearly 14 percent of Italians living in poverty

ROME, 16 July—More than 8 million people in Italy, or about 13.8 percent of the population, live in relative poverty, according to figures released by the Italian national statistics agency on Friday.

The 2010 Households Budget Survey by the Italian National Institute of Statistics revealed that more than 3 million people lived in absolute poverty, which accounted for 5.2 percent of the Italian population.

A two-person household was considered to be relatively poor if it spent 992.46 euros (about 1,399 US

dollars) a month. The figure was 9 euros (about 12.7 dollars) higher than the 2009 threshold, the agency said. Families with monthly expenditures at or below that limit were classified as living in absolute poverty.

In southern Italy, where economic development lags behind other regions of the country, more people lived in poverty, the survey found.

The relative poverty rate of southern households was 23 percent, while for central and northern families the rate was 6.3 percent and 4.9 percent respectively.—Xinhua

US soldier arrested after trying to board Los Angeles-bound plane with explosives

YUMA, 16 July—A US soldier has been arrested and charged with attempting to board a United Airlines flight while possessing a small amount of explosives, prosecutors in Arizona confirmed on Thursday.

US Army Private First Class Christopher Eric Wey, 19, was arrested on Wednesday when he tried to board a United Airlines flight from Yuma in Arizona to Los Angeles. Security officers with the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) detected the presence of explosives in Wey's luggage during a routine screening.

"TSA personnel subsequently found one-half ounce of C4 explosive hidden in a tobacco can inside one of Wey's bags. Wey was detained for investigation, and interviewed by Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI)," a spokesperson for the US Attorney's Office in Arizona said.

According to a complaint filed on Thursday, Wey stole the C4 explosive while attending a recent explosive training course. It is not known why he stole it, but authorities found no evidence that Wey intended any harm

with the explosives in his possession. Wey has been charged with one count of Attempt to Carry an Explosive on an Aircraft and one count of Transportation of a Stolen Explosive. He faces a maximum penalty of 10 years imprisonment, and a \$250,000 fine, if convicted.—Internet



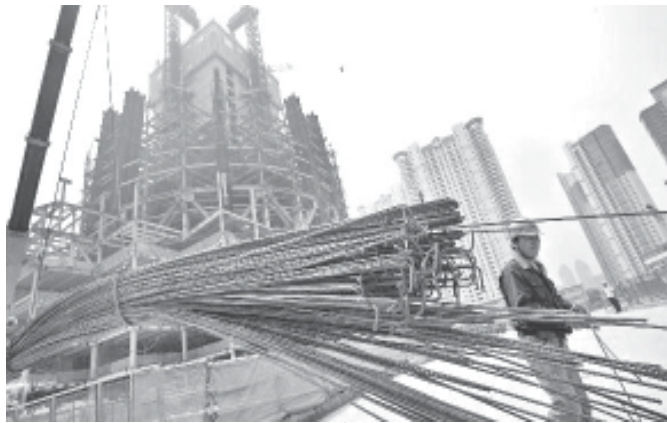

76 killed by cholera in Dominica since November

SANTO DOMINGO, 16 July—With the five fatalities over the past week, cholera has killed a total of 76 people in the Dominican Republic since November, the Health Ministry said Friday.

The number of suspected cholera cases has risen to 10,760 after 1,014 new cases were registered in the past week, it said.

Most fresh cases were reported in the southern Province of Elias Pina and on the outskirts of the capital Santo Domingo.

The ministry said health authorities in Dominica, which shares the Hispaniola Island with Haiti, were also checking 182 deaths to decide whether they were caused by the epidemic.

As the rainy season has begun in Dominica, hot and humid weather has led to a sharp rise of cholera cases in the Caribbean nation.

The ministry has tightened measures to prevent the spread of cholera and relevant diseases.

The current cholera developed from a severe outbreak in Haiti last year, according to Dominican officials. —*MNA/Xinhua*

Strong El Nino could bring higher sea levels to US East Coast

WASHINGTON, 16 July—Coastal communities along the US East Coast may be at risk to higher sea levels accompanied by more destructive storm surges in future El Nino years, according to a new study published Friday by the US National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA).

The study was prompted by an unusual number of destructive storm surges along the East Coast during the 2009-2010 El Nino winter.

The study, led by Bill Sweet, from NOAA's Centre for Operational Oceanographic Products and Services, examined water levels and storm surge events during the "cool season" of October to April for the past five decades at four sites representative of much of the East Coast: Boston, Atlantic City, Norfolk and Charleston.

From 1961 to 2010, it was found that in strong El Nino years, these coastal areas experienced nearly three times the average number of storm surge events (defined as those of one foot or greater). The research also found that waters in those areas saw a third-of-a-foot elevation in mean sea level above predicted conditions.

"High-water events are already a concern for coastal communities. Studies like this may better prepare local officials who plan for or respond to conditions that may impact their communities," said Sweet. "For instance, city planners may consider reinforcing the primary dunes to mitigate for erosion at their beaches and protecting vulnerable structures like city docks by October during a strong El Nino year."—Xinhua

Grape seed polyphenols may protect against Alzheimer's disease

WASHINGTON, 16 July—Researchers at Mount Sinai School of Medicine have found that grape seed polyphenols—a natural antioxidant — may help prevent the development or delay the progression of Alzheimer's disease. The research, led by Giulio Pasinetti, was published online Friday in the *Journal of Alzheimer's Disease*, which causes brain changes that gradually get worse. This is the first study to evaluate the ability of grape-derived polyphenols to prevent the generation of a specific form of amyloid (A) peptide, a substance in the brain long known to cause the neurotoxicity associated with Alzheimer's disease.

In partnership with a team at the University of Minnesota, Pasinetti and collaborators administered grape seed polyphenolic extracts to mice genetically determined to develop

memory deficits and A neurotoxins similar to those found in Alzheimer's disease. They found that the brain content of the A*56, a specific form of A previously implicated in the promotion of Alzheimer's disease memory loss, was substantially reduced after treatment. Previous studies suggest that increased consumption of grape-derived polyphenols, whose content, for example, is very high in red wine, may protect against cognitive decline in Alzheimer's.

This new finding corroborates those theories. "Since naturally occurring polyphenols are also generally commercially available as nutritional supplements and have negligible adverse events even after prolonged periods of treatment, this new finding holds significant promise as a preventive method or treatment."—Xinhua

Sunken Nazi submarine discovered off Brazilian coast

RIO DE JANEIRO, 16 July—Brazilian researchers announced Friday they have discovered the remains of a German World War II submarine sunken off the coast of the country's southern region.

Researchers from the Kat Schurmann Institute and Itajai Valley University said the *U-513* submarine was found late Thursday at a depth of 75 meters off the coast of Santa Catarina

state. "We are very happy with the discovery," the researchers said.

The *U-513* submarine was destroyed by a US seaplane on July 19, 1943. Seven of the 46 crew members survived, the researchers said.

It is believed that 10 German submarines had been sunk off the Brazilian coast besides the *U-513* during World War II.—*Internet*

Three burglaries hit Britain every two minutes

LONDON, 16 July—Nearly 745,000 break-ins took place in British houses in 2010—meaning three burglaries every two minutes, a survey has found.

The number was 94,000 more than in the previous year, *The Sun* reported.

The rise in thefts is believed to be fuelled by the recession and a rise in unemployment, says the British Crime Survey.

A think-tank, Policy Exchange, has argued police only solve one in eight burglaries.

The survey also revealed there were 2.2 million violent crimes last year. This included a dramatic 38 percent hike in assaults with "minor injury" and a 35 percent increase in domestic violence.

Jon Murphy, a top official of the Association of Chief Police Officers, said rocketing metal prices drove a 70 percent upsurge in cable thefts in the railways.

Shadow home secretary Yvette Cooper said: "After years of falling crime, these figures show the further progress people want is at risk."—*Internet*

Stolen Picasso recovered in US

NEW YORK, 16 July—A Picasso painting that was stolen three weeks ago in New York has been found in the apartment of a man who was arrested last week in San Francisco for the theft of a sketch by the Spanish artist, police said Friday.

The recovered painting is a 1933 work, "Sculpteur et Deux Tetes", valued at \$350,000, which was robbed 27 June from an art gallery in New York's SoHo District.

Police agents from New York and Hoboken found 10 other works of art in Lugo's home that had been stolen between 6 June and 1 July from various galleries and hotels in New York, worth some \$500,000 in all.

Police obtained a search warrant for Lugo's home after he was detained last week in San Francisco accused of stealing "Tete de Femme", a 1965 sketch by Picasso that was on

view at the Weinstein Gallery.

San Francisco authorities recovered undamaged the work of art that has a sale price of over \$200,000 and which Lugo was apparently going to sell to an unidentified person. The accused, who pleads not guilty and remains in custody in San Francisco awaiting trial, was visiting some friends in Napa Valley when agents nabbed him.

World's fattest mom earns USD 90k a year from fans who watch her eat online

LONDON, 16 July—An American woman who is aiming to become the world's fattest woman has already started profiting from her challenge - by earning 90,000 dollars a year from fans who pay to watch her eat online.

Donna Simpson, 44, who already holds the dubious honour of being the world's fattest woman to give birth, makes money from people hungry to watch her eat more than 15,000 calories a day, reports *the Daily Mail*.

The mother-of-two weighs 50st, but is determined to pile on yet more weight so she can reach her dream goal of being 72st and crowned the world's fattest woman. Her website charged people

around 20 dollars for 30 days for viewing her tucking huge meals, and the profits are used to fund her huge food shopping bill, which is estimated to cost her around 500 pounds a week. The New Jersey mother ploughs through burgers, chips, meatloaf, pizza, cake and fizzy drinks.

But Donna, who struggles to walk and suffers high blood pressure, heart disease and diabetes, refuses to give up her incredibly dangerous eating habits, ignoring all doctors' warnings.

The 5ft 2in mother, who now requires a mobility scooter to go shopping, wears XXXXXXXXL dresses and tries to move as little as possible to prevent her from burning any precious calories.—*Internet*

Positive attitude key to ageing successfully

LONDON, 16 July — Aging successfully has been linked with a preference for positive, emotionally gratifying experiences.

New research published in *Biological Psychiatry* now explains how and when this "positivity effect" works in the brain.

German scientists studied this effect by using neuro imaging to evaluate brain engagement in young and old adults while

they performed a specialized cognitive task that included supposedly irrelevant pictures of either neutral, happy, sad or fearful faces. During parts of the task when they did not have to pay as much attention, the elderly subjects were significantly more distracted by the happy faces, according to a University Medical Centre statement.

When this occurred, they had increased engagement in the part of

the brain that helps control emotions. This stronger signal in the brain was correlated with those who showed the greatest emotional stability.

"We suggest that motivational goal-shifting in healthy aging leads to a self-regulated engagement in positive emotions even when this is not required by the setting," explains Stefanie Brassen, University Medical Centre, Hamburg, Germany, who led the study.—*Internet*

£161m Euromillions winner claims prize

LONDON, 16 July —The UK winner of the £161m Euromillions jackpot has claimed their prize, lottery operator Camelot has confirmed. It is not yet known if the ticket holder is an indi-

vidual or syndicate — or whether they will go public. If the winner is a single player, they would instantly be placed 430th in this year's *Sunday Times Rich List*.



The jackpot was capped at 185 million euros after a number of rollovers.—INTERNET

Tuesday's £161,653,000 prize was Europe's biggest-ever and was capped after a series of rollovers. It follows a £113m UK Euromillions win in October. The lucky winner of the £161m prize, who is said to be deciding whether or not to reveal their identity, successfully matched all five main numbers and both Lucky Stars. The numbers were 17, 19, 38, 42 and 45, and the Lucky Stars were 9 and 10.—*Internet*

Gene link to 70% of hard-to-treat breast cancers

MASSACHUSETTS, 16 July—A gene has been linked to 70% of hard-to-treat breast cancers which are resistant to hormone therapies, in US research. The study published in *Nature* used a new technique which tested hundreds of genes at once, rather than one at a time. Scientists said there was "a lot of potential for significant impact" if drugs could be developed.

Cancer Research UK said it would be interesting to see where the study led. Hormones can force

tumour growth, so drugs which interfere with that process, such as tamoxifen and aromatase inhibitors, are used as treatments. Up to a third of breast cancers, however, are not hormone driven, so these drugs do not work and there are fewer treatments available for these patients.

The researchers at the Whitehead Institute for Biomedical Research, Massachusetts, used **Some breast cancers are much harder to treat.**

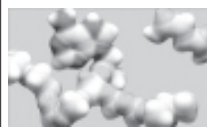

HIV medicines 'boost prevention'

WASHINGTON, 16 July—HIV drugs can be used to boost protection against HIV as well as treating symptoms after infection, research suggests. Two studies in Africa add weight to previous data showing drugs used to treat HIV can reduce infection risk when taken daily. The World Health Organization said the studies could have "enormous impact" in preventing HIV transmission.

The findings were revealed in the run-up to an AIDS conference in Rome.

"This is a major scientific breakthrough which reconfirms the essential role that antiretroviral medicine has to play in the AIDS response," said Michel Sidibé, executive director of the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS). "These studies could help us to reach the tipping point in the HIV epidemic."

One trial, carried out by

the University of Washington, US, followed almost 5,000 couples in Kenya and Uganda, where one person had HIV infection and the other did not. The uninfected person took a daily HIV medicine (tenofovir), a combination of two HIV drugs (tenofovir and emtricitabine), or a placebo pill.

Height matters more than size for dispersing seeds

SYDNEY, 16 July—Plant height rather than seed mass is a better predictor of how far seeds will be dispersed, a study has shown.

The authors said they were surprised by the findings because it was assumed that lighter seeds would be carried further by the wind, water or animals.

However, the team found that plants of greater height—rather than those of reduced seed size—recorded greater dispersal distances. The findings

Investigators said the man apparently didn't realize the cameras were filming as he was removing them from the wall. Police said they arrested a 22-year-old man Wednesday in the thefts.

Fifty-year-old love letter arrives at school

Officials at a Pennsylvania college said a love letter mailed to a student more than 50 years ago has finally arrived at the school.

Christine Kindl, a spokeswoman for California University of Pennsylvania, formerly known as California State Teachers College, said a letter intended for a student named Clark C Moore arrived at the school Friday after being

mailed 20 Feb, 1958, the *Pittsburgh Tribune-Review* reported Thursday.

Kindl said the letter was mailed from Pittsburgh and is signed "Love Forever, Vonnie."

"It's the most interesting thing I've come across in 22 years of working mail. I see a lot of students' mail, but nothing like this," said Connie Morris, mail-room supervisor for the school.

Officials said they

attempted to find Moore, who would be in his 70s, using files and Web sites including Facebook, but they were unable to track him down.

"We've tried to find him, but we don't have a record of him in our alumni records," Kindl said.

Postal Service officials said they are trying to determine how the letter wound up in the mail stream instead of the dead letter file.

The Wellington Zoo said the penguin, dubbed Happy Feet after the 2006 film of the same name, became ill after eating sand at Peka Peka beach last month, *The Dominion Post* reported Thursday. Kate Baker, a spokeswoman for the zoo, said Happy Feet has been recovering well since having his stomach pumped and is now on the road to recovery, having gained 5.7 pounds since his rescue.

Baker said Happy Feet, the first penguin to make the swim from Antarctica to New Zealand in 44 years, is being kept in the dark to emulate the Antarctic winter days. The spokeswoman said experts are formulating a plan to return the penguin to Antarctica once his recovery is complete.

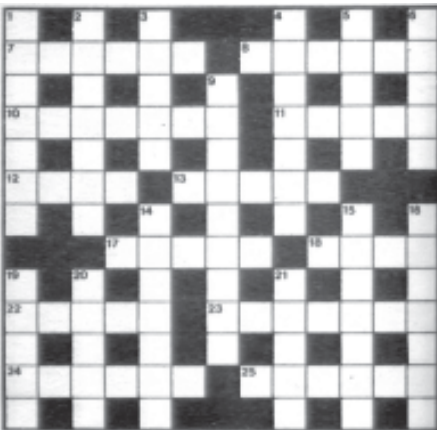

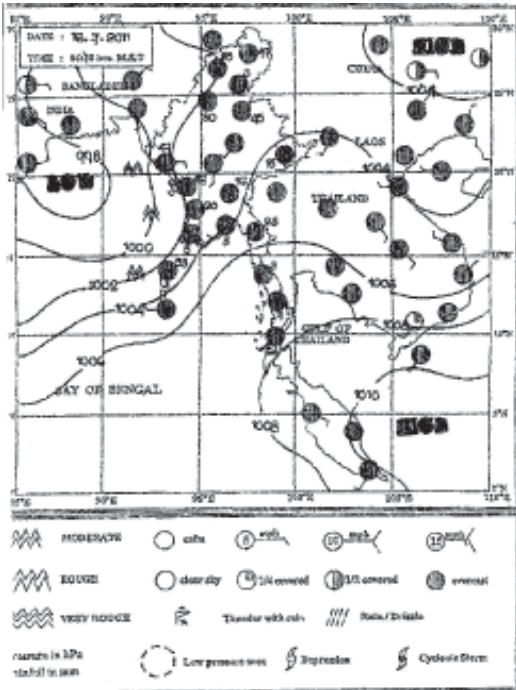
