At least 91 dead in Norway shooting, bomb attack



OSLO, 23 July—A gunman dressed in police uniform opened fire at a youth camp of Norway's ruling political party on Friday, killing at least 84 people, two hours after a bomb killed seven in the government district in the capital Oslo at 3:30 pm (1330 GMT).

Witnesses said the gunman, identified by police as a 32-year-old Norwegian, moved across the small, wooded Utoeya holiday island about 40 kilometres west of Oslo firing at random as young people scattered in fear. Norwegian television TV2 said the gunman detained by police was described as tall and blond and had links to

right-wing extremism.

"We had all gathered in the main house to talk about what had happened in Oslo. Suddenly we heard shots. First we thought it was nonsense. Then everyone at the annual event of the Workers' Youth League run by the governing Labour Party started running," a survivor, 16-year-old called Hana told Norway's Aftenposten. "I saw a policeman stand there with earplugs. He said 'I'd like to gather everyone'. Then he ran in and started shooting at people. We ran down towards the beach and began to swim." Hana said the gunman fired at people in the water.—MNA/Xinhua

CHICAGO, 23 July—Autopsies revealed Friday showed that at least seven people from the Chicago area died from heat related causes within the last three scorching days, the *Chicago Sun-times* reports.

According to WGN TV meteorologist Tom Skilling, a check of Chicago's 83-year weather record at Midway reveals back-to-back 100s have occurred in only 11 of the past 83 years.

Six Iran troops killed in clashes with Kurd rebels

TEHERAN, 23 July—A senior officer of Iran's elite Revolutionary Guards was among six soldiers killed in clashes with Kurdish rebels on the border with Iraq, *Fars news agency* reported on Friday.

"General Assemi of the Qom branch of the Islamic Revolutionary Guards Corps was killed along with five of his comrades in clashes with terrorist rebels of the PJAK (Party of Free Life of Kurdistan) in the Sardasht area," the agency said, without giving any further details. Iranian troops launched a major offensive on Saturday against PJAK



rebels operating out of rear-bases in neighbouring Iraq. On Tuesday, the autonomous regional government in Iraqi Kurdistan demanded Iran respect the border after a Guards commander said Iranian forces

Gunmen kill five laborers in southwest Pakistan

ISLAMABAD, 23 July—At least five people were killed on Saturday afternoon when unknown gunmen opened fire in Pakistan's southwestern province of Balochistan, local media reported.

According to the reports, two gunmen riding a motorcycle suddenly appeared in the Kasan Puri area of Naushki, a district in the southwestern side of the provincial capital Quetta, and opened fire at five laborers working at a site.

As a result of firing, all the poor men died on the spot. Police and rescue team rushed to the site of incident and shifted the bodies to the district hospital.

According to eyewitnesses, all the laborers were from the country's eastern province of Punjab.

Dozens of workers, doctors, professors and businessmen, who migrated from other provinces to Balochistan, have been killed during the last couple of years.

Officials and other sources believed that Baloch people who have adopted armed struggle for their rights were involved in such incidents.

80 insurgents killed in Afghan Paktika province

KABUL, 23 July—A total of 80 anti-government insurgents have been killed in Paktika province 155 km east of Afghan capital Kabul over the past three days, a statement released by provincial administration said on Saturday.

"The combined operation of Afghan and international troops have left 80 armed militants dead in Paktika province over the past three days," the statement said.

According to the statement, the combined operation is covering Marizko and Armai villages in Sar Rowzah district with the objective to ensure security there.

The operation is continuing with the support of air power, it added.

Taliban militants fighting Afghan and NATO-led troops have not to make comment yet.

Next Mars rover will land in 96-mile-wide crater

LOS ANGELES, 23 July—NASA's next *Mars* rover will land at the foot of a towering mountain inside a 96-mile-wide crater to search for evidence that the region once had conditions capable of supporting microbial life, project officials announced Friday

The rover, nicknamed *Curiosity*, is expected to be launched this year and to land on Mars in August 2012. It's far bigger than the three rovers NASA has previously sent to the red planet in search of geologic evidence that the frigid, dusty planet was once warmer and wet, with

conditions that could potentially have supported a hardy form of life.

The 3-mile-high mountain in Gale Crater is layered and scientists believe it is the surviving remnant of an extensive sequence of deposits. The site also has a huge cut likened to the Grand Canyon that appears to have been made by flowing water. Mission planners intend to send the instrument-laden *Curiosity* up the lower flanks of the mountain to examine the layers. Its robotic arm is designed to pick up samples that two of the 10 instruments will be able to ingest for analysis. Scientists hope *Curiosity* will help determine what happened to the water on Mars, how it went from wet to a frozen desert where dust devils spin across the surface.—*Internet*

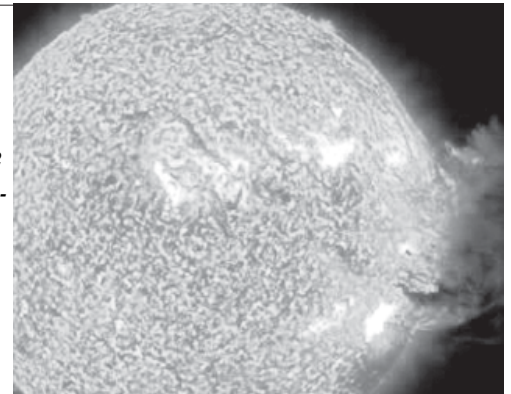

Dying sun will drive off comets

CAMBRIDGE, 23 July—When our sun ages and finally dies it will go out with a bang, throwing many of the solar system's comets into interstellar space, British scientists say.

In about 5 billion years it will run out of hydrogen to burn in its core and will expand to become a red giant star, eventually blowing off its atmosphere to leave an ember-like core called a white dwarf, *NewScientist.com* reported.

Researchers at the University of Cambridge say computer simulations show a sun's death throes will be felt as far as the vast cloud of comets in the so-

called *Ort* cloud, well beyond the orbit of *Pluto*.

It's generally assumed the inner planets, including *Earth*, will be engulfed and incinerated during that phase, but now scientists say they believe the impact will be felt far beyond that.

As the sun loses mass, its gravity will decrease and that change can eject orbiting objects, and *Dimitri Veras* and his colleagues *Cambridge* said their simulations indicate as much as 20 percent of *Ort* cloud comets will fly away into interstellar space.—*Internet*



Sephora releases iPad app

NEW YORK, 23 July—The beauty retailer is on an innovative roll this month: following the introduction of same-day product delivery in Manhattan and the announcement of in-store nail bars (coming end of this month), Sephora has launched its free Sephora To Go app for both iPhone and iPad.

With what might well be the most complete beauty app for the iPad to date, users are now able to browse and buy products, track the latest launches at Sephora, read reviews, locate stores with GPS, look up previous buys, and watch video tutorials as part of the same offering.

In addition to these more or less expected

features, the app's developers have also come up with a few more surprising tools, including the *Virtual Polish Change* that lets you 'try on' nail colours from the Sephora by *OPI* range and the *Scan* that provides you with information, videos, and reviews when used on a product in store.

Spotify has 70,000 paid US users one week after launch

WASHINGTON, 23 July—Spotify launched in the United States a week ago on an invite-only basis, and has been getting a lot of coverage recently, including some rave reviews.

The streaming music service can be used for free with ads, but also offers two paid subscription options that start at \$4.99. Despite hurdles to sign up, in the time Spotify has been available in the United States, *Billboard* now claims that 70,000 users have signed up for a paid subscription.

The main draws to having a paid subscription would be the removal of ads between songs, unlimited play time, and the ability to listen to the service on your mobile device.

It's hard to judge just how successful of a launch Spotify is experiencing since all of its closest competitors have been on the market for years. For example, *Rhapsody* has around 800,000

paid users, but it launched in 2001.

Napster was reported to have 761,000 subscribers before it was bought by *Best Buy* in 2008. Fellow newcomer *Rdio* is reported to have fewer than 100,000 paid users, so Spotify did a great job of playing catch up in a single week.

In a recent comparison conducted by *Digital Trends*, we found Spotify to be the most well-rounded service out of *Pandora*, *Spotify*, and *Grooveshark*.

Even with a bug, Spotify was able to barely pass *Grooveshark* in our comparison, winning three of the six categories. The bug has to do with users losing their "starred" songs, which is annoying but is not a game breaking bug.

The overall product is still very solid, and it is easy to see why the service has become so popular so quickly.—*Internet*

Breathing problems strike soldiers returning from Middle East

BEIJING, 23 July— Some US soldiers returning from the Middle East have acquired constrictive bronchiolitis, a kind of lung damage virtually unknown in young adults, according to US News & World Report.
“Respiratory disorders are emerging as a major consequence of service in southwest Asia,” said study author Dr Matthew S. King, an assistant professor of pulmonary and critical care at Meharry Medical College in Nashville, Tenn.
“In addition to our study, there have been studies showing increases in asthma, obstructive lung disease, allergic rhinitis and a general increase in reports of respiratory symptoms,” he added. “Most of the patients say they can't seem to catch their breath when exerting themselves.”

Mexico vaccinates against measles after toddler case

MEXICO CITY, 23 July—Mexican health officials stepped up a vaccination campaign against the measles Friday after a French toddler became Mexico's first case of the disease in four years.
“There's no need for alarm, but we're asking for cooperation from everybody, particularly those who have not been vaccinated,” Health Minister Jose Angel Cordoba told Televisa television Friday.
The 18-month-old girl showed symptoms of the disease, including fever and a cough, five days after arriving in Mexico on 10 July from France.
The Mexico City neighbourhood where she was staying was placed on a health watch this week while vaccination booths for the highly-contagious disease appeared at the international airport Friday.
“Everyone under 39 who has not had measles

must be vaccinated as well as children under 12 who have not had a first vaccination,” Cordoba said. The last indigenous case of measles in Mexico was detected 14 years ago and the last case from a foreign country was in 2007, he added.—Internet

On the other hand, Anthony Szema, a physician and engineer at Stony Brook University in New York, has examined a soldier and found tiny complexes of titanium and iron in the man's lungs, where metals can cause severe damage.
Mined separately, the two metals could have gotten together only through a manufacturing process, Szema reported.
While the metals' origin is unclear, he presents a new case study, suspecting garbage-burning pits or exploding devices sent them airborne.
While the cases in the study represent only a few dozen people of the hundreds of thousands serving in the Middle East, there is no estimate of how many more might have bronchiolitis.
it is recommended that soldiers exercise caution in the field until more is known.
Soldiers are now told to wear a mask when burning garbage.

Borders begins liquidation sales

ANN ARBOR, 23 July—Borders Group Inc began a going-out-of-business sale for its almost 400 US stores Friday, but for a handful of stores it may not be the end, analysts said.
Books-A-Million Inc, which operates 231 bookstores in 23 states and the District of Columbia, has said it hopes to buy 30 of those locations, *The Wall Street Journal* reported.
The sale went on at the chain's flagship store in Ann Arbor, Mich, with liquidation signs in the windows but little fanfare, AnnArbor.com reported.
Customers wandered into the store with a tinge of regret, a feeling of nostalgia and a sense of frustration that the chain, a victim of industry dynamics, strategic errors and a changing culture, couldn't find a way to hang on.
“I'm a retired retailer, and I've seen all the trends in retail around the years, and I never thought I'd see the end of this trend,” Flint resident Michael Melet said.

Baidu on deck as Caterpillar comes up short, McDonald's and oil services sizzle

NEW YORK, 23 July—With nearly 90% of the S&P 500 Index companies that have reported results since 11 July topping profit expectations, the large cap stock index finished the week 2.2% higher than last Friday's close.
General Electric topped both sales and profit expectations, showing a 21% gain in earnings per share on a 4% decrease in revenues, associated mainly with selling its NBC Universal unit to Comcast.
Caterpillar produced a 44% increase in net income but it wasn't enough to meet Wall Street's expectations. It blamed a slowdown in Japanese sales and costs of integrating the acquisition of mining machinery maker Bucyrus for the EPS shortfall. The stock dropped 5.8%.
McDonald's saw net income rise 15% as the top and bottom lines both topped analysts' views. Shares hit a new high, gaining 2.3% to \$88.56.

Near 130 people poisoned by meat in S Philippines

COTABATO (Philippines), 23 July—At least 128 people from a remote village in southern Philippines have been rushed to hospital since Tuesday due to food poisoning, local officials said on Saturday.

Of the total number of victims, 42 were children from the village of Ned. They all suffered vomiting, abdominal pain, diarrhea and fever after eating a Carabao meat slaughtered by their neighbour, Mayor Antonio Fungan of Lake Sebu Town in South Cotabato Province said.

Fungan said the majority of residents in Ned experienced the symptoms after eating the meat.

Victims have been confined at the South Cotabato Provincial Hospital for treatment. "The farm animal was slaughtered after it became weak.

The meats were sold to all villagers," Fungan said.

Health officials were sent to Ned to monitor the health condition of other victims who opted to stay in their residence.—MNA/Xinhua

Two charged in LA in brutal beating of baseball fan

LOS ANGELES, 23 July—Police exonerated one suspect in the beating of a San Francisco Giants fan and charged two other men with the crime Friday, accusing them of a savage attack the included cutting the victim's tongue and disfiguring his face. The

arrests came two months after an emotional Police Chief Charlie Beck trumpeted the arrest of the initial suspect, and four months after the beating of Bryan Stow, a paramedic who suffered a brain injury and remains hospitalized in serious condition.

Another man, Gio-vanni Ramirez, was arrested in May but wasn't charged in the attack in a stadium parking lot. For months, police Chief Charlie Beck had steadfastly maintained his confidence that Ramirez was the right suspect. "In policing, it's just as important to exonerate the innocent as it is to implicate the guilty," Beck said Friday at a terse news conference. "I want to tell the world that Giovanni Ramirez is no longer a suspect in this case."

MOGADISHU, 23 July—Al-Qaeda-linked militants in Somalia vowed to keep most international aid workers out of the country despite a worsening famine and the UN warned Friday that 800,000 children could die in the region from starvation. Frustrated aid groups said they want to deploy more food assistance in Somalia but don't yet have the

necessary safety guarantees to do so. The anarchic country has been mired in conflict for two decades and its capital is a war zone. The renewed threat from al-Shabab means only a handful of agencies will be able to respond to the hunger crisis in militant-controlled areas of southern Somalia.

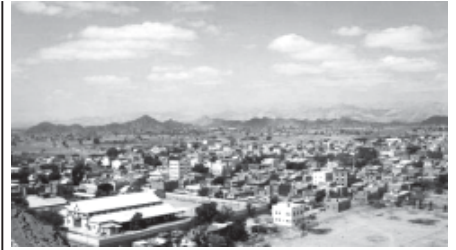
She was charged with six counts of causing damage with intent to endanger life in connection with the deaths. She will appear at Manchester Magistrates' Court on Saturday.

Two Yemeni soldiers, 'Qaeda' member killed in south

SANA'A, 23 July—Two Yemeni soldiers have been killed and four others wounded in clashes with suspected Al-Qaeda militants near Zinjibar, the capital of the southern Province of Abyan, a military source said Friday. And tribal sources said armed tribesmen had killed one Al-Qaeda member and wounded another at the entrance of Mudiyah, about 80 kilometres (49 miles) east of Zinjibar.

A military source said "two soldiers were killed and four wounded in clashes centred on the entrance to Zinjibar Thursday night between the army and Al-Qaeda fighters," a toll confirmed by medical sources.

Other military sources told AFP sporadic clashes had occurred from Thursday into Friday as the army attempted to enter Zinjibar, much of which has been held by suspected Al-Qaeda-linked militants since May.—Internet

BEIJING, 23 July—Chinese Premier Wen Jiabao on Saturday extended condolences to Norwegian Prime Minister Jens Stoltenberg over Friday's deadly attacks in Norway that killed at least 91 people. In his message, Wen condemned the violent twin attacks, and extended his condolences to the victims and deep sympathy to their families.

At least 84 people were killed when a gunman disguised as a police officer opened fire at a youth camp on Utoeya island, about 40 km west of the capital Oslo. —Xinhua

S African troops fight poachers slaughtering rhino

KRUGER NATIONAL PARK, 23 July—They used to rely on snares, poison and shotguns to kill rhinos for their horns. Now international crime syndicates are arming poachers with night-vision goggles and AK-47 assault rifles as the price for rhino horn surpasses gold.

Kruger National Park and soldiers ready for pre-dawn patrols.

“They’ve become very aggressive,” Ken Maggs, head of the South African government environmental crime investigation unit, said of the poachers. “They leave notes for us written in the sand, warnings. That

South Africa, home to 90 percent of the rhinos left on the continent, is fighting back. Since more than 140 troops were deployed in April, the number of rhinos killed in Kruger has dropped from 40 in March and 30 in April to 15 in May and just two in June. Fifteen alleged poachers also have been killed this year, and nine suspects wounded in gunfights.

Still, rhino carcasses with mutilated faces are becoming a common sight in African wildlife parks.

The hacked-off horns are destined to be smuggled to China and Vietnam, where traditional medicine practitioners grind them up for sale as alleged cures for everything from fevers to arthritis and cancer.

The horns have become so valuable that thieves this year started stealing rhino exhibits in European museums.

Chavez says ‘first cycle’ of chemo completed

CARACAS, 23 July—Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez said Friday he has finished his “first cycle” of chemotherapy in Cuba and will begin the second of various phases of treatment.

Chavez vowed to overcome his cancer, saying he is confident of winning re-election next year and staying in power for at least six more years. He spoke in a telephone call carried live on state television during a speech by his vice president, Elias Jaua.

“This first cycle has been completed successfully. And now, well, we’re preparing for a second cycle,” Chavez said. “There are various ones in this battle to finally defeat and eliminate any risk of the presence of malignant cells in this body, which is going to turn 57 years old.”

They were the first televised remarks by Chavez, whose birthday is 28 July, since he went to Cuba last Saturday to begin chemotherapy. His only public statements until Friday had been dozens of messages posted on his Twitter account.

Chavez underwent surgery in Cuba on 20 June to remove a cancerous tumour. He hasn’t said what type of cancer he has been diagnosed with or specified where exactly it was located, saying only that it was in his pelvic region. He says chemotherapy is necessary to ensure cancer cells don’t reappear.

Chavez likened it to a “bombardment,” saying: “It’s the bomb against the illness.”

He said the first phase of treatment went well and he feels a “will to live that has sprung up inside me like a volcano.”—Internet

NY-Boston Amtrak trains suspended after truck crash

NEW YORK, 23 July—Amtrak trains between New York and Boston were suspended until Saturday morning after a heavy truck struck overhead power lines near New Haven, Connecticut, an Amtrak spokesman said. Scheduled trips on Amtrak were canceled after the accident occurred at about 5 pm on Friday, spokesman Marc Magliari said. No train passengers were hurt, he said. New Haven police, who were investigating the accident, did not immediately release information about the crash, including the truck driver’s condition. “A vehicle made its way onto our property,” Magliari said. “It didn’t happen at a crossing.” Amtrak was repairing the damage and expected trains to resume service at a yet undetermined time on Saturday, Magliari said.—Reuters

Food poisoning leaves one dead, 72 hospitalized in SW China

GUIYANG, 23 July—A food poisoning has left a five-year-old girl dead and 72 others hospitalized in a village in southwest China’s Guizhou Province, a local official said Saturday.

Villagers in the Wangzhuang Village in Anshun City began to show symptoms of food poisoning after attending a dinner party hosted by fellow villager Qi Qinggang Friday evening. They were soon sent to five different hospitals, said Ma Ning, vice secretary-general of the Anshun municipal government.

A young girl died after treatment failed. Currently, 12 villagers are still in critical condition, Ma said.

An initial investigation showed the poisoning

might be caused by nitrite, which can lead to deficiency in the amount of oxygen reaching human’s body tissues.

One killed, 20 injured in bus accident in New York

NEW YORK, 23 July—One person was killed and at least 20 people injured after a bus and a tractor-trailer collided on a highway in New York state, local police said Friday.

The tour bus was carrying about 50 people when the collision happened early Friday near Waterloo. Both vehicles caught fire and were totally destroyed, the police said.

The driver of the tractor-trailer was the fatality, and the injured have been taken to hospital.

The cause of the accident is under investigation.

On Sunday, a tour bus crashed some 70 kilometres west of Friday’s crash scene, killing two people and injuring 35 others. Police blamed that crash on a tyre blowout.

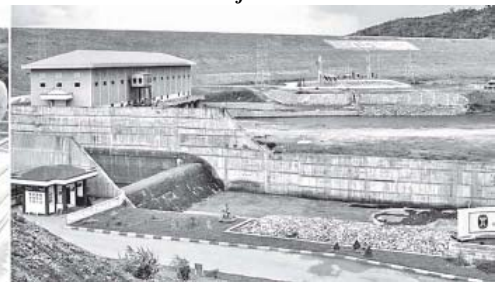

The state has been working in cooperation with UNESCO for Sri Kestra, Beikthano and Hanlin ancient cities, lands of Myanmar cultural heritage, to be included in World Heritage List, there remains only stage to submit the application for the World Heritage List this month. After submitting the application, there will remain the processes of UNESCO. After completion of the processes of UNESCO, Sri Kestra, Beikthano and Hanlin ancient cities will be included in the World Heritage List. In preserving the ancient heritage, it is necessary to cooperate with foreign countries and organizations. If not, it is necessary to preserve the ancient heritages in original shapes on self-reliant basis by applying modern technology.

Preservation and renovation of ancient heritages are being undertaken in Inwa, Mandalay, Shwebo, Bago, MraukU and Kayin State apart from Bagan region. As Inwa era was the most flourishing of literature in the Myanmar culture, a future plan is under way to rebuild ancient Inwa city including log forts, city walls and moats. He disclosed that beginning November this year, maintenance tasks will be carried out in cooperation with experts from Archaeological Survey of India at Ananda Pagoda which possesses worthy of architectural works in Bagan. The government will join hands with any country, organization and person for maintenance works in accord with the State policy.

There are 3122 ancient pagodas in Bagan region including 122 pagodas with unnecessary maintenance and 3000 pagodas with necessary maintenance. Up to now, the State together with the people has maintained 2403 pagodas. Moreover, a total of 534 pagodas need regular maintenance and 63 pagodas, ongoing maintenance. As the ministry has urged the people to participate in maintenance and renovation of the remaining pagodas, wellwishers have emerged to renovate all 63 pagodas. Of K 729.4 million as renovation cost, wellwishers have donated K 458.4 million to the funds.

While skillful engineers of

the Ministry of Culture who have got PhD, ME and diploma are closely supervising the maintenance and renovation works, the people and departmental personnel are to cooperate with them as much as possible in preservation of ancient heritage and maintenance of the pagodas and stupas. As Bagan is a main destination of tourists, the local people are enjoying the job opportunities in hotel services, catering services, transport, handicraft and trading and as a result, their socio-economy has improved. Enhancement of the small- and medium-scale cottage industries such as lacquerware, painting, sculpture and stone sculpture works in Bagan is one of eight plans adopted by the government for poverty alleviation of rural people. To do so, the Ministry of Commerce and the Ministry of Cooperatives will provide necessary assistance for promotion of these industries with the use of modern techniques to enable the local people to enjoy the better socio-economic life. In conclusion, the Union Minister urged the departmental personnel and local people to cooperate in maintaining ancient heritages in Bagan region as a national duty.

Director-General U Kyaw Oo Lwin reported on facts about Bagan archaeological region, progress of works being jointly undertaken by the Ministry of Culture and UNESCO, lectures of international archaeologists, maintenance and renovation at the pagodas, Buddhist University of Bagan era and brick temples with fine architectural works, best mural paintings and ancient cultural heritage, renovation of damaged pagodas and stupas like brick mounds that ruined in bad weather to become the original shapes, bricks and masonry works at ancient buildings, renovation of large and small archways, necessary masonry works, reinforced concrete works, and ongoing works with the contributions of the people and the State.

Age and City States Age and King Anawrahta established the First Myanmar Empire in Bagan in 1044 AD. The State is preserving remains of ancient cultural heritage with advanced techniques and local people are to give a hand in doing so as a national duty, urged the Union Minister.

Bagan is traditionally said to have 4446 pagodas which are invaluable cultural heritage for Myanmar people and on the other hand it is the region where pagodas and stupas, which represent the religion of Myanmar people, can be seen in mass. The world has recognized the high standard of architecture and fine arts of Myanmar through structures of pagodas, stupas, cave temples in Bagan Region and handicrafts of ten Myanmar traditional arts and crafts in those religious edifices, and literary writings in terracotta plaques, mural paintings, ink inscriptions on stuccos, stone inscriptions and inscriptions on bells. Moreover, the excavated iron and bronze casts and golden and silver items are evidences of the high standard of Myanmar arts and crafts.

The royal families, the rich and wellwishers of the second and third Myanmar Empires preserved and renovated ancient cultural heritage of high standard through successive generations. It can be seen that our forefathers as well as successive governments also valued and renovated those cultural heritage.

In other words it had preserved and renovated those cultural heritage with both of the strength of the State and the people. It had adopted firm policy to carry out renovation works with thorough reasoning.

The difference between Myanmar and alien peoples in perception of Bagan and cultural sites in Bagan region is that alien peoples view these cultural sites just as cultural heritage, but for Myanmar, these are not only just cultural heritage but also holy place. Alien peoples simply think renovation of such ancient edifices would reduce value of antiquity and they just cannot understand the loss of pagodas in our point of view. So, the State has laid down policies to preserve those ancient edifices in Bagan Region as a site of cultural heritage and also sacred place of religion.

In renovating ancient edifices, skilled Myanmar engineers who are well-versed in internationally-used modern architecture and have finished PhD and MSc degrees, diploma and long-term and short-term courses abroad, were assigned for close supervision. In repairing the ruined religious edifices, they are maintained in current condition to prevent them from falling into decay and new similar religious edifices are constructed beside old ones

carried out by skillful engineers who have attended the ancient building maintenance courses at Structural Conservation of India, ICCROM of Italy, Japan and Cambodia. Maintenance and cleansing works have been undertaken at mural paintings at 12 pagodas including Myingaba Gubyaukkyi, Apel Yadana and Lawka Hteikpan pagodas in Bagan region. Moreover, masonry works of 93 pagodas have been maintained whereas mural paintings and masonry works at 94 pagodas of Bagan and Inwa eras in Sagaing, Tilawkgaguru, Myingun, Kyundaw, Hsale, Sale, Pakhangyi and Pakhangge regions have been renovated with the use of chemicals systematically.

Beginning 1984, expert Mr Pierre Pichard of UNESCO together with staff of the department compiled the detailed facts and figures with drawings and photos of ancient buildings, aboveground and underground pagodas, stupas and buildings in Bagan region and published eight volumes of the book entitled "Inventory of Monuments of Bagan" in English version in 1996. Moreover, the detailed records of 2230 pagodas, stupas and temples in Bagan region have been compiled including ground plans and structure plans. Likewise, mural paintings from 77 pagodas in Bagan region have been maintained through digital

Nguyen Van Bo, Director of the Vietnam Agricultural Science Institute, under MARD, addressed at the seminar that Vietnamese agricultural products play an importance role in securing food

and providing jobs to the rural people.

Impacts due to climate change, including sea water rising, land submersion, soil quality degradation and desert, all pose challenges to agricultural production and its sustainable development. The seminar provided opportunities for regional scientists and managers in the field to share experience, research and consultation on the vulnerability of agriculture to climate change, as well as set up policies to cope with its impacts, Bo said. ICRISAT Research Program Director MCS Bantilan shared with participants experience in climate change. She said that poor farmers are the worst affected by climate change and also the most vulnerable to its impacts.—*Xinhua*

Historian: 3 possible Japanese airmen for skull

HONOLULU, 23 July—The skull found in Pearl Harbour believed to be from a Japanese pilot in the 7 Dec, 1941 attack could belong to one of three airmen who were aboard a torpedo plane that was shot down where the surprising discovery was recently made.

Daniel Martinez, the National Park Service's chief historian for Pearl Harbour, said Friday he and historian Mike Wenger planned to spend the weekend researching the names of the three Japanese men on a Nakajima B5N2 bomber that went down in the area where the skull was discovered during dredging in April.

Forensic scientists with the Joint POW/MIA Accounting Command on Oahu are conducting tests to confirm that the skull belongs to one of 55 Japanese airmen killed in the attack. Martinez said the Nakajima B5N2, also known as a Kate bomber, was shot down in the southeast loch of the harbor. That's where an excavation crew in April found the skull during overnight dredging in water between 35 and 40 feet deep. The destroyer USS Bagley was credited with shooting down the aircraft.

"If JPAC determines this is Asian and it has been determined that it fits into the 1941 scenario, JPAC will then have to consider the names we'll submit to them as possible casualties," Martinez said. "We've got it whittled

down to three possible crews."

Martinez said he would not disclose the possible names without JPAC's permission. JPAC officials could not immediately be reached Friday.—*Internet*

British artist Lucian Freud dies aged 88

LONDON, 23 July—Realist painter Lucian Freud, grandson of the inventor of modern psychoanalysis Sigmund Freud and widely seen as Britain's top contemporary artist, has died in London aged 88, his lawyer said.

Freud was known for his signature nudes and self-portraits such as the powerful 1993 work of himself as a naked older man waving his brush like a weapon.

In recent years his paintings have sold for astronomical sums. His 1995 Portrait "Benefits Supervisor Sleeping" fetched 33.6 million dollars at a Christie's auction in New York — a world record for a living artist.

A statement released by his lawyer Diana Rawstron Thursday said the artist "died peacefully at his home in London".

His New York gallery, Acquavella Galleries, said Freud died Wednesday after a brief illness at his home in

Notting Hill.

"In company he was exciting, humble, warm and witty. He lived to paint and painted until the day he died, far removed from the noise of the art world," said New York art dealer William Acquavella.

Born to architect Ernst Freud, Sigmund's youngest son, in Berlin in 1922, Lucian moved to England with his family aged 10 to escape Nazism and became a British citizen in 1933.

Hawaii reports another snake—5th in recent weeks

HONOLULU, 23 July—The state says a ball python has been turned in to authorities on Oahu.

The Department of Agriculture said Friday it's the fifth snake that has been captured or turned in since late June in Hawaii. Snakes have no natural predators in Hawaii and pose a serious threat to Hawaii's environment. Japan's quake region holds samurai festival

TOKYO, 23 July—Japan's tsunami-hit Fukushima region has kicked off a thousand-year-old horse festival, with riders in samurai armour defying an ongoing nuclear crisis to take to the streets and vow recovery.

The "Soma Nomaoi", or wild horse chase, featured some 80 horses with riders in full samurai armour, and was dedicated this year to praying for those killed in the March disasters and for the reconstruction of local communities.

Locals marched through city streets just outside the 20-kilometre (12-mile) exclusion zone where nuclear workers are still battling to cool overheated reactors at a stricken atomic plant.

Michitane Soma, a direct descendant of the Soma clan which once governed the area, addressed the riders, each of whom carried a black mourning badge. "Believe in the strength of the tradition of Soma Nomaoi," the 36-year-old said tearfully.

"March on and pray for the swift reconstruction of eastern Japan." The three-day festival originates from secret military exercises held by 10th-century samurai warriors under the Soma clan, using horses as mock enemy soldiers.—INTERNET

US House cuts congressional budget

WASHINGTON, 23 July—US House of Representatives on Friday voted to cut the congressional budget by 6.4 percent, trimming the legislative branch budget by 227 million dollars to 3.3 billion for the next fiscal year.

The bill funding the Congress and its related agencies for 2012 was approved with a 252-159 vote.

Thirty-nine Democrats voted for the bill while 16 Republicans voted against it.

In the bill, appropriators said legislative-branch agencies need to cut bonuses and other merit pay in light of the fiscal crisis.

A report accompanying the bill calls on all agencies to justify bonuses paid out, and notes that some bonuses are lifting certain salaries higher than those earned by members of the Congress.

Under the bill, several agencies would be cut to the tune of 6 percent, including the Congressional Budget Office, the Government Accountability Office and the Library of Congress.

However, the Sergeant at Arms' budget would increase by 3.5 million, and the US Capitol Police budget would be level-funded.

During debate, members rejected several amendments, including one that would have slashed funding for the Office of Congressional Ethics (OCE) by 40 percent.

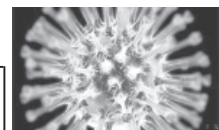

Swine flu jab 'narcolepsy risk'

LONDON, 23 July — A swine flu jab has been linked to rare cases of a sleeping disorder and should be the last line of protection for young people, European regulators say. The European Medicines Agency (EMA) said Pandemrix should only be given to children and teenagers at risk of H1N1 flu if other jabs are unavailable. More than six million doses of the vaccine have been given in the UK. Ten sus-

pected cases of narcolepsy linked to the vaccine have been reported to the UK's drug regulator.

Pandemrix, made by GlaxoSmithKline (GSK), was the most widely used in the UK during the 2009/10 flu pandemic. However, the vaccine is no longer in use and the remaining stocks will be destroyed this autumn.—INTERNET

Mandrill monkey makes 'pedicuring' tool

LONDON, 23 July — A crude "pedicure" carried out by a mandrill at Chester Zoo suggests the monkeys are capable of more advanced tool use than previously thought. Scientists from Durham University, UK, filmed the mandrill stripping a twig and using the resulting tool to clean under its toenails. They published the findings in the journal *Behavioural Processes*. Mandrills are the fifth species of Old World monkey seen deliberately modifying tools. Non-human apes, including chimpanzees and orangutans, can adapt basic tools for specific jobs.—INTERNET

China CNR signs subway contract with MTR

BEIJING, 23 July—China CNR Corporation Limited said its subsidiary had signed a deal worth 1.401 billion HK dollars (180 million US dollars) to sell subway trains to Hong Kong's MTR Corporation.

Changchun Railway Vehicles Co, Ltd under the China CNR, a major Chinese manufacturer of locomotives, will deliver the trains to MTR from this month to June 2015, the group said in a statement to the Shanghai Stock Exchange Friday night.

The statement did not say how many trains are included in the contract.—Xinhua

An enormous sinkhole has opened up in the town of Leesburg, Fla, and it's hungry. It's already gobbled up a garbage bin, an oak tree, the back wall of the building housing a salon and racks of supplies.

The chasm that caused Main Street Hair and Beauty Supply to collapse is about 60 feet wide and 20 feet deep.

Although the street surrounding the building has also fallen prey to the pit, officials say the hole isn't growing. But the slowly sinking building is sparking growing concern for neighbours

who live nearby. The sinkhole started after a torrential downpour at the end of June.

The heavy rains lead to plenty of pits opening in central Florida. Since the 1950s, 3,100 sinkholes have been recorded in Florida.

Tiny 2,000-year-old golden bell found in Jerusalem

A tiny golden bell which was lost in Jerusalem some 2,000 years ago during the Second Temple period has been found among ruins near the Old City, Israel's Antiquities Authority said on Friday.

The bell, which is thought to have been an adornment which was sewn onto the garments of a senior official, was uncovered during excavation work on a drainage channel in the City of David, an area in the Arab neighbourhood of Silwan just south of the Old City walls.

"It seems the bell was sewn on the garment worn by a high official in Jerusalem at the end of the Second Temple period," an IAA statement said. The bell was found inside the main drainage channel taking rainwater from different parts of the city to the pool of Siloam, which is

mentioned several times in the Bible. "Apparently, the high official was walking in the Jerusalem street in the vicinity of Robinson's Arch and lost the gold bell that fell from his garment into the drainage channel beneath the road," it said, noting that Jewish high priests were known to have bells sewn onto their robes.

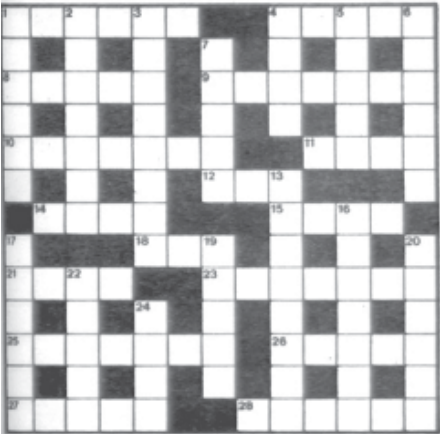

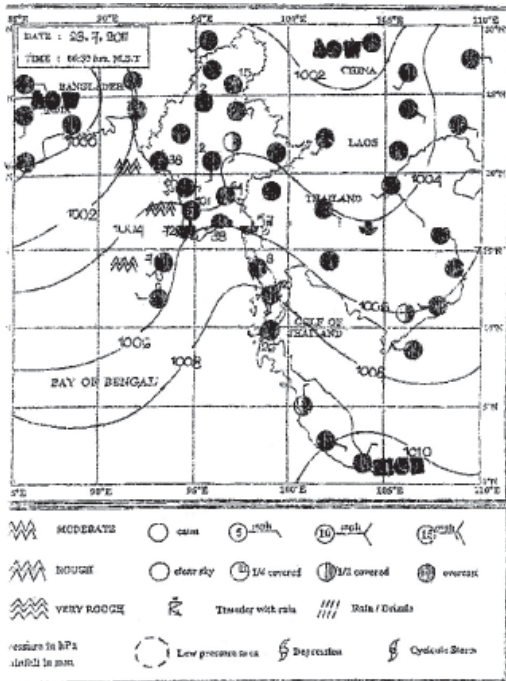

During the past 24 hours, rains have been isolated in Lower Sagaing Region and Chin State. NAY PYI TAW, 23 July—Work Coordination Meeting on Preservation of Cultural Heritage in Bagan Region was held at Bagan Archaeological Museum in Bagan Archaeological Region, NyaungU District, Mandalay Region, today, with an address by Union Minister for Information and for Culture U Kyaw Hsan.

Also present at the meeting were representatives of NyaungU Township Pyithu Hluttaw and Amyotha Hluttaw, Director-General U Kyaw Oo Lwin of Archaeology, National Museum and Library Department, the director of Bagan branch and staff, chairmen of pagoda boards of trustees and members, managers of hotels and guesthouses in Bagan Region, personnel of companies who are renovating religious edifices in Bagan, members of social organizations, senior citizens, community elders, local people and donors.

Speaking on the occasion, the Union Minister said that the meeting

was held with two objectives, the first one—to inform the local authorities and people about the adopted policies of the State, modern techniques, and cooperation with international organizations in preserving and maintaining such Myanmar's invaluable ancient cultural heritage in Bagan-NyaungU Region as pagodas, temples, lakes, stupas and religious edifices and participation of each individual in these tasks; the second one is to coordinate with the State on present renovation works. Bagan Archaeological Region is a region of great value for three reasons—the first, Bagan Region reflects national prestige and integrity of Myanmar country and Myanmar peoples, the second cultural handicrafts in this region are ancient cultural heritage of high value and the region is the land of pagodas and stupas which are of religious value to Myanmar people and the third, it is the major tourist destination in Myanmar. And thus, everyone is to safeguard and preserve

those three characteristics, stressed the Union Minister.

Myanmar peoples were previously supposed to be the descendants of Mongoloid races from northern Tibetan plateau. Teams comprised of international and Myanmar experts discovered fossilized remains of anthropoid primate in Pontaung-Ponnya Region in Myaung Township and Pale Township in 1979.

After laboratory tests and analysis of international organizations, a consensus was reached that Pontaung anthropoid primate fossils date back 40 million years, seven million years earlier than 33 million years old primate fossils discovered in Africa. Thus, the world has acknowledged that "Myanmar is the origin of the world."
