Salient points from the speech delivered by the Vice-Senior General at the NDMC coordination meeting

- 1. Officials must inspect the endurances of 12 dams and 12 reservoirs in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area daily to inform people from relief camps about the situation of these facilities.
- 2. Each relief camp systematically keeps the management fund and five basic foodstuffs provided by Nay Pyi Taw Council to supply foodstuffs to people from the camps daily.
- 3. Officials from hospitals, station hospitals, rural dispensaries, and nurses from villages have to inform nearby treatment centres about people's health conditions so as not to cause diarrhoea, mosquito- and fly-borne diseases, and general infectious diseases.
- 4. Since floodwaters receded, it is essential to provide basic foodstuffs and purified drinking water, as well as healthcare services to those who returned to their native areas.

Chairman of the National Disaster Management Committee Vice-Chairman of the State Administration Council Deputv Prime Minister Vice-Senior General Soe Win yesterday morning said so at the coordination meeting of the management outbreak of cyclonic storms Mocha in

committee to address damage in flash flooding in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area.

Speaking on the occasion, the Vice-Senior General noted that flash floods, inundation and heavy rains in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area, including Pyinmana, Tatkon and Lewe townships, are based on impacts of global climate change.

He stressed the need to overcome the challenges of natural disasters by applying experiences obtained in the 2023 and Nargis in 2008. Natural Disaster Management Committees not only in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area but also in Shan, Kayin and Mon States and Magway, Mandalay, Taninthayi and Bago Regions affected by Typhoon Yagi are conducting rescue and relief measures for the people in flooding and landslides.

He underlined that disaster management committees, which are open around the clock, have to direct well-wishers to relevant relief camps for flood victims in order to make donations systematically.

The Vice-Senior General urged the Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation to submit daily reports to the State Administration Council on the inflow of water to residences, as well as serious and non-serious occurrences.

He pointed out that officials must inspect the endurances of 12 dams and 12 reservoirs in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area daily to inform people from relief camps about the situations of these facilities.

According to the observations at 17:30 hours MST today, the Deep Depression over the West Bengal (India) and adjoining Bangladesh has moved west-southwestwards and crossing the interior of Bangladesh.

During next 48 hours forecast


The Deep Depression is likely to continue to move westwards and may cross continue inland of India and weaken into a Depression during next 48 hours.

General caution

Due to the Deep Depression, rain or thunder-showers will be widespread in Magway Region and Chin and Rakhine states with likelihood of isolated heavyfalls and fairly widespread to widespread in Nay Pyi Taw, Sagaing, Mandalay, Bago, Yangon and Ayeyawady regions with heavy rainfalls and strong wind from tonight to 15-9-2024. Squalls with rough seas are likely at times in Deltaic, off and along Rakhine Coasts. Surface wind speed in squalls may reach 35-40 miles per hour. Wave height will be about 8-10 feet in Deltaic, off and along Rakhine Coasts.

Advisory

Under the influence of deep depression, people should be aware of heavy rain with strong wind, flash flood and landslide in the hilly areas and near small rivers and also domestic flight, trawlers, vessels and ships in Deltaic, off and along Rakhine Coasts.

Flood condition of Dokhtawady River

According to the 17:30 hours MST observation today, the water level of Dokhtawady River at Myitnge has exceeded by more than 3.5 feet (111 centimetres) above its danger level 28.54 feet (870 centimetres). It may fall from the present water level by about 0.5 foot during the next one day and may remain above its danger level.

Flood conditions of Sittoung River

According to the 17:30 hours MST observation today, the water level of Sittoung River at Toungoo has exceeded by about 6.5 feet (196 centimetres) above its

danger level 19.69 feet (600 centimetres). It may fall from the present water level by about 1.5 feet during the next one day and may remain above its danger level.

According to the 17:30 hours MST observation today, the water level of Sittoung River at Madauk has exceeded by about 2.5 feet (76 centimetres) above its danger level 35.10 feet (1,070 centimetres). It may continue to rise from the present water level by about 0.5 foot during the next one day and may remain above its danger level.

Flood condition of Bago River

According to the 17:30 hours MST observation today, the water level of Bago River at Bago has exceeded by more than 0.5 foot (22 centimetres) above its danger level 28.87 feet (880 centimetres). It may fall from the present water level by about 0.5 foot during the next one day and may remain above its danger level.

Flood condition of Thanlwin River

According to the 17:30 hours MST observation today, the water level of Thanlwin River at Hpa-an has exceeded by more than seven feet (218 centimetres) above its danger level 24.61 feet (750 centimetres). It may continue to rise from the present water level by about 0.5 foot during the next one day and may remain above its danger level.

It is especially advised to the people who settle near the river banks and low-lying areas in Toungoo, Bago, Hpa-an, Myitnge and Madauk townships, to take precaution measures. — DMH

Residents Urged to Prioritize Public Safety Amid Armed Terrorist Threats

ARMED terrorists have been launching attacks by using residential homes and administrative buildings in towns and villages as cover, where they have forcibly settled. They aim to shield themselves from Tatmadaw counterattacks while also persuading temporarily displaced persons to return to their native areas and recruiting new members. That enables terrorists to use civilians as human shields. Tatmadaw is committed to safeguarding the sovereignty of the State and will respond to these threats based on intelligence and prevailing conditions. Therefore, residents in areas where terrorists have taken control must prioritize their safety and protect themselves from being exploited by these groups.

He highlighted that each relief camp systematically keeps the management fund and five basic foodstuffs provided by Nay Pyi Taw Council to supply food to people from the camps daily.

He continued that as some villages are facing one-two feet deep flood, it is necessary to distribute drinking water as well as life straws, bleaching powder and water-purified tablets to residents.

The Vice-Senior General underscored that officials from hospitals, station hospitals, rural dispensaries and nurses from villages have to inform nearby treatment centres about the health conditions of people not to cause diarrhoea and mosquito- and fly-borne diseases and general infectious diseases.

He explained that healthcare teams should be formed to despatch them to the villages which still face difficulties, and meeting discussions must be disseminated to remaining regions and states and attended to the needs.

Nay Pyi Taw Council Chairman U Than Tun Oo and officials reported on flash floods in Tatkon, Pobbathiri, Zeyathiri, Pyinmana and Lewe townships starting from the morning of 11 September, overflow of Hsinthay Creek, conducting rescue and relief measures in difficulties in flooded water affected by Nawin, Mone and Kintha creeks, clearing of debris starting from 12 September, 42 deaths in incidents, floating of 33 houses, start of cleaning 3,819 flooded buildings, the progress of rescue, relief and rehabilitation, the opening of 82 relief camps to accommodate some 25,000 people.

The meeting was also attended by Union Ministers Lt-Gen Yar Pyae, U Myo Thant, Dr Thet Khaing Win, Dr Soe Win, and U Min Naung and officials.

After the meeting, the Vice-Senior General inspected the 190-foot-long and 28-foot-wide Nawin Creek Bridge, damaged by erosion on the Yangon-Mandalay highway and the construction of a Bailey bridge by officials and staff of the Department of Bridges.

The 100-foot-long and 24-foot-wide Bailey with a 24-foot-wide motorway can withstand 40 tonnes of load. Its construc-

tion started on 11 September, and it can be used on 16 September.

The Vice-Senior General also inspected damage caused by flooding in residential wards and villages in the Nay Pyi Taw Council Area.

In the meeting with some 600 flood victims from Hsinthay, Pawsankhaw, Peinnabin, Zeebyupin and Hnandaw villages of Pyinmana Township at the Basic Education High School in Natthaye Village, the Vice-Senior General explained arrangements for food and accommodation, and rehabilitation and provided cash assistance and foodstuffs.

He also met some 500 flood-stricken people from flood-ravaged villages at Chanmyae Yeiktha Monastery in Tatkon Township and explained plans to provide aid for rehabilitation.

Union ministers who accompanied the Vice-Senior General discussed that as flooded water ebbed, basic foodstuffs and, purified drinking water and healthcare services must be provided for those who return to their native areas, adding people should not be fearful for misinformation about dams. They also presented cash assistance and food to the victims.

The Vice-Senior General also conversed with more than 1,000 flood victims at Tatkon BEHS No 1 and inspected the opening of a temporary clinic and stockpiling foodstuffs, clothes and relief supplies.

At flood-hit Tatkon Township Hospital (100-bed), the Vice-Senior General inspected repair works and comforted the patients.

DPM MoTC Union Minister inspects damage and repair progress on railways, bridges

DEPUTY Prime Minister Union Minister for Transport and Communications General Mya Tun Oo led an inspection of railways and bridges in Mandalay Region yesterday, damaged by recent heavy rainfalls. Officials from the ministry and Myanma Railways accompanied him.

During the morning inspec-

tion, General Mya Tun Oo arrived at Yamethin Station, where he boarded a railway inspection vehicle to examine damage caused by flooding along the Yangon-Mandalay railway. Specifically, between mileposts 271/16-17, both tracks of the Up and Down lines were found to have suffered erosion, with

around 30 feet of embankment washed away.

The inspection continued between Yamethin and Ingyinkan stations, where additional erosion damage was observed near milepost 277/1-3. Additionally, the inspection team checked bridge No 515, which had been severely impacted on its Mandalay side due to the erosion of its abutments near milepost 277/7-8.

Later in the day, the Deputy Prime Minister visited the site of bridge No 529, located between Shwedah and Pyawbwe stations. The bridge, a 100-foot Bailey structure, had partially collapsed due to the force of floodwaters.

At Pyawbwe station, he met officials from Myanma Railways, including those from head office and regional divisions. They discussed the widespread damage caused by the recent storm that swept through the eastern parts of Myanmar, bringing torrential rainfall that severely affected railways across Bago Region, Nay Pyi Taw Council Area and Mandalay Region. The lines most impacted included the Yangon-Mandalay railway and the southern Shan State route from Thazi to Shwenyaung-Taunggyi. Due to the damage, rail services had been temporarily suspended, disrupting passenger and freight transport.

To expedite the restoration of railway operations, the Union minister directed staff to allocate resources efficiently, including workforce, materials, and logistical support, across the affected regions. He emphasized the need for systematic supervision to ensure rapid repairs, especially on critical sections of the railway. He also highlighted the importance of setting appropriate speed limits once the repairs are completed, managing outdated tracks and sleepers, and ensuring the cleanliness and maintenance of station areas.

In the afternoon, General Mya Tun Oo inspected further erosion destruction along the Up and Down lines between Pyawbwe and Shanywa stations. He noted areas where rail ballast had been washed away and directed officials to increase the use of machinery to ensure faster, more effective repairs. He also urged adherence to safety standards throughout the repair

Repair and restoration work is ongoing, and authorities are taking all necessary measures to beef up repair work with use of heavy machinery. — MNA/KZL

MoALI Union Minister makes inspection tour of Nay Pyi Taw Council Area

UNION Minister for Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation U Min Naung, accompanied by Deputy Minister U Bo Bo Kyaw, inspected the work processes of the Irrigation and Water Utilization Management Department regarding water inflow of dams and drainage system in vicinity areas of Nay Pyi Taw Council Area on 13 September.

First, the Union minister and party observed the Kintha Dam near Kyaukse village of Tatkon, and officials reported on the water storage; vast amounts of water flow into the dam during continuous rainfall, damage and other matters.

Then, the Union minister instructed officials to work with relevant departmental organizations to provide the

needed assistance for people in flood-affected areas and to conduct maintenance works.

Although the Kintha Dam was affected by the flood, only 230 feet out of the whole dam was destroyed. Some of the farmlands under the dam were damaged, and assistance will be provided for farmers to use fertilizer fully in the remaining farmlands to meet the target

The Vice-Senior General inspected the construction of a bailey bridge and approach roads on both sides by the Directorate of Military Engineers of the Office of the Commander-in-Chief (Army) for Nawin Creek Bridge (Thayaaye) destroyed by erosion and left instructions on the long-term existence of the Bailey Bridge with resilience of natural disaster. The Bailey Bridge is scheduled to be finished in the last week of September.

He also viewed round the 360 feet long and 55 feet wide Thaikchaung Bridge, crossing Hsinthay Creek on the Pobbathiri circular road linking Zeyathiri and Pobbathiri townships. The bridge was eroded by flooding in Hsinthay Creek.

Roads and bridges damaged by flash flooding are repaired in Nay Pyi Taw

Council Area. At present, the inter-district road between Tatkon and Pyinmana townships is used to transport relief supplies and other goods so they are not delayed.

Torrential rains, which flew into the Hsinthay and Ngalaik creeks and Paung laung River, caused casualties to five of eight townships in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area. Hence, 82 relief camps are open in relevant towns and villages with efforts of Tatmadaw members, Myanmar Police Force members, firefighters, departmental personnel and charity organizations for rescue, relief and rehabilitation measures.

Currently, the water level in the Sittoung River is in danger, but people along the river have prepared to overcome the challenges of loss and damage caused by flooding. — MNA/TTA

Donations given to flood victims; Relief and clean-up efforts ongoing

IN Nay Pyi Taw Council Area and various states and regions, water levels in creeks and rivers have risen due to continuous heavy rainfall, resulting in widespread flooding in wards and villages. Roads, bridges, electricity distribution posts, and buildings have collapsed or been damaged.

Authorities and rescue teams have been assisting flood victims by evacuating residents from affected wards and villages. On 14 September, Tatmadaw members, police, firefighters, departmental officials, and charity and civil society associations conducted evacuation and relief measures, and delivered food and supplies to people in Lewe, Pyinmana, Zeyathiri, and Pobbathiri townships in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area. Additionally, personnel have cleared silt, broken tree branches, and debris from roads and bridges in the affected areas.

As repairs to damaged roads and bridges continue, the Thaikchaung and Nawinchaung bridges in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area were replaced with iron frame Bailey bridges on 14 September. Furthermore, the bridge over Sinthay Creek, which connects Zeyathiri Township and

Pobbathiri Township, has been replaced with a temporary Bailey ridge, with construction completed on the afternoon of 14 September.

Temporary relief camps have been established in Nay Pyi Taw Union Territory and various states and regions, providing necessary healthcare services, food, and drinking water. Families of the Defence Services (Army, Navy, and Air), departmental personnel, and donors are contributing rice boxes, drinking water, and other foodstuffs.

Regional and state chief ministers, Lt-Gen Phone Myat

from the Office of the Commander-in-Chief (Army), commanders of relevant commands, and departmental officials have visited the affected areas to offer words of encouragement to flood victims.

Flooding has affected 462 villages and wards in 64 townships in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area, Bago, Mandalay, and Ayeyawady regions, as well as Mon, Kayin, and Shan (South and East) states. As of the evening of 13 September, the floods have resulted in 74 deaths and 89 people missing. Search and rescue operations are ongoing and led by authorities and search and rescue workers. In the flood-stricken areas, a total of 32,645 feet in length of roads, 24 bridges, 375 schools, one monastery, five dams, four pagodas, 14 transformers, 456 lamp-posts, and 65,759 houses have been destroyed. — MNA/

Over 187 relief camps operated in 7 states/regions as of 13 September

DUE to the severe flood that occurred in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area, Mandalay and Bago regions, Kayah, Kayin, Mon, and Shan states, more than 187 temporary relief camps were opened. A total of 59,413 households with 236,649 individuals from 37 townships were accommodated at 187 relief camps as of 13 September.

In addition, aid worth K12 million has been donated to the flood victims as of 12 September, according to Director Daw Lay Shwe Zin Oo of the Department of Disaster Management.

"We are supporting and aiding the required materials such as boats, life jackets, rescue materials and foodstuffs to the victims in Nay Pyi Taw where the flood hit the worst. We are also planning to assist in the places where houses and property lost and were damaged due to the flood, although the water level decreased," Daw Lay Shwe Zin Oo said.

Moreover, departments under the Ministry of Health, regional administrative bodies, relevant departments and the public will be collaborating to carry out

removing dirty water from the lakes and ponds, chlorination, and anti-dengue processes to prevent the potential outbreak of diarrhoea and dengue fever after the water level decreases. In addition, authorities are carrying out for supplying enough medicines and pharmaceuticals, 24/7 healthcare services, personal hygien-

ic matters, access to purified drinking water, water purification process, access to fresh and healthy foods, systematic garbage system, awareness raising for preventing infectious diseases and health knowledge at the relief camps, and to transfer the patients to the hospital in time.

Due to Typhoon Yagi, the water level increased in Ngalaik Creek, Hsinthay Creek, and Paunglaung Creek; flood swept; landslide; and power towers, buildings, roads and bridges collapsed in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area. Schools have been temporarily closed due to the severe flood. — ASH/TMT

False alert: Ngamoeyeik Dam water release

CURRENTLY, misinformation is spreading online that the Ngamoeye-ik Dam will release water, potentially inundating Yangon.

The Department of Meteorology and Hydrology (DMH) has not announced that Yangon will be affected by flooding. Conditions at the Ngamoeyeik Dam are stable, and there is no immediate risk of flooding in Yangon.

The water levels of the Hlaing and Bago rivers, as well as the Ngamoeyeik Creek, are normal and not at critical levels. The rain has also stopped, so Yangon is not at risk of flooding," said a person who regularly follows weather news.

The water level of the Ngamoeyeik Dam increased by two feet at 9 pm on 13 September, and the Mahuya Dam increased by 0.8 foot. These changes are within the normal range for these dams.

"If anyone wants to inquire about the situation, we invite them to the dam, and we will provide an explanation," said an official from the Ngamoeyeik Dam.

The Sittoung, Thanlwin, and Ayeyawady rivers, which are currently overflowing, are far from Yangon.

"We need to consider the sources

of water that could affect Yangon. To the west, there is the Hlaing River, and the Ngamoeyeik Creek is in the centre

The water levels are not at critical points. Water from the Bago Creek and Sittoung Canal will flow into the Bago River.

Low-lying areas in Thanlyin and Dagon Myothit (Seikkan) townships may experience flooding. If the rain does not intensify, the tidal water is not expected to rise significantly between 17 and 21 September.

The depression is expected to move into India and away from Myanmar, so there should be minimal rainfall until 23 September. Considering these factors, we can forecast whether Yangon will be flooded or not," said U Win Naing, a meteorologist. — Htun Htun/TKO



MAI to offer free cargo service for emergency supplies to flood-hit areas

MYANMAR Airways International (MAI) will provide free cargo service to deliver relief supplies and aid to areas affected by the flood, according to the airlines.

This service aims to ensure the smooth transport of relief supplies, food-stuffs, and medicine to flood-stricken are-as such as Tachilek, Kengtung, and Heho in Shan State, as well as Mandalay and the Nay Pyi Taw Council Area.

Volunteers and well-wishers who wish to use MAI's free cargo service to deliver emergency supplies can contact MAI's Cargo Operations Team. MAI will provide the service in accordance with regulations, approvals, or recommendations from relevant officials and will check available space to accommodate the aid items. — ASH/TKO

Yangon Tourism Committee approves 4 hotel licences, 1 guesthouse permit

YANGON Region Tourism Committee granted licences for four hotels and one guesthouse permit at its third meeting held at the meeting hall of the Yangon Region government office on 14 August.

The hotel businesses will bring in capital of over K7 billion. Additionally, the committee endorsed 19 tour licences (inbound/ outbound) and 13 outbound tour agency licences. Those businesses are to create 312 jobs for locals

After the endorsement of the projects, Yangon Region Chief Minister U Soe Thein, chair of the committee, addressed tourism development activities at the meeting. — San Kyaw Oo (IPRD)/KK

CBM sells US\$230,000, 1.5M yuan, over 956,000 Thai baht on 13 Sept

THE Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) injected US\$230,000, over 1.5 million yuan and over 956,000 Thai baht into the financial market on 13 September.

The CBM announced on 12 September that it would pump \$10 million into the fuel oil sector and \$7 million into the edible oil sector through the foreign exchange trading platform.

Following CBM's notification dated 14 August about contribution of \$100 million towards the fuel oil sector, it sold over \$9.498 million at exchange rate of K3,400 on 15 August, over \$89.975 million at exchange rate of K3,410 on 19 August, \$31 million at exchange rate of K3,440 on 22 August, over \$35 million

at exchange rate of K3,460 on 26 August and \$16.9 million at exchange rate of K3,472 on 28 August respectively.

CBM announced on 9 August that it would sell \$6 million, five million yuan, and 10 million baht in edible oil, fuel oil, and pharmaceutical sectors through online foreign exchange trading platforms in the coming weeks.

CBM sold \$5 million and five million yuan for fuel oil, edible oil and pharmaceutical sectors on 2 August, after selling 69 million baht and nine million yuan for those importing edible oil, fertilizer, pharmaceuticals and medical devices on 1 August.

Therefore, CBM injected over \$190 million, 19 million yuan and 79 million baht in August.

This move is to curb the instability in the foreign exchange market and the currency devaluation. According to CBM's notification on 15 March, it has been joining hands with law enforcement agencies to combat and prosecute those who attempt to manipulate the currency market under the existing laws. CBM allowed authorized dealers (private banks) to operate online foreign exchange trading freely as per the market rate depending on supply and demand, starting from 5 December 2023. - NN/KK

Actively protect the Ozone layer for the safety of society

HE ozone layer is located in the Earth's stratosphere, starting at an altitude of 15-50 kilometres and spanning a thickness of about 56 kilometres. It absorbs harmful ultraviolet-B and C rays from the sun, protecting animals on Earth and reducing the risk of skin cancer, cataracts, and other health problems in humans. Additionally, the ozone layer helps safeguard ecosystems, regulates climate, and minimizes damage to plastic, wood, and rubber products.

Man-made chemicals such as Chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs), Hydrochlorofluorocarbons (HCFCs), and Bromochloromethane (BrCH, Cl) can damage the ozone layer. These substances are re-

Myanmar has established a national ozone unit to work actively on ozone layer conservation. As a member of the Montreal Protocol, Myanmar cooperates with other countries to protect the ozone layer and mitigate climate change. While the country has relatively low production of ozone-depleting substances, it fully complies with the commitments of the Montreal Protocol.

The 28th meeting of the Montreal Protocol members adopted the Kigali Amendment to reduce the production and use of hydrofluorocarbons (HFCs) to control substances harmful to the ozone layer. Through the Kigali Amendment, climate action is being accelerated, with countries

committing to phase down HFCs – powerful climate-warming gases that replaced ozone-depleting substances. If fully ratified and implemented, this Amendment could prevent up to 0.5°C of warming by 2100.

The Montreal Protocol is rightly hailed as a success story of multilateralism. It united the world to phase out ozone-depleting substances, setting the ozone layer on a path to recovery and protecting all life on Earth. On this World Ozone Day, countries celebrate climate action in line with the 2024 theme, "Montreal Protocol: Advancing Climate Actions."

WE are all used to hearing some people say, "Sit Hso Yin Yay Daung Sit Ma Thauk Chin Boo," which for a working translation into English will be, "Not willing to hear the word war; we even hate to drink water going through a sieve (which in Myanmar means sit – i.e.") Such an utterance is mainly made by the older generation who had gone through the periods of war throughout successive eras under the British colonialists, the Japanese fascists and the Revolutionary Council. Their bitter experiences have made them unable to bear to hear the word 'war'.

Some people shout the word 'peace' at the top of their voices;

however, they do not really know the value of peace. Matter-of-factly, how can those who have never undergone a period of war know the value of peace? The woes and sorrows caused by the wars are of astronomical figure. People can learn a host of lessons from the wars. Nevertheless, peace can sometimes be achieved only by launching wars. That is the reason why waging a war is sometimes called making the peace. If one party can defeat the other by war, peace will prevail.

There are 12 episodes in this book. Maps for illustration purposes accompany the writings. During World War the Second, Myanmar was the soil on which

the Japanese fascist troops suffered dramatically. For the British, they have had to wage the longest war in Burma. The original English version of the book is the most comprehensive one about the Second World War in Myanmar. What also appeals to the writer of the book review is Saya Mya Than Tint, who is one of the best translators in our country, translated this book under review. Saya Mya Than Tint is famous not only for his excellent translation but also for his painstaking effort in translating the thickest books like War and

This book was translated part by part and published in a long series in the excellent magazine Pav Phoo Hlwar. Louis Allen writes Burma, the Longest War, 1941-45. This book is a very detailed account of the War in Burma, not a campaign but the entire war that lasted from December 1941 to the end of the war. Everything worthy of note is contained in the book, including a number of personal accounts that make the conflict and suffering much alive to the readers.

Louis Allen was a brilliant lecturer who, over the years, at conferences, seminars and other academic gatherings, delivered papers which were informative, provocative, often entertaining, and always revealed enormous knowledge of and infectious enthusiasm for the topic under consideration.

His last performance, the paper on Burma: the Longest War, which he presented from his wheelchair at the Imperial War Museum on 5 December 1991, was vintage Louis, and those who were there will long remember it. It was a moving account that combined the knowledge that comes from direct experience and that which comes from books. This book really deserves a place on the bookshelf of the readers.

satisfaction to the Myanmar





Trains suspend as flood becomes barriers

S Korea's money supply grows for 14th month in July

The expansion is due to strong demand for short-term financial instruments, including time deposits and profit-making securities.

SOUTH Korea's money supply grew for the 14th consecutive month due to solid demand for deposits and securities, central bank data showed Friday.

The seasonally-adjusted M2, or broad money, gained 0.4 per cent to 4,053.9 trillion won (US\$3.05 trillion) in July compared to the previous month, continuing to rise since June 2023, according to the Bank of Korea (BOK).

The continued expansion

was attributed to strong demand for short-term financial instruments such as time deposits and profit-making securities.

The M1, or narrow money, reduced 0.3 per cent in July on a monthly basis, keeping a downward trend for the fourth straight month.

Expectations ran high for the BOK to lower its policy rate by the end of 2024 amid an expected rate cut in the United States. The M1 refers to currency in circulation, demand deposits and transferable savings deposits equivalent to cash. The M2 adds money market funds, time deposits and financial products that mature in less than two years. The liquidity of financial institutions, called Lf, increased 0.2 per cent in the cited month, while the liquidity aggregate, the broadest measure of money supply, stood unchanged. — Xinhua

Deadly floods bring relief to Moroccan farmers

WHEN powerful thunderstorms hit Morocco's arid south, they brought deadly floods but also provided some relief to farmers as the country grapples with its worst drought in nearly 40 years.

The torrential rains at the weekend triggered floods that killed at least 18 people in areas of southern Morocco that straddle the Sahara desert.

While the rain was devas-

tating in part, it also brought some relief to farmers growing crops like almonds, dates and cereals.

"These rains will bring a breath of fresh air" to the south, said agronomist Mohamed Taher Srairi.

"But it has not rained elsewhere, and the country remains under a heavy structural drought."

Recent powerful thunder-

storms in southern Morocco, which experienced some of the worst droughts in nearly 40 years, have had a dual impact.

Over the weekend, torrential rains caused deadly floods, claiming at least 18 lives and significantly affecting the Sahara desert region. Despite the devastation, the rainfall offered partial relief to farmers growing crops like almonds, dates, and cereals. — AFP

Witnessing 'Staggering' economic devastation across Gaza, West Bank

ISRAEL'S war against Hamas has decimated Gaza's economy, shrinking it to less than one-sixth of its 2022 level, amid an "alarming decline" in the West Bank, the UN said Thursday.

Since the war erupted in the Gaza Strip more than 11 months ago, the United Nations said economic devastation has taken place at a "staggering scale".

The war erupted after Hamas's 7 October attack inside Israel, which resulted in the deaths of 1,205 people, mostly civilians, according to an AFP tally based on official Israeli figures, which includes hostages killed in captivity.

Israel's retaliatory military offensive has killed at least 41,020 people in Gaza, according to the Hamas-run territory's health ministry. The UN rights office says most of the dead are women and children. – AFP

Egypt calls for reforming global financial system

Sisi highlighted the necessity of international cooperation to ensure universal access to water.

EGYPTIAN President Abdel-Fattah al-Sisi on Thursday called for reforming the structure of the global financial system and boosting the engagement of developing countries in economic decision-making mechanisms.

He made the appeal in a virtual speech at the UN event "Global Call on the Summit of the Future".

The event convenes amid growing international crises, both politically and economically, he said, underscoring the grave escalation in the Middle East in particular.

Sisi deemed it a priority to

strengthen the role of the United Nations in international economic governance, which will significantly contribute to facilitating the Global South's access to essential funding.

He called for enhancing efforts to eradicate poverty and hunger globally while addressing the challenges of food security.

"International cooperation to secure universal access to water and to uphold international law in the management of cross-border rivers is necessary to ensure harmony among the concerned countries and prevent any harm to any country," said Sisi. — Xinhua

China's tyre factory begins mass production in Serbia

The factory initially creates over 1,200 jobs, with a projected increase to 1,835 jobs in the second phase.

MASS production officially began at Linglong's new tyre factory in Zrenjanin, Serbia, on Friday, marking China's first tyre manufacturing facility in Europe.

The 990-million-US-dollar investment represents a significant milestone for both Linglong Tyre and Serbia, positioning the factory as one of the most advanced tire production sites globally, according to a statement from Linglong Tyre.

Serbian President Aleksandar Vucic, who attended the launch alongside Chinese Ambassador to Serbia Li Ming and Linglong Tyre Co, Ltd Chairman Wang Feng, underlined the economic importance of the project.

Serbian President Vucic hailed a new factory as Serbia's largest greenfield investment, creating over 1,200 jobs initially with a projected increase to 1,835 in its second phase. The factory, a product of the Belt and Road Initiative and partnership with China, will boost Zrenjanin's economy and infrastructure. The facility will produce 13.62 million high-performance tyres annually using advanced technologies. Ambassador Li noted the growing Chinese investment in Serbia due to favourable conditions. — Xinhua

Italy court orders toxic steelworks retrial

AN Italian appeals court Friday scrapped the convictions of the former owners of one of Europe's largest steelworks for failing to curb toxic emissions, ordering a retrial, lawyers told AFP.

Brothers Fabio and Nicola Riva were sentenced to 20 and 22 years, respectively, in 2021 by a court in the southern city of Taranto after years of the plant's non-compliance with environmental controls. But the Rivas' legal team appealed, arguing there was a conflict of interest in trying the case in Taranto, where judges may feel directly

affected by the vast plant, which runs along one side of the coastal city. The objection was accepted by an appeals court, which ordered a retrial in Potenza, a city in another region in southern Italy, lawyer Pasquale Annicchiarico told AFP. Charges against the Rivas included conspiracy to commit environmental disaster and wilful failure to take precautions in the workplace.

Twenty-six people were convicted in the original trial, including Nichi Vendola, the former president of Italy's Puglia region where the plant is located. — AFP

Boeing workers strike after rejecting contract

THOUSANDS of Boeing factory workers in the United States walked off the job Friday after voting overwhelmingly to reject a contract with the embattled aviation giant, its first strike in 16 years. Union leaders called for the strike to start just after midnight on Friday (0700 GMT), hours after hourly workers in the Seattle region in the Pacific Northwest spurned the tentative contract with a vote of 94.6 per cent and to strike with 96 per cent.

A strike will shutter two major plane assem-

BRICS Media Summit opens in Moscow

14 SEPTEMBER

THE BRICS Media Summit is being held in Moscow from 13 to 17 September, with participation from leaders and top specialists from over 60 media outlets across 45 countries. The main venue for the forum is the World Trade Centre.

The Media Summit is being conducted for the first time as a new format of the BRICS Media Forum—an independent, nonprofit platform for dialogue among leading media from the member states.

The Media Forum was established in 2015 at the initiative of Chinese state news agency Xinhua and has since been held in the BRICS chair country.

The upcoming BRICS summit will be a global sensation, said Russian Foreign Ministry spokeswoman Maria Zakharova at the opening of the seven BRICS Media Summit. – SPUTNIK

North Korea reveals uranium facility

NORTH Korea released images of its uranium enrichment facility for the first time on Friday, showing leader Kim Jong Un touring it as he called for more centrifuges to boost his nuclear arsenal.

The country, which conducted its first nuclear test in 2006 and is under rafts of UN sanctions for its banned weapons programmes, has never publicly disclosed details of its uranium enrichment facility.

North Korean leader Kim Jong-un recently visited a facility producing highly enriched uranium, crucial for nuclear warheads.

He emphasized expanding centrifuge numbers and introducing advanced models to boost nuclear weapon production. Despite UN sanctions, North Korea continues its nuclear programme. — AFP

12 SEPTEMBER

Peruvians mourn polarizing ex-president Fujimori

PERUVIANS began three days of national mourning Thursday for polarizing former president Alberto Fujimori, who ruled his country with an iron fist and then spent 16 years in prison for crimes against humanity.

Fujimori, who died on Wednesday aged 86 after a long battle with cancer, lay in state at the national museum where hundreds of supporters lined up to pay their respects at his open casket.

Alberto Fujimori, Peru's president from 1990 to 2000, was admired for stabilizing the economy and defeating leftist guerrillas but criticized for human rights abuses and authoritarianism. Supporters hailed him as the best president Peru ever had, while others condemned his brutal tactics. Fujimori was released from prison on humanitarian grounds before his recent death. A state funeral is planned for Saturday. — AFP

11 SEPTEMBER

Chesterfield unveils 9/11 memorial tribute

A new 9/11 memorial was unveiled in Chesterfield, New Jersey, on 11 September to honour the victims and heroes of the 9/11 terror attacks.

This is an initiative of Sewa International's South Jersey Chapter in partnership with Chesterfield Township, according to a press release by Sewa International.

The solemn ceremony, was attended by over 350 people, including local officials, state senators, assembly members, and first responders.

During the event, three key monuments symbolising the Twin Towers, the Pentagon, and Flight 93 were unveiled.

State Senator Latham Tiver and Assemblywoman Andrea Katz stressed daily values of care and kindness, while Mayor Matthew Litt praised the memorial for fostering reflection and unity. Sandesh Kamath from Sewa highlighted the memorial's symbolism of unity and collective effort. Sridhar Talanki from Sewa International USA emphasized that collective action can help build a future where everyone can thrive. — ANI

Royal family embraces modern communication

A slick video by Catherine, Princess of Wales announcing that her chemotherapy has finished marks a dramatic shift in communications for the British royal family, media and commentators said Tuesday.

Kate, as she is widely known, posted the three-minute footage on social media on Tuesday, some six months after she dramatically revealed in another video that she was being treated for the condition.

But the intimate portrait of the 42-year-old princess, her husband Prince William and their young children was notable for its departure from the stiff formality of traditional royal public relations.

PR consultant Mark Borkowski describes the royal family's new approach as a significant shift in image control.

Gonzalez Urrutia flees to Spain

EDMUNDO Gonzalez Urrutia — who insists he, not Venezuelan strongman Nicolas Maduro, is the legitimate elected leader — said Monday he fled to Spain "so that things can change" and appealed for "dialogue".

Gonzalez Urrutia arrived in Madrid late Sunday after weeks in hiding. The opposition says it can prove he won the 28 July elections in which Maduro — in power in the oil-rich but cash-poor country since 2013 — claimed a widely disputed victory.

Gonzalez Urrutia, 75, left Venezuela to foster change and dialogue, seeking to reunite the nation.

He hopes his gesture will be reciprocated and continues to fight for freedom and democracy. Spain granted him asylum, citing safety concerns amidst repression. - AFP

8 SEPTEMBER

Bangladesh lifts cash withdrawal limit

THE central bank of Bangladesh has lifted a limit on cash withdrawals from banks from Sunday.

Bangladesh Bank spokesperson Md Mezbaul Haque made the announcement on Saturday, saying the restriction on cash withdrawals will no longer be in effect as of Sunday.

Bank account holders can now withdraw unlimited amounts after weeks of restrictions due to the political turmoil following Sheikh Hasina's resignation on 5 August

Initially capped at 100,000 taka, the limit was gradually increased to 500,000 taka before being lifted entirely. The central bank has removed the daily withdrawal cap to stabilize the situation. - Xinhua

Meanwhile, at the Thuwunna Youth Training Cen-





UK to restrict junk food ads in childhood obesity fight

The policy has faced criticism from the political right as "nanny state" interference. Over one-third of children are obese by age 11.

HE UK will ban junk food advertising on the internet and daytime TV in a bid to tackle childhood obesity, sparking criticism on the political right over "nanny state" meddling.

The measure was included in the Labour manifesto that won Keir Starmer's Labour a resounding victory in July, and is due to be introduced on 1 October 2025, the government said Thursday.

The announcement came after Starmer promised wide-ranging reforms to the crisis-hit National Health Service (NHS), in particular by placing a greater emphasis on prevention.

Junior health minister Andrew Gwynne said in a written statement to parliament that more than one in five children in England are "overweight or living with obesity by the time they start primary school" at age four or five.

By the time they leave at aged 11, the figure is more than one third, he added.

The UK government is introducing restrictions on advertising unhealthy foods to protect children, banning such ads before 9 pm on TV and entirely online

Supported by Boris Johnson's Conservative Party but criticized by some as an infringement on personal freedom, the measure aims to counteract unhealthy dietary influences.

Other proposed measures include banning energy drinks for under-16s and expanding sugar taxes. — AFP
