Wuhan virus: Surveillance, awareness campaigns beefed up in border towns

ON ACCOUNT of the number of coronavirus cases and related deaths rising in neighboring China, the health authorities in border towns have beefed up surveillance at the border gate with China with the help of thermal scan equipment.

Health staff from the Muse Township Health Department are conducting surveillance by scanning travelers entering Myanmar from China from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. everyday.

According to reports from China, 11 people in Yunnan Province, which neighbors Myanmar, have reported coronavirus infections. However, there has been no incidence of infections in neighboring towns in Myanmar so far. Following the outbreak of infections in Yunnan Province, the number of travelers from Myanmar to China through the border gates has dropped significantly. Meanwhile, with higher demand for masks in Muse and other border towns to prevent the virus, the towns are facing a shortage of masks.

Public Health Capacity workshop held in Yangon

THE University of Public Health in Yangon hosted a workshop under the project of Strengthening Public Health Capacity to Respond to Myanmar's Disease Transition and the dissemination of the final project yesterday.

The programme was jointly supported by the European Union and the HelpAge International Myanmar. In his opening remark, Union Minister for Health and Sports Dr Myint Htwe highlighted capacity building of public health personnel in prevention of communicable and noncommunicable diseases and the exchange programme between Myanmar teachers from medical universities and their counterparts from the Thammasat University of Thailand for sharing knowledge in promoting teaching capacities.

The Union Minister also explained the project that covered designing long strategies for development of the University of Public Health, national-level strategy for prevention of non-communicable diseases, chronic lung diseases, 10 points of policy suggestions, dispatching 100 teachers of universities under the ministry, upgrading curricula and exchange programmes among the universities to promote public health sector.

Union Minister Dr Myint Htwe expressed thanks for the assistance of the European Union and the HelpAge International for the project.

Mr Kristian Schmidt, the Ambassador of European Union, delivered an opening remark on the workshop and Mr Eduardo Kliem, the Regional Director

from the Asia Pacific Regional Office of HelpAge International, shared experiences on implementation of the project.

Real estate sees most investment after power; attracts FDI of over \$440 mln

THE real estate sector recorded the second highest share of foreign fund inflows at US\$440 million in the October-December period of the current financial year. Power received the highest quantum of investment than any other sector in the first three months of the 2019-2020 FY.

During the October-December period, FDI of \$1.164 billion, including expansion of capital, flowed into the country. The Myanmar Investment Commission (MIC) and the investment committees of states and regions allowed 72 enterprises to invest in the country. The manufacturing sector absorbed FDI of \$158.89 million from 59 projects in the current fiscal. The livestock and fisheries sector attracted two foreign investment projects worth \$6.58 million. One project, worth \$0.4 million, was approved in the transport and communications sector. The hotels and tourism sector pulled in investment of \$0.8 million from one foreign enterprise. The real estate sector also raked in \$440 million from three foreign projects. Over \$18.87 million in FDI was pumped into the other services sector.

So far, domestic investments from 88 enterprises in the real estate sector have reached K4,669 billion, according to the DICA.

More than 23 per cent of domestic investments made by Myanmar citizens have flowed into the real estate sector, while investments have also been made in the manufacturing, hotels and

tourism, construction, industrial estate, energy, mining, livestock and fisheries, agriculture, and other services sectors, according to the DICA.

Realtors are expecting a reduction in income tax to stimulate the realty market, which has been cool for the last three years. They are also anticipating the approval of a real estate service law, which would regulate informal deals and prevent buyers and sellers from being defrauded by unscrupulous realtors, according to real estate officials.

At present, buyers and sellers are forced to avoid paying taxes owing to high appraisal and tax rates. Most dealers are informally conducting real estate deals using only the special and general power of attorney, said realtors. The reduction in taxes is likely to persuade traders who evaded taxes in previous years to pay taxes and make changes in ownership, they added.

For the 2019-2020 fiscal year, the standard land price per square foot in Yangon's townships has been reduced by 10 per cent compared to the year-ago period, according to the Inland Revenue Department. These prices are used for tax evaluations in real estate sales.

As per the Condominium Law, when a condominium project developed by a citizen or a foreigner is completed, foreigners have the right to own up to 40 per cent of the units. —Ko Khant (Translated by Ei Myat Mon)

Traffic police in Muse distributed 500 masks to travelers yesterday in Muse, as part of efforts for raising awareness against coronavirus infections.

Local authorities in another border town, Manhero, are undertaking an awareness campaign against Coronavirus in Muse district of northern Shan State beginning 25 January.

Coronavirus can cause

and locals have been restricted access to parks, museums, and shops as the festivals were suspended yesterday.

Police seizes illegal drugs, firearms in three townships

AS part of counter narcotic drugs operations, police seized heroin, stimulant tablets, firearms, cars and mobile phones in Mayangone, Kengtung and Tachilek townships in last two days, according to Myanmar Police Force.

On 25 January, police raided the house of Aung Ye Kyaw (a

Phoe Khwar in Wah Wah Win Street, No.2 Ward in Mayangone Township, and confiscated 0.0012 kilograms of heroins, 1,340 kilograms of stimulant tablets and two mobile phones.

On 24 January, anti-narcotic police squad in Kengtung Township stopped and searched the car driven by Lawtar and Lizu on board, and seized K 8,400 million worth 336 kilograms of ICE, a M22 rifle, 75 bullets, three magazines, two mobile phones and a walkie-talkie.

On the same day, police from Tachilek also seized 360,000 stimulant tablets while they

searched a motorcycle and a Toyota Hilux Vigo stopped on the Thitkhauk Chan forest path on Maelakeparkaw-Lunseti road near Maelakeparkaw Village in Milekoe Village-tract in Tachilek Township. In addition, police seized 1,000 kilograms of caffeine estimated worth of K 460 million from another Toyota Hilux Vigo car stopped near the Thitkhauk Chan on Maelakeparkaw-Lunseti road on the same day.

Police filed charges against the suspects under the Anti-narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Law.—MNA

Sino-Myanmar border trade up \$573.6 mln in current fiscal

SINO-Myanmar border trade registered an increase of US\$573.668 million between 1 October and 17 January in the current financial year, according to the Ministry of Commerce.

Data from the ministry shows the value of Sino-Myanmar border trade rose to \$2 billion in the current fiscal from \$1.46 billion recorded in the year-ago period.

This FY, the value of border trade totaled \$1.67 billion at Muse, \$33.89 million at Lweje, \$188.4 million at Chinshwehaw, \$140.87 million at Kanpikete, and \$2.878 million at Kengtung.

In a bid to lower trade barriers and offer relief to Myanmar traders through the border trade channel, officials from the Ministry of Commerce, the related departments, and the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry have been negotiating with their Chinese counterparts.

The two countries are making efforts to set up more border economic cooperation zones and promote border trade.

During Chinese premier Xi Jinping's recent visit to Myanmar, Myanmar and China signed MoUs on Local Cooperation under the Framework for Joint Building of the China-Myanmar Economic Corridor (CMEC) between the Yunnan Province of China and the Mandalay Region of Myanmar, Protocol on Plant Inspection and Quarantine Requirements for Exporting Rice From Myanmar to China, Protocol for Heat Processed Cocoons to be imported from Myanmar to

China, Protocol on Quarantine Health Requirements for Slaughter Bovine to be Exported from Myanmar to China, Exchange Letter for the Project of Agricultural Product Quality Control Centre, Establishment of the Working Group for the Promotion of Smooth Trade between the Ministry of Commerce of Myanmar and the Ministry of Commerce of China, and many other agreements.

Following the MoUs between Myanmar and China, bilateral trade will grow, said a market observer.

Myanmar exports rice, sugar, pulses, sesame seeds, corn, dried tea leaves, fishery products, minerals, and animal products to China, while it imports agricultural machinery, electrical appliances, iron and steel-related materials, raw industrial goods, and consumer goods from the neighboring country. — Htet Myat

External trade rises to \$11.29 bln

MYANMAR'S external trade between 1 October and 17 January in the 2019-2020 financial year reached US\$11.29 billion, an increase of \$1.7 billion compared to the corresponding period of the 2018-2019 fiscal, according to the Ministry of Commerce.

During the same period in the previous FY, trade stood at \$9.57 billion, according to data released by the ministry. Both maritime and border trade showed an increase in the current fiscal, with exports estimated at over \$5.4 billion, and imports valued at \$5.85 billion. Myanmar exports agricultural products, animal products,

minerals, forest products, and finished industrial goods, while it imports capital goods, raw industrial materials, and consumer goods. The country's export sector relies more on the agricultural and manufacturing sectors. Export earnings from the CMP (cutting, making, and packaging) garment businesses are rising, while reliance on natural resources, such as natural gas and jade, is lessening. The government is trying to cut trade deficit by screening luxury import items and boosting exports, according to the Ministry of Commerce.—GNLM

Japan realtor Yamaman to open 1st overseas hotel in Yangon in Feb.

YANGON — Japanese realtor Yamaman Co. will open a Japanese-style hotel in Myanmar's commercial capital of Yangon on Feb. 17, marking its first foray overseas.

An opening ceremony was held on Thursday for Wishton Hotel Yangon, operated by Yamaman's Myanmar arm, Hotel Yamaman Co., in the Yankin Township, located between downtown Yan-

gon and Yangon International Airport.

A total of 91 rooms in the hotel ranging from \$70 to \$80 will each be equipped with a bathtub, while half of them will have a kitchen and a washing machine, suitable for long-stay guests.

With Japanese-speaking staff, the hotel will also offer a Japanese breakfast buffet.

"We think we have to launch

at least five to six hotels," Yamaman head Tetsuo Shimada told NNA on Wednesday, but added that there are no specific plans in place yet.

The Tokyo-based company also intends to launch a business for training nursing-care workers, with a view to employing them at the company's welfare facilities in Japan that are suffering from labor shortages. —Kyodo News

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Information about pneumonia caused by 2019 Novel Coronavirus (2019-nCoV), first identified in Wuhan City of People's Republic of China

26 January 2020

The Department of Public Health under the Ministry of Health and Sports is taking priority over monitoring and responding to communicable diseases, especially the recent outbreak of 2019 Novel Coronavirus (2019-nCoV) which was first identified in Wuhan City of Peoples Republic of China, advising people in Myanmar to take up the following suggestions.

(a) Major symptoms of 2019-nCoV

Patients are said to be suspected with Novel coronavirus (2019-nCoV) when they have got fever (38 C and above), cough, breathing difficulties and fatigue after they have travelled to Wuhan, China, in 14 days, had close contact with the suspected or confirmed patients in 14 days

(b) Transmission of disease

Although the epidemiology of 2019-nCoV has not been definitely identified, the transmission may occur through respiratory tracts, like other coronaviruses, from cough and sneeze that can transmit influenza virus, or touching with bare hands to virus on the materials

(c) Recommendations to prevent infection of 2019-nCoV

- * Stay away from the people with the symptoms of respiratory diseases such as fever, coughing, sneezing
- * Avoid going to crowded areas
- * Wash hands frequently with soap and water
- * Use clothes and facemask to cover nose and mouth during sneezing and coughing, especially on buses not to transmit to others
- * Carefully leave used tissue papers in sneezing and coughing into a waste bin, and wash hands again soap
- * Avoid touching to animals in bare hands
- * Consume animal meats and fishes only after fully cooked
- * Take care of personnel hygiene and get enough sleep
- * Have nutritious foods and take regular physical exercises
- * Health workers need to follow the Infection Prevention and Control (IPC) for prevention of the disease whenever they contact

with the patients, and Wash hands after touching materials exposed to patients and direct contacts with the patients

- * Domestic/Foreign travelers at the international airports are to follow travel advice issued by the Ministry of Health and Sports

If someone is suffering from the above-mentioned symptoms of 2019-nCoV or found a suspected patient, the case must be reported to the nearby hospital, clinics and health centres for medical treatments. Departmental officials, private hospitals and clinics, health workers, operators of hotels and tourism and public are also advised to report immediately on the suspected cases of 2019-nCoV to the nearby health facilities.

Boeing's new 777X airliner makes first flight

WASHINGTON — Boeing's new long-haul 777X airliner made its first flight on Saturday, a step forward for the company whose broader prospects remain clouded by the 737 MAX crisis.

The world's largest twin-engine aircraft landed at Boeing Field near Seattle after approximately four hours in the air, following months of delays and erratic weather in recent days.

High winds led to the maiden flight's postponement on Friday, and the company blamed weather for an earlier delay on Thursday, which was rainy.

A few minutes after 10:00

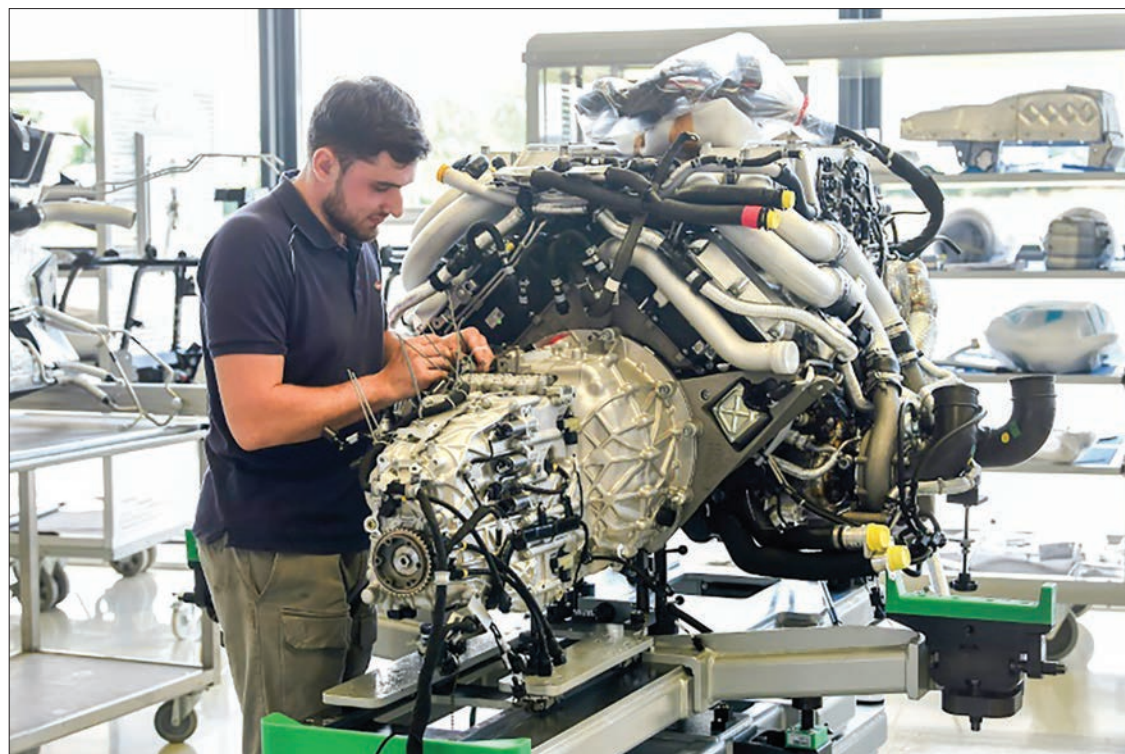
am local time (1800 GMT), the plane took off from the rain-slicked runway at Paine Field in Everett, Washington, home to Boeing's northwest US manufacturing site.

"Yes!" Boeing spokesman Josh Green shouted as the plane's wheels finally lifted off the tarmac.

Just minutes earlier, the pilots deployed the plane's winglets — folding wing tips — designed to improve the craft's fuel efficiency and make it possible for the plane, with the widest wing span ever from Boeing, to be accommodated at more airports.— AFP ■

Bugatti touts green ambitions while storming full speed ahead

PARIS — Supercar manufacturer Bugatti, fresh off one of its best years, wants the world to know it has taken environmental concerns to heart even as it prepares a next generation of heart-pounding -- and gas-guzzling -- speed machines.

The French automaker has implemented a series of measures to offset the carbon emitted by the 81 racers it produced last year, including a shift to

biogas and other green energy sources to power its manufacturing facilities in northeast France.

But will Bugatti, which has hinted at "surprises" this year, be joining other luxury carmakers in shifting to electric or hybrid models?

The short answer: Not right now.

"For the next 10 years to come, only the W16 motor pro-

vides the emotion and the passion expected by our supercar clients," Stephan Winkelmann, the firm's chief executive, said recently in reference to its massive 16-cylinder engine.

Nonetheless, the Volkswagen-owned brand believes it can offset its own greenhouse gas emissions as well as those of its clients, a challenge admittedly made easier by its limited production runs.— AFP ■

Ex-nurse helping revive struggling fishing business in Hokkaido

YAKUMO — Shiho Tateoka, who lives in a small fishing village in Hokkaido, Japan, rises almost every day at 6 am and sends her three children off to school before starting her day of handling fish sales to various customers.

Then she's back on social media searching for more clients.

Years ago, Tateoka, 43, was a single mom in Tokyo, who was busy working both as a nurse and saleswoman for a home medical care service. Fish, you might say, was the furthest thing from her mind.

But life changed when her cousin, a fisherman based at Otoshibe port in the town of Yakumo on Japan's northernmost island, visited her home six years ago. Yuki, 37, who later became her husband, described his worries to her as a fisherman on a sinking ship.

"When I listened to his sto-

ry, I thought there may still be room for the fishing industry to grow," Shiho explained in a recent interview.

"I thought I may be able to commit to a new sales job and dedicate myself to a new life."

Yuki had been concerned whether he could continue his career as the fishing industry faced various challenges, such as a depleted fish population due to rising ocean temperatures linked to climate change and years of overfishing.

But when Shiho took him to a Tokyo department store, he was surprised to see the high prices the fish sold for.

He said he had been unaware of how his hauls were treated after they were handed over to a local fishery cooperative, which was in charge of sales.

Yuki was hoping to increase the value of his catches and cultivate a customer

base to boost earnings but was clueless until Shiho decided to move to Yakumo, a struggling seaside town, and work together with him, drawing on her sales experience.

In April 2014, Shiho helped Yuki launch Funkawan Sengyo Oroshi Ryujinmaru, a company delivering fresh seafood such as flounder, shrimps and crabs caught in nearby waters direct-

ly to wholesalers, restaurants and consumers nationwide, and became its sales manager.

The company now has about 30 clients per month and earns 5 million yen (around \$45,400) annually.

Since then, Shiho's life has become very busy, soliciting restaurants and fish markets nationwide by social media, phone and direct visits to buyers.

She also advised Yuki to process fish damaged by fishing nets, which was previously disposed of.

She now uses social media, including Facebook, to promote the processed products such as salted dried fish and flathead flounder pickled with cherry leaves.

Other posts describe the couple's daily fishing activities, fish freshness and cooking methods, and prices.— Kyodo News ■

Quick response important for containing Wuhan virus

IN 2003, the outbreak of severe acute respiratory syndrome-related coronavirus, or SARS, sparked a major health crisis in a number of countries around the globe.

While it originated in China, the coronavirus spread quickly to other countries. There were 8,098 cases of SARS registered across the world, which resulted in 774 deaths in 37 countries. The virus overwhelmed some hospitals and medical centers, sparked fear in communities, and led to mass immunizations.

Since 2004, no case of SARS had been recorded — until recently. Now, a new and potentially dangerous coronavirus from China, the Wuhan flu, has spread to other countries.

The Public Health Department has instructed private hospitals to provide information on suspected patients, in real time.

Health officials have suggested that people wash their hands, cover their mouths and noses when coughing and sneezing, and cook meat and eggs as thoroughly as possible. It's also important to avoid close contact with those showing symptoms of respiratory illness, such as coughing and sneezing.

Up to 26 January, there were 56 deaths and 2,070 confirmed cases in China.

Outside of China, several countries, such as Japan, South Korea, and Thailand, have reported cases of Wuhan flu on their soil.

In Myanmar, one Chinese tourist, who entered Myanmar through the Muse border gate, was found suffering from high temperature and fever recently and quarantined. Local authorities announced that she recovered from a normal fever and showed no signs of Wuhan virus infection.

Like other countries, Myanmar is also taking early precautions. The Public Health Department has instructed private hospitals to provide information on suspected patients, in real-time. The instructions from the PHD include the method of sending information, symptoms and particulars of the virus, and signs shown by affected patients.

The health authorities have also beefed up surveillance at international airports, sea ports, border crossings, especially the ones with the People's Republic of China.

The daily Wuhan-Yangon and Wuhan-Mandalay flights run by China Eastern Airways have been suspended to prevent the spread of the coronavirus in Myanmar.

A quick response would be very important to contain any infection, if it is found on our soil.

THE pneumonia outbreak was first reported in Wuhan City, central China's Hubei Province, in December 2019. Experts have attributed the outbreak to a novel coronavirus that has since spread across China and abroad.

As of 10:00 p.m. on January 26, China has reported at least 2,070 confirmed cases and another 37 cases have been confirmed abroad. The death toll has risen to 56.

A total of 14 cases have been confirmed in Hong Kong, Macao and Taiwan.

But there is also hope. On 26 January, at least 11 members of the medical staff in Wuhan City, who were confirmed infected, had tested negative for the virus.

'2019-nCoV' cures underway in China

The 2019-nCoV does not currently have an effective medicine treatment or vaccine, though efforts to develop them are underway.

Chinese Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CCDC) announced on 26 January that it started research and development of a vaccine for the coronavirus. And the organization is also conducting drug screening for treatment.

China has mobilized seven groups of 900 medical staff to aid Hubei Province and will send 12 more teams with 1,600 medical personnel in two days to Wuhan City, the center of the novel coronavirus outbreak, as part of the latest efforts to control the spread of the coronavirus, said officials at a press conference on 26 January.

Here are the places that have confirmed cases of 2019 Novel Coronavirus:

France There are three known cases of the coronavirus in France,

the first European country to be affected by the outbreak.

One person is sick in Bordeaux and another is ill in Paris. A third person, who is a close relative of one of the other two, has also been confirmed to have the virus.

All three had recently travelled to China and had now been placed in isolation.

Japan

Japan's health authorities confirmed a second case on Friday. Local media said the patient was a man in his 40s who was originally from Wuhan and on a trip to Japan.

The country's first case was reported by the health ministry last week: a man who had visited Wuhan and was hospitalised on January 10, four days after his return to Japan.

Australia

Australia on Saturday confirmed its first case of the virus, a man who arrived in Melbourne from China a week ago.

Authorities said they were contacting people who had travelled on the same plane from China and offering advice.

Malaysia

Malaysia confirmed its first three cases on Saturday. All are Chinese nationals on holiday from Wuhan who arrived in the country from Singapore two days earlier.

A 66-year-old woman and two boys, aged two and 11, are

in a stable condition and are being kept in an isolation ward at a public hospital, Malaysia's health minister said.

Nepal

Nepal said a 32-year-old man arriving from Wuhan had the deadly disease.

The patient, who was initially quarantined, recovered and was discharged. The government said that surveillance has been increased at the airport "and suspicious patients entering Nepal are being monitored".

Singapore

Singapore has announced at least three cases -- a 66-year-old man and his 37-year-old son, who arrived in Singapore on Monday from Wuhan, and a 52-year-old Wuhan woman, who arrived in the city-state on Tuesday.

South Korea

South Korea confirmed its second case of the virus on Friday. The health ministry said a South Korean man in his 50s started experiencing symptoms while working in Wuhan on Jan 10. He was tested after his return earlier this week, and the virus was confirmed.

The country reported its first case on January 20 -- a 35-year-old woman who flew in from Wuhan.

Both remain in treatment and are in stable conditions.

Taiwan

Taiwan has uncovered three

Thai woman who came back from the Chinese city this month.

Two of the Chinese patients were treated, and have since recovered and travelled back to China, the Thai health ministry said this week.

United States

On 21 January US health officials announced the country's first case, a man in his 30s living near Seattle. On 24 January a second case was announced -- a woman in her 60s living in Chicago.

Both were treated and are recovering.

Vietnam

Vietnam confirmed two cases of the virus on 23 January. An infected man from Wuhan travelled to Ho Chi Minh City earlier this month and passed the virus on to his son.

Both are being treated in hospital and are stable, Vietnam health officials said.

It's entirely new

The virus appears to be a never-before-seen strain of coronavirus - a large family of viruses that can cause diseases ranging from the common cold to Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS), which killed 349 people in mainland China and another 299 in Hong Kong between 2002 and 2003.

Arnaud Fontanet, head of the department of epidemiology at

the Institut Pasteur in Paris, told AFP the current virus strain was 80 percent genetically identical to SARS.

It's being passed between humans

The World Health Organization said it believed an animal source was the "primary source" of the outbreak, and Wuhan authorities identified a seafood market as the centre of the epidemic.

It is milder than SARS

Compared with SARS, the symptoms appear to be less aggressive, and experts say the death toll is still relatively low.

According to authorities in Wuhan, 25 of the more than 200 people infected in the city have already been discharged.

It could lead to an international public health emergency

The WHO held a meeting on 22 January to determine whether the outbreak constitutes a "public health emergency of international concern" and if so, what should be done to manage it.

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New China virus 'not as powerful as SARS': health official

BEIJING — A top Chinese health official said Sunday that a new deadly virus that has infected nearly 2,000 people and killed dozens in China is “not as powerful as SARS”.

The new virus has sparked alarm amid a rising death toll and the discovery that it comes from the same family of coronaviruses as SARS, which killed nearly 650 people across mainland China and Hong Kong.

But Chinese officials told reporters that the new disease was less powerful than SARS — though it was becoming more contagious.

“From what we see now, this disease is indeed...not as powerful as SARS,” said Gao

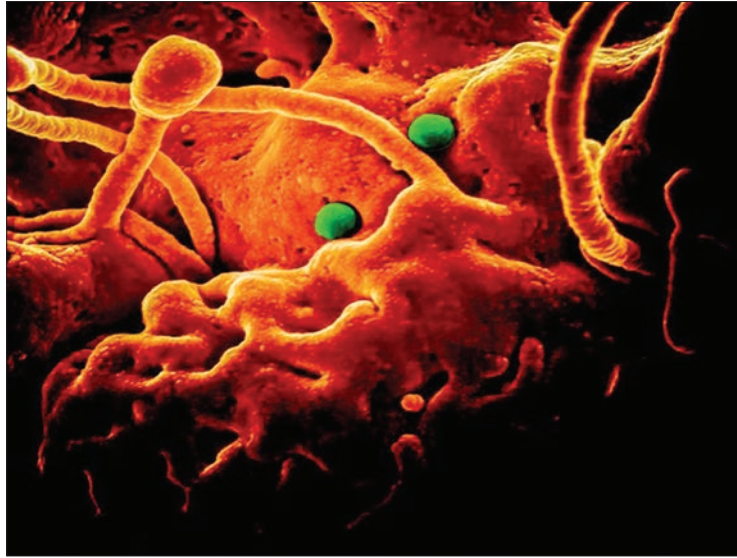
Fu, head of China's Centre for Disease Control and Prevention, at a press briefing in Beijing.

However, it also appears that the “spreading ability of the virus is getting stronger,” added Ma Xiaowei, head of China's National Health Commission (NHC).

The new disease also has an incubation period of up to two weeks, Ma said at the press conference, and that it was “contagious during the incubation period.”

“This is very different from SARS,” he added.

The new virus was first reported in the central Chinese city of Wuhan last month, but

has since spread to at least 30 regions in China, resulting in

Chinese authorities scramble to contain the disease.

Four cities — including Beijing and Shanghai, and the eastern province of Shandong — announced bans on long-distance buses from entering or leaving their borders, a move that will affect millions of people travelling over the Lunar New Year holiday.

And on Thursday, the Chinese government put the hard-hit province of Hubei under effective quarantine in an unprecedented operation affecting tens of millions of people to slow the spread of an illness that President Xi Jinping said posed a “grave” threat.—AFP ■

Local heroes: Wuhan motorists defy virus threat to help neighbours

WUHAN — Citizens of China's virus-stricken city of Wuhan have been told to stay indoors, avoid strangers and keep their cars off the road, but locals like Zhang Lin are refusing to sit by and watch their hometown suffer.

Defying the threat from a contagious respiratory illness that broke out in the city and has killed dozens of people, Zhang and other Wuhan residents are pitching in by driving sick fellow citizens to hospital.

“We're from Wuhan, and even though you guys are here to help us, our own citizens should also come out to (help),” Zhang Lin told AFP journalists as he waited for a patient to emerge from a clinic

for the drive back home.

“There has to be someone who does this.”

The 48-year-old Zhang and others have been enlisted by the government to provide the free service, and it is sorely needed.

Wuhan has for days been the nucleus of a transport lockdown that began in the city of 11 million and has since been expanded to much of the rest of Hubei province, in an attempt to cut off transmission routes for the virus.

Wuhan's public transport system has been halted, taxi services curtailed and, on Sunday, new restrictions were introduced banning most cars from the streets.—AFP ■

A new surgical procedure to fix broken ribs faster

WASHINGTON — Doctors have come up with a new surgical procedure to fix rib fractures.

Evert Eriksson, a co-author of the paper said: “Offer medicine for the pain and a ventilator if breathing is an issue. This extended discomfort is what led Denver Health Medi-

cal Center surgeon Fredric Pieracci, M.D., along with several other trauma surgeons to conduct a study with members of the Chest Wall Injury Society.

Twelve centres across the United States came together to evaluate the success of surgical stabilization of rib fractures (SSRF), which involves installing a plate to line up the two ends of the fracture and hold them in place throughout the healing process.—ANI ■

Scientists to search for relatives of extinct Galapagos tortoises

QUITO — A scientific expedition to the Galapagos Islands will spend ten days searching for relatives of two tortoise species believed to be extinct, including those of the archipelago's Lonesome George, park officials said Friday.

George, the last known member of the Pinta tortoise species, died in 2012 at over 100 years of age after refusing to mate in captivity with females from related subspecies.

Park rangers and scientists from the Galapagos National Parks (PNG) and Galapagos Conservancy will tour the Wolf Volcano on Isabela Island in hopes of “locating and removing a group of giant tortoises with partial lineage” to the extinct Pinta and Floreana species, the park said in a statement. They chose the area because whalers and pirates who would eat the animals were thought to have dumped some of

the tortoises there in the past to lighten their ships' loads.

The Galapagos Islands, located 1,000 kilometers (620 miles) off the coast of Ecuador in the Pacific Ocean, were made famous by Charles Darwin's studies of their breathtaking biodiversity.

In 2008, a similar expedition took blood samples from 1,726 tortoises, 17 of which had a “significant percentage” of genes in common with the Pinta species while about 80 showed a “partial lineage” to the Floreana species, PNG said.—AFP ■

Women grab limelight at India's Republic Day pageantry

NEW DELHI— Huge crowds gathered for India's Republic Day parade Sunday, with women taking centre-stage at the annual pomp-filled spectacle of military might featuring army tanks, horses and camels.

For the first time, the riders performing daredevil stunts on motorbikes to the delight of the crowds lining New Delhi's central Rajpath boulevard, were women.

Inspector Seema Nag saluted the gathered VIPs as she led her fellow bikers, one precariously perched at the top of a ladder wedged behind her vehicle's handlebars as others formed a human pyramid, drawing the loudest cheers from thousands

of spectators.

And in front of the guest of honour, Brazil's President Jair Bolsonaro, Captain Tania Shergill, a fourth-generation army officer, led an all-male Corps of Signals contingent.

Bolsonaro sat next to Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi—who wore a saffron turban—and waved and clapped from behind a bullet-proof glass.

January 26 is the anniversary of India's adoption of its constitution in 1950.

The two-hour showcase of military might and cultural diversity included everything from battle tanks and state-of-the-art weaponry to traditional dancers.

Scaled-down models of the Rafale aircraft were paraded by the air force, following the South Asian nation's purchase of 36 jets from France in 2016 in a multi-billion-dollar deal. The mounted camels of the Border Security Force put in an early showing, strutting down the avenue in brightly coloured caparisons.

Traditional dancers representing some of India's diverse regional cultures performed on elaborately decorated floats showcasing selected states.

The show culminated with a Su-30 MKI fighter jet roaring through the sky in a "Vertical Charlie" aerobatic manoeuvre.—AFP ■

Over and out: Britain readies to leave the EU

LONDON — Britain calls time on almost half a century of European Union membership this week, striking out alone in a historic move that has bitterly divided the country.

At 11:00 pm (2300 GMT) on January 31, the UK will become the first country to leave the 28-nation EU, the world's largest single market area that it joined in 1973.

Nothing will immediately change, owing to a transition period negotiated between London and Brussels to allow both sides to agree a new future partnership.

Britons will be able to work in and trade freely with EU nations until December 31, and vice versa, although they will no longer be represented in the bloc's institutions.

But legally, Britain will be out.

The exit process has been tortuous, with the years since the 2016 EU referendum marked by bitter arguments that paralysed the government and forced two prime ministers to quit.

Four years ago, 52 percent of Britons backed Brexit but 48 percent wanted to stay, and the

country is still split between “Leavers” and “Remainers”.

The political chaos came

to an abrupt halt last month when Prime Minister Boris Johnson won a decisive vic-

tory in a general election with a promise to “Get Brexit Done”.—AFP ■

Key vote in Italy as Salvini seeks to topple government

ROME —Italians voted Sunday in a key regional election which the far-right hopes will shake the country's fragile coalition government to its core and return strongman Matteo Salvini to power.

The wealthy centre-north

region of Emilia Romagna has been a stronghold of the Italian left for over 70 years, but while left-wing values still hold sway in its cities, the right has been rallying serious support in towns and the countryside.

The last polls published

before the pre-election media blackout showed the anti-immigrant League neck-and-neck with the centre-left Democratic Party (PD), which governs Italy in coalition with the anti-establishment Five Star Movement (M5S).

Some 3.5 million citizens are eligible to cast ballots to elect the region's president between seven am (0600 GMT) and 11 pm, alongside similar regional elections in the smaller southern region of Calabria.

Turnout in Emilia Romagna was high at midday (1100 GMT), at over 23 percent, compared to just 11 percent at the same time during the last regional elections.

The League is hoping for a repeat of its historic win in October in Umbria, which had been a left-wing fiefdom for 50 years.

Its candidate in Emilia Romagna, Lucia Borgonzoni, 43, has been overshadowed by Salvini, who has held daily rallies and inundated social media with snaps of him sampling delicacies in the Parma ham and Parmesan cheese heartland.

Salvini infuriated the left Saturday when he broke the pre-election silence -- which under Italian law means candidates cannot campaign the day before a vote -- by tweeting about the “eviction notice” he was set to deliver to the government.—AFP ■

Thousands rally across Australia for ‘Invasion Day’ protests

MELBOURNE — Thousands of people joined Invasion Day protests in cities across Australia Sunday to mark the beginning of British colonisation of the vast continent.

January 26 is officially recognised as Australia Day, a public holiday to celebrate the origins of the modern nation and is commemorated with fireworks, concerts and citizenship ceremonies.

However, the date is a time of mourning for indigenous Australians, who have inhabited the land for 65,000 years and view the arrival of British settlers in 1788 as heralding two centuries of pain and suffering.

Annual rallies have stead-

ily grown in size as protesters bring attention to injustices faced by indigenous people and call on the government to change the date of Australia Day.

It was only formally established as a nation-wide celebration in 1994.

This year, non-indigenous Australians were asked to give reparations in the form of a donation to the #PayTheRent campaign.

Melbourne rally organiser Lidia Thorpe, a former Victoria state government politician, drew attention to the plight of Aboriginal families who had to pay for the funerals of relatives who died in custody.—AFP ■

Lagos waterfront evictions highlight Nigeria oil and land squabbles

LAGOS— The lagoon waters at the port entrance to Lagos, Nigeria's economic capital, are usually teeming with small fishing boats.

But the bustling waterfront slums of Lagos are now quiet after the navy

evicted tens of thousands of residents from their homes in recent weeks.

The evictions are highlighting tensions over real estate in the megalopolis of 20 million where building space is an increasingly

rare commodity.

The operation has also exposed the stark contrast of shantytown fishing communities in the shadow of Lagos' Ileshe beach with its villas for billionaires and expat executives.

Nigeria is rich in crude oil, an OPEC nation and Africa's largest petroleum producer.

Its army says the operation stopped residents tapping into pipelines to illegally siphon off fuel oil that is pumped from the port.

But locals and rights groups say the brutal evictions are an illegal seizure of precious building space in a city where the population is booming.—AFP ■

For US Fed, it's steady as she goes... for now

WASHINGTON—The Federal Reserve is overwhelmingly expected to begin 2020 as it ended 2019: by leaving interest rates right where they are.

As they prepare to hold their first policy meeting of the year in the coming week, central bankers are sending clear signals they think monetary policy is in a sweet spot.

Frayed nerves on both sides of the Pacific have begun to ease after President Donald Trump last month called a truce in his China trade war, and trade relations within North America

have resolved as well, with the signing of a new continental pact.

Meanwhile, employers are still hiring, workers are still spending, unemployment is still low and inflation is still tame.

In a nutshell, US growth appears to be cooling back towards a long-term trend of around two percent and the recession scare of late summer 2019 feels far off.

Both the economy and policy are "in a good place," as Fed number two Richard Clarida said in a speech this month.

So after cutting rates three times in 2019, Fed policymakers have made it clear they will not move again unless things get significantly and unexpectedly worse.

"They've been taking a victory lap for the last couple of months and I expect them to continue doing that," economist Joel Naroff told AFP.

Futures markets have taken that expectation to the bank. As of Friday, they predicted the Fed will not resume cutting interest rates until September at the earliest.—AFP ■

Trump immigration clampdown may threaten Americans' jobs, wages, economists say

WASHINGTON— The 20-year-old San Diego bakery Con Pane Rustic Breads & Cafe went out of business this month after an audit by US authorities found immigrants working there illegally.

In April, a small Nebraska town lost a potato processing plant, and the local revenue it generated, in the wake of an immigration raid on its facilities. A restaurant in New York appears to have suffered similar fate in August.

Farmers say they are planting less, turning to automation, eliminating some crops, leaving them to rot in the field or contemplating selling out of the business altogether -- all because they cannot find enough immigrant labor.

As the US birth rate is falling and a labor shortage is worsening, President Donald Trump's crack-

down on immigrants could make the situation worse for businesses like these.

Trump and others who favor tighter immigration controls say low-skilled migrant workers compete for American jobs and drive down wages for all workers.

But a growing body of research suggests the contrary: that removing immigrant workers can

be destructive, resulting in lost jobs, lower wages, canceled investments and less affordable services -- even for Americans.

About 7.6 million unauthorized migrants work in the United States, amounting to 4.6 percent of the labor force, according to the Pew Research Center, and the share is shrinking even as demand for workers is strong.—AFP ■

WITH the programme backed by World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF), we from Myanmar together with Laura, a woman travel blogger and Mathias, a man lifestyle blogger from Denmark, went on a tour of Myang Hay Wun Elephant Camp to find out nature of elephants and actual life of mahouts from the close range. Having put up at the camp for one night, we came to know that it is a worth-visiting site for nature lovers and those who are fond of visiting. Let me share the information about natures of elephants and their mahouts to nature lovers and those being fond of visiting. It is located in Taikkyi Township, Yangon Region.

Fantastical capture of untamed elephant

The location of Myaing Hay Wun Elephant Camp is a short distance away from Bago mountain ranges and this point is uncommon. Wild elephants used to take the wrong way to nearby villages and plantations due to various reasons. The camp is to prevent against the danger of wild elephants in practical terms. As chance would have it, herds of wild elephants can be explored by riding elephants in the camp. Howdahs considered to hurt elephants are not used in taking a ride of the elephant. Visitors can ride on the bare back of the elephant. This elephant ride can cool me down to some degree. It is unsuitable for

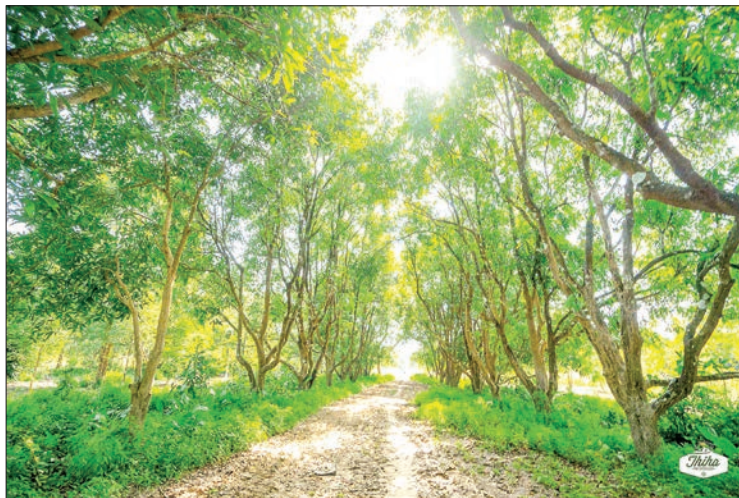
If people are asked why the elephant is killed, they will easily answer to want ivory. Nowadays this answer isn't enough.

ene bags. Therefore, elephant camps, environmentalists and forest police have to join hands in preventing the elephants from being killed.

We also came to know that elephant keepers are not allowed carrying weapons so they have difficulty when they see the armed hunters.

Night stay at Myaing Hay Wun Elephant Camp

Lack of facilities at the camp is some kind of attraction. It is very close to the forest. We had to stay at the camp by nature. We were hosted in great variety just like a lifestyle of village. The visitors can learn how to keep tame elephants by

nature. It is very nice to listen to the life of mahouts. We gained experience of mahouts how to care elephants in one sitting during the night stay. The camp provides the mahouts service quarters their families to live. There is also a mess hall where breakfast, lunch and dinner are available. The hall is not so large. About 12 people can stay there. There are more than 30 elephants including baby ones in the camp. Some elephants are almost 60 years old.

Fifty-six-year-old elephant named Shwe Toe Win

The elephants including Shwe Toe Win have to be taken to water to bath them in the mornings. There is a creek in the gully of the camp to bath the elephants. We bathed Shwe Toe Win in the creek in the morning on the day when we returned. While we were rubbing Shwe Toe Win with soap, we saw a kind of tree called Sue Yit. We cut it with a knife to get its bark. When it is crashed, it changes to foam. The elephants can be cleaned with this foam. Ivory can be cleaned by rubbing them with sand.

Other activities near elephant camp

he had to ask for help from the elephant camp when the wild elephants came to the mango plantation. The visitors can visit nearby villages by motorcycles.

Weather conditions

It is hot in the summertime. It is difficult to go from one place to another in the rainy season because the roads are earthen. The cold season is the best to go. The weather is fairly cold so it will not be easy to have a bath.

Where is it and how to go?

Myaing Hay Wun Elephant Camp is in Taikkyi Township, Yangon Region, which is reachable by car. Get off in Pa-Lon village of Taikkyi and then take motorcycles. It is a thirty minutes' motorcycle drive to the camp. Myaing Hay Wun Elephant Camp can be reached by motorcycles in half an hour. The car drive is also the same matter. Off-road vehicles like four-wheel drive are better than small ones as the road is rough. If the car body is low, its flooring may touch the road. If you ride a motorcycle to Myaing Hay Wun, it costs about K5,000.

Other expenditures

One night stay at Myaing Hay Wun Elephant Camp costs K10,000 per person. Breakfast is worth about K10,000 per person. Charge for elephant ride is K5,000 per person.

Myaing Hay Wun Elephant Camp is quite unlike any other one that I have ever visited. The camp is in a situation of a difficult access. The animal keepers are taking care of the elephants by nature. The elephants are usually put out to pasture. Regular patrol is made to prevent against the danger of untamed elephants coming to the area of the camp. Sometimes, the visitors ride the elephants here and there in the camp. The mahouts put the elephants out to the pasture in the mornings and return them to their usual place in the evenings. The environmental conservation organizations like the daily activities taking place in the camp. We were much satisfied with a rare chance of observing lifestyles of the mahouts and their families with the close range. I soon am going to post Myaing Hay Wun Elephant Camp on a blog to capture the attention of nature loving travellers. Wishing all the people could travel with best of health and happiness free from all obstacles.
