Announcement on Extension of the Precautionary Restriction Measures Relating to Control of the COVID-19 Pandemic until 30 September 2020

- 1. With a view to the further strengthening of measures to contain the spread of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar has issued the following announcements regarding temporary entry restrictions for visitors from all countries. All those restrictions were extended until 31 August 2020 by the Ministry's announcement dated 30 July 2020.
- (a) Announcement dated 15 March 2020 regarding precautionary measures for all travellers visiting Myanmar;
- (b) Announcement dated 20 March 2020 regarding additional precautionary measures for travellers visiting Myanmar and temporary suspension of

issuance of visa on Arrival and e-visa;

- (c) Announcement dated 24 March 2020 regarding additional precautionary measures for travellers from all countries visiting Myanmar;
- (d) Announcement dated 28 March 2020 regarding temporary suspension of all types of visas (including social visit visas) and visa exemption services.
- In order to continue its effective response measures to protect the population of the country from the risks of importation and spread of the COVID-19, the Government of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar has decided to extend the afore-mentioned entry restriction measures until 30 September 2020.
 In case of urgent official missions or compelling

reasons, foreign nationals, including diplomats and United Nations officials, who wish to travel to Myanmar by available relief or special flights, may contact the nearest Myanmar Mission and apply for possible exception with regard to certain visa and entry restrictions. However, all visitors must abide by existing directives issued by the Ministry of Health and Sports relating to the prevention and control of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Myanmar nationals stranded in India brought back home


ARELIEF flight of Myanmar National Airlines (MNA) brought back 90 Myanmar nationals stranded in India, and it landed at Yangon International Airport yesterday evening.

As they arrived in Yangon, officials from the Ministry of Labour, Immigration and Population, the Ministry of Health and Sports, and the Yangon Region government helped for their 21-day quarantine period in line with the regulations of immigration, health and medical checks.

For the repatriation of Myanmar citizens who were stranded in foreign countries by relief flights and chartered flights in accordance with the instructions from National-Level Central Committee on Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COV-ID-19), the Ministry of Foreign Affairs cooperated with the relevant ministries and Myanmar embassies from respective countries, and has organized 5 relief flights to pick up Myanmar nationals stuck in India to date. —MNA

Cartoonists Shwe Min Thar, Myint Thein, Maung Maung Aung, Soe Thaw Dar, Win Aung, Maung Maung Phoung Tain, Nay Myo Aye, Lai Like, University Harculi, and Wai Yan (Taunggyi) attended the meeting.

They discussed matters

relating to the formation committee for establishing a cartoon museum and appointment of new committee members, organizing cartoon exhibitions with collected articles for the museum, and collecting and preserving cartoon-related articles for exhibitions and museum.

Myanmar Affairs Study Group's U Aye Maung Kyaw (Aye Maung Kyaw) and U Than Ohn (Maung Zeyar) and Myanmar Cartoonists Association's cartoonists Yazar, Win Myint Aung, Han and San Lin also joined the event.

The meeting with cartoonists was concluded following the Union Minister's remarks.

The Union Minister also met graphic designers and related-businesses' officials in the afternoon, and discussed drawing up of by-laws for Copyright Law on Literary and Artistic Works that will be soon enacted.

cals Painters Association's patron U Kyaw Thaung and Architect U Maw Lin detailed about protection of copyright loss and rights of their relevant sectors.





Section 59 (g) in Hluttaw Election Law



IN accordance with section 59 (g) of the Hluttaw Election Law, no one is allowed to vote more than once in any election for a Hluttaw constituency in which he or she has the right to vote. Anyone who is found guilty of or abetting this act shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term not exceeding one year, or with fine not exceeding K100,000 (one hundred thousand Kyats), or with both.

MoHS minister discusses healthcare assistance with USAID

UNION Minister for Health and Sports Dr Myint Htwe held a videoconference on 28 August with the team of United States Agency for International Development on its further healthcare assistance to Myanmar in malaria, tuberculosis, HIV/AIDS and maternal and child health and measures against COVID-19. The responsible persons from the USAID's offices in the United States and Myanmar participated in the discussion with MoHS headquarters in Nay Pyi Taw.

Deputy Chief of Mission Ms Gwen Cardno expressed the readiness to continue USAID's health assistance to Myanmar and asked for the needs of Myanmar.

Union Minister Dr Myint Htwe advised the USAID officers to make their visits to its project areas in Myanmar, the need of short-term training programmes at US-CDC on communicable diseases for MoHS staff members. The Union Minister added the capacity and technical assistance of USAID could promote capabilities of public healthcare staff and long-term healthcare sector.

Acting Mission Director Pamela Fessenden from the USAID said further health assistance, and asked about the ministry's instructions, recommendations and advice on the existing aid of USAID.

Director Karen Cavanaugh from the USAID-Office of Public Health presented US\$6.5 million through the Access to Health Fund for COVID-19 response health sector.

The USAID is also providing healthcare item, including PPE sets, for the people at the relief camps and quarantine centres of less-developed areas in Kachin, Shan, Mon, Rakhine, Kayah, Kayin, Chin, Sagaing and Yangon.

The COVID-19 response fund is included \$700,000 through WHO, \$600,000 through UNICEF and 500,000 through SCI, as well as 6 millions of humanitarian and emergency assistance through UNICEF, IOM and the Relief International.

The USAID will also provide technical assistance and vaccination programmes from the United States.

After discussions about the USAID's healthcare assistance, the Union Minister said the joint plan of his office and USAID next year's projects by the Access to Health Fund are principally acceptable, and agreed to sign MoU on TB partnership between the two organizations to fight against tuberculosis as it is necessary for the country.

The Union Minister affirmed his agreements on the Myanmar Demographic and Health Survey project which will be implemented in 2021 with the assistance of USAID, and stressed the need for analysis on the composite index on the projects at operation level.

He added the requirement of Myanmar for digital health which has been proposed by the USAID, and implemented by the digital square system.—MNA

SWRR Ministry delivers COVID aid to IDPs in Sami, Paletwa

THE Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement organized a virtual meeting with officials in Chin State on providing assistance for internally displaced persons (IDPs) in Sami and Paletwa townships, Chin State yesterday.

Chin State Disaster Management Department's Director reported on delivering assistance for IDP households under COVID-19 Economic Relief Plan (CERP), and MoSWRR Deputy Minister and Disaster Management Department's Director-General coordinated the matters.

The Union Minister said the staff to abide by COVID-19 guidelines in visiting IDP camps for delivering assistance, and expressed thanks to them for fulfilling the ministry's duties amid the difficulties including transportation.

Officials from Chin State Disaster Management Department and Matupi District General Administration Department provided a total of K32.48 million, K40,000 per household, and hand soap under CERP, for 812 households in four IDP camps in Sami Township, Chin State on 25 and 26 August.

Officials from Chin State Disaster Management Department, Paletwa Township General Administration Department and Chin State IDP Supervision Committee led by the IDP Supervision Committee's Deputy Chairman Minister for Municipal Affairs, Electricity and Industry will visit and deliver a total of K44.52 million cash assistance for 1,113 households in 19 IDP camps in Paletwa Township starting from September first week.

As part of preparation for COVID-19, the ministry used K 35 million and constructed seven long houses to accommodate suspected IDP COVID-19 patients in Sami and Paletwa townships and Sein Sin Wa Village.

A total of K36 million was already allocated to build five long houses in Paletwa and Sami townships and Mi Zar Village.

Over 600,000 acres of monsoon paddy grown in Sagaing Region

A total of 604,933 acres of monsoon paddy were grown in ten districts of Sagaing region and other townships of Naga self-administered zone in 2019-2020 financial year, said U Win Hlaing Oo, regional head from the Agriculture Department. "The department is sharing the growing method and protection method of the crops. Also, the department is providing awareness courses to the local farmers for the growing methods which are suitable for the weather condition. Out of over 18 targeted acres, one third of the monsoon paddy plantations have already been put under cultivation in the region. Additionally, we are growing the remaining monsoon paddy. To meet the target, the agriculture department staff went to the paddy farms to cooperate with the local farmers," he added.

The monsoon paddy was cultivated on 5,476 acres of land in Sagaing district, 8,439 acres in Monywa district, 51,659 acres in Yinmabin district, 93,817 acres in Shwebo district, 47,037 acres in Kanbalu district, 231,885 acres in Katha district, 67,941 acres in Kalay district, 27,910 acres in Tamu district, 27,850 acres in Mawlaik district, 18,699 acres in Kani district and 24,220 acres in Naga self-administered region.—Win Oo (Zayyartine)

Myanmar to import over 3 mln broiler chicks from Thai in 4 months

TO fulfil domestic needs, Myanmar targeted to import 3.79 million broiler chicks from Thailand in September as a monthly temporary project, under which the import has been conducted starting from June, according to Myanmar Livestock Federation (MLF).

"Because of the coronavirus outbreak in April and May, the local broiler chicken breeders dropped the production of chicken because of decreasing demand. The COVID-19 outbreak is not worse in the country, and broiler poultry businesses are re-operated again. So, we have market demand, and we are planning to import the broiler chicks from Thailand," said MLF Vice-Chairman (3) Dr Nay Thurein.

The country will import 1.7 million broiler chicks for the third time from Thailand in one and a half months from 15 August to 30 September.

"The broiler chicks are imported nationwide. Myanmar imported 920,000 broiler chicks between 15 June and 15 July for the first time and 1.8 million broiler chicks between 15 July and 15 August for the second time. Now, the country targeted to import 1.7 million chicks for the third time from 15 August to 30 September. Later on, there will be sufficient supply of the broiler chicken in the country. Before that, we have to import them from other countries," he added.

The broiler chicks are imported from Thailand through the border areas because of the temporary suspension of airlines. In June, the chicken price has increased to K5,000 per viss from K4,000 per viss. These days, the chickens are sold for only K2,700 per viss in Yangon market and K3,100 per viss in Mandalay market. The production costs K2,800 per viss. With the increase of import volume of chicken in Yangon market, the price of chicken has reached below the production cost. Myanmar will ease the import volume of the chicks from Thailand after raising the domestic chicken production, he added.

"The broiler chicks cost around K700 per chicken. There are poultry farms in Yangon and Mandalay regions. The chicks are also distributed to other poultry farms in other states and regions. Later, the local incubators will be able to produce nearly 100 per cent to meet the local chick demand," he added.

The country produces 18 million chickens per month, mainly from Yangon and Mandalay.—Htet Htar Naing

Total border trade value exceeds US\$9.5 bln

THE total trade value at 18 border trade camps exceeded US\$9.56 billion from 1 October to 21 August in 2019-2020 financial year (FY), according to the Ministry of Commerce.

During this period, the total border trade value amounted to \$9.56 billion, an increase of \$334 million compared to that of the same period last year. The bor-

der trade value hit \$9.23 billionlast year.

The total border trade value included \$6.45 billion in export and \$3.11 billion in import. There are 18 border trade camps in Myanmar. The country carried out border trade with China, Thailand, Bangladesh and India.

Among all the border cross-

ings, the Muse border sees the enormous volume and value of border trade with an estimated cost of more than \$4.27 billion this FY followed by Hteekhee with \$1.84 billion and Myawady with \$1.08 billion.

Myanmar's major export items are farming, animal, marine, forest, mining, CMP and other products. Myanmar mainly imports capital goods, industrial raw materials, personal goods and CMP raw materials.

The total trade value is targeted to hit \$34 billion in 2019-2020FY while the export sector is estimated to reach US\$ 18 billion.—Zwe

ASEAN, China, Japan, S. Korea reaffirm commitment to actions against COVID-19 fallout

ECONOMIC ministers from the 10 members of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASE-AN), China, Japan and South Korea have reaffirmed their commitment to take collective actions in mitigating the economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Attending the 23rd ASEAN **Economic Ministers Plus Three** Consultations via video link on Friday, the ministers underscored the importance of bringing back business confidence to facilitate post-pandemic recovery, according to a joint media statement of the meeting.

They agreed to intensify coordinated efforts in promoting economic and social resilience in the region, including through signing of the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP) this year, said the statement.

Welcoming the progress on

the RCEP negotiations and the preparation for its signing this year, the ministers reiterated the significance of the deal's signing in enhancing confidence and strengthening the regional economic architecture, according to the statement.

The ministers resolved to ensure macroeconomic and financial stability by keeping the markets open for trade and investment and ensuring the supply chain connectivity, and reiterated the need for cooperative efforts to facilitate the essential movement of business people across borders, it said.

In enabling post-pandemic recovery, the ministers also recognized the importance of harnessing the opportunities of the digital economy by facilitating the cross-border transfer of information and data by electronic means, the statement said. — Xinhua





Canada economy takes record plunge but outlook bright

CANADA'S economy shrank at a record pace in the second quarter but by the end of the period showed signs of a rapid recovery from the pandemic trauma that forced businesses to close and put millions out of work.

At the same time, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's government ran up a Can\$120 billion (US\$90 billion) budget deficit dolling out emergency aid to Canadians, compared to a shortfall of Can\$85 million during the same period last year.

The economy contracted 11.5 per cent, or at an annualized pace of 38.7 per cent, in the three months ending June

ever, GDP surged 6.5 per cent

But, he added, "things were looking up by the end of the second quarter" with "solid momentum" continuing into July. Mendes also noted that Canadians' disposable income actually grew in the period as emergency government support more than offset a drag from a jump in unemployment. That drove the household savings rate up to 28 per cent, from seven per cent, "potentially leaving some extra cash for spending in upcoming periods," he said. — AFP ■

Peru extends coronavirus state of emergency

PERU on Friday extended its national emergency until September 30 and prolonged a lockdown in some of the areas worst affected by the coronavirus, the government said.

The South American country has one of the worst death rates in the world from Covid-19 deaths among its 33 million population.

In Latin America, it's second only to Brazil in terms of total infections, and trails Brazil and Mexico in deaths. The departments of Cusco, Moquegua, Puno and Tacna will remain in lockdown, as they have been since Peru started lifting restrictions in the rest of the country, including the capital Lima, from July 1.

Ending hunger and poverty amid COVID-19 impacts will require leveraging agricultural technology, innovation and partnerships

LOBAL hunger has been — on a regrettable rise in recent years, and despite Asia's economic clout, the continent – home to more than half of the world's undernourished - has not been spared. Now COVID-19 is leading to a slow-down of regional economic growth and further threatening food security.

Southern Asia is particularly vulnerable, with the number of chronically underfed people projected to rise by almost a third to 330 million by 2030. It is also the only subregion in the world, where more than half the children from the poorest fifth of society are stunted, a condition that prejudices their futures. But there are challenges all around: The Pacific Island States have the world's highest child wasting rates, and East Asia has the world's highest absolute costs for a healthy diet – one that goes beyond mere calorie counts to offer balanced nutrition. On top of that, Asia and the Pacific is the region where obesity and overweight, for children and adults, are growing faster than anywhere else.

We are facing two pandemics. COVID-19, which beyond its health toll is crushing livelihoods, and hunger, a scourge the international community pledged to eradicate by the end of this decade - the Sustainable Development Goal 2.

Tackling them will require new ideas and more robust political will. Past progress was sustained by the benign trickle-down effects of strong economies. This is not the case anymore.

For Covid-19, what is 'safe distancing'? It depends...

ONE metres or two? Or is it six? When it comes to coronavirus social distancing, there is no single rule of thumb, researchers cautioned this week in a study.

Indoors or outside; the velocity and pattern of air flows; whether one is whispering, shouting or sneezing; air conditioning or open windows; duration of exposure; whether one is wearing a mask -- all of these elements will determine how far is far enough when it comes to steering clear of Covid-19 infection.

"Rigid safe distancing rules are an oversimplification based on outdated science and experiences of past viruses," said lead author Nicholas Jones, a researcher at Saint Thomas Hospital in London.

"Instead of single, fixed physical distance rules, we propose graded recommendations that better reflect the multiple factors that combine to determine risk."

Around the world, living with Covid-19 has become a reality.

A widely available vaccine is months away at best, and the number of cases is on the rise again in many countries that had succeeded in bringing the epidemic under control.

But governments at all levels -- eager to avoid the lockdowns that devastated their economies are looking for ways to finetune policy responses in a middle ground

On Thursday, for example, France's prime minister -- flanked by his ministers of education and health -- outlined new measures that included mandatory mask wearing in Paris and its immediate suburbs, among other regions.

Previously, masks had been obligatory only in public transport, shops, and public buildings. Low- and high-risk scenarios

From the earliest days of the pandemic, experts have sharply debated what constitutes "safe" social distancing.

The World Health Organization (WHO) recommends "maintaining at least one metre (three feet) distance between yourself and others," and many national health authorities have issued

similar guidelines.

But experiments conducted in recent months suggest this may still be too close for comfort, at least in some circumstances.

"Eight out of 10 studies in a recent systematic review showed horizontal projection of respiratory droplets beyond two metres for particles up to 60 microns," Jones and colleagues noted in the BMJ, a medical journal.

In one study, droplets that could contain live virus were detected more than six metres from the source, a distance consistent with sneezing, coughing or vigorous singing.

These findings could explain the case of a choir practice in the United States in which a person carrying the SARS-CoV-2 virus infected 32 other singers -- with 20 other likely cases -- despite physical distancing.

US now says asymptomatic people don't need virus test after exposure

AFTER previously encouraging people without Covid-19 symptoms to get tested if they have been exposed to someone diagnosed with the virus, US health authorities have abruptly reversed their position without a clear explanation.

The changes in guidance were quietly made to the Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) website on Monday amid US media reports of political interference from the White House.

President Donald Trump has repeatedly said that the US should do less testing, and blamed testing for making it appear as though the country is doing poorly against the pandemic.

This is not true: though the US is testing at a high level, that is because its outbreak is worse than any other country in the world, with more than 5.8 million confirmed cases and almost 180,000 deaths.

The CDC's site previously said: "Testing is recommended for all close contacts of persons with SARS-CoV-2 infection.

"Because of the potential for asymptomatic and pre-symptomatic transmission, it is important that contacts of individuals with SARS-CoV-2 infection be quickly identified and tested."

The site now says: "If you have been in close contact (within 6 feet) of a person with a COVID-19 infection for at least 15 minutes but do not have symptoms, you do not necessarily need a test unless you are a vulnerable individual or your health care provider or State or local public health officials recommend you take one." **Fauci critical**

In a call with reporters, senior health department official Brett Giroir said, "The new guidelines are a CDC action.

As always, guidelines received appropriate attention, consultation and input from (coronavirus) Task Force experts."

Giroir did not elaborate on what new evidence had led to the guidance.

But he said that the documents had been seen by other

senior officials including the widely respected Anthony Fauci, who leads the National Institute of Allergies and Infectious Diseases.

Fauci later denied this, telling CNN: "I was under general anesthesia in the operating room and was not part of any discussion or deliberation regarding the new testing recommendations.

"I am concerned about the interpretation of these recommendations and worried it will give people the incorrect assumption that asymptomatic spread is not of great concern. In fact, it is," he added.

Fauci had surgery last Thursday to remove a vocal cord polyp.

The CDC has previously emphasized that between 40-50 per cent of people with Covid-19 are asymptomatic, and therefore getting tested is important to stop the spread of the virus.

Many other health experts also reacted with dismay.

"I still can't make sense of CDCgov change in guidance," tweeted Leana Wen, a professor at George Washington University and former health commissioner of Baltimore.— AFP ■

Nation plunges into recession with historic slump

SWITZERLAND has plunged into recession after the coronavirus pandemic caused a "historic" 8.2-per-cent slump in economic activity in the second quarter, official figures showed Thursday.

"In the second quarter, Switzerland's GDP (gross domestic product) suffered the biggest decline since records of quarterly data began in 1980," the economic affairs ministry (SECO) said in a statement.

During the first quarter, the wealthy Alpine nation's economy shrank 2.5 per cent compared to the previous quarter, it said, revising the figure slightly from the 2.6 per cent announced in June. Recession is defined as two

consecutive quarters of contraction.

SECO pointed out that Switzerland was by no way unique, with the global economy also in sharp recession as the pandemic rages worldwide.

To date, more than 820,000 people have died out of the some 24 million infected globally by the novel coronavirus.

SECO stressed that in Switzerland, which has seen over 1,700 deaths and more than 40,000 cases, the "GDP decline remained limited in an international comparison."

During the second quarter, Switzerland saw manufacturing slump nine per cent, with growth in the country's sizeable pharmaceutical industry preventing a steeper decline.

Exports of goods, excluding precious metals and other valuables, plunged 9.4 per cent.

Switzerland's service sector was meanwhile hit hardest by the measures taken to contain the pandemic, it said, with accommodation and food services for example plummeting over 54 per cent.—AFP

Hotel and casino group MGM Resorts lays off 18,000

HOTEL and casino giant MGM Resorts on Friday said 18,000 furloughed employees in the United States would be permanently laid off as the hospitality industry struggles amid the coronavirus pandemic.

"Federal law requires companies to provide a date of separation for furloughed employees who are not recalled within six months," CEO Bill Hornbuckle said in a letter seen by AFP. "Regrettably, August 31, marks the date of separation for thousands of MGM Resorts employees whom we have not yet been able to bring back." gust 22, the latest reported by the Labour Department, around one million people made new claims for unemployment benefits.

Bars, restaurants and hotels have been among the businesses hardest-hit by orders to close down to stop the disease's spread, and MGM closed all of its US properties on March 17, furloughing 62,000 of its 70,000 employees. Parts of the US have lifted those restrictions and some MGM workers have returned to their jobs as their casinos and hotels have reopened, but in his letter Hornbuckle said "our industry — and country - continues to be impacted by the pandemic, and we have not returned to full operating capacity."—AFP ■

India battles black market in used gloves and masks

INDIAN police are battling a booming black market in used face masks and surgical gloves scavenged in some cases from hospital refuse tips, as people scramble for cheap coronavirus protection.

Police in the western city of Navi Mumbai said Friday that they seized from one gang 3.8 million pieces of refurbished single-use surgical gloves that were washed, dried and packed ready for sale.

"They sourced nearly 35 tonnes of used gloves from different hospitals and were preparing to sell it to dealers at throwaway prices," investigating officer Subhash Nikam told AFP.

"They had managed to sell 6,000 to 10,000 pieces and were in touch with several buyers for the rest of the consignment," he said.

The four accused are facing initial charges of cheating and endangering lives by spreading a communicable disease.

Demand for personal protection equipment has soared in the country of 1.3 billion people, which on Friday saw the official tally of coronavirus infections hit 3.4 million with over 60,000 deaths.

Many experts say that with India not testing enough people and many deaths not properly recorded, the real toll could be considerably higher. Several antibody tests have borne this out.

Coca-Cola to cut 4,000 jobs after Covid-19 hits Q2 profits

COCA-COLA announced Friday it will cut 4,000 jobs in North America as part of a reorganization following a rough second quarter in which Covid-19 slashed profits.

As sporting events, theatres and entertainment all shut down to stop the spread of the coronavirus, the beverage maker suffered a 32 per cent plunge in net income to \$1.8 billion in the April-June period while sales fell 28 per cent to \$7.2 billion.

The iconic American brand, that owns dozens of juice, water and soft drink labels, said it plans to cut down to nine business units from 17 currently, but will offer severance packages to employees costing between \$350 million and \$550 million.

Bhutan lifts tobacco ban due to coronavirus

The remote Himalayan kingdom of Bhutan, known for embracing gross national happiness and outlawing television until 1999, has now made the unusual decision to reverse a ban on the sale of tobacco, blaming coronavirus.

The decision comes even though smoking is considered a sin in the mostly Buddhist country, where a tobacco control law was first passed in 1729 and the plant is believed to have grown from the blood of a demoness. The country of about 750,000 banned the sale, manufacture and distribution of tobacco in 2010 but allowed smokers to import controlled amounts of tobacco products after paying hefty duties and taxes -- sparking a thriving black market for cigarettes smuggled over the border from India. Paris masks up as European leaders warn virus fight getting tougher

MASKS became compulsory outdoors all over Paris on Friday as France joined a growing global battle against new virus outbreaks, while Germany warned the crisis will be "more difficult" in the autumn and winter.

There has been a surge of infections in many countries as well as a rising global death toll, which now stands at more than 832,000.

In the worst-hit United States, where there are more

"The epidemic is gaining ground, and now is the time to intervene." On Thursday, official data showed 6,111 confirmed new cases in 24 hours nationwide, a record since the end of France's lockdown in May, and French leaders said they cannot exclude out a new stay-at-home rule.

EU could sanction Turkey if no progress on Mediterranean crisis

BRUSSELS — The EU on Friday warned Turkey it could face fresh sanctions -- including tough economic measures -- unless progress is made in reducing soaring tensions with Greece and Cyprus in the eastern Mediterranean.

EU diplomatic chief Josep Borrell said the bloc wanted to give "a serious chance to dialogue" but was steadfast in its support for member states Greece and Cyprus in the crisis, which has raised fears of a military standoff.

A dispute over maritime

borders and gas drilling rights has reignited the long-running rivalry between Athens and Ankara, with the two neighbours staging rival naval drills.

EU foreign ministers meeting for talks in Berlin agreed to a request from Cyprus to sanction more individuals for their role in Turkey's exploratory drilling in waters claimed by the island.

Borrell urged Ankara to "abstain from unilateral actions" as a basic condition to allow dialogue -- which Germany is trying to broker -- to advance.

"We agreed that in the ab-

sence of progress in engaging Turkey we could develop a list of further restrictive measures that could be discussed at the European Council on September 24 and 25," Borrell said after the talks.

Asked what these measures might entail, Borrell said sanctions could be extended to ships or other assets involved in the drilling, as well as prohibiting the use of EU ports and supplies and restricting "economic and financial infrastructure related with this activity". —AFP■

Riot in southern Sweden after anti-Muslim Danish leader banned

MALMO — Protesters threw stones at police and burned tyres in southern Sweden late on Friday, authorities said, hours after an anti-Muslim Danish politician was blocked from attending a Koran-burning rally nearby.

About 300 people were on the streets of Malmo with violence escalating as the evening wore on, according to police and local media.

The demonstration was connected to an incident earlier in the day in which protesters burned a copy of the Islamic holy book, police spokesman Rickard Lundqvist told Swedish tabloid Expressen.

Rasmus Paludan, who leads the far-right Danish anti-immigration party Hard Line, was due to travel to Malmo to speak at that event, which was being held on the same day as weekly prayers for the Muslim sabbath. But authorities pre-empted Paludan's arrival by announcing he had been banned from entering Sweden for two years. He was later arrested near Malmo.

"We suspect that he was going to break the law in Sweden," Calle Persson, spokesman for the police in Malmo told AFP.

"There was also a risk that his behaviour... would pose a threat to society."

But his supporters went ahead with the rally, and three people were then arrested for inciting racial hatred.

Paludan later put up a scathing message on Facebook.

"Sent back and banned from Sweden for two years. However, rapists and murderers are always welcome!" he wrote.

Paludan last year attracted media attention for burning a Koran wrapped in bacon - a meat that is anathema for Muslims.—AFP

Brazilian Supreme Court of Justice suspends Rio de Janeiro governor from office over alleged corruption

RIO DE JANEIRO – The Brazilian Supreme Court of Justice (STJ) announced on Friday that it has suspended Rio de Janeiro Governor Wilson Witzel from office following reports of alleged corruption. According to the STJ, Witzel and eight people have been accused of involvement in a corruption scandal, including Witzel's wife, Helena Witzel, and the former presidential candidate and current national president of the Social Christian Party (PSC), Pastor Everaldo Pereira.

The Attorney-General's Office reported that Witzel and the eight others accused had created an alleged scheme to embezzle funds meant to aid in the state's fight against the COVID-19 pandemic.

In May, Witzel and his wife were also the subjects of a police investigation into fraudulent contracts used in the construction of field hospitals. This operation resulted in the arrest of a former federal deputy and a businessman close to the Witzels.—AFP

ROME — It survived the advent of DVDs and the internet

era of instant gratification. Now Rome's last remaining adult cinema says it is sure to also overcome its latest challenge as it grapples with coronavirus.

Discreetly tucked away between upmarket apartments and hotels, a stone's throw from the Italian capital's main train station, the "Ambasciatori" continues to show its vintage pornographic films to the delight of

its customers.

In early March when Italy shuttered against the devastating pandemic, its movie houses closed too, and the Ambasciatori was no exception.

But after Rome eased its lockdown restrictions over the summer, the adult landmark once again opened for business with social distancing measures in place.

Outside its presence is advertised by a simple sign that

says "Cine" (Cinema), but stepping inside, a red poster sets the tone – "Sexy movie, adults only". It promises customers a selection of "cult productions" and the "best stars in the history of hard cinema". "We will survive Covid," Carlo, the Ambasciatori's supervisor and cinema manager, tells AFP, declining to give his full name. "A lot of customers are calling us to find out when they can come back," he adds. — AFP ■

Huge Indonesia mine resumes operations after lockdown protest

JAYAPURA — Operations have resumed at the world's biggest gold mine in Indonesia, the company that runs it said Saturday, after workers blocked access to the site in protest at being stopped from visiting their families over virus concerns.

The miners at the Grasberg complex in the country's easternmost Papua region reached an agreement with the USbased operator Freeport, which said it would resume bus services for workers to return home. This week more than 1,000 employees demonstrated at the mine's main entrance over the decision to cancel bus services to the city of Timika in response to fears about the spread of coronavirus infections.

Many workers had

been unable to leave the site -- a high-altitude open pit that is also a major copper mine -- for six months.

Freeport spokesman Riza Pratama told AFP Saturday that the road-

block had been removed after a long negotiation period. Several buses departed from the mine late Friday, carrying some workers who had been granted a leave of absence,

said local company spokesman Kerry Yarangga.

These bus services will be run with stringent health protocols including Covid-19 testing, Yarangga said.—AFP ■

China starts trial run of online int'l LNG trade

SHANGHAI — Shanghai Petroleum and Natural Gas Exchange (SHPGX), a national energy trading

centre, started the trial run of its online platform for international liquefied natural gas (LNG) trading

on Friday. China's oil giants Sinopec and CNOOC respectively reached LNG purchase deals with their foreign counterparts through the trading platform, with total trading volume at 130,000 tonnes.

Given China's market size and weight in the sector, China is well placed to establish a liquid and relevant market for LNG, said Laurent Vivier, president for the gas division of Total.

As China's largest LNG importer, CNOOC will actively participate in the online trading, and will support more domestic new players in the natural gas sector to enter the international market, said Wu Wenlai, chairman of CNOOC Gas and Power Group.

With the establishment of the national oil and gas pipeline company China Oil & Gas Pipeline Network Corporation (PipeChina), China has accelerated market-oriented reforms over its oil and gas market, creating favourable conditions for the launch of the online international LNG trading business, noted Ye Guobiao, chairman of the SHPGX.—Xinhua

JAL tests new contactless tech for check-in to ease virus concern

TOKYO — Japan Airlines Co. has recently introduced self service checkin machines equipped with motion sensors, which enable customers to complete procedures without touching the screen, to help prevent coronavirus infection.

Through the use of infrared technology, which captures finger motion, customers are able to make their selections by holding their finger 3 centimetres away from the screen. Two touchless kiosks are available at Tokyo's Haneda airport Terminal 1 during the trial period through Sept. 15, JAL said.

The device allows users to scroll through texts and press digital buttons by simply moving their fingers in front of the screen as they would do with a conventional touch panel, according to the airline, who said ground staff are available nearby for guidance.

JAL said it will consider whether to fully introduce the touchless checkin kiosks based on user response and feedback. The device was developed by Mitsubishi Electric Information Systems Corp. and Oki Electric Industry Co.

"We will make every effort so passengers feel safe in this difficult time with the new coronavirus," a company spokeswoman said.—Kyodo 🔳

Chinese airlines' losses mitigated by domestic travel

BEIJING — China's biggest airline on Saturday reported less severe losses in the second quarter as domestic travel picks up with the coronavirus outbreak brought largely under control.

The country where the disease first emerged last year has reported no new deaths since May -allowing for a tentative return of business and tourist travel within its borders, even as the virus wreaks havoc elsewhere. China Southern Airlines, the nation's largest carrier in terms of passenger numbers, posted losses of 2.9 billion yuan (\$422 million) in April-June, compared with 5.3 billion yuan in the first quarter from January

to March. "The Covid-19 pandemic has exerted a long-term and profound impact globally," the company said in its results announcement, predicting further uncertainty. But "the aviation market in China will be the first to rebound, and the overall trend of recoverv and development is

prosperous", it said, noting a "strong potential demand for passenger travel" if the virus is suppressed.

Flag carrier Air China reported total first-half losses of 9.4 billion yuan, with the second-quarter loss of 4.6 billion only slightly lower than 4.8 billion posted in the first quarter.—AFP ■

Crocodile conservation in Myanmar

WERYBODY in Myanmar is familiar with the crocodile named Nga Moe Yeik via videos, Zat Pwe (traditional theatrical performance) and other entertainment since their childhood. I knew nothing regarding the crocodiles even though I am a graduate in Zoology. I became

to know a little about crocodiles when I arrive at Thaketa Crocodile Farm.

The Nga Moe Yeik crocodile is very interesting because it is the wildest aquatic animal. They ate fish, prawn, tortoises and sharks and other huge animals, and are sometimes harmful to human beings. They can be seen at freshwater and saltwater regions near Bogale in Ayeyawady Region. Now, they become an endangered species. The Department of Fisheries under the Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation established a crocodile farm. It is located in Mya Khwar Nyo

The crocodile breeding industry began in 1968-1969 in Myanmar, and Thaketa Crocodile Farm was launched in May 1978 and operated as a recreation centre to the public since 6 November 1997.

Thaketa crocodile farm was established with the aims of ensuring more extended existence of the crocodiles, becoming a site of relaxing and seeking knowledge for local and foreign travellers and ensuring public participation in the wildlife conservation.

There are 547 crocodiles of

more than 240 million years.

They can be seen in Africa, Australia, America, Bangladesh, Brunei, Myanmar, Cambodia, China, India, Indonesia, Malaysia, Papua New Guinea, the Philippines, Singapore, Sri Lanka, Solomon Islands, Thailand and Viet Nam and sometimes in Japan. There are about 27 species of crocodiles but only 23 species are found -14 kinds of crocodile species, 8 of alligator species and 2 of gavial species.

The SaltWater Crocodile, Nga Moe Yeik can live for 70 to 100 years and the size of male crocodile is bigger than female. Male crocodile is 13 ft in average length and the female is about 10 ft in length. They become adults when they

different ages. It is the figure compiled on 3 August 2020. The farm breed only Crocodylus porosus (Saltwater Crocodile) and they are called Nga Moe Yeik crocodiles or Than Thu Mar crocodiles.

The crocodile species found in Myanmar are Crocodylus porosus, Crocodylus polustris and Graviails gangeticus and Crocodylus siamensis.

They are amphibious carnivores with long bodies and have been in existence since reach about 8 ft. Nga Moe Yeik crocodiles are kinds of alligator species and the length of head is one-seventh of their total length. They mate in February and lay eggs in April. A female crocodile lays 20 to 70 eggs which incubate after 90 days. A baby crocodile is about

temperature is lower or higher, eggs usually hatch into females. Saltwater Crocodiles are the most expensive animals in the world and their skins are used in producing clothes and bags. The World Wildlife Fund (WWF) bans the sale of crocodiles.

The Nga Moe Yeik crocodiles are the most dangerous animals for the human beings and the crocodile attack oc-

curred in Bogale township.

Those who want to see the Nga Moe Yeik crocodiles should go to the Thaketa Crocodiles Farm individually or together with the family members and can feed the crocodiles.

The entrance fees range from K500 for locals and K1,000 for foreigners. The children under five are free of charge. There are places to park cars, motorcycles and bicycles. In conclusion, Myanmar boasts for its ability to conserve the endangered crocodiles to date. Although dinosaurs and Homo Sapiens emerged at the same time, dinosaurs gradually disappeared due to the lack of conservation. So, all people should participate in conservation of Nga Moe Yeik crocodiles.

Liverpool finished 18 points ahead of second placed City last season as they won the English title for the first time since 1990.

And Klopp conceded Liverpool's bid to retain the Premier League crown would clearly be under threat if Messi joined City.

Commuters On Bilses

PEOPLE in different uniform badges, holding their packed lunchboxes in their hands are waiting for buses. They are going home. Recently, it is always overcast with high showers all the time in all parts of Yangon. After a long wait, the bus, already packed with the passengers, arrives on the scene. Setting aside the hope to get a seat on the bus, the first thing you must do is elbow your way in the crowd to set your feet in this bus. Waiting for another bus will take 25 minutes or so. Everyone knows that the evening is the most traffic- congested hours in Yangon.

The bus driver has to drive carefully. The bus is so heavy with passengers and the road is slippery because of the heavy rain. Under the threat of Covid-19, all people wear masks, of course, but they have to stay really close so that more commuters like them can get home early. This is the kind of condition that most Yangon populace are used to; however, for ones who are just settled in Yangon for life improvements, it must be quite unusual for them. Some of them wear a sulky face, expressing they are losing their temper.

As the journey proceeds, the bus is more crowded with passengers. Those who have reached their destination find it hard to get off the bus from the exit. Anyway, they hustle through the crowd to get themselves out. The route is such an uneven ground as everyone might not feel comfortable being in this situation. Suddenly, at one bus-stop, a woman carrying a seemingly heavy basket shoves herself to get on to the bus and another woman helps her carry her basket as she has got stuck near the entrance. Taung Byone Nat Festival in Wagaung

HOUGH Myanmar Traditional Monthly Festivals do not include Taung Byone Nat Festival of Wagaung [ဝါခေါင်]. This Nat festival is more well-known at home and abroad. So we may make an academic study of it as follows. There are 37 nats in Myanmar Pantheon. Of them the first Thagyar Nat was Hindu deity or deva Thunder god. The remaing 36 were Myanmar nats. Myanmar 36 nats were not born deva nats. They were human heros and heroines, kings, queens, soldiers, sportsmen who became nat spirits due to violent deaths by assassination, execution, child birth, fatal accidents or killed by snake or tiger. Their spirits wandered until they got resting places.

In the order of 36 nats Taung Byone Min Nyi Naung [Elder and Younger] brother well known as Shwe Pyin Nge Naung originated in the lime of King Anawrahta [A.D 1044-1066]. The founder of First Myanmar Empire. The Shwe Pyin Nyi Naung were two sons of Byatta, king's equestrian forester and flower seller Mei Wunna of Mt Popa 30 miles away from Bagan Capital.

Nga Htwe Yu, the toddy palm climber, Nga Lone Let Phe, the ploughs man and Nyaung U Pe, the great Swimmer were selected by king Anawrahta to be his knights event. So these four and Byatta formed commanders of royal Land Forces. When Byatta was executed for his secret marriage with flower seller Mei Wunna and their two sons Shwe Pyin Nyi Naung sons were taken adopted as his grandsons. Mei Wunna died of broke heart. She becameal Popa Mei daw Nat.

The two Shwe Hpin brothers accompanied King Anawrahta who visited Sacred Tooth Relic Chamber in China. The two brothers served the king bravely and faithfully. On return home Anawrahta stayed for some time at Taung byone, north of Mandalay. There he built Su Taung Pyi Zedi in which he enshrined religious relics presented by his Chinese emperor U Di Bwa. By royal order every member of royal entourage was required to contribute one brick, one tin of sand and one coconut shell of water in the building of Pagoda.

But two adopted grandsons Shwe pyin gyi and Shwe pyin nge forgot to carry out the royal order as they were courting Ma Shwe Oo, the beauty village girl of that place. When the king found his two adopted grands on disobeyed his order, he punished them. But the executioner flaked then needs to death. So they became nat spirits King Anawrahta built nat shrine near the Pagoda. Some rice fields were donated to Pagoda and some to two nat brothers for holding their nat festival at the time of Pagoda Festival. Who are the believers of Taung Byone Nat and goers of that Festivals.

First, the very first nat mediums and their descendants. They have been holding Taung Byone Festival till today.

Secondly, believers and propitiates. You propitiate the two nat broth us and if your propitiations or prayers are answered. You have to but fill your promise of presents to the nat brothers clothing, food, money, other presents.

Visual artists and performing artists are belivers including Bingers dances, musicians, film stars etc. People whose professions are risky such as soldiers, air pilots, seamen.

mariners etc. They visit Taung Byone nat festivals and make profitable bring back whatever nat brothers give them to keep as amulet. Next are the majority they are effeminates who dress like women, sing and dance. They say they are possessed by nat brothers and they danced and sing.

The last but nat the least are the gays from all over the world. Regard less of their race, religion, social status, they come to this festival status, they come to this festival without fail and enjoy all their gay activities. Open gay, hidden gay, active gay passive gays. Freedom permitted by Taung Byone nat festival is boundless permitted but within the limit of law. Among believers are included educated classes, foreigners from all countries. Doctors, engineers, professor dentists at etc ... Politian's teachers, UN officials. The writer of this article had the chance of accompanying the wife of one UN officer in Myanmar. They were from Denmark. The wife was a believer in Hindu Gods. She believed in Ramayana, Maha ba rata. They applied for transfer to Myanmar because the wife wanted to study Taung byone nats. The writer was assigned to accompany them to Taung byone festival. We put up at Mandalay Hotel and by car we visited Taung Byone 2 days ahead.

Oh! Dr. Khin Maung Nyunt I had a wonderful time doing with two brothers. The two nat brothers gave one costly long silk longyi to the husband and one long silk hlunei and scarf to the lady. She participated in all festivals of days.

On return to Yangon this Dane Lady has become a confined Nat Ka Daw, Nat median. She much images of two brothers held consecration nat to be brought with. The writer come to know that she became Taung Byone nat telling earning many in her country. One officer from U.S counsellor office in Mandalay went to visited with his friends from Mandalay University. Joking by or testing he propitiated two nat brothers.





The portmanteau words are being used in formal speech and in writing. We ought to use them in conformity with the subjects or fields or science or some technologies. We must learn the definitions and meanings of portmanteau words by heart. First, learn them. Then use them in the specific sentences correctly. As you can see, there are thousands of English words in English language and new words are being added to the existing words in the dictionaries constantly. Moreover, the slang expressions (informal usages) may be included in these new coinages. Nevertheless, we can use the coinages which are suitable for formal speech and writing.
