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Overseas Employment Supervisory Committee discusses migrant workers issues

THE Overseas Employment Supervisory Committee held its (1/2021) coordination meeting at the Ministry of Labour, Immigration and Population yesterday.

During the meeting, Committee Chairman Union Minister U Myint Kyaing discussed the establishment of a committee to ensure the safe sending of Myanmar migrant workers to foreign countries and protection for the rights of those working

in foreign countries.

The committee was reorganized with 18 members with Notification No (87/2021) of the State Administration Council on 1-4-2021.

The ministry grants permit to the overseas employment agencies according to the 1999 Overseas Employment Law. The agencies mainly send the Myanmar workers to Thailand, Malaysia, Korea, Japan, Singapore, the UAE, Qatar,

Macau and Jordan. The government sent 1,320,914 Myanmar migrant workers to foreign countries from 1990 to March 2021. Although the processes of overseas employment were suspended on 18 March 2020 due to the outbreak of COVID-19, the government sent 4,169 workers to Japan and 225 workers to Korea, depending on their demand.

Moreover, Singapore sent Demand Letters. The officials permitted 25 workers to work

abroad on 11 April 2021 in line with the health rules.

The overseas employment training courses were conducted at Skills Training Centre (Yangon) and (Mandalay) starting 9 January 2017 for those who want to work in foreign countries to be able to know about the countries where they go to, labour law and occupational safety. But these pieces of training were temporarily closed on 1 September 2020.

The Union Minister said the ministry increased the agencies fees to K25 million from K5 million to be licenced overseas employment agencies full of responsibilities and accountabilities starting 4 February 2020 and eliminating the substandard agencies.

He also highlighted the repatriation of 1,086 Myanmar nationals from Malaysia in three military vessels on 23 February 2021

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Central Bank of Myanmar Press Release

27 April 2021

1. As some riots and terror acts happen in some areas of the country, people are worried about the safety of cash in hand.
2. If the people wish to entrust their cash to the banks, they will be allowed to open new bank accounts at the banks as of 3 May 2021 to authorize their money. If they wish to take out the cash from the new bank accounts, they will be allowed to take out cash from the entrusted amount without limit.
3. Those who opened the accounts at the banks before 3 May 2021 will be allowed to take out cash in line with the original restrictions adopted by the Central Bank of Myanmar. Arrangements are underway to ease such restrictions.

3. Efforts will be made to recover businesses that faced loss caused by COVID-19 in various ways as quickly as possible.
4. Emphasis will be placed on restoring eternal peace in the entire nation in line with agreements from the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement (NCA) as much as possible.
5. When missions will be accomplished in accord with provisions of the state of emergency, a free and fair multiparty democracy election will be held in accordance with the Constitution (2008), and further tasks will be undertaken to hand over State duty to the winning party meeting the standards of democracy.

Statement for civil service personnel taken action for participation in CDM activity for various reasons

1. Civil service personnel are well operating the whole State machinery. However, political and economic systems and governments were changed, and civil service personnel have to manage the State machinery alive constantly. Some of them were taken action under the provisions of the Civil Service Personnel Law and rules for failures in service personnel code of conduct, breaking disciplines and absence in duty, and some personnel were taken action under the law for their acts or criminal commitments based on their lack of responsibility.

2. Some service personnel of those taken actions participated in the CDM activities intending to undermine the

State. Some service personnel were also taken action to participate in the CDM activity for utilizing their emotional moods, pressure, threats and coercion by those from their environs, worries for suffering social punishment that can discredit the human prestige and concerns for unexpected situations.

3. Some civil service personnel taken action for participation in the CDM activities did not take part in the riots and terrorist acts. If they submit the report to re-discharge duty as civil service personnel as they participated in the activities for one of the above-mentioned reasons, taking action against them will be lifted under the criminal process based on the fol-

lowing facts.

(a) recommendations of the heads of relevant service organizations that those service personnel were satisfied with their past duty assignments and they would be appropriate for more assignments

(b) remarks and recommendations of relevant region administrative bodies and prosecution organizations for whether educating and warning those service personnel for writing and expression on the social networks can be controlled continuously or not and whether they participated in the riots and terror acts

(c) the promise of those ser-

vice personnel

4. By reviewing the action taken against those service personnel, arrangements will be made as follows:-

(a) as those departmental personnel taken action under the Civil Service Personnel Law have the rights to appeal their cases within six months, they will be allowed to discharge State duty by easing the punishment depending on further scrutiny because they can continuously contribute to nation-building tasks

(b) Action taken against the personnel under Section 505 (a) or 505-a of the Criminal Procedure for their activities

and absence amounting to crime will be withdrawn, and punishment will be eased under the Civil Service Personnel Rules so as to allow them to discharge State duties

5. As such, information was released that it is necessary to consider the civil service personnel who were taken action for participation in the CDM activities due to suffering from utilization over sensitive emotion, pressure, threats and coercion from environs, worries for facing social punishment and other unexpected situation to be able to re-discharge State duties.

Handover ceremony of COVID Fund held in Nay Pyi Taw

THE handover ceremony of the COVID Fund took place at the Ministry of Planning, Finance and Industry in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday.

Chairman of Fund Management Subcommittee on the Purchase of COVID-19 Vaccines Union Minister U Win Shein, subcommittee members, deputy ministers, department heads, five K100 million and above and two K10 million donors attended the ceremony.

One of the well-wishers explained the donations.

Then, the Union Minister talked about establishing Fund Management Subcommittee on 30 December 2020 that opened COVID-19 Vaccination Fund at Myanmar Economic Bank (Nay Pyi Taw) with Myanmar Currency and Foreign Currency Accounts. The purpose of fund-raising is to purchase adequate COVID-19 vaccines and to use them effectively for all entire people.

The government set up the fund with an initial sum of K1 billion and \$250 million. It also drafted the financial management procedures to use the fund

systematically. Currently, the processes are being carried out in line with these procedures.

The Union minister also highlighted the methods for cash contribution announced on 10 and 18 January issues of state-run newspapers, broadcasting programmes of received cash donation at Myanmar Currency and Foreign Currency accounts via MRTV and state-run news-

papers. It received K29,784,250,115.39 and \$3,140,149.53 between 6 January and 23 April and so there is a total of K30,784,250,115.39 and \$253,140,149.53 including the state-funding.

The government used \$75 million to purchase 30 million units of Indian made Covishield on 7 January 2021, and so it left \$178,140,149.53 in Foreign

Currency Account. There are a total of 10,093 donors between 6 January and 23 April, and the certificates of honour are given to the well-wishers who donate K100,000 and above according to their desires.

The first handover ceremony was held on 22 January, and certificates of honour were presented to eight well-wishers who donated K10 million and above.

The Union Minister also added the places to issue the certificates of honour, effective use of COVID-19 fund and plan to inspect expenditure.

The Union Minister then expressed words of thanks to the local and foreign donors and subcommittee on behalf of the Central Committee on Prevention, Control and Treatment of COVID-19. — MNA

A MYANMAR delegation led by U Than Aung Kyaw, Deputy Minister for Investment and Foreign Economic Relations virtually participated on the occasion of the 77th Session of the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (UNESCAP) which is being held from 26 to 29 April, 2021.

The theme topic of the session is “Building back better from crises through regional cooperation in the Asia and the Pacific”.

The opening session was held on 26th April. Heads of respective organizations from United Nations, ECOSOC and UNESCAP made opening addresses and the leaders and heads of governments from member countries in Asia-Pacific Region gave the policy statements for building back better from the crises.

On 27th April, the Deputy Minister for Investment and Foreign Economic Relations delivered the Country Statement under the Country statement session. Deputy Minister

highlighted the implementation of the Myanmar Sustainable Development Plan (MSDP) towards SDGs achievement, implementation of COVID-19 Economic Relief Plan (CERP) and formulation of Myanmar Economic Recovery Plan (MERP) as transitional plan. UNION Minister for Construction U Shwe Lay, accompanied by commander of the Military Operations Command Colonel Thaw Zin Oo, inspected roads

in Monghsat town and the current condition of the Monghsat-Tachilek section and the paved section of the concrete roadway on 26 April.

During the inspection tour, the Union Minister said the Monghsat-Tachilek road is an important connecting road to the border towns. The roads and bridges

must be in good condition for the active flow of goods. He instructed them to widen the curves to make it safer for vehicles and erect directional warning signs according to the regulations as it is a winding mountain road and to provide roadside drainage systematically to prevent water from flowing into the road.

Afterwards, the Union Minister and party arrived at Tachilek and, along with the Tachilek District Administration Body's Chairman, inspected the No (2) Myanmar-Thailand Friendship Bridge. The officials from the Bridge Task Force (12) of the Department of Bridge explained the construction of bridges on the Tachilek detour, the availability of funds for each financial

year and future plans, paving of the detour according to the financial year and coordination of land issues encountered in carrying out the work and projects for further coordination with landowners.

The Union Minister said the construction work of the bridge on the detour road in Tachilek needs to focus on the timely completion and quality of the part of the bridge. He urged them to submit to the Shan State Administration Council and to coordinate regarding the land compensation issues and the remaining works to be carried out as per the specified road features. He also inspected the construction of the bridge and the condition of the detour. — MNA

Nationwide case management supervision unit (NCMSU) holds meeting

THE Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement held a Nationwide Case Management Supervision Unit (NCMSU) coordination meeting in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday.

Union Minister Dr Thet Thet Khine, Directors General and Deputy Directors-General from the departments and Social Welfare Department officials from the Nay Pyi Taw Council, regions and states joined the meeting virtually.

At the meeting, Union Minister Dr Thet Thet Khine said it is necessary to continue to produce more case managers to cover the whole country. The Department must provide the support needed for the case managers as

the case management is giving service to each and every person.

The Standard Operations Guidelines were introduced for the first time in 2015 to enable case managers to be more systematic in their implementation. In 2019, a working guide was issued to address not only child issues but also gender-based violence.

The Union Minister said 3,360 cases of children had been solved in the six years since the case management was started, including 1,466 cases of children facing lawsuit and 1,168 cases of sexual abuse.

The Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement is also liaising with other relevant

ministries depending on the child cases as per the responsibilities of the National Committee on the Rights of the Child (NCRC) under the Ministry's policy and liaison

with other relevant ministries.

The NCMSU was formed on 28 October 2020 in order to be able to quickly and easily collect information on operations by the

modern changing system and to be able to manage under the working mechanism of the Union Government.

The Union Minister urged to openly discuss the business needs and challenges encountered in order to make joint plans to strengthen the implementation activities. The meeting discussed the implementation done by the NCMSU, coordination with relevant departments and organizations and future plans to integrate into the Social Welfare Management Information System (SMIS) to be implemented by the Department in order to organize information together and future implementation plans. — MNA

The Union Election Commission has inspected the withdrawal/receipt/use/remaining of ballot papers used for Pyithu Hluttaw Election of Mohnyin, Moegaung and Mansi townships of Kachin State together with the respective township election sub-commission, head of police force, Immigration and Population and administrators in accordance with Section 53 of the Hluttaw Election Law.

4. According to the inspection, a total of 215 polling stations in these three townships took out 344,352 ballots and used 214,456 ballots. It left 129,890 ballots instead of 129,896 ballots. Students at both levels should choose the best ways of their own accord without attachment. They should assess the benevolence of creating the learning opportunities, and they have to analyze knowledge obtained from the university education.

All in all, while the government is creating good learning environs, students should grasp the learning opportunity without fail in order to be able to shape a peaceful and prosperous country.

New UN-led global immunization push aims to save more than 50 million lives

A UN-led global immunization strategy was unveiled on Monday to reach more than 50 million children who have missed lifesaving jabs against diseases such as measles, yellow fever and diphtheria, in large part because of COVID-19 disruption.

“EVEN before the pandemic, there were worrying signs that we were beginning to lose ground in the fight against preventable child illness, with 20 million children already missing out on critical vaccinations”, said Henrietta Fore, UN Children’s Fund (UNICEF) Executive Director.

According to UNICEF, disruption caused by the COVID-19 pandemic at the beginning of 2020 meant that vaccine deliveries fell from 2.29 billion in 2019, to just over two billion vaccine doses last year.

“The pandemic has made a bad situation worse, causing millions more children to go immunized”, Ms Fore maintained. “Now that vaccines are at the forefront of everyone’s minds, we must sustain this energy to help every child catch up on their measles, polio and other vaccines. We have no

time to waste. Lost ground means lost lives.”

Echoing that message, World Health Organization (WHO) Director-General Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus along with partner GAVI, the Vaccine Alliance, urged universal access to immunization and far greater investment

in primary health care to support mass jab drives.

“Vaccines will help us end the COVID-19 pandemic but only if we ensure fair access for all countries, and build strong systems to deliver them”, he said.

According to the UN health agency, immunization services

have started to recover from the disruption caused by COVID-19 restrictions in 2020.

But a WHO survey indicated that more than one-third of respondent countries still report problems delivering routine jabs.

228 million at risk Today, 60 lifesaving mass

vaccination campaigns have been postponed in 50 countries, putting around 228 million people - mostly children - at risk for diseases such as measles, yellow fever and polio, WHO warned.

More than half of the 50 affected countries are in Africa, while measles campaigns have seen most disruption, accounting for 23 postponed vaccination drives, affecting an estimated 140 million people.

“Many of these (measles) campaigns have been delayed for over a year”, WHO noted, warning that failure to protect against this highly contagious disease risks large outbreaks wherever people are unvaccinated.

Serious measles outbreaks have already been reported in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Pakistan and Yemen as a result of gaps in vaccination coverage, WHO said, at the start of World

Immunization Week 2021.

These outbreaks are happening in places already grappling with conflict situations as well as service disruptions due to ongoing response measures to COVID-19.

Lifesaving resource

The world has vaccines to prevent more than 20 life-threatening diseases, helping people of all ages live longer, healthier lives - as is their right - according to the Immunization Agenda 2030 strategy to support recovery from COVID-19 disruptions. “Strong immunization systems will be needed to ensure that people everywhere are protected against COVID-19 and other diseases” over the next decade, the campaign’s website explained, underscoring the savings and economic returns made by investing in vaccination programmes for individuals, communities and countries.

COVID-19 situation in India ‘beyond heartbreaking’: WHO chief

The World Health Organization chief voiced alarm on Monday (Apr 26) at India’s record-breaking wave of COVID-19 cases and deaths, saying the organisation was rushing to help address the crisis.

“THE situation in India is beyond heartbreaking,” Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus told reporters.

He spoke as India battles a catastrophic coronavirus wave that has overwhelmed hospitals, with crematoriums working at full capacity.

A surge in recent days has seen patients’ families taking to social media to beg for oxygen supplies and locations of available hospital beds, and has forced the capital New Delhi to extend a week-long lockdown.

“WHO is doing everything we can, providing critical equipment and supplies,” Tedros said.

He said the UN health agency was among other things sending “thousands of oxygen concentrators, prefabricated mobile field hospitals and laboratory supplies”.

The WHO also said it had transferred more than 2,600 of its experts from various programmes, including polio and tuberculosis, to work with Indian

health authorities to help respond to the pandemic.

The country of 1.3 billion has become the latest hotspot of a pandemic that has killed more than 3 million people worldwide, even as richer countries take steps towards normality with accelerating vaccination programmes.

The US and Britain rushed ventilators and vaccine materials to help India weather the crisis, while a range of other countries also pledged support.

GLOBAL SURGE Since the virus that causes COVID-19 first surfaced in China in late 2019, the disease has killed more than 3.1 million people out of at least 147 million infected, according to a tally from official sources compiled by AFP.

Tedros on Monday lamented that global new case numbers have been rising for the past nine weeks straight.

“To put it in perspective,” he said, “there were almost as many cases globally last week as in the

first five months of the pandemic.”

The United States remains the worst-affected country, with some 572,200 deaths and over 32 million infections, followed by Brazil and Mexico.

But India, in fourth place, has in recent days been driving the global caseload.

The country, which has recorded over 195,000 deaths, registered 2,812 new deaths and 352,991 new infections on Monday alone - its highest tolls since the start of the pandemic.

“The exponential growth that we’ve seen in case numbers is really, truly astonishing,” Maria Van Kerkhove, the WHO’s technical lead on COVID-19, told reporters.

She warned that India was not unique, pointing out that a number of countries had seen “similar trajectories of increases in transmission”.

“This can happen in a number of countries ... if we let our guard down,” she said.

“We’re in a fragile situation.”

COVAX HIT

Meanwhile, the Indian crisis has taken a toll on the Covax programme aimed at providing equitable access to COVID-19 vaccines, with a particular focus on 92 poorer nations.

Prior to the surge, India was exporting tens of millions of AstraZeneca shots made domestically by the Serum Institute through Covax, which is co-run by the WHO, the Gavi vaccine alliance and the Coalition for Epidemic Preparedness Innovations (CEPI).

But once cases started surging, New Delhi froze exports - including to Covax - to prioritise India.

This has left Covax short 90 million doses that had been intended for 60 low-income countries in March and April, the WHO and Gavi said.

“Those have not been made available given the crisis in India. Now they’re being used domestically,” Gavi chief Seth Berkley told the briefing.

Covax, he said, was “looking at other options” while waiting for the supplies to resume.

Among other things, the Covax partners have appealed to countries that have excess vaccine doses to share them with the programme.

Berkley said that it was “early

Lawsuit filed against former Yangon region minister for energy, industry, transport and communications under anti-corruption law

ACCORDING to the complaint, the Anti-Corruption Commission set up an investigation team to investigate the alleged misconduct of Daw Nilar Kyaw, former Yangon Region minister for Energy, Industry, transport and Communications and take necessary action under

the Anti-Corruption Law.

According to the finding of the investigation team, it was found that she used her authority during her tenure as the chairperson of the Quality Controller Company Selection Committee to issue a certificate to a company close to her

as a quality controller company and assigned work to carry out quality inspection work. At the same time, she was the Yangon Region Minister for Energy, Industry, transport and Communications.

From March 2017 to January 2021, she was found to have

received over K1,660 million from a total of 1,577 businesses for the quality inspection work. The investigation revealed that the receipt of a total of K364.360 million from that company was a violation of the authority given to her by her position.

According to the Anti-Corruption Commission yesterday, the first complaint was reportedly lodged at the Kamayut Township Police Station to take action against her in accordance with Section 55 of the Anti-Corruption Law. — MNA

Germany eyes stronger 2021 growth as vaccines offer hope

GERMANY is poised to upgrade its growth forecast for 2021 on Tuesday, offering a glimpse of light at the end of the coronavirus pandemic tunnel as vaccinations finally begin to gather pace in Europe's biggest economy.

"There are reasons to be optimistic," Economy Minister Peter Altmaier said.

"In January, we forecast growth of 3.0 per cent. Current data show that it will even be slightly higher," Altmaier said in an interview with the Funke media group.

Europe's biggest economy contracted by 4.9 per cent in 2020 as the pan-

demic idled entire sectors and upended hundreds of thousands of businesses.

With Germany still firmly in the clutches of a third wave of the pandemic, the country is expected to report weak data for the first three months of the year.

But the rhythm of vaccinations is accelerating after a stuttering start, with hundreds of thousands of jabs being administered daily in recent days.

The mass inoculations could help accelerate a return to some normalcy after more than a year of open and close swings to halt Covid-19.

Major economic think tanks have already delivered a more optimistic forecast than the government, having already predicted growth of 3.7 per cent for the year.

"Once the risk of infections is removed, the economy will show a strong re-

covery," they said.

- 'Still booming' -

Germany came through the first wave of the pandemic relatively unscathed, but authorities have struggled for months to put in place concerted action to stop the current wave. —AFP ■

Bank of Japan lifts growth forecast, keeps policy unchanged

JAPAN'S central bank on Tuesday raised its growth forecasts for the world's third-largest economy, citing expected stronger demand, and left its ultra-loose monetary policy in place.

But it acknowledged that the outlook remains "highly unclear" and could change depending on how the still-raging coronavirus pandemic evolves and affects the domestic and interna-

tional economy. Still, it revised up its forecast for the 2020-2021 fiscal year that ended on March 31, projecting the economy would shrink 4.9 per cent, compared with the 5.6 per cent contraction

it predicted in January. For the current fiscal year, it now expects 4.0 per cent growth, against its January forecast of 3.9 per cent, while it lifted its expectations for the fiscal year ending in March 2023 to 2.4 per cent, from 1.8 per cent previously.

"The projected growth rates are higher, mainly for fiscal 2022, on the back of stronger domestic and external demand," the Bank of Japan explained. It said while Japan's economic activity was expected to stay lower than pre-pandemic levels "for the time being", it expects to see the virus's impact "waning gradually". —AFP ■

European Parliament to wave through Brexit trade deal

THE European Parliament will vote to ratify the EU trade deal with Britain Tuesday, turning the page on a difficult Brexit chapter but with little hope of smoothing relations with London.

The 705-member Brussels chamber is expected to overwhelmingly back the bare bones trade deal that was sealed last Christmas Eve after nine

months of bad tempered negotiation.

The zero-tariffs, zero-quotas arrangement has been provisionally applied since January 1 when an eleven-month post-Brexit transition period ended.

But MEPs demanded extra time to vet the pact, which also includes a deal on fishing that was especially difficult to clinch with EU fishing crews los-

ing much of their access to bountiful UK waters.

The European Parliament further delayed its vote in part to protest unilateral delays by London in implementing customs checks in Northern Ireland, one of the most contentious issues in the divorce.

Brussels has launched legal action against London over the Irish problem,

while a major row over the supply of UK-based AstraZeneca's Covid-19 vaccine has also embittered cross-Channel relations.

But, despite the acrimony, the European Commission, which handles ties with the UK for the Europeans, has asked MEPs to greenlight the pact, arguing that it will better help keep Britain in check. —AFP ■

Japan to regulate digital ads under law on IT giants

JAPAN plans to regulate online advertising as early as next April under the law requiring information technology giants to be more transparent following recommendations contained in a final government report on digital marketing released Tuesday.

The move could be the world's first legislation to regulate digital advertisements if measures aimed at securing transparency and fairness in the industry are added to the law that took effect in February.

The report compiled by the Digital Market Competition Council urged IT giants to create a scheme to accept third-party assessment of the effectiveness of online advertising and disclose information on wrongdoings such as illegal charges levied on advertisers.

The legislation to protect advertisers will come as Japan steps up efforts to toughen regulations on industry giants such as Apple Inc. and Amazon.com Inc. amid concerns that such companies are taking advantage of their market dominance to mistreat merchants who offer wares on their platforms. —Kyodo News ■

Dutch surprise rivals in race for Brexit spoils

IN the race for business lost by the City of London because of Brexit, Amsterdam's stock market has surprised European rivals by carving out the biggest slice so far.

The city of canals, cheese and cannabis overtook London in January as Europe's largest share trading centre, with more than nine billion euros of EU stocks exchanging hands every day.

Other European Union cities such as Paris, Dublin, Milan and Frankfurt have also benefited from the exodus from London, but none as much as Amsterdam to date.

"This trend is, I just want to insist on that point, really affecting in a very positive manner all the locations within the European Union," Stephane Boujnah, CEO of pan-European stock market operator Euronext, told AFP.

Euronext runs the Amsterdam stock market and those of Brussels, Dublin, Lisbon, Oslo and Paris. Last year it also agreed to buy the Milan bourse from the London Stock Exchange. "What's specific in Amsterdam is the consolidation of some players that used to be based in London" but who had offices already in the Dutch capital, he said. Amsterdam was also seen as "more international" than some other cities, with English virtually a second language and favourable tax conditions offered by the government, he said. —AFP ■

The foreign ministry expressed its "deep regret" saying: "We consider the decision unfounded and unjust because it is in retaliation for a legitimate measure taking by the Italian authorities in defence of their own security." —AFP ■

Libya PM first trip to Benghazi postponed after security team is turned back

THE Libyan government postponed the prime minister's first visit to the east of the country late Sunday, hours after an advance security team was turned back from Benghazi airport, a source told AFP.

A cabinet meeting scheduled for Monday in the city would also have marked national unity government leader Abdulhamid Dbeibah's first trip to Libya's east, a bastion of military strongman Khalifa Haftar.

But on Sunday a spokesperson said preparations were underway to arrange another date, without giving a reason for the postponement.

The announcement came several hours after a government security team was turned away by local authorities at Benghazi airport, forcing them to get back on their plane and return to the capital Tripoli, a local security source told AFP. Dbeibah was selected earlier this year through a UN-backed inter-Libyan dialogue to lead the country to national elections in December 2021. —AFP ■

Bulgaria heads for new vote as main parties fail to form government

BULGARIA'S anti-establishment party There is Such a Nation (TSN) announced Monday it too had failed to build a stable coalition to run the country and called for a new election.

The centre-right GERB party of Bulgaria's long-time premier Boyko Borisov, which came first in April 4 elections, had already admitted on Friday its efforts to form a government came to naught.

TSN leader Slavi Trifonov, a 54-year-old showman and TV presenter, took to Facebook to say the party had not been able to persuade "the required

number of deputies" to join a coalition.

"The best choice" would be to stage a new vote, added Trifonov, whose party garnered a surprise 17.7 per cent of the last vote.

Former world chess champion Antoaneta Stefanova, who would have become prime minister in a TSN coalition, would inform President Roumen Radev, he added.

GERB won just under 27 per cent in the election and Borisov said he would not seek a new term as premier of the EU's poorest member.

He named ex-foreign min-

ister Daniel Mitov to set up a new administration but that ended up with Mitov accusing other parties of behaving "arrogantly and irresponsibly".

President Radev is now expected to mandate a third and final party of his choice to try to break the deadlock. —AFP ■

UN calls for urgent Yemeni port repairs to reduce food costs

THE United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) called Monday for the swift repair of two ports in southern Yemen to reduce the cost of imported food, as the war-torn country races against the threat of large-scale famine.

"The Ports of Aden and Mukalla represent critical and irreplaceable infrastructure that are essential to commercial and humanitarian activities in Yemen, particularly in relation to the overall food supply chain," UNDP said in its report.

It stressed that Dutch experts from the Port of Rotterdam and Solid Port Solutions were deployed by UNDP between 22 November and 4 December 2020 to conduct an initial assessment to determine the minimum requirements to improve productivity and effective management of the ports.

Fixing the ports will

"reduce the cost of food in Yemen," Auke Lootsma, the UNDP's resident country representative, told AFP.

"The looming famine in

Yemen is a question of food affordability and not food availability."

"For example, 50 per cent of a kilogramme price of wheat

is made up of transport costs, such as shipping, insurance and demurrage."

Last month, UNDP warned that famine could become part of Yemen's "reality" this year, after a donor conference sought to raise \$3.85 billion from more than 100 governments and donors, but only reached \$1.7 billion.

According to the UN agency, the damage and capacity assessment report found that an investment package of \$49,590,000 (\$21,560,000 for Aden and US\$28,030,000 for Mukalla) is needed to both maintain current operations and restore them to pre-war conditions.

The project's priorities consist of maintaining current port operations, improving cargo handling at both ports and restoring safety and sustainability of the ports' operations and assets. —AFP ■

Papua intelligence chief killed in rebel attack

An Indonesian regional intelligence chief has been killed in an ambush by rebels in restive Papua region, the military confirmed as the country's president vowed to crush the separatists.

General I Gusti Putu Danny Karya Nugraha, who headed Papua's intelligence agency, was killed during a shoot-out on Monday after rebels opened fire at a patrolling security forces unit in the Papuan highlands on Sunday.

"He was in the area as part of the operation to restore security and to boost the morale of locals in the region following a series of attacks by separatist and terrorist groups," National Intelligence Agency spokesman Wawan Purwanto told AFP news agency. —AFP ■

Harris vows \$310 mn US relief as Central America tackles migration

VICE – President Kamala Harris told Guatemalan President Alejandro Giammattei during a virtual call Monday the US will give \$310 million in humanitarian relief to Central America, her office said, as the region tackles a wave of migration north.

Harris, who leads President Joe Biden's efforts to address the influx of migrants from Guatemala, Honduras and El Salvador to the US-Mexico border, met with Giammattei by videoconference, prior to her visit to Central America scheduled for June.

"In light of the dire situation and acute suffering faced by millions of people in El Salvador, Guatemala, and Honduras, Vice

–President Harris announced an additional \$310 million in US government support for humanitarian relief and to address food insecurity," a statement from her office said after the meeting.

It said the two governments will also coordinate law enforcement efforts to tackle criminal organizations whose activities help drive migration, as well as open migrant resource centers to establish safe, legal migration.

"The United States plans to increase relief to the region, strengthen our cooperation to manage migration in an effective, secure and humane manner," Harris promised Giammattei.—AFP ■

10 years after his death, Bin Laden still haunts Pakistan

CHILDREN play cricket in a patch of scorched grass and scattered rubble in Abbottabad – all that remains of the final lair of the man who was once the most wanted person on the planet.

It was in this Pakistani city that Osama bin Laden was killed in the clandestine "Operation Geronimo" raid by US Navy Seals in the early hours of May 2, 2011.

The operation had global repercussions and dented Pakistan's international reputation – exposing contradictions in a country that had long served as a rear base for Al Qaeda and its Taliban allies while suffering from the effects of terrorism.

Bin Laden had been living in seclusion for at least five years in Abbottabad, hidden behind the high walls of an imposing white building less than two kilometres from a renowned military academy.

"It was a very bad thing for this place and for the whole country," said Altaf Hussain, a retired schoolteacher, walking down an alley alongside Bin Laden's former residence. "By living here, Osama gave this city a bad reputation."—AFP ■

US justice department probes Louisville police over abuse, racial discrimination

THE US Justice Department on Monday announced an investigation of systematic abuse by police in Louisville, Kentucky, 13 months after officers shot dead black medical technician Breonna Taylor in a raid on her home.

Just days after launching an investigation of Minneapolis police in the wake of the killing of George Floyd, Attorney-General Merrick Garland said the examination of Louisville will focus on

a pattern of unreasonable use of force, unlawful searches and seizures, and discrimination against African-Americans. Both investigations could lead to the police being legally bound by consent decrees to enact reforms.

After Donald Trump refused to use federal pressure to reform local police departments, the probes underscore the determination of President Joe Biden's administration to hold the police

to account amid a series of unjustified shootings and killings of African-Americans. "All of these steps will be taken with one goal in mind: to ensure that policing policies and practices are constitutional and lawful," Garland said.

The Louisville police came under particular scrutiny in the nationwide Black Lives Matter protests against police abuse last year because of the death of Taylor.—AFP ■

Somali opposition fighters cordon off parts of tense capital

HEAVILY armed Somali opposition fighters held positions in parts of Mogadishu on Monday, a day after clashes with government troops erupted over the president's bid to extend his mandate, in the country's worst political violence in years.

Fighters used mounds of earth to barricade roads, while armed men and vehicles mounted with machine guns were stationed in opposition strongholds after the fighting that left three dead.

"Both the Somali security forces and the pro-opposition fighters have taken positions along some key roads," witness Abdullahi Mire told AFP.

The fragile nation has not had an effective central government since the collapse of a military regime in 1991 led to decades of civil war and lawless-

ness fuelled by clan conflicts.

For more than a decade, conflict has centred on an Islamist insurgency by the Al-Qaeda-linked Al-Shabaab.

The political clashes in the streets of Mogadishu mark a dangerous new phase in a dispute triggered by the failure to hold February's planned elections.

President Mohamed Abdullahi Mohamed, best known by his nickname Farmajo, earlier this month signed a law approved by parliament that extended his mandate by two years.

On Sunday night, sporadic bursts of heavy gunfire rang out across the capital after fighting broke out between government forces and soldiers allied along clan lines to various opposition leaders.—AFP ■

"The players are welcome to be vaccinated as it is protection for them. We're giving them a choice as PFF will be spending on the vaccines. I'm confident that they will accept these vaccines." "Last year, clubs were only able to play five matches in the bubble season. With the vaccine set

to roll out this year, we look forward to giving the clubs more competitive matches to keep the players physically fit, which will benefit our clubs participating at the domestic level, international competitions, and our national team," the PFL commissioner added. —GNLM

Liverpool report £46 million pre-tax loss

LIVERPOOL reported a £46 million (\$63 million) pre-tax loss for the financial year ending May 2020, figures that suggest why the club's owners were prepared to join the failed European Super League plan.

Just a week after Liverpool were forced to pull out of the controversial Super League following a furious public backlash, the reigning Premier League champions' revealed the financial impact of the coronavirus pandemic.

The loss of significant media revenue and match-day income at Anfield in the final quarter of the results amid the lockdown contributed to a £88 million negative swing in just over 12 months.

Liverpool reportedly estimate they will have suffered a financial hit of around £120 million by the time supporters are allowed back into matches.

In March 2020, Liverpool announced a profit of £42 million, but that surplus was wiped out after last season was suspended

in March and then restarted behind closed doors.

The pandemic fall-out convinced Liverpool's owners Fenway Sports Group to sell a 10 per cent share in the club last month for £543 million to private investment firm RedBird Capital.

Also included in their income for the year was about £3.4 million for winning the 2019 Champions League final as it fell just outside the previous financial reporting period.

Eight new partnerships were announced during this period while Carlsberg renewed their long-term association.

Commercial revenue rose by £29 million to £217 million, but that could not compensate for media revenue dropping by £59 million to £202 million and match-day revenue was down £13 million to £71 million.

Wages across the club also rose to £325 million from £310 million. "This financial reporting period was up to May 2020 so approaching a year ago now," Liverpool managing director Andy Hughes said. —AFP ■

Paris Saint-Germain did not sign up to the proposals, which crumbled within 48 hours of being announced last week after a fierce backlash from fans, players, governments, national leagues, UEFA and FIFA.

However, the clash between PSG and City on Wednesday is illustrative of the forces which drove some of European football's more established powers, led by Madrid president Florentino Perez, to seek the financial reassurances of a closed league format.

Under the Super League proposals, 15 founding members would be guaranteed their place in a 20-team competition, split into two leagues of 10 with the top sides in each progressing to the quarter-finals.

On top of ensuring revenue

from TV rights and sponsorship of more games between the European elite, a key part of the breakaway plan concocted by the 'dirty dozen' was to control costs.

A much-criticised statement to launch the league last Sunday said: "The competition will be built on a sustainable financial foundation with all founding clubs signing up to a spending framework."

Hyper-inflated transfer market

Backed by the state wealth of Abu Dhabi and Qatar respectively, City and PSG have played leading roles in the inflated costs of player transfers and wages in recent years and been far less affected by the economic crunch of the coronavirus pandemic over the last 12 months.

City's spending power has blown away the competition even in the lucrative Premier League.

Pep Guardiola's men are closing in on a third league title in four years and on Sunday won a fourth consecutive League Cup. —AFP ■

Nagelsmann to coach Bayern Munich from next season: club

JULIAN Nagelsmann will take over as Bayern Munich coach from next season to replace Hansi Flick, the reigning German and European champions announced on Tuesday.

Nagelsmann, 33, will move from RB Leipzig on a five-year contract after Flick, whose relationship with the club's powerful sporting director Hasan Salihamidzic has deteriorated, asked to be released from his contract.

"FC Bayern agreed to current head coach Hansi Flick's request to have his contract terminated on 30 June 2021, two years earlier than its original expiry date," the club said in a statement.

Nagelsmann has never hidden his desire to coach Bayern, especially as he comes from the Bavaria region.

Last season, he led Leipzig

to the semi-finals of the Champions League and this season his side has replaced Borussia Dortmund as Bayern's main title challengers. —AFP ■
