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MoEE reviews activities conducted in second quarter of 2020-2021FY

THE Ministry of Electricity and Energy held coordination meetings in order to review the ministry's works done during the second quarter of 2020-2021FY and ongoing work plans to carry out in the third and fourth quarters in Nay Pyi Taw on 30 April and 1 May.

During the meetings, Union Minister U Aung Than Oo discussed the importance of electricity and energy sectors for developing the country and socio-economic of public and sufficient power distribution with stable volt and frequency.

The ministry is currently making efforts to fulfil the needs of electricity and energy as per the State's policies. At the same time, the potential projects are being implemented in the country.

Moreover, the ministry arranges to generate power from hydro, solar and renewable sources with minor impacts on

natural resources and the environment.

Although there were difficulties in reading meters, distributing bills and collecting bills, the public appreciated the ministry's effort as it filled their power needs. Therefore, it should keep making efforts without just satisfying with such appreciation. Moreover, it should conduct bill collecting programmes as quickly as possible as they want to make the bill payments for their consumed power.

The Union Minister also instructed the need to train the newly assigned staff to serve their duties responsibly while communicating with the public.

He urged the region and state electrical engineers and the Department of Hydropower Implementation director to discuss their difficulties openly.

He then discussed the formation of servicing teams not

to occur power cuts in monsoon despite the natural disaster and plans to supply sufficient power to the public.

The senior officers of rel-

evant departments and enterprises, and engineers briefed the performance in the second quarter of the 2020-2021 financial year, further plans for the third

and fourth quarters, including the river pumping project.

The Union Minister coordinated the discussion and gave necessary instructions.—MNA

Union Minister Dr Thet Khaing Win discusses opening of postgraduate/undergraduate courses

UNION Minister for Health and Sports Dr Thet Khaing Win met the rectors, professors and officials from the medical and relevant universities in order to discuss opening postgraduate/undergraduate courses yesterday morning in Yangon.

At the meeting, the Union Minister appreciated the efforts of the respective professors and those in charge of hospital

wards. He said if healthcare cannot be resumed, it will affect people's health, increasing personal expenditure for healthcare expenses.

He said the death rate of children under five would increase in the coming years if regular immunization services for children are not implemented. He added that those who are social bullying the medical staff

returning to work would be taken legal action.

Regarding the reopening of the postgraduate courses, he said the students would need to have 90 per cent attendance, and application deadlines for postgraduate studies for assistant doctors have been extended. The ministry would release health workers charged under Section 505-A of the Penal Code accord-

ing to guidelines issued by the State Administration Council and return them to work, he said.

Afterwards, the Union Minister met officials from the Public Health Department and instructed necessary matters relating to COVID-19 disease prevention, control and treatment, preventive measures against any possible importation of the virus from neighbouring countries

into Myanmar; treatment to the COVID-19 patients at Waibargi Hospital and Phaungyi hospital and effective contact tracing, COVID-19 diagnostic services, coordination with the Yangon Region Administration Council in order to expand quarantine centres and closely monitor the activities of the Township Health/Public Health Departments. — MNA

Five-Point Road Map of the State Administration Council

1. The Union Election Commission will be reconstituted and its mandated tasks, including the scrutiny of voter lists, shall be implemented in accordance with the law.
2. Effective measures will be taken with added momentum to prevent and manage the COVID-19 pandemic.
3. Actions will be taken to ensure the speedy recovery of businesses from the impact of COVID-19.
4. Emphasis will be placed on achieving enduring peace for the entire nation in line with the agreements set out in the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement.
5. Upon accomplishing the provisions of the state of emergency, free and fair multiparty democratic elections will be held in line with the 2008 Constitution, and further work will be undertaken to hand over State duties to the winning party in accordance with democratic standards.

Similarly, about 35 people staged a strike in Aung Zeya Ward of Meiktila Township of Mandalay Region.

The security forces dispersed the protest crowd under the law.

Moreover, about 50 people marched to protest in Kyaik Pauk Village in Bago Township of Bago Region.

The police dispersed the crowd and detained three men, including Than Htut Aung, who lives in Maha Zedi Ward of Bago Township and one woman.

Those arrested will face actions according to the law. — MNA

Findings on ballot papers for Pyithu Hluttaw Election in YeU Township

8. According to the inspection, 90 polling stations in YeU Township of Sagaing Region took out 118,546 ballots and used 83,614 ballots. The extra/shortage ballots and illegal extra ballots were found at respective poll stations. There were 997 missing ballots and it found extra use of 584 ballots which were not granted by UEC. The poll heads did not follow Hluttaw Election Law Section 66(h) and they returned 11 ballot books (550 papers) of Lain Taw village-tract after election. Findings were as follows:

Place emphasis on ensuring food sufficiency, lifeblood of the people

RICE is a primary staple food of Myanmar. So, Myanmar people have been emphasizing the cultivation of paddy on a large sown acreage across the nation since time immemorial.

Food sufficiency is a lifeblood at the levels of family, community, region, country and world. Hence, it is necessary to seek various ways and means for the supply of foods to each other.

Undertaking livestock breeding tasks in respective regions to increase quality livestock and fish production will contribute to the people consuming meat and fish at fair prices, State Administration Council Chairman Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services Senior General Min Aung Hlaing gave guidance to officials at Thilawa multiple agriculture and livestock zone recently.

As Myanmar water territory is a pot of aquatic living beings, we have to discharge the duty of conserving those creatures in our generations to contribute a great deal to the food sufficiency of posterity.

If we analyze the consumption of quality meat and fish, the people will be healthy and fit due to obtaining nutrition from systemic digestion. But, we need not only quality meat and fish but also healthy, quality rice for consumption. As such, we should seek quality seeds of paddy. We should conduct the research works for the production of high yield, quality paddy strains so as to produce quality rice for public consumption as well as for exportation.

It is required to operate vast multiple agriculture and livestock farms to produce quality paddy or meat and fish. As Yangon Region is populous with some seven million people, local authorities should unavoidably expand the aforesaid farms the region one after another in order to provide quality food supplies to the city dwellers.

Emphasis should be placed on livestock production while releasing fingerlings into the natural water to ensure the regeneration of fish to be abundant of fish resources. As Myanmar water territory is a pot of aquatic living beings, we have to discharge the duty of conserving those creatures in our generations to contribute a great deal to the food sufficiency of posterity. Currently, Yangon Region focuses on implementing Thilawa multiple agriculture and livestock zone, 26th-mile multiple agriculture and livestock zone, and Shwemuyin fish farm in Twantay Township to meet the food demand of the people under the long term plans. Products from these zones will help the people enjoy food sufficiency.

Geoengineering: 'Plan B' for the planet

DISMISSED a decade ago as far-fetched and dangerous, schemes to tame the effects of global warming by engineering the climate have migrated from the margins of policy debates towards centre stage. "Plan A" remains tackling the problem at its source. But the UN's top climate science body has made it clear that slashing carbon pollution won't be enough to keep Earth from overheating.

That has opened the door to a host of geoengineering schemes, from building underwater walls to shore up an Antarctic glacier the size of Britain to injecting a giant sunscreen into the stratosphere.

Here is a menu of "Plan B" geoengineering solutions, along with their potential drawbacks: **Direct CO2 capture** Experiments have shown it is possible to suck planet-warming carbon dioxide directly from the air, converting it into fuel pellets or storing it underground.

A company backed by Microsoft co-founder Bill Gates launched a pilot facility in Canada in 2015, and another company operates one in Iceland.

DRAWBACK: The technology is currently prohibitively expensive and might take decades to operate at scale.

Solar radiation management Unlike other strategies, solar radiation management does not target CO2. The goal is simple: prevent some of the sun's rays from hitting the planet's surface, forcing them back up into space.

One idea is to inject or spray tiny reflective particles into the stratosphere - possibly with balloons, aircraft or through giant tubes.

Nature sometimes does the same: Debris from the 1991 eruption of Mount Pinatubo in the Philippines lowered the planet's average surface temperature for a year or two afterwards.

Sixty-six million years ago, a ten-kilometre wide asteroid strike threw up so much debris that it wiped out land-based dinosaurs built for steamy tropical climes.

In April, a balloon test flight in Sweden for the Harvard-led project SCoPEX, short for "Stratospheric Controlled Perturbation Experiment", was postponed amid concerns over the implications for the environment and people in the country.

In Australia, trials of a controversial technique to spray microscopic salt crystals into the air above the threatened Great Barrier Reef to make the clouds brighter began last year.

Australian scientists say it successful and combined with other climate and protection measures this could help slow the decline of the reef.

DRAWBACKS: Even if it works as intended, solar radiation management would do nothing to reduce atmospheric CO2, which is making oceans too acidic. There is also the danger of knock-on consequences, including changes in rainfall patterns, and what scientists call "termination shock" - a sudden warming if the system were to fail.

Afforestation Extensive planting of trees could significantly slow the concentration of CO2 in the atmosphere, which currently stands at more than 510 parts per million, 50 percent more than 150 years ago.

BECCS Bioenergy with carbon capture and storage (BECCS) marries a natural process with a high-tech one.

The first step is to plant rapeseed, sugarcane, corn or "2nd-generation" biofuel crops such as switchgrass, which pull

CO2 from the air while growing. The second step is while burning the harvested plants for energy to sequester the CO2 produced.

In theory, the result is less CO2 in the atmosphere than when the process started. Virtually all climate change models projecting a future consistent with the Paris Agreement's temperature targets assume a key role for BECCS.

DRAWBACK: Studies calculate that up to twice the area of India would need to be given over to biofuels, putting BECCS in conflict with food crops. Such schemes would also require vast amounts of fresh water.

Ocean fertilisation Microscopic ocean plants called phytoplankton gobble up CO2 and drag it to the bottom of the ocean when they die. Their colony size is limited by a lack of natural iron, but experiments have shown that sowing the ocean with iron sulphate powder creates large blooms.

DRAWBACKS: Scientists worry about unintended impacts. Die-offs of plankton, for example, use up oxygen, which could create massive "dead zones" in the oceans, something already on the rise.

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COVID Worldwide Cases Hit 150 Million

INDIA on Friday posted another global record for daily coronavirus infections, pushing worldwide cases past 150 million as a pandemic that has killed

almost 3.2 million worldwide continues to wreak devastation. The number of new daily cases has more than doubled since mid-February, an AFP tally

showed, in an explosion in infections blamed in part on a new COVID-19 variant but also on failure to follow virus restrictions. The countries with the highest

total number of cases are the United States (US), India and Brazil, which recorded 3,001 COVID-19 deaths in the past 24 hours, bringing its overall toll to 401,186.

The continent seeing the bulk of new daily cases is Asia, driven largely by a devastating wave in India which has overwhelmed hospitals and crematoriums.

India recorded another 385,000 cases in the past 24 hours - a new global record - and almost 3,500 deaths, according to official data that many experts suspect falls short of the true toll. More than 40 countries have committed to sending medical aid to India, with a US Super Galaxy military transporter carrying more than 400 oxygen cylinders, other hospital equipment and nearly one million rapid coronavirus tests arriving in New Delhi on Friday.

The Indian global diaspora has also sprung into action, with a collection of overseas volunteers scrambling to locate desperately-needed supplies for COVID-19 stricken family, friends and strangers back home.

Compounding India's woes as cases soared has been its failure to get a much-needed vaccine programme off the ground. Until now, only "frontline" workers like medical staff, people over 45 and those with existing illnesses have been given the AstraZeneca shot or Bharat Biotech's homegrown Covaxin.

As of Saturday, jabs will be open to all adults, meaning around 600 million more people will be eligible. But several states have warned they do not have sufficient stocks, and the expanded rollout is threatened by administrative bickering, confusion over prices and technical glitches on

the government's digital vaccine platform. **Brazil Woes** Also struggling to inoculate a vast country facing a surge in cases is Brazil, which has one of the highest mortality rates in the pandemic, at 189 deaths per 100,000 inhabitants.

Experts blame the latest surge partly on the "Brazil variant" of the virus, a mutation that emerged in or around the Amazon rainforest city of Manaus in December. But many have also pointed the finger at the administration of President Jair Bolsonaro, which now faces investigation from the country's Senate into whether there was criminal neglect in its handling of the pandemic.

Around 28 million people have received a first COVID-19 vaccine dose, just over 10 per cent of the population. SOURCE: AFP



Sesame market shows downticks on low foreign demand



Typically, Myanmar exports about 80 per cent of sesame production to foreign markets. China is the primary buyer of Myanmar sesame, which is also shipped to markets in Japan, the Republic of Korea, China (Taipei), the UK, Germany, the Netherlands, Greece, and Poland among the EU countries.

THE sesame market is sluggish, and the price remains bearish in April-end, traders from the Mandalay market said.

The market of edible oil crop has been slow-moving prior to the Chinese New Year festival. The market continues facing slow-down owing to heightened border security amid the COVID-19 resurgences, a trader said.

The prices of white and

brown sesame varieties have remained stable on the back of domestic demand. At the same time, there is low demand by foreign market. However, the price of black sesame seeds (Samone variety), which is primarily shipped to external markets, slightly declines.

On 4 February, the FOB prices of sesame stood at US\$2,000-2,100 per metric tonne of Black sesame (Samone va-

riety), \$1,250-1,300 per metric tonne of white sesame and \$1,150-1,200 per metric tonne of brown sesame. On 29 April, the black sesame price dipped to \$1,900-2,000 per metric tonne. The white sesame is pegged at \$1,200-1,300, and brown sesame fetches \$1,100-\$1,200, Bayintnaung wholesale market stated.

Last year, the sesame prices dropped by over 20 per cent compared with the prices in

the previous years due to the COVID-19 negative impacts. Consequently, the growers do not make a significant profit this year, a trader from the Mandalay market stressed.

Typically, Myanmar exports about 80 per cent of sesame production to foreign markets. China is the primary buyer of Myanmar sesame, which is also shipped to markets in Japan, the Republic of Korea, China (Taipei), the UK, Germany, the Netherlands, Greece, and Poland among the EU countries.

The EU markets prefer organic-farming sesame seeds from Myanmar, said an official from the Trade Promotion Department.

Japan prefers Myanmar black sesame seeds, cultivated under good agricultural practices (GAP), and purchases them after a quality assessment. Black sesame seeds from Myanmar are also exported to South Korea and Japan. Meanwhile, China buys various coloured sesame seeds from the country. This year, Japan

has not purchased Myanmar's sesame yet.

Sesame is cultivated in the country throughout the year. Magway Region, which has gained a reputation as the oil pot of Myanmar, is the leading producer of sesame seeds. The seeds are also grown in Mandalay and Sagaing regions.

Of the cooking oil crops grown in Myanmar, the acreage under sesame is the highest, accounting for 51.3 per cent of the overall oil crop plantation.

The volume of sesame exports was registered at over 96,000 tonnes, worth \$130 million, in the financial year 2015-2016; 100,000 tonnes, worth \$145 million, in the FY2016-2017FY; 120,000 tonnes, worth \$147 million, in the FY2017-2018; 33,900 tonnes valued at \$43.8 million in the 2018 mini-budget period, 125,800 tonnes, worth \$212.5 million in the FY2018-2019 and over 150,000 tonnes of sesame, worth \$240 million in the previous FY2019-2020, the trade data of Central Statistical Organization indicated. — KH/GNLM

Domestic gold prices still on the rise

THE domestic prices of the gold continue to rise, said U Myo Myint, the chairman of Yangon Region Gold Entrepreneurs Association (YRGEA).

People are collecting the gold bars currently because of the business being suspended as a result of the COVID-19 outbreak, he added.

"The prices of the local gold are sky high these days because of the pandemic that has started again worldwide. Thus, the countries around the world have imposed restrictions again, resulting in the businesses halting again. That is the reason why people are collecting the gold bar. The domestic gold market has connected with the global gold market. Therefore if the global gold price goes high, the domestic gold price will rise. Now, the domestic prices of the gold continue to rise as a result of the restart of the COVID-19 outbreak," said U Myo Myint.

The domestic gold price is around K100,000 less than that of the global gold price, according to the YRGEA.

"The domestic gold price

is around K100,000 less than that of the global gold price. If the trading is permitted to make payments through telegraph transfer (TT), the gold trading could enter the international market. The trading will be faster and convenient if the Department of Mines under the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation will issue the sale licenses. Now, the domestic gold price is K100,000 less than that of the global gold price," said U Myo Myint.

At present, the pure gold price is about K1,455,000 per tical (0.578 ounces, or 0.016 kilograms) on 1 May in the domestic market, while global gold price touches a high of above US\$1,772 per ounce.

Further, the dollar versus kyat exchange rate was at K1,575 per dollar on 1 May.

Therefore, the global gold versus dollar exchange rate remains skyrocketing. The domestic gold price will be still as high as the worldwide gold price and dollar exchange rate, according to the YGEA. — NN/GNLM

Myanmar Sterculia gum price declines



There are about 30,000 acres of Sterculia gum plantations in the Sagaing region, and the gums are chiefly grown in Ahyardaw and Monywa townships.

THE price of Myanmar Sterculia gum locally called Saekalamat has dropped recently in the market and the growers face losses, said U Zaw Min, chairman of Sagaing Region Sterculia Production and Exporter Association.

"Presently, the price of Sterculia gum is K5,000 per viss in the market. The high-quality Sterculia gum prices range between K7,000 and K8,000 per viss. However, we haven't got any high price yet. This time in 2019,

the Sterculia gum price was K40,000 per viss. Every year, the price of the gum is high. But this year, the prevailing price of the gums is only K7,000-K8,000 per viss. Now, the growers are encountering losses. Even then, they didn't get back the production cost because of the pandemic and the political situation," said U Zaw Min.

In the market, the Myanmar Sterculia gums are sold for K28,000 per viss before the COVID-19 outbreak. The

Sterculia gum market slightly declined when COVID-19 started to break out, and its price was only K8,000 per viss.

There are about 30,000 acres of Sterculia gum plantations in the Sagaing region, and the gums are chiefly grown in Ahyardaw and Monywa townships.

The Sterculia gums are also grown in Monywa, Ahyardaw, Sagaing, Shwebo, Yinmabin, Katha, Kanbalu, Kalay townships in Sagaing Region. — Lulay/GNLM

AstraZeneca COVID vaccine sales hit \$275m in first quarter

BRITISH pharmaceuticals giant AstraZeneca said on Friday that its COVID vaccine generated \$275 million (€227m) in sales in the first quarter, as its chief executive defended performance in the face of EU legal action. It is the first time that the company has disclosed figures from sales of one of the world's leading vaccines, which it sells at cost.

The company has delivered about 68 million doses of the vaccine, which was developed with the University of Oxford and has been instrumental in Britain's rapid vaccination drive.

However, public confidence in the jab has been dented over links to very rare blood clots, and the company is also mired in a legal fight with the EU over delivery shortfalls. **'Did our very best'**

"I don't think we ever over-promised... more than we thought we could deliver," chief executive Pascal Soriot told reporters on Friday, insisting there were no

regrets. "What we communicated at the time was based on the capacity that we had put together." Soriot noted that AstraZeneca was the second largest

supplier to the EU after US firm Pfizer. The bulk of AstraZeneca's jab sales during the first quarter – \$224 million worth – were in Europe, the company said. A total \$43 million were in emerging markets, and \$8 million in the rest of the world, it added.

"Of course we would have preferred to have delivered more quantities to Europe, but at then end of the day we did our very best to help the world," Soriot said. AstraZeneca vaccine production had been rapidly assembled following the start of the outbreak in early 2020.

"Our vaccine continues to play a leading role in the global fight against the pandemic," Soriot insisted. "We are seeing signs that it is reducing transmissions," he added, citing recent UK data.—AFP ■

Toyota fined by China's regulator for violating anti-monopoly laws

CHINA'S market regulator on Friday fined Toyota Motor Corp., Japan's largest automaker, 500,000 yuan (\$77,313) for violating anti-monopoly laws.

Toyota failed to report to the authorities in advance when in 2019, it set up a joint venture with Didi Chuxing, a major Chinese ride-hailing service, the regulator said.

The latest move came as Chinese President Xi Jinping has pledged to strengthen measures to curb the monopolistic behaviour and disorderly capital expansion of IT giants in the country.

In March, Japanese wireless carrier SoftBank Corp. was also fined by the Chinese authorities for the same reason. —Kyodo News ■

Eurozone enters double-dip recession in first quarter

THE eurozone economy fell into a second recession in less than a year in the first quarter, data showed on Friday, as slow vaccinations and pandemic lockdowns stopped a rebound.

The data was in stark contrast to the US, where the economy roared forward in the same period, posting annualised growth of 6.4 per cent.

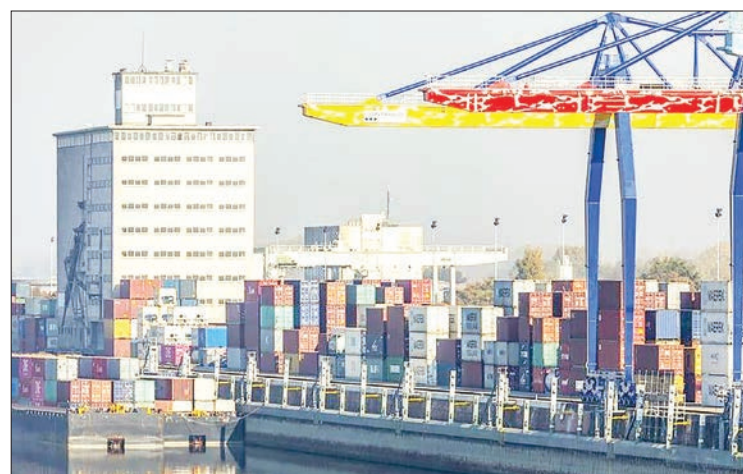
China has also turned the corner from the coronavirus pandemic with a 18.3-per cent explosion in gross domestic product growth on an annual basis.

Europe has been hit hard by a second and third wave of the coronavirus pandemic,

with multiple attempts to reopen the economy cut short by new outbreaks.

More recent data has given Europeans confidence that the recession will be short-lived, however, with surveys showing that manufacturing is now booming. And with the vaccination campaign finally getting into swing, pent-up demand is expected to follow as Europeans begin to spend more in shops, at reopened restaurants and on tourism.

The EU's slow-moving recovery plan is also expected to finally get on track, giving a much-needed boost to southern countries crushed

by the pandemic, such as Italy or Spain.

Germany was the major drag on growth in January to

March period, with exports unable to overcome a steep drop in demand by discouraged consumers, analysts said.—AFP ■

Disneyland fans hail 'greatest feeling ever' as California theme park finally reopens

FANS wearing Mickey Mouse ears lined up as Disneyland in California finally reopened Friday, more than 400 days after the pandemic forced an unprecedented closure for the self-styled "Happiest Place on Earth."

"It is the greatest feeling ever!" said Momi Young-Wilkins, a 55-year-old mother as she brought her children to the world-famous park near Los Angeles. "I promised my daughters we would be back here on opening day, and I made it happen." Disneyland Park – the world's second-most visited theme park – and neighbouring Disney California Adventure Park have been closed the longest of all the Mouse House's globe-spanning parks, delayed by California's sharp winter Covid spike and tough restrictions. But with the Golden State now boasting the nation's lowest per capita infection rate, the sprawling resort flung open its gates Friday to the delight of many of its most obsessive devotees.—AFP ■

Profits at India's Reliance double on oil, retail recovery

INDIAN conglomerate Reliance Industries saw its quarterly profits more than double between January and March, the firm said Friday, boosted by a turnaround in its key oil and retail businesses.

The Mumbai-based behemoth – which is owned by Asia's richest man, Mukesh Ambani – said its consolidated net profit for the period jumped 108 per cent to 132.27 billion rupees (\$1.79 billion) from 63.48 billion rupees a year earlier.

The oil-to-telecoms giant enjoyed a strong recovery during the quarter as India eased coro-

navirus lockdowns, prompting the transport and retail sectors to bounce back, before a ferocious second wave of infections forced a new round of restrictions this month. "Our consumer businesses have proved to be a digital and physical lifeline for the nation in these challenging times," Ambani said in a statement.

Its telecom arm Jio added over 15 million subscribers during the quarter, with revenues up by 18.9 per cent, as pandemic restrictions saw increasing numbers of Indians rely on digital services.—AFP ■

EU charges Apple in landmark App Store competition case

THE EU formally accused Apple on Friday of unfairly squeezing out music streaming rivals through its App Store in one of

the biggest-ever competition cases to hit the iPhone maker. The charge sheet lands as Apple faces a rebellion from

firms that want to break free of the global Apple App Store's strict terms and fees, with authorities in the US, Russia, Britain and South Korea also circling on the world's biggest company.

"By setting strict rules on the App Store that disadvantage competing music streaming services, Apple deprives users of cheaper music streaming choices and distorts competition," EU competition commissioner Margrethe Vestager said in a statement.

The European Commission's case, put forward in a "statement of objections", is based on a complaint brought by Sweden-based Spotify and

others that accuses Apple of making unfair use of the App Store to promote its own Apple Music.

Spotify filed the complaint in 2019 that also accused Apple of unfairly taking a 30 per cent cut from businesses using its store, which Spotify says amounts to a violation of fair competition rules.

The case is one of four taken up by the European Commission against Apple last year and could force the company to change the way it does business.

The other cases focus on the Apple Pay system as well as the company's eBooks offering. —AFP ■

Brazil auctions Rio water concession for US\$4 billion in win for Bolsonaro

BRAZIL raked in a larger-than-expected US\$4 billion Friday (Apr 30) auctioning the operating rights to the Rio de Janeiro water and sewer system, a win for President Jair Bolsonaro and his privatization agenda.

The far-right leader attended the auction in Sao Paulo, which garnered 22.7 billion reais - more than double the minimum price - and came after a political battle that nearly saw the concession sale canceled.

Bolsonaro, who has struggled to implement the privatization plans he campaigned on in 2018, called the auction "historic".

"This is a government that believes in the free market, that believes in winning investors' confidence," he said.

It was the biggest-ever water-treatment auction in Brazil.

"The result is in: Confidence

in Brazil," said ultra-liberal Economy Minister Paulo Guedes.

"Brazil is going to return to growth. We are going to get through both waves," he added, referring to the hit that Latin America's biggest economy has taken from the coronavirus pandemic.

Rio's troubled public water company, Cedae, has faced criticism in recent years for the city's sometimes cloudy, smelly and earthy-tasting water.

The auction divided the company's system up into four lots by region - one of which failed to sell.

In all, Cedae serves 13 million people, including the greater metropolitan area.

The winning bidders gain 35-year concessions to their portions of the system, which they will be tasked with overhauling and operating. —AFP ■

US oil giants return to profitability in Q1 on higher oil prices

AFTER a string of losses, ExxonMobil and Chevron on Friday both reported a return to profitability in the first quarter, bolstered by a significant jump in oil prices.

The results, which come amid a similar round of profits by Royal Dutch Shell, Total and other European petroleum giants, point to a much-improved demand outlook compared with last year, when oil prices tumbled midway through the first quarter as the coronavirus crisis shuttered large parts of the economy.

"Earnings strengthened primarily due to higher oil prices as the economy recovers," said Chevron Chief Executive Mike Wirth.

Yet larger petroleum companies still face major challenges, including campaigns from

activist shareholders at annual meetings next month over their response to climate change.

Both US oil firms also face weakness in their downstream business amid tepid demand for petroleum products, especially jet fuel.

ExxonMobil, which reported losses in all four quarters in 2020, reported profits of \$2.7 billion in the first quarter. Revenues rose 5.3% to \$59.1 billion.

The company said its average price for crude oil sold rose 42% compared with the fourth quarter, while natural gas prices rose by 33%.

Conditions in the downstream business improved from the fourth quarter, "but remained below 10-year lows driven by market oversupply and high product inventory levels," ExxonMobil said. —AFP ■

Colombia president axes tax plan after angry protests

COLOMBIAN President Ivan Duque caved in Friday to widespread anger and said he would overhaul a proposed tax reform that many said would leave them poorer during the pandemic.

Duque announced he was shelving clauses that would lower the income tax threshold to broaden the tax base and raise value-added taxes on goods and services.

He acted two days after tens of thousands of Colombians took to the streets across the country to denounce the proposed tax changes.

They were rejected across the board -- by opposition parties, unions, students and civil society groups that complained that the reforms came at the worst possible time and were particularly harmful to the middle class.

Even some in Duque's party opposed his plan.

"I have given very clear instructions to the finance ministry for it to ... compose a new draft with congress," Duque said. —AFP ■

Japan Jan.-March GDP seen having shrunk 4.8% under 2nd virus emergency

JAPAN'S economy in the January to March quarter is estimated to have shrunk an annualized real 4.8 per cent, as a second state of emergency over the coronavirus pandemic dampened consumption, economists said Friday.

The average estimate by 10 economists polled by Kyodo News indicates the world's third-largest economy likely logged its first shrinkage since an annualized 29.3 per cent contraction in the three months ended in June 2020, its worst economic plunge on record triggered by its first virus emergency.

The Cabinet Office is scheduled to release preliminary GDP data for this year's first quarter on May 18. —Kyodo News ■

Afghan retreat: US formally begins withdrawing from its longest war

THE United States formally begins withdrawing its last troops from Afghanistan Saturday, bringing its longest war nearer to an end but also heralding an uncertain future for a country in the tightening grip of an emboldened Taliban.

US officials on the ground say the withdrawal is already a work in progress -- and May 1 is just a continuation -- but Washington has made an issue of the date because it is a deadline agreed with the Taliban in 2020 to complete the pullout.

The skies above Kabul and nearby Bagram airbase have been buzzing with more US hel-

icopter activity than usual as the pullout gears up, following the

start Thursday of a concurrent NATO withdrawal.

The prospect of an end of 20 years of US presence comes despite fighting raging across the countryside in the absence of a peace deal.

A stark reminder of what remains came late Friday with a car bomb in Pul-e-Alam, south of the capital, killing at least 21 people and wounding 100 more.

US President Joe Biden is determined to end what he called "the forever war", announcing last month that the withdrawal of the remaining 2,500 American forces would be complete by the 20th anniversary of the September 11 attacks.

"A horrific attack 20 years

ago... cannot explain why we should remain there in 2021," he said.

Since the US withdrawal deal was struck the Taliban have not directly engaged foreign troops, but insurgents have mercilessly attacked government forces in the countryside and waged a terror campaign in urban areas.

The exit of US forces has only exacerbated the fear felt by ordinary Afghans.

"Everyone is scared that we might go back to the dark days of the Taliban era," said Mena Nowrozi, who works at a private radio station in Kabul. —AFP ■

US investigates more 'Havana syndrome' attacks: senators

US senators said Friday that the government is investigating an apparent increase in mysterious directed-energy attacks dubbed "Havana syndrome", amid new reports of potentially brain-damaging incidents inside the country.

Democratic Senator Mark Warner and Republican Marco Rubio, who lead the Senate Intelligence Committee, issued a statement after two media reports saying attacks had taken place in Washington, including just outside the White House, and in Miami, Florida.

"For nearly five years, we have been aware of reports of mysterious attacks on United States government personnel in Havana, Cuba and around the world," they said.

"This pattern of attacking our fellow citizens serving our government appears to be increasing."

The still unexplained attacks have caused sickness and even brain damage in US diplomats and intelligence officials in Cuba, China, Russia, and other countries.

Moscow is suspected to be behind them, even if the mechanism for them has yet to be explained. Scientists have theorized that the attacks arise from pulsed microwaves. Earlier this week CNN, citing unnamed officials, said federal agencies were investigating a November 2020 incident at the White House Ellipse in which a national security council staffer was sickened.—AFP ■

Ship prepares to ferry chemicals out of Beirut port

A ship prepared Friday to ferry dozens of containers of hazardous materials from Lebanon's capital to Germany, managers of a cleanup project said, months after disaster struck on the dockside.

German firm Combi Lift was tasked with removing dangerous substances from the port after the explosion of hundreds of tonnes of fertilizer there on August 4 last year killed more than 200 people and ravaged large parts of Beirut.

The last of 59 containers was lifted onto the ship on Friday.

Heiko Felderhoff, CEO of Combi Lift, said they would be disposed of in Germany.

"The ship is here and so on the weekend we are leaving" for Germany, he said at a ceremony on the docks.

Elias Assouad, the head of the Lebanese-German Business Council, said the project

had cleared the port of "all toxic, cancerous, flammable and highly reactive chemicals that have been stored here for decades."

The German firm had been expected "to deal with only 49 containers of hazardous material," he said.

But they ended up "handling more than 75, of which 59 will be shipped."

He said 15 others would be "disposed of within safe and environmentally sound procedures in situ," without providing more details.—AFP ■

NGO files Khashoggi torture suit in France against Saudi general

AN NGO filed a case against a Saudi general in a Paris court on Friday, accusing him of being responsible for the torture of journalist Jamal Khashoggi in 2018, its lawyer said.

Khashoggi was tortured, killed and dismembered inside the Saudi consulate in Istanbul after going there to get documents for his wedding.

The Gulf Centre for Human rights (GCHR) holds General

Ahmad al-Assiri, a former intelligence official, responsible for the "physical and psychological abuse" that Khashoggi suffered just before his death, the NGO's lawyer William Bourdon said.

French courts have universal jurisdiction over crimes of torture, but not in murder cases, which is why the GCHR suit focuses on the torture claim and not the subsequent killing of Khashoggi, Bourdon told AFP.

In February, the US imposed sanctions on Assiri as well as an elite Saudi unit for their role in the killing.

The Treasury Department said it would block assets and criminalise transactions with the Rapid Intervention Force, which a declassified intelligence report said was answerable to Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, as well as al-Assiri.—AFP ■

Indonesian team to play two friendlies in UAE

THE Football Associations of Indonesia has set two friendly matches for its national football team in the United Arab Emirates (UAE) ahead of their remaining rounds of the 2022 FIFA World Cup qualifiers in June.

“The first test match will

be against Afghanistan on 25 May 2021 while the second friendly against Oman will be played four days later,” football authorities said.

“UAE will be the centralized location for the remaining matches of Group G of the 2022 FIFA World Cup qualifiers. In-

donesia will play Thailand on 3 June 2021, Vietnam on 7 June 2021 and then against the hosts UAE on 11 June 2021,” officials added.

“This is certainly positive news for the national team and will be useful for our matches in the UAE later,” said Mo-

chamad Iriawan, President of the Football Associations of Indonesia (PSSI).

“Coach Tae-yong wanted at least two test matches as a warm-up before playing in the qualifiers.

And these two countries have made the confirmation,”

Indra Sjafri, Indonesian team Technical Director said.

According to the statement with the Asian Football Confederation, the Indonesia team will start their centralized training on 1 May 2021 in Jakarta. —GNLM ■

Istiqlool become first Tajik club into Asian Champions League last 16

TOURNAMENT debutants Istiqlool on Friday became the first club from Tajikistan to qualify for the Asian Champions League last 16 despite suffering a 2-1 defeat to Uzbekistan’s AGMK.

The Dushanbe-based Istiqlool finished on 10 points from six matches to top Group A on a better head-to-head-record with Saudi giants Al Hilal, who also advanced as one of the three best second-placed teams after a 2-0 defeat by Shabab Al Ahli of the UAE.

AGMK had nothing to lose and were aggressive from the start, keeping Istiqlool goalkeeper Rustam Yatimov on his toes throughout the match at the King Fahd International Stadium in Riyadh.

After several close calls, the Tajiks finally fell to the pressure in the 67th minute with AGMK’s Zafar Polovonov heading in from close off an assist from Akramjon Komilov.

Twelve minutes later Istiqlool suffered another setback as AGMK scored their sec-

ond goal with Jovan Djokic’s powerful shot off a pass from Murodjon Toshmatov finding the net.

Istiqlool, who had already made history this month by becoming the first club from Tajikistan to feature in the continental club showpiece, pulled one back with Rustam Soirov scoring from the penalty spot after he was fouled by Komilov.

But even though AGMK withstood the pressure in the dying minutes to pull off only

their second win, it emerged that Al Hilal had been beaten by Shabab Al Ahli at Riyadh’s Prince Faisal bin Fahd Stadium.

Igor Jesus scored both the goals for Shabab in the second half to give the UAE side a second win in three matches.

Brazilian forward Jesus first struck with a spot-kick in the 54th minute after Mohamed Kanno brought down the dangerous Jaloliddin Masharipov. —AFP ■

Man. City season ‘extra special’ due to fixture stress, says Guardiola

PEP GUARDIOLA believes Manchester City’s season has been “extra special” as the Premier League leaders chase a memorable treble despite a gruelling fixture schedule.

Guardiola’s side won the League Cup last Sunday and could wrap up a third Premier League title in four seasons this weekend.

City are also on track to reach their first Champions League final if they finish off Paris Saint Germain in their semi-final next Tuesday, having earned a 2-1 advantage following Wednesday’s first leg.

All this has come in a draining campaign which City began after a shortened close-season break, with matches coming thick and fast amid the coronavirus pandemic lockdown.

“It’s a lot of games and the problem is the shortness of time. It is home, game, home, travel, travel, here, here, game, game, travel,” Guardiola said.

“You cannot enjoy one game. We don’t have time to

sit back one day or two, take a break and see what has happened.

“The team has been more resilient and calm. When you play every three days you don’t have time to see things clearly, because it’s the next one – then travel, then organise the team, then whatever. “This is the most difficult thing when you play a lot of games, but the difference here is lockdown – our lives have changed completely – and it’s a shorter period of time. “That makes this season so special for everyone. Winning one title already, close to another and playing another ‘final’ on Tuesday.

It has been exceptional.

“I don’t know what’s going to happen in the last four weeks ahead of us but the season has been extraordinary already.”

City will clunch the title if they win at Crystal Palace on Saturday and second-placed Manchester United lose against Liverpool on Sunday. —AFP ■

Chelsea face uphill task in bid for historic final

CHELSEA are gunning to become just the second English team to reach the final of the Women’s Champions League but face a battle to overhaul Bayern Munich in Sunday’s semi-final second leg.

Emma Hayes’ team are well-placed to retain their domestic Women’s Super League title after having only lost one game so far this season, but after establishing domestic prominence the Blues are aiming to become a continental powerhouse. Only Arsenal have reached the biggest match in European women’s club football, when they won the competition in 2007.

Chelsea will have their work cut out for them against Bayern, who are the competition’s leading scorers and are 2-1 ahead in the tie after last week’s first leg in Germany, following which Hayes said she would “make sure the team puts in the performance of their lives next week”.

Hayes seemed aware of the tough task awaiting her side when speaking to reporters on Friday, lamenting the poor finishing and “sloppy” goals conceded in the first leg which leave Chelsea with work to do. “I think the realities are if we’re going to progress, we’re probably going to have to score more than one goal,” said Hayes.

“We’re going to take the game to Bayern Munich. We’re at home and I think we’ve got to trust in the belief that we’re in the position because we deserve to be here, but if you want to go to the next level you have to produce something you didn’t produce before. “I want an inspired performance from the team but I’m accustomed to getting that from them, so I trust them.” Hayes’ hope that Chelsea cut out the mistakes could be rocked by the possible absence of centre-back and captain Magda Eriksson because of a calf problem. —AFP ■
