Five-Point Road Map of the State Administration Council

1. The Union Election Commission will be reconstituted and its mandated tasks, including the scrutiny of voter lists, shall be implemented in accordance with the law.
2. Effective measures will be taken with added momentum to prevent and manage the COVID-19 pandemic.
3. Actions will be taken to ensure the speedy recovery of businesses from the impact of COVID-19.
4. Emphasis will be placed on achieving enduring peace for the entire nation in line with the agreements set out in the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement.
5. Upon accomplishing the provisions of the state of emergency, free and fair multiparty democratic elections will be held in line with the 2008 Constitution, and further work will be undertaken to hand over State duties to the winning party in accordance with democratic standards.

I extend greetings to all on the occasion of the 66th Anniversary of Kayin State Day today while praying for all national people of the Union in the entire nation to be physical and mental well-being.

Kayin State is located in the south of Myanmar and enriches in beautiful natural scenes.

Papun area of Thanlwin District was designated as Kayin State in accord with Amendment Act No 62 of the Constitution in 1951. Kayin State was expanded with Kya-in-Seikkyi Township, Kawkareik Township, Hlaingbwe Township, Hpa-an Township and Thandaunggyi Township, totalling five related to Thanlwin District as the second phase in accord with the Extension of Karen State Act 14 in 1952. The Kayin State was reconstituted again with seven townships with setting Myawady as a township on 1 March 1960. As 7th November 1955 was designated as Kayin State Day when the President signed the 1951 Constitution Amendment Act to set Thanlwin District as Kayin State, today falls on the 66th Anniversary.

The Thanlwin River, a significant symbol of Kayin State, is streaming in Kayin State which possesses abundant greening landscaping and natural beauties.

Natural resources are rich in Kayin State with valuable forests in addition to successful agricultural businesses in favourably climatic conditions.

Kayin State is full of beautiful natural scenes, caves and waterfalls as well as lovely customs and traditional cultural heritage of local ethnicities. As such, it is a region capable of implementing community-based tourism, and local and foreign tour services. Happy and active Kayin don dance and music of Phasi drum of Kayin ethnic nationals are an attractive tradition that can catch the attention of those at home and abroad.

COVID-19 vaccines delivered to various states/regions

IN collaboration with civil society groups, COVID-19 vaccines are being transported to different states and regions in line with the Cold Trail Standards, which are provided by the Air Force.

Sinopharm COVID-19 vaccines, which are being stored at the expanded vaccine storage centre on Mindhamma Road in Yangon, are being transported by Cold Chain Delivery Logistics trucks by military planes to various regions and states as per the quality control standards, officials said.

On 6 November, 132,695 COVID-19 vac-

ination doses to Mandalay, 29,540 to Nay Pyi Taw Council Area, 30,821 to Monywa, 52,360 to Taunggyi, 158,353 to Patheingyi, 40,000 to Mawlamyine, 100,492 to Magway, 217,757 to Yangon, 48,645 to Pyaw, 69,383 to Bago, 41,004 to Lashio, and 24,000 doses to Hpa-an were transported by Cold Chain Delivery Logistics Vehicles.

Authorities from each township have received all the vaccines and they will be distributed to the public as soon as possible accordingly to the target population groups, officials added.

MYANMAR'S COVID-19 positive cases rose to **505,998** after **960** new cases were reported on 6 November 2021 according to the Ministry of Health. Among these confirmed cases, **476,895** have been discharged from hospitals. Death toll reached **18,804** after **21** died.—MNA

MoC oversees daily import processes for anti-COVID-19 equipment

THE Ministry of Commerce is making efforts to ensure people have access to the essential medical supplies that are critical to the COVID-19 prevention, control and treatment activities, including liquid oxygen and oxygen cylinders, by arranging continu-

ous importation through trading posts, international airports and seaports with the Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs).

On 6 November, anti-COVID-19 equipment, medical products, including masks and oxygen generators, were imported by

three companies and transported by 15 vehicles.

A total of 105 tonnes of masks were imported via Chinshwehaw trading posts, officials said.

From 1 to 6 November, a total of 80 tonnes of liquid oxygen, six tonnes of oxygen gas carried by

bowsers, 1,638 empty oxygen cylinders, two oxygen plants, six oxygen generators, 30 oxygen concentrators, 63,600 PPE suits, nine tonnes of gloves and 186 tonnes of masks were transported by 34 vehicles from 15 companies.

In the same period, two bowsers transported liquid oxygen to Yangon, another two to Mawlamyine and one to Nay Pyi Taw. Two oxygen plants were also transported to Yangon, officials said.

Officials from the relevant departments are cooperating to facilitate and expedite the Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs), including on-line registration for the import process.

It is reported that the Ministry of Commerce is coordinating with relevant departments, treatment of COVID-19, as well as contact persons for inquiries can be reached through the Ministry's Website—www.commerce.gov.mm. —MNA

Myanmar welcomes more returnees at different land borders

MYANMAR nationals returned from abroad are being welcomed at various land borders this month.

On 5 November, a total of 33 returnees – 18 males and 15 females came back home through Chinshwehaw, northern Shan State. Similarly, 45 returnees, including 32 males and 13 females, came back home through Laukai, Shan State.

Healthcare officials from relevant public hospitals and members of the Tatmadaw Medical Corps conducted COVID-19 tests and provided quarantine entry documents for the returnees.

Next, instructions of the Ministry of Health were explained systematically and departmental officials provided necessary assistance. The township administration then escorted them to their respective places in passenger vehicles, and the infected people were kept in separate places to facilitate the necessary medical and administrative matters, officials said. —MNA

Second-day meeting of UEC, political parties on electoral reform continues

THE second-day meeting of the Union Election Commission and the representative of political parties on the electoral system continued at the Yangon Region Government office yesterday.

At the meeting, U Tin Swe from the Democratic Party (Myanmar) said, at the National Convention for the Drafting of the 2008 Constitution on 30-31 October 2006, Chairman of the National Convention Convening Commission U Aung Toe said proportional representation was being adopted in many countries and Myanmar was required to establish a wide constituency and enact the necessary laws as per the decision of the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw. He discussed that the implementation of the PR system in the current Pyithu Hluttaw would lead to a good political culture in the 330-seat Pyithu Hluttaw, which selects the Chief Executive (President) as well as a good government and a strong legislature would emerge which integrate the differences.

U Aung Zin from the National Democratic Force Party said the issue of electoral reform in Myanmar is in the interest of the whole nation as well as the history of the country and emerging political processes, adding it is playing a vital role towards a new democratic federal union. He highlighted the need to pay special attention to the emergence of nation-building not only state-building but also for nation-building with multiethnic characteristics with democratic characteristics, the need to provide inclusive representation in each Hluttaw for the peace and the unity of the whole nation.

He also discussed the National Democratic Force Party has been working since

2012 to create a proportional representation (PR) system compatible with the Union of Myanmar for the emergence of a federal democratic union in Myanmar.

U Thein Zaw from Pyi said the proposal was made to include the efforts of the candidates to make the referendum acceptable to the people in order to help build a modern and developed democracy and not to deviate too much from the previous voting system. He made a detailed discussion on electoral system designs for PR elections.

U Khin Maung Thein from the National Unity Party discussed that implementation of the PR system could have advantages such as more opportunities for small parties and ethnic minorities to enter parliament, guaranteeing the rights of individual voters, increasing public interest in the election and improving turnout, increasing access to an all-inclusive voter, practising the participation of 30% women in parliament, and reducing the influence of a single party and preventing a democratic

dictatorship. He suggested that the new PR system should be introduced in the next election after the completion of emergency duties.

U Khaw Tain from New Democracy Party (Kachin) said in the previous election period, only the two major parties took turns in power, with the emergence of a strong one-party dictatorship and fewer opportunities for small ethnic minority parties due to the weak electoral system, population disparities, focus on townships and weaknesses in the rules regarding temporary migrants. He said it is necessary to change the PR system to include multi-party participation in parliament if a disciplined multi-party democracy will be practised in the 2008 Constitution.

He called for a simple PR system and designation of constituencies based on existing regions/states/districts/townships under the provisions of the 2008 Constitution and the possibility of a non-discriminatory system for ethnic minorities. He also gave suggestions on constituency division.



through the practice of proportional representation will be able to serve the interests of different ethnic nationalities, adding that she believes that the federal rights desired by the ethnic nationalities can be realized through the parliamentary process.

Afterwards, the Chairman of the Union Election Commission concluded the meeting. He expressed words of appreciation to those who enthusiastically participated in the discussion. He said the Chief Minister of the Yangon region government had made suggestions in defining constituencies, and the best will be considered although there are limitations.

This is the third time the Union Election Commission and political parties held a meeting. The first and the second meeting agreed on the electoral system, and this time focused on the implementation of a PR system that is appropriate with Myanmar. He said it is necessary to consider participating in law and administration to ensure security for all ethnic groups, adding it will improve and the country will develop more depending on the organizational capacity.

He also said political parties and interested people will be invited in the next month or two to a wide-ranging consultation on electoral system design for Region/State Hluttaw. He also added the efforts of the staff of the Union Election Commission to develop electoral researches, and that the best will be carried by obtaining opinions and ideas of political parties.

The meeting was attended by 92 representatives from 51 political parties and 18 civil society representatives, it is reported. — MNA

Daw Nan Htike Htike Win Kyaw from the Phlone-Sqaw Democratic Party discussed the systems for the township and population-based Amyotha Hluttaw PR system and for electing state and ethnic affairs ministers. She added the use of the PR system aims to create a parliamentary environment that is inclusive, in addition, to preventing electoral fraud and developing a free and fair nation.

Daw Win Kay Khine Aye from the National Political Alliances said the electoral system used during the colonial era, independence and parliamentary era, and the 2010-2020 democratic period were winner-take-all systems (FPTP system), however, due to the weakness of the system, only the winning party in parliament is dominated which resulted in disadvantages such as ignoring the interests of the people and the votes of the people who supported the other parties were wasted due to the lack of multi-party participation and the inability to have a voice of ethnic parties in parliament.

She highlighted that only

Clarification on IMF RCF/RFI loans

Q: The media outlets express that \$372 million in pandemic relief funding from the International Monetary Fund (IMF) have gone missing in the term of State Administration Council. Please explain us about it.

A: The first thing I want to say is that we can see the news covering of media and words of IMF. These things are said without any inspection. In their news, what we see is that they expose the assistance to Myanmar. The first thing is the loan. It is RCF/RFI loan provided by IMF for COVID-19 pandemic. It is Rapid Credit Facility (RCF) and Rapid Financing Instrument (RFI). The loan was taken with the agreement with the financial policy of the Central Bank of Myanmar and the Ministry of Planning and Finance. We had to conduct for two times. The government carried out in line with the financial procedures. The first time was that we received \$356million on 1-7-2020 at US dollar account of CBM and K490 billion equivalent to the received dollar amount was deposited in the State account of the Ministry of Planning and Finance on 2-7-2021. Now, the second time of the \$372.391 million was received at the foreign currency account of CBM on 28-1-2021, and K495.50billion equivalent to the received dollar amount was deposited in the State account of the Ministry of Planning and Finance on 29-1-

2021. They are the loans.

The RCF loan has a grace period of five years and a 10-year repayment term. The RFI loan has a grace period of three years and a 5-year repayment term. I mean they are the loans that we have to repay. According to the agreement between the CBM and the Ministry of Planning and Finance, the CBM carries out only for granting loan while the Ministry of Planning and Finance is for the usage of loan.

The Ministry of Planning and Finance released the report on the usage of above-mentioned RFI loan inspected by the Union Auditor-General Office at its website www.mopf.gov.mm. The

people can get information at this website. The website featured the information on the procurement cost over K100 million for COVID-19 prevention and COVID-19 Economic Relief Plan (CERP) for four times, expenditure for COVID-19 protective gears for three times and other inspections on the expenses and procedures regarding the COVID-19 prevention, control and treatment activities of the governmental organizations. Then, we are working with the ministry concerned to release the fourth information.

They will release the information in detail during this month. There, they also announce the daily cash donation and re-

maining balance for COVID-19. Such information is also released weekly. They also expressed the remaining balance, received cash contribution and closed account balance from 25-10-201 and 29-10-2021 including the expenditures for medicines. They can be seen at the website. The inventory regarding with the procurement of COVID-19 protective gears are also expressed there.

In the final list, until 29-10-2021, it included the paid amount to Chinese Sinopharm company as the final repayment on 27-10-2021. What I want to say is that the government is working hard transparently with full of responsibilities.

The news is published without observing these issues, and the knowingly publishing without caring the situation and without asking the ministry concerned by the international countries are seemed to deliberately disrupting the COVID-19 treatment processes

We, the government already expressed the completed work plans and other measures regarding COVID-19. Tatmadaw actively participated in the COVID-19 prevention, control and treatment activities before it took over the state responsibilities. Then, the military members-individually and military officials donated in the COVID-19 fund. They donated from their salaries for many times. Therefore, what I want to say is that the people and media can study regarding the news in detail at the website of ministry concerned. If they conduct something after studying, it can make more benefits.

Regarding COVID-19 pandemic, our country reported more than 40 per cent of positive cases in July. The officials talk about it now. Currently, it reaches below 4 per cent. We can see the effective government performance and public participation in COVID-19 prevention, control and treatment activities. Therefore, I want to urge the public to actively participate in these processes as before. Thank you. —MNA

About 600 acres of monsoon paddy replanted in Sagaing region

HEAVY rains in the Sagaing Region have flooded more than 3,500 acres of crops. However, about 600 acres of monsoon paddy has been replanted in that area, said Dr Tin Mar Mar Oo, the head of the Sagaing Region Agriculture Department.

About 592 acres of monsoon paddy have been replanted among a total of 3,552 acres of crops lost in the Sagaing Region. The winter crops will be also grown constantly in that remaining destroyed area in its season, said Dr Tin Mar Mar Oo.

A total of 71,951 acres of farms were inundated and about 3,552 acres were destroyed in 19 townships in Sagaing Region from July to September 2021.

As a result, about 71,951 acres of crops have been flooded including 68,792 acres of mon-

soon paddy, 83 acres of monsoon sesame, 387 acres of monsoon peanuts, 55 acres of sugarcane, 1,215 acres of winter sesame, 344 acres of other crops and 1,075 acres of other perennial crops.

Besides, a total of 3,552 acres of crops were destroyed containing 2,647 acres of monsoon paddy, 22 acres of monsoon sesame, 166 acres of monsoon peanuts, 630 acres of monsoon sesame, 22 acres of other crops and six acres of other perennial crops.

To provide timely replacement of flood-damaged crops by the floods, the relevant districts and township agriculture departments have been sharing the necessary cultivation technology and awareness to the local farmers. — Lulay/GNLM

Fuel oil imported with CBM exchange rate to distribute at reasonable price

US\$53.4 million worth of fuel oil has been imported with the Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) exchange rate to distribute at a reasonable price, according to the Consumer Affairs Department.

“The CBM has already sold \$53.4 million to our Myanmar Petroleum Trade Association (MPTA). But, we still have some dollars to withdraw from the bank. Currently, the retail stations are still selling the \$20 million worth of fuel oil. We are also making effort to sell the remaining over \$33 million worth of fuel oil through the retail stations. We are also carrying out the distribution plan,” said an official from the Consumer Affairs Department.

MPTA, in cooperating with the Ministry of Commerce has sold fuel at a fair price since 22 September, which is equivalent to the amount that the oil importers directly purchased the foreign currency from the Central Bank

of Myanmar. The Consumer Affairs Department stated that more than 51 million litres of fuel oil were sold at a reasonable rate between 22 September and 2 November 2021. Out of them, the association ended over 19 million litres of 92 Ron, over 12 million litres of diesel and over 18 million litres of premium diesel.

The fuel oil at the fairer price is available at 229 petrol-filling stations in Yangon, Mandalay, and Nay Pyi Taw cities and Mon, Shan, Kachin, Kayin and Rakhine states and Sagaing, Bago, Magway and Ayeyawady and Taninthayi regions.

If the consumers find the shops that are not being sold at the fixed price, they are urged to report to the Working Committee on Ensuring the Smooth Flow of Trade and Goods, calling 09-664075683, 09-664596327 and 09-676320816, to Yangon consumer affair department 01-250270 and

Myanmar Petroleum Trade Association 09-421006794.

The fuel oil was pegged at around at K590 per litre for diesel, K605 for premium diesel, K590 for Octane 92 and K610 for Octane 95 in early February 2021 in the domestic retail market.

Then, it strangely climbs up to K1,340 for diesel, K1,355 for premium diesel, K1,420 for Octane 92 and K1,4850 for Octane 95 at present. There is a significant price gap of K700-800 per litre, according to the local fuel oil market.

The devaluation of the local currency is the main reason for the oil price hike in the domestic market. At present, a dollar is worth around K1,900 in the domestic foreign exchange market.

Normally, Myanmar yearly imports around 600,000 tonnes of fuel oil from external markets, the Ministry of Commerce stated. — NN/GNLM

Milestones in the State Administration Council's Eighth Month

Overview

September marked the turning point in the fight against the COVID-19 pandemic, reducing test positivity rates, and achieving planned goals in the vaccination programmes against the disease. The month was also notable for increased cooperation and collaboration with neighbouring and other friendly countries.

September also saw intensified efforts of terrorist organizations dedicated to destroying the state and creating anarchy out of desperation. These efforts were thwarted by the vigilance of the security forces and the cooperation of the Myanmar people in bringing some of these terrorists to justice.

Diary of the State Leader

On 6 September, Chairman of the State Administration Council Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing presided over the 11th COVID-19 Prevention, Control and Treatment Coordination meeting. During the meeting, he highlighted the decline of the test positivity rate from 40 per cent in mid-July to 10.37 per cent in early September and emphasized the need to remain vigilant, observe health rules, and continue with the vaccination programme, especially since the infection rate remains high in some regions and states. He also mentioned the efforts for local production of vaccines, the research in traditional medicines, and the need to advance universal healthcare coverage.

On 7 September, at the second meeting of the Provisional Government of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar, the Prime Minister emphasized that a country's main strengths lay in building up its political, economic and defence might, and the health and continuous learning of its people. He discussed the improvement of

agriculture and livestock sectors, especially intending to increase exports, enhance local food security, and heighten the production of oilseed crops, cotton and other crops. The meeting also discussed plans for the hotels and tourism sector; housing construction, transportation, greening the country, the arrival of COVID-19 vaccines and the progress of vaccination programmes, with the aim being to leave no one behind.

On 9 September, the 7th Greater Mekong Subregion (GMS) Summit was convened and Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing welcomed the GMS Economic Cooperation Programme Strategic Framework 2030, which was approved at the summit, which would guide GMS cooperation in the future. He also highlighted the efforts of Myanmar to recover from the impact of COVID-19 on the economy, and for 50 per cent coverage of vaccination across the nation by the end of this year.

On 10 September, the Prime Minister inspected the New Locomotive Assembling Factory (Nay Pyi Taw) of the Mechanical and Electrical Engineering Branch under Myanma Railways and

railway station and guided the discussion on how rail transport could improve the country's transport networks.

On 13 and 14 September, SAC Chairman Senior General Min Aung Hlaing attended the Choice of Arms ceremony for the 64th Intake of the Defence Services Academy at PyinOoLwin, and on 14 September, met with senior officer instructors, senior officer lecturers, medical specialists, faculty members, officers, other ranks and families from PyinOoLwin military station. He highlighted the important role of the Myanmar Defence Services (Tatmadaw) in political changes for the country and emphasized discipline, health, fitness and skills of service members.

On 16 September, Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing inspected the Sin Min Dam, its storage and other facilities, the National Kandawgyi Garden, natural spring and water inlet channels along the circular road of the garden. The Prime Minister next met with the members of the Administration Councils of Mandalay Region and PyinOoLwin Township, departmental personnel and town

elders at PyinOoLwin Township Hall. Discussions focused on the impact of COVID-19 on businesses in PyinOoLwin, which was variously known as Flower City, a centre for tourism and education institutions. All would need to work together to reduce the COVID-19 infection rate and to accelerate the recovery process in PyinOoLwin with various local development projects in the agriculture, livestock, health and services sectors. On 17 September, the Prime Minister inspected projects related to the sports, local economy and tourism of PyinOoLwin.

On 18 September, the Prime Minister met with the members of the Kachin State authorities, departmental officials, district/township administrators and town elders at Myitkyina Township for the first time. The Prime Minister discussed the current plans for socio-economic development and peace processes in the country, the building of a firm multiparty democratic system, and the priority given to building up prosperity and food security in the country. To wean the country away from over-dependence on natural resources, diversification

would be needed, especially towards the cultivation of oilseed crops, the production of quality farming products, renewable energy, city development projects, tourism and sports. All these require human resources development built on a foundation of education, knowledge about the economy and law, and a healthy population.

The Prime Minister visited the military station in Myitkyina and explained the progress being made in the sector-wise development of the country with the Five-Point Roadmap and the Nine Objectives. He mentioned the efforts being made for the emergence of a genuine disciplined multiparty democratic system, for prosperity and food security. He urged Tatmadaw members to work hard to contribute to the development of the country while serving the military duties and providing the military families with gifts of food. The Prime Minister then met with Tatmadaw personnel who were under medical treatment at Myitkyina military hospital to personally encourage them.

On 19 September, the Prime Minister met with Tatmadaw officials and families at the Lashio military station. He updated them on the political situation, provided them with gifts of food, and encouraged the soldiers to be treated at the military hospital with words of comfort. Subsequently, the Prime Minister met with Shan State government authorities, officials of Self-Administered Zones, departmental personnel, other local authorities and town elders at the office of Shan State government. During the visit, he underscored the need to boost local production, industry development, electricity, agriculture and livestock sectors.

The era of anti-Covid pills begins

They are pills taken orally as soon as the first symptoms of Covid-19 appear, to avoid serious forms of the illness, and therefore hospitalisation. This form of treatment has been sought since the start of the global health crisis.

WHAT if a simple pill could help heal from Covid-19? US pharma giants Merck and Pfizer have announced encouraging results for oral drugs, while an anti-depressant has also shown promise in what could open up a new chapter in the fight against the pandemic.

What are these treatments?

They are pills taken orally as soon as the first symptoms of Covid-19 appear, to avoid serious forms of the illness, and therefore hospitalisation. This form of treatment has been sought since the start of the global health crisis.

After months of research, Merck and Pfizer say they have reached that elusive goal.

Early October, Merck said it was seeking authorisation in the United States for its pill molnupiravir, and Pfizer followed suit on Friday with paxlovid.

They are both anti-virals that act by reducing the virus's ability to replicate, slowing down the disease.

Both companies say clinical trials showed a strong reduction in the risk of hospitalisation. Those who took molnupiravir saw that risk diminish by 50 per cent and those who took paxlovid by nearly 90 percent, although direct comparisons

of these efficacy rates should be avoided because of the different study protocols.

An anti-depressant which is already available to the public, fluvoxamine, has also shown encouraging results in preventing serious forms of Covid-19, according to a study published in October by Brazilian researchers in the Lancet Global Health journal.

Why are they important?

If the efficacy of these drugs is confirmed, it will be a major step forward in the fight against Covid-19.

They would add to vaccines to bolster the world's therapeutic arsenal against the virus. Treatments already exist, mostly in the form of synthetic antibodies.

But these drugs, which usually target those who already have severe forms of the disease, are injected and therefore more difficult to administer.

A pill can be quickly prescribed to a patient who will then take it easily at home.

Merck and Pfizer's treatments, which so far have not shown many side effects, would entail taking around 10 doses over five days. "The success of these antivirals potentially marks a new era in our ability to prevent the severe consequences of SARS-CoV2 infection," British virologist Stephen Griffin told the Science Media Center.

What limitations?

It is difficult so far to properly evaluate Merck and Pfizer's treatments given both groups have only published statements and have not made the data of their clinical trials available.

French infectious diseases specialist Karine Lacombe warned in September that these types of announcements should be treated with "caution" until the studies can be scrutinised. She pointed out that these treatments represent a "potentially enormous" market for pharmaceutical

groups. Nevertheless, some elements indicate that Merck and Pfizer are not making empty promises.

For one, they both stopped their clinical trials earlier than expected as the results were so strong, with the okay of independent monitoring committees.

Where fluvoxamine is concerned, the data is available but is not without criticism.

Several researchers have complained that the authors did not just limit themselves to evaluating the frequency of

hospitalisations, but also assessed the frequency of prolonged emergency room stays.

This, they say, complicated the interpretation of data.

When? And how much?

Merck's molnupiravir has already been approved in the United Kingdom where health authorities on Thursday gave their green light to its use in patients at risk of developing a serious form of the illness, such as the elderly, obese people, or those suffering from diabetes.

US and EU health authorities are also urgently reviewing the drug. The European Medicines Agency promised on Thursday to "accelerate" proceedings, without giving a firm date.

Several countries have already ordered stocks of molnupiravir, such as the United States, with 1.7 million courses of the drug. The US order gives an idea of the steep price of the drug.

It comes to \$1.2 billion, which equates to around \$700 for a five-day course.

As for Pfizer, while it has not outlined a price for paxlovid, it has promised it will be "affordable" and subject to a tiered pricing approach based on the income level of countries.

Japan eases border rules to allow business travellers, students

From Monday, business visitors fully inoculated with an authorised vaccine will need to quarantine for only three days, down from a minimum of 10 days, the foreign ministry said.

JAPAN said Friday it will allow short-term business travellers, foreign students and other visa holders to enter the country, but tourists are still barred under pandemic border restrictions.

From Monday, business visitors fully inoculated with an authorised vaccine will need to quarantine for only three days, down from a minimum of 10 days, the foreign ministry said.

Plunged from record highs

Daily cases in the country of 126 million have plunged from record highs of more than 25,000 in August to the current average of just over 200.

Despite a slow start to its vaccination campaign, 73 per cent of the population is now fully inoculated.

Japan has seen comparatively few virus deaths — around 18,000 — despite never having imposed stay-at-home orders.

But for most of the past year, big cities have endured restrictions targeting nightlife and crowd sizes at large events, forcing almost all competitions and ceremonies at the Tokyo Olympics behind closed doors.

Waiting to enter

According to Japanese media, around 370,000 visa holders are waiting to enter the country and will be gradually let in.

Business travellers remain the responsibility of their firms while in Japan and need to provide activity plans for each trip, the foreign ministry said.

Visitors from three countries

deemed high-risk — Trinidad and Tobago, Peru, and Venezuela — are still barred.

The ministry did not say when tourists may be allowed in. Japan welcomed a record 31.9 million foreign visitors in 2019, and had been on track to achieve its goal of 40 million in 2020 before the pandemic hit.

Former prime minister Yoshihide Suga stepped down last month after just a year in the job, partly due to public dissatisfaction with his government's pandemic response.

He was replaced by Prime Minister Fumio Kishida, who led the ruling coalition to victory in general elections on Sunday and has promised to make the virus "top priority".

The Kapaungkya Incident

KAPAUNGKYA Village located in Taze Township of Sagaing Region has about 700 houses with its residents supporting the USDA, NLD and other political parties. Despite supporting the different political parties, the residents had lived in peaceful coexistence. After the Tatmadaw assumed responsibility for the State, NLD supporters in the village turned out to be ultra-terrorists and formed a PDF terrorist group with Theegon Sayadaw Bhaddanta Sandima acting as the leader of the group. The terrorist group killed nine people, including some children at the age of 11, 16 and 18 on 17 April this year. Similarly, the terrorist group killed three people including two old people, a woman and a man at the age of 73 each, on 9 October, and two more people, a man and a woman, on October 10. In their terrorist act of killing and setting fires, 14 people – 11 males and three females – were killed. Because of their act of threat to life, village residents who do not support their party moved to nearby villages and their relatives in fear for their lives. Some had to flee to Taze Township Police Station and USDP party offices to take refuge. As the local terrorists did further threats to them in many ways while seeking protection and refuge in that way, the refuge-seeking people went and took shelter at Sayadaw Bhaddanta Warsawa's Sasana Alinyaung Buddhist Monastery in Oomawdaw Village in Kanbalu Township. 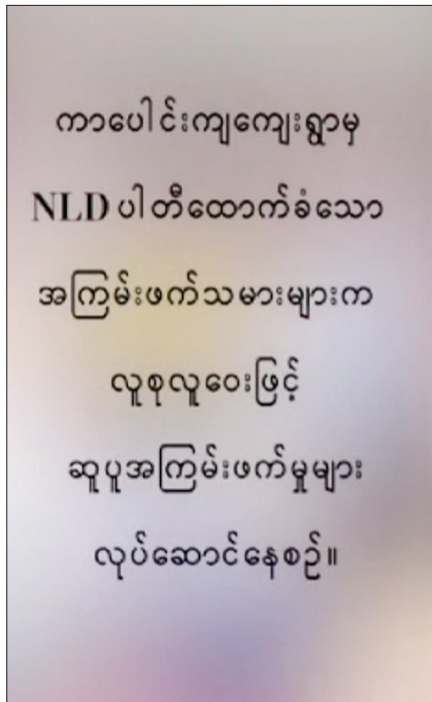

While I was begging, Kyaw Swar Htet and Wai Phyo Thant shoot my husband but missed the first shot. Kyaw Swar Htet pulled out the handgun from his pocket and shoot my husband 3 times cruelly. After that they said "He is dead, let's go" and they went to my father and mother. I cannot stop them because I knew that they would kill me if I stop them. They shoot my father first and the bullet hit the leg. While my father was screaming in agony, they shoot at the head cruelly and my father died on the spot. I was hiding and watching the scene with my son. My mother has poor eyesight and cannot even move from her bed as she was critically ill. They asked her "Are you ...". When my mother replied "Yes", they shoot my mother head cruelly. All the brains splattered, and my mother died instantly. While they went to my parents, I run and hide in the forest. They were shouting "Look for that bitch" and searching for me to kill. I was scared like hell and forget how to breathe. They set fire to our house and killed our 7 bulls. I hide in the forest the whole night sitting in the water to the knees level while raining. I was rescued by the security forces in the morning. They killed my family, burned our house, killed our bulls and took away all the belongings that we worked, earned and saved. I only left with my National Registration card. I cannot live together with the



terrorists in the same village anymore. My youngest daughter is 11 years old, my eldest boy is 17 years, study at 10th grade and my second son is 13 years old. My daughter saw her father was shot and died. She was hurt very painfully. My parents were shot and died in front of my son. 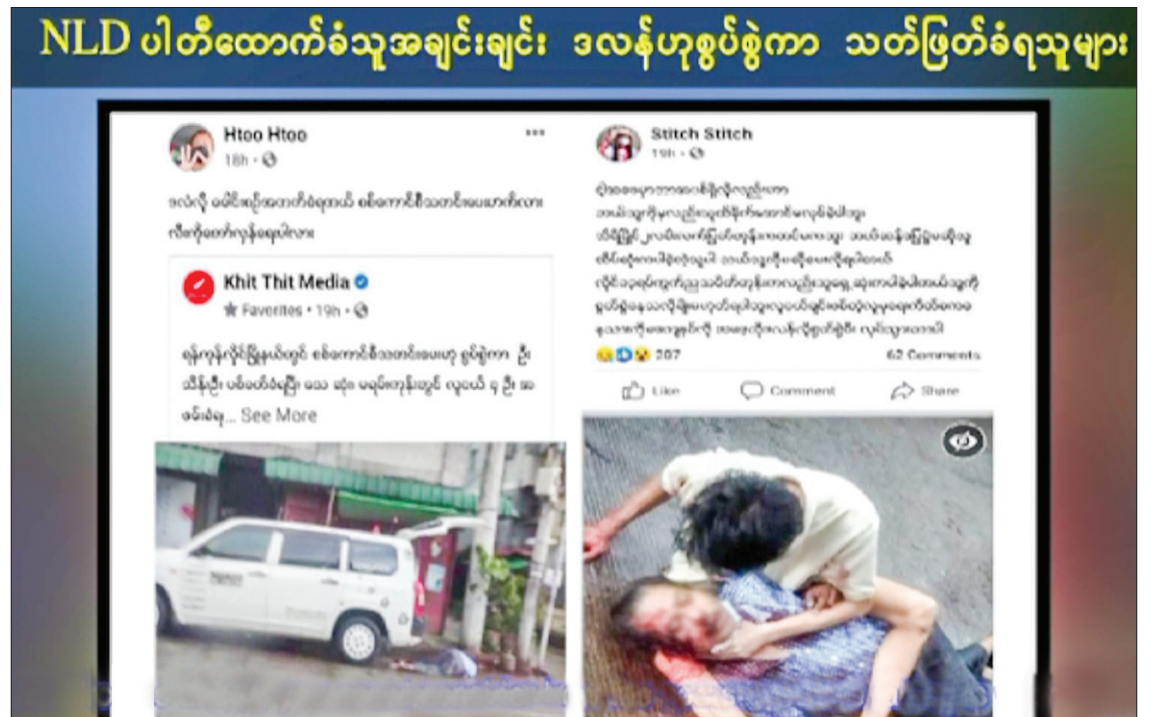
Please don't neglect them, please help them. They needed support from the military. They don't have clothes to wear, food to eat and a place to stay. They

US Congress passes giant \$1tn infrastructure package

DEMOCRATS rescued President Joe Biden's faltering domestic agenda Friday, passing a giant infrastructure package that is one of the pillars of his \$3 trillion economic vision after rebel moderates had earlier blocked a vote on his social welfare expansion.

Despite hours of cajoling lawmakers, party leaders had risked seeing Biden's two-pronged legislative strategy collapse as they failed to unite the party's feuding progressive and moderate factions.

But the breakthrough came as lawmakers rubber-stamped the Senate-passed \$1.2 trillion infrastructure bill on the House floor by a comfortable 228 votes to 206.

The passage of the infrastructure spending marks a legacy-making achievement

for Biden, amid plunging personal approval ratings and a humiliating upset defeat for his Democratic Party in the Virginia gubernatorial election.

His spokeswoman Jen Psaki said the success was "proof that delivering for the American people is worth all the painful sausage making."

"Clean drinking water for kids, broadband access, electric vehicles, biggest investment in public transit. It's happening. And more to come," she tweeted.

Party leadership in the House of Representatives began the day aiming to rubber-stamp the infrastructure bill, the biggest upgrade of roads, bridges and waterways in decades, after sending an even bigger social welfare deal, worth up to \$1.85 trillion, to the upper chamber.

But six moderate Demo-

crats refused to commit to the "Build Back Better" benefits package, arguing they first needed to see a full accounting of its economic impacts, which won't

be available for at least a week.

With a majority of just three votes in the House, Speaker Nancy Pelosi was forced to postpone the vote on the Build Back Better

package, which includes major investments in health, education, tackling climate change and expanding social welfare programs.— AFP ■

Motorbike-clogged Hanoi rolls out first urban railway

IT'S a city of more than five million motorbikes but Hanoi on Saturday opened its first ever urban railway line as authorities try to cut traffic and pollution that have long dogged the Vietnamese capital.

After years of delays and

a near-doubling of construction costs, a train eased out of Cat Linh station, close to the centre of the city, to begin its 13-kilometre journey towards the densely populated east.

"I decided to give this a try because I was curious," Nguyen

Thi Thu told AFP inside a busy carriage of the Chinese-made train.

"I am very happy to be able to take a ride after all the postponements."

Other passengers showed up early to strike a pose in front of the shiny new train, while young children on board stared in wonder out of large windows at the Hanoi skyline rushing past.

The buzzing capital of nine million people is known the world over for its dense crowds of motorbikes that fill the city's streets and make life perilous for pedestrians attempting to cross. The number of bikes on the roads has soared from two million in 2008 to 5.7 million in 2020, according to police.

The figure for cars has also rocketed in the same period, from 185,000 to 700,000.—AFP ■

Tanzania's exports to Africa rose 11.8 pct in 2020

TANZANIA'S exports to African countries increased to 2.27 billion U.S. dollars in 2020 from 2.03 billion U.S. dollars in 2019, an increase of 11.8 per cent, said the East African Business Council (EABC) on Friday.

John Bosco Kalisa, the EABC chief executive officer, revealed Tanzania's exports trend to African countries at the launch of the African Due Diligence Platform in the commercial capital Dar es Salaam. The Due Diligence Platform is among innovative solutions put in place to transform Africa's trade and helped to solve challenges African countries are facing in trading with each other.—Xinhua ■

Stellar jobs data push US stocks to new records

BLOCKBUSTER job creation helped push US stocks to new records on Friday, with an added boost from news of Pfizer's new Covid-19 treatment.

The US economy added a better-than-expected 531,000 jobs last month as a wide range of industries took on workers, and the unemployment rate dropped to 4.6 percent, Labor Department data showed.

The better-than-expected result indicated hiring is resurging as Covid-19 infections decline, and job gains in August and September were 235,000 stronger than originally reported.—AFP ■

French hotel industry on its knees: Accor CEO

THE French hotel industry is on its knees, the head of the hotel group Accor said on Friday, as it cannot afford to raise wages and is having trouble recruiting enough staff to handle the recovery as tourists return.

Sebastien Bazin, head of the world's sixth-largest hotel group, said on French radio station RMC that Accor currently

lacks at least 2,000 employees in France as the tourism market there begins to recover and foreign visitors trickle back, but still remains deeply below pre-pandemic levels. He said many employees had not returned "because they thought about things during the lockdown, because they moved, changed professions, were no longer will-

ing to accept the sacrifice of the working hours".—AFP ■

Geothermal power plants in Japan quadruple since 2011 nuke accident

THE number of geothermal power plants in Japan has quadrupled since the 2011 nuclear disaster in Fukushima, northeastern Japan, according to industry data.

Despite the surge, showed in the Thermal and Nuclear Power Engineering Society data, geothermal power accounts for only 0.3 percent of the country's total power output because many of the plants are of small scale.

With world leaders calling for urgent action to rein in global warming at U.N. climate talks in Glasgow, Scotland, analysts say it is vital for Japan to accel-

erate the introduction of renewable energy.

Despite the abundance of geothermal resources in Japan, development of geothermal power has stagnated but it is now attracting renewed attention as a renewable energy source, with the government aiming to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 46 percent from fiscal 2013 levels in fiscal 2030. As part of the goal, the Cabinet approved a plan in October to double Japan's geothermal power facilities by 2030.

Geothermal power does not emit greenhouse gases, but it takes time and

money to develop, and the national budget continued to decline until the 2011 disaster involving Tokyo Electric Power Company Holdings Inc.'s Fukushima Daiichi nuclear plant.

A geothermal plant generates electricity by extracting the steam heated by high-temperature magma deep underground through winzes to rotate turbines. Geothermal power generation is more stable than wind or solar generation, which are vulnerable to weather changes. Japan has the third-largest geothermal resources in the world after the United States and

Volkswagen CEO demands 'revolution' to tackle Tesla

VOLKSWAGEN CEO Herbert Diess told employees at the German carmaker on Thursday to prepare for the "revolution" needed to take on electric car pioneer Tesla and Chinese manufacturers.

"In the new automotive world, we are faced with competition the likes of which Volkswagen has never seen before," Diess said in a speech at the carmaker's flagship plant in Wolfsburg.

The German group — whose 12 brands include Audi, Porsche and Skoda — is pumping 35 billion euros (\$40 billion) into the shift to electric vehicles

and aims to become the world's largest electric carmaker by 2025.

With VW planning to stop producing cars with internal combustion engines in Europe for its eponymous flagship brand

as soon as 2033, its facilities will need to be retooled soon.

Diess said he was "worried" about the Wolfsburg factory, whose future has been the subject of a fierce debate within the

group, highlighting the "impressive productivity" of the new Tesla facility outside of Berlin where production is expected to begin in the next few months.

Tesla plans to produce a vehicle in 10 hours at its German plant, Diess said, while Volkswagen's main electric car factory in Zwickau requires "more than 30 hours".

Diess, who caused consternation within the company last month when he evoked the possible loss of 30,000 jobs in Wolfsburg, said: "Today is the right moment for the VW revolution." —AFP ■

Boeing 737 MAX negligence case ends with \$237.5 mn settlement

BOEING shareholders have reached a \$237.5 million out-of-court settlement with the US aircraft manufacturer's current and former directors in a 737 MAX aircraft safety negligence case, according to documents released Friday.

Shareholders had accused Boeing board members and several executives, as well as current CEO David Calhoun, of failing to ensure that control and information instruments on the 737 MAX were functioning effectively. Under the agreement, still to be validated by a judge, the \$237.5 million compensation will be paid out by insurers, not the board members and executives.

Boeing has also agreed to hire a mediator to handle internal issues and appoint a board representative with aviation safety experience. The agreement does not require Boeing to admit to negligence on behalf of persons sued in the case. The 737 MAX was involved in two crashes — one operated by Lion Air in October 2018 and the other by Ethiopian Airlines in March 2019 — that killed a total of 346 people. Investigations revealed that both incidents were related to the crash prevention system (MCAS).—AFP ■

WITH 30 more cases of the Zika virus, the total number of cases rose to 66 in the city of Kanpur in India's northern state of Uttar Pradesh on Friday, media reports said.

The total cases were reported to include 45 male and 21 females.

The first case of the mosquito-borne virus in Kanpur was reported on 23 Oct when an Indian Air Force (IAF) warrant officer tested positive for the virus.—Xinhua ■

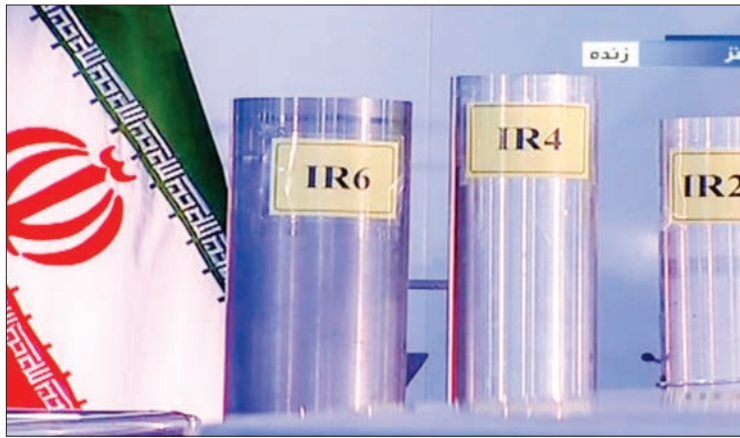

floods kill at least

INDONESIAN rescuers scrambled Friday to find survivors under mud-swamped hillsides after flash floods on Java island killed at least eight people, the disaster agency said.

Torrential rains on Thursday unleashed flash floods in Malang and the highland city of Batu, inundating houses with mud and debris, while a wall of water destroyed local bridges.

Six people were pulled from the detritus alive, while rescuers found a half dozen bodies in Batu and two more victims in Malang. On Friday, teams raced to find several more people unaccounted for in Batu, according to Indonesia's national disaster mitigation agency, as the dead were placed in body bags.—AFP ■

Iran edges closer to nuclear capability

IRAN said Friday that its stockpile of uranium enriched to 20 per cent now exceeds 210 kilograms and it has produced up to

25 kg at 60 per cent, local media reported, bringing the country closer to a nuclear capability.

State-run media attributed the information, which comes as indirect talks with the United States to rebuild the Iran nuclear agreement are scheduled for the end of this month, to Atomic Energy Organization of Iran spokesman Behrouz Kamalvandi.

It is likely to cause a backlash from the West as it marks a serious violation of a 2015 nuclear deal with world powers under which Iran's enrichment had been capped to 3.67 per cent, and brings the purity of

its enriched uranium closer to weapons-grade levels.

Iran has repeatedly broken the upper limit in order to force the lifting of crippling economic sanctions.

Tehran first announced in April that it had enriched uranium to 60 per cent purity, the highest level achieved under its nuclear program. Its moves come as parties to the 2015 agreement and the United States have held a series of discussions in Vienna with the objective of finding a way for Washington to re-enter the agreement it withdrew from in 2018.—Kyodo ■

US offers \$10 mn bounty for DarkSide hackers

THE United States announced a \$10 million reward Thursday for help finding leaders of the high-profile ransomware gang DarkSide, authorities' latest try at combatting spiking cyber-extortion attacks.

Washington blamed the Russia-based group for the online assault that forced the shutdown of the largest oil pipeline in the eastern United States in May.

Cyber-extortion heists involve breaking into a company or institution's network to encrypt its data, then demanding a ransom, typically paid via cryptocurrency in exchange for the digital key to unlock it.

"In offering this reward, the United States demonstrates its commitment to protecting ran-

somware victims around the world from exploitation by cyber criminals," said a US State Department statement.

Washington also offered a

\$5 million bounty for information leading to the arrest or conviction in any country of anyone who tries to join in an attack with DarkSide.

Despite the temptation potentially provoked by the sums, not all cyber-security experts were convinced the rewards would be effective in unmasking hackers.

"Absent a bounty hunter willing to travel to their jurisdiction, put their unconscious body in a bag and dumping it at the nearest US embassy, I doubt this will have much of an impact," said John Bambenek at Netenrich, an IT and security operations company.

"To be fair, it certainly won't hurt either," he added. Cyber crimes have been booming, with new data out in October showing \$590 million in ransomware-related payments were reported to US authorities in the first half of 2021 alone.—AFP ■

Singapore urged not to hang mentally disabled trafficker

SINGAPORE faced calls Friday not to hang a mentally disabled Malaysian man for trafficking a small amount of heroin into the city-state, with campaigners criticising the planned execution as "despicable".

Nagaenthran K. Dharmalingam was arrested in 2009 for transporting 43 grammes — equivalent to about three tablespoons — of the drug into Singapore, and sentenced to death the following year.

After exhausting a series of legal challenges in the city-state, which has some of the world's toughest anti-narcotics laws, the 33-year-old is set to be hanged on Wednesday.

It will be the first execution

since 2019 in Singapore, which maintains the death penalty is an effective deterrent against crime despite mounting pressure from rights groups for its abolition.

Supporters say that Nagaenthran has an IQ of just 69, a level that is recognised as an intellectual disability, and was struggling with an alcohol problem at the time of the crime.

"To hang a person convicted merely of carrying drugs, amid chilling testimony that he might not even fully understand what is happening to him, is despicable," said Rachel Chhoa-Howard from Amnesty International.

"We urge the authorities to immediately halt plans to exe-

cute Nagaenthran."

Human Rights Watch said it was a breach of international law to execute someone with

an intellectual disability, and proceeding with the hanging would be "disproportionate and cruel".—AFP ■

Pope to revisit Lesbos on trip to Cyprus, Greece

POPE Francis will visit Cyprus and Greece next month and will revisit the island of Lesbos, a major point of entry for migrants into Europe, the Vatican said Friday.

His 35th trip abroad comes just five months after the Argentine pontiff, who turns 85 in December, was hospitalized following surgery on his colon.

“Pope Francis will travel to Cyprus from 2 to 4 December, visiting the city of Nicosia, and to Greece from 4 to 6 December, visiting Athens and the island of Lesbos,” spokesman Matteo Bruni said in a brief statement.

Francis has travelled widely since he took office in 2013, and although his schedule was suspended by the coronavirus pan-

demic, this year he has already made a historic trip to Iraq and visits to the Hungarian capital Budapest and Slovakia.

Migration has been a key theme -- his first trip as pope, in July 2013, was to the Italian island of Lampedusa, the landing point for migrants crossing the Mediterranean from North Africa.

While there, he criticised the “globalisation of indifference” over migrants.

In April 2016, he visited Lesbos, for many years the main entry point into Europe for migrants and asylum-seekers. He paid a trip to Moria, the continent’s largest migrant camp until it was destroyed by fire last year.—AFP ■

US urges Americans to leave Ethiopia urgently as rebels join forces

THE US embassy in Addis Ababa on Friday urged Americans to leave Ethiopia “as soon as possible” over fears of a rebel advance on the capital, as nine groups battling the government joined forces.

Concern over the country’s year-old conflict is escalating after Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed’s government declared a state of emergency and vowed to press on to victory in “an existential war”.

In an advisory, the US embassy warned “the security environment in Ethiopia is very fluid.”

It urged “citizens who are in Ethiopia to leave the country as soon as possible.”

The warning came after several groups including the

Tigray People’s Liberation Front (TPLF) -- locked in a year-long conflict with the government -- and the Oromo Liberation Army (OLA) announced a new alliance.

The TPLF said Wednesday that its fighters had reached the town of Kemissie in the Amhara region, 325 kilometres (200 miles) northeast of the capital, and were running “joint operations” with the OLA, which predicted Addis Ababa could fall in a matter of weeks.

Berhane Gebre-Christos, a TPLF representative who signed the nine-party agreement in Washington, said Friday that time was running out for Abiy. “Our intention is to remove the regime,” he told reporters.—AFP ■

Drug violence shakes Mexican beach resorts

MEXICAN soldiers patrol the beach of Tulum while investigators reconstruct a crime scene in the once-sleepy Caribbean resort, reeling from the deaths of two tourists caught in gang crossfire.

“Are they filming a movie?” asks Lukas Smith, a Canadian tourist visiting the town known for its ancient Mayan ruins, turquoise waters and -- more recent-

ly -- dance music parties.

But the troops and forensic experts working at a restaurant in downtown Tulum are not actors.

It was here that a shootout between rival drug dealers last month claimed the lives of German tourist Jennifer Henzold, 35, and Indian travel blogger Anjali Ryot, 25.

Two more German visitors

and one from the Netherlands were injured.

On Thursday, another gang shooting sent tourists in swimsuits fleeing in panic from a beach near Cancun further north on the Riviera Maya. Two suspected drug dealers were killed.

The violence has shone a spotlight on the dark side of Tulum and other Mexican resorts hit by turf wars between gangs involved in drug dealing and extortion. The army and National Guard have since stepped up patrols on the streets and beaches of Tulum, where troops with rifles and bulletproof vests are now seen riding quad bikes.

Hoteliers worried

The town of 46,000 inhabitants receives about four million visitors a year following in the footsteps of celebrities such as Leonardo DiCaprio and Demi Moore.—AFP ■

EU warns London as talks stall over N. Ireland

EUROPEAN Commission Vice President Maros Sefcovic on Friday warned of “serious consequences” if the United Kingdom (UK) sought to renegotiate the protocol on Ireland/Northern Ireland.

Following talks with the UK’s Brexit Minister David Frost on how goods can be shipped between Northern Ireland and Great Britain, Sefcovic called for more sincerity from

the UK side.

“Until today, we have seen no move at all from the UK side,” Sefcovic said at a press conference following the meeting. “I find this disappointing and once again I urge the UK government to engage with us sincerely.”

“We hear a lot about Article 16 at the moment. Let there be no doubt that triggering Article 16 — to seek the renegotiation

of the Protocol — would have serious consequences,” Sefcovic said.

“Serious for Northern Ireland, as it would lead to instability and unpredictability. And serious also for EU-UK relations in general, as it would mean a rejection of EU efforts to find a consensual solution to the implementation of the protocol,” he added.—Xinhua ■

Win Theingi Tun's Gokulam FC to compete in Asian Women's Club Championship

THE 2021 Asian Women's Club Championship will be held on 7 November (today) and will feature the Indian club Gokulam, played by Myanmar women's national team striker Win Theingi Tun.

The Asian Women's Club Championship will be hosted by four clubs from four West Asian countries in a round-robin format.

Indian Club Gokulam, Jor-

dan Club Amman, Uzbekistan Club Ben Yodakov, Iranian club Shahadur Serigan will compete in the tourney.

The competition will be held from 7 to 13 November in Jordan.

Gokulam team played by Myanmar striker Win Theingi Tun will take on Amman FC on 7 November; Shahadur Serigan FC on 10 November; and Ben Yodakov on 13 November respectively.

Indian club Gokulam has signed Myanmar women's national team striker Win Theingi Tun on a short-term contract for the current tournament, becoming the first Myanmar female player to go abroad.

French quadruple amputee to swim across world's highest lake

A Paralympian quadruple amputee, an Olympic silver medalist and an "eco-adventurer" will attempt to swim 122 kilometers across the highest navigable lake in the world to raise awareness of environmental pollution.

The French trio -- Theo Curin, 21, Malia Metella, 39, and Matthieu Witvoet, 27 -- were in La Paz on Friday finalizing preparations to swim across Lake Titicaca on the border of Bolivia and Peru.

"One of the reasons is that I wanted to take on a challenge that has never been done before," said Curin, a Rio 2016 Paralympian who had part of both arms and both legs amputated when he was six after contracting meningitis.

Starting on Wednesday, the trio will swim from Copacabana on the Bolivian side of Lake Titicaca, 122-kilometres across to Puno on the Peruvian side of the world's highest body of navigable freshwater, some 3,800 metres above sea level.

They have been training for 13 months at Lac de Maudouze in the Pyrenees for the challenge, which they expect will take then 10 days to complete.

Besides the long distance they will have to cover and the high altitude which will make the task more difficult,

the swimmers will come up against the cold: the water temperature is just 10 degrees Celsius.

They will take turns to swim an expected 12 kilometres a day while the other two will keep warm and fed in a boat traveling alongside the swimmer.—AFP ■

Xavi appointment delayed as Barca reluctant to pay release clause

BARCELONA'S attempt to appoint Xavi Hernandez as coach was held up on Friday over his Al Sadd release clause, with Xavi and Barca considering splitting the payment to complete the deal.

Al Sadd announced in a statement earlier on Friday that Barca had agreed to pay the clause in Xavi's contract, which is reportedly set at around 5 mil-

lion euros (\$5.8 million).

But while Barcelona remain confident Xavi will be their new coach, the club disputed that a deal had been agreed and were yet to confirm the Spaniard's appointment almost five hours later.

A source close to negotiations told AFP on Friday discussions were still ongoing over the clause and one possibility was Xavi and Barcelona would each

contribute to the payment.

"Al Sadd have said it is official but Barca have not. Let's wait," said Barca's interim coach Sergi Barjuan, who is expected to be in charge for the La Liga game against Celta Vigo on Saturday.

Al Sadd published photos on social media of Xavi saying goodbye to the club's players and staff.—AFP ■

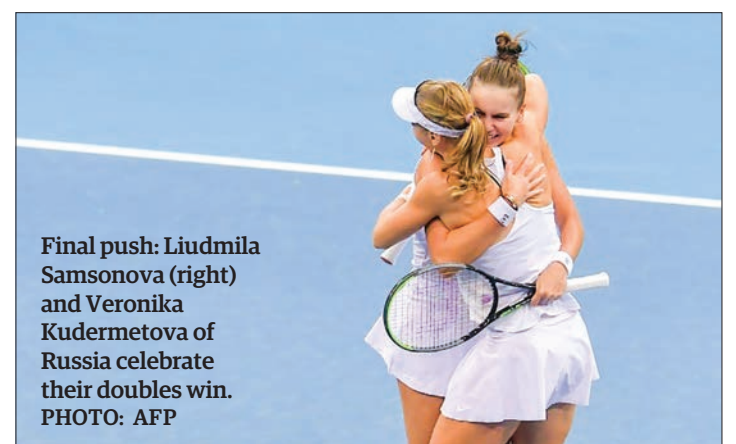

Russia face Switzerland in Billie Jean King Cup final

LIUDMILA Samsonova and Jil Teichmann stole the show in the Billie Jean King Cup semi-finals in Prague on Friday as they set up a final clash between Russia and Switzerland.

Both had only played doubles at the tournament so far, but they were the crucial force behind Russia's semi-final win over the United States and Switzerland's trashing of Australia at the rebranded version of the Fed Cup.

The 40th-ranked Samsonova, Russia's lowest-ranked player at the tournament, beat Sloane Stephens 1-6, 6-4, 6-3 before teaming up with Veronika Kudermetova to sink Shelby Rogers and Coco Vandeweghe 6-3, 6-3 in the doubles.

Danielle Collins won the only point for the United States as she edged Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova 6-7 (9/11), 7-6 (7/2), 6-2.

Teichmann demolished Australia's Storm Sanders 6-0, 6-3 before Belinda Bencic eased past Ajla Tomljanovic 6-3, 6-2 to send Switzerland into Saturday's final.—AFP ■
