Industrial crop elephant foot yams - a gift of nature By Nadi Min

LEPHANT foot yam is a natural gift that keeps on giving," said Salai Kyaw, Chin ethnic people.

His native town Chin State possesses a beautiful landscape of mountain ranges and the elephant foot yams in their natural habitats.

"There is a need to control weeds in tuber crops. It does

not need fertilizer treatment. As it is a cash crop, some growers eye the yams and execute commercial farming. Once the yams are harvested, it makes handsome profits," Salai Kyaw

There are approximately 80 varieties of elephant foot yams. It is used in making traditional medicine in Japan.

The yams are rich in essen-

tial minerals. It is a rich source of dietary fibre, protein, and vitamins that brings many health and nutritional benefits. It contains oxalic acid, and it is not suitable to be consumed raw like taro. It can be used in food, pharmaceutical and industrial sectors with value-adding.

The yam is native from South East Asia. It is also naturally grown in Asia, Africa, and Indochina tropical regions. The yam species found in Myanmar contain 60 per cent of glucomannan, so Myanmar's native yam is highly nutritious and tasty compared to the yams from other Asian regions.

As a result, China, Japan, the Republic of Korea and India prefer the yams from Myanmar.




Industrial crop elephant foot yams - a gift of nature

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"Most importantly, the yams (pink flesh) produced in Chin Hills and Bago mountains (Bago Yoma) have a high content of glucomannan which is greater than the standard amount. Those with white flesh from central Myanmar have a low content of glucomannan. This is why it is a gift bestowed by God", said U Aung Thwin Ko, in charge of Nyaunghnapin's nursery yard under the Department of Agriculture.

The yams are primarily cultivated in Chin, Kachin, Kayah, Kayin, Mon and Shan states and Sagaing, Taninthayi, Bago, Magway and Ayeyawady regions. Growers from the Yangon Region also started to plant that tuber crop. This



the department for further information", U Aung Thwin Kosaid.

"The elephant foot yam is not an alternative crop. It is industrial crops that can be grown under a tree-based intercropping system.

The growers have to pump in the capital of K5 million per acre for the commercially valued yam within one year. They can receive profits of K8-10 million. It is a lucrative crop with high profits and significant investments.

At present, the security issues impede the cultivation of elephant foot yams. Consequently, the market is quite sluggish.

The growers have to







being so, the yam growing acres have reached a hundred thousand.

The yam is fertile in welldrained soil, forest land and alluvial soil. If the soil drains too slowly and they are waterlogged, it will lead to root rot. It is not a salt-resistant plant. It is a tropical tuber crop. It can be grown within 60-120 inches of rainfall, the temperature at 25°-35° and 1,000-5,000 above sea level. If it is above 2,500 feet, there need to be no shade trees. If grown below 1,000 feet, tree-based intercropping is required for shade. The yams can be cultivated by intercropping with perennial coffee, rubber, and oil palm trees. It can also be grown separately.

The yams can be grown naturally across Myanmar, except in the extreme hot regions. Nevertheless, early harvest resulted in the extinction of the natural yam. Therefore, systematic yam cultivation began in 2007.

"It is hard to harvest the naturally grown yams as we don't know where to dig. Sometimes, it affects quality. We can dig them up systematically if planted on our farms", U Aung Thwin Ko elaborated.

The propagation is possi-

ble by root stems and tuber. It takes about four years for them to be commercially valued for plant propagation by roots. It is marketable within two or three years for propagation by tubers.

"The yams can be naturally grown from stems as well as from tubers. That's why it is named as a cash crop which growers never give up on", U Aung Thwin Ko shared his opinion.

The harvested yams should be stored in cold and dry places before they are delivered to processing plants.

"Glucomannan extracted

from elephant foot yam is exported to foreign markets. The remaining starch is sent to the feed processing industry", U Aung Thwin Ko explained.

Under the Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation, the Agriculture Department is providing technical assistance and offering awareness courses for the growers to help choose pedigree seeds.

"The yam species of good quality originated in Chin State cannot be grown in Yangon because of different land quality. The growers must choose the species that are suitable for each region. They can contact choose the climate-resilient seeds by aiming towards exports and making readiness for market recovery.

"The elephant foot yams are native to Myanmar like tapioca. It can be grown anywhere in the country. Nevertheless, the growers need to focus on quality control. The systematic growing and handling method is of vital importance for the yams to penetrate the external market. As it needs a large amount of investment, the growers need to consider thoroughly before planting them," U Aung Thwin Ko suggested.

On 4 May, a joint team led

by the Yangon North District Forest Department and the Myanmar Police conducted an investigation under the auspices of the Yangon Region Anti-Illegal Trade Task Force.

A total of 2.3020 tonnes of illegal teak (estimated at K690,600) and two vehicles carrying the timbers (approximately K30,000,000) were seized on the Yangon-Mandalay Expressway,

Hlegu Township.

Similarly, 7.6314 tonnes of illegal timbers (estimated at K1,526,280) and a 10-wheel Nissan UD truck carrying these timbers (estimated at K45,000,000), and a total value of K77,216,880 were seized near Milepost 51/2, Yangon-Pyay Road, Taikkyi Township. The action was taken under the Forest Law.

In addition, the Customs and Excise Team inspected the container terminal of Myanmar Industrial Port under the management of the Customs Department on 6 May.

Battery and accessories not listed in the import declaration (ID), clothing, consumer goods and cosmetics (estimated at K125,232,000) were seized and action was taken according to the Customs procedures.

Next, the Customs team inspected the Kawkareik (Tadakyoe) Joint Inspection Station

under the management of the Kayin State Anti-Illegal Trade Task Force on 7 May.

During the inspection, Lipo-Vitan-D soft drinks (estimated value of K4,550,000) were seized from a truck and action was taken according to the Customs pro-

Similarly, a joint inspection team led by the Region Forestry Department conducted an inspection under the management of the Anti-Illegal Trade Task Force.

During their inspection, 0.7050 tonnes of illegal teak logs (estimated value of K141,000) were seized near Milepost 37/0 of the Yangon-Mandalay Expressway and action was taken under the Forest Law. The traffickers were prosecuted at Dala Myoma police station under Section 25/32 of the Anti-Trafficking in Persons Law. The South District Court sentenced them to a 10-year jail with labour under Section 25 of the Anti-Trafficking in Persons Law on Thursday. — MNA

Petrol price high; diesel price declines on 7 May

IN local fuel market, the petroleum price was high and the diesel price slightly declined on 7 May, according to the Fuel Import, Storage and Distribution Supervisory Committee.

The committee released the prices based on the 4 May reference retail prices of MOPS.

"Since the fuel price becomes over K2000, our business is not good. At that time, the CNG-fuelled taxis are in good condition but they have to queue at the gas station. The passengers want us to open the AC when they hire the taxi. They also think the taxi fare is high. They should know our condition that we do not even get the car rental fee for owner as the fuel price is high," said Ko

Kyaw Swa Oo, a taxi driver from Sangyoung Township.

The fuel prices in Yangon yesterday were K2,065 per litre of 92 Octane, K2,125 per litre of 95 Octane that were higher K30 per litre than on 6 May.

It was K2,345 per litre of diesel and K2,375 per litre of premium diesel and the prices dropped between K50 and K20 than the prices of 6 May. The petrol prices were slightly high in Nay Pyi Taw, Mandalay and other regions/states and the diesel prices declined. In the global fuel market, it was \$1.21 per litre of 95 Octane in the US and \$1.419 per litre of diesel while \$1.399 per litre of 95 Octane in Thailand and \$0.927 per litre of diesel. — TWA/GNLM

MIC invites EoI for eight investment sectors



The Office of the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration-DICA

MYANMAR Investment Commission (MIC) called for EoI (Expression of Interest) submissions for eight sectors to fulfil the needs for the development of the country and nation-building.

The priority sectors are (a) fertilizer production, (b) cement production (c) steel production, (d) agriculture and livestock breeding, (e) value-added foodstuffs production (f) electronic

vehicles production, (g) medicine and health related material production and (h) public transportation.

If interested Myanmar and foreign investors submit proposals for the investment, the MIC, ministries concerned and region/state governments will provide the necessary things.

The country approved 48 investments amounting to

\$684.686 million in foreign investments and 38 Myanmar citizens' investments totalling K468393.528 million between October 2021 and March 2022, and it created 42,880 job opportunities.

The MIC permitted \$684million and K468 billion worth of local and foreign investments during the first six months of 2021-2022. —TWA/GNLM

MoC to revoke exporters/importers' registration certificates if exporters fail to deposit their export earnings within 3 months

THE Ministry of Commerce announced that the exporters/importers' registration certificates will be revoked if the export/import companies do not deposit their export earnings within the fixed period of the Central Bank of Myanmar.

The statement said exporters must deposit their export earnings into their banking accounts in foreign currencies within three months from the date of the shipment of goods without fail under the Foreign Exchange Management Law, Foreign Exchange Management Regulations and Notification No 46/2021 of the CBM.

The exporters/importers' registration certificates of 346 export companies were revoked in 2021 for failing to follow the orders of the CBM. — TWA/ GNLM

Myanmar nationals convicted in Thailand deported home through Ranong

A total of 123 Myanmar nationals and nine children convicted in Thailand were deported to Myanmar in eight boats via Ranong on 6 May.

The Myanmar migrant workers have been released from prison in Thailand for various reasons. Cross-border special forces repatriated the Myanmar citizens from Ranong to Kawthoung by eight tugboats.

The migrant workers were welcomed by Myanmar authorities led by Labour Attache U Ye Lin Htet and officials from the Boundary Committee.

A total of 123 Myanmar migrant workers, including 96 males and 27 females, were handed over to Myanmar after serving their sentences in Thailand for various reasons, including seven children, two boys and two girls, officials said.

They were accepted following the COVID-19 rules and regulations, according to the Myanmar Labour Attache. — TWA/GNLM

The National Skill Standards Authority-NSSA is carefully turning out the skilled workers in Myanmar. It has been issuing recognition certificates on national level work skills since 2014. So far, it has assessed skilled labours in 30 kinds of jobs and recognized 17.103 qualified, skilled work-

Currently, NSSA decided to assess 5,000 candidate labours for 33 kinds of jobs to recognize them as skilled labours in the 2022-2023 financial year. A plan is underway to conduct the training courses on skill standard scheming and assessment techniques to be able to

contribute to the assessment process of the NSSA

Indeed, the NSSA's processes to assess the skilled labour and issue the recognition certificates to the candidates emphasize the improvement of the skills of Myanmar labours. Hence, such a process is expected to meet the demand for skilled workers in the country's labour market.

As the development of human resources is a sector which is essential for the improvement of the nation, Myanmar workers should attend the relevant skill training courses to possess job opportunities by uplifting their capacity and skilled qualification. If so, they will have the firm confidence to encounter the challenges in the workplace with easily solving any problems.

To build a modernized country, the government, the employers and the skilled labour need to join hands with one another in implementing the essential projects benefiting the State and the people in the long run. Hence, let's turn out qualified, skilled workers without delay!

Countries in WHO South-East Asia Region renew commitment to eliminate malaria by 2030

HE WHO South-East Asia Region on 5 May 2022 renewed its commitment to eliminate malaria by 2030, with countries pledging accelerated action and greater efforts at the sub-national and community levels.

"We need the support of all leaders, policymakers, development partners, donors, the private sector, non-governmental organizations, civil society, and the public to actively support commitments to accelerate progress toward a malaria-free Region," said Dr Poonam Khetrapal Singh, addressing a seminar on 'Malaria High Burden to High

At the seminar, ministers of health and WHO endorsed a Statement on Renewed Commitment for Malaria Elimination. The renewed commitment calls for greater efforts to get back on track, with ownership and governance of actions towards elimination being devolved to sub-national and community

It calls for urgently scaling up proven implementation strategies and adopting newer, innovative strategies such as new investments, vector control approaches, diagnostics, antimalarial medicines, and other tools to speed the pace of progress against malaria.

In 2020, the Region had five million estimated cases and 8,900 estimated deaths – 80 per cent fewer cases and 77 per cent fewer deaths compared to 2010 – and the largest decline in any of the WHO regions.

While applauding efforts made by countries that enabled WHO South-East Asia to become the only WHO Region to achieve the 2020 global milestone of reducing malaria cases and deaths by 40 per cent against 2015 levels, the Statement cautioned that the achievements so far were not enough to reach the elimination targets.

The Maldives and Sri Lanka have maintained their malaria-free status. Eliminating malaria by 2025 continues to be a real possibility in Bhutan, DPR Korea, Nepal, Thailand, and Timor-Leste.

"We have a long way to go to eliminate malaria in all countries. The Region is at a crossroads in response to malaria elimination. Over the years, we have witnessed either stagnation or at times reduction in overall funding, contrary to the undeniable need for an increase in funding necessary for malaria elimination," Dr Khetrapal

Singh said

The Regional Director called for accelerating efforts to attain and maintain malaria elimination in all countries by implementing key strategic interventions outlined in the Regional Action Plan 2017-2030. These include - ensuring universal access to malaria diagnosis and treatment by enhancing and optimizing case management; universal access to malaria prevention by enhancing and optimizing vector control and increasing sensitivity and spec-

ificity of malaria surveillance. High-burden countries with diverse geographical and pop-

ulation contexts must adopt subnational and locally relevant approaches, ensuring a speedier trajectory that prioritizes the hard-to-reach and underserved, and those at risk of being left

behind, Dr Singh said. "Across each of these areas, investment and innovation will continue to be crucial, with a focus on new vector control approaches, as well as better diagnostics and antimalarial medicines. Drug resistance must be addressed sooner rather than later," she said.

The renewed commitment statement calls for consistently high level of tailored elimination

efforts and focused actions at the sub-national levels to prevent resurgence of cases, cross-border transmission, and achieve malaria elimination.


It also emphasizes on greater domestic funding and diversification of funding sources for malaria elimination along with increased political leadership and new partners to join in the malaria elimination efforts.

Today's renewed commitment follows earlier pledges by Member countries to eliminate malaria from the Region before or by 2030, made in the 2017 Ministerial Declaration for Accelerating and Sustaining Malaria

Elimination and the 2018 Minis terial Call for Action to eliminate malaria in the Greater Mekong Subregion.



China to make county towns priority in new phase of urbanization

CHINA has released guidelines demanding various localities across the country promote urbanization with a focus on county towns.

The guidelines, jointly issued by the General Office of the Communist Party of China Central Committee and the State Council General Office, said the move aims to better meet the needs of rural residents to find jobs and settle down in county towns.

The guidelines list a series of measures including developing

competitive industries, creating more jobs in county towns, and strengthening ecological conservation, adding that by 2025, major progress will be seen in the drive.

China's urbanization rate of permanent residents hit 64.72 percent in 2021, according to the National Development and Reform Commission.

The country aims to raise its urbanization rate to 65 per cent during the 2021-2025 period, according to the 14th Five-Year Plan.— Xinhua

India, Pakistan must brace for even worse heatwaves

THE devastating heatwave that gripped India and Pakistan over the last two months is unprecedented, but worse — perhaps far worse — is on the horizon as climate change continues apace, top climate scientists told AFP.

Even without additional global warming South Asia is,

statistically speaking, ripe for a "big one" in the same way that California is said to be overdue for a major earthquake, according to research published this week

Extreme heat across much of India and neighbouring Pakistan in March and April ex-

posed more than a billion people to scorching temperatures well above 40 Celsius (104 Fahrenheit). The hottest part of the year is yet to come.

"This heatwave is likely to kill thousands," tweeted Robert Rohde, lead scientist at Berkeley Earth, a climate science research non-profit. The number of excess deaths, especially among the elderly poor, will only become apparent in hindsight.

Heatwave mortality in India has increased by more than 60 per cent since 1980, according to the country's Ministry of Earth Sciences. But "cascading impacts" on agricultural output, water, energy supplies and other sectors are already apparent, World Meteorological Organization chief Petteri Taalas said this week.—AFP

Microbe-based faux beef could save forests, slash CO2

GRADUALLY replacing 20 per cent of global beef and lamb consumption with meat-textured proteins grown in stainless steel vats could cut agriculture-related CO2 emissions and deforestation in half by 2050, researchers reported Wednesday.

Compared to a current-trends projection for popu-

lation growth and food demand, swapping half of red meat consumption for so-called microbial proteins would see reductions in tree loss and CO2 pollution of more than 80 per cent, they reported in the journal Nature. "With a relatively small change in the consumption of ruminant meat, greenhouse gas emissions

from tropical deforestation can be strongly reduced," lead author Florian Humpenoder, a scientist at the Potsdam Institute for Climate Impact Research (PIK), told AFP. "This is an important contribution to reaching the Paris Agreement climate targets, with additional co-benefits for other sustainability goals." —AFP

UN action plan for clean, affordable energy by 2030 announced

The United Nations launched its Energy Plan of Action on Wednesday to gain clean, affordable energy for all by 2030, a UN spokesman said.

The plan sets out steps for collective action by 30 entities of the world body and international organizations to achieve the massive pledge they made at the High-level Dialogue on Energy last September, said Stephane Dujarric, the chief spokesman for UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres.

That commitment included gaining access for 500 million more people to electricity and 1 billion more to clean cooking solutions, the creation of 30 million jobs in renewable energy and energy efficiency by 2025, said Dujarric. Clean, affordable energy by 2030 is crucial to addressing the climate emergency and net-zero emissions by 2050.—Xinhua

Chinese scientists find potential in lunar soil to generate oxygen and fuel

Chinese material scientists have found the soil on the moon may potentially be able to generate oxygen and fuel, a find that signifies more tantalizing possibilities of utilizing lunar resources to further human exploration on the moon or beyond.

The researchers with Nanjing University showed that the lunar sample brought back by China's Chang'e-5 probe contains active compounds that can convert carbon dioxide into oxygen and fuel.

Initially, they hope to design a system that takes advantage of lunar soil and solar radiation, the two most abundant resources on the moon, according to a study published on Thursday in the journal Joule.

After analyzing the Chang'e-5 lunar soil, the team found the sample contains iron-rich and titanium-rich substances, which could work as a catalyst to make oxygen using sunlight and carbon dioxide. The team proposed a strategy using lunar soil to electrolyze water from the moon and the astronauts' life support system into oxygen and hydrogen. The process is powered by sunlight.—Xinhua

FILIPINO domestic worker Marites Saliganan loves getting outdoors on her one day off a week, and after Hong Kong's government lifted a pandemic ban on gathering at beaches on Thursday, she and her friends

headed for the sand.

Nestled on the southern side of Hong Kong's main island, the wealthy town of Stanley offers a welcome respite from the city with its low-rise houses and seaside eateries.

But anyone venturing onto the beach in the last seven weeks faced hefty fines, as the city imposed its strictest social distancing measures yet to curb a virus outbreak earlier this year.

"We are so happy because today is the day of reopening the beach," Saliganan, sporting a wide-brimmed hat, told AFP.

While much of the world began adjusting to living with the coronavirus, Hong Kong has gone in the opposite direction, hewing to a lighter version of China's zero-Covid strategy.

A wave of the highly transmissible Omicron variant began tearing through the city's defences in January. It killed more than 9,000, mostly unvaccinated elderly people, and forced the reimposition of painful social distancing curbs that have plunged Hong Kong towards another economic recession.—AFP

Airline giant IAG cuts loss on Covid recovery

AIRLINE giant IAG, owner of British Airways, said Friday that it narrowed its first-quarter net loss after Covid travel curbs were lifted, and forecast a return to annual profit.

The loss after taxation improved to 787 million euros (\$832 million) in the first three months of the year, IAG said in a results statement.

That followed a net loss of 1.1 billion euros in the same part of 2021 when planes were grounded by the coronavirus pandemic.

Revenues more than tripled to 3.4 billion euros.

"The continued easing of government-imposed travel restrictions, particularly in the UK, resulted in improved travel demand, with no noticeable impact from the war in

Ukraine," IAG said in the earnings release.

"Quarter one saw strong business travel recovery, with premium leisure remaining strong."

However, airlines generally post losses over the period because it covers the seasonally slower months of the year.

IAG added Friday that seasonal low demand, the Omicron Covid variant and rising costs had weighed on its performance.

Yet the overall proportion of seats filled on flights was better than one year ago as bookings accelerated and economies reopened.

"Demand is recovering strongly in line with our previous expectations," said chief executive Luis Gallego.—AFP

Vaccines still protect against new **COVID-19 variants: WHO**

EXPERTS from the World Health Organization (WHO) emphasized on Wednesday that vaccines are still highly effective against COVID-19, even new variants of the disease emerging in South Africa and the United States, reported Xinhua.

WHO data shows that global cases of COVID-19 are continually declining, with reported weekly deaths at their lowest level since March 2020. However, the Organization's Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus cautioned at a press briefing on Wednesday that these trends don't tell the full story.

"Driven by Omicron sub-variants, we are seeing an increase in reported cases in the Americas and Africa. The South African scientists who identified Omicron late last year have now reported two more Omicron sub-variants, BA.4 and BA.5, as the reason for a spike in cases in South Africa," he said.

"It's too soon to know whether these new sub-variants can cause more severe disease than other Omicron sub-variants, but early data suggests vaccination

remains protective against severe disease and death," he

According to Maria van Kerkhove from the WHO's Health Emergencies Programme, BA.4 and BA.5 have been detected in a number of countries. The WHO is still evaluating the severity of the two new variants.

However, van Kerkhove said it is not yet possible to confirm whether BA.4 and BA.5 have resulted in increased hospitalizations, as any rise in numbers could be due to a general spike in case numbers in South Africa. Nevertheless, she emphasized: "Vaccines still work incredibly well against preventing severe disease and death."

She also called for monitoring of, and testing for COVID-19 to continue in order for the WHO to be able to provide the public with the most accurate information and advice possible. —Xinhua

Chinese recombinant protein vaccine effective against COVID-19 in phase-3 human trials: study

A China-developed recombinant protein vaccine against COVID-19 has shown to be safe and effective in the latestage human trials, according to a study published online in The New England Journal of Medicine on Thursday.

The three-shot vaccine ZF2001 was jointly developed by the Institute of Microbiology under the Chinese Academy of Sciences and Anhui Zhifei Longcom Biopharmaceutical Co. Ltd.

Researchers conducted the Phase-3 trials between 12 December 2020 and 15 December 2021 at 31 clinical centers across Uzbekistan, Indonesia, Pakistan and Ecuador, and one in China. More than 28,000 adults aged 18 and above participated in the tests, with 6.4 per cent of them aged 60-plus.

World food prices fall slightly from record high over Ukraine war: FAO

WORLD food prices fell slightly last month after hitting a record in March but remain high due to the Ukraine war, the UN's Food and Agriculture Organization said Friday.

International sanctions against Russia as well as export flow disruptions resulting from the 24 February invasion have sparked fears of a global hunger crisis.

Russia and Ukraine, whose vast grain-growing regions are among the world's main bread-baskets, account for a huge share of the globe's exports in several major commodities, including

wheat, vegetable oil and corn.

The FAO's food price index, which had reported records for both March and February, dipped 0.8 per cent in April compared to the previous month, the agency said in a statement.

"The small decrease in the index is a welcome relief, particularly for low-income food-deficit countries, but still food prices remain close to their recent highs, reflecting persistent market tightness and posing a challenge to global food security for the most vulnerable," FAO chief economist Maximo Torero Cullen said.

The modest drop was led by vegetable oil prices, with the FAO's vegetable oil price index down 5.7 per cent in April.

However, the FAO said that prices remain very high amid "uncertainties about export availabilities out of Indonesia, the world's leading palm oil exporter".

Indonesia's decision to suspend palm oil exports in the face of domestic shortages has pushed vegetable oil prices to new highs, further tightening a market already on edge due to the war in Ukraine and global warming.—AFP

China fine-tunes regulatory policy to boost property market development

CHINA'S central and local authorities are fine-tuning housing policies to seek a balance between defusing risks and spurring demand, amid efforts to boost the steady and sound development of the property market.

While reiterating the principle that "housing is for living in, not for speculation," a key meeting held last week by the Political Bureau of the Communist Party of China Central Committee called for efforts to improve real estate policies based on local realities.

Giving a shot in the arm

to both the demand and supply sides, it urged support for meeting the demand from both first-time home buyers and home upgraders and optimizing regulation over the prepayment for commercial housing.

China's property industry, with a size of 10 trillion yuan (about 1.5 trillion US dollars) and involving scores of subsectors across the supply chain, has been a key underpinning for the economy. Official data showed that the industry's value-added output accounted for 6.8 per cent of the country's gross domestic product in 2021.—Xinhua

Closing the 'escape valve': Venezuela pursues de-dollarization

HAVING opened its arms to the US dollar as an "escape valve" Venezuela is now trying to re-energize its own currency, which has been crippled by devaluation in recent years.

The aim is to incorporate \$3 billion circulating on the streets of the South American country into its financial system, but experts warn it is a risky gamble. Distrust in the bolivar due to severe devaluations, demonetization and four

years of hyperinflation persists, despite a slow down in price rises and economic recovery following seven years of recession in which GDP fell by 80 per cent. The dollarization, described by President Nicolas Maduro as an "escape valve", alongside an easing of price controls brought an end to the scarcity of bare essentials and the interminable queues for what little was available, such as a bag of rice.—AFP

Soy boon for Argentina as Ukraine war boosts prices

RUSSIA'S war on Ukraine has sent grain prices skyrocketing — a worry for consumers worldwide but potentially a boon for producers like Argentina, which hopes an influx of soybean "agridollars" will boost its faltering economy.

South America's third-largest economy is the biggest exporter of soybean meal and oil in the world, and only the United States and Brazil export more soybean grains.

Soy represents nearly a third of Argentina's exports and in 2021 contributed \$9 billion to the state coffers.

This year, the sector is expecting record sales of \$23.7 billion — about \$700 million more than in 2021 — despite a 10 per cent smaller harvest due to severe drought.

"The prospects for the producer are good... There is optimism," said Martin Semino,

who sells farming equipment and presides over the Rural Society of Lobos, a fertile agricultural zone southwest of Buenos Aires.

The harvest season is at its height, and workers are labouring from dawn to dusk to clear the fields before the autumn rains arrive.

"Soy is the dollar, the cur-

rency of the countryside," Semino told AFP.

In the past, the grain has been a saviour for inflation-troubled Argentina.

A soybean boom in the 2000s is widely considered to have helped the country recover from its worst economic crisis in 2001.—AFP

Cameroon, European Investment Bank sign agreement on funding railway line

CAMEROON and the European Investment Bank (EIB) on Thursday signed an agreement on funding the railway line between Belabo and Ngaoundere in the eastern part of the Central African nation.

Vice-President of the EIB Thomas Ostros began

a working visit in Cameroon Thursday, hoping to explore further avenues of economic cooperation between the EU and the Central African nation. During his stay, Ostros met with the country's Prime Minister Joseph Dion Ngute and other senior government officials in Yaounde, the capital of Cameroon, and discussed the prospects for increasing investment.

It is believed that the signing of the agreement during his visit will involve an investment of 80 billion XAF (about 129 million US dollars).—Xinhua

German industry production in March falls due to ongoing supply problems: Destatis

PRODUCTION in Germany's industry in March fell by 3.9 per cent compared to the previous month due to ongoing supply problems, according to preliminary

figures published by the Federal Statistical Office (Destatis) on Friday.

The last time there had been a sharper decline was during the first

COVID-19 lockdown in Germany in April 2020, when monthly production figures plummeted 18.1 per cent, according to Destatis.

Due to interrupted supply chains resulting from the pandemic and the Russia-Ukraine conflict, many German companies were still facing problems completing their orders. 80 per cent of companies currently had to deal with supply problems, according to a study by the ifo Institute.

"Germany, as an export-oriented country, has been disproportionately affected by the trade sanctions against Russia," the Ministry for Economic Af-

fairs and Climate Action (BMWK) said in a statement.

Important intermediate products had become scarce due to the Russia-Ukraine conflict, the ministry added, pointing to a 14 per cent drop in automotive production in March due to a shortage of wiring harnesses.

Energy production slumped 11.4 on the previous month, following a "marked increase" in February. According to Destatis, fluctuations were "mainly due to changes within energy production from wind power."

Indonesia seizes tanker over palm oil export ban violation

THE Indonesian Navy has seized a tanker that was carrying palm oil out of the country in violation of an export ban, a spokesman said Saturday.

Indonesia, the world's

largest producer of palm oil, prohibited its export last week to rein in skyrocketing domestic prices and shortages.

An Indonesian warship intercepted the Singapore-flagged MV Mathu Bhum on Wednesday as it headed for Malaysia, Navy spokesman Agung Prasetiawan said in a press release.

"The ship was carry-

ing... 34 containers containing refined, bleached, deodorized (RBD) palm olein. This is the type of material that is temporarily prohibited for exports," he added.—AFP

TOP Dutch bank ING said on Friday that profits dipped by more than half for the first quarter of 2022 as results were hit by Rus-

Havana hotel explosion death toll doubles to 18: Cuban President

EIGHTEEN people, including a pregnant woman and child, died as a result of a powerful explosion that destroyed the Saratoga hotel in Havana on Friday, the Cuban presidential administration said on Saturday.

"Cuban President Miguel Diaz-Canel thanked friendly countries for the solidarity shown in the face of the Saratoga Hotel accident. According to preliminary figures announced at the meeting, 18 people were

killed, including a pregnant woman and child," the administration said after the meeting.

The Cuban authorities said earlier in the day that nine people died and 40 injured as a result of the explosion.—ANI

Over 24 million Afghans need humanitarian aid

MORE than 24.4 million people are in need of humanitarian aid in Afghanistan—an increase from 18.4 million in 2021, said a report by the US Special Inspector-General for Afghanistan Reconstruction (SIGAR).

The report states that the Taliban takeover of the country

and the resulting cut in international assistance has led to a worsening humanitarian crisis.

70 per cent of the Afghans are unable to provide for their basic needs, SIGAR said in a report to the US congress.

"Some 70 per cent of households reported being unable to

cover basic food and non-food needs, reflecting the impact of decline in household incomes," according to the study, citing US State Department figures.

The report adds that people selling their kidneys as evidence of how dire the situation has become.

According to international assessments, Afghanistan has now the highest number of people in emergency food insecurity in the world, with more than 23 million in need of assistance, and approximately 95 per cent of the population having insufficient food consumption.

Of particular concern is the vulnerability of more than four million internally displaced, including people belonging to minorities and over 3.5 million seeking refuge in neighbouring countries.—ANI

S Korean ex-presidential candidate Lee to run in by-election

SOUTH Korea's ruling Democratic Party on Friday picked Lee Jae Myung, who ran in the March 9 presidential race from the party, as a candidate for parliamentary by-elections slated for 1 June.

Lee lost to Yoon Suk Yeol of the main opposition People Power Party in the presidential elec-

tion after a neck-and-neck race. The DP said Lee will run in the National Assembly by-elections for a seat in a constituency in Gyeyang, Incheon.

The Gyeyang district in the western port city had been represented by former Democratic Party Chairman Song Young Gil, who resigned as a lawmaker and made a bid to become the next mayor of Seoul.

The by-elections will be held concurrently with local elections. Lee will also head the party's campaign for the elections, said Koh Yong Jin, a spokesman for the DP.—Kyodo

Bali to deport Russian couple for nude photos on sacred tree

A Russian influencer and her husband will be deported from Bali after staging a nude photo shoot on a sacred tree in violation of local culture, officials on the Indonesian holiday island said Friday.

Alina Fazleeva, who has thousands of followers on Instagram, posed naked on a 700-year-old banyan tree at a temple in Tabanan district.

The picture, which was taken by her husband Andrey Fazleev, was uploaded to Instagram and went viral, irking Balinese communities.—AFP

US sanctions cannot stop Iran's drone capability: lawmaker

THE United States cannot stop the development of Iran's drone capability by putting embargoes on it, a senior Iranian lawmaker told official news agency IRNA on Friday.

"By sanctioning Iran's drone power, the United States is trying to create Iranophobia in the region," said Mohammad Hassan Asfari, a member of the Iranian parliament, referring to the recent US lawmakers' move to sanction Iran's drone power.

Through these pressures, Washington also seeks to get more concessions from the Islamic republic at the negotiating table in Vienna, said Asfari. But Iran's drone capability is "non-negotiable and unstoppable", he said.—Xinhua

Pro-Marcos misinformation targets main rival in Philippine polls

THE son and namesake of the Philippines' late dictator Ferdinand Marcos is on track to win Monday's presidential poll, after a massive misinformation campaign whitewashed the family's past and smeared his main rival.

Leni Robredo, the incumbent vice-president, is the last obstacle to the controversial clan achieving their goal of returning to the presidential palace they fled in disgrace in 1986 following a popular uprising.—AFP

N Korea fires apparent submarine-launched ballistic missile

NORTH Korea on Saturday fired what is presumed to be a shortrange, submarine-launched ballistic missile into the sea off its eastern coast, South Korea's military said, three days before President-elect Yoon Suk Yeol's inauguration.

The apparent SLBM was likely launched from waters near North Korea's eastern port city of Sinpo at around 2:07 pm, according to South Korea's Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Japanese Defence Minister Nobuo Kishi also said North Korea fired what is believed to be

an SLBM, adding it flew about 600 kilometres with an altitude of around 50 km.

It likely landed outside Japan's exclusive economic zone and the Japanese government has received no reports of damage, according to officials.

Kishi said North Korea could complete its preparation by the end of this month to conduct a nuclear test and Japan's Defence Ministry has shared such a view with the United States.

North Korea, which has been conducting a series of missile tests since the beginning of this year, last launched an SLBM in October.

The latest test came three days after Japan and South Korea detected North Korea's test-firing of a ballistic missile from Pyongyang's Sunan area and ahead of the inauguration of the South Korean president-elect on Tuesday.

North Korea's show of force came also as US President Joe Biden is scheduled to visit South Korea and Japan from 20 to 24 May, making it his first trip to Asia since taking office in January 2021.—Kyodo

Moscow museum chronicles NATO 'cruelty' amid Ukraine campaign

PAINTINGS of wounded children and grieving women line the walls, while loudspeakers spit out the sound of approaching war planes.

Welcome to a Moscow exhibition depicting NATO's "crimes" amid Russia's military campaign in Ukraine.

"NATO. A chronicle of cruelty" opened at the Museum of Contemporary Russian History in Moscow in early April, over a month after President Vladimir Putin sent troops to the pro-Western country.

According to the museum, the display is dedicated to the history of NATO including the United States' atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki in 1945, despite the Western military alliance being founded only in 1949.

It also lists the bloc's bombing of Yugoslavia in

1999, US-led wars in Iraq and Yaroslav Polestrov, 46, said. Afghanistan as well as cooperation between Ukraine and NATO "that has led" to the current conflict.

Dozens of civilians evacuated from besieged Ukraine plant

FIFTY civilians were evacuated Friday from Mariupol's besieged steelworks, the last pocket of Ukrainian resistance against Russian forces in the city, Kyiv said, but reports of renewed firing cast doubt on a promised truce.

About 200 civilians, including children, had been estimated to still be trapped in the Soviet-era tunnels and bunkers beneath the sprawling Azovstal factory, along with a group of Ukrainian soldiers making their last stand.

Ukrainian Deputy Prime Minister Iryna Vereshchuk, who announced Friday's evacuation of the 50, said the operation would

continue Saturday morning.

Russia had earlier announced a daytime ceasefire at the plant for three days, starting Thursday.

But the Ukrainian army says Russian "assault operations" have continued by ground and by air.—Xinhua

G7 leaders will hold video conference with Zelensky on Sunday

LEADERS of the world's top industrialized nations will hold video talks with Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky on Sunday, a spokeswoman for the German government as acting G7 chair said.

"The German chancellor (Olaf Scholz) will hold the third video conference since the start of the year with his G7 partners," Christiane Hoffmann told reporters on Friday, noting that 8 May is a "historic date marking the end of World War II in Europe".

"It will cover current issues, particularly the situation in Ukraine. Ukrainian President Zelensky will take part and report on the current situation in his country."—AFP

New Mariupol mission

A new UN-led rescue mission is under way to evacuate the last civilians still trapped inside a besieged steel plant in Mariupol that has become the devastated city's final holdout against Russian forces, Ukraine says.

About 200 civilians, including children, are estimated to remain in hiding in the Soviet-era tunnels and bunkers beneath the sprawling Azovstal factory, along with hundreds of Ukrainian

President Volodymyr Zelensky's office earlier said almost 500 civilians had been evacuated.

Oil embargo a 'red line': Hungary

Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orban says European Commission head Ursula von der Leven has crossed "a red line" with a proposed EU Russian oil ban.

Von der Leyen has said the bloc would "phase out Russian supply of crude oil within six months, and refined products by the end of the year". Hungary and Slovakia -- both highly dependent on Moscow's oil exports -- would have until the end of 2023.

"I avoid the word 'veto'," Orban, who has cultivated close ties with Putin, says on state radio, adding the proposal "has been returned to sender, to Madame President, to work on further".

MORE than 400 athletes from Laos are to participate in the 31st Southeast Asian Games in Viet Nam from 12 to 23 May.

Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of National Defence, Chansamone Chanyalath, and Minister of Education and Sports, Phout Simmalavong, held a press conference in Laos' capital Vientiane on Thursday to announce the country's participation at the Games. Laos is to send teams to compete in petanque, billiards, kickboxing, Lao and Thai boxing, wushu, cycling, taekwondo, Sepak Takraw, pencak silat, karate, judo, professional wrestling, archery, running, weightlifting, vovinam and swimming.

Other sports at the Games are badminton, football, tennis, volleyball, golf, gymnastics, E-sports, shooting, table tennis, body building and dance sports. Lao wushu team, comprising five male and two female athletes, is expected to bring home a gold medal.

In 2019, Lao athletes competed in 24 sports at the 30th SEA Games in the Philippines, winning a gold medal in kickboxing, as well as five silver and 29 bronze medals.
