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## Five-Point Road Map of the State Administration Council

1. The Union Election Commission will be reconstituted and its mandated tasks, including the scrutiny of voter lists, shall be implemented in accordance with the law.
2. Effective measures will be taken with added momentum to prevent and manage the COVID-19 pandemic.
3. Actions will be taken to ensure the speedy recovery of businesses from the impact of COVID-19.
4. Emphasis will be placed on achieving enduring peace for the entire nation in line with the agreements set out in the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement.
5. Upon accomplishing the provisions of the state of emergency, free and fair multiparty democratic elections will be held in line with the 2008 Constitution, and further work will be undertaken to hand over State duties to the winning party in accordance with democratic standards.

## Bagan eyes more local/foreign tourists as hoteliers prepare quality services

**T**HE hotels and motels across the nation are making preparations for local/foreign travellers in the New Year period, December and the hotels in the Bagan Ancient Cultural Zone, the heart of Myanmar people, are also ready to host both domestic and international travellers during the New Year festival and Bagan pagoda festival.

The Bagan Ancient Cultural Zone with a 19 square miles area boasts 3,822 pagodas and hosts great numbers of travellers in the open season. While the tourism industry of Bagan was suspended during the COVID-19 outbreak, the government concerted its greatest efforts to revive the tourism sector in 2022

There are also visitors via land routes. The numbers of local travellers are high during long holidays. This month, the hotel/motel offer promotion for Christmas and new year. They prepare regional food and music bands. They are making arrangements to lure visitors to pay a visit to the Bagan Ancient Cultural Zone again. There are various loca-

tions and picturesque scenes. The number of visitors increased in October 2022 and that amount might remain unchanged until 2023. Hotel bookings are also on the rise for the new year festival," said U Win Aung, Deputy Director of the Directorate of Hotels and Tourism (Bagan Branch).

A total of 154 hotels and 75 guesthouses supervised by the development committee in Ba-

gan are ready for local/foreign travellers.

The Bagan Ancient Cultural Zone hosts 107 tourists by flight in October and 188 tourists in November. Hotels expect higher numbers of travellers in December than in previous months, said U Moe Wai, owner of Bagan No 18 Hotel.

"For Bagan tourism, we launch competitive services to

attract visitors. There are tourists and our hotel welcomes many Spanish tourists. In the early period of the full moon day of Pyatho, there will be higher numbers of domestic and international travellers for the Ananda Pagoda festival. The travellers also make hotel reservations for December new year festival. Hotels and motels in Bagan always welcome Myanmar's open sea-

son and prepare competitive services during this open season," he said.

Hotels offer new services such as K7,000 per air conditioning unit per person including breakfast this open season and entertainment programmes with Myanmar traditional orchestra featuring the essence of Bagan's cultures.—Nyein Thu (MNA)/KTZH

## 8 new cases of COVID-19 reported on 17 December, total figure rises to 633,551

MYANMAR'S COVID-19 positive cases rose to **633,551** after **eight** new cases were reported on 17 December 2022 according to the Ministry of Health.

The total number of patients who have recovered from COVID-19 in the country reached **608,112** including **23** new recoveries.

The death toll from COVID-19 in the country remained unchanged at **19,488** on 17 December with no new deaths reported from the pandemic.

Daily laboratory examination showed decline of infection to less than one per cent for 32 successive days.

According to the research, it is found that people who have been vaccinated do not suffer severely from the disease, need not to be hospitalized and unlikely to die. If they have received booster shot, the death rates can be reduced more.

As such, the people need to follow the new normal way in living with COVID. Hence, all the people above five have to fully receive COVID-19 vaccination inoculated by the Ministry of Health free of charge. Six months after the vaccination, they have to take booster jabs at relevant health centres and ward/village administration offices without fail.

Moreover, they have to wear masks while in closed chambers and public places. They need to often wash hands with soap and water or the hand gel containing alcohol (at least 60 per cent) for 20 seconds.

People need to follow the social distancing rule and avoid the crowds as much as possible. While not wearing masks, if they cough and sneeze, they need to cover mouth and noses with elbows in line with the personal hygienic ways. ## Inauguration of 9-storey medical building at Pathein General Hospital hails Diamond Jubilee Independence Day

AS a gesture of hailing the Diamond Jubilee Independence Day, a ceremony to inaugurate a 9-storey medical building took place at the Pathein General Hospital yesterday morning, attended by Secretary of the State Administration Council Lt-Gen Aung Lin Dwe.

The SAC Secretary unveiled the signboard and bronze plaque of the building and viewed round relevant medical wards, the blood centre, laboratories, operation theatres and other facilities.

Speaking on the occasion at the multifunctional hall of the building, the Secretary said that during the tenure of the State Administration Council, annexes were opened at hospitals in Hinthada, Hpa-an, Magway, Monywa and Waibargi of Yangon. The nine-storey new medical building of Pathein General Hospital was built on 2.23 acres of land with more than K22 billion from the allotted fund. Arrangements are being made to

upgrade Pathein General Hospital as a 500-bed facility formed with speciality departments.

more than 60,000 outpatients in 2022.

## Illegal timbers, consumer goods, construction materials, Agri-materials and vehicles confiscated

AN on-duty team under the supervision of the Customs Department conducted inspections on 15 December at the Myanmar Industrial Port container checkpoint and captured 570 boxes of fancy chains worth K5,250,000 that were not declared in the Import Declaration (ID) from a container. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

In addition, the Pyawbwe township food and drug administration under the management of the Mandalay Region

FDA conducted market monitoring activities and confiscated 54 bags of fertilizers (Myinpyan brand) worth K4,425,000 without a product label in the Myanmar Language. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

An on-duty team confiscated K4,038,400 worth of sandals and construction materials that were not declared in the Import Declaration (ID) from two vehicles and two trailers (estimated value of K230 million) at the Mayanchaung permanent checkpoint in Mon State. The

action was taken under Customs procedures.

On 16 December, a total of 12.0262 tonnes of sawn teak worth K7,937,292 from a vehicle (approximately K30 million) was seized in Shwepyitha township in Yangon North District and the action was taken under the Forest Law.

Therefore, 10 arrests (estimated value of K281,650,692) were made on 15 and 16 December, according to the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee. — MNA/MKKS

## Dollar exchanged at K2,850 higher than CBM's reference rate

ALTHOUGH the Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) set the reference exchange rate at K2,100 per dollar, it reached K2,850 per dollar in the market, according to local forex traders.

The CBM released a statement at a reference rate within the margin of  $\pm 0.3$  for selling, purchasing and exchanging foreign currency on 10 August.

Therefore, the banks and business persons including exchange counters set the purchase price at K2,100 per dollar and the selling price at K2,106 per dollar.

Despite the set prices, the purchase price was K2,835 per dollar while the selling price was K2,985 per dollar in the unauthorized market on 17 December.

Thus, the CBM declared on 15 December that there is no plan to fix the reference

rate, despite a gap between the market price and the reference price.

Some unscrupulous traders spread rumours of possible changes in CBM's reference rate and the various reasons for rising dollar prices, to manipulate the market, the CBM stated.

In addition, CBM sold US\$ 108 million, including USD liquidity and salary transactions, into the market in 45 days and announced further selling in the future.

Also, the hard currency US dollar hit a high of over K4,500 in the forex market at August-end. Consequently, the CBM sold dollars at its auction market for the sectors in need, to stabilize the exchange rate. A total of US\$443.8 million were sold at an auction rate in 2021 as well. — NN/CT

### Telecom operators announce importance of re-registration of SIM cards

SIM cards users in Myanmar need to check their identifications and re-register their SIM cards with correct information by 31 January 2023, according to the announcement of Posts and Telecommunications Department (PTD) under the Ministry of Transport and Communications.

Re-registration can safeguard digital and physical security, and users can safely use mobile financial services and be protected from fraudulent activities.

SIM card users in Myanmar are required to register SIM cards using their full name, Citizenship Scrutiny Card (National Registration Card, NRC) number and its clear and correct front and back color photos by the activation of the SIM card.

The Posts and Telecommunications Department an-

nounced that the SIM cards information shall be checked with national database of the Ministry of Immigration and Population and those with incomplete/incorrect information shall be deactivated.

Therefore, it is utmost important that all SIM card users in Myanmar are encouraged to check their identification and re-register their SIM cards within the defined period to avoid the deactivation.

The SIM card users can check their current registered ID by dialing \*601# for Myanmar Posts and Telecommunications (MPT), \*766# (or) \*979\*3\*3# for ATOM, \*666# for Ooredoo and \*966\*6# choose 2 for Mytel.

Re-registration of SIM cards can be done on official website and applications of respective operators and at respective point of sales. — TWA/KTZH

### Drugs worth over K1069.94 billion seized over 11 months

HOME Affairs Union Minister Lt-Gen Soe Htut said there were 6,276 drug seizures worth over K1,069.94 billion during 11 months of 2022 at the meeting of the Central Committee on Drug Abuse Control 1/2022 at the hall of Myanmar Police Force in Nay Pyi Taw on 14 December.

In 2022, there were 6,276 cases of drug seizures of over 1.1 tonnes of raw opium, over 1.32 tonnes of opium, over 16 4.87 million stimulant tablets,

over 21.75 tonnes of Ice (methamphetamine), over 2.04 tonnes of ketamine including other drugs and chemicals which are used in making of drugs.

As a result of drug control operations, the number of captures has increased every year and special operations are carried out 37 times in 2022.

There were 26 drug-related cases transferred to the Financial Intelligence Units in 2022 and 29 cases were transferred in 2021. — TWA/MKKS

### ME to resume extension process for PJ passports on 7 Jan 2023

MYANMAR Embassy in Thailand announced the extension process will resume for Myanmar PJ passports, which expired in 2022, in Thailand on 7 January 2023.

In addition, the process will

include those who have previously received appointment tokens, and OWIC cards will also be issued. The Myanmar Embassy (new location) will carry out the extension process on Saturday only from 9 am to 12 noon.

The Myanmar Embassy notified that appointment tokens will be stamped in old passports and issued only to those who come in person to the Myanmar Embassy in Thailand.—TWA/MKKS

### New tamarind enters market during Christmas season

THE new Darsin (chopped) tamarind from Yamethin township enters the Yangon market at K2,300 per viss starting 14 December, according to the Sinpanlan tamarind and chilli wholesale centre.

The new tamarind usually enters the Yangon market near Christmas yearly and they are also available in the market this year.

Shortly after tamarinds from Yamethin arrived at the market, the ones from Kyaukpadaung township enter the

market.

Later 2021, the new Darsin tamarind entered the market at K2,000 per viss and the prices of new ones this year are higher compared to the same period of the previous year.

Although tamarind merchants expected that prices can rise in 2022, prices of tamarinds and Shan garlic are slightly higher this year.

In early 2022, the Yangon market received the new Darsin tamarind at K2,000 per viss.

The new Pwintkat tamar-

rind was K2,100 per viss on 28 January and K2,000-2,100 per viss on 16 December.

The Bayintnaung tamarind wholesale centre said tamarinds will not fetch good prices in 2022 while tamarind traders expect higher prices in 2022 for a large number of leftovers and various reasons.

In November, the tamarind entry to the Bayintnaung wholesale centre increased.

The Akyawswal tamarind is also exported to foreign countries. The Darsin tamarind fetches the lowest prices and is most common in the market only in the early period of the year.

The Pwintkat tamarind weighting one viss is also available in the market. The Akyawswal tamarind price is lower than Darsin tamarinds. The tamarind without seed fetches the highest price in the market.

The price of the Pwintkat and Darsin mix stands at a low level. The one-viss tamarind and pile of tamarind weighing 10/11 visses are available in the market. — TWA/KTZH

## Muse border sees surge in rice export

MYANMAR'S rice and broken rice export to China through the Muse border have risen, said U Min Thein, vice-chair of the Muse Rice Wholesale Centre.

At the end of November, the daily export volume was over 20,000 rice bags. At present, more than 30,000 bags of rice are daily shipped to China via the Muse border.

As Chinese Yuan payment is given the go-ahead for rice exports to China and 100 per cent of export earnings can be used without limits, rice export has risen, he added.

"The authorities nod Chinese yuan payment. Moreover, rice exports are not affected by a new forex rule. This is the strong point for rice traders compared to other commodities. Approximately 30-40 truckloads of rice and broken rice (50 bags per truck) are daily leaving for China through Muse," U Min Thein elaborated.

On 14 December 2021, the Central Bank of Myanmar released a notification that the use of Yuan or Kyat in the bilateral transaction was officially allowed in the border areas between Myanmar and China to boost bilat-

eral cross-border trade, facilitate trading and bilateral transaction, increase the use of domestic currency, as per the objectives of the ASEAN Financial Integration

However, Foreign Exchange Supervisory Committee notified the traders of the dollar payment for agricultural exports such as rice, corn, oil crops, beans and pulses, according to a directive dated 30 June.

Export earnings have to be exchanged according to the CBM's reference rate of K2,100.

Therefore, there is a large gap between the reference rate and the over-the-counter rate (K2,870).

According to a meeting 66/2022 of the Foreign Exchange Supervisory Committee, export earnings of some items can be made in Chinese Yuan and Thai Baht in addition to the US dollar. The CBM's notice dated 18 November takes effect on those export items; various pulses (green gram, black gram, chickpea, pigeon pea), edible oil crops

(peanut, sesame seeds), corn, rubber, fishery products (fish, shrimp, crab, eel) and livestock products (live cattle, hides, frozen meat, dried meat).

The traders need to apply for a licence to make Yuan or Baht payments. According to the US dollar policy, 65 per cent of earnings must be exchanged for local currency at the CBM's reference foreign exchange rate, while exporters can use 35 per cent of export earnings or transfer or sell them to authorized

dealers (ADs) or others with an over-the-counter rate within one month.

This directive came into effect starting on 21 November, the CBM stated.

However, rice and broken rice exports to China via the Muse border are excluded from that forex rule. So, rice and broken rice exports are allowed to proceed with Yuan as before.

Therefore, rice export returned to normality. The prices in the Muse trade zone stood at 127 Yuan per 50-kilogramme bag of broken rice and 140-150 Yuan per bag of rice.

At present, Myanmar daily delivers rice, broken rice, rubber, various beans and pulses, fishery products, chili pepper and other food commodities to China through Kyinsankyawt by 100 trucks and building materials, electrical appliances, household goods and industrial raw materials are imported into the country by 40 trucks.

As China eased coronavirus restrictions, only the Kyinsankyawt checkpoint out of the Sino-Myanmar land borders linking to the Muse post are reopened. — NN/EMM

## Monsoon onion price slumps within week

MONSOON onions from various regions are entering the Yangon market on daily basis. There is only a demand for domestic consumption in the market, leading to a drop in the price of monsoon onions from the Myingyan area up to K1,600 per viss (a viss equals 1.6 kilogrammes), according to onion depots in the Bayintnaung market.

Various varieties of monsoon onions around 180,000 visses entered the market on 16 December and most of them are from the Myittha area. The wholesale prices are K1,500-K2,800 and K2,300-K3,700 per viss for Myingyan and Myittha onions based on varieties.

Except for new monsoon onions, summer onions whose price rose to the highest price

of K5,100 per viss starting from 6 December are no longer entering the Yangon market. On 9 December, the price per viss of big-sized Myingyan onions and Myittha onions were K4,400 and K4,800, indicating a fall in price by K1,600 and K1,500 per viss respectively.

Two regional depots are receiving 150,000 to 200,000 visses of new monsoon onions supply daily.

New monsoon onions weighing 159,156 visses arrived at the Pakokku market on 8 December at a record price of K3,500 per viss. Similarly, the Myingyan depot received 162,480 visses of monsoon onions on 9 December, with the highest price rate of K3,400 per viss.

Although the highest price of onions from the Myittha area

hit K4,000 per viss in the Mandalay market on 8 December, it dropped to K2,800 per viss on 16 December.

The year 2022 is unique in the history of the domestic onion market. Onion price set a new record three months earlier than the previous years. The record price has risen from the previous price of K3,700 to K5,100 this year.

New monsoon onions were planted early because the price of summer onions went up earlier than expected. A great number of new monsoon onions are entering markets in Yangon and other regions despite the minor damage in the plantation. Growers of summer onions are expected to get more profits in the coming summer, like the rain-fed rice of 2022, it is learnt. — TWA/CT

On 9 December 2022, a bronze plaque was installed at the Royal Thante School called Dio High School as the ancient cultural heritage in Aungmyaythazan Township of Mandalay Region. Such a school was built and donated by King Mindon to Dr Marks in 1869. In fact, it was the oldest high school in Myanmar.

In the monarchical era, Myanmar royal princes including King Thibaw in his princelyhood pursued an education in Latin, English, Geography, Mathematics, History and other subjects. Currently, the historic Thante School has been transformed into the No 10 Basic Education High School in Aungmyaythazan Township where students from various statuses of families have chances to learn education happily.

Everybody needs to preserve ancient tangible and intangible cultural heritage for ensuring long-term existence and to adore these kinds of heritage to be passed down from generation to generation as a natural duty. If so, the posterities will clearly know the value of the cultural heritage of the nation and histories in successive eras in preservation measures.

## WHO eyes end to Covid emergency in 2023

**T**HE World Health Organization said Wednesday it hoped that Covid-19 would no longer be a public health emergency in 2023, as it urged China to share information that could pinpoint how the pandemic started.

As the third anniversary of the original outbreak rolls around, the WHO said the virus was here to stay but would need managing alongside other respiratory illnesses.

WHO chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said the weekly Covid death toll was now around a

fifth of what it was a year ago — but was still far too high.

"Last week, less than 10,000 people lost their lives. That's still 10,000 too many and there is still a lot that all countries can do to save lives," he told a press conference.

"But we have come a long way. We are hopeful that at some point next year, we will be able to say that Covid-19 is no longer a global health emergency." The WHO's emergency committee on Covid-19, which advises Tedros

on whether the virus constitutes a public health emergency of international concern (PHEIC), will

discuss the criteria for declaring an end to the emergency phase when they next meet in January.

Maria Van Kerkhove, the WHO's Covid-19 technical lead, said the committee would look at the epidemiology, variants like Omicron, and the impact of the virus. While waves of infection are still expected, the pandemic "is not what it was in the beginning", with cases resulting in fewer hospitalizations and deaths, she said.

"These deaths are largely happening among people who are not vaccinated," or have not received their full course of jabs,

Van Kerkhove said.

While the WHO says more than 13 billion vaccine doses have been administered, around 30 per cent of the world has not received a single dose, she added.

### Covid origins

Nearly 650 million confirmed Covid cases and more than 6.6 million deaths have been reported to the WHO, though the UN health agency acknowledges this will be a vast undercount.

Tedros said that as the world looks to end the Covid emergency, which has upended economies

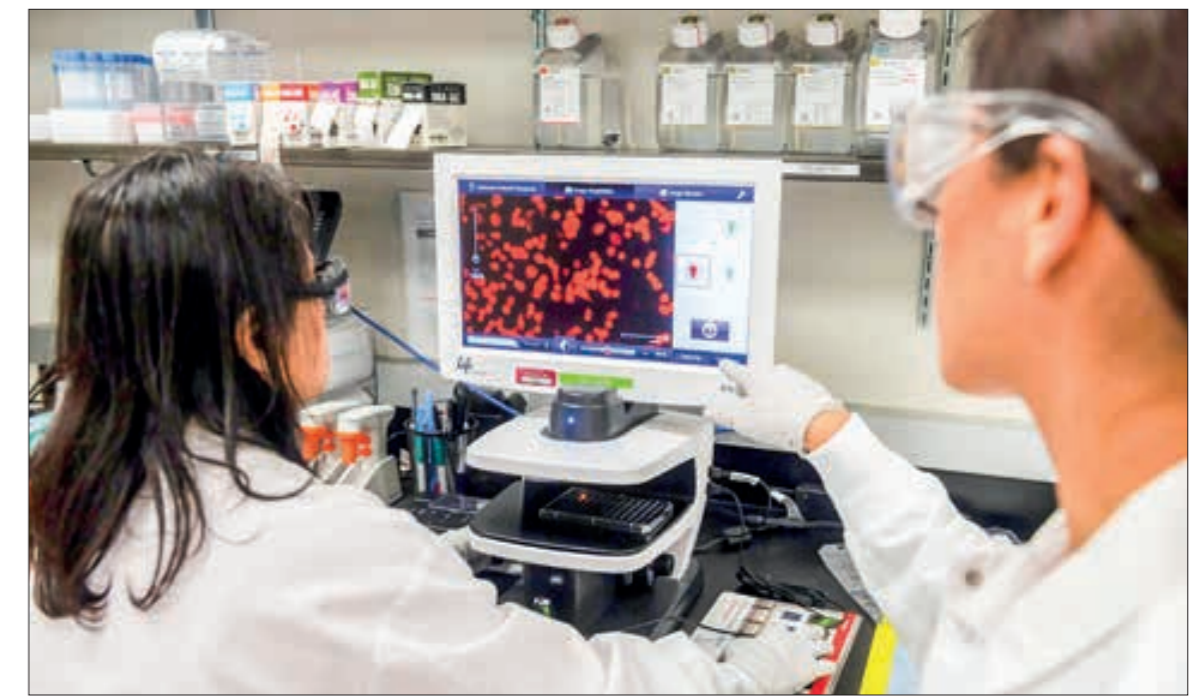
and left millions suffering ongoing symptoms, it needs to understand how the pandemic began.

The first cases of Covid-19 were recorded in the Chinese city of Wuhan in December 2019.

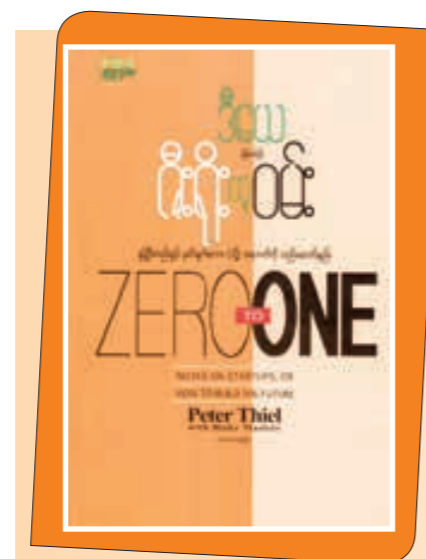
"We continue to call on China to share the data and conduct the studies that we have requested, to better understand the origins of this virus," Tedros said.

"All hypotheses remain on the table," he said, adding that this includes the theory that the virus escaped from Wuhan's virology laboratories.

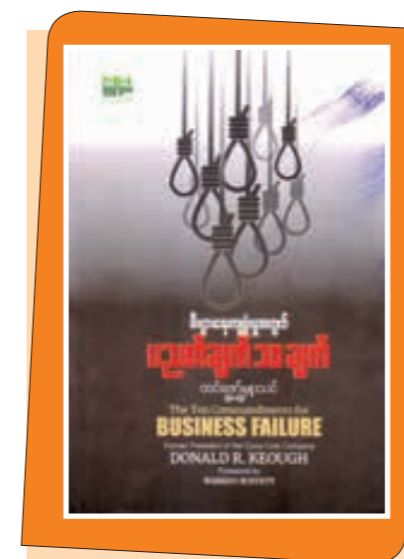

## Robot plant grows, wilts on fate of UN nature talks

IT'S not always easy to make sense of the complex environmental diplomacy taking place at a UN summit billed as humanity's last hope to save nature.

That's why a scientist and artist have teamed up to build a large, data-driven robotic plant that withers or flourishes depend-

ing on countries' policy commitments: a tangible demonstration of how human actions will impact the world's threatened species.

Called "ECONARIO," the 5.5-metre (18-foot) tall artwork took a year to build from recycled steel and is currently on display in Montreal Convention Centre, keeping policymakers at the COP15 meeting on their toes as they attempt to hammer out a deal to protect ecosystems.

Its creator, Dutch artist Thijs

Biersteker, told AFP the idea behind it is simple: "If the research does not reach us, then how can the research teach us?"

"Art reflects the time we're in, and it should reflect these important issues."

The plant feeds on data from the Biodiversity Intactness Index (BII) — an estimated percentage of the original number of species that remain, and their abundance in any given area, despite human impacts.—AFP

## Scientists reveal key reasons for shrinking of Aral Sea

AFTER five years of joint scientific research, Chinese and Uzbek scientists have revealed key factors behind the shrinking of the Aral Sea over the past 20 years, including climate warming and a lack of water-saving technology in farmlands.

The Aral Sea, located between Kazakhstan and Uzbekistan, was once the world's

fourth-largest inland waterbody. It has shrunk remarkably since 1960 — with its surface area dwindling from 67,000 square kilometres in 1960 to just 6,000 square km in 2020.

Most findings considered farmland expansion as the main cause behind the contraction of the Aral Sea. "But since 2000, the farmland in the Aral Sea basin

has stopped expanding," said Chen Xi, director of the Research Centre for Ecology and Environment of Central Asia under the Chinese Academy of Sciences.

The latest research showed that rising temperatures, a lack of water-saving technology in farmlands, wetland expansion in the middle and lower reaches, and a large amount of water storage in upstream hydropower stations, had all accelerated the shrinkage of the Aral Sea in the past two decades, Chen said.

The dried shores produce salt dust, posing a serious threat to the local ecological environment and people's health. Scientists from both China and Uzbekistan put forward a roadmap for the ecological restoration of the dried lake areas. They divided the Aral Sea into various sections, which will be treated with tailored measures.—Xinhua

## Nature at risk of 'cascading' species extinction: study

CLIMATE change and habitat degradation will cause extinctions that cascade through communities of animals and plants and drive dramatic biodiversity loss, according to new research published on Friday.

The study, in the journal *Science Advances*, found that chain-reaction extinctions are unavoidable and predicted Earth's ecosystems will see average biodiversity loss of between six and 10 per cent by 2050, depending on different carbon emissions scenarios.

By 2100, losses of animals and plants could rise to as much as 27 per cent, they found in their research that used virtual Earths to map out thousands of food webs.

The authors said their

modelling suggested that the biggest changes will come before mid-century, predicting "the bleakest time for natural communities might be imminent and that the next few decades will be decisive for the future of global biodiversity".

With life on Earth under threat from human destruction, overexploitation and pollution, scientists have warned that a million species are facing extinction in what many fear heralds the planet's sixth mass extinction event.

Climate change is expected to dramatically accelerate the losses, with impacts of warming ranging from the effects of extreme weather, to changes in behaviour and habitat.—AFP

## Zimbabwe starts cloud seeding to augment rainfall

ZIMBABWE has started cloud seeding in an effort to increase rainfall in the current summer season, an official said Friday.

The country recently acquired the latest technology to aid in cloud seeding, and a test run was conducted on Wednesday in Mt-Hampden in the outskirts of the capital Harare, resulting in some rains falling, Prosper

Matondi, national coordinator for Climate Change Department in the Ministry of Environment, Climate, Tourism and Hospitality Industry, told Xinhua.

He said the government has availed significant resources for cloud seeding in the current rain season, which usually runs from November to April. This year, his department is geared to carrying

out timely cloud seeding to minimize the effects of mid-season dry spells that normally occur during the month of January, Matondi said. "Traditionally, we always do cloud seeding to complement the natural rainfall each season, and we usually start just into the season to cloud seed based on the different conditions that obtain on a day-to-day basis.—Xinhua

## Climate change fuelling cholera surge: WHO

CLIMATE change is fuelling a global cholera upsurge, the WHO said Friday, warning the situation was compounded by vaccine shortages and will only worsen unless it is stamped out soon.

The World Health Organization is responding to cholera outbreaks in 29 countries, including Haiti, which has more than 1,200 confirmed cases, more than 14,000 suspected cases and more than 280 reported deaths.

This week, Haiti received almost 1.2 million doses of oral cholera vaccines.

But the WHO said that vac-

cine stockpiles were extremely low -- and that manufacturers were not enthusiastic about producing a vaccine chiefly aimed at some of the poorest countries in the world.

"If we don't control the outbreak now, the situation will get worse and worse," Philippe Barboza, the WHO's team lead on cholera, told reporters in Geneva.

He said fatality rates are extremely high for most of the countries for which the UN health agency has data.

Cholera is contracted from

a bacterium that is generally transmitted through contaminated food or water.

It causes diarrhoea and vomiting, and can be especially dangerous for young children.

"The factors which drive cholera are still the same: poverty, vulnerability and people who do not have access to clean water," Barboza said.

These are amplified by conflict, humanitarian crises and natural disasters, which reduce access to drinking water.

### Vaccine shortage

"But this year, we have a factor which is even more important: the direct impact of climate change, with a succession of major droughts, unprecedented floods in certain parts of the world, and cyclones which have amplified most of these epidemics," he said.

Barboza said that while there had been big epidemics in certain countries before, they had not happened simultaneously, as now.

Although cholera can kill within hours, it can be treated with simple oral rehydration, and antibiotics for more severe cases.

But many people lack timely access to such treatment.—AFP

## US CDC director warns vaccine misinformation one of biggest public health threats



Tens of thousands of children across the United States have already fallen behind in vaccinations for diseases like measles, chickenpox or polio, a trend that has been bubbling for years but accelerated during the pandemic, said a report of NBC News. PHOTO: AFP

VACCINE misinformation is among the biggest threats to public health, Director of the US Centres of Disease Control

and Prevention (CDC) Rochelle Walensky told NBC News in a recent interview.

Doctors' appointments missed during the first years of COVID-19 contributed to a dip in childhood vaccination rates, but it is the onslaught of vaccine disinformation that continues to put young kids at risk for preventable death and disease, said Walensky.

Just 42 per cent of kids under age 18 in the United States have had their flu shots this year, according to CDC data. The vast majority of kids ages 4 and younger, about 90 per cent, have not got the updated COVID-19 shot, according to the American Academy of Pediatrics.—Xinhua

## China conducts survey on population most susceptible to COVID-19 infections

CHINA is carrying out a survey to identify people most susceptible to COVID-19 infections, including the elderly and those with underlying diseases, an official with the National Health Commission (NHC) said on Thursday.

The action came in line with China's optimization of COVID-19 response, with the priority of work shifted from preventing infections to medical treatment and more efforts devoted to the protection of vulnerable groups and improvement of primary-level medical services. All localities have been required to have a clear understanding of the health conditions of people aged 65

and above, especially those with such diseases as coronary heart disease, stroke and hypertension, Nie Chunlei, head of the department of primary health of the NHC, told a press conference in Beijing.

The elderly can be classified according to their underlying diseases, age groups, and COVID-19 vaccination status following the survey, according to the official. "The move is aimed at providing classified services for elderly people suffering from underlying diseases so as to direct the limited medical resources to those most in need and improve the efficiency and quality of medical services," Nie said.—Xinhua

## Biden says COVID-19 cases rising across US

US President Joe Biden said on Thursday that COVID-19 cases "are rising" across the country.

The remarks, which Biden posted on Twitter, came as American families are getting together for the holidays.

The White House is resuming a programme to send COVID-19 testing kits to households that request them ahead of a potential winter surge.

A senior official of the Biden administration told reporters on Wednesday that "we're seeing COVID cases rising in

parts of the country following Thanksgiving."

"While COVID isn't the disruptive force it once was, we know that the virus will circulate more quickly and easily as folks gather indoors for the winter holiday season," the official said. The seven-day average of weekly new COVID-19 cases, according to the US Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), reached more than 65,000 last week, an increase of nearly 50 per cent compared to the previous week.—Xinhua

## EU studies ways to rival vast new US subsidies on greener tech

EU leaders on Thursday tasked the European Commission with coming up with ways to vie with huge US subsidies on greener tech such as electric vehicles to protect the bloc's industrial base.

"We will come forward in January with a state aid proposal that is not only faster and simpler, but even more predictable," commission chief Ursula von der Leyen said after a summit.

The European bloc is unsettled by parts of the multi-billion-dollar US Inflation Reduc-

tion Act (IRA) which lavishes subsidies and tax cuts for US purchasers of electric vehicles -- if they "Buy American".

The bloc views the act as discriminatory against European car manufacturers, a breach of World Trade Organization rules, and a threat to investment in Europe. To compete -- and keep big industrial companies on its shores -- many EU countries want rules around national subsidies loosened and public investment in cleaner energy

boosted. European companies "need subsidies in the same way as those in the United States, and of the same magnitude, if you want to avoid a fragmentation of the European market," French President Emmanuel Macron said.

The EU leaders, in their summit conclusion text, stressed the need to safeguard "Europe's economic, industrial and technological base and of preserving the global level playing field".— AFP

## Macau casino giants pledge \$15 billion for 10-year licences

SIX Macau casino firms agreed Friday to invest a total of 118.8 billion patacas (\$15 billion) after being granted 10-year operating licences, with the bulk of the money pledged to non-gaming projects.

The former Portuguese colony is the only place in China where casinos are allowed, and

issues just six operating concessions for a multi-billion-dollar industry that, until the pandemic hit, was bigger than Las Vegas.

Macau has been keen to diversify away from gambling into tourism and leisure for decades, but with mixed results.

The government confirmed last month that the six incum-

bents all won licence renewals, beating back a surprise bid from a newcomer firm linked to Malaysian gaming and resorts giant Genting.

The casino firms promised to spend 108.7 billion patacas -- more than 90 per cent of their investment total -- on "exploring overseas customer markets and developing non-gaming projects", the government said Friday.

Such projects would cover the "convention and exhibition business, entertainment and performances, sports events, culture and art, health care, and themed amusement", the government added. Macau's leader Ho Iat-seng said he hoped the operators would contribute to Macau's development and "deliver on their corporate social responsibilities regarding protection of local employment and promotion of upward mobility of local workers".— AFP

## EU agrees to grant Kosovo visitors visa-free travel

EUROPEAN Union member states and the EU parliament agreed Wednesday on a plan to allow visitors from Kosovo to enter the bloc without visas.

Statements from parliament and the European Council said new rules allowing two 90 day visits a year would go into effect before 1 January, 2024.

The long sought-after deal came on the same day as leaders from Kosovo -- which is recognised as a state by all but five EU members -- applied to join the bloc.

Kosovo is the last of the six countries in the Western Balkans to not have an EU visa waiver, and the only one whose membership bid has yet to be accepted. "This is a very important moment for its European future," said Dutch MEP Thijs Reuten, who led the parliament's team in the rules

negotiations.

"Finally, Kosovars will be able to travel to the EU for holidays, family visits and business trips without having to apply for a visa."

The European Council, which represents member states, said more steps remain but the rule would come into force with the new European Travel Information and Authorisation System (ETIAS).

"And in any case no later than 1 January 2024," the statement added. In Pristina, President Vjosa Osmani, Prime Minister Albin Kurti and parliamentary speaker Glauk Konjufca jointly signed an application for EU membership. This will be submitted to the Czech Republic, which currently holds the rotating EU presidency, but is seen as only the start of a potentially very long process.—AFP

## Japan ruling camp OKs permanent NISA tax-free investment scheme

JAPAN'S ruling parties agreed Friday to make permanent a tax-free scheme for households to boost investment, in line with Prime Minister Fumio Kishida's drive to encourage households with abundant cash to invest more.

The NISA reform plan aims to raise the ceiling on no-tax investments to 3.6 million yen (\$26,000) a year -- 1.2 million, triple the current limit, for investment trusts and 2.4 million yen, or double the current amount, for another "growth investment"

type that includes stocks.

Kishida, who is pushing for a "new form of capitalism", is seeking to "double" financial assets held by Japanese households. As of June, about half of some 2,000 trillion yen worth of household assets was held in cash.—Kyodo

## US probing GM's autonomous driving unit after incidents

US authorities opened a preliminary investigation into General Motors' Cruise autonomous driving programme following sudden stop incidents, according to a notice seen Friday by AFP.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration is reviewing two types of incidents that result in Cruise vehicles "becoming unexpected roadway obstacles", said the notice.

Cruise began offering first-in-the-nation commercial driverless

taxi service to the public in part of San Francisco in June.

While there have been no fatalities from the incidents, the investigation comes on the heels of an ongoing NHTSA probe into Tesla's "Auto-pilot" driver-assistance system.

The agency received three incident reports in which Cruise vehicles were struck by another auto from the rear following a "hard braking manoeuvre," according to the notice. —AFP

## Vietnamese commercial banks to slash interest rates as businesses struggle with lower orders

MANY commercial banks in Viet Nam pledged to lower lending interest rates by 0.5 to three percentage points to support businesses amid falling demand and orders, Viet Nam News Agency reported on Thursday.

A total of 16 banks had pledged to slash interest rates following the State Bank of Viet Nam's decision to expand the credit room, the news agency reported.

BIDV lowers interest rate by 0.5 to 2.5 percentage points for lenders in priority groups including those affected by COV-

ID-19, those working in export-import industries, foreign businesses, or individual lenders.

Vietcombank also slashes interest rate by one percentage point for 175,000 lenders with a total credit worth 500 trillion Vietnamese dong (21.1 billion US dollars).

The interest rates at banks are still high, the news agency said. The average rates range from 10 to 16 per cent per year for unsecured loans, and from 10 to 14 per cent per year for mortgage loans, the news agency reported.—Xinhua

## Germany to cut the ribbon on first LNG terminal

GERMANY will on Saturday inaugurate its first liquefied natural gas (LNG) terminal, built in record time, as the country scrambles to adapt to life without Russian energy.

The rig in the North Sea port of Wilhelmshaven will be opened by Chancellor Olaf Scholz at a ceremony on board a specialist vessel known as an FSRU, named the Hoegh Esper-

anza.

The ship has already been stocked with gas from Nigeria that could supply 50,000 homes for a year, and the terminal is set to begin deliveries on

22 December.

Germany plans to open four more government-funded LNG terminals over the next few months as well as a private terminal in the port of Lubmin.

Together, the terminals could deliver 30 billion cubic metres of gas a year from next year, or a third of Germany's total gas needs — if Berlin can find enough LNG to service them.

LNG terminals allow for the import by sea of natural gas which has been chilled and turned into a liquid to make it easier to transport.

The FRSU stocks the LNG, then turns it back into a ready-to-use gas. —AFP

## Goldman Sachs to cut up to 8% of staff: reports

GOLDMAN Sachs could cut up to eight per cent of its staff, or around 4,000 jobs, according to reports Friday, as the financial giant eyes sluggish global growth in 2023.

The job cuts are expected early in 2023, according to reports in Semafor and CNBC that said the final figure could ultimately be smaller than eight per cent.

Goldman Sachs typically trims about one to five per cent of headcount each year, targeting underperforming staff.

This year's culling will be deeper than usual in light of the uncertain economic outlook and the growth in Goldman's staffing in recent years, a person familiar with the matter told AFP. —AFP

## China holds Central Economic Work Conference to plan for 2023

THE annual Central Economic Work Conference was held in Beijing from Thursday to Friday as Chinese leaders decided priorities for the economic work in 2023.

Delivering an important speech at the conference, Xi Jinping, general secretary of the Communist Party of China Central Committee, Chinese president and chairman of the Central Military Commission, reviewed the country's economic work in 2022, analyzed the current economic situation and arranged next year's economic work.

Li Keqiang, Li Qiang, Zhao Leji, Wang Huning, Han Zheng, Cai Qi, Ding Xuexiang and Li Xi attended the conference.

It was noted at the meeting that an overall recovery and improvement is expected in the country's economic performance in the next year, and that a firm confidence is necessary to do a good job in the economic work.

The meeting demanded making economic stability a top priority and pursuing steady progress while ensuring economic stability for the next year.

Proactive fiscal policy and prudent monetary policy will continue to be implemented next year. Meanwhile, efforts will be made to intensify macro-control and coordinate various policies to form synergy for high-quality development, according to the meeting.—Xinhua

## Guam serves as Pacific “springboard” for US forces: commander

A 16-year-old plan to transfer a significant number of US Marines from the Japanese island prefecture of Okinawa to the US territory of Guam continues to make sense strategically and politically, a US military commander said. Joint Region Marianas Commander Rear Adm. Benjamin Nicholson, in a recent interview with Kyodo News and other media, said Guam plays an important role as “springboard” for US forces to rapidly respond, by air or sea, to any military crisis in the region amid looming threats from China and North Korea. “It's essentially equidis-

tant between Tokyo, Manila and Port Moresby,” he said.

Nicholson said the ability to quickly deploy troops and equipment is the current focus in the so-called second island chain, a strategic defence line formed by Japanese islands south of Tokyo and the Mariana Islands. In June, the United States test-fired a High Mobility Artillery Rocket System, or HIMARS, and conducted Patriot missile live-fire exercise during the US-only Valiant Shield exercise to demonstrate its capabilities in multiple locations across Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands and Palau.—Kyodo

## UN launches 10-year survival plan for indigenous languages at risk

THE United Nations on Friday launched the International Decade of Indigenous Languages to help them survive, and protect them from extinction.

Preserving their languages is “not only important for them, but for all humanity,” said UN General Assembly President Csaba Korosi. “With each indigenous language that goes extinct, so too goes the thought: the culture, tradition and knowledge it bears. That matters because we are in dire need of a radical transformation in the way we relate to our environment,” he said.—Xinhua

## Putin to visit Belarus Monday for talks with Lukashenko

RUSSIAN President Vladimir Putin will visit Belarus on Monday for talks with his counterpart and ally Alexander Lukashenko, the Belarus leader's office said.

The Belarus presidency said Friday the pair will hold discussions at the Independence Palace, Lukashenko's office, in Minsk during Putin's “working visit”. The visit comes 10 months into Russia's offensive in Ukraine, which was launched from several directions, including Belarusian territory.

Minsk said the pair will hold one-on-one talks as well as wider negotiations with their ministers on “Belarusian-Russian integration”.

Moscow and Minsk have committed to a wide range of programmes for deeper economic and defence cooperation.

The statement said the “presidents will also give priority to security issues and exchange views on the situation in the region and the world” but did not mention Ukraine.—AFP

## ‘Explosions’ in Kyiv, strikes in other Ukraine regions: officials

A fresh barrage of Russian strikes hit several cities including the Ukraine capital Kyiv early Friday, officials said, leading to water and power cuts in many areas. “Due to damage to energy infrastructure, there are interruptions to the water supplies in all areas of the capital,” Kyiv mayor Vitali Klitschko said on social media, after telling residents that “metro traffic is temporarily stopped on all lines.”—AFP



## US to refill oil reserve after huge Biden release

THE US Energy Department announced on Friday a plan to add oil back to the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) after a historically large release undertaken by the Biden administration.

The policy marks a significant shift after President Biden authorized the biggest-ever release earlier this year following Russia's invasion of Ukraine, which sent oil prices to US\$120

a barrel.

The plan represents "an opportunity to secure a good deal for American taxpayers by repurchasing oil at a lower price than the \$96 per barrel average price it was sold for, as well as to strengthen energy security," the Department of Energy (DOE) said in a news release.

The agency said it will buy up to three million barrels of

oil under a pilot programme designed to attract sellers who can lock in prices.

The SPR currently holds 382 million barrels of crude, down some 216 million barrels from its level before September 2021.

A Biden official said in October that the administration planned to purchase oil to refill the reserve as soon as prices hit around US\$67-72 a barrel.—AFP

## Jordan arrests 44 after deadly fuel protests

JORDAN has arrested dozens of people accused of involvement in protests against rising fuel prices in which a senior police officer was gunned down, the country's security agency said Saturday.

Colonel Abdul Razzaq Dalabeh, the deputy police chief of Maan province, died of a gunshot to the head in the town of Al-Husseiniya on Thursday while confronting what the authorities called "riots".

"Forty-four people who participated in the riots in a number of regions in the kingdom have been arrested and they will be brought before the courts," the Public Security Directorate said in a statement. It said reinforcements had been sent to the provinces, and accused "vandals and outlaws" of being behind violence in Maan, in the country's south. Jordan's King Abdullah II warned on Friday that "anyone who raises a weapon against the state will be dealt with firmly".

Interior Minister Mazen al-Faraya, also on Friday, said "the security services are working to arrest the perpetrator and bring him to justice as soon as possible". Two other policemen were shot and wounded, also in Al-Husseiniya, the security directorate said.—AFP

## Tunisians to vote on toothless parliament in poll shunned by opposition

TUNISIA holds a lacklustre election on Saturday for a parliament with virtually no power, the final pillar in President Kais Saied's political overhaul in the birthplace of the Arab Spring.

The vote comes after three weeks of barely noticeable campaigning, with few posters in the streets and no serious debate among a public largely preoccupied with pressing financial concerns.

Opposition political groups in the North African country have called for a boycott, saying the poll is part of a "coup" against the only democracy to have emerged from the 2011 wave of uprisings across the region. Last year, after months

of political deadlock and economic crisis exacerbated by the coronavirus pandemic, Saied suspended parliament and sent tanks to surround it in a dramatic power grab more than a decade after a popular revolution unseated dictator Zine El Abidine Ben Ali.

Saied, a former law professor, has since pushed through a new constitution giving the presidency almost unrestrained powers and laying the ground for a 161-seat rubber-stamp legislature.

His moves were initially supported by many Tunisians tired of the messy and corrupt democratic system in the post-Ben Ali era.—AFP

#### Almost 10,000 trapped amid Colombia rebel "armed strike"

REBELS in Colombia who have launched an armed strike have essentially trapped thousands of people in the northwest, authorities said Friday. Around 9,800 people have been forced to confine themselves due to the "indefinite armed strike" imposed in Choco department by the ELN guerrillas amid ongoing peace negotiations with the government, the Ombudsman's Office reported. "Following the announcement of an armed strike" by the rebels in the department of Choco, "at least 9,800 people from the municipalities of Istmina, Medio San Juan, Sipi and Novita" are "in indefinite confinement", with restrictions on "mobility", "daily activities", "transportation of groceries and food as well as access to health services", the ombudsman's office said in a statement.

In a document released on Wednesday, the National Liberation Army (ELN) prohibited circulation and activity in that region, alleging the murder on Monday of "young Santiago Caceres" at the hands of "paramilitaries" in "collusion" with government forces.—AFP

## Croatia beat Morocco to finish third at World Cup

CROATIA defeated Morocco 2-1 in the World Cup third place play-off on Saturday, with Mislav Orsic curling home the winner. Josko Gvardiol, one of the stars of the tournament in Qatar, headed Croatia into the lead in the seventh minute at the Khalifa International Stadium but Achraf Dari brought Morocco level right away.

Orsic's terrific curling strike late in the first half ensured Croatia took home the bronze medal, the 11<sup>th</sup> World Cup in a row a European team has finished third.

Morocco, the first World Cup semi-finalists in history, had signalled their intent with a spirited

display against 2018 runners-up Croatia in their opening game in Qatar. The rematch was nothing like the cagey 0-0 draw in the group stage, with Morocco goalkeeper Yassine Bounou dangerously close to passing the ball into his own net early on.

Croatia soon surged in front from a well-rehearsed free-kick as Ivan Perisic nodded Lovro Majer's clip into the box back towards a diving Gvardiol, who planted his header into the corner.

But Morocco hit back two minutes later when Hakim Ziyech's free-kick looped up off the head of Majer, allowing Dari to head past Dominik Livakovic.—AFP
