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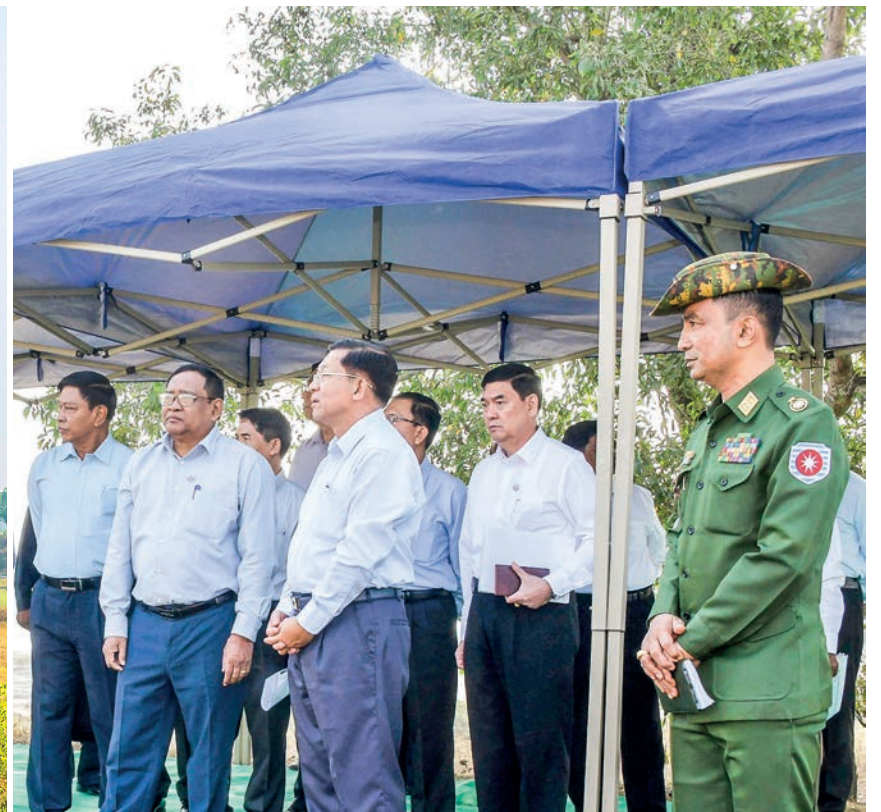

The Republic of the Union of Myanmar State Administration Council: Five-Point Road Map

1. Priority will be given to fully realizing peace, stability and rule of law throughout the Union to safeguard the socioeconomic life of the people.
2. People-centred development work that enhances socioeconomic well-being will be undertaken to ensure the country's prosperity and food security.
3. Processes will further continue to consolidate a genuine, disciplined multiparty democratic system and build a Union based on democracy and federalism.
4. Priority will be accorded to work aligned with the agreements set out in the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement, in order to achieve enduring peace for the entire nation.
5. Upon accomplishing the provisions of the state of emergency, free and fair multiparty democratic elections will be held in line with the 2008 Constitution, and further work will be undertaken to hand over State duties to the winning party in accordance with democratic standards.

CHAIRMAN of the State Administration Council Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing yesterday morning inspected water supply facilities in Sittway of Rakhine State.

At the Kandawgyi lake and water collection tanks, departmental officials reported

on daily water requirements of local people, water supply functions, rainfall, water storage, lesser volume of waterfalls since 2017, increasing population of Sittway and the problem of water supply, and necessity to supply water from Khamikyein Creek to water collection tanks and expansion

of the water tank.

In his response, the Senior General stressed the need to seek ways for transforming seawater into freshwater in addition to storage and supply of freshwater to the region. It is necessary to conduct feasibility studies for tapping underground water in the northern

part of the city without harming the environment. The Senior General instructed officials to improve the strengthening of the Kandawgyi water collection lake. Extreme extraction of timber in the region can cause climate change, lesser volume of rainfalls and natural disasters. Hence, all need to

grow trees including mangrove forests.

The Senior General inspected water collection tanks and instructed officials to carry out necessary maintenance for the tanks and supply water enough to meet the demand of the region. — MNA/TTA

MYANMAR'S COVID-19 positive cases rose to **633,918** after **four** new cases were reported on 28 February 2023 according to the Ministry of Health. The total number of patients who have recovered from COVID-19 in the country reached **614,399**, including **one** new recovery. The death toll from COVID-19 in the country remained unchanged at **19,490** on 28-2-2023 with no new death reported from the pandemic. —MNA

India-Myanmar Investment and Trade Promotion Dialogue held

THE meeting between members of the delegation led by Mr Shri Vinay Kumar, Ambassador of India to Myanmar and Patron of India-Myanmar Chamber of Commerce-IMCC, and businessmen led by Chairman U Aye Win of Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry-UMFCCI took place at the UMFC-CI on Min Ye Kyaw Swa Road in Lanmadaw Township on 27 February.

At the meeting, UMFCCI Chairman U Aye Win stated that he met a delegation of financial institutions from the Northeast recently and discussed the current economic challenges and opportunities. According to the latest statistical information, India ranks

fifth as Myanmar's Trade Partner, fourth in the largest export destinations and sixth in import sources. India-Myanmar Chamber of Commerce is one of Myanmar's closest business partners, and trade and business cooperation between the two countries will be increased, he added.

Afterwards, Mr Shri Vinay Kumar replied that Myanmar is an important trading partner of India and India's export partner as well. 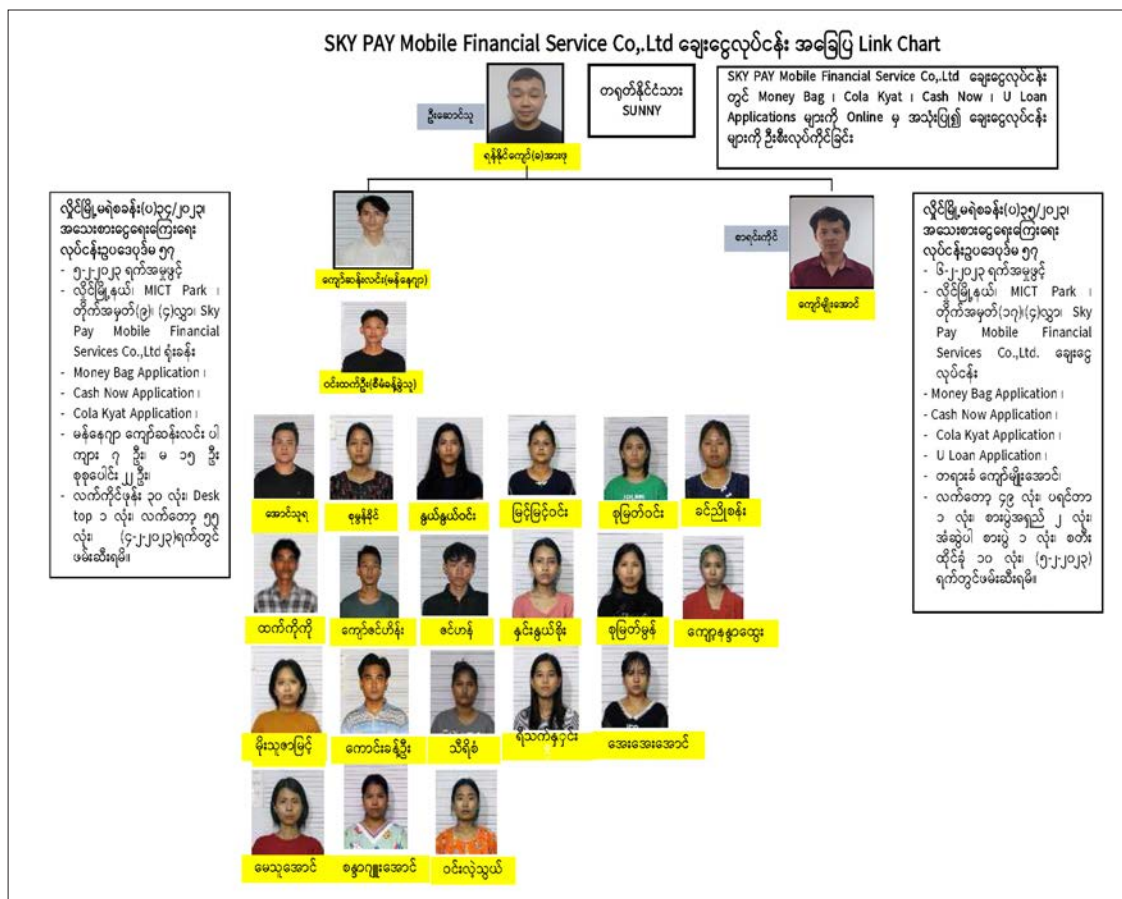
Police bust 71 suspects involved in online gambling

SECURITY Force members conducted investigations against insurgents who are running on-line gambling, betting and illegal financing services based on the security of surveillance footage and technologies.

Acting on a tip-off, the TTbet Online Game gambling business is running, the police raided a house in Ngwe Hnin Phyu Thitkhwa street in FMI CITY of Hlinethaya (east) Township of Yangon Region on 29 January and arrested nine suspects including Moh Moh San (aka) Yuki together with 50 handphones, 22 laptops, four monitors, 741 sim-cards and other materials.

According to the confession of suspects, the police also searched the house in Chindwin street of FMI City and also arrested 19 suspects including Aung Phone Kyaw, admin of Golden Gift online lucky draw and Htin Aung Kyaw (aka) Alic, supervisor together with 37 handphones, 25 laptops, three monitors, one System Box, one colour printer and other materials.

Moreover, the police also arrested 19 suspects including Aye Nyein Thu, clerk of TTbet Online Game and supervisor Sai Thiha Zaw at No FG-95 in Chindwin street of FMI CITY including 11laptops, 22 handphones and



other materials. 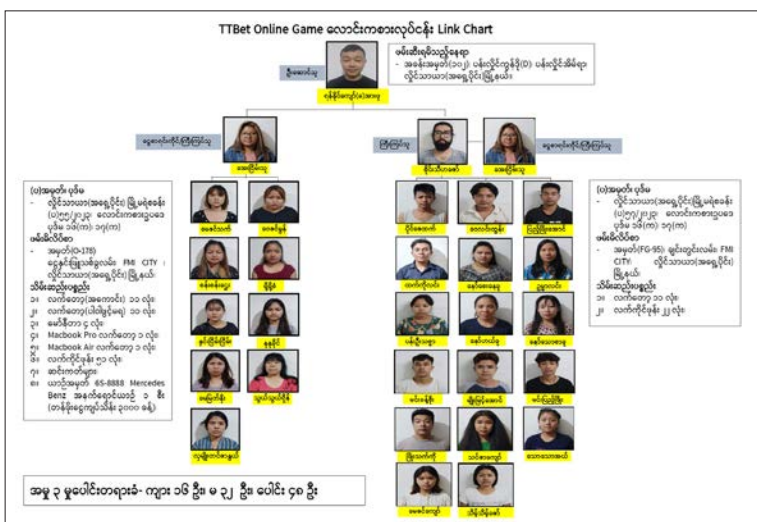

According to the confession of Yan Naing Kyaw (aka) Arphu, the police raided the office of Sky Pay Mobile Financial Services Co Ltd in MICT Park of Hline Township on 4 February and arrested 22 suspects including manager Kyaw San Lin (aka) Archan of illegal online financing service

using Money Bag Application, Cash Now Application and Cola Kyat Application together with 30 mobile phones, 55 laptops, one desktop and other materials. Moreover, Kyaw Myo Aung, accountant of that illegal online financing service was also arrested with 49 laptops, one printer and other materials at the office of Sky Pay Mobile Financial

Services Co Ltd in MICT Park of Hline Township on 5 February. The suspects testified that Yan Naing Kyaw (aka) Arphu operated the TTbet Online Game, Golden Gift online lucky draw and illegal financing services under the name of Sky Pay Mobile Financial Services Co Ltd by using Money Bag Application, Cash Now Application, Cola Kyat and U Loan Application. The TTbet Online Game was launched by communicating with Yang Song (still investigating) while the illegal online financing service was by communicating with Sunny (still investigating) using Money Bag Application, Cash Now Application, Cola Kyat and U Loan Application under the proxy's name of Sky Pay Mobile Financial Services Co Ltd and Golden Gift online lucky draw was operated by his (Yan Naing Kyaw) brother Aung Phone Kyaw.

The suspect deployed Kyaw San Lin (aka) Archan as manager, Aye Nyein Thu (aka) Neo as supervisor/accountant, Moh Moh San (aka) Kyaw Myo Aung as accountants, Htin Kyaw Aung (aka) Alic and Sai Thiha Zaw as supervisors. In these cases, the police arrested a total of 71 suspects – 24 males and 47 females for five cases related to online gambling and seized 164laptops, 140 handphones, seven monitors, two printers, one System Box, one UPS, one desktop, 741 sim-cards, one Mercedes Benz and one Lexus.

The officials also temporarily seized about K480.5 million from their bank accounts, KBZ Pay and Wave Pay accounts and froze 14 KBZ Pay accounts to inspect the balance. The suspects were charged in the cases and further investigation was underway. — MNA/KTZH

Beware of danger based on the outbreak of fire in any seasons

GENERALLY, everybody prioritizes ownership of their property. If somebody faces problems with loss of property, it causes impacts on their minds with suffering. It is because various kinds of their property are based on their physical and mental hardworking and efforts.

In January 2023 alone, the outbreak of fire throughout the nation destroyed the property of the people amounting to some K7 billion. In this regard, loss and damage in the outbreak of fire in January 2023 were more millions of kyats than in the whole year 2022, according to the Myanmar Fire Brigade headquarters.

Most outbreaks of fire were based on the electric short and overheating process of electricity. As such, people should use good-conditioned wires and systematically use electronic equipment to take preventive measures against fire in any season. Hence, people should remove unsafe wires in lighting and other operations in daily life.

As an important thing, every citizen is responsible for informing authorities and firefighting organizations whenever they face an outbreak of fire or they commit an outbreak of fire. Not too late to quit addiction

Even at a late age, some people had bad habits such as smoking or drinking. They are addicted and have no mental power to quit. They thought that they had been practising those bad habits for decades and quitting them at old age is not beneficial and makes complete nonsense.

It's not as you think. Five-year addiction? Thirty-year addiction? No matter how long you had been practising those habits, especially smoking and drinking, it may be beneficial as long as you are diagnosed with no serious disease. Even with diseases, quitting may help your health span.

For a lifelong chain smoker,

quitting smoking makes senses of smell and taste start to improve; within days coughing begins to progressively decline. Within a few weeks, energy and breathing get better and improve steadily. The chance of coronary heart disease may be reduced and continues to drop.

Quitting smoking allows the lung to heal. Quitting alcohol can also lead to a range of both physical and mental health as well as a social relationship, fitness and legal situations. After quitting you may improve your physical health and decrease the risk of liver disease, cancer and hypertension. Your sleep will be improved. Mental health is also improved. And the risk for depression and anxiety may be reduced.

Quitting alcohol is more difficult than smoking but the benefits are more pronounced.

Not too late to be semi-vegetarian

When we get older, our chances of getting non-communicable diseases such as stroke, cancer, diabetes and hypertension are in-

creased. Constipation is also very frequent. Eating more plant-based food may reduce those risks. Although we prefer meat to plant-based foods in our youth, at this old age you should at least be semi-vegetarian. Fruits and vegetables are plentiful in vitamins, minerals and phytochemicals.

Those phytonutrients support your body to function properly and prevent non-communicable diseases. The most substantial advantage of being a vegetarian is getting high fibre and good regular bowel movements. A 2020 report found that eating more fibre-rich food may reduce woman's long-term total risk of stroke by up to 25 per cent and their risk of ischemic stroke by up to 30 per cent.

Consuming two cups of fruits or vegetables (25-38 grammes of fibre) daily in midlife can help control blood pressure, cholesterol, blood sugar and abdominal weight. Even if you couldn't be a full-term vegetarian, you should be a semi-vegetarian. Change your path to plant-based foods. It's not too late.

Schools help students adapt to campus life after COVID response adjustment

To cater to the students' physical conditions after a prolonged period of staying indoors or recovering from COVID-19 infection, many schools have decided to set aside time for students to gradually restore their athleticism.

STUDENTS in China are returning to campuses this spring semester after they have frequently taken online classes as a major way to study due to COVID-19 over the past three years.

The new school term is the first semester after China downgraded its management of COVID-19 from Class A to Class B on 8 January and introduced optimized response measures accordingly. As per the adjusted measures, schools no longer require negative nucleic acid test results from students entering the campus.

However, this doesn't mean that schools no longer pay attention to the potential risks related to COVID-19. According to the Ministry of Education, the new COVID-19 management measures highlight safety at educational institutions, as well as the health and well-being of teachers and students.

COVID-19 response measures

"We have formulated a set of COVID-19 response measures in accordance with the city's guidelines on COVID-19 prevention and control in middle schools, primary schools, and kindergartens," said Qin Sheng, vice-president of Beijing No 13 Middle School.

Qin said that, since the beginning of the semester, the school has implemented a number of COVID-19 response measures, such as health reporting on a regular basis and keeping records of the students who take sick leave.

In addition to taking necessary precautions to ensure that students can adapt to campus life with ease, education institutions across the country are taking steps to help them prepare for offline school activities both

physically and mentally.

To cater to the students' physical conditions after a pro-

longed period of staying indoors or recovering from COVID-19 infection, many schools have

decided to set aside time for students to gradually restore their athleticism.

At some schools, students are organized to take part in mild physical activities in PE classes to stay fit.

"Instead of organizing intense exercise such as long-distance running, we aim to help students restore their physical wellness through activities like ball games," said Ma Luo, director of the student sports centre at the Guangqumen Middle School in Beijing's Dongcheng District.

Student's physical condition

Out of similar consideration, the local education authority in south China's city of Guangzhou also released a circular that requires schools to check the student's physical condition before arranging PE classes.

In terms of mental health, many schools are working out ways to ease the student's minds about returning to the campus.

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Liang Hongyan, a teacher from a primary school in Miyun District, Beijing, decided to lead her students in making paper planes and guessing riddles in the first class of the new semester.

"The games help ease their minds and cheer them up," said Liang. She said that after the games, the students are in higher spirits to embrace life on campus.

After an extended period of home study amidst the epidemic, students may be troubled with various psychological pressures due to a lack of vital interpersonal communication intertwined with adolescent impulsiveness, said Li Baozhi, principal of Hengshui No 4 Middle School in Hebei.

To address the students' psychological needs, many schools chose "mental wellness" as the subject of the new semes-

ter's first lesson.

Such efforts are well-received by the students. "The lesson is taught in an entirely different way. It is very interesting and gives me the strength to begin the new semester," said Yi Zihao, a seventh-grade student from Chengdu, Sichuan Province, after taking a mental wellness lesson featuring a cooperative game.

Currently, more plans to brighten up the students' moods are being made. In Beijing No 13 Middle School, Qin is planning to hold a coming-of-age ceremony for the seniors in high school, which was originally planned for the last fall semester but was delayed due to the epidemic.

"We are going to invite the students' parents to honour the ceremony, so as to make it as memorable as it can be," said Qin.

Illegal lead, foodstuffs, consumer goods, auto parts and vehicles confiscated

AN on-duty team confiscated 25.6 metric tons of lead bags worth K84.48 million without official documents from a vehicle heading to Hpa-an from Thaton at the Thanlwin Bridge (Hpa-an) combined checkpoint on 24 February and 35 blenders and grinders worth K2.65 million without official documents from a vehicle heading to Yangon from Myawady at the Kawkareik (Tadakyoe) combined checkpoint on 26

February. The action was taken under the Myanmar Mines Law and Customs procedures.

The on-duty teams under the supervision of the Customs Department conducted inspections at the Mayanchaung permanent checkpoint in Mon State on 25 February.

Officials seized two kinds of goods including clothes worth K3 million without official documents from a Yutong express bus (estimated value of K35 million) heading to Yangon from Hpa-an, 200 cartons of Lactasoy worth K2.4 million without official documents from a Nissan Diesel car (estimated value of K30 million) heading to Yangon from Mawlamyine and three kinds of goods including 150 cartons of Lactasoy worth K4.15 million without official documents from a Zhongtong express bus (estimated value of K40 million) heading to Yangon from Myawady. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

A combined team conducted inspections on the Myawady-Yangon Road and captured 23 kinds of goods including 90 kilogrammes of the rear-view mirror (used), 11 car engines (used) and 10 brand new batteries worth K53,856,000 that were not declared in the ID/RO (Manifest) from a tractor head and a trailer (approximately K60 million) at an energy shop near Nyaungkhashay village. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

An unregistered Toyota Mark II car (estimated value of K4.5 million) was captured heading to Shukhintha from Bandula Bridge in Dawbon township and the action was taken under the Export and Import Law.

Therefore, 12 arrests (estimated value of K320,036,000) were made on three consecutive days from 24 to 26 February, according to the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee. — MNA/MKKS

Over K1.17 bln worth of stimulant tablets captured in Thazi township

OVER K1.17 billion worth of 780,000 stimulant tablets were captured in Thazi township in Mandalay Region, Myanmar Police Force stated.

A combined team consisting of members of the Anti-Drug Police Force searched a 12-wheel Hino car driven by Myo Win Aung accompanied by Maung Kyaw (aka) Kun Maung Kyaw heading to Thazi from Taunggyi near Kywaltutsone village in Thazi township at 11 am on 25 February and seized 780,000 stimulant tablets worth over K1.17 billion.

Acting on the investigation, the Police Force arrested a trafficker, Myint Lwin (aka) Kalarlay in the No 4 ward in Aye-thaya in Taunggyi township.

Offenders admitted the drugs were carried from Shan State (South) to Yangon Region and the police have taken legal action against the offenders. — MNA/MKKS

Weekly update price list of Bayintnaung Commodity Market

IN the Yangon Bayintnaung market within the week from 22 to 28 February, the price of palm oil and pigeon pea (red gram) increased and that of low-grade summer rice varieties and Pawsan rice varieties decreased.

Onion

Within 24 depot-opening days in February 2023, 4,380,000 visses of monsoon onion from various regions entered the market. The price increased again slightly at the end of February.

A total of 240,000 visses of onion from various regions arrived at the Yangon market on 27 February and 180,000 visses on 28 February. In the Yangon market on 28 February, the wholesale price of onion was set at K1,200-K1,275 per viss for Seikphyu (Pinlay) onions and K1,450-K1,650 per viss for Myitha onions.

The highest price per viss of onion from the Yaw region was K1,100 in the Pakokku market on 28 February. Sintgaing onions were priced at K1,450 per viss, the highest price in the Mandalay market.

Garlic

The wholesale price of new Shan garlic was K4,100-K4,800 per viss in the Yangon garlic market on 28 February.

Potato

In the Yangon potato market on 28 February, potato from the Sinphyukyun area was valued at the wholesale price of K1,200-K1,600 per viss, and potato from the Pakokku area at K2,000 per viss, while Chinese potatoes were priced at K2,150 per viss.

Chilli pepper

The Chilli pepper price went up a bit in the Yangon chilli pepper market on 28 February. The wholesale prices per viss of chilli pepper were K12,200 for new long chilli pepper, K11,500 for new Myarni long chilli pepper, K12,000 for Moehtaung chilli pepper from Yayle (Maubin), K13,000 for Moehtaung chilli pepper from Hinthada, K13,000 for Pyawbwe Moehtaung chilli pepper processed in the cold storage facility, K14,500-K16,000 for new Sinphyukyun bell pepper, K14,000-K15,000 for large size Vietnam long chilli pepper and K15,000 for chilli pepper from delta regions.

Rice

The price of low-grade summer rice varieties plunged this week. A new bag of Pawsan rice varieties dropped by around K1,500. The new Pawsan rice price per bag was fixed at K51,000 for low-grade summer rice variety grown under multiple cropping, K57,000 for 90-day rice variety, K60,000 for new Pawkywe rice variety, K67,000 for Bogale Pawsan rice variety, K69,000 for Pyapon rice variety, K73,000 for Myaungmya rice variety, and K87,000 for Shwebo rice variety.

Pulses

On 28 February, a tonne of black gram (RC) priced at K1,886,000, SQ/RC at K2,106,000, pigeon pea (red gram) (RC) at K2,187,500, a viss of mung bean (Kayan Shwewah) at K3,915 and a viss of half of the chickpea at K4,100-K4,400 respectively. — TWA/CT

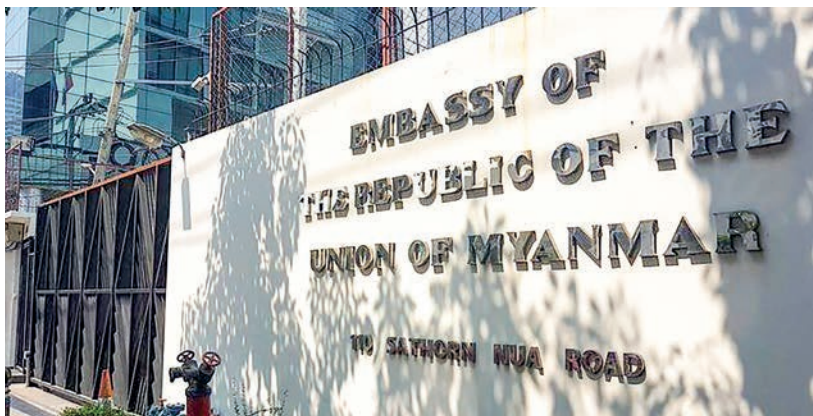

UK food inflation hits 'record': survey

UK food price inflation has soared to a record peak as Britons suffer under a cost-of-living crisis, according to a survey Tuesday.

Prices accelerated 17.1 per cent in the four weeks to 19 February compared with a year earlier, data provider Kantar said after tracking the cost of more than 75,000 products.

That was the highest increase recorded by Kantar, which began its survey in 2008.

"Shoppers have been facing sustained price rises for some time now... This is having a big impact on people's lives," said Fraser McKevitt, head of retail and consumer insight at the group.

Its research also indicated that grocery price inflation was the second biggest financial is-

sue for Britons after rocketing energy costs.

Kantar found that one quarter of households were "struggling financially" in January, when it surveyed almost 10,000 consumers.

That compared with one fifth one year ago.

"These latest figures are deeply concerning," said Rocio Concha, director of policy and advocacy at the consumer pressure group Which?

"Some households are already skipping meals to make ends meet," she added.

Overall inflation is easing, however, as the cost of energy slides. Global inflation last year reached the highest levels in decades as the invasion of Ukraine by Russia fuelled energy and food prices. — AFP

Thailand's industrial output falls in January as demand weakens

THAILAND'S industrial output dropped for the fourth consecutive month in January due to the global economic slowdown, data showed Tuesday.

The country's manufacturing production index (MPI) for January declined 4.35 per cent from a year earlier, following an 8.45 percent year-on-year fall in the previous month, as furniture, hard disk drives, and plastic pellet production continued to slow, according to the

Ministry of Industry.

Despite rising foreign tourist numbers and government stimulus measures that could help offset the impact of weakening exports, the MPI is expected to fall further in February due to slowing global demand and a high comparative base last year, director-general of the ministry's Office of Industrial Economics, Warawan Chitaroon, told a news conference. — Xinhua

Finland enters recession, while Swedish GDP dips

FINLAND entered a recession in the final quarter of 2022, while the Swedish economy shrank more than initially estimated, official statistics showed Tuesday. The 0.6-per-cent drop in Finnish GDP was the second consecutive quarter of negative growth — the technical definition of a recession.

Finland's economy has suffered from accelerating inflation — which reached 8.4 per cent in January — as well as

the economic consequences of the war in Ukraine, Statistics Finland said. Both consumers and businesses have less confidence in the future and these "weakened expectations began to be realized in the latter half of the year," the office said.

From October to December, the volume of Finnish exports decreased by 2.9 per cent from the level in the previous quarter, while imports dipped by 2.4 per cent. — AFP

Intl arrivals to Viet Nam surge in February on air traffic recovery

VIET Nam saw 933,000 international arrivals in February, surging 31.6 times compared to the same period last year, the country's General Statistics Office (GSO) said on Tuesday.

The surge in tourists is due mainly to the country's full reopening to foreign visitors and the resumption of international commercial flights.

During the period, foreign arrivals to Viet Nam by air accounted for 89.6 per cent of the total, followed by road with 9.6

per cent and sea routes with 0.8 per cent, respectively.

Most of the arrivals were from Asia with around 74 per cent, the data showed.

Foreign arrivals to the country in the first two months of this year increased to 1.8 million, or a 36.6-fold jump from the same period last year, but still below 60 per cent of the pre-pandemic levels in 2019, said the GSO.

As global airline traffic is on the way to full recovery, Viet

Nam's air passenger traffic jumped to nearly 20 million in the January-February period, the Civil Aviation Authority of Viet Nam said, with 22 civil airports handling 4.7 million international passengers and 14.8 million domestic passengers.

About 3.7 million international tourists arrived in 2022 and Viet Nam is targeting foreign arrivals of 8 million in 2023, according to the Viet Nam National Administration of Tourism. — Xinhua

S Africa unemployment dips for 4th consecutive quarter

SOUTH Africa's unemployment rate fell slightly for a fourth consecutive quarter, official data showed on Tuesday, a small piece of good news for the country's struggling economy.

The high unemployment rate has fuelled protests as well as anti-foreigner sentiment.

Between October and December 2022, the jobless rate declined by 0.2 per cent over the third quarter to 32.7 per cent of the workforce, StatsSA said.

The drop follows falls of 1.0,

0.6 and 0.8 percentage points in the previous three quarters of the year.

Unemployment stood at 35.3 per cent at the end of 2021, when the number of unemployed people peaked at 7.9 million.

South Africa has been battered by record power cuts that have hampered economic activity over the past year, costing millions of dollars in lost output each day, according to estimates.

Last week, the head of state-owned power utility Eskom left

suddenly following an incendiary interview where he blamed some of the monopoly's troubles on corruption within the ruling party. In another reputational blow, on Friday a global watchdog placed the country on its "grey list" for increased monitoring over deficiencies in combatting money laundering and other financial crimes.

Poverty, inequality and joblessness run high in the country, nearly three decades after the end of apartheid. — AFP

Japanese chipmaker Rapidus to build advanced chip plant in Hokkaido

STATE-BACKED chipmaker Rapidus Corp said Tuesday it will build a plant in Hokkaido, northern Japan, as it seeks to

begin mass-production of chips with state-of-the-art 2-nanometer technology in five years.

The new plant will

be a chip-production hub in Japan, as the country aims to rejuvenate its semiconductor sector through government in-

itiatives.

Rapidus President Atsuyoshi Koike said in a meeting with Hokkaido Gov Naomichi Suzuki that

his company decided to set up a plant in Chitose, southwestern Hokkaido, citing ample water supply and availability of

renewable energy as the reasons. Semiconductor chips need to be rinsed with ultrapure water.—Kydoo

Higher prices for herbicides boost Bayer profits in 2022

GERMAN chemicals giant Bayer said Tuesday it quadrupled its net profit in 2022, in part thanks to higher prices and strong demand for its glyphosate-based weedkillers.

Net profit climbed to 4.15 billion euros (\$4.3 billion), up from 1.0 billion a year earlier, the Leverkusen-based group said in a statement.

Sales rose by 8.7 per cent to 50.7 billion euros, in line with analyst expectations.

“2022 was a very successful year for Bayer despite the challenging environment,” said outgoing CEO Werner Baumann.

The results were boosted by record sales in the company’s agricultural division, up more than 15 per cent year-on-year to 25 billion euros.

Bayer said this was “in particular thanks to higher prices” for herbicides across all regions, at a time when “supply for glyphosate-based products was tight”.

Sales at the group’s pharmaceuticals arm were up just one per cent, the latest sign the unit is struggling to compensate for lost revenues from blockbuster drugs like the bloodthinner Xarelto and eye medicine Eylea, as their patents expire.

The group’s consumer health division, which sells over-the-counter drugs, saw sales grow by 8.4 per cent on the back of strong demand for al-

lergy and cold medicine. Baumann said Bayer’s group sales were forecast to grow by a modest “two to three per cent” in 2023 as the company braces for a drop in prices for herbicides and some pharma products.

Baumann will be replaced from 1 June by former Roche executive Bill Anderson, following pressure from activist investors urging a change in direction at the German conglomerate.—AFP

Cow manure fuels French tractors

A French farmer steps away from his barn and fills up a tractor with fuel made from the manure of his cows, an attempt to put their climate-damaging methane to good use. Anchored by a stone farmhouse, much has changed on the Guerin family farm in the southern Dordogne region since its founding in 1926.

The cow barn is largely automated, and features two huge, partially buried tanks covered with rounded domes that capture the methane emitted from the

cow dung. A dark green filling station with a pump and bank card payment terminal is connected to the facilities — but it isn't diesel that comes out of the nozzle.

Instead it is bioNGV — renewable natural gas for vehicles — produced on the farm, a substance that is essentially methane. Cleaner than diesel, it is also cheaper and now powers all the farm's cars and a new tractor — the first to run on bioNGV that its manufacturer, the Italian-American firm New Holland, began

selling last year.

The farm's owner, Bertrand Guerin, hopes the truck he uses to collect milk will also soon be filling up at his site. The 59-year-old is also seeking to attract the visitors to the region from Britain and the Netherlands, where cars that run on natural gas are more common. The filling station is part of a new chain, Biogaz de France, created by an association of farmers producing methane in which Guerin serves as vice president. — AFP

Ukraine to fulfil EU's additional requirements for membership talks by yearend: official

UKRAINE stands ready to fulfil additional European Commission's requirements to start the membership talks by the end of the year, the government-run Ukrinform news agency reported Monday, citing a senior official.

Olha Stefanishyna, Ukraine's Deputy Prime Minister for European and Euro-Atlantic Integration, said that Ukraine has already completed the necessary work on seven recommendations needed for closer integration with the European Union.

In particular, Ukraine made progress in fighting corruption and reforming the mass media, Stefanishyna said.

"Now we are waiting for the assessment of the European Commission and its further recommendations," she said.

In June 2022, EU leaders accepted Ukraine as a candidate for membership in the bloc.

The European Commission put forward seven requirements to be fulfilled by Ukraine for starting the accession talks.—Xinhua

Russia-Ukraine conflict drives refugees into Lithuania

THREE quarters of foreigners that settled in Lithuania in 2022 were refugees fleeing Ukraine, according to Statistics Lithuania, as a result of the Russia-Ukraine conflict.

Traditionally, most Lithuanians repatriate from the United Kingdom, Norway and Germany. Last year, the corresponding figures were 5,684, 1,546, and 1,369, respectively.

Last year saw 14,352 Lithuanians repatriating to, and 12,697 leaving the country, according to government statistics.

In 2022, 95,400 people immigrated to Lithuania, and 23,000 people left Lithuania. Among all immigrated people, there are 81,000 foreigners and three quarters of them are refugees from Ukraine.

The country registered 62,000 refugees fleeing Ukraine in 2022, Statistics Lithuania said.

The last "migration negative" year was 2019, with 24,510 arrivals and 20,412 departures.

Last year, the total number of permanent residents in Lithuania increased by 54,000 to 2,860,000, mainly due to the influx of refugees from Ukraine, Statistics Lithuania reported in January. —Xinhua

Elation and fear: Everest pioneer recounts historic climb

HE'S over 80, but the Austrian climber Peter Habeler — one half of the duo that was first to scale Everest without supplemental oxygen — is still fantastically fit and scaling mountain peaks, which he calls his "fountain of youth".

Many thought it impossible when he and Reinhold Messner of Italy — both Tyroleans — set out to conquer the world's high-

est peak in 1978 without additional oxygen.

When they reached the summit, "I was beside myself", the mountaineer told AFP at his home in western Austria, feeling "happiness and also sadness and fear".

"The higher we got, the slower our steps became. But the more certain we became that we would reach the summit,"

he said.

As soon as he and Messner — who is from just over the Zillertal Alps in Italy — took their "obligatory" summit photo, "I thought, 'How do I get down?'"

Climbers who go above 8,000 metres enter what is considered the "death zone" due to the lack of sufficient oxygen to sustain human life for long periods.

At 8,848 metres (29,032 feet), Everest was deep in that danger area. Habeler still recalls his "jitters", wanting to return safely to his family.

"We didn't know what would happen with the brain, what would happen with the muscles," he said. Since then, numerous climbers have summited the world's highest mountain without carrying oxygen, even though more than 300 have lost their lives on the Nepalese peak since 1950. Habeler, who has lost none of his wiry, electric energy, said he feels "privileged" to have been able to go up the Himalayan giant before it was overrun by climbing tourism.— AFP

World Bank estimates Türkiye quake damage at \$34 bln

THE devastating 6 February earthquake and aftershocks that hit southern Türkiye have caused damage worth more than \$34 billion in the country, the World Bank said on Monday.

The amount is equivalent to four per cent of Türkiye's GDP in 2021, the Washington-based

institution said, adding that the estimate does not account for the costs of reconstruction that were "potentially twice as large", a statement said.

The estimate also does not take into account the damage caused in northern Syria, also particularly affected by the

earthquakes, with a World Bank estimate of the costs there to be released on Tuesday.

The World Bank warned that the continuing aftershocks are likely to increase the total amount of damage caused by the disaster. — AFP

World Bank staffer, surgeon picked as Japan astronaut candidates

JAPAN'S space agency said Tuesday that it has selected a World Bank employee and a surgeon as astronaut candidates in its first recruitment in more than 13 years.

Makoto Suwa, 46, a disaster prevention specialist at the World Bank and Ayu Yoneda, 28, a surgeon at the Japanese Red Cross Medical Centre, will join the Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency for two years of training.

Yoneda, the youngest ever candidate, will become the third female astronaut in JAXA, after Chiaki Mukai and Naoko Yamazaki, while Suwa is the oldest candidate selected.

"I felt a great sense of responsibility" when notified, Suwa said at a press conference in Tokyo that he joined online from Washington.

"I was happy, surprised and felt determined by a sense of responsibility and duty," Yoneda said. "I'm interested in seeing how the Earth looks from the Moon during an eclipse." Suwa previously worked on a Japan Overseas Cooperation Volunteers programme in Rwanda and for the World Meteorological Organization. Yoneda graduated from the University of Tokyo's graduate school of medicine in 2019. Once officially certified as astro-

nauts, the two could participate in missions on the International Space Station as well as take part in the Artemis Project, an international effort led by the United States to return humans to the Moon for the first time since the US National Aeronautics and Space Administration's 1972 Apollo 17 mission. The Japanese government said in 2019 that it was joining the project, seeking to become the second country after the United States to land an astronaut on the Moon.

Suwa and Yoneda are the first to be selected as potential astronauts since Norishige Kanai in September 2009. — Kyodo

Viet Nam to name new president this week: sources

VIET Nam will name a new president later this week, officials said Tuesday, after the dramatic resignation of Nguyen Xuan

Phuc as part of an anti-corruption drive. Vo Van Thuong, 52, is expected to be confirmed at an extraordinary meeting of the

country's national assembly on Thursday, official political and government sources told AFP on condition of anonymity.

His expected appointment comes during a period of significant political upheaval in Viet Nam, where the all-powerful Communist Party's anti-graft purge and factional fighting have seen several ministers fired.

Authoritarian Viet Nam is run by the party, which is officially led by the general secretary, president and prime minister.

Thuong is seen as close to Secretary General Nguyen Phu Trong, the most powerful man in the party and the architect of the anti-corruption campaign.

"The party central committee will meet Wednesday, while the almost 500-member national assembly will meet at its fourth extraordinary meeting Thursday," a national assembly source told AFP. "For sure the national assembly is meeting to vote for the presidency, which is scheduled to be given to Vo Van Thuong," another government source said. Thuong has served as deputy head of the Central Steering Committee on Prevention and Control of Corruption and Negative Phenomena since 2021. He is also head of the party's central propaganda department, a position that has a powerful grasp over freedom of speech and the press. — AFP

Sri Lanka outlaws strikes as anti-tax protests spread

SRI Lanka's government said Tuesday it was banning strikes in several key sectors, a day ahead of a planned one-day national stoppage called by unions to protest against painfully high taxes and utility bills.

Anger towards President Ranil Wickremesinghe is growing as his government slashes spending and hikes taxes to secure an IMF bailout after more than a year of economic and political upheaval.

Wickremesinghe's office said he used his executive power to invoke an "essential services" order that effectively outlawed the planned trade union action.

He declared "public transports, delivery of food or drink,

or coal, oil, fuel, the maintenance of facilities for transport by road, rail or air... airports, ports and railway lines, as essential services with immediate effect," a statement said.

Anyone defying the essential services order risks losing their job. More than 40 trade unions, including bank employees and government hospital staff, had said they would not carry out work on Wednesday as a token protest against the doubling of taxes since January. The government has raised energy costs threefold in line with demands by the International Monetary Fund to reduce losses of state utilities in order to qualify for a \$2.9-billion rescue. — AFP

Japan births hit all-time low in 2022, below 800,000 for 1st time

THE number of babies born in Japan in 2022 fell to a new record low for the seventh consecutive year, dropping below 800,000 for the first time since records began in 1899, government data showed Tuesday. The total number of births was down 5.1 per cent to 799,728, according to preliminary data released by the health ministry. The drop comes much earlier than a 2017 government forecast that said births would fall below 800,000 in 2033. Lifestyle changes resulting from the prolonged COVID-19 pandemic and a growing trend of people marrying later in life are thought to have exacerbated the declining birthrate. — Kyodo

Arsenal can move 5 clear in Premier League, while Liverpool have to beat Wolves for European hopes

while Liverpool need to recapture some form against Wolverhampton.

Arsenal go into the match with Gabriel Jesus their only

absentee as he continues his recovery from a knee injury. The 'Gunners' will hope for a better result than in their first meeting with Everton ended in a 1-0 defeat at Goodison Park less than a month ago.

That game meant Sean Dyche got off to a winning start at the club, but a 2-0 defeat to Aston Villa on Saturday leaves Everton back in the bottom three, a point from safety.

Everton have struggled to score goals, with just 17 in 24 league games, and their cause is not helped by the continued absence of Dominic Calvert-Lewin.

Meanwhile, Dyche is expecting a totally different game in the Emirates Stadium than the meeting earlier this month.— Xinhua

Messi beats Mbappe to FIFA Best prize, Putellas claims women's award

LIONEL Messi won The Best FIFA men's player prize for 2022 on Monday on the back of his World Cup triumph with Argentina and Spain's Alexia Putellas retained the women's award at a ceremony in Paris. Messi beat his Paris Saint-Germain teammate, and World Cup final rival, Kylian Mbappe to the men's gong with Ballon d'Or winner Karim Benzema having been the other contender to claim the prize. It is the second time that Messi has won the honour inaugurated by FIFA in 2016 after

football's world governing body split from Ballon d'Or organizers France Football.

The award, which is voted for by national team coaches and captains, journalists and also fans, recognizes a year in which the former Barcelona star crowned his glorious career by leading Argentina to victory at the World Cup. Messi scored twice in an epic final in Doha as Argentina beat France on penalties despite Mbappe netting a hat-trick for Les Bleus in a remarkable 3-3 draw.— AFP
