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## The Republic of the Union of Myanmar State Administration Council: Five-Point Road Map

With regard to jade lots, local and foreign gem merchants are allowed to pay US dollars, euros, yuan and baht for purchasing the jade lots. Moreover, local merchants are allowed to pay kyat equal to euro in buying jade lots and foreign merchants, US dollars or yuan or baht equal to the euro currency. These lots will be sold to local and foreign merchants through open tender under the rules and regulations. The 58<sup>th</sup> emporium will last from 17 to 23 March. — MNA/TTA

The Senior General and attendees watched a video clip on the production and sale of Myanmar's pearls, the production of jewellery items, and preparations for organizing the 58<sup>th</sup> Myanmar Gems Emporium for 2023.

The Senior General viewed round jade, gems and pearl lots displayed for sale at the hall and gave necessary guidance to officials. The Senior General

viewed round the private jewellery showrooms and looked into a 35-tonne jade stone excavated from Metlinchaung joint venture-2 in Lonkhin/Phakant gems land and lots of uncut jade stones displayed outside the hall.

The Myanmar Gems Emporium has been held since 1964 for selling gems and jewellery items to earn foreign exchange for the State and to benefit the citizens. This emporium will sell 295 lots of pearls, 120 lots of gems and 2,150 lots of jade to local and foreign gem merchants through open tender under the rules and regulations. The floor prices of pearl lots are set at US dollars. Foreign gem merchants are al-

## Application for registration, political party establishment rights ongoing

UNDER Section 25 of the Political Parties Registration Law, the People's Workers Party and Akha National Development Party which are desirous of organizing political parties yesterday applied to the Union Election Commission for permission to establish political parties under the law and rules.

To date, six parties have applied under Section 3 of the Political Parties Registration Law, and 23 parties under Section 25 of the Political Parties Registration Law, totalling 29.

Among these 29 parties, seven parties will organize the entire union and 22 parties only within a region or state.

The Union Election Commission continues verifying the right to establish and register these parties. — MNA/KZL

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## 58<sup>th</sup> Myanmar Gems Emporium opens in Nay Pyi Taw

THE 58<sup>th</sup> Myanmar Gems Emporium began at the Maniradana Jade Hall in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday, crowded with local and foreign jewellers.

From the morning, local and foreign gem merchants viewed pearl lots and jade lots displayed in the hall and jade lots on display outside the hall in the designated areas. Then, they put proposed prices for

desired gems and jade lots into tender boxes.

At the emporium, 295 pearl lots, 120 gem lots and 2,150 jade lots will be sold to all jewellers through an open tender system. The pearl lots were displayed on 17 March and the gem lots will be on display from 17 to 19 March while jade lots will be exhibited from 17 to 20 March. The pearl lots will be sold on 18

and 19 March, the gem lots on 20 March and the jade lots from 21 to 23 March.

In this emporium, pearl lots are priced in US dollars and the reserve price for gems and jade lots is set in euros. Nevertheless, local and foreign jewellers can purchase pearl lots, gem lots and jade lots in specified currencies such as US dollars, euros, yuan, baht and kyat.

Gems and jewellery shops are opened in the Maniradana Jade Hall as well and are alive with shoppers.

The gem emporiums have been held successfully since 1964 to achieve foreign income and economic benefits for citizens. It is reported that the 58<sup>th</sup> gems emporium will be held from 17 and 23 March. — Aung Ye Thwin/CT

11 new cases of COVID-19 reported on 17 March, total figure rises to 633,986

MYANMAR'S COVID-19 positive cases rose to 633,986 after eleven new cases were reported on 17 March 2023 according to the Ministry of Health.

The total number of patients who have recovered from COVID-19 in the country reached 614,463, including four new recoveries.

The death toll from COVID-19 in the country remained unchanged at 19,490 on 17-3-2023 with no new death reported from the pandemic. — GNLM

## State Economic Promotion Fund Management Committee holds 2/2023 meeting

THE State Economic Promotion Fund Management Committee held its second coordination meeting in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday.

During the meeting, Committee Chairman Deputy Prime Minister Union Minister for Planning and Finance U Win Shein said the committee allotted a total of K330 billion – K230 billion to the Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation, K10 billion each to Kayah, Chin and Rakhine states, K8 billion each to Kachin State, Kayin State, Taninthayi Region, Mon and Shan states and K5 billion each to one Self-Administered Division and five Self-Administered Zones from K400 billion fund.

Officials of the committee inspected the operations launched

under the State Economic Promotion Fund in respective regions/states and Self-Administered Division/Zones last two months.

Currently, it is estimated allocation of K50 billion to establish a fund for oil mill development loan and K20 billion for the livestock breeding sector using the remaining K70 billion fund.

The government is providing from every sector to promote the State economy and the relevant officials should make efforts to increase the capital of funds and spend effectively.

Then, the committee members coordinated the discussion and the committee chairman concluded the meeting. — MNA/KTZH

The ceremony was jointly organized by the CFPA Myanmar Office and the Naypyitaw State Academy. CFPA Myanmar Office launched the Pauk-Phaw Scholarship Project by cooperating with the affiliated departments of the Ministry of Education in 2015. Scholarship awards were presented to a total of 1,348 students from 14 universities to date. For the current 2022-2023 academic year, 800 students from East Yangon University, Yangon Education

# Illegal jade, consumer goods, electronics, raw materials, auto parts and vehicles seized

AN on-duty team at the Yepu permanent checkpoint in Shan State made inspections and confiscated three various goods including 8,500 LED lights worth K20,161,963 that were different from the Import Declaration (ID) from a Chenglong truck (estimated value of K50 million) heading to Mandalay from Muse on 12 March and five different commodities including 50 kilogrammes of suspected jade worth K187,900,000 without official documents from a Nissan Diesel condor truck (estimated value of K22 million) heading to Muse from Mandalay on 14

March. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

In addition, the on-duty team captured eight kinds of goods including a total of 4,164 CV-joint car parts worth K121.95 million that needed an import licence and did not declare in the Import Declaration (ID) from a container at the Myanmar International Terminals (Thilawa) on 14 March, 39 kinds of goods including 100 LED street lamp fixture and LED panel lamps worth K199,844,400 that were different from the Import Declaration (ID) from two containers, 40,500 rechargeable electric

LED bulbs worth K81,648,000 that were taken over 61 days of valid for prior arrival (VPA) from a container and five kinds of goods including 292 child bicycles (JGCW) worth K26,762,400 that were taken over 61 days of VPA at the Myanmar Industrial Port Terminal container checkpoint on 14 and 15 March. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

On 15 March, the on-duty teams seized three kinds of goods including 14,266 kilogrammes of Canopy Tents and 1,092 kilogrammes of ready-made tent cloth worth K24,815,616 that were

taken over 61 days of VPA from a container at the Asia World Terminal container checkpoint and two kinds of goods including 72 small remote control toy cars that were not declared in the Import Declaration (ID) worth K1.8 million from a container at the Hteedan Port container checkpoint. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

On 15 March, a combined team conducted surprise checks and captured 28,000 kilogrammes of shrimp (chaff) worth K29.4 million without official documents from a Dongfeng tractor truck (estimated value

of K35 million) which stopped in the three-floor bus station compound in Muse township and 26 kinds of goods including 90 kilogrammes of the plastic bowl and 444 kilogrammes of chain cover without official documents from a Dongfeng tractor truck (estimated value of K20 million) on the Union highway in Muse township. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

Therefore, 17 arrests (estimated value of K896,115,247) were made on 12, 14 and 15 March, according to the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee. —MNA/MKKS

## Myanmar black gram price regains on India's demand

THE price of black gram bounced back to over K2 million per tonne from an over two-week drop in the domestic market on the back of strong demand by India.

On 1 March, the price was K1,858,500 per tonne. It jumped to K2,008,000 per tonne on 17 March, showing a sharp increase of 150,000 per tonne within three weeks.

India's demand strongly influenced Myanmar's black gram price, traders elaborated.

At present, the price of black gram (urad in India) is slightly increasing in India's market on regular demand. India imported approximately 35,000 tonnes of Myanmar's black gram in February and 28,000-30,000 in March, according to the Ayeya Trade Centre.

At present, Myanmar's black gram markets see an upward trend in prices. The export is like-

ly to climb in April. The price will remain high depending on the stocks of India. The price of black gram (urad in India) is expected to be around Rs 8,500-9,000 per quintal in Chennai until August, Agri World Mumbai forecasted.

India notified on 28 December that the free import policy of black gram (urad) and pigeon pea (tur) extended up to March 2024, pushing black gram prices down in the domestic market.

Additionally, the price of black gram is positively related to the exchange rate. Kyat devalued at K2,870 against the US dollar.

Last August 2022, the price of black gram peaked at K2.1 million per tonne when Kyat weakened to K4,500 against the US dollar.

Myanmar earned over US\$1.2 billion from over 1.6 million tonnes of pulses over the past 11 months of the current

financial year, the Ministry of Commerce said.

Of them, black gram export earned \$499.491 million from 608,673.819 kilogrammes, while pigeon pea export pocked \$157.909 million from 202,557.35 kilos, the Ministry of Commerce's statistics showed.

Myanmar primarily exports black gram, green gram and pigeon peas. Of them, black gram and pigeon peas are mainly sent to India while green grams are shipped to China and Europe.

India has growing demand and consumption requirements for black grams and pigeon peas. According to a Memorandum of Understanding between Myanmar and India signed on 18 June 2022, India will import 250,000 tonnes of black gram and 100,000 tonnes of pigeon peas (tur) from Myanmar for five consecutive years from 2021-2022 financial

year to 2025-2026 FY.

This G-to-G pact will not affect the pulses' annual quota set by India. Myanmar's exporters are also entitled to deliver the pulses to India under that annual quota.

Myanmar yearly produces approximately 400,000 tonnes

of black gram and about 50,000 tonnes of pigeon peas. Myanmar is the top producer of the black gram that is primarily demanded by India, while pigeon peas, green grams and chickpeas are cultivated in Australia and African countries besides Myanmar. — NN/EM

## CBM revokes forex licences of 20 companies including Myanmar National Airlines

TWENTY money changers including Myanmar National Airlines have got their forex licence revoked starting from 14 March as they failed to comply with the rules and directives issued by the Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM), according to its Board of Directors meeting. They are Oake Khaung Travels & Tourism Senjo Royal Myanmar, Dawei Popular, Zam Myo, Phyo Thet, Sky Bound, Myanmar MCG Corporation, Htwe and Htwe Family, Won Won, United Eleven, Tun Yama, Myanmar Alinka Hotel Group, Cartel, Super Phoenix, Golden Falcon Shipping, Fairness Travels & Tours, Yadana Bon Travels & Tours, Myanmar National Airlines, Dewant Financial Loan Microfinance and Treasure Su.

The CBM set the reference

exchange rate at K2,100, while a US dollar was exchanged at K2,880 in the unofficial market.

CBM has set the currency trading band at 0.3 per cent for the Kyat to fluctuate between these two specified upper and lower exchange rates for transactions, selling or buying, according to a directive issued by the CBM on 10 August 2022.

Therefore, financial institutions including banks and informal money exchanges are instructed to set a dollar value at K2,094 for buying and K2,106 for selling. However, the over-the-counter Kyat-dollar exchange rate was K2,865 for buying and K2,880 for selling on 17 March.

There is a large price difference between the reference rate of the CBM and the unofficial market rate. However, there is

no way to set the new price, as per the notification released on 15 January.

Investigation and Prosecuting of market manipulation to hike the exchange rate in the local forex market with the malicious rumours will be undertaken, according to the Central Bank of Myanmar's statement released on 10 February.

Some exporters, importers and banks are attempting to raise the exchange rate owing to the rumours. The statement called for bank institutions to govern the market and investigate those fraudsters who circulate rumours.

The CBM released a notice that the exporters, importers and banking institutions are asked not to elevate the exchange rate. Those banking institutions that will not abide by financial regulations will face legal action as well.

Last August, a dollar value hit an all-time high of over K4,500 in the grey market. Consequently, the CBM sold dollars at its auction market for the sectors in need, to control the soaring dollar, injecting a total of \$443.8 million in the markets in 2021. — NN/EM

## Do best for boosting agricultural produce

**AS** MYANMAR is striving for transforming manual farming into mechanized farming, it is necessary to improve the farmlands for boosting the manufacturing of agricultural produce. On the other hand, relevant authorities and organizations need to uplift the socioeconomic life of local farmers.

Myanmar farmers using the traditional farming system did not have the skills to improve their farmlands. As such, local authorities and relevant departmental personnel contributed modern agricultural techniques and necessary inputs to those farmers to develop their lives as well as boost their production.

On one hand, relevant ministries and local authorities helped those farmers overcome agricultural difficulties and challenges such as agricultural water, manufacturing roads, quality seeds of crops and other necessary inputs. Thanks to their endeavours, farmlands could be facilitated with proper drainage systems, modern agricultural techniques and quality strains of crops as well as agricultural machinery aid.

Currently, Myanmar is changing its farming system with mechanized equipment to cut time and money in cultivation. At the same time, high-quality strains of crops produce boosting the per-acre yield of crops which helps the country have food security and the farmers enjoy higher living standards. Moreover, personnel from the relevant departments are raising the awareness of farmers to be able to upgrade their farmlands under modern techniques. Hence, those farmers comprehensively understand the important role of fertile soil, agricultural water, quality strains of crops and agricultural techniques.

If so, farmers are willing to join hands with the government and relevant departments they believe that these bodies are keen to improve their society. Hence, all farmers need to emphasize systematic reclamation of farmlands, efficient use of agricultural water, timely harvesting to minimize loss and waste of crops and increase production of quality crops based on regional situations, geographical conditions and favourable weather with skills of applying modern agricultural techniques to thrive crop plants and combat pests and sharing their experiences to new generation farmers.

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**H**AVING learnt to read enables most readers to initiate their reading habit, as I see it. After beginning to read in my primary student life, I would like to read as many words as I could see, even signboards, directions, and Buddhist chants. First of all, young readers will just be able to read out something rather than trying to comprehend it. When readers have got a longer reading age, they start reading up on anything whether critically or logically though. Even a smart reader can know well which takes aim at what if its writer drops only a narrow hint or clue to him. Of course, a time for reading is, metaphorically speaking, the very creature comforts that give a reader knowledge, pleasure, peace and quiet to their utmost, costing a small fortune. Only if anyone has never taken up reading will he think it boring to read for sure. So far as I am aware, the first step towards lifelong reading may be simply the comics. But here, I want to share my excellent reading experience with future readers as much as I can.

### Step-by-step reading

For starters, readers should look at what sort of writing piece they may like, for instance, the comics mentioned above. As my great teacher U Hla Kyi said, the reader fears thinking books but loses thin ones quite often. To my mind, young readers prefer fiction to non-fiction since the former type of literature usually makes them laugh, smile, or even cry to a certain degree. If they wish, they could set up their long-term reading journey with literature. Whichever type of literature they embark on ought to interest readers through tragedy, comedy, tragicomedy or something new. And every single time any reader

picks up a book, he needs to know 1) what it is about in detail, including its contents, chapter, index, foreword, thanks and bibliography, 2) which subject matter it is based on, 3) what time or place it is set in, and 4) its main purpose at least. As advanced readers and writers, they will have to see even the author's distinctive writing style and main theme. After all, a clever reader must be able to hold a grasp of the essence and aesthetic of a book.

### Overcoming the trouble with a few resource books in hand

Only occasionally have readers been having difficulty getting a few resource books in hand as one of their major problems regarding reading work. However, the readers can make potential resource substitutes for books by going to the nearest libraries, attending and holding literary talks, watching television, or listening to the radio as regards literary programmes. It would be better for readers to read books for the simple reason that before a book is published widely, both its writer and publisher have got to cogitate on distribution costs and profits even if the book would become a best-seller here, there and everywhere; in other words, whether or not it is worth purchasing and reading. So, the writer must have thrown heart and soul into his book. Last but not least, readers could even read their textbooks or the books which they have finished in depth over and over again. It

should be remembered that the textbooks described in a nation's education will probably cast light on the most fundamental knowledge, skills, and attitudes for a citizen's life.

**Facing thematic difficulty and linguistic barriers**

Readers tend to meet subject matter difficulty and language barriers while reading. Sometimes they read reading material that is by far higher than their literacy skills according to the theme or the language. At that time, they can easily get neither the literal meaning nor connotation of a good read. An average

reader could manage to resolve those difficulties and barriers by reading the reading matter which might be suitable for their literacy levels or by looking new words up in multi-lingual dictionaries patiently and industriously. But these tasks will be driving them bored or disappointed sometimes. In general, classics look totally boring to inexperienced little readers, mainly because of archaisms. In actual fact, they may find it really interesting to study the archaisms after having read dictionaries a lot. Another solution to thematic difficulty and linguistic barriers is literature in translation. Strange to say, some

have no desire to read translated literature; others even look down on translators merely for their translation is not their own works of art. Readers to the core are in translators' debt. It is found that literature in translation is still living in every developed country, especially England, France and Japan.

**Making a change to read pieces of writing**

In my childhood, I used to read fairy tales beginning with 'Long, long ago' or 'Once upon a time'. Honestly speaking, I expected to read on next tales under the illusion that they would start with those expressions. At

the beginning of some stories in me after reading it sounds like a knock on the door, a voice such as a monologue, or action, for example, fighting – as a descriptive writing style, not a narrative structure. Quite frankly, I was highly sceptical about that writing style, thinking of whether the stories should be written like this. Much later on, I got to notice that stories are written chiefly relying upon the only plot of a whole narrative, the writer's theoretical concepts or significant story writing style. As to the writing form of stories, they are composed of the central written word, the emphasized spoken word or a balanced mixture of these two words. And again, articles are of various genres; apparently, the articles can be classified into two categories – directly informative writings and food for thought. The way I see it, readers would prefer thought-oriented articles instead of information-based ones as they are getting aged.

**Getting to know extended reading**

As we all know, there is a lot to study in the world, and for my money, people's professional achievement will not point out adequate knowledge necessary for their entire life. Thus, extended reading should be required for wide-ranging and enough study on universal truths so as to find their feet in life. I want to divide the extended reading into two parts, namely extensive reading and intensive reading. What I mean

is that the first term 'extensive reading' refers to the study of all other things apart from professional studies for a long time, and the second term 'intensive reading' denotes the study of shortcuts to the subject matter in hot pursuit for current affairs. What is more, extensive reading calls for newspapers, journals, and magazines in addition to books whereas intensive reading entails attending courses, workshops, programmes, and seminars if need be. Those reading styles have a great deal to offer readers in the way of colourful knowledge such as seeing different lives and situations. Just because of that knowledge, they may come to terms with strangers from all walks of life in future.

### Beneficial effects of reading

Having had a lot of reading enables readers to express their readiness for discussion and writing, at least I think it does. By the time the topics that have been read by them link up with the studies they are carrying out at school. These topics will definitely double their abilities to understand school lessons. Conducting a classroom presentation in my university life, bibliophiles stand head and shoulders above the other students with bibliophobia. As always, bibliolaters are perfectly capable of speaking out trenchantly by means of standing jokes, words of wisdom, facts and figures in virtue of their reading knowledge. It is probable that writers take the most advantage of reading, that is, they can

dig up linguistic effects and usages which may contribute to their effective and efficient writing, and so do translators or interpreters. Readers like to instil a noble spirit to sympathize with others, a keen spirit to realize human nature, a sound spirit to beat life's sufferings, and a constructive spirit to preserve the natural environment thanks to literature.

### Remarks on the very reading

I have always loved reading and it has come to my knowledge that not everyone has such easy access to as many books as they need, with many not being able to afford them. Actually, reading should not be a privilege. There ought to be any accessibility or affordability of books for all bookworms to read more. In order to get into extra reading, well-read persons do not put pressure on themselves, listen to podcasts or audiobooks that are still a form of reading, try long articles, set aside 10 minutes in the morning, and read anthologies which are a collection of writing or poems in terms of a writer and cultural historian's tips. Whatever is read, this can be called authentic reading on condition that readers have devoted all their attention to reading, especially in a noise-free reading room, or so long as their ideas, views and opinions from reading have been applied in real-life circumstances or provided their reading developmental stage never stops at light reading, i.e., reading for pleasure, or only if they are able to evaluate the typical norms of some grand literature. Rarely are authorities in any field of study such as doctors, engineers, and teachers lacking in a pre-reading task.

## New Kunlong bridge construction underway

THE Kunlong bridge is under construction across the Thanlwin River in northern Shan State. It will be completed this year according to the Chinese Embassy to Myanmar. The bridge has reached the important part where the two sides of the bridge are connected.

### Tanzania probes mystery illness after five die

TANZANIA has dispatched a team of health experts to investigate a mysterious disease that has claimed the lives of five people, the government said.

The illness was detected in "a total of seven people (with) symptoms including fever, vomiting, bleeding in various body parts and kidney failure", the health ministry said in a statement released late Thursday.

The government has sent a rapid response team to the north-western region of Kagera which borders Uganda to investigate the "communicable disease", Tanzania's chief medical officer Tumaini Nagu said in the statement. "Samples have been taken from the patients and the dead in an effort to identify the source and type of illness," she said, urging the public to remain calm but take precautions to avoid contagion.—AFP

## Philippine social media users face barrage of bogus medical posts

PHILIPPINE vlogger Rosanel Demasudlay holds a heart-shaped "virginity soap" bar in front of the camera and assures her hundreds of YouTube followers it can be safely used to "tighten" their vaginas.

The video is part of a barrage of bogus and harmful medical posts on social media platforms where Filipinos rank among the world's heaviest users.

Even before Covid-19 confined people to their homes and left them fearful of seeing a doctor, many in the Philippines sought remedies online because they were cheaper and easier to access.

During the pandemic, AFP's Fact Check team saw an explosion of misinformation about untested cosmetic

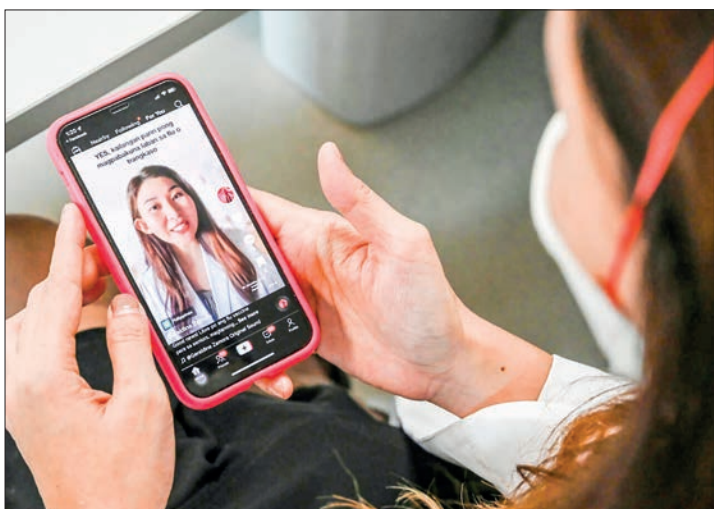
products and quick-fix treatments for chronic illnesses.

The majority appear as free posts or paid advertisements on Facebook, the most popular social media site among the 76 million internet users in the Philippines.

They can circulate for weeks or even months without detection as Facebook struggles to keep up with the torrent of misinformation flooding its platform.

While there is no vetting of posts before they go live, Facebook has a multi-stage, largely automated, review system to check ads before they are published.

Many of the products are promoted in videos that have been doctored to make it look like real medical professionals are endorsing them.—AFP

## Japan targets 85% of male workers to take paternity leave by FY 2030

JAPANESE Prime Minister Fumio Kishida pledged Friday to implement the necessary measures to allow 85 per cent of male workers who have a child to take paternity leave by fiscal 2030 to tackle the falling birthrate.

Kishida said at a press conference that his government will also take steps to push up wages for young workers and boost economic assistance to them to create an environment conducive to raising their children free of concerns.

In Japan, 85.1 per cent of women took maternity leave in fiscal 2021, but only 13.97 per cent of men did so. Many workers worry taking the time off may increase their colleagues' workload.

The number of babies born in Japan in 2022 fell to a new record low for the seventh consecutive year, dropping below 800,000 for the first time since records began in 1899, government data showed late last month.

Kishida has expressed an eagerness to increase spending to fight the declining birthrate, saying that focusing on child policies is this year's most pressing agenda item, but he has stopped short of clarifying how to secure the budget.

Japan's public expenditures related to family support stood at around 10 trillion yen (\$75 billion) in fiscal 2020, ac-

counting for 2.01 per cent of gross domestic product in the year and underscoring that the country has lagged behind developed European economies.

Sweden spent 3.46 per cent, Britain 2.98 per cent and France 2.81 per cent of their GDPs on child care, according to data released in fiscal 2018 by the National Institute of Population and Social Security Research in Tokyo.—Kyodo

## Half of women scientists worldwide sexually harassed

HALF of all women scientists worldwide have been the victim of workplace sexual harassment at some point during their career, according to a survey published on Thursday.

In the survey, which included more than 5,000 researchers across 117 countries, 49 per cent of women scientists reported that they had "personally experienced at least one situation" of harassment.

Nearly half of the cases took place after the MeToo movement emerged in 2017, according to the survey, which was conducted by the Ipsos polling firm on behalf of the L'Oréal Foundation. For 65 per cent of the women, the harassment had a negative impact on their careers. Just one in five of the victims reported the harassment to their institution.

## Fallout from collapse of US banks causes more trouble in Europe

BANKING giant Credit Suisse lost nearly a fourth of its value Wednesday, amid the growing fallout from the collapse of two regional banks in the United States.

Wednesday marked the second time in three trading sessions since the collapse of California's Silicon Valley Bank (SVB), and the subsequent failure of Signature Bank from New York, that European financial stocks were severely battered.

Nevertheless, the dramatic impact on Credit Suisse in trading Wednesday was largely

unexpected, since the institution is so large.

According to 2022 data from Insider Intelligence, Credit Suisse was the second-largest bank in Switzerland and the 17th-largest in Europe, with an estimated 730 billion euros (772 billion US dollars) in assets under control.

The Swiss institution saw its share price plummet by 24 per cent in trading Wednesday, ending the day at 1.7 Swiss francs in heavy trading. Earlier in the session the shares were down by more than 30 per cent. Wednesday's fall was the tenth consec-

utive losing session for the company's shares. They have lost nearly 40 per cent of their value since 3 March, when shares traded at 2.78 Swiss francs.

The latest developments have also increased volatility for the Swiss franc compared to the euro, the US dollar, and other leading currencies.

Stock exchanges across Europe were also impacted by Wednesday's losses.

The DAX blue-chip index on Germany's Frankfurt Stock Exchange fell by 3.3 per cent; in Paris, the CAC-40 index fell by 3.6 per cent; shares slipped 4.6 per cent in Milan; in Madrid they were down by 4.3 per cent; and in Amsterdam by 2.9 per cent.

In most cases, financial sector stocks led the retreat as investors worried about further impacts on banking institutions.

The Credit Suisse sell-off was reportedly triggered by a weaker-than-expected annual financial statement, followed by the announcement that a leading shareholder — the Saudi National Bank — would not provide new financial support through the acquisition of more shares. —Xinhua

## Push for carbon-free hydrogen accelerates in US

A source of renewable and storable energy, hydrogen is experiencing a breakthrough in the United States after years of sluggish growth as Biden administration climate policies spark major investments. "America came from nowhere and now they're in the lead," Mark Hutchinson, CEO of Fortescue Future Industries, said of America's ascent in renewable energy in general and hydrogen more specifically, at last week's CERAWEEK energy conference in Houston, Texas. US hydrogen production already amounts to around ten million tonnes per year, about 10 per cent of world volumes. But that output mostly consists of so-called "grey" hydrogen, which is produced from natural gas without capturing carbon dioxide emissions.

Thanks especially to the 2021

infrastructure bill and the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA), signed into law last year, US President Joe Biden has pledged to increase production capacity for low- and zero-carbon emission sources, which are known as "blue" and

"green" hydrogen.

Blue hydrogen is produced from natural gas in which the carbon dioxide from the manufacturing process is captured. Green hydrogen is produced through renewable sources. —AFP

## Sweden rediscovers poverty as inflation soars

IT'S not yet 6 am and dozens of homeless people are already queuing outside Stockholm's central station for breakfast, their numbers bigger than ever, charities say.

Hit by the highest inflation in more than 30 years and poised for recession, Sweden's visible signs of poverty are mounting amid rising inequality. "So many people are coming here to breakfast," said Kavian Ferdowsi who runs a charity helping the homeless.

"In the 13 years that I've run this, we've never had so many people," he told AFP as his colleagues served up cinnamon buns and coffee.

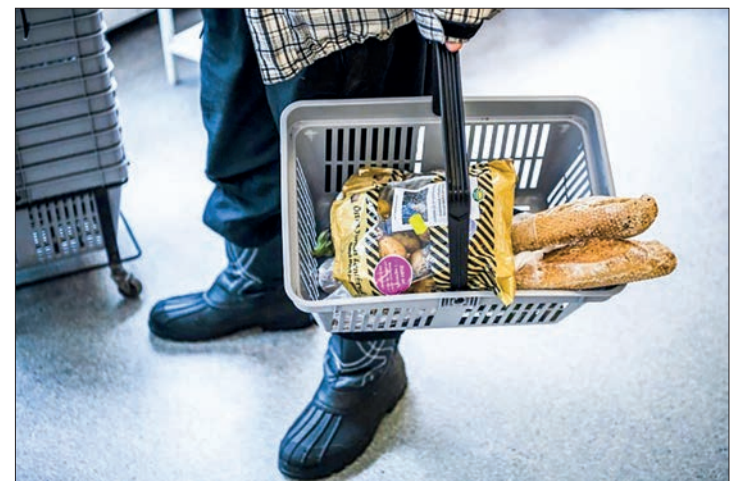
Sweden has been hit hard by the effects of the war in Ukraine. Its currency, the krona, is weaker than it has

ever been against the euro, and aggressive interest rate hikes have left many households with hefty mortgage payments.

Long stable and prosperous, Sweden's economy is now one of the worst performers in Europe. After a spike in electricity prices at the start of the winter, food prices are now Swedes' main concern, up 20 per cent from a year ago.

Inflation has hovered stubbornly around 12 per cent since November, according to official statistics on Wednesday.

"The first wave of inflation was just energy prices and some import prices. But now it has spread to the entire economy," said Annika Alexius, a Stockholm University economist. —AFP

## Hong Kong sees over 1 mln visitors in February, first in 3 years

HONG Kong saw 1.46 million visitors last month, exceeding the monthly 1-million mark for the first time since February 2020, as the share of tourists continued to grow, official data showed Wednesday. The number of Chinese mainland visitors jumped to more than 1.1 million in February, up from 280,000 in the previous month, according to data from the Hong Kong Tourism Board (HKTB). The rebound comes after normal travel between Hong Kong

and the Chinese mainland fully resumed on 6 February. Last month, non-mainland travellers to Hong Kong rose from 220,000 to 350,000, with short-distance visits mainly made by people from Southeast Asia, the data showed. The HKTB said the MTR Corporation will give away 100,000 Airport Express tickets, 100,000 Tourist Day Passes and 100,000 coupons each worth 30 yuan (4.3 US dollars) for high-speed rail tickets to attract visitors to Hong Kong. —Xinhua



## Beijing launches first direct China-Europe freight train service

A cargo train loaded with 55 containers left Beijing Thursday morning for the Russian capital Moscow, marking the launch of the first direct China-Europe freight train service from the Chinese capital.

The freight train carrying goods such as construction materials, household electrical appliances and clothing departed from the logistic hub of Pinggu District in the northeast of the city and will exit the country via Manzhouli Port in north China's Inner Mongolia Autonomous

Region.

The train is expected to reach Moscow in 18 days, covering a distance of approximately 9,000 kilometres.

"In the past, we needed to send the products to Henan or Hebei provinces before they were shipped to Europe," said Chu Yixiao, general manager of the Taitong International Transportation Co Ltd.

"With the launch of this freight train service, goods can now be sent directly from Beijing to Europe, reducing logistics costs and

boosting transportation efficiency," he said, adding that the development presents new opportunities for businesses to thrive.

This year marks the 10th anniversary of the Belt and Road Initiative (BRI). According to Liu Zhenfang, chairman of the board of the China State Railway Group Co., Ltd, China-Europe freight trains have linked 108 Chinese cities with 208 cities in 25 European countries, with the cargo routes having handled 65,000 freight train trips.—Xinhua

## Wall Street giants move to rescue First Republic Bank

AMERICA'S largest banks moved Thursday to shore up First Republic, easing fears that the regional lender could be the next domino to fall after collapses including Silicon Valley Bank.

A consortium of 11 US private banks, including Bank of America, Citigroup and JPMorgan Chase, announced they would deposit \$30 billion into First Republic.

The move marks a dramatic initiative by the lenders to bolster the system following failures of three midsized lenders in the last week.

"This action by America's largest banks reflects their confidence in First Republic and in banks of

all sizes," the group said in a joint statement.

"Together, we are deploying our financial

strength and liquidity into the larger system, where it is needed the most," the banks said.

Shares of First Republic reversed earlier losses to close 10 per cent higher on Wall Street Thursday. "This show of support by a group of large banks is most welcome, and demonstrates the resilience of the banking system," said leaders of the Treasury Department, US Federal Reserve, Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and Office of the Comptroller of the Currency in a joint statement.—AFP

## Rome's Pantheon to charge for tourist entry

One of Rome's oldest and best loved monuments, the Pantheon, will soon start charging for entrance, officials said Thursday — drawing a mixed reaction from tourists.

The price for entry, which is currently free, has yet to be fixed but would not exceed five euros (\$5), while minors and Rome residents would be exempt.

The change was "based on common sense", Culture Minister Gennaro Sangiuliano said, and the price "modest" for Italy's most visited cultural site.

The 2,000-year-old

building is currently a consecrated church and part of the proceeds from ticket sales will go towards the diocese of Rome.

Most of the money — 70 per cent — will go to the culture ministry, which will bear the costs of cleaning and maintenance.

Among the tourists visiting the Pantheon on Thursday, reaction to the news was mixed.

"It makes sense. Conservation requires money, and it doesn't shock me to make tourists contribute," said Gustavo Rojas, a 37-year-old from Chile.—AFP

## Microsoft applies AI powers to Excel, Outlook

MICROSOFT pressed on with its AI revolution on Thursday, announcing that it would apply the powers behind ChatGPT to its iconic Excel, Word and Outlook programmes.

The Redmond, Washington giant has been swiftly adopting language-based AI, showing less caution than its rivals despite early problems such as chatbots giving disturbing responses or blatantly inaccurate information.

Microsoft's latest chatbot, called Copilot, will put ChatGPT-like abilities to work in offices, churning out meeting transcripts, calendar entries or PowerPoint slides almost instantaneously.

The thrust of the new release is that generative AI, the term for ChatGPT style capabilities, will function as an assistant for users of Microsoft's popular workplace software and not unilaterally take over office tasks.—AFP

## China's Xi to go to Russia on first visit since Ukraine invasion

CHINESE President Xi Jinping will make a state visit to Moscow next week, where he will hold talks with his strategic ally Vladimir Putin just over a year into Russia's war in Ukraine.

Xi will be in Russia from Monday to Wednesday, Beijing's foreign ministry and the Kremlin said on Friday.

China's foreign ministry called Xi's trip "a visit for peace" that aimed to "practice true multilateralism... improve global governance and make contributions to the development and progress of the world".

The two leaders would exchange views on bilateral relations and major international and regional issues, ministry spokesman Wang Wenbin said at a regular press conference.

"At present, changes not seen in a century are rapidly evolving, and the world has entered a new period of turmoil," he said.

"China will uphold its objective and fair position on the Ukrainian crisis and play a constructive role in promoting peace talks."

The Kremlin said the two

presidents would speak about "strategic cooperation" and "discuss deepening the exhaustive operation between Russia and partnership and strategic co-operation between Russia and China".—AFP

#### French PM deploys constitutional power to force passage of pension reform bill

FRENCH Prime Minister Elisabeth Borne on Thursday activated an article of the country's Constitution that allows the government to force passage of the controversial pension reform bill without a vote at the National Assembly.

"We cannot gamble on the future of our pensions, this reform is necessary," Borne told the National Assembly, where the government does not have an absolute majority.

"Because I am attached to our social model, and because I believe in parliamentary democracy, it is on your reform that I am ready to engage my responsibility," Borne said.—Xinhua

#### Argentina to hold general election in October

ARGENTINA will hold the general election for the 2023-2027 presidential term on 22 October, the National Electoral Chamber announced Thursday. Mandatory primary elections are scheduled for 13 August. Political parties can present one list of primary candidates and voting is mandatory for citizens.

Primary candidates must obtain at least 1.5 per cent of the total votes in order to be eligible for the October election.—Xinhua

## N Korea says it launched Hwasong-17 ICBM as "warning to enemies"

NORTH Korea said Friday it conducted a launch drill for a Hwasong-17 intercontinental ballistic missile the previous day to give "a stronger warning to the enemies" amid a large-scale military exercise being conducted by the United States and South Korea.

The launch drill, guided by leader Kim Jong Un, confirmed the war readiness of an ICBM unit and "the exceptional militancy" of the North's strategic forces and verified their reliability, the official Korean Central News Agency said.

The ICBM test took place just hours before the Japanese and South Korean leaders held a summit in Tokyo to discuss issues, including cooperation in responding to Pyongyang's threats.

In response to the missile

firing and to ensure their readiness to respond to emergencies, Japan's Air Self-Defence Force and US Air Force conducted a joint fighter jet drill over the Sea of Japan on Friday, Japan's Defence Ministry said.—Kyodo

## Venezuela Supreme Court decriminalizes homosexuality in armed forces

VENEZUELA'S Supreme Court on Thursday annulled a controversial article of the military justice code that had criminalized homosexuality within the armed forces.

The court annulled the provision, which had provided for

a penalty of up to three years in prison, "for lacking sufficient clarity and legal precision with regard to the conduct it intended to punish," the court stated on its website.

It had called for punishment against members of the

military who committed "sexual acts against nature" but failed to define what that meant, the statement said.

The article was not compatible with the constitution or progress in human rights, the court added.—AFP



## Cambodia celebrates return of 'priceless' stolen Angkor jewellery

CAMBODIAN leader Hun Sen unveiled a collection of stolen Angkor crown jewellery on Friday which was recently returned to the kingdom after decades in Britain, pleading for other long-lost treasures to be handed back.

Gold crowns, necklaces and amulets were among the trove of treasures from the Angkor period, which ran from the ninth to 14th centuries AD when the Khmer empire dominated vast parts of Southeast Asia.

The Cambodian culture ministry characterized the items — expected to go on display at the national museum — as “priceless cultural heritage”.

“I appeal to museums, institutions and Khmer artefact collectors to continue to return those items voluntarily to Cambodia,” Hun Sen told the ceremony.

“Heritage items should be returned to their country of origin.” The culture ministry last month discreetly received

77 pieces from the family of the late, disgraced British art dealer Douglas Latchford.

Two 10th-century sculptures recently returned by the United States were also displayed on Friday.

Dominic Williams, the British ambassador to Cambodia, tweeted that it was an “extraordinary privilege to see these previously stolen artefacts displayed in their ancestral home”.

When he died in 2020, Latchford was awaiting trial in the United States for art trafficking, and the same year his family agreed to return the antiquities to Cambodia.

The family returned five stone and bronze artefacts in 2021. Thousands of antiques and artefacts were stolen from Cambodia during the conflict and genocide of the Khmer Rouge regime in the 1970s.—AFP

## Uranium said missing by IAEA in Libya recovered: military

SEVERAL containers of natural uranium reported missing by the UN's nuclear watchdog in war-scarred Libya have been found, a general with one of the country's two rival camps said Thursday.

General Khaled al-Mahjoub, commander of eastern strongman Khalifa Haftar's communications division, said on his Facebook page that the containers of uranium had been recovered “barely five kilometres (three miles)” from

where they had been stored in the Sabha area of southern Libya. “The situation is under control. The IAEA has been informed,” Mahjoub told AFP.

On Wednesday the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) in Vienna reported that 2.5 tonnes of natural uranium had gone missing from a Libyan site.

Following the announced discovery on Thursday, the IAEA said it was trying to verify the information.—AFP

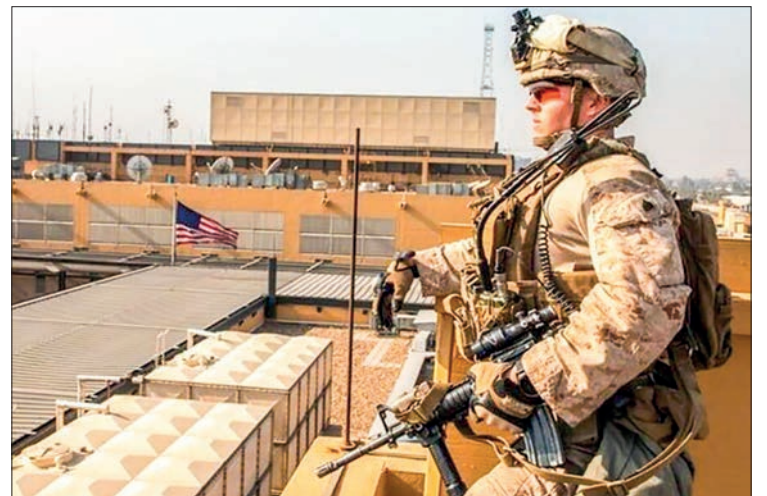
## 20 years after US Iraq invasion, Senate acts to end war authorization

ALMOST exactly 20 years after US forces invaded Iraq to remove Saddam Hussein from power, the US Senate moved Thursday to revoke the law that authorized then-president George W. Bush to launch the war.

In a procedural vote that came over a decade after the war's official end, senators from both parties strongly supported cancelling the 2002 Authorization for Use of Military Force (AUMF), which empowered Bush to send US forces to Iraq.

The same bill also revokes the 1991 AUMF that empowered Bush's father president George HW Bush to attack Iraq after Saddam's forces invaded Kuwait.

“The Iraq War has itself long been over. This AUMF has outlived its purpose and we can

no longer justify keeping it in effect,” said Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer.

“Every year we leave these

AUMFs on the books is another year that a future administration can abuse them,” he said.—AFP

## N Ireland peace deal saved ‘thousands’ of lives: ex-Irish PM

THE success of the 1998 peace accords in Northern Ireland can be measured in thousands of lives saved, said former Irish prime minister Bertie Ahern, as new tensions simmer ahead

of the agreement's 25th anniversary.

The former Taoiseach played a pivotal role in negotiating and implementing the Good Friday Agreement with the UK

government under Tony Blair.

“The last 25 years, thankfully, we've had some problems but small (ones),” Ahern, 71, told AFP in an interview.—AFP

## Vieira sacked by Crystal Palace after winless run

CRYSTAL Palace sacked manager Patrick Vieira on Friday after a miserable run of one win in 14 Premier League games pulled them into a relegation battle.

The London club, without a win in 2023 under the former Arsenal and France midfielder, are 12<sup>th</sup> in the table but are just three points above the drop zone.

"It is with enormous regret that this difficult decision has been made," said chairman Steve Parish.

"Ultimately, results in recent months have placed us in a precarious league position and we felt a change is necessary to give us the best chance of retaining Premier League status."

Palace said in a statement that "the process to appoint a new manager is under way".

Three members of Vieira's coaching staff — Osian Roberts, Kristian Wilson and Said Aigoun — have also left Selhurst Park.

Parish added: "Patrick has given his all to the club, and we all thank him and his team for their service."

Vieira, 46, replaced Roy Hodgson before the start of the 2021/22 season and led Palace to a 12-placed finish.

But this season they have scored just 21 goals in 27 games — only three clubs have scored fewer.

Their 1-0 defeat by Brighton on Wednesday was their third loss in a row.—AFP
