DOMESTIC raw materials must be fully utilized for manufacturing finished goods with the technical assistance of relevant departments, said Chairman of National Planning Commission Chairman of the State Administration Council Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing at the National Planning Commission meeting 1/2023 at the SAC Chairman Office in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday morning.

Speaking at the meeting, the

Senior General said that the economic growth rate declined 5.9 per cent from October 2020 to September 2021 in the 2020-21 financial year. In implementing the six-month interim plan, the economic growth rate increased by 2.4 per cent and in the first six-month period of the 2022-23 FY, by 3.4 per cent. The relevant department estimated that the economic growth rate may reach 3.4 per cent for the whole year.

Operation of manufacturing at home at full capacity is crucial

in the economic development of a nation. Only when domestic production increases will it fulfil the requirement of food for ensuring local food security.

The development of rural regions reflects the socioeconomic improvement of rural people, narrowing the development gap between urban and rural areas. The government will accelerate public-centred development measures for the whole nation.

- To serve primary duties of Tatmadaw for successfully safeguarding Our Three Main National Causes, and protecting the State Constitution and shielding the genuine disciplined multiparty democratic system

Application for registration, political party establishment rights ongoing

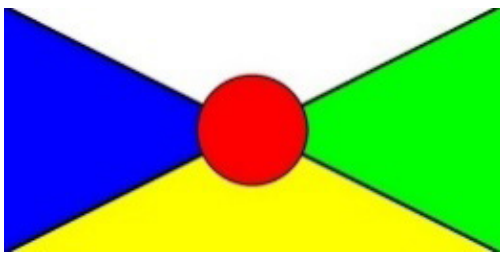
UNDER Section 25 of the Political Parties Registration Law, the New Society Party (NSP), which is desirous of organizing political parties, yesterday applied to the Union Election Commission for permission to establish political parties under the law and rules.

To date, six parties have applied under Section 3 of the Political Parties Registration Law, and 27 parties under Section 25 of the Political Parties Registration Law, totalling 33.

Among these 33 parties, eight parties will organize the entire union and 25 parties only within a region or state. The Union Election Commission continues verifying the right to establish and register these parties. — MNA

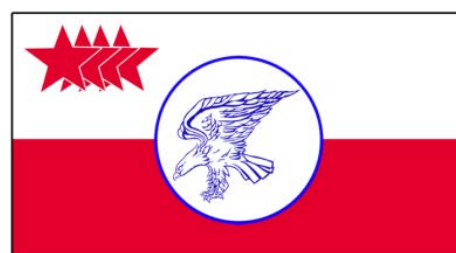

The Senior General stressed the need to continuously strive for the cultivation of sunflowers on the schedule for ensuring local oil sufficiency. Local farmers need to learn from the difficulties of growing monsoon and winter sunflower cultivation to have success in meeting the target.

The Senior General highlighted that investments from home and abroad are invited to the nation in various ways and means. This being so, relevant departments are to comprehensively coordinate the implementation of investments in businesses in time.

The government allows the implementation of projects to build staff housing for doctors and nurses from the health sector; construct health infrastructures and accelerate healthcare services with the increased budget for the health sector.

The finance is increased annually for raising the sports sector and ensuring a healthy and fit society. So, standardized stadiums, gymnasiums and swimming pools are under construction in regions and states.

During its tenure, the State Administration Council raised the allocated budget for the education sector to improve education infrastructures and extend school buildings. Now, the plans have been allowed to build 51 technical, agricultural, and livestock schools in 50 districts for granting the students to have jobs and con-

tinue learning higher education in relevant subjects with stipends.

The Senior General urged all to strive for increasing the enrolment rate of school-age children in the future and decreasing the school dropout rate. All have to implement the education system to produce qualified students in larger quantities.

The Senior General pointed out that the world's geopolitical crises lead to rising fuel prices. So, high prices of commodities, changes in interest rates and foreign exchange rates raise the amount of debts causing a decline in the local currencies.

As such, the Senior General noted that guidance has been given to reduce the consumption of fuel oil and an effective energy consumption system develops. Effective reduction of fuel consumption will contribute to the emergence of a carbon-free environment. Efforts must be made for generating electricity at full capacity, timely completing the electricity projects and implementing small-scale hydropower projects in relevant regions while managing the generation of electricity from solar power, wind power, coal-fired power and nuclear energy.

Implementation of projects needs to follow the plan, do, check and act-PDCA for having the economic development before the Covid-19 period, the Senior General added.

Vice-Chairman of the Na-



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tional Planning Commission SAC Vice-Chairman Deputy Prime Minister Vice-Senior General Soe Win stressed the need for timely completion of projects, spending the appropriate amount of money on projects, and achieving good results and high quality in the implementation of the project with the use of State budget.

Vice-Chairman of the National Planning Commission Deputy Prime Minister Union Minister for Planning and Finance U Win Shein reviewed the implementation of the national plan for the 2022-23 financial year and drafted the national plan for the 2023-24 FY.

Commission Secretary Deputy Minister for Planning and Finance Daw Than Than Lin reported on the 2023-24 FY national planning law (draft). Auditor-General of the Union

U Tin Oo explained recommendations over findings in the previous FY and plans to do auditing in the 2023-24 FY.

In his response to the reports, the Senior General said the State economic promotion fund allotted K400 billion to regions and states, self-administered zones and divisions. These amounts must be capital for agricultural tasks such as sunflower, green gram and summer paddy cultivation. Despite different situations, all need to seek ways and means for meeting the target and ensuring successful implementation of the projects.

In conclusion, the Senior General stressed the need to systematically hand over the finance to the government if the implementation of projects cannot be completed at the end of the financial year for many reasons. Feasibili-

ty studies must be conducted for the projects which must be cost-effective and beneficial for the people.

The economic promotion with the most certainty is operating agricultural produce and livestock products. Domestic raw materials must be fully utilized for manufacturing finished goods with the technical assistance of relevant departments.

The Senior General pointed out that it is necessary to adjust the income and expense of the State-owned enterprises. Any projects need to depend on efficient spending of money and full capacity in implementation. The Senior General urged all to seek strong and weak points in the national plan this financial year for the development of the State economy. — MNA/TTA

MYANMAR'S COVID-19 positive cases recorded **633,993** after **one** new case was reported on 21 March 2023 according to the Ministry of Health.

The total number of patients who have recovered from COVID-19 in the country reached **614,481**, including **one** new recovery.

The death toll from COVID-19 in the country remained unchanged at **19,490** on 21-3-2023 with no new death reported from the pandemic. — GNLM

It is necessary to constantly supervise the implementation of projects in conformity with the budget: Senior General

ONLY when union ministries and region and state governments can fully earn incomes meeting the targets in the financial year will they have the chance to fully spend the targeted expenditures, said Chairman of the Financial Commission Chairman of the State Administration Council Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing at the financial commission meeting 1/2023 at SAC Chairman Office in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday afternoon.

Speaking on the occasion, the Senior General said that the budget for the 2023-24 financial year will contribute to the implementation of the five-point roadmap and 12 objectives of the Union government.

Departments and enterprises need to earmark the approximate budget for 2023-24 FY, strive for earning incomes exceeding the target income so as to balance the budget deficit, prioritize the expenditure for quickly contributing to the economic development of the State and enhancement of socioeconomic life of the people and systematically very other expenditures.

A plan was prioritized to pay back loans and interests of the State to foreign countries as a responsible country.

Only when union ministries and region and state governments can fully earn incomes meeting the targets in the financial year will they have the chance to fully spend the targeted expenditures. The Senior General urged financial commission members to discuss the Union budget and the Union budget bill for 2023-24 FY so as to submit them to the State Administration Council in time.

Minister Vice-Senior General Soe Win made a speech, saying that the finance provided by the Union was yearly allotted to regions and states in a correct ratio in line with the mid-year financial framework and six socioeconomic indexes.

Commission Secretary Deputy Prime Minister and Union Minister for Planning and Finance U Win Shein reported on the Union budget for 2023-24 FY and the Union Budget Bill. The Auditor-General of the Union also clarified findings in auditing the budget in 2022-23 FY, reviews and requirements to follow the financial rules and regulations.

In conclusion, the Senior General noted that the 2023-24 FY Union budget and the Union Budget Bill have been ap-

proved. It will be submitted to the SAC via the Union government for enacting the Union Budget Law for 2023-24 FY.

The Senior General stressed the need for heads of departments to supervise the spending of the allotted fund and levy the taxes as incomes of the State under the law. Relevant ministries are to strive for increasing the incomes of State-owned enterprises.

It is necessary to constantly supervise the implementation of projects in conformity with the budget and to systematically accept auditing over incomes and expenses.

The government encourages the modernization of agriculture and livestock farms, the development of rural regions

and the improvement of MSME businesses. While allocating the budget comprising agriculture and livestock businesses, the government set up the State economic promotion fund, Covid-19 special loan fund and MSME development fund so as to fulfil the requirements of capital for these businesses.

The Senior General called for the development of domestic products, becoming the exporter country from the importer, ensuring local oil sufficiency, creating job opportunities for the people and increasing per-capita income.

In the past, the Senior General recounted that the trade deficit depended on lesser manufacturing at home and reliance on imported goods. Currently,

the government encourages manufacturing at home and tries to resume the operation of halted State-owned industries. Manufacturing quality consumer goods in larger quantities can help reduce spending on foreign exchange.

The government has increased the expenditure for generating electricity which plays a key role in the development undertakings of the State. On the other hand, the Senior General noted that relevant regions and states are to conduct feasibilities for generating electricity. Relevant ministries and organizations need to increase generating electricity and supervise minimizing loss and waste of electricity. —MNA/TTA

Weekly market update of dry groceries at Bayintnaung Wholesale Centre

BETWEEN 15 and 21 March 2023, the prices of rice, cooking oil, chickpea and black gram went up. Meanwhile, the sugar, Shan garlic, pigeon pea and mung bean saw slight price declines. The wholesale price of sugar was K3,050-3,080 per viss last month and now it was only K3,000-3,030 per viss on 21 March.

Garlic

On 21 March, the Shan Aungban garlic wholesale prices were K2,900-3,200-3,500-3,700 per viss depending on the varieties and qualities, whereas Kyukok garlic fetched K1,400 per viss.

Potato

On 21 March, the wholesale prices of potatoes in the Yangon market moved in the range between K1,300 and K1,850 per viss depending on producing areas.

Chilli pepper

On 21 March, the wholesale prices of chilli peppers were K10,000-11,000 per viss for Panye and Myarni long chilli pepper, K11,000-12,000 per viss for Moehtaungdimon, K13,000 per viss for Sinphyukyun and K13,000-14,000 per viss for Myitwa chilli pepper.

Rice

The rice prices were up about K2,000 per bag. The prices stood at K51,000-52,000 per bag for summer rice grown under the intercropping system and it was K54,000 per bag on 21 March. It was K61,000-K62,000 per bag for new short-mature summer rice (90 days) and K63,000-64,000 per bag for new Pawkywe rice. It was K70,000 for Pawsan rice from Bogale, K73,000 from Pyapon, K75,000 from Myaungmya and K85,000-87,000 from Shwebo.

Palm oil

The wholesale reference price of palm oil in Yangon for a week from 20 and 26 March is set at K4,570 and it shows a decline of K65 per viss to the previous week. On 21 March, the wholesale price was K6,900-7,000 per viss at Lanmadaw Nyaungpinlay Market while K7,100 per viss in the Myingyan market.

Bean

On 18 March, the black gram RC was priced at K2,049,000 per tonne and K2.4 million per tonne of pigeon pea. On 21 March, the black gram RC stood at K2,054,000 per tonne, SQ/RC at K2,334,000 per tonne and the pigeon pea at K2,397,000 per tonne. The mung bean (Khayan Shwewah Htatesa) prices dropped to K3,830 per viss and the chickpea reached K4,600/4,800 per viss. — TWA/KTZH

Two insober sailors drown while swimming

ON 20 March in Thanlyin Township, two sailors recently returned from abroad were drowned by swimming in a drunken state.

At 4:15 pm on that day, two men went swimming in the No 2 natural lake of Satkan, Bago Ward in Thanlyin Township and got drowned and the Shweyaung Twallatt Social Organization rushed to the scene to rescue them.

It is known that the deceased were sailors, and they were identified as Ko Pyae Sone, aged 32, from Dala Township and Ko Thurein, aged 40, from Insein Township. They were visiting their friend, Ko Ko Myat, who lives at the staff quarters in Thanlyin Township.

According to a resident, they drowned while swimming in the lake as they had been drinking, but it is not confirmed yet.

The body of, Ko Pyae Sone, one of the two drowning victims, was initially discovered at 5 pm on 20 March and was taken to the Public Hospital in Thanlyin Township. It is reported that the search for the remaining body of Ko Thurein is still ongoing. — TWA/CT

YGEA requests members not to buy competitively following spot gold rate rally

YANGON Region Gold Entrepreneurs Association asked the members not to buy the gold competitively because of the surge in spot gold rates.

After the US bank went bankrupt, the gold price soared. Despite the gold gain in the global market, Myanmar's forex market sees no movement at all. Consequently, YGEA requested its members not to buy them competitively, tracking the upward trend in the gold spot price, as per YGEA's statement released on 20 March.

Additionally, it made a further request to control the market to stop volatile prices.

Afterwards, the YGEA called for the members to make gold transactions with only immediate payment and avoid verbal transactions over calls without having any physical stocks.

The YGEA is not bound to have any responsibilities for market manipulation in the unofficial markets. As a result of this, its members are asked to strictly ad-

here to the rules and regulations of the association while making gold transactions.

At present, the authorities concerned are attempting to deal with market abuse and inspecting and prosecuting market manipulation is being undertaken.

On 20 March, YGEA hiked the reference rate to over K2,358,600 per tical (0.578 ounce or 0.016 kilogramme) with the spot gold prices rising to US\$2,002 per ounce.

The gold rate moved slightly down to \$1,970 per ounce on 21 March, so the YGEA's reference rate decreased to K2,320,900 per tical.

Pure gold price is soaring at approximately K2,945,000 per tical in the unofficial domestic market, showing a price difference of K620,000 per tical compared with the YGEA's reference rate.

YGEA calculated the price depending on the Central Bank of Myanmar's reference exchange rate of K2,100, with some addition, while the US dollar is exchanged

at K2,880 in the unofficial forex market.

The dollar exchange rate weighs on the market price and reference price of gold.

The soaring dollar exchange rate at over K4,500 drove the pure gold price up to a record-high

of K3.7 million per tical in late August 2022.

For the gold price to decline, the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation has been selling gold ingots under the competitive bidding system in Yangon, Mandalay and

Nay Pyi Taw.

With an aim at reducing gold prices, the YGEA and Mandalay Region Gold Entrepreneurs Association sold gold bullion supplied by the executive members and the members as well. — NN/EM

Onion prices in Yangon market remain high unlike other regions

ALTHOUGH approximately 200,000 visses of onions are daily supplied to Yangon markets, the price remained unchanged, unlike regions outside Yangon.

The prices moved in the range between K1,050 and K2,100 per viss depending on the producing areas (Seikphyu, Myittha), sizes and qualities on 21 March, with 180,000 visses of onions from various regions entering the Yangon market.

However, the bulk supply (180,000 visses) of onions to the Pakokku market scaled down the prices to around K1,000 per viss there, the market data of the Pakokku commodity depot showed.

On 19 March, about 108,080 visses of onions flowed into the Pakokku market. The maximum price was only K9,00-1,100 per viss.

This month, newly harvested monsoon onions and onion

seedlings entered the market. The price of onions in the first quarter of this year is higher than that of the year-ago period. This being so, the growers earn a handsome profit this year.

On 21 March 2022, the prices were K350-1,025 per viss in the Yangon market.

This year, the price doubled compared to that recorded in the corresponding period last year.

The onion growers are not happy with the prevailing prices this month in the second highest onion-producing country India as onions are priced at K230 per viss.

Myanmar's onion cultivation has an output of one million tonnes (600 million visses) per year. For the 2023-2024 financial year, Myanmar aims to achieve an export target of 150,000 tonnes of onions to its foreign trade partners, as per the official notification. India produces about 24 million tonnes of onions yearly. —TWA/EM

In Myanmar, the National Water Resources Committee is serving the duties and functions to draw up and implement an integrated water management system, and develop a national integrated water management strategy, a national water resources policy, a water framework directive and a water law. The national committee has been relentlessly striving for ensuring water sufficiency not only in the rural areas but also in the urban areas with the aim of supplying hygienic water to the people and irrigating the farmlands.

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IHAPPENED to read the following paragraph on one of the internet pages mentioned by The Global New Light of Myanmar newspaper. It is as follows...

“Originally established on 12th January 1964 as “The Working People’s Daily”, the Global New Light of Myanmar is Myanmar’s oldest English daily. The Working People’s Daily changed its name to The New Light of Myanmar on 17 April 1993. The paper started printing 12 black and white pages in broadsheet size. On 1st January 2003, the size of the paper was reduced from broadsheet to tabloid still in black and white pages but the number of the pages increased to 16. The process of black and white printing was terminated on 17 October 2012 in Nay Pyi Taw. The new version of the New Light of Myanmar came out on 18 October 2012 with full-colour printing. Yangon saw the colour of the New Light of Myanmar on 5 December 2012 just in tabloid size. For about half a century, the paper was under the News and Periodicals Enterprise of the Ministry of Information. Now, the paper is changed and its works are in full swing. It tries to expand its field to the Web. We invite your comments and opinions.”

The Unforgettable Gratitude 44 Years Ago

It was just a brief history of the Paper but I happened to take notice of the words which I made bolded on the first line. With the association of those words, I remembered the year 1979 and the gratitude of The Working People’s Daily upon me. You might have been somewhat surprised by it, I think. At that moment, I was an English subject teacher in an affiliated high school in Kyaunggon Township, Ayeyawady Region.

When I graduated, the major I took in the university was Zoology. However, I was assigned to teach at the school was English. I thought there was no connection between the knowledge of Zoology and the teaching skills in English. I denied it at first but as there were only three teachers in the ninth and tenth grades and the other two teachers could not touch English at all, I was forced to accept the responsibility of teaching English.

There were 14 students in the tenth grade and about 35 students in the ninth grade. I was the class teacher in the ninth grade but I had to teach English subjects in both classes. By the way, I will have to tell you about my qualification in English for the matriculation examination. I passed the matric exam in 1973 with a mark of 41 in English. Moreover, I had to take English as a minor subject for only

two years: the first and second years in the university at that moment. Here, you can guess my level of English after my graduation.

Let me continue revealing my status teaching English in the affiliated school. There were a lot of challenges for me in teaching English in those two classes during the first week.

Teaching English to Grade 9 and Grade 10 level students was a challenging task for an English teacher like me, as students at this level were often in the process of

developing their language skills and might have different learning styles and preferences. Some of the challenges that I faced when teaching Grade 9 and Grade 10 level students included:

1. Motivating Students: One of the biggest challenges for me was to motivate my students. To effectively teach English to Grade 9 and Grade 10 level students, teachers had to find ways to engage and inspire their students, whether through interesting and relevant content, interactive activities, or

creative assignments.

2. Addressing Varied Skill Levels: Students at Grade 9 and Grade 10 levels might have different skill levels when it came to English language proficiency. Some students might struggle with basic reading and writing, while others may be more advanced and require more challenging coursework. An English teacher like me had to be able to identify and address these varying skill levels and provide individualized instruction as needed.

3. Developing Critical Thinking Skills: At Grade 9 and Grade 10 levels, students were still developing their critical thinking skills. An English teacher like me had to be able to encourage students to think critically about literature and other materials, analyze and interpret texts, and draw their own conclusions.

4. Incorporating Technology: As it was not a digital age, it was not important for me to incorporate technology into their lessons. This could also be a challenge for some teachers including me who might not be familiar with the latest digital tools and technologies, I think.

5. Addressing Cultural Differences: Students in Grades 9 and 10 might come from diverse cultural backgrounds, which could make it challenging to address cultural differences and ensure that all students felt included and represented in the classroom.

6. Assessing Progress: Another challenge for me at Grade 9 and Grade 10 levels is assessing student progress. Teachers had to be able to accurately assess students’ writing and reading abilities, as well as provide constructive feedback and suggestions for

improvement. Teaching English to Grade 9 and Grade 10-level students could be a challenge with so many things but it was a rewarding experience. With the right approach, I could help their students develop a love for literature, improve their language skills, and prepare for future academic and professional success, I thought. However, among those challenges, I realized that one would surely be the most important difficulty for me. It was nothing but a lack of skill in grammatical functions of my own. I also realized that it was the first and foremost challenge that I would have to settle. Therefore, I seek the best ways to solve it.

Not long after, a thought dawned upon me. I remembered the English newspaper viz. “The Working People’s Daily” which my dad read daily while he was in our house. At that moment, I often surfed the pages and I happened to take notice of the Sunday Supplement every Sunday which carried grammar explanations for the middle and high school level students by C.T.O. (later I became aware that those initials referred to Sayagyi (U Chit Thein Oo). These explanations were very

useful for my self-study because they are in Myanmar and English. I thought the Sunday Supplement would also give a lot of assistance to my students in Grades 9 and 10. Therefore, I made an order of weekly Sunday Supplements to the newspaper agent for my students and myself. It made me much exhausted because I had to study the explanations of grammatical functions in the Sunday Supplements in advance at night with a faintly lighted oil lamp. Then, I had to arrange for my students to attend my special classes daily before school began. I put up my plan to my headmaster and he agreed with it easily. I started my special classes in July and carried on it to the end of that academic year without fail.

The school was situated in a rural area and the students obeyed me. I was sure the special classes made my students many benefits. More surely, my English got improved through regular studies in grammatical functions explained by C.T.O. In the following year, I could teach English to the students of Grade 9 and Grade 10 very well.

I have been familiar with The Global New Light of Myanmar newspaper since it was named “The Working People’s Daily”. I will never forget the gratitude of Sayagyi C.T.O. and the Sunday Supplement of the paper as they conveyed to me, who was once very poor in English, on the way which has made me much improvement and fluency in the English language.

Study: Pregnancy-related mortality rising due to COVID among reproductive-age women



FOLLOWING the emergence of the highly contagious Delta and Omicron COVID-19 variants, pregnancy-related mortality rates in the United States increased faster in 2021 than the previous year, according to a new study (UMD).

The study by Boston Uni-

CDC recommends COVID-19 vaccines for everyone ages six months and older, including people who are pregnant, breastfeeding, trying to get pregnant now, or might become pregnant in the future and getting boosters, if eligible.

versity School of Public Health (BUSPH) and the University of Maryland School of Public Health.

Published in the journal *Obstetrics & Gynecology*, the findings on pregnancy-related mortality are consistent with rising COVID-19-related death rates among reproductive-age women, and the results follow the team’s previously published research that also revealed alarming spikes in maternal mortality rates during the first year of the pandemic in 2020.

The staggering data captures the worsening burden of pregnancy-related mortality in the United States during the pandemic, which includes deaths during pregnancy

through one year postpartum.

Mortality rates increased most among racial and ethnic minorities, and the study adds COVID context to a new report from the National Centre for Health Statistics, which shows that maternal mortality rates in the United States increased by 38 per cent in 2021 compared to 2020 rates.

The new study found that pregnancy-related deaths ratios rose to 45.5 deaths per 100,000 live births overall in 2021—and as high as 56.9 deaths per 100,000 live births during the third quarter of 2021—compared to 36.7 deaths per 100,000 live births in 2020, and 30.3 deaths per 100,000 live births

pre-COVID.

The Delta variant began rising through the country in June 2021, before the even-more-contagious Omicron variant took hold in late fall. Notably, the study found that the largest relative increases in pregnancy-related deaths between 2020 and 2021 were among Hispanic people (at 34 per cent) and especially American Indian/Alaska Native (AIAN) people (at 104 per cent).

Pregnancy-related mortality ratios in 2021 were highest for AIAN (161 deaths per 100,000 live births) and Black (98 deaths per 100,000 live births) pregnant people. The proportion of pregnan-

cy-related deaths with a COVID diagnosis was highest among Hispanic (at 43 per cent) and AIAN (at 36 per cent) people.

“The pandemic exacerbated what were already poor maternal outcomes in the US by deepening disparities by race/ethnicity and place of residence resulting in maternal death rates not seen since 1964,” says study senior author Dr Eugene Declercq, professor of community health sciences at BUSPH. “In particular, the extraordinary increases among American Indian and Alaska Natives in 2021 deserves greater attention.”

Scientists make 'disturbing' find on remote island: plastic rocks

THERE are few places on Earth as isolated as Trindade island, a volcanic outcrop a three- to four-day boat trip off the coast of Brazil.

So geologist Fernanda Avelar Santos was startled to find an unsettling sign of human impact on the otherwise untouched landscape: rocks formed from the glut of plastic pollution floating in the ocean.

Santos first found the plastic rocks in 2019, when she travelled to the island to research her doctoral thesis on a completely different topic — landslides, erosion and other “geological risks”.

She was working near a protected nature reserve known as Turtle Beach, the world's largest breeding ground for the endangered green turtle, when she came across a large outcrop of the peculiar-looking blue-green rocks.

Intrigued, she took some back to her lab after her two-month expedition.

Analyzing them, she and her team identified the specimens as a new kind of geological formation, merging the materials and processes the Earth has used to

form rocks for billions of years with a new ingredient: plastic trash.

“We concluded that human beings are now acting as a geological agent, influencing processes that were previously completely natural, like rock formation,” she told AFP.

“It fits in with the idea of the Anthropocene, which scientists are talking about a lot these days: the geological era of human beings influencing the planet's natural processes. This type of rock-like plastic will be preserved in the geological record and mark the Anthropocene.”

Island paradise

The finding left her “disturbed” and “upset,” said Santos, a professor at the Federal University of Parana, in southern Brazil.

She describes Trindade as “like paradise”: a beautiful tropical island whose remoteness has made it a refuge for all sorts of species — sea birds, fish found only there, nearly extinct crabs, the green turtle.

The only human presence on the South Atlantic island is a small Brazilian military base and a scientific research centre.

“It's marvellous,” she said.

“So it was all the more horrifying to find something like this — and on one of the most ecologically important beaches.”

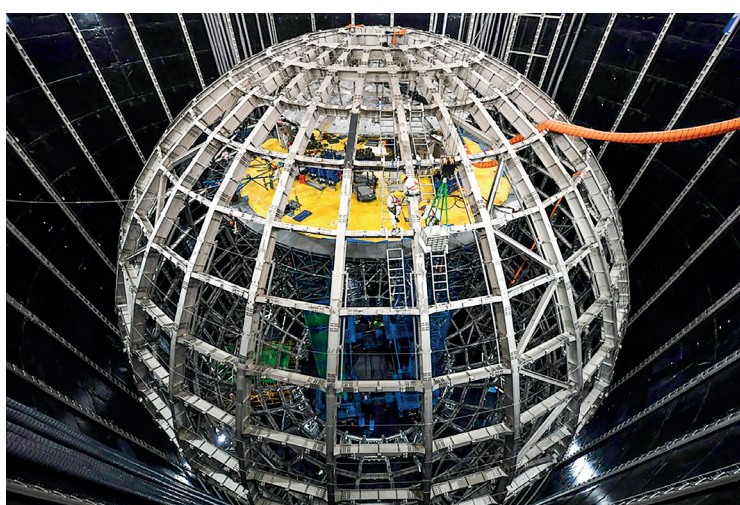
She returned to the island late last year to collect more specimens and dig deeper into the phenomenon. — AFP

Scientists mull building underwater telescope to detect cosmic rays

CHINESE scientists are working on a blueprint for a gigantic telescope to observe neutrinos, one of the most abundant particles in the universe, from deep within the seas or lakes.

The facility, designed to have a roughly 30-cubic-kilometre volume, will be submerged to a depth of more than one kilometre, said Chen Mingjun, lead researcher of the project at the Institute of High Energy Physics under the Chinese Academy of Sciences.

The aim of building such an underwater telescope is to detect high-energy neutrinos. The particles are thought to be produced outside the solar system. According to Chen, detecting the neutrinos that pass through the telescope will contribute to solving a century-old scientific puzzle of the origin of cosmic rays. In the early 1900s, scientists discovered

that Earth is constantly bombarded by energetic particles from outer space called cosmic rays. In 2021, China's Large High-Altitude Air Shower Observatory (LHAASO) detected 12 sources of gamma rays that are thought to come

from the same sources as cosmic rays. Chen said one popular hypothesis is that the high-energy neutrinos and gamma rays are potentially produced simultaneously when high-energy cosmic rays originate. — Xinhua

How AI 'revolution' is shaking up journalism

JOURNALISTS had fun last year asking the shiny new AI chatbot ChatGPT to write their columns, most concluding that the bot was not good enough to take their jobs. Yet.

But many commentators believe journalism is on the cusp of a revolution where mastery of algorithms and AI tools that generate content will be a key battleground.

The technology news site CNET perhaps heralded the way forward when it quietly deployed an AI programme last year to write some of its listicles.

It was later forced to issue several corrections after another news site noticed that the bot had made mistakes, some of them serious.

But CNET's parent company later announced job cuts that

included editorial staff — though executives denied AI was behind the layoffs.

The German publishing behemoth Axel Springer, owner of Politico and German tabloid Bild among other titles, has been less coy.

“Artificial intelligence has the potential to make independent journalism better than it ever was — or simply replace it,” the group's boss Mathias Doepfner told staff last month.

Hailing bots like ChatGPT as a “revolution” for the industry, he announced a restructuring that would see “significant reductions” in production and proofreading. Both companies are pushing AI as a tool to support journalists, and can point to recent developments in the industry. — AFP

Australian workers feel exhausted, unprepared for AI-driven future: report

A new report has found that Australian workers are exhausted, unwell, at risk of quitting and largely unprepared for future workplace challenges driven by automation and artificial intelligence (AI).

The report, released on Monday by the University of Melbourne, involved 1,400 Australian workers fielded in June 2022, who were asked about their experiences at work since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic. According to the report, 38 per cent of the workers said they

suffered a chronic illness, higher than the 32 per cent found in the most recent Australian census in 2021, while discrimination remains pervasive at work, particularly against women, chronic illnesses patients, caregivers and indigenous groups.

At the height of the pandemic between 2020 and 2021, one in five Australians felt “depressed and anxious” all the time, which captured “a significant increase” in the proportion of workers reporting mental stress. — Xinhua

New study shows COVID infection weakens immune-cell response to vaccination

THE magnitude and quality of a key immune cell's response to vaccination with two doses of the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine were considerably lower in people with prior SARS-CoV-2 infection compared to people without prior infection, according to a new study published on Monday.

The study, co-funded by the US National Institutes of Health, also found the level of this key immune cell that targets the SARS-CoV-2 spike protein was substantially lower in unvaccinated people with COVID-19 than in vaccinated people who had never been infected.

The study, published in the

journal *Immunity*, suggests that the virus damages important immune-cell response.

The new findings highlight the need to develop vaccination strategies to specifically boost antiviral CD8+ T cell responses in people previously infected with SARS-CoV-2, according to the researchers. — Xinhua

Malawi says cholera crisis risks worsening after Cyclone Freddy

MALAWI faces increased risk of a surge in cholera cases following the devastation caused by Cyclone Freddy that has destroyed water systems and toilets, the health ministry warned Monday.

The country was already battling its deadliest cholera outbreak on record when the storm landed last week, causing mudslides and flooding, killing 476 and displacing nearly half a million.

The cholera outbreak, which began last year, infected more than 30,600 people and claimed more than 1,700 deaths.

"With the floods, people's toilets have been washed away and most people have no access to safe drinking water," health services director Storn Kabuluza told AFP, saying the country faced an "immediate danger" of surging cholera cases.

After a record-breaking rampage, the storm caused 579 deaths in three southern African countries including Mozambique and Madagascar.

Malawi was hit the hardest as Freddy triggered floods and mudslides that swept away homes, roads and bridges — also causing massive damage to the country's water infrastructure. — AFP

Viet Nam aims to bolster local medicine production

AS Viet Nam's pharmaceutical market is expected to swell to 16.1 billion US dollars in the next three years, the government has aimed for domestic medicine production of up to 80 per cent by 2030, Vietnam News reported on Tuesday.

In a strategy aimed at cutting reliance on imports and boosting local pharmaceutical industry, the Vietnamese government will prioritize the production of more advanced technology products, urging domestic companies to focus on research and development.

The Ministry of Health estimated the market at 6.9 billion dollars in 2021, while BMI Research forecast the market to reach 16.1 billion dollars in 2026 with a compound annual growth rate of 11 per cent.

However, domestic companies still have to face tough competition from foreign investors, said Nguyen Dieu Ha, general secretary and office chief of the Viet Nam Pharmaceutical Companies Association.

Ha pointed out that locally-manufactured drugs accounted for 46 per cent of resident spending on medicine during 2015-2021, significantly up from 17 per cent in the 2001-2011 period, but well below the world average.

Poor research and development investments due to a lack of skilled personnel, technical knowledge and adequate infrastructure have caused the local market to depend on drug importing, said Le Van Truyen, former deputy health minister. — Xinhua

Omicron subvariant XBB.1.5 accounts for over 90% new COVID-19 cases in US

THE highly transmissible Omicron subvariant XBB.1.5 now accounts for over 90 per cent of new COVID-19 cases reported in the United States, according to the latest estimates by the US Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

XBB.1.5 was estimated to account for 90.2 per cent of all COVID-19 cases in the country in the latest week ending 18 March.

It was up from 88.8 per cent a week before and 86.3 per cent two weeks prior, CDC data showed. The prevalence

of XBB.1.5 has kept increasing since late last year.

The second most prevalent strain BQ.1.1 only accounted for 3.5 per cent in the latest week.

The CDC first started tracking XBB.1.5 in November last year, when it accounted for less than one per cent of cases nationwide. Since then, the strain is spreading quickly in the United States.

While XBB.1.5 is spreading easier, scientists said it does not seem to cause more severe disease. — Xinhua

Across China: TCM cooperation helps strengthen Sino-Pakistani relationship

THE cooperation between China and Pakistan in the field of traditional Chinese medicine (TCM) has helped strengthen bilateral relations in recent years.

At the beginning of 2023, health authorities of Sindh Province in Pakistan initiated a program, which proposed that China assist the country in training doctors proficient in the field of TCM.

According to the project organizer, the Sino-Pakistan Cooperation Centre for Traditional Chinese Medicine (SPCCTCM) in central China's Hunan Prov-

ince, the Pakistani side will select the first batch of ten young doctors and send them to the centre to carry out a two-year TCM theory learning and clinical practice. After the training, they will return to their hometown to carry out TCM diagnosis and treatment.

SPCCTCM was jointly established by the Hunan University of Medicine and the International Centre for Chemical and Biological Sciences of the University of Karachi in Pakistan in late 2020, aiming to build an international cooperation centre integrating healthcare,

TCM education and training, scientific research, and industrial cooperation.

"This is the preliminary exploration of SPCCTCM in the training of Pakistani TCM talents," said He Qinghu, co-director of SPCCTCM and president of the Hunan University of Medicine.

He said the training project, with support from both the Chinese and Pakistani governments, will unite TCM colleges and hospitals to train talents with a certain level of TCM theory and clinical practice skills for Pakistan. — Xinhua

Credit Suisse tells Hong Kong clients to 'embrace new reality'

DAYS after it was rescued in an emergency buyout, Credit Suisse gathered hundreds of clients in an upscale Hong Kong hotel on Tuesday for a glitzy investment conference where they were told to "embrace the new reality".

Executives at the event from the troubled Swiss lender were eager to offer reassurances, even as details of the takeover by Swiss giant UBS remained unclear and global markets were buffeted by fears for the banking industry.

UBS agreed on Sunday to a government-brokered deal to take over Credit Suisse for \$3 billion Swiss francs (\$3.25 billion), a move authorities say was vital to prevent further economic turmoil.

Chairman Axel Lehmann

and CEO Ulrich Korner cancelled their scheduled appearances at the event in the Chinese finance hub.

That left Head of Global Equities Neil Hosie to welcome corporate clients at Hong Kong's Conrad Hotel, overlooking the city's famed Victoria Harbour.

A Credit Suisse executive at the event told AFP Hosie did not speak about company prospects during his closed-door welcome speech and took no questions.

A brief statement was released to the media in which Hosie said: "The (conference) represents Credit Suisse at its best."

"For 26 years, it has been our privilege to present powerful perspectives on the themes that matter most." — AFP

Sri Lanka bailout conditional on tackling corruption: IMF

SRI Lanka must not allow entrenched corruption to undermine a bailout for its bankrupt economy, the IMF said Tuesday after signing off on a \$3 billion loan for the crisis-hit nation.

The International Monetary Fund approved its long-delayed rescue programme on Monday after China, the South Asian island's biggest bilateral lender, offered debt relief assurances.

But it said the rescue was conditional on tackling the deep-rooted culture of graft and government mismanagement blamed for tipping Sri Lanka

into an unprecedented economic crisis last year.

Peter Breuer, the IMF mission chief in Sri Lanka, said the government had agreed to enact tougher anti-corruption laws within months during the bailout negotiations.

"We emphasize the importance of anti-corruption and governance reforms as a central pillar of the programme," he told reporters.

President Ranil Wickremesinghe said the latest rescue would allow him to ease a range of import bans imposed since March 2020 to shore up foreign

exchange reserves.

"The world has accepted that Sri Lanka is no longer a bankrupt country," he said in a national address. "Normal transactions can resume."

Sri Lanka's tea-and-tourism economy is no stranger to crisis, and Monday's bailout is the 17th loan facility negotiated with the IMF since 1965.

Its last programme, agreed in 2016, was scuttled by Colombo after a change of government three years later.

"Every few years, we seem to go back to the Fund because we don't seem to be able to put our house in order," Murtaza Jafferjee of the Colombo-based Advocata Institute think-tank told AFP.

"But one is hopeful that because the crash was so steep this time, that there will be an awakening and there will be permanent changes."

Sri Lanka once again went to the Washington-based lender of last resort shortly before defaulting on its \$46 billion foreign debt last April.

A critical shortage of foreign exchange had left the island nation unable to finance even the most essential imports, causing severe food and fuel shortages. — AFP

Malaysia's export outlook remains uncertain amid sluggish global demand, say economists

ECONOMISTS see Malaysia's export outlook will remain uncertain due to sluggish global demand.

Affin Hwang Investment Bank said in a note that in the near term, it believes global macroeconomic uncertainties will continue to weigh on trade activities, which pose downside risks to Malaysia's overseas demand, especially with negative events regarding the banking system in the United States.

Due to elevated inflation rate in major economies, it be-

lieves that the global financial condition will continue to tighten but at a slower pace in the short term.

Coupled with the prolonged Russia-Ukraine conflict, it said the risks from external factors tilted to the downside.

Taking into consideration the weaker-than-expected export growth, it is maintaining its projection that Malaysia's real gross domestic product (GDP) growth will likely slow to 3.7 per cent in 2023 from 8.7 per cent in 2022. — Xinhua

EU raids energy drink maker Red Bull in antitrust probe

EU antitrust investigators have raided energy drink maker Red Bull over suspicions it abused its dominance in the wildly popular market, officials said Tuesday.

Red Bull said EU Commission officials "visited our premises" on Monday.

"We will, of course, work with them on all matters that concern them," the company said in a statement, declining

to comment further.

The EU's executive arm said earlier its teams carried out unannounced inspections Monday "at the premises of a company active in the energy drinks sector in various member states". It did not name the company nor say in which countries investigators — joined by competition authorities of each member state affected — had conducted raids. — AFP

Stocks rally as panic eases over banks

STOCK markets jumped Tuesday, gradually recovering from last week's plunge, as shares in banks rallied on easing fears of a fresh financial crisis.

Panic across markets eased after authorities in leading economies pledged support for depositors and troubled lenders following the recent collapse of Silicon Valley Bank and Signature Bank in the United States. Still, the takeover of troubled Credit Suisse by Swiss rival bank UBS for \$3.25 billion fanned concerns about what could be next on the chopping block, and analysts warned it was too early to say that the crisis was over.

"Despite the apparent relief, uncertainty is still in charge," noted Neil Wilson, chief market analyst at Finalto. — AFP

Amazon to lay off 9,000 more employees

AMAZON announced on Monday the company's plan to cut 9,000 more jobs in a new round of layoffs. Amazon CEO Andy Jassy said in a blog post Monday morning that the cuts will mostly impact those in the company's cloud services, advertising and Twitch units.

The news came just a couple of months after Amazon announced a cut of 18,000 jobs. "Some may ask why we didn't announce these role reductions with the ones we announced a couple of months ago," Jassy wrote. "The short answer is that not all of the teams were done with their analyses in the late fall." — Xinhua

Firm creates app for overseas buyers to access Japan's fish catch

A Japanese company has tapped into growing demand in Asia for fresh seafood, allowing overseas customers to use a smartphone app to order freshly caught fish from ports across Japan and ensuring hassle-free delivery.

Uuuu, Inc, acting as an intermediary between sellers and buyers, recently delivered red seabream to Thailand in an initial foray into the global market, the Hiroshima-based company said in a press release.

Overseas importers are able to utilize the app

"Uuuu importer" to look through listed pictures of seafood from numerous ports in Japan as well as obtain information on the fishing method, landing date and delivery date, simplifying a procedure that often requires phone calls.

The fish will be delivered after Uuuu arranges the dates and steps for transport with a third-party exporter.

Importers are able to buy fresh fish from around 100 ports across Japan after obtaining daily information regarding the type

of seafood available and its quantity. Uuuu is also exploring new production areas.

Customers are additionally able to request certain types of fish not listed on the app, the company said.

Japan's seafood exports last year rose to a record 387.3 billion yen (\$2.91 billion), up 28.5 per cent from a year earlier, supported by the yen's weakness as well as an increase in people flocking to restaurants amid an easing of COVID-19 restrictions. — Kyodo

US to allow Japan-provided materials in EV tax credit scheme

WASHINGTON and Tokyo are preparing to make Japanese vehicles eligible for tax credits in a US initiative for electrified vehicles that use critical minerals from the United States or countries that it has free trade agreements with, sources familiar with the talks said Tuesday.

Under the changes, the United States would relax the rules to allow EVs to contain key miner-

als provided by Japanese companies, such as parts makers, despite Tokyo not holding a free trade agreement with Washington.

Promoting EV uptake is a key US government policy. As part of its Inflation Reduction Act passed in August 2022, it offers tax credits of up to \$7,500 on purchases of electrified vehicles that come off North American assembly lines and in which a certain

amount of battery-critical minerals are sourced or processed domestically or from free trade agreement countries.

Japanese companies play a major role in processing minerals sought for electric vehicle production, and both governments have decided that easing requirements will be mutually beneficial, the sources said. — Kyodo

Xi says China will continue to play constructive role in promoting political settlement of Ukraine crisis

CHINA stands ready to continue to play a constructive role in promoting the political settlement of the Ukraine crisis, Chinese President Xi Jinping said here on Monday.

Xi made the remarks while having an in-depth exchange of views on the Ukrainian issue with his Russian counterpart, Vladimir Putin.

Xi stressed that, on the Ukraine issue, voices for peace and rationality are building. Most countries support easing tensions, stand for peace talks, and are against adding fuel

to the fire. A review of history shows that conflicts in the end have to be settled through dialogue and negotiation.

China released a document on its position on the Ukraine crisis, advocating the political settlement of the crisis and rejecting the Cold War mentality and unilateral sanctions, said Xi.

China believes that the more difficulties there are, the greater the need to keep space for peace. The more acute the problem is, the more important it is not to give up efforts for dialogue. China will continue to

play a constructive role in promoting the political settlement of the Ukraine issue, said Xi.

For his part, Putin said that Russia appreciates China for consistently upholding an impartial, objective, and balanced position and standing for fairness and justice on major international issues. Russia has carefully studied China's position paper on the political settlement of the Ukraine issue and is open to talks for peace. Russia welcomes China to play a constructive role in this regard. — Xinhua

London police force racist, misogynist and homophobic: report

THE London police forces, Britain's largest, is institutionally racist, misogynist and homophobic and could still be employing rapists and murderers, a scathing independent review said Tuesday.

The report, written by government official Louise Casey, was commissioned after the kidnap, rape and murder two years ago of a London woman, Sarah Everard, by serving Metropolitan Police officer Wayne Couzens.

But since then, another officer, David Carrick, was also jailed for life for dozens of rapes and sexual assaults stretching back two decades, and several other Met scandals have emerged.

Casey found the shocking

crimes had been perpetrated in a pervasive culture of "deep-seated homophobia" and predatory behaviour, in which female officers and staff "routinely face sexism and misogyny".

Officers from minorities suffer widespread bullying, while violence against women and girls in the majority white and male force has not been treated seriously enough, she concluded.

Asked if there could be more officers like Couzens and Carrick -- who at one point served in the same armed unit protecting MPs and foreign diplomats -- Casey said: "I cannot sufficiently assure you that that is not the case." —AFP

Macron defiant as anger smoulders over French pension reform

FRENCH President Emmanuel Macron told allies Tuesday he plans to keep the government in place and not dissolve parliament, defying opponents and widespread public anger over his pensions reform.

Police arrested another 234 people in Paris on Monday night during clashes between protesters and security forces, with several groups burning trash bins, bikes and other objects.

The latest unrest came after Macron's centrist government narrowly survived two no-confidence motions in parliament on Monday, meaning the legislation to raise the retirement age from 62 to 64 looks almost certain to enter into force.

But anger over the government's decision to invoke a notorious constitutional power to ram the reform through

parliament without a vote last week has dismayed many ruling party MPs and caused fury on the streets.

"The reform is adopted but

it is not seen as legitimate in the eyes of French people," political scientist Jerome Jaffre told France Inter radio on Tuesday. — AFP



Greek train drivers seek safety assurances ahead of relaunch

GREEK train drivers on Tuesday called for safety assurances as officials prepared to restart the

country's rail network after last month's collision that killed 57 people.

In a statement to services operator Hellenic Train, the drivers' union PEPE called for better monitoring of rail crossings, improved tunnel lighting, bridge inspection data and the removal of debris and overgrown vegeta-

tion from tracks.

"We believe that unless these problems are solved, services cannot resume in these areas," the union said. The government has said rail services that were suspended after the 28 February tragedy will be gradually restored from Wednesday until mid-April. — AFP

Thailand to hold general election on 14 May

THAILAND plans to hold a general election on 14 May, the country's Election Commission announced on Tuesday, a day after the House of Representatives was dissolved.

Political parties must submit their prime ministerial nominees between 4 and 7 April, Election Commission Chairman Ittiporn Boonpracong told a news conference.

In a statement, the Election Commission also announced the application schedule for 500

House of Representatives candidates.

Under the two-ballot system, more than 52 million eligible voters will elect 500 members of the House of Representatives.

Thailand's King Maha Vajiralongkorn Phra Vajiraklaohaoyuhua on Monday endorsed a decree to dissolve the House of Representatives which was formed after the 2019 general election, with a four-year term scheduled to end on 23 March. — Xinhua

India strongly protests vandalization of its consulate in San Francisco

INDIA on Monday strongly protested with the US against the vandalization of the property of its consulate in San Francisco, said the Ministry of External Affairs.

Several people, seen as separatists demanding Khalistan as a separate state from India, had attacked India's consulate general, media reports said.

"The US government was reminded of its basic obligation to protect and secure diplomatic representation. It was asked to take appropriate measures to prevent recurrence of such incidents," said an official statement released by the ministry. — Xinhua

Indonesian students rally against Japan's plan to dispose nuclear wastewater

INDONESIAN students rallied on Tuesday against Japan's controversial plan to dump its nuclear wastewater into the sea.

They delivered statements while clad in anti-radioactive costumes and holding up posters depicting perilous nuclear waste in front of the Japanese Embassy in Jakarta.

"In the name of humanity, we reject the plan to dump 1.25 million tonnes of nuclear wastewater into the Pacific Ocean," said Kevin Sidabutar, coordinator of the organization named Environmental Lovers Student Participation. — Xinhua

Strong quake has people fleeing homes in Afghanistan, Pakistan

A strong earthquake lasting for at least 30 seconds was felt across much of Afghanistan, Pakistan and parts of India Tuesday night, with the United States Geological Survey putting the magnitude at 6.5.

"It was a terrifying tremor. I had never felt such a tremor before in my life," Khatera, 50, a resident of Kabul, told AFP after rushing out of her fifth-storey apartment in the capital.

The USGS said the quake was centred near Jurm in north-eastern Afghanistan and had a depth of 187 kilometres (116 miles).

The region is frequently hit by earthquakes — especially in the Hindu Kush mountain range, which lies near the junction of the Eurasian and Indian tectonic plates.

Two people, including a child, were killed in Laghman province,

Shafullah Rahimi, spokesman for Afghanistan's Ministry of Natural Disaster Management, told AFP.

Government spokesman Zabihullah Mujahid said health centres across the country had been put on high alert.

Noor Mohammad Hanifi, a shopkeeper in Kabul, set up tents in a street for his family to spend

the night in.

"Nobody dares to go inside their homes," Hanifi told AFP as his family, cloaked in blankets, took shelter. Hanafi said he felt dizzy when the quake hit as he had just returned from a long trip.

"But when I heard the doors and windows shaking I realized it was an earthquake." — AFP

Hiroshima modern art museum reopens after renovations

A modern art museum designed by world-famous architect Kisho Kurokawa in the atomic-bombed city of Hiroshima has reopened after around two years of major renovations.

The Hiroshima City Museum of Contemporary Art opened in 1989 as Japan's first publicly run modern art museum and has exhibited many artworks

on the themes of atomic bombs and peace, owing to its location in a city that endured an atomic bombing in the final days of World War II in 1945.

Following the large-scale renovations and repairs to the structure's interior and exterior, the building, which reopened Saturday, is now equipped with barrier-free bathrooms and

nursing rooms to make the museum more accessible.

Among other changes to the facility, which closed in December 2020 due to aging, its aluminum roof has been replaced, and its exhibits are now illuminated with LED lights.

A cafe has also been added to the entrance, along with a multi-purpose space. — Kyodo

Mbappe to become new France captain

KYLIAN Mbappe will take over as captain of France after Hugo Lloris stepped down following the World Cup final defeat to Argentina, a source close to the team has told AFP.

Paris Saint-Germain forward Mbappe, 24, accepted the role after discussions with coach Didier Deschamps.

His first game as captain will be Friday's Euro 2024 qualifier against the Netherlands at the Stade de France, Les Bleus' first match since their World Cup final disappointment in Doha on 18 December.

Tottenham goalkeeper Lloris, 36, brought an end to his international career in January, in the weeks after Lionel Messi's Argentina side beat the French in a penalty shootout following a thrilling match that ended 3-3 in extra-time.

Lloris had been skipper for more than a decade.

Atletico Madrid attacker Antoine Griezmann was named vice-captain after Manchester United centre-back Raphael Varane also hung up his boots following the defeat to Argentina in December.

Mbappe, who scored a hat-trick in the World Cup final defeat, had been heavily linked with the captain's role for weeks. — AFP
