Applications for establishment of political parties under verification

THOSE who want to establish a political party are applying to the Union Election Commission by stating the name of the party they want to establish. To date, there have been 13 parties that have applied for the right to establish parties. Among those that applied, the following two parties were found to comply with the political parties' registration law and regulations, and the Union Election Commission approved the application for the establishment of the two political parties yesterday.

- 1. Union Development Party
- 2. Democratic Forces Labour Party

These two parties, which have the right to establish a party, must apply to the Commission for registration as a political party under Rule 7 of the Registration of Political Parties within 30 days from the date of approval. To date, three political parties have been allowed to be established and the other parties that have applied for party establishment are also being scrutinized. —MNA/KZL

68 new cases of COVID-19 reported on 26 April, total figure registers **634,539**

MYANMAR'S COVID-19-positive cases rose to **634,539** after **68** new cases were reported on 26 April 2023 according to the Ministry of Health.

Therefore, a total of **10,324,846** laboratory samples were examined and the confirmed COV-ID-19 cases reached **634,539**. The total number of patients who have recovered from COVID-19 in the country reached **614,722** including **six** new recoveries. The death toll from COVID-19 in the country remained unchanged at **19,490** on 26-4-2023 with no new death reported from the pandemic.

The country has vaccinated **30,999,400** people aged 18 and above for COVID-19 vaccines and **6,849,055** people aged under 18 till 25 April 2023.

Status of COVID-19 vaccination (as of 25 April 2023)

People aged 18 and above who received vaccines	30,999,400
People under 18 years old who received vaccines	6,849,055

According to the research, it is found that people who have been vaccinated do not suffer severely from the disease, need not be hospitalized and are unlikely to die. If they have received booster shots, the death rates can be reduced more.

As such, people need to follow the new normal way of living with COVID. Hence, all people above five have to fully receive COVID-19 vaccination inoculated by the Ministry of Health free of charge. Six months after the vaccination, they have to take booster jabs at relevant health centres and ward/village administration offices without fail.

Moreover, they have to wear masks while in closed chambers and public places. They need to often wash their hands with soap and water or the hand gel containing alcohol (at least 60 per cent) for 20 seconds. People need to follow the social distancing rule and avoid crowds as much as possible.

While not wearing masks, if they cough and sneeze, they need to cover their mouth and noses with elbows in line with the personal hygienic ways. COVID-19 information can be browsed on the internet page moh.gov.mm of the Ministry of Health. — GNLM

Request to the public

1. THE Ministry of Health is continuously analyzing infection of Covid-19 not only in global countries and neighbouring countries but in Myanmar and is carrying

- out necessary prevention and control of the pandemic.
- 2. According to the press release of the World Health Organization on 20 April 2023, infection rate of Covid-19 is rising in Myanmar's neighbouring countries such as India, Thailand, Bangladesh and other regional countries as from January 2023, with infection of variant XBB. 1.16 (Arcturus).
- 3. It was found that infection of Covid-19 has been slightly increasing in Myanmar from the early April 2023.
- 4. According to the surveys and monitoring till today, variant XBB. 1.16 of Covid-19 is spreading 1.27 folds quicker than previously found variants but the former does not cause higher violent infection, situation of medical treatment at hospital and dead rate. But, suffering from the variant can be affected by current drugs. The drugs being used in Myanmar are effective over the prevention of the disease. Booster dose of vaccines can reduce infection of the disease, intensification and dead rate.
- 5. As such, all the people especially the aged and those suffering from chronicle diseases are –

(a) to specially take care of receiving Covid-19 vaccine and booster dose,

(b) to follow primary ways for prevention of Covid-19 pandemic with social distancing and wearing masks to go to the public places and closed sites,(c) to take necessary treatment by contacting nearby health centres as quickly as possible if suspect symptoms of the pandemic are found,(d) to follow the health protocols released by the Ministry of Health not to spread the virus to others and quarantine themselves at home.

STATE Administration Council Member Deputy Prime Minister Union Minister for Defence General Mya Tun Oo, in his capacity as Chairman of the Central Committee for Intellectual Property Rights, attended the Grand Opening Ceremony of Trademark Registration and World Intellectual Property Day 2023 held in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday.

At the event, the Deputy Prime Minister Union Minister for Defence said Myanmar is a member of the World Trade Organization-WTO and World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO) and it needs to establish an international intellectual property rights system for the country. The government enacted four major IP Laws in 2019 and the Trademark Law came into effect on 1 April 2023. The trademark registration processes will begin on 26 April 2023 and so that day is a historic and significant day for the country.

The WIPO member countries celebrate World IP Day re-

spectively and the theme of this year is "Women and IP: Accelerating Innovation and Creativity".

As the country carries out the trademark registration and protects the trademarks as per the law, it will benefit investment and trading, fully protect the owner of brands and eligible people, and curb the imitation of products and fake products in the market to ensure the competitive market system and create a safe community for the public.

Then, the vice-chair of the committee and Union minister for Commerce made a remark and the video message of the director-general of WIPO was played.

Then, the Deputy Prime Minister pressed the electric button to launch the trademark registration system.

After the ceremony, he also observed the demonstration of trademark registration processes, documentary photos for the development of the IP system, works of winners of poems, posters, cartoons and articles competitions marking 2023 World IP Day and regional development programmes of the Intellectual Property Department, four major IP Laws and counterfeit-real goods.

The event also included a talk show under the theme of 2023 World IP Day by one female director-general of the IP Department and three female directors-general of the departments concerned while the deputy director-general of the IP Department and business people discussed the matters related to the trademark rights.

The business people can make trademark registration starting 26 April at the IP Department Nay Pyi Taw (head), Lower Myanmar (Yangon branch) and Upper Myanmar (Mandalay branch) in person or via the representatives online. — MNA/ KTZH

Central committee meeting for correctness and quality of statistical information 1/2023 held

THE central committee meeting for correctness and quality of statistical information 1/2023 was held at the meeting hall of the Ministry of Planning and Finance, Office No 32 in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday afternoon.

Deputy Prime Minister Union Minister for Planning and Finance U Win Shein, in the capacity of the Chairman of the Central Committee for Correctness and Quality of Statistical Information, attended and gave a speech.

Union ministers who are members of the Central Committee, the Union auditor-general, the Governor of the Central Bank of Myanmar, the deputy ministers, Nay Pyi Taw Council member, the directors-general, sectoral task force chairpersons and officials attended the meeting in person while regional and state economic ministers, professors from the Department of Statistics, Yangon University of Economics, and the Myanmar Statistics Association vice-president via the videoconference system.

In the meeting, Chairman of the Central Committee Deputy Prime Minister U Win Shein said that the correctness of statistical information is very important for every country, and it is especially necessary for the comprehensive development of a country and the strengthening of the national statistical system.

By having quality statistical information, policymakers, planners, private entrepreneurs, and socio-economic research practitioners will be able to establish development policies and projects and create a good business environment, and limited resources will be used efficiently and effectively, he said.

The statistics sector is essential at every stage of the country's development, so it is necessary to be able to work with evolving technologies and methods.

As the statistical system practised in our country is a statistical system that reduces central control, it is especially necessary to have coordination and cooperation between the departments and organizations related to statistics, not only the Central Statistical Organization but also those involved in the national statistical system to compile and publish statistical information.

To adapt the consumer price of goods and services to the modern system, the base year is changed from 2012 to 2017, so it is necessary to cooperate for the completion according to the timeline, he added.

Secretary of the Central Committee and Director General of the Central Statistics Organization U Tun Zaw clarified the reorganization of the Central Committee for Correctness and Quality of Statistical Information, completion of Central Committee Meeting 1/2021 resolutions, actions of working groups according to statistics sector, calculation of consumer price index and inflation rate from the base year 2012 to 2017, promotion of statistical knowledge, conducting meetings, business performance training and surveys and publishing Survey Calendar and statistical bulletins.

Then, the Union ministers who are members of the central committee, Nay Pyi Taw Council member, regional and state economic affairs ministers and officials discussed the correctness and quality of statistical information according to relevant sectors.

The chairman of the central committee coordinated what is necessary. — MNA/ KZL

THE Russia-Myanmar Strategies for Cooperation Conference dedicated to the 75th Anniversary of Russia and Myanmar Diplomatic Relations was held at the Moscow State Institute of International Relations (University) of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Russian Federation (MGI-MO) on 24 April.

In his opening remark, the Union Minister said the diplomatic relations between the two countries bring firm and equal interest, value and mutual respect. Despite the geographical challenges, the people can communicate and make investments in trade, economy, tourism and industry.

On 25 April, the Union Minister attended Myanmar-Saint Petersburg Tourism Forum via video conferencing and made a speech. He said the tourism sector is one of the promising sectors for promoting mutual benefits. Direct airway and payment systems are the most important matters. Efforts are being made for attracting more tourists from Russia to Myanmar by forming the Leading Committee and Work Committee which comprise the Government and private sector under the "Welcome Russia" programme. The ministry and Russia-Myanmar Friendship Association jointly arranged a tour for Russian singers, video producers and bloggers to Myanmar from 11 to 19 April.

Illegal timbers, industrial materials, consumer goods, foodstuffs, auto parts and vehicles seized

THE combined team led by the No 74 Traffic Police Team (Dawei) under the management of the Taninthayi Region Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force captured an unregistered Honda Insight car (approximate value of K5 million) near No 6 BEHS in Dawei township. The action was taken under the Export and Import Law.

On 24 April, the Customs on-duty teams seized four injectors assy worth K1,374,000 without Import Licence from luggage at the Yangon International Airport (Import Desk). Moreover, two kinds of goods (including 2,500 kilogrammes of iron sheets) worth K5.37 million that exceeded the Import Declaration (ID) were seized from a Mitsubishi Fuso tractor head and a trailer (estimated value of K55 million) heading to Yangon from Myawady at the Mayanchaung permanent checkpoint. A total of 80 Mac

book batteries worth K4 million without official documents were also confiscated from a Yutong bus (approximate value of K70 million) heading to Mandalay from Muse at the Yepu permanent checkpoint. The effective action was taken under Customs procedures.

On the same day, the Muse District Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force inspected smuggled goods that were stacked on the side of the road over the Sinphyu checkpoint and confiscated 37 kinds of goods (including 85 lady clothes) worth K29,276,320. The action was taken under Customs procedures. In addition, the Hlegu District Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force inspected the smuggled goods that were stacked on the side of the road near the Minlwingon checkpoint on the former Yangon-Mandalay road, according to information, and nabbed six kinds of foodstuffs

(including 276 bottles of red cherry fruit) worth K3.67 million. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

Similarly, an on-duty combined team sized 107 used tires of Dunlop, Yokohama, Tokyo, Bridgestone worth K10.7 million without official documents from a Nissan Diesel truck (estimated value of K35 million) heading to Pyawbwe from Myawady at the Thanlwin Bridge combined checkpoint. The action was taken under Customs procedures. Afterwards, a total of 16.982 tonnes of illegal teak and 30.044 tonnes of illegal hardwood worth K18,560,800 were captured in Toungoo and Nyaunglebin districts. The action was taken under the Forest Law. Therefore, 11 arrests (estimated value of K237,951,120) were made on 23 and 24 April, according to the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee. — MNA/MKKS

Drugs seized in Waingmaw, Mahaaungmyay and Lashio townships

A combined team consisting of members of the Anti-Drug Police Force examined a motorbike driven by Myint Aung (aka) Aikekae at 13 kilogrammes combined checkpoint in Waingmaw township at 2 pm on 25 April and seized 9,500 stimulant tablets.

At 7 pm on 24 April, the Police Force examined a suspect by the name of Aung Kyaw Zaw (aka) Sit Min Chant who claimed the Parcel at the bus stop in Mahaaungmyay township and captured 2.018 kilogrammes of Happy Water.

At 6:40 pm on the same day, the Police Force searched the apartment of Li Haung in the No 1 ward of Lashio township and captured 0.88 kilogramme of Ketamine, 0.11 kilogramme of Ice and 2,970 Erimine-5 with MMK 400,000.

Hence, people residing across the nation need to take care of climatic conditions and they must be in touch with weather forecasts at any time. If so, they can make necessary preparations for their families depending on the weather news. Moreover, local authorities need to declare weather forecasts related to their regions to the residents without delay.

Meteorologists can easily predict weather forecasts based on necessary data collected in their relevant arena. Some climatic characteristics including strong winds, lightning strikes and falling hail stones are initial characteristics of the tornado. Overview of a Journey of Myanmar Culture Preservation and Promotion: The Emergence of Political Changes and the Cultural Policy

YANMAR has a long cultural history and remained a high historical continuity and integrity of the nation-state with a vigorous tradition. Human beings were found on this Myanmar soil millions of years ago. Moreover, its high cultural standard with its long withstanding high cultural aspects stand out from the prehistoric periods of the Stone Age, Bronze Age and Iron Age cultures to Proto Historic Period when the Pyu culture flourished, followed by successive periods like the Bagan Period till to the present.

The abundance of cultural properties like ancient cities, old palace sites, ancient cultural edifices and historical structures, terracotta rings, stone inscriptions, palm-leave manuscripts, and parabeiks which can be found in all parts of Myanmar are the proven pieces of evidence of Myanmar's rich cultural heritage. In fact, the Myanmar cultural components: literature, performing arts, ten kinds of arts and crafts, architecture, and devotion to Theravada Buddhism have been perpetuated and flourished for more than thousands of years. Such kind of cultural characteristics has been preserved by generations starting from the early Pyu to the nationalities in the way of a single stem bearing hundreds of fruits.

The emergence of the Pyu from the Prehistoric period, 2,500 years ago, was listed as one of the high civilization peoples in Southeast Asia and according to the archaeological evidence, the Pyu civilization flourished in Central Myanmar and Upper Myanmar. From the emergence of those $\ensuremath{\mathsf{Pyu}}$ city-states like Tagaung, Beikthano, Halin, Sri Ksetra, and Mai Mao, they paved the synergy for the successive historical eras in Myanmar namely: Bagan Period, Pinya Period, Inwa Period, Taungoo Period, Nyaungyan Period and Konbaung Period.

Most scholars viewed culture together with civilization but Myanmar does not. The majority of Myanmar's population believes in Buddhism, which is predominantly Theravada tradition. According

to Buddhist teaching, moral ethics heavily reflect the living styles and culture of Myanmar people from generation to generation. Culture can make a society unique; it can be mentioned as an invisible link that ties a community together and also affects the development of one's attitude towards life. Culture has been designated as the lifeblood of a vibrant society, a scale for civilization, expressed in many ways; telling our stories, celebrating the festivals, remembering the past, entertaining ourselves, and imagining the future.

The arts and culture were then deployed primarily by the state as an ideological tool to reinforce the discourses of nationalism and racial harmony among the main (8)ethnic groups: Kachin, Kayah, Kayin, Chin, Myanmar, Mon, Rakhine and Shan. To this purpose, it was commonplace for schools and public institutions to use the arts as an opportunity for inter-ethnic interaction and symbolic displays of nationality through the showcasing of traditional ethnic dances alongside each other. The distribution of state funds for arts groups was dispensed as the State budget granted by the Ministry of Culture, without any long-term view to nurture the relationship between arts practitioners and the state and to showcase more at their respective States and Divisions.

The successive governments in Myanmar adopted attitudes towards cultural and educational policies by stressing the cultural identity and the use of the national language. According to these attitudes, the purpose of cultural policy is to mobilize the people to take a more active part in all cultural fields with the perspective of safeguarding tradition and customs. Thus, cultural activities like other social and economic activities have been affected by the "spirit of the masses." The assignment of "Thabin Wun" (means Minister in charge of Performing Arts, especially for the Royal Courts) can be judged that Myanmar people are always aware of culture and tradition and its sustainability. The "cultural dimension" has been

determined as one of the most important factors in the overall development plan. In this way, the successive Governments face the following tasks (common for those who are in the cultural arena):

> to preserve and revitalize cultural heritage by integrating vernacular cultures - folk tales and folk songs, handicrafts and art, museums and archaeological sites - into everyday life;

to draw upon innovation and eradicate inappropriate traditions

- to train competent staff in the field of culture and education;
- to encourage the area of cultural services (e.g., participation in the art); to stimulate creativity.

In general, those principles and methods of cultural policy, the evaluation of cultural needs, administrative structures and management, planning and financing, the organization of resources, legislation, budgeting, public and private institutions, cultural content in education, cultural autonomy and decentralization, the training of personnel, institutional infra-

structures for meeting specific cultural needs, the safeguarding of the cultural heritage, institutions for the dissemination of the arts, international cultural co-operation and other related subjects have been considered to be put in the policy. For this reason, Myanmar established the Ministry of Union Culture (later changed to the Ministry of Culture) in 1954.

The current discourse about culture (expressions, industries, media, collaborations), insists that a culture policy is needed to be in line with the existing government national policy. Since Myanmar is a nation with various nationalities and requires a Culture and National Heritage Policy that recognizes this diversity. It has huge cultural resources and talents, which should be incorporated into the national agenda. Since culture provides the ideological and philosophical foundation for national development, which is central to all development programmes, the Culture Policy of Myanmar has to recognize culture as a repository of 'knowledge' which is manifested in all aspects of life as a guide to the evolution of morals, attitudes, beliefs and values in society.

Overview of Political Changes and the National Policy **Before Independence**

From 1824 to 1920: It is the Period of anti-colonialism and struggles against the British. From 1920 – 1930: It is the Period of demanding Home Rule under British administration and self-administered rule that had been highly demanded by the Myanmar-educated youths and active politicians.

From 1930-1942: 1930 is one of the remarkable milestones in Myanmar politics as it was the era of Do Bamar Asi Ayon which was largely joined by active and patriotic university students and partic-

which fought against the Japanese and highlighted the nationalistic policy driven by "Independence is the first: Democracy is the second and Socialism is the third" respectively.

After Independence

From 1948 to 1958, after getting Independence on 4 January 1948, multi-coloured insurgencies spread to the entire country and the split of AFPL factions and its consequences made the chaos and to restore peace and stability. The collapse of national solidarity had made the defections on ideological and racial grounds. This can be termed the "Union Government Era". In the resolutions proposed and adopted in the Preparatory Convention of the AFPFL, it was clearly stated that there shall be a guarantee of racial and cultural rights.

From 1958 to 1960, due to those political events and instability, the solution is the establishment of a Caretaker Government devoted to the supervision of general elections. The national policy then focuses on peace and tranquillity as the first, democracy as the second and socialist economy as the third. This Caretaker Government was led by General Ne Win.

After the assumption of State power by the Tatmadaw in 1962, formed the Revolutionary Council. Under the Revolutionary Council Government, peace and tranquillity, and the welfare of the public were supervised and taken responsibility by the Security and Administrative Committees concerned at different levels. The formation of the state's ideology under General Ne Win's regime was "the Burmese Way to Socialism". There are two main documents ideologically announced which were the benchmarks: the Burmese Way to Socialism and the Burmese Socialist Programme Party's official ideology. It has been mentioned as "at any rate, it is domestic trouble that seemed to be the main threat and the conviction of the Revolution-

ary Council is apparently that both the Parliament system and those who worked it in this country have failed". 1974 Constitution was announced under the Union of the Socialist Republic of Myanmar and the People Council Government Era which lasted till 1988 From 1962 to 1988, the reformation of the State under the name of "Burmese Way to Socialism" is the state policy till the upheaval took place in 1988.

To jeopardize the state peace and stability of the Union and Independence, the State Law and Order Restoration Council was formed and took the responsibility of executive and administrative responsibilities. To take the challenges: non-disintegration of the union; non-disintegration of the national races and consolidation of national sovereignty have been laid down as national legacy and national causes. Indeed it is the main backbone of the sovereignty and sustaining the peace and tranquillity of the state. Those Three National Causes announced have been the major political commitments of SLORC and SPDC and the national cultural policy is also reflected by those ideologies as the Objectives followed by the national motto.

Four Social Objectives vs Political Objectives

Since 1988 is the new chapter of the political landscape in Myanmar, it called for the emergence of a peaceful, modern and developed nation in which administrators are turned out to take responsibility for the security of the state prevalence of law and order and socioeconomic development. People-oriented development has been demanded and the political thoughts and ideology of "change" has been appreciated and negotiations play a very important role. Along with the collapse of the General Ne Win regime in 1988, anti-government demonstrations led to the resignation of U Ne Win from the Chairman of BSPP.

Peanut price moves slightly up on foreign, domestic demand

THE price of peanuts went up on the strong foreign and domestic demand, according to the Mandalay Commodity Centre.

On 1 April 2023, the prices stood at K6,300-7,000 per viss. The prices rose to K6,300 -7,500 per viss on 25 April, showing a small increase of K200-500 per viss. The peanut supply to the Mandalay market is seen regularly. At present, both Chinese traders and oil millers are purchasing them.

In the last week of last November, the prices plunged to K4,700-5,750 per viss amid the falling demand by oil millers and lack of foreign demand.

Myanmar has been shipping oil seeds (sesame seeds and peanuts) to foreign countries. In April 2022, the world's top palm oil exporter Indonesia, which is one of the main oil suppliers to Myanmar, declared an export ban on cooking oil export to reduce the domestic shortage. Consequently, Myanmar's Trade Department under the Ministry of Commerce temporarily suspended exports of oil crops (peanut and sesame) from 9 May to have oil self-sufficiency.

Exports of Myanmar's edible oil crops resumed as the world's top palm oil exporters returned to normalcy, according to a notification dated 5 July 2022 released by the Trade Department. The country has shipped more than 32,000 kilogrammes peanut and sesame worth US\$40.16 million to foreign markets through the border trade channels so far in the financial year 2022-2023 (April-March). — NN/EM



India-Myanmar Multisector B2B Matchmaking enhances cooperation

Japan aims to draw 100 tril yen foreign investment, digital nomads

JAPAN will aim to attract 100 trillion yen (\$750 billion) worth of foreign direct investment by 2030, and more foreign talent and remote workers known as "digital nomads", as part of its drive to boost economic growth and global competitiveness, the government said Wednesday.

The numerical target, included in a new action plan, is roughly double the 46.6 trillion yen of foreign investment at the end of 2022. The government previously set an 80 trillion yen target for 2030. The plan comes as the COVID-19 pandemic and Russia's war in Ukraine have underscored the need to streamline and strengthen supply chains for critical components, and ensure national security. Japan wants to boost its standing as a production and research hub, capitalizing on a weak yen that would serve as an incentive for foreign investment. Under the plan, Japan will use funds and other resources to attract investment in strategic areas such as semiconductors, digitalization, green technology and health care. It will seek to develop necessary human resources via tripartite cooperation among the government, firms and academia.

The project to build a Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Co chip-making plant in Kumamoto Prefecture, southwestern Japan, is a recent example of the public and private sectors joining hands, with the government deciding to extend financial assistance. Prime Minister Fumio Kishida, who wants to achieve a virtuous cycle of growth and redistribution, sees digital and green transformation as key areas of investment. —Kyodo

EU to revamp budget rules to spur growth

THE EU will unveil an overhaul of its fiscal rules on Wednesday, a long-awaited reform that has bitterly divided member states over how to encourage investment while strengthening scrutiny of government spending.

The European Commission,

to reform the rules, known as the Stability and Growth Pact, that limit how much the bloc's 27 member states can borrow.

But the proposals have split the bloc between the more frugal northern countries, including Germany, and the southern Germany, a staunch defender of fiscal discipline, fears Brussels will overly relax the EU's budgetary straitjacket and undermine fairness within the bloc. Italy and others argue the rules constrain their ability to invest.

The pact currently stipulates that states' public deficits should not go above three per cent of gross domestic product, and debt should stay below 60 per cent of GDP.

The European Union suspended the rules in 2020 to allow member states to pour money into their economies during the coronavirus pandemic.

That was extended last year to let states raise spending to protect households and businesses from sky-high energy prices from Russia's war in Ukraine, and to

'Infernal': Fuel crisis driving Cubans round the bend

THE streets of Havana are quieter than usual — many of the rattling old cars the city is known for stand idle amid Cuba's worst fuel shortage in years.

"This is infernal!" exclaimed 59-year-old Lazaro Diaz, a private delivery driver, after queuing an entire day for gasoline. Without luck.

Queues snake for kilometers (miles) around fuel stations in the capital of the communist island suffering its worst economic crisis in three decades worsened by biting US sanctions and a tourism slump caused by the Covid-19 pandemic.

The dearth of fuel, which started end-March, is felt in

all sectors and economic classes.

Everything from concerts to baseball games have been postponed or cancelled including, authorities said Tuesday, the upcoming May Day rally in Havana's Plaza de la Revolution.

The event usually draws thousands — largely travelling by bus — to the square from all over the city. Instead, smaller events are being organized among Havana's various neighborhoods.

A university in the capital and four in other provinces have had to cancel in-person lectures this week with students and professors unable to get to class.—AFP

Digital economy contributes 9.4% to Philippines GDP in 2022

THE Philippines' digital economy in 2022 amounted to 2.08 trillion pesos (37.44 billion US dollars), contributing 9.4 per cent to the country's gross domestic product (GDP), the Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA) said on Tuesday. "This amount represents an increase of 11 per cent from the media or content.

1.87 trillion pesos (roughly 33.67 billion dollars) in 2021," the PSA said.

The digital economy comprises digital transactions covering digital-enabling infrastructure, e-commerce, and digital Of the total digital transactions in 2022, the agency said digital-enabling infrastructure made up the largest share of 77.2 per cent, amounting to 1.60 trillion pesos (roughly 28.81 billion dollars). —Xinhua

The mythical store on Manhattan's Fifth Avenue — immortalized by the 1961 film "Breakfast at Tiffany's" — has been extensively remodelled, which the luxury jeweller hopes will help fuel the brand's momentum under its new owner, the French luxury giant LVMH. The revamped landmark store will be officially inaugurated on Wednesday following its first complete renovation since it opened in 1940. It will reopen to the public on Friday. The goal, according to Tiffany chief executive officer Anthony Ledru, is to offer "a unique client experience," with a blend of "art, craftsmanship, heritage and lifestyle".

Tiffany is looking to remain true to its origins while remaining culturally "relevant," he told AFP in an email. The company wants to make Tiffany's "approachable to all generations", he said.

Beyonce and Nike

Tiffany was founded in New York in 1837, and has become best known for its diamonds, silver jewellery and engagement rings sold in the brand's iconic robin's egg blue boxes. The company, which employs 14,000 people and operates some 300 retail outlets around the world, was acquired by LVMH in early 2021 for just under \$16 billion. At LVMH's annual earnings presentation in January, **CEO** Bernard Arnault noted that Tiffany was on track to "exceed \$1 billion in current operating income" this year.—AFP

Honda aims to accelerate EV expansion, catch up with Chinese rivals

HONDA Motor Co. on Wednesday announced a series of measures to accelerate the expansion of its electric vehicle business, including a tie-up with Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Co. to strengthen its chip procurement, as it seeks to catch up with leading EV manufacturers.

Honda President Toshihiro Mibe told a press conference that his company is still trailing behind Chinese automakers in EV technology. The company, however, should be able to catch up with them as it sets up new EV production lines, strengthens the development of software for onboard systems and secures stable supplies of chips and battery materials in line with its plan to only sell zero-emission vehicles globally by 2040, he said.

"They have gotten further ahead than we expected," Mibe said of Honda's

Chinese rivals, referring to the vehicles displayed by companies at the Shanghai International Automobile Industry Exhibition held through Thursday.

Touching on the superior quality of self-driving and artificial intelligence technologies in many Chinese-made cars, Mibe said, "I admit we are a little behind. But we are going to turn the game around."

"If we could win in the Chinese market, we could win in the global market, too," he added.— Kyodo

UK blocks Microsoft's \$69bln Activision takeover

BRITAIN on Wednesday blocked Microsoft's \$69-billion takeover of US video game giant Activision Blizzard, arguing it would harm competition in cloud gaming and leaving the blockbuster deal in peril. The UK's Competition and Markets Authority prevented the deal "over concerns... (it) would alter the future of the fast-growing cloud gaming market, leading to reduced innovation and less choice for UK gamers over the years to come", the CMA said in a final decision on its long-running probe. bMicrosoft replied it would appeal the verdict over its vast

takeover, which has yet to win regulatory approvals in Europe or the United States. The Xbox-owner launched in 2022 its bid to create the world's third biggest gaming company by revenue with the takeover of Activision, owner of hit games "Candy Crush" and "Call Of Duty", triggering antitrust concerns worldwide.

The CMA added Wednesday that Microsoft's proposed remedies over cloud gaming contained "significant shortcomings" and would require further regulatory oversight instead of allowing the market to decide.—AFP

US, S Korean leaders to agree on stronger extended deterrence

US President Joe Biden is expected to agree with his South Korean counterpart Yoon Suk Yeol on Wednesday to bolster extended deterrence measures in response to North Korea's growing nuclear threat.

Biden and Yoon, who arrived in Washington on Monday for a state visit, will release a joint statement designed to reinforce US security commitments, including shielding allies under its nuclear umbrella, according to senior US administration officials. Another reason for agreeing on what they called the "Washington declaration" is to improve the clarity of what it means by extended deterrence and at the same time reaffirm South Korea's commitment to its non-nuclear status.

The officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the United States will take steps to make its extended deterrence policy "more visible" by regularly

deploying strategic assets, such as a nuclear ballistic submarine visit to South Korea, something that has not taken place since the early 1980s.

While continuing to enhance their military training, the leaders are set to also agree on the creation of a peacetime nuclear consultative group.

The officials said the new mechanism will give Seoul ad-

ditional insight into how Washington thinks about planning for major contingencies and will give it a voice in those deliberations.

They suggested that the declaration, which was discussed "for months", is aimed at providing better deterrence against North Korea and will help to quell persistent calls in South Korea for nuclear armament.—AFP

Homegrown fried chicken chain replaces KFC in Russia

THE Russian incarnation of KFC opened its first restaurant in Moscow on Tuesday after the American fast food chain exited the country over the Kremlin's offensive in Ukraine.

The new owners of the US giant's former restaurants across Russia are resuscitating Rostic's, a brand that appeared in the tumultuous early years of post-Soviet Russia.

At the launch in central Moscow, Colonel Harland Sanders, the founder of the KFC chain, was absent from the logo, but the new colour scheme still featured its signature red and white. Several dozen customers were seen at Rostic's flagship venue on Tuesday afternoon.

"For us Rostic's is like a childhood memory," Yevgeny Lazarev, a 31-year-old software tester, told AFP outside the restaurant. "They were here before and they came back."

Originally launched in 1993, Rostic's helped KFC expand in Russia and was eventually bought out by it. For many Russians, Rostic's brings back memories of the turbulent early years of transitioning to a free-market economy following the collapse of the Soviet Union in 1991.—AFP



Norway irked over Swedish rocket crash on its turf

THE Norwegian foreign ministry expressed irritation Tuesday with Sweden for not immediately informing it of a research rocket that crashed in Norway, in a rare spat between the two neighbours.

The rocket, which was launched early Monday from the Esrange Space Centre in Kiruna, northern Sweden, plunged into a mountainside in the Malselv municipality in Norway's far north, about 10 kilometres (six miles) from the closest inhabited area. No one was injured and no material damage was reported. "The crash of a rocket like this is a very serious incident that can cause serious damage," the foreign ministry in Oslo said. "When such a border violation occurs, it is crucial that those responsible immediately inform the relevant Norwegian authorities through the proper channels," it said.

Russia hosts talks with Iran, Syria, Türkiye

RUSSIAN Defence Minister Sergei Shoigu on Tuesday hosted four-way talks aimed at normalizing ties between Ankara and Damascus, which were severed at the start of Syria's civil war in 2011.

"Practical steps were discussed in the field of strengthening security in the Syrian Arab Republic and normalising Syrian-Turkish relations," the Russian defence ministry.

Moscow stressed the importance of countering "the fight against all extremist groups in Syria".

Shoigu, who hosted counterparts from Syria, Türkiye and Iran, also held a number of bilateral talks.

The Kremlin has sought to mend ties between Damascus and

"The rocket took a slightly longer and more westerly trajectory than calculated and landed after a completed flight 15 kilometres (9.3 miles) into Norway," the Swedish Space Corporation said in a statement on Monday. "Work on retrieving the payload is underway," it added. Norway's foreign ministry also noted that retrieval work was not supposed to begin without Norwegian authorization, which had not been granted. Norway's Civil Aviation Authority said it had learned of the crash from the Swedish Space

The video, set to dramatic music, then depicts armed men in full combat gear walking across a battlefield in thick fog.

"You're a real man! Be one!" says the ad, encouraging Russians to sign a contract with the defence ministry.—AFP

US, Philippine troops fire rockets at ship in largest-ever drills

US and Philippine troops fired a salvo of rockets at a warship representing an enemy vessel in the disputed South China Sea on Wednesday, in the final exercise of the allies' largest-ever military drills.

It was the first time the countries had conducted a joint live-fire exercise in the hotly contested waters, which China claims almost entirely.

Philippine President Ferdi-

nand Marcos, who has sought stronger defence ties with the United States, sat in an observation tower with US and Philippine officials watching the event north of Manila.

"No Hollywood effects this morning, this is old fashioned training," said Lieutenant Colonel Nick Mannweiler, a US Marine Corps public affairs officer. The live-fire drill kicked off

with the US HIMARS precision

rocket system launching a series of rounds at a decommissioned Philippine Navy corvette anchored about 22 kilometres (14 miles) off the coast.

The objective was to sink the decades-old ship, which represented an enemy vessel approaching the Philippine shore.

That was followed by artillery units lined up along a grassy field firing rockets at floating drums 10 kilometres offshore.

The exercise was briefly interrupted when a small private aircraft entered the exercise area, Mannweiler told AFP.

'Ironclad alliance'

The drills aim to boost Manila's military capability while serving as a US show of support for its Asian ally as China's assertiveness in the region grows stronger.

Nearly 18,000 troops have taken part in the annual exercises dubbed Balikatan, or "shoulder to shoulder" in Filipino.— AFP

Japan's population projected to shrink 30% to 87 mln by 2070

JAPAN'S population is expected to fall to 87 million by 2070, shrinking 30 per cent from 2020, a government estimate showed Wednesday, highlighting the country's need to overhaul its social security systems and restructure its urban communities.

Foreign residents, including students and workers residing in Japan for more than three months, are set to comprise 10.8 per cent of the population at 9.39 million in 2070, expanding from 2.2 per cent in 2020.

The National Institute of Population and Security Research said those aged 65 or above in Japan are projected to hit 33.67 million in 2070 after peaking at 39.53 million in 2043. In 2070, they will comprise 38.7 per cent of the population, resulting in ballooning social security costs. The health ministry's research body provides 50-year demographic forecasts approximately every five years based on public data such as censuses. The government will use the latest data to calculate the country's future pension payouts.

The population, numbering 126.15 million as of 2020, is expected to fall under the 100 million threshold in 2056, it said. The projected fertility rate, or the expected number of children born per woman during her child-bearing years, was at 1.36 for 2070, slightly up from 1.33 in 2020 but remaining well below the threshold of 2.07 for maintaining the population.

The number of births, which slipped below 800,000 in 2022, is likely to decline further to under 700,000 in 2043 and below 500,000 in 2070, the institute said.—Kyodo

AUSTRALIA said Wednesday it will host a Quad group meeting with the leaders of India, Japan and the United States in Sydney on 24 May.

The Quad meeting will take place after the three-day Group of Seven industrialized nations summit from 19 May in Hiroshima, western Japan. Australian Prime Minister Anthony Albanese is expected to visit Hiroshima for the summit, while the White House has announced that US President Joe Biden will also attend.

Albanese told reporters that the Quad leaders will discuss global economic conditions, growing strategic competition in the Indo-Pacific, the ongoing impact of the Russian invasion of Ukraine and other issues.

Albanese and Biden will dis-

cuss with Japanese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida and Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi how to deepen cooperation on critical and emerging technologies, high-quality infrastructure, global health, climate change, maritime domain awareness and a range of other issues, White House spokeswoman Karine Jean-Pierre said in a statement.—Kyodo



Venezuela's Guaido

COLOMBIA'S President Gustavo Petro on Tuesday denied expelling leading Venezuelan opposition figure Juan Guaido, but accused him of entering the country illegally.

On Monday, Guaido claimed to have been kicked out of Colombia, hours after he arrived in Bogota ahead of a conference on his crisis-torn country hosted by Petro.

"Mr. Guaido was not expelled and it is better that this lie does not appear in politics," wrote Petro on Twitter.

Petro said Guaido had been allowed to travel to Miami, where he arrived on Tuesday, "for humanitarian reasons despite the illegal entry into the country."—AFP

Barca confident of ousting Chelsea to make third consecutive final

BARCELONA are confident of achieving their goal of reaching a third consecutive Champions League final when they host Chelsea on Thursday, boasting a 1-0 advantage from the semi-final first leg.

The Catalans, who lifted the trophy as part of a treble in 2021 with a 4-0 romp over the Blues, have reached three finals in the last four seasons.

With Olympique Lyon eliminated by Chelsea — the French side beat Barcelona in the other two finals — Jonatan Giraldez's team are favourites to lift the trophy again.

Caroline Graham Hansen struck early at Stamford Bridge last weekend to give her side the lead in the tie and although Chelsea clung on to give themselves a lifeline, Barcelona will relish their chances playing at Camp Nou.

Giraldez's side have scored 23 goals in just four games at home in the Champions League this season, conceding just once, when they crushed Roma 5-1 in the quarter-finals.

"I think we had control, we got the goal and could have scored a couple more, but, in the end, it was a really good game," Graham Hansen told reporters Tuesday.

"If you see our statistics in recent years, we have lost away from home (in Europe). We have still gone through, but the away games have been tough.

"Now we have a great chance to reach another final here at home in front of our fans."

The Norwegian forward says that triumphing in Europe is the club's main goal once again — they are poised to lift Liga F on Sunday, a competition in which they have 60 consecutive victories.

"Our big objective this season is to win the Champions League and if we get to the final we are one step closer to that," added the winger.

"I promise I will do everything in my power to achieve it." — AFP
