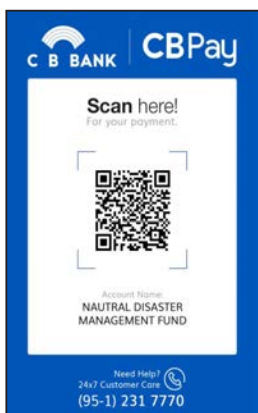
94 new cases of COVID-19 reported on 17 June, total figure registers 639,999

MYANMAR'S COVID-19-positive cases rose to 639,999 after 94 new cases were reported on 17 June 2023 according to the Ministry of Health. Therefore, a total of 10,775,318 laboratory samples were examined and the confirmed COVID-19 cases reached 639,999. The total number of patients who have recovered from COVID-19 in the country reached 618,903 including 26 new recoveries. The death toll from COVID-19 in the country registered 19,494 on 17-6-2023 with no new death reported from the pandemic. and 19 bronze medals, totalling 56 in XII ASEAN Para Games held in Cambodia in 2023 compared to 43 medals including 14 gold medals in the XI ASEAN Para Games held in Indonesia 2022.

According to the competition records, Myanmar athletes with disabilities could uplift the prestige of the State.

Likewise, a total of 80 athletes from eight countries took part in the 17th Southeast Asian Bodybuilding and Physique Sports Championships in Batam Island of Indonesia from 8 to 12 June 2023. Myanmar bagged one gold, three silver and three bronze medals, totalling seven, and those victorious athletes will be honoured.

Those victorious athletes securing a deserved position among other countries and winners in the 17th Southeast Asian Bodybuilding and Physique Sports Championships would be honoured deservedly.

The Senior General urged entrepreneurs, presidents of sports federations and officials to honour those winners. Moreover, those winning athletes are

sented cash awards to gold medallists, coaches and managers in the swimming, track and field shot put, javelin, discus, 400-metre relay, swimming and weightlifting events in the 12th ASEAN Para Games and the 17th Southeast Asian Bodybuilding and Physique Sports Championships.

Council Joint Secretary Lt-Gen Ye Win Oo presented cash awards to silver medallists, coaches and managers in the long jump, shot put, javelin and weightlifting events.

Likewise, Council members General Mya Tun Oo, Lt-Gen Soe Htut, Daw Dwe Bu, Mahn Nye-in Maung and Dr Hmu Thang,

Chief of the General Staff (Army, Navy and Air) General Maung Maung Aye, and senior military officers gave cash awards to the medallists, administrative board members and coaches.

Corporal Soe Pay and Maung Nyein Chan, medallists, spoke words of thanks.

At the ceremony, gold medallists were awarded K30 million each, silver medallists K20 million each and bronze medallists K10 million each in the 12th ASEAN Para Games, athletes from teamwise events winning bronze medal K3.5 million each, coaches and managers for gold medal-winning events K10 million each, silver medal K5 million each and bronze medal K3 million each. Cash awards for winners amounted to K1,229.5 million. Moreover, K10 million each was presented to gold medallists in the 17th Southeast Asian Bodybuilding and Physique Sports Championships, silver medallists K7 million each and bronze medallists K5 million each. He stated that party offices should be opened in at least five townships in the state within 180 days, and party flags and

the logo should be properly implemented following the requirements.

He also ordered that the party's financial rules and reg-

ulations be developed following the instructions and that party officials communicate with the relevant departments of Immigration and Population so that

the trifold national identification cards held by the party members can be replaced with citizenship verification cards.

He stressed that representatives of the respective parties must be elected in the elections to be held with the proportional representation system (PR), and they should work hard to get the right to participate in the state legislative and administrative sectors.

After that, party officials re-explained the working conditions of the party.

UNION Minister for Electric Power U Thaung Han attended the third day of the St Petersburg International Economic Forum 2023 (SPIEF'23) held in St Petersburg, Russia on 16 June.

At the plenary meeting under the theme of the Role of the Nuclear Industry in "Achieving Technological Sovereignty and Technologies of the future", the Union minister talked about the key role of the nuclear industry in future technology development and an organization with technological sovereignty, the effectiveness of the nuclear industry to over-

come challenges in scientific and technical sectors, application of nuclear technology in other sectors in addition to power generation and benefits of safety and efficiency increases of the nuclear power plant.

He also stressed the need to reduce carbon dioxide in all sectors that rely on fossil fuel to ensure CO2 free for the global economy and mentioned the importance of nuclear energy for that situation being the second-largest source of low-carbon energy following hydropower, the need to invest in research development programmes, education and

training sections to achieve technological sovereignty, produce new generation scientists, engineers and skilled persons, provide the knowledge and abilities to the youths in nuclear science and technology sectors to move towards the future of continuous improvement and technical potential of the nuclear industry by making investments in research and development programmes and producing a new generation of experts.

Gentle cleansers kill viruses just like harsh soaps: Research

A RECENT study by University of Sheffield specialists discovered that gentle cleansers are just as efficient as hard soaps in eliminating viruses, including coronavirus.

Healthcare professionals often substitute harsh soaps or alcohol-based hand sanitisers with skin-friendly cleansers in order to treat or prevent irritant contact dermatitis - a common skin disease which causes red and swollen skin with a dry and damaged surface.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, incidence and severity of the disease amongst healthcare professionals increased from 20

per cent to 80 per cent.

Despite the widespread use of gentle cleansing products for handwashing, there has been limited evidence to show the antiviral efficacy of the products to prevent the spread of viruses such as human coronavirus, herpes simplex virus, norovirus and influenza.

Scientists from the University of Sheffield's Sheffield Dermatology Research (SDR) group tested multiple handwash products as part of the study.

These included antibacterial soap, natural soap, foam cleansers and bath wash products, with the team investigating their ability to kill both enveloped viruses;

such as human coronavirus and influenza, which have an additional layer of structural protection; compared to non-enveloped viruses, such as norovirus and adenovirus.

The findings, published in the journal *Frontiers in Virology*, show gentle cleansers were effective in killing enveloped viruses, but non-enveloped viruses displayed resistance against skin-friendly cleansers, as well as harsh soaps.

Lead author of the study, Dr Munitta Muthana from the University of Sheffield's Department of Oncology and Metabolism, said: "Washing our hands with soap and warm water for 20 seconds was a

fundamental message advocated in the UK to help stop the spread of COVID-19.

But for healthcare professionals, who can wash their hands as many as 100 times during a 12 hour shift, this may cause unintended adverse effects.

"Not only does irritant contact dermatitis cause the skin to become inflamed, blister and crack, which increases transmission of bacteria and viruses, it can also lead to less compliance with personal protective equipment (PPE) and inadequate hand washing for fear of making symptoms worse. The disease can also significantly impact workplace pro-

ductivity.

"For the first time, our study has shown substituting harsh soaps with milder wash products such as gentle cleansers is effective in fighting against enveloped viruses, including human coronavirus, which is very encouraging - especially for those in jobs in which irritant contact dermatitis is an occupational hazard.

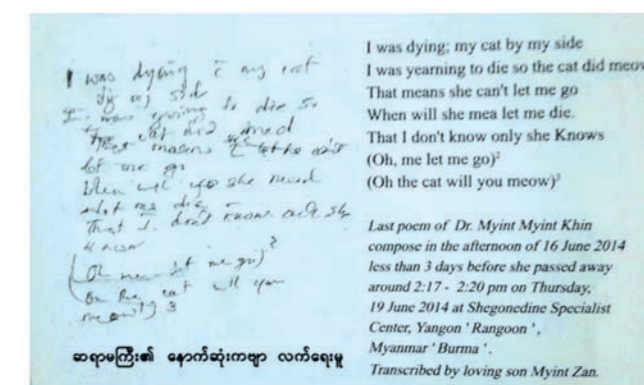
We also found that using additional agents such as moisturisers to help protect the skin didn't prevent the products' antiviral activity, which means we don't have to use very harsh products on our skin in order to kill viruses."

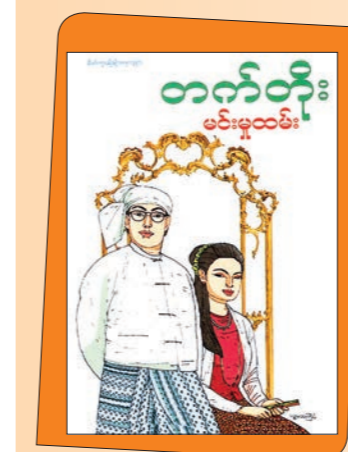

He has worked as a tutor at the English Department, an editor with *Ganda Lawka Magazine*, a translator with the Office of the Detective-General and the Deputy Chief Editor of the Translation Division under the Ministry of Information. Later, he also became the Myanmar Language Department under the Ministry of Education, Assistant Editor-in-Charge of *Pyinnya Swezon Kyan*, the Research officer, the Editor of *Oway Magazine*, the Vice-Chairman of the Printers and Publishers Association and the first resident correspondent of the *Time Magazine*. He became the Chief Editor of the *Burma Press Syndicate* from

1950 to 1952. In 1963, when the News Agency Burma-External was established, he became the Chief Editor. He also served as the Managing Director of the News and Periodicals Corporation. He also became a People's Hluttaw Representative.

His first book is *Mata Hari* which was published in 1940. In 1950, he won the Sarpay Beikman Award with this book under review. This novel was based on the ten-year experience he gained in his capacity as a clerk with a government department. He presented case studies in which the methods of bribery and corruption were mentioned.

The main character is a Township Officer from the General Administration Department. His name is U Tin Thein. He wrote

Over 3,600 YBS buses equipped with CCTV

THE Yangon Region Transport Committee (YRTC) has successfully installed CCTV cameras aboard over 3,600 YBS buses.

However, there are still more than 2,000 buses in the YBS fleet that are yet to be equipped with CCTV. In response, the YRTC has issued an instruction to install CCTV systems on all YBS buses. THIS installation will enable effective monitoring and control of criminal incidents, fare collection, and adherence to traffic rules on YBS buses.

Furthermore, the YRTC will take necessary action to address complaints regarding fare collection exceeding the prescribed rates. — TWA/MKKS

MRF-led delegation holds meetings with 8 Philippine companies during visit

Additionally, the delegation met Mr George Barcelon, Chairman of the Philippine Chamber of Commerce and Industry (PCCI), and other businesspeople at the PCCI Head Office in Manila on 9 June. communication among business communities in both countries within the ASEAN Economic Community, considering their membership in ASEAN.

44 prisoners achieve success in 2022-2023 matriculation examination

THE Myanmar National Human Rights Commission (MNHRC) has announced the release of 44 prisoners who successfully passed the 2022-2023 matriculation examination.

The matriculation exam results for the 2022-2023 academic year were declared on 9 June. Among the 161,850 students who appeared for the examination, 44 prisoners — including

10 from Insein prison, 29 from Mandalay prison, and five from other regional or state prisons — achieved success along with 109,851 other students.

These prisoners showcased outstanding academic performance, with one distinction in five subjects, two distinctions in four subjects, 25 distinctions in three subjects, seven distinctions in two sub-

jects, and six distinctions in one subject.

Canada's population reaches 40 million

CANADA'S population reached a milestone of 40 million as of 16 June 2023, Statistics Canada announced Friday.

Canada's population is currently growing at a record-setting pace. In 2022, the number of Canadians rose by 1,050,110, which marks the first time in Canadian history that the population grew by over 1 million people in a single year with the annual growth rate reaching 2.7 per cent.

While the previous growth rate record in the 1950s was

mostly attributed to the high number of births during the post-war baby boom, international migration accounted for nearly all growth recorded in 2022, the national statistical agency said.

Canada is by far leading the G7 countries for population growth and this has been the case for the last two decades, the agency said. If this rate of population growth was to stay constant in the years to come, the Canadian population could double in about 26 years, Statistics Canada said. — AFP

Night owls die earlier due to drinking and smoking: study

PEOPLE who tend to stay up late are not more likely to die younger than early risers -- as long as they don't use those longer nights for drinking and smoking, a 37-year-long study suggested on Friday.

Previous research has shown that night owls, who stay up later and struggle to drag themselves out of bed in the morning, are more likely to suffer from a range of health problems.

In 2018, a large study in the UK found that evening people had a 10 per cent higher risk of dying than morning people over a 6.5-year period.

While that was potentially worrying news for the world's night owls, that research did not take into account factors, such as alcohol-consumption, that could be behind those deaths. — AFP

Japan raises age of consent from 13 to 16 years old

JAPAN'S age of consent was raised from 13, among the world's lowest, to 16 years old on Friday as lawmakers passed key reforms to sex crime legislation.

A new bill, which also clarifies rape prosecution requirements and criminalizes voyeurism, cleared parliament's upper house in a unanimous vote.

The age of consent -- below which sexual activity is considered statutory rape -- is 16 in Britain, 15 in France, and 14 in Germany and China. — AFP

Peru health minister resigns over dengue crisis

PERU'S health minister resigned Thursday following criticism over her handling of a dengue crisis that has left at least 248 people dead and around 147,000 infected, a presidential statement said.

Peruvian President Dina Boluarte accepted Rosa Gutierrez's resignation and vowed to "redouble all efforts to bring quality healthcare" to all citizens, according to a post on the Peruvian presidency's Twitter account.

Gutierrez announced her departure during a congressional meeting in which she was questioned over her management of the dengue outbreak.

Several parties had called for her resignation after she attributed the increase in dengue cases to high temperatures and rains in the first quarter of the year.

Peru has the second-highest dengue mortality rate in Latin

America after Brazil, according to the Pan American Health Organization, with cases overwhelming hospitals in the north of the country this year.

Dengue is a disease endemic to tropical areas that causes high fevers, headaches, nausea, vomiting, muscle pain and, in the most serious cases, haemorrhages that can lead to death.

It was first detected in Peru in 1984 and has since become endemic. The World Health Organization warned in April that dengue and other diseases caused by mosquito-borne viruses are spreading much further and farther under the effect of climate change. — AFP

Meta guru says ChatGPT-style AI is out-of-date

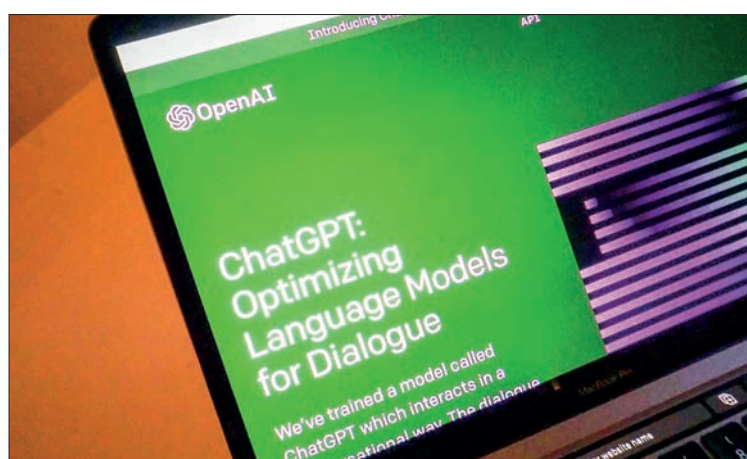
THE chief scientist for Facebook-owner Meta on Tuesday said that generative AI, the

technology behind ChatGPT, was already at a dead end, instead promising new artificial intelligence resembling human rationality.

"Today AI and machine learning really sucks. Humans have common sense, machines don't," Yann LeCun told reporters at a Meta launch event in Paris.

LeCun spoke as Meta announced its latest AI project -- called image-based Joint Embedding Predictive Architecture, or JEPA.

The project seeks to move beyond ChatGPT-like generative AI and give machines the ability to conceptualize abstract ideas and not just regurgitate what exists online. — AFP

Japan promotes tourism at international expo in Beijing

JAPAN is promoting tourism at a major international exposition that opened in Beijing on Friday, with demand for overseas trips recovering among local people after China lifted its stringent "zero-COVID" policy and reopened its borders earlier this year.

At a booth set up by the Japan National Tourism Organization, prefectures including

Tokushima, Okinawa and Kumamoto showed promotional videos to introduce local tourist attractions. There was also a performance featuring the Okinawan "sanshin" string instrument while visitors could also try their hand at painting Japanese "furin" wind bells.

Events such as weddings at Japanese shrines, kimono photo sessions as well as

medical tourism, skiing and golf tours were promoted at another booth.

About 100,000 visitors are expected at the three-day Beijing International Tourism Expo, which features more than 70 booths of Chinese tour companies, local provinces and cities as well as foreign countries including Russia, the Philippines, Viet Nam and Cuba.

Shintaro Chaya, chief representative of the JNTO Beijing office, said while visas for individual Japan-bound Chinese travelers are available, group tours and the combined sale of air tickets and hotels have yet to resume.

"Even though group tour participants only accounted for some 30 per cent of all Chinese visitors in Japan before COVID, the overall Japan-bound travel trend will not gain momentum without the lifting of restrictions on group tours," Chaya said. — Kyodo

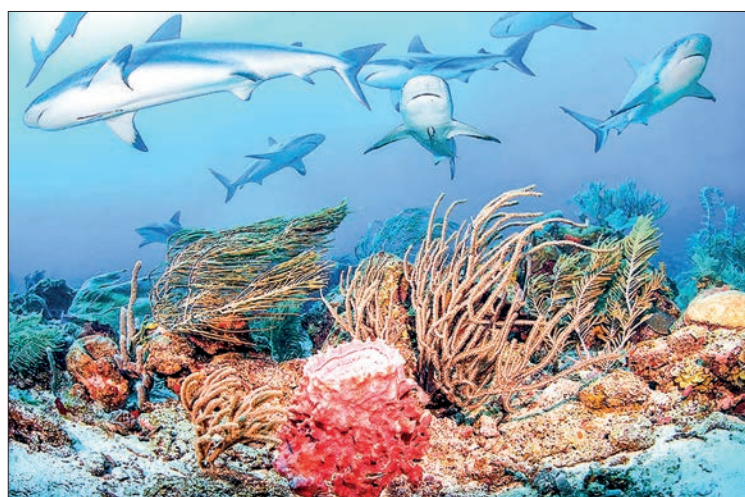
Overfishing pushes reef sharks towards extinction: study

OVERFISHING is driving coral reef sharks towards extinction, according to a global study out Thursday that signals far greater peril to the marine predators than previously thought.

That matters to humans because the species act as managers of their marine ecosystems, maintaining delicately balanced

food webs on which hundreds of millions of people rely.

The research, published in the journal *Science*, is the result of the Global FinPrint project, which collected more than 22,000 hours of video footage from reefs across Africa, the Middle East, Asia, Australasia and the Americas.

The depletion data was derived from a computer model that estimated what shark numbers would have looked like without human pressures.

Sharks were entirely absent in 14 per cent of reefs where they had been previously documented.

Lead author Colin Simpfendorfer of the James Cook University and the University of Tasmania told AFP that prior to the study, coral reef sharks — unlike their bigger cousins that dwell in deep oceans — were not thought to be doing badly.

"But when you sat down and looked at the overall results, it was quite stunning," he said. — AFP

Paris Air Show returns with climate, defence in focus

AFTER a Covid-induced break, the Paris Air Show returns next week with the aerospace industry bouncing back from the pandemic but facing pressure to slash its carbon footprint.

Organizers are promoting the biennial event as the "recovery airshow" after the coronavirus ravaged the sector and forced the gathering's cancellation in 2021.

The aerospace industry is flocking back to Le Bourget airport on the outskirts of Paris with a spring in its step, as aircraft makers field hundreds of orders and airlines brace for a near-record number of

passengers this year.

Russia's war in Ukraine has also prompted countries to step up their military spending, which could benefit aerospace defence firms.

The airshow is a chance for companies to show off their wares, announce deals and do more business, with some 2,500 firms showing off their latest planes, drones, helicopters and prototypes such as flying taxis.

With some 125,000 square metres of exhibition space — the equivalent of nearly 18 soccer fields — around 320,000 visitors are expected during the week-long event starting Monday. — AFP

BOJ sticks to monetary easing, unconvinced about price, wage growth

BANK of Japan Governor Kazuo Ueda on Friday warned of "extremely high" uncertainty over the sustainability of recent inflation and wage growth, as the central bank decided to keep interest rates extremely low to support the economy.

After a two-day policy meeting, Ueda acknowledged that the pace of inflation has been slowing more moderately than expected, underscoring the challenges faced by the BOJ as rising prices of everyday goods put "big burdens" on consumers. — Kyodo

system where Brazilian leader Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva, Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman as well as a host of African heads of state are expected.

Two Pacific nations exposed to the risk of rising sea levels, the Marshall and Solomon islands, have been pushing over the last decade for a \$100-per-tonne tax on maritime industry emissions which would create incentives for operators to cut their pollution. — AFP

European leaders host Musk, chase Tesla investment

BILLIONAIRE Elon Musk is set to meet French President Emmanuel Macron in Paris on Friday as part of a European trip, with national leaders jostling for investment from his electric car firm Tesla.

The maverick tech titan, who also owns SpaceX and Twitter, met Italian Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni on Thursday, and she later tweeted that they had a “fruitful meeting” discussing “innovation and opportunities”.

Macron confirmed during a visit to France’s biggest technology trade fair VivaTech earlier this week that he would meet the businessman to “tout the attractiveness of France and Europe”.

Musk will also visit VivaTech later, appearing before an audience of thousands for what is billed as an hour-long “conversation” with the event’s French founder Maurice Levy. — AFP

UK approves Amazon buy of robotic vacuum maker iRobot

BRITAIN’S Competition and Markets Authority regulator said Friday it has approved Amazon’s \$1.7-billion purchase of iRobot, the US maker of robotic vacuum Roomba.

The CMA “has now concluded that the deal would not lead to competition concerns in the UK”, it announced in a statement.

The transaction, announced in August 2022, aims to expand Amazon’s artificial intelligence and smart home ambitions.

The US retail titan

welcomed Friday’s news. “We’re pleased with

the UK CMA’s decision and are committed to

supporting regulatory bodies in their work. We look forward to similar decisions from other regulators soon,” said a spokesperson.

Massachusetts-based iRobot builds robots and “intelligent home” innovations, having introduced the Roomba self-operating vacuums a decade ago. Amazon’s deal to buy iRobot for \$61 per share along with acquiring the company’s debt was subject to approval of shareholders and regulators. — AFP

UAE cinemas scrap Spider-Man film featuring trans flag

SONY’S latest Spider-Man animation will not hit the silver screen in the United Arab Emirates, a cinema company said Friday, following backlash over an expression of support for transgender rights.

“Spider-Man: Across the Spider-Verse” was

originally scheduled to screen across the UAE as of 22 June, but it has since been scrapped from lists of upcoming films on the websites of major cinema operators in the Gulf state. “Spider-Man: Across the Spider-Verse” will not be releasing in the

UAE,” VOX Cinemas said in response to an enquiry on Facebook.

The cinema company, which operates in the UAE and much of the Gulf region, did not provide a reason for the decision.

Majid Al Futtaim Entertainment, which owns

VOX Cinemas, did not respond to a request for comment.

The superhero film, which premiered late last month, has sparked controversy online in the UAE for a scene featuring a flag with the writing “protect trans kids”. — AFP

Russia maintains economic stability despite challenges: Putin

RUSSIA has successfully maintained economic stability in the face of “unprecedented challenges”, President Vladimir Putin said on Friday.

“Positive macroeconomic trends are gaining momentum and becoming increasingly apparent,” Putin said during a plenary session of the 26th St Petersburg International Economic Forum. Russia’s GDP could achieve a growth rate of about 1.5 per cent to two per cent this year, which will enable the country to retain its place among the world’s leading economies, he said. Inflation stays close to a historical low of 2.9 per cent and unemployment stands at a record low of 3.3 per cent, according to the Russian leader.

While many foreign brands have long been selling products completely manufactured in Russia, those de facto Russian goods only with foreign logos

owners and profits remain, Putin noted. He told the audience that

Russia continues to pursue an open economy and will never

turn onto the path of self-isolation despite all the difficulties.

“On the contrary, we have expanded contacts with reliable, responsible partners in countries and regions that today act as locomotives and drivers of the global economy. I want to repeat: these are the markets of the future,” he underlined.

“The ugly, essentially neo-colonial international system has ceased to exist, while the multipolar world order, on the contrary, is being strengthened. This is an inevitable process,” Putin added.

The St Petersburg International Economic Forum has been held annually in Russia’s second largest city since 1997, and the theme of this year’s event, scheduled from Wednesday to Saturday, is “Sovereign Development as the Basis of a Just World: Joining Forces for Future Generations.” — Xinhua

Canada court upholds pact on returning asylum seekers to US

CANADA’S Supreme Court on Friday upheld an immigration

agreement that allows authorities to bar asylum seekers from enter-

ing the country from the United States. The Safe Third Country Agreement, which came into effect in 2004, says that asylum seekers must make their application in the first safe country in which they arrived once they left their country of origin. The judges unanimously ruled that the accord did “not infringe refugee claimants’ rights to liberty and security”. In July 2020, a Federal Court judge invalidated the agreement, ruling that it violated the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms because those returned to the US faced poor detention conditions. — AFP

China warns US against ‘strategic misjudgement’ as Blinken heads to Beijing

BLINKEN is arriving in Beijing this weekend in what will be his first trip to China as secretary of state, a visit that was delayed in February, when Washington tracked a suspected Chinese surveillance balloon in US airspace.

The US views China as its “primary rival” and “the most consequential geopolitical challenge”, which is “a major strategic misjudgement”, Chinese Foreign Ministry Spokesperson Wang Wenbin has stated.

Speaking to reporters ahead of US Secretary Antony Blinken’s visit to China slated for this weekend, Wang said that while there is a competition between the two countries in such fields as economics and trade, there should be “no vicious zero-sum competition,” as well as no attempts to contain or suppress one another in the name of rivalry and deprive China of its legitimate right to development. — SPUTNIK

Kidnappers use grisly tactics as Ecuador crime spirals

CRIME has taken a sadistic turn in Ecuador, where kidnappers now regularly amputate the fingers of their victims and send images to pressure relatives to pay higher ransoms.

For decades, Ecuador was a refuge of peace wedged in a dangerous region. But these days, it increasingly resembles nearby Peru and Colombia, two

huge producers of cocaine with violent criminal histories.

In March, the wife of a businessman in the port city of Guayaquil received images of someone snipping two fingers off her husband’s left hand, threatening to mutilate him further unless they were paid \$100,000.

At the end of 2022, police released a photograph of a mem-

ber of the Chilean navy who’d had two fingers lopped off during a kidnapping while he was in the country visiting a girlfriend.

Social media lit up in April when an x-ray of a hand with no fingers made the rounds. The image was of an Ecuadoran migrant to the United States ensnared in a kidnapping during a vacation back home. — AFP

Japan emperor, empress to visit Indonesia for 7 days from 17 June

EMPEROR Naruhito and Empress Masako will visit Indonesia for seven days from 17 June, the Japanese government said Friday, marking their first official goodwill visit abroad since the emperor ascended the throne in 2019. The couple will attend events including a luncheon with Indonesian President Joko Widodo where the emperor will deliver a speech. The planned visit, approved by the Cabinet, comes as Japan and the Association of Southeast Asian Nations mark this year the 50th anniversary of friendly ties. Indonesia is the 2023 ASEAN chair. The emperor received an invitation from Widodo in August 2019, according to the Imperial Household Agency.

Empress Masako, who has long battled a stress-induced illness, will determine whether

to attend individual events depending on her condition, the agency said.

The couple is scheduled to meet with the president and his wife and have luncheon at the palace in Bogor, near Jakarta, on 19 June. They will offer flowers the following day at the Kalibata Heroes' Cemetery, which honours those who fought for Indonesia's independence. From 21 June, the emperor will travel alone to Yogyakarta, an ancient city in central Java, to attend a dinner hosted by the governor of the special province in which it is located. The plan also includes visits to a high-speed railway constructed with Japan's economic assistance and a university engaging in Japanese-language education, as well as a meeting with Japanese residents in Indonesia. — Kyodo

Pentagon Papers whistleblower Daniel Ellsberg dead at 92

DANIEL Ellsberg, the whistleblower who leaked the "Pentagon Papers" about the Vietnam War — changing public perceptions of the conflict — died on Friday, his family announced. He was 92.

Ellsberg was a military analyst when he released thousands of documents to US media in 1971 that revealed successive United States administrations had lied to the public about the Vietnam war.

The 7,000 classified pages determined that, contrary to the public assertions of US government officials, the conflict was unwinnable.

The leak was recounted in the 2017 Hollywood thriller "The Post", which detailed the nail-biting behind-the-scenes story of the papers' publication. Ellsberg announced in March that doctors had told him on 17 February that he had terminal pancreatic cancer and only around six months to live. "He was not in pain, and was surrounded by loving family," his wife and children said in a statement announcing his death. — AFP

African leaders prepare to meet Putin after Zelensky rules out talks

A high-level African delegation was preparing to meet with Russian President Vladimir Putin on Saturday, a day after its calls for talks between Moscow and Kyiv were rebuffed by Ukrainian leader Volodymyr Zelensky.

The diplomatic team had gone to Kyiv on Friday to voice the concerns of a continent that has suffered from the fallout of Russia's invasion — in particular rising grain prices — with South African President Cyril Ramaphosa insisting "there should be peace through negotiations".

But Zelensky ruled out that possibility during a joint press conference with the delegates, telling reporters: "I clearly said several times at our meeting that

to allow any negotiations with Russia now that the occupier is on our land is to freeze the war, to freeze pain and suffering".

Shortly after the African

leaders' arrival, air raid sirens sounded across the country as Russian missiles were detected, forcing the delegates to take shelter in the capital. — AFP

Uruguay to melt Nazi bronze eagle, recast it as peace dove

URUGUAY will melt down a bronze eagle found on a sunken World War II-era German destroyer off its coast 13 years ago, and recast it as a dove of

peace, the South American country's president said Friday. The 350-kilogramme (770-pound) "symbol of violence and war" will be turned into a "symbol of peace and union," President Luis Lacalle Pou told journalists in the capital Montevideo. The two-metre (6.5-foot)-tall bird with a Nazi swastika gripped in its talons adorned the stern of the Admiral

Graf Spee, a battleship involved in one of the first naval skirmishes of World War II. The Graf Spee's captain, Hans Langsdorff, scuttled the battleship — one of the Third Reich's largest — on 17 December 1939 following the Battle of the River Plate. The sculpture was found in 2006 after a 10-year hunt in the River Plate off Montevideo. — AFP

Rodri aiming to bring back Spain's 'winning culture'

Manchester City's goalscoring hero in their Champions League final triumph over Inter Milan last weekend noted only two players in Spain's squad had won trophies with the national team — Jordi Alba and Jesus Navas. Sevilla wing-back Navas lifted the 2010 World Cup with La Roja, while Alba was part of

the side which won Spain's last trophy at Euro 2012, over a decade ago. "It will be very important to win again, after all this time, bringing Spain back to the highest point," Rodri told a news conference Saturday, ahead of the final in Rotterdam.

"We only have two players who know what it's like to win. It's not just important to win but to create a winning culture, we have to understand that we have a unique opportunity. "We had the chance to win against France

in the (2021) final but we couldn't do it. This will allow us to recover that winning culture." Spain also reached the Euro 2020 semi-finals but were beaten by Italy on penalties. Rodri has become a key figure for coach Luis de la Fuente in midfield and the Man City player believes he is at a career level high.

"I think I am, in terms of maturity, winning titles, it's a moment I want to extend in the national team," continued Rodri. — AFP
