The Republic of the Union of Myanmar State Administration Council: Five-Point Road Map

1. Priority will be given to fully realizing peace, stability and rule of law throughout the Union to safeguard the socioeconomic life of the people.
2. People-centred development work that enhances socioeconomic well-being will be undertaken to ensure the country's prosperity and food security.
3. Processes will further continue to consolidate a genuine, disciplined multiparty democratic system and build a Union based on democracy and federalism.
4. Priority will be accorded to work aligned with the agreements set out in the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement, in order to achieve enduring peace for the entire nation.
5. Upon accomplishing the provisions of the state of emergency, free and fair multiparty democratic elections will be held in line with the 2008 Constitution, and further work will be undertaken to hand over State duties to the winning party in accordance with democratic standards.

Applications for establishment of political parties under verification

THOSE who want to establish a political party are applying to the Union Election Commission by stating the name of the party they want to establish.

To date, there have been 13 parties that have applied for the right to establish parties.

Among those that applied, National Politics New Vigor Par-

ty is found to comply with the political parties' registration law and regulations, and the Union Election Commission approved the application for the establishment of the political party yesterday.

The National Politics New Vigor Party which has the right to establish a party must apply to

the Commission for registration as a political party under Rule 7 of the Registration of Political Parties within 30 days from the date of approval. To date, eight political parties have been allowed to be established and the other parties that have applied for party establishment are also being scrutinized. —MNA/KZL

32 new cases of COVID-19 reported on 22 June, total figure registers 640,234

MYANMAR'S COVID-19-positive cases rose to **640,234** after **32** new cases were reported on 22 June 2023 according to the Ministry of Health. Therefore, a total of **10,808,397** laboratory samples were examined to date and the confirmed COVID-19 cases reached **640,234**. The total number of patients who have recovered from COVID-19 in the country reached **619,054** including **32** new recoveries. The death toll from COVID-19 in the country registered **19,494** on 22-6-2023 with no new death reported from the pandemic. 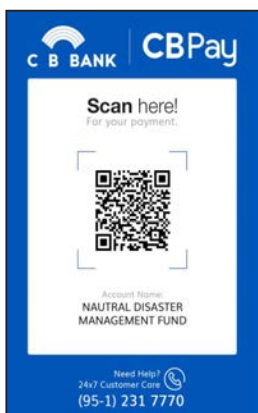

He called for making the restoration stronger and better than the original condition, and greening, cleaning and beautifying work for public recreation.

The Deputy Prime Minister, Union ministers, the Rakhine State chief minister and deputy ministers attended the coordination meeting on rehabilitation held at the Rakhine State government office. — MNA/TS

AT the invitation of the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Kingdom of Thailand, Mr Don Pramudwinai, U Than Swe, Union Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar, attended an informal discussion on Myanmar, held on 18-19 June 2023 in Pattaya, Thailand, along with the Foreign Ministers, Special Envoy, Ambassadors and representatives from ASEAN Member States: Brunei, Cambodia, Laos, Vietnam, the Philippines and neighbouring countries: China and India.

The Union Minister expressed his appreciation to friends of Myanmar for organizing an informal discussion on Myanmar while welcoming suggestions to overcome challenges faced by Myanmar. At a time when correct information on Myanmar was blocked and one-sided news was spread by biased media, progress was analyzed making reference to the ASEAN five-point consensus, he briefed the meeting on the development in Myanmar, particularly the implementation of three main tasks of the ASEAN five-point consensus; namely the cessation of violence, inclusive political dialogue and provision of humanitarian assistance as these tasks complement Myanmar's Five-Point Road Map.

The Union Minister elaborated on peace efforts by undertaking all necessary measures for the cessation of violence. Like many other countries in the region, Myanmar experienced insurgency during the Cold War era. By 1974, it has managed to bring tranquillity to 90 per cent of the country's inland areas. In order not to damage the friendship with neighbouring countries, Myanmar exercised utmost constraints in managing the insurgency in border areas. Gentleman agreements were reached with almost all ethnic armed organizations in the post-Cold War era basically agreeing to carry out border development programmes and peace processes, and vowing not to commit offensive attacks and not to make new recruitments. Successive governments have been pursuing the peace process for more than 33 years. Ceasefire in 1990 allowed 17 big EAOs and 17 small EAOs to operate in special zones covering about three per cent of the border areas. As the dedicated Ministry was formed for the development of those areas, some EAOs traded arms for peace for good and about 10,000 armed personnel were transformed into Border Guard Forces-BGF and they are joining hands with the government ensuring peace and stability in respective areas. As of today, there are 18 EAOs and 10 of them signed the NCA and eight are non-NCA signatories who continue to participate in peace negotiation. A to-

tal of 106 rounds of peace talks were held under the current government. As of now, peace talks are organized more than 5,000 times. Important agreements were reached particularly for the building of a Federal Union through a multiparty democratic system as well as for sharing of power and resources. Tatmadaw strictly follows the peace agreement not undertaking first strikes and not intruding on demarcated zones. Only in cases of NCA violation, intrusion into government control areas, expansion of bases in resource-rich areas and imposing threats to the public, counter-attacks are carried out with maximum restraints and in line with the Rule of Engagement in the Vienna Convention. Myanmar people value lives and never go to extremes. Despite the existence of armed struggles for 75 years since 1948, the gun death rate is the lowest in the ASEAN region.

The Union Minister explained that some EAOs takes advantage of the political instabilities in the past two years by training and equipping vulnerable and emotional youth in the post-COVID-19 period as the PDFs even in the areas where stability was enjoyed for the past five decades. They do attack security forces but they aim at soft targets by killing and bullying unarmed people, members of opposition parties, public services personnel and veterans and destroying public properties. Those armed groups emerged only after the announcement of the ASEAN five-point consensus. So-called NUG ministers order PDFs for terror activities against those who do not follow the instruction for school and office closure by supporting arms and ammunition to PDFs. To date, 5,846 innocent lives were claimed by PDFs including 187 young children, 77 teachers, 69 members of the Sangha, 807 village and ward administrators and 148 other public services personnel, 17 medical service personnel, members of opposition parties, veterans. Such kind of brutal acts are not acceptable in any civilized society. Being responsible to protect its people, the government has to counter the attacks by PDFs. As an institution systematically organized with rich experience and capability, Tatmadaw can easily eliminate ordinary armed groups. However, it exercises utmost restraints not to hurt its own citizens. Government open its door for peace in order to solve domestic issues in an amicable manner. Amnesty is also announced giving pardons except to those with records of serious crimes such as rape and murder. All are allowed to participate in the political process after coming to legal-fold. Political parties are also allowed to be formed and registered. As all the doors

are opened for the cessation of violence and inclusive political dialogues,

The Union Minister explained that some EAOs do not cooperate wholeheartedly in peace processes as they don't wish to relinquish the benefits they are gaining from illegal businesses of drug and armed smuggling. Also, some did not join the elections all three times. As drug production becomes synthetic chemical-based, eliminating drug issues becomes more challenging. Therefore, he stressed the need to promote cooperation with neighbours and the ASEAN Member States.

On the humanitarian front, the Union Minister underlined that the government will continue facilitating the works of the AHA centre. With regard to the repatriation of displaced persons in Rakhine state, the government has been expediting the early implementation of the pilot project. Although there are some delays in the commencement of the repatriation process as some potential returnees were threatened by some groups on the other side, Government will continue its efforts in cooperation with all relevant parties.

As the government has to address the issue of one-sided media attempting to destroy the country's image while blocking the true information in Myanmar, Union Minister called for greater cooperation from friends of Myanmar. Only through communication and engagement at all levels in ASEAN, ASEAN Member States can effectively support Myanmar to overcome challenging situations through proper analysis and judgement.

The Union Minister continued to explain that there are some NLD members who wish to stay peacefully in the country in line with the rules of law. Any democracy would not accept election fraud of this scale, 29 per cent, as experienced in the 2020 general elections. Findings were disclosed to media and diplomats. NUG fail to solve the political issue through lawful and peaceful means by engaging in destructive activities. Myanmar had experienced a similar organization, the National Coalition Government of Union of Burma (NCGUB) 30 years ago. Although such groups raised funds and earn international support by claiming for the cause of democracy, none of those people returned to the country during the 10 years of democracy and not even at the time of the NLD administration. Most of those people merely aim for gaining refugee status, they don't consider much on the benefit of the people and gradually fade away from politics.

He highlighted that all enabling environments, such as granting amnesty and allowing party registration, are

in place, anyone with a sincere will to bring about benefits to the people can seek peaceful solutions by participating in political processes while denouncing terrorist activities.

He informed that the current government is carrying out all its duties and all the records of its activities under its administration are systematically kept for a systematic handover of the state responsibilities to the winning party after general elections.

The Union Minister continued to explain that the country's peace efforts over the past 33 years were done through dialogues rather than armed conflicts. During that period, some EAOs delayed the peace process as they are not willing to relinquish high profits gained from illegal businesses including drugs. Successive governments are pursuing peace patiently. Now a day, rates of armed attacks and drug smuggling are declining due to collaborative efforts of the government with the neighbouring countries. Some are returning to legal-fold.

Despite Myanmar being a resource-rich country surrounded by five neighbours with 31 billion people and the country being situated at the hub of the world's biggest market with high development potential, it continues to experience hardship for a long period due to external interference. Due to its geo-political and geo-strategic locations, successive Myanmar government has been upholding the principle of "peaceful co-existence" without interfering with the internal affairs of other countries and has no issue with any countries in the world. The Union Minister said Myanmar stands ready to receive good advice and suggestions from and promote cooperation with friends of Myanmar who realize the real situation in Myanmar and the challenges of biased media on Myanmar.

The Union Minister concluded by expressing the government's readiness to cooperate with all countries who can understand the real situation in the country as opposed to the wrong image portrayed by some biased media and disinformation campaigns.

Participants at the informal meetings expressed their adherence to non-interference in the internal affairs of Myanmar and their readiness to support Myanmar for peace, stability and inclusive political dialogues. They expressed their willingness to avoid the ASEAN-minus formula looking forward to strengthened cooperation with Myanmar.

Illegal timbers, minerals, foreign currency notes and vehicles seized

A combined team led by the Thandwe District Forest Department under the supervision of the Rakhine State Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force captured a total of 2.607 tonnes of illegal timbers (worth K182,490) on 13 June. The action was taken under the Forest Law.

Similarly, a total of 4.410 tonnes of illegal teak and 1.356 tonnes of other illegal timbers

(worth K1,452,228) were seized in Lewe and Ottarathiri townships on 18 June. The action was taken under the Forest Law.

In addition, a combined team led by a police officer from Kanpauk Police Station in Yephyu township impounded 56 bags of lead (worth K50.4 million) without official documents from a house in Kanpauk village. The action was taken under the My-

anmar Mines Law.

A combined team led by a police officer from Tiddim Police Station captured a total of 7,198,500 Indian Rupee (approximately equivalent to K184,807,090) without a foreign currency exchange licence from a Honda CR-V car (worth K3 million) in Tiddim township. The action was taken under the Foreign Exchange Management Law.

On 22 June, a combined team confiscated a Toyota Crown (worth K8.5 million) and a Nissan X-Trail (worth K7 million) without official documents heading to Phayagyi from Waw near a Tollgate on Yangon-Mawlamyine Road in Bago township. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

Therefore, seven arrests were made on 13, 18, 20 and 22 June, with an estimated value of K255,341,808, as reported by the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee. — MNA/MKKS

Over K420 mln worth of prohibited chemical (Caffeine) captured in Ywangan township

MORE than one tonne of prohibited chemical (caffeine) worth over K420 million was captured in Ywangan township in Shan State (South).

Acting on a tip-off, a combined team consisting of members of the Anti-Drug Police Force stopped and searched a 12-wheel Nissan lorry travelling from Hanmyintmo to Ywangan at the Myogyi checkpoint in Ywangan township at 7 am on

21 June and seized over one tonne of prohibited chemical (caffeine) worth over K420 million.

Following interrogation, offenders admitted that the seized drugs were to be carried from Mandalay region to Shan state.

Legal action was taken against the offenders and an investigation is underway to find out the persons involved in the case. — MNA/MKKS

Dried chilli pepper prices on the rise

THE prices of various chilli peppers are moving up in June, U Hla Han, a chilli pepper depot owner at Bayintnaung Wholesale Centre, told the Global New Light of Myanmar.

The prices rebounded to K15,000-17,000 per viss of long chilli pepper, Moehtaung variety and bell peppers on 21 June 2023 after it declined to K10,000-13,000 per viss at the end of March 2023.

When new stocks of chilli pepper entered the market in April 2022, the prices touched a low of K4,700-8,000 per viss. Traders kept them in their hands at that time and resold them at an exorbitantly high price in history.

The price of chilli peppers hit a record high of K31,000 per viss on 11 November 2022. Also,

the prices peaked at K18,500-19,000 per viss of Moehtaung variety on 9 August 2022 and K21,000-22,000 per viss on 24 November.

The traders who kept the chilli peppers stocks in hand reaped a great profit last year.

The prices recorded in the last week of June this year is up by K8,000 per viss compared to that in the corresponding period last year. The prevailing prices of long chilli and Moehtaung varieties are near record highs.

New chilli peppers from Thetaw, Kyaukse and Pyawbwe areas will flow into the Yangon market at the end of June, while the new supply of long chilli pepper from Shan State and bell peppers will enter the Yangon market in mid-October. — TWA/EM

MISA existed as a cluster of

the MIA since 2014. It was also accepted by the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration.

Additionally, the MISA joined the South East Asia Iron and Steel Institute (SEAISI) in December 2018 to promote the iron and steel industry by building networks with the members of the SEAISI.

The MISA will move forward to the development of industry standards which are compatible with the country and the production of iron and steel products that meet international

standards. The association will cooperate with international organizations to grow small and medium steel enterprises, disseminate iron and steel information and receive technical assistance from the regional countries by holding seminars and research paper reading sessions.

At present, Myanmar's steel demand is estimated at 2.5 million tons per year, 92 per cent of which are imported. The demand is likely to grow up to 5.4 million tonnes per year in 2030, according to the MISA. — NN/EM

Automatic licensing and non-automatic licensing system for importers commences on 22 June

SEEKING Import licences through automatic licensing and non-automatic licensing systems on Myanmar Tradenet 2.0 platform is available from 22 June, according to the news bulletin (9/2023) released by the Trade Department under the Ministry of Commerce.

Having digitized the licensing system, import licensing for certain lines (1,525 lines) via seaborne trade will be automatically passed on to the system.

According to that notification of the Ministry of Commerce, for seaborne trade, commodities lines that did not require import licences before are mandatory for import licences under the non-automatic import licensing process after 60 days from today (22 June).

Additionally, for imports via the border, only a non-automatic licensing system will be exercised amid the scrutiny of export earnings and other income documents.

Those commodities that did not need import licences before will be allowed to be imported with licences after 30 days from today. According to news bulletin 8/2023 of the Ministry of Commerce, in accordance with the Customs Tariff of Myanmar 2022, 3,075 commodities lines with 10 digits HS Code for imports were notified to be permitted licence automatically on Myanmar trade net 2.0 portal and from 22 June, only 1,525 lines will be granted licences through automatic import licensing system in line with the procedures of the State. — NN/EM

US approves lab-grown chicken for sale

THE United States has granted its first ever approvals to two companies to sell chicken grown directly from animal cells, becoming only the second country to allow lab-grown meat to be offered to consumers.

The US Department of Agriculture (USDA) approved food safety systems at facilities of Upside Foods and Good Meat, a spokesperson for the agency told AFP Wednesday, with the companies adding the products would be available soon at select restaurants.

Both Upside Foods and Good Meat were cleared on safety grounds by the Food and Drug Administration in November, and the USDA last week reviewed and approved their product labels to ensure they were not misleading.

"This approval will fundamentally change how meat makes it to our table," said Uma Valeti, CEO and founder of Upside Foods, in a statement.

"It's a giant step forward towards a more sustainable future — one that preserves choice and life." Josh Tetric, CEO of Good Meat, the cell-cultured food division of Eat Just, added its "cultivated meat" was now "approved to sell to consumers in the world's largest economy".

Producing the meat in large, high-quality volumes is expensive. But, following approval, Upside processed its first order, placed by three-Michelin-star Chef Dominique Crenn in San Francisco.

Good Meat, meanwhile, started production of its first batch that will be sold to celebrity chef and philanthropist Jose Andres.

Andres will sell the product at a yet-to-be-revealed restaurant in the capital Washington. Several start-ups are aiming to produce the so-called lab-grown meat, which would allow humans to consume animal protein without the associated environmental harms of farming or animal suffering.

Level-2 fire outbreak at Hteinbin dump

THE Fire Services Department (FSD) announced that a fire broke out at the Hteinbin garbage dump in Hlinethaya Township, Yangon, at 10:45 am on 22 June.

The fire brigade classified the fire as Level 2, and it was extinguished at noon. According to the Fire Department's report, a fire that started when chemicals were being disposed of in the landfill destroyed two cranes and one 16-wheeler truck, and two firemen suffered suffocation due to chemical fumes.

There was also a fire at the dump in 2008, and it had to wait for the fire to

be put out for a week. The news reports then said that four out of 16 patients with smoke inhalation in Ward 20 of Hlinethaya Township died of asphyxiation.

Vehicles from the Yangon City Development Committee transport around 1,350 tonnes of waste in Yangon to the Hteinbin dump, about 1,100 tonnes to the Dawei Chaung dump, approximately 25 tonnes to the Dala disposal site, and around eight tonnes to the Seikkyi/Khanaungto landfill on a daily basis. — TWA/CT

Biometric information to be collected simultaneously in 45 townships of Yangon Region

BIOMETRIC information will be collected simultaneously in 45 townships of the Yangon Region, the Yangon Region chief minister said at the opening of the training course on how to use the Biometric Enrollment and UID Management System of the Yangon Region Immigration and Population Department on 20 June.

The collection of biometric information, which is a basic and vital system for the e-Government process to convert the digital system in accordance with international standards, will be done in 45 townships in Yangon Region at

the same time. It will be conducted by dividing civil servants and their family members, students aged 10 years and above, prisoners in jails and prisons, private banking and financial services, workers in factories and workshops, nuns, monks, and members of other religious orders into six targeted groups.

The chief minister said that the e-ID system is a system that collects the information of individuals living in the country and maintains it in a database, and it will continue to issue National IDs electronically to all citizens under the law. — TWA/CT

Myawady, Tachilek border trade tops US\$200 mln in May

THE value of trade through the Myawady and Tachilek border points with the neighbouring country Thailand totalled US\$205.13 million in May 2023, the Ministry of Commerce's statistics indicated.

Trade via the Myawady border amounted to \$186.751 million with exports worth \$57.691 million and imports worth \$129.06 million.

The overall trade figures showed a sharp drop of \$53.395 million compared to that in the corresponding period last year, with a sharp drop of \$59.585 million in exports and an increase of \$6.19 million in imports.

Despite the rise in the mineral export group, the exports

in agricultural products, livestock products, manufacturing and other groups declined,

while there was a decrease in consumer goods imports, yet there was an increase in

imports of intermediate goods and capital goods last month via the Myawady border.

Nonetheless, the trade value via the Myawady border in May 2023 was up by \$79.806 million from that of April, with an increase of \$25.077 million in exports and \$54.729 million in imports.

Last month, the trade value through the Tachilek border reached \$18.379 million, including exports worth \$9.201 million and imports valued at \$9.178 million. Tachilek border achieved 12.53 per cent of the trade target. The figures showed a decrease of \$2.256 million in exports and \$0.685 million compared to those registered in the corresponding

period last year.

The export values were up by \$0.012 million in forest products, \$0.184 million in minerals, \$0.519 million in fishery products and \$0.004 million in manufacturing. Exports of Agricultural groups showed a decline of \$2.973 million and other groups indicated a small drop of \$0.002 million.

Meanwhile, imports in capital goods were up by \$0.716 million. However, the import values fell by \$1.203 million in intermediate goods and \$0.198 million in consumer goods.

Trade value increased by \$6.735 million through the Tachilek border compared to that of April 2023. — TWA/EM

China steps up efforts to prevent mpox spread

CHINA is redoubling its efforts to prevent the spread of the mpox disease, as a growing number of cases have been reported in certain parts of Asia and a few cases were found in Chinese cities including Beijing and Guangzhou, a health official said Tuesday.

In a bid to detect patients as early as possible, the coun-

try has been building a mpox monitoring and early warning system, with a particular focus on the protection of key groups, said Shi Guoqing, an official with the Chinese Centre for Disease Control and Prevention.

Efforts have been made in areas such as health monitoring of inbound travellers,

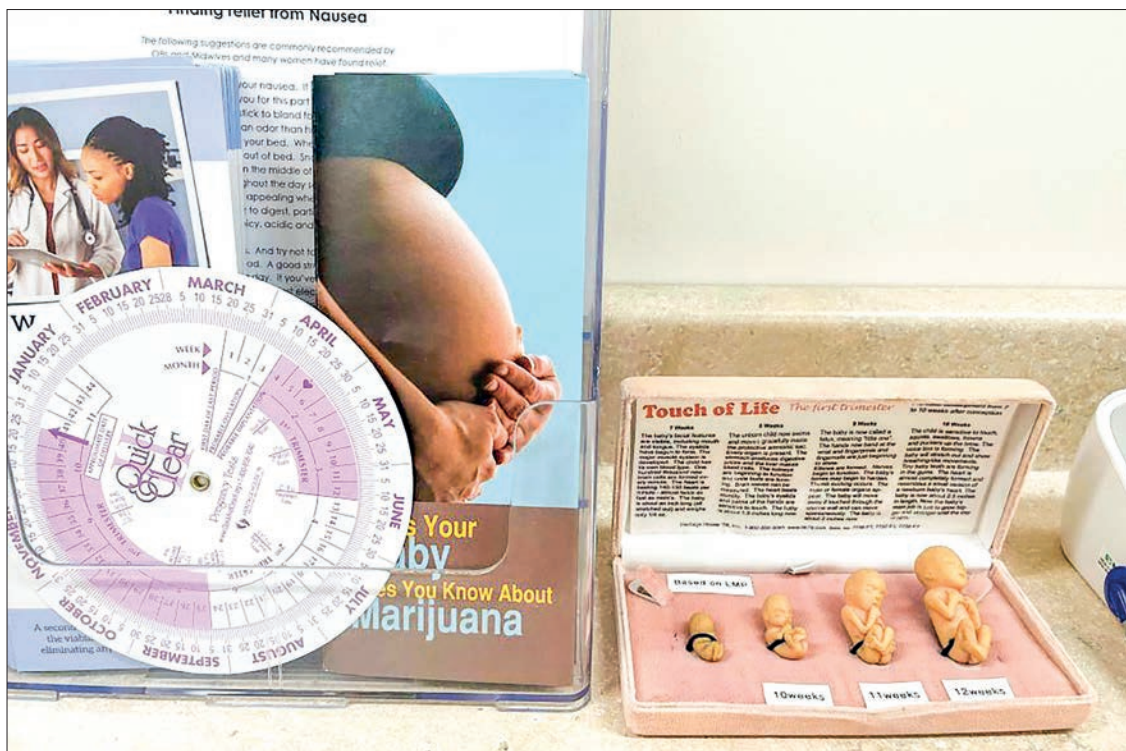
epidemiological investigation for suspected cases, sample collection and laboratory testing, among others, according to Shi.

‘Just the beginning’: US anti-abortion camp expands fight

ACTIVIST Lydia Heykamp goes door-to-door in a quiet Virginia suburb with a pressing message: now that the constitutional right to abortion has been overturned, the state must ban it outright.

The 23-year-old is part of a new offensive in America’s anti-abortion movement, as it pivots from the national stage following last year’s Supreme Court decision ending the constitutional

right to a termination.

“I was ecstatic,” Heykamp told AFP. But, she says, “that was just the beginning.” “I don’t think I could stay silent and sit on the sidelines.” In overturning Roe v. Wade, the court placed reproductive rights in the hands of individual US states: some quickly banned the procedure, but others moved to protect it.

“The movement is still pret-

ty far away from what it wants, which is a nationwide ban on abortion,” said Mary Ziegler, a law professor at the University of California, Davis, who studies reproductive politics. In a country where the majority believe abortion should be legal in most cases, activists such as Heykamp have refocused their efforts on state legislatures, courts and local communities. — AFP

Healthcare heavily hit by Sudan fighting: WHO

AROUND two-thirds of the healthcare facilities in areas hit by the fighting in Sudan are out of service, the World Health Organization said Wednesday.

The WHO said around 11 million people needed health assistance and voiced concerns about attempts to control ongoing epidemics of measles, malaria and dengue.

“About two-thirds of health facilities in affected areas are out of service,” WHO chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus told a press conference in Geneva.

“Repeated attacks on health facilities, medical warehouses, ambulances and

health workers are preventing patients and health workers from reaching hospitals.”

The WHO has verified 46 attacks on healthcare since the start of the fighting.

Since 15 April the army, led by Abdel Fattah al-Burhan, has been battling the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF) commanded by his former deputy Mohamed Hamdan Daglo, after the two fell out in a power struggle.

Renewed artillery exchanges rocked greater Khartoum Wednesday as the warring generals resumed fighting just minutes after the latest US- and Saudi-brokered ceasefire expired. — AFP

Four in critical condition after Paris building blast

AN explosion potentially caused by a gas leak ripped through a building in central Paris on Wednesday, leaving four people fighting for their lives and causing a wave of destruction,

officials said.

Rescue workers were in the evening still searching the rubble for two missing individuals who had not been accounted for, according to French Inter-

ior Minister Gerald Darmanin.

He told reporters at the scene that four seriously injured victims were in a life-threatening condition, while 33 others had sustained lesser injuries.

The blast was followed by a major fire which caused the building, housing a fashion school, to collapse in a historic district of the French capital.

Images showed wreckage

littering the area around the building, as the flames smouldered. Some 70 fire trucks and 270 firefighters battled the blaze. Nine doctors were also at the scene. — AFP

France says Macron hopes to attend BRICS summit

FRENCH President Emmanuel Macron hopes to attend a BRICS summit scheduled for August, his foreign minister said Tuesday, a meeting to which Russian leader Vladimir Putin has been invited.

Foreign minister Catherine Colonna said she had informed summit hosts South Africa Pretoria of Macron's "interest" in attending as an observer at the summit of a bloc which groups Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa.

"I informed my counterpart... of the President's availability and interest in pursuing dialogue that

France maintains with the BRICS," Colonna said in response to a journalist's question during a visit to South Africa.

It is not common for

other foreign leaders to attend the bloc's meetings.

Macron's summit attendance "if it were to happen would be an innovation to the model of

BRICS participation that we've had up to this time," said South Africa's Foreign Minister Naledi Pandor on Monday, adding that the decision on who gets invited lies with President Cyril Ramaphosa who is the current BRICS chairman.

Colonna said that such an invitation would have to be "in full respect of international law", in reference to the possible attendance of Putin.

The Russian leader has been invited to summit of the group that was created as a counterbalance to a western dominated international order. — AFP

High UK inflation piles pressure on Bank of England

BRITAIN'S annual inflation rate unexpectedly remained at 8.7 per cent in May, official data showed Wednesday, piling pressure on the Bank of England and government to act over soaring prices.

Markets had forecast a drop from April's level, while the BoE was already widely expected to raise interest rates again Thursday to combat an inflation rate which is the highest among G7 nations.

The latest data is a blow also for Prime Minister Rishi Sunak, who has made cutting inflation a priority for his Conservative government heading into a general election next year.

UK inflation had been expected to cool to 8.4 per cent last month while core inflation, which strips out food and energy costs, un-

expectedly jumped to 7.1 per cent in May.

"These numbers warn that inflationary pressures in the UK are not under control and call for further rate hikes which will further squeeze the British households," noted Ipek Ozkardeska, senior analyst at Swissquote Bank.

The BoE has already lifted borrowing costs to a 15-year high at 4.5 per cent in a bid to cool inflation.

This is set to rise further Thursday following a regular policy meeting in what would be the central bank's 13th rate increase in a row. "We know how much high inflation hurts families and businesses across the country," finance minister Jeremy Hunt said following the latest consumer prices index data. — AFP

Crypto a 'flawed system': BIS

THE Bank for International Settlements (BIS) said Tuesday that decen-

tralised cryptocurrencies are a "flawed system" and instead supported the de-

velopment of a centralized alternative.

The BIS, regarded as the central bank of central banks, backed "tokenization" or the conversion of money and other assets into digital tokens that can be traded on programmable platforms, saying it offers the promise of a "major leap" in the financial system.

Central banks and regulators have mostly been sceptical if not downright hostile to cryptocurrencies, which were

developed using digital blockchains, a technology that allowed for decentralised management of trading assets.

Proponents of the technology lauded its decentralised structure and often anonymous transactions that took control out of the hands of government institutions like central banks.

But central banks have begun to test the waters of the technology, with the BIS taking a leading role. — AFP

Netflix CEO says \$2.5 bln investment an ‘opportunity’ for S Korea

NETFLIX'S \$2.5 billion investment in South Korea is an “opportunity” for local business, the streaming giant's CEO said Thursday, as he played down a dispute with local internet companies over network usage.

South Korea is one

of Netflix's biggest suppliers of television series and films, and boss Ted Sarandos said it was “investing for the long term” in the country, which has given the company global hits Squid Game and The Glory. Outlining how the \$2.5 billion — announced

in April in Washington while Korean President Yoon Suk Yeol was on a state visit — would be spent, Sarandos praised the “amazing partnership between the Korean creative community and Netflix”. “But I believe we’re just scratching the surface of what’s possible,” he added, vowing to invest heavily in training South Korea’s next generation of storytellers, in addition to boosting funding for original shows.

“We have to invest in their talent collectively as an industry. Between 2022 and 2025, for example, one in five Netflix titles in Korea will have come from a first-time writer or director,” he said. — AFP

INDIA and the United States partnership will serve as the driving engine behind sustainable and inclusive global growth, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said on Wednesday.

Addressing the 'Skilling for Future' event at the National Science Foundation, PM Modi emphasized the need to nurture a pipeline of talent to sustain the growth momentum between the

two countries.

"To maintain growth momentum, India and the US need a pipeline of talent. On the one hand, the US has top-class educational institutions and advanced technologies. On the other hand, India has the world's biggest youth factory.

That is why, I believe that the India-US partnership will prove to be the engine of sustainable and inclusive global growth," PM Modi at the National Science Foundation in Alexandria, Virginia in the US.

Earlier on Wednesday, PM Modi arrived in Washington DC and received a ceremonial welcome as well as a Guard of Honour at the airbase.

PM Modi will, later on, attend the state dinner to which he was invited by US President Joe Biden and the first lady.— ANI

Protesters shouted "No to NATO" and unfurled a red banner reading "NATO wars

millions dead" moments before an address by foreign minister Micheal Martin at University College Cork.

The consultation, which ends next Tuesday, follows the decision by previously non-aligned Finland and Sweden to reappraise decades of neutrality

in the face of Kremlin aggression.

But the debate in Ireland over pursuing NATO membership has stoked passions and threatened to divert the course followed by successive governments since the outbreak of World War II.— AFP

Seven ASEAN Countries Join - Thai-Myanmar Talks a Success

DESPITE the absence of three ASEAN countries, talks with the Myanmar Government initiated by Thailand were a "success" and participated by as many as nine countries including India and China, Thai media reports said.

Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister of Thailand Don Pramudwinai held unofficial talks with some foreign ministers of ASEAN countries as well as Than Swe, Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Myanmar Government in Thailand on 19 June. In response to criticism that the caretaker government should wait for the new government to address the issue, Don said he cannot wait until the new government is in power. If there is an opportunity, everyone should contribute to addressing the issue as soon as possible. There must be constant discussions even if it is exhausting. We have to look after the interests of the country, he said.

Indonesia, Singapore and Malaysia did not attend. Both India and China sent representatives. In total nine countries participated, seven of them are ASEAN Members, one news agency reported.

Caretaker Prime Minister Gen Prayut Chan-o-cha said his government was not siding with any countries. He also defended Don's action on Myanmar and rejected criticism that the caretaker government should not make such a move, even if some ASEAN foreign ministers oppose participation. The public sees that this could have an impact on the perception of ASEAN's image and credibility.

This matter is about finding a solution within ASEAN and it is necessary that we have talks. In the past, we all looked at different perspectives. We need to put ourselves in an appropriate position. In the past, we have followed our policy, which is to fully comply with the internal ASEAN resolutions on Myanmar. But if we look at it from a different angle, we would be more affected than others or not," said Gen Prayut.

PM Gen Prayut said that Thailand shares a long land border of over 3,000 kilometres with Myanmar and also has maritime boundaries. There is cross-border trade worth billions of dollars each year, and some gas and oil resources come from Myanmar. These matters need to be discussed, taking into account what Thailand has to lose, he said.

Ukrainian strike hits Crimea bridge

A Ukrainian strike damaged a bridge that connects south Ukraine to the annexed Crimean peninsula, a Russian official said on Thursday as tensions again rose over a Moscow-held nuclear power plant. Fighting has increased in occupied parts of Ukraine's south and east with the start of Kyiv's long-awaited offensive and that has included strikes far behind enemy lines.

"During the night a strike hit the Chongar bridge. There are no victims," Sergei Aksyonov, the Russia-installed governor of Crimea, said on Telegram. The bridge connects Crimea, which Russia annexed from Ukraine in 2014, to a part of the Ukrainian region of Kherson that is held by Moscow.— AFP

China-France ties have global significance, China ready to expand two-way opening-up — Chinese premier

CHINESE Premier Li Qiang said Wednesday that France, as a permanent member of the UN Security Council and a major country with an independent spirit, is a comprehensive strategic partner of China, and China-France relations have maintained a high level of development and always carried global significance that goes far beyond the bilateral scope.

In April this year, Chinese President Xi Jinping and French President Emmanuel Macron reached a series of strategic consensus, outlining a beautiful blueprint for China-France comprehensive strategic partnership and pointing out the direction for China-France cooperation at bilateral, China-Europe and global levels, Li said upon his arrival in Paris for an official visit to France.

The premier said China is ready to work with France to expand two-way opening-up,

build more resilient industrial and supply chains between

China and France and between China and Europe, deepen peo-

ple-to-people exchanges and mutual learning, and jointly ad-

dress global challenges such as climate change and sustainable development, so as to inject new impetus into the sustained, sound and steady growth of China-France relations, and inject more confidence and strength into world peace, stability and development.

China is ready to work with France to turn the blueprint for the development of China-France relations drawn up by the two countries' heads of state into working plans and reality, Li said.

At the invitation of the French government, Li arrived at Paris Orly Airport on Wednesday afternoon by chartered plane to pay an official visit to France and attend the Summit for a New Global Financing Pact. State Councilor and Secretary-General of the State Council Wu Zhenglong, among other accompanying officials, arrived on the same plane. — Xinhua

Pentagon leak suspect pleads not guilty

JACK Teixeira, the US airman accused of leaking top secret Pentagon documents in an online chat forum, pleaded not guilty on Wednesday to charges that could send him to prison for decades.

The 21-year-old Massachusetts Air National Guard IT specialist was arrested in April for allegedly orchestrating the most damaging leak of US classified documents in a decade.

He is facing six counts of retaining and transmitting national defence information. They each carry sentences of up to 10 years in prison. Teixeira appeared before Magistrate Judge David Hennessy in Worcester, Massachusetts, on Wednesday and entered a plea of not guilty to each of the charges, according to court documents.

His lawyer asked that Teixeira be released pending trial but the judge denied the request.

Teixeira is suspected of posting the documents — some dated as recently as early March — to a private chat group on the social media platform Discord. Some of the files later appeared on other sites, including Twitter, 4Chan and Telegram. — AFP

Britain's National Portrait Gallery reopens after 3-year renovation

THE National Portrait Gallery in London reopened to the public on Thursday following a three-year closure for renovation, seeking to make its updated collection more "representative" of modern Britain. An exhibition of previously unseen photographs by Paul McCartney is set to go on display following the refurbishment, which cost £41.3 million (\$52.8 million) and saw the creation of public spaces, a new visitor entrance and a learning centre.

The gallery also sought to "readdress the balance of what we show, to make it more inclusive and representative of Brit-

ain today," chief curator Alison Smith said. She said that previously there were more portraits

of men than women and now "48 per cent of the works on display are female sitters". — AFP

Outrage boils year after deadly Spain-Morocco border crush

THE death of at least 23 migrants during an attempt to cross into Spain's North African enclave of Melilla from Morocco one year ago prompted an outcry over police actions, but advocates say no-one has been held responsible.

Some 2,000 migrants —

many from conflict-torn Sudan — stormed the metres-high fence that seals off Melilla from Morocco on 24 June 2022, and clashed with border officers, according to Spanish authorities.

Despite the clamour over the way Moroccan and Spanish police

repelled them, no authorities in either country have been officially accused of wrongdoing.

"There is total impunity," Miguel Urban Crespo, a far-left Spanish member of the European parliament who has pushed for greater accountability in the

case, told AFP.

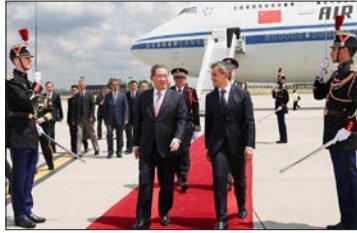
"It's a terrible precedent for Europe, for Spain." The death toll from last year's tragedy — at least 23 according to Morocco, at least 37 according to Amnesty and independent experts — was the worst in years of attempted

migrant crossings into Melilla.

At least 76 other migrants were missing, according to rights groups. Morocco said some migrants died after falling from the fence while others suffocated as people panicked and a stampede started. — AFP

Myanmar national futsal team head coach Mr Bunlert Charoenwong expressed his feeling about the situation that came out of the drawing-lots ceremony.

“I am satisfied with the results of the group division. But all the countries are playing futsal well and have strong teams, so I cannot take it lightly. We will prepare the team to the best of our ability,” the head coach said.

The futsal qualifiers will be held in the first week of October, and the Myanmar national futsal team has been training since 19 June, as stated by the Myanmar Football Federation. — KZL



Olympic chief criticizes Ukraine for ‘sanctioning’ its own athletes

OLYMPIC chief Thomas Bach on Thursday criticized the Ukrainian government for “sanctioning” its own athletes by not allowing them to compete in recent global competitions.

Athletes from Russia and Belarus have faced sanctions from a multitude of sports since Russia invaded Ukraine in February last year.

As Moscow’s assault on Ukraine stretches into a second year, the International Olympic Committee (IOC) has recommended allowing athletes from Russia and Moscow ally Belarus to compete as individual neutrals in international com-

petitions.

Their presence has led to boycotts by Ukrainian athletes.

“At the respective judo and taekwondo championships, the Ukrainian athletes were absent,” Bach said in a speech to the 140th IOC Session in Lausanne.

“Why? Because they had not been allowed to participate following the instructions of the Ukrainian sports ministry. In other words, the Ukrainian athletes are being sanctioned by their own government for the war that has been started by the Russian and Belarusian governments.” — AFP

Man City’s Gundogan set to join Barcelona: reports

MANCHESTER City midfielder Ilkay Gundogan is set to leave the treble winners to join Barcelona on a free transfer, according to reports on Wednesday.

Gundogan is believed to have been offered a three-year deal by Barcelona and is expected to complete his move to the Spanish champions when his City contract expires at the end of June.

City were reported to have been willing to give their 32-year-old captain a new one-year contract with the option of a further 12 months.

But Gundogan’s impending move to the Camp Nou was revealed on the same day City agreed a £30 million (\$38 million) deal to sign Chelsea midfielder Mateo Kovacic.

Kovacic’s versatility and experience would help compensate for the loss of the influential Gundogan, whose leadership and knack for scoring crucial goals played a key role in City’s success in Pep Guardiola’s reign.

Gundogan netted twice in City’s FA Cup final victory over Manchester United this season before Guardiola’s Premier League champions went on to beat Inter Milan in the Champions League final.

The Germany international played 51 games this term, scoring 11 goals including six in his last seven appearances during the tense treble run-in.

City are only the second English side to win all three major trophies in a single season.

Gundogan will be fondly remembered by City fans as one of the understated touchstones of their club’s golden era.

The former Borussia Dortmund midfielder has won five Premier League titles, two FA Cups, four League Cups and the Champions League in his seven years at City. — AFP
