The total number of patients who have recovered from COVID-19 in the country reached 619,727 including 14 new recoveries. The death toll from COVID-19 in the country registered 19,494 on 19-7-2023 with no new death reported from the pandemic. 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Bogyoke Aung San Museum bustling with visitors on Martyrs' Day

MORE than 3,000 visitors, including Buddhist monks, people and students, visited the Bogyoke Aung San Museum located in Bahan township, Yangon, on the 76th Martyrs' Day that falls on 19 July 2023.

The museum which was once the house of General Aung San who was a linchpin in attempting independence of Myanmar is slated to open as a special show starting on 19 July up till 21 July from 7 am to 5 pm. The museum is normally open to the public from 9:30 am to 4:30 pm daily except on Mondays and days of special significance.

"The Bogyoke Aung San Museum is open as a special show, on 76th Martyrs' Day. The signpost is placed in the museum. The car the general used is on display around the entrance of the museum. You can view the historic documents and photos of the general on 18 boards along the driveway to the museum. On the balcony of the museum, you can see the silicon replica of the general

reading in the deck chair. The books the general read, the lighter bearing his name and the ashtray and the cigar box are among the display items. From there on, you can see the furniture in the dining room of the family of the general. There are 5 boards depicting his childhood, his university student life, and his life as a political and military leader and state leader. Following the study in the dining room, there are two boards on which the life events of the general are described briefly in both Myanmar and English and are waiting for you. Besides, the brief history of Bogyoke Aung San Museum (Yangon) described in English, Myanmar bilingually is displayed in the exterior corridor of the museum. On the wav back inside lies the settee and furniture which the family of the general used, the long coat given as a present by Mr Jawaharlal Nehru who was a great leader of India, the radio, the oil painting by artist U Ngwe Gaing which portrayed



the general growing plants, the photograph of the family of the general, the bust of the general, the painting and the family photo, and the chair where the general sat," explained Daw Nyo Nyo Yin Mauk, an official of the Bogyoke Aung San Museum (Yangon).

In short, the new generations should look up the martial power and wisdom and bravery of Bogyoke Aung San and try hard like him if necessary.

'T'S been a harsh summer in the northern hemisphere. People literally died of the heat during the past few weeks. There were about 16 per cent more deaths in the UK than normal for that time. Elsewhere, there has been immense climate-related suffering horrific heat waves in India and China, and devastating floods in Pakistan, China and Uganda.

About everyone got the message by now combatting climate change is not something we can put off until the future - it is already starting to bite when it comes to putting some teeth behind our actions, however, what kind of diet might help?

What is the most climate-friendly diet and what is the trade-off of malnourishment?

According to the latest report by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), a plant-based diet is the biggest behavioural shift a person can make to reduce their individual greenhouse-gas emissions. Food choice falls into the "shift" rather than "avoid" category, because the global food system is responsible for about a quarter of human emissions.

But the exact definition of the term" plant-based" is still unclear. To some people, it means cutting out all animal products, but to many, it encompasses a

low-meat diet. It can mean vegan, vegetarian or flexitarian. Whatever the rules do, the plant-based food-eating society is booming. Vegetarians have increased from seven to nine per cent over the past year, while those declaring themselves are up from two to five per cent. Nearly a third of the surveyed want to eat less meat, whereas seven per cent plan to

Australians are the world's biggest red meat and milk consumers, outpacing even high-income North Americans. People in South Asian countries eat, on average about a 20th of typical red meat intake. Red meat sits at the pinnacles of greenhouse-gas-producing foods. Beef consistently leads the pack, followed by lamb, processed meats, pork and cheese. Milk in its unprocessed form falls lower on the scale. But product emissions depend on how they are produced.

Research shows that cutting out meat still significantly lowers diet-related emissions. A University of Otago study found that compared with most European

diets, vegetarianism cut emissions by 30 per cent and veganism by 33 per cent. Another study showed that meatless but dairyrich fare cut dietary emissions

by nearly a quarter. A century from now, when the eater will have died, the methane emissions associated with will have largely finished exerting their powerful warming effect and broken down.

However, if younger generations keep eating meat, they're likely to keep methane levels elevated. The important message is that changing your diet to reduce your meat intake can significantly reduce dietary emissions. As with all trends, individual changes may not make a huge difference on their own, but collectively they have a multiplier effect. And they can also have important ramifications for other issues, such as land use, health, and animal

Land use matters because if people can be fed from the land, there's more space to restore or preserve native forests and wetlands. Those ecosystems sequester more carbon than land

comparatively denuded for agriculture or crops. Because it takes a lot of land to feed cattle, beef production is considered particularly tough on the environment, regardless of whether the cattle graze pasture or are fed crop and crop residues. Such

calculations also rate a portion of food as more climate-friendly if its production is more intensive and therefore spares land. However, this assumes that freed-up land is actually used for carbon-sequestering ecosystems.

There are other consequenc-

es to eating less meat that are so positive and it's crazy not to consider it. For most people in the developed world, eating less meat is a good idea. Moreover, cutting back on meat lessens the harmful effects on health. Most studies show vegetarian, vegan and low-meat diets reduce the risk of developing what most Westerners die of cardiovascular disease, cancer and type 2

The evidence from numerous studies showed that a decrease in meat consumption in many countries would benefit both human and planetary health. All the food and nutrition guidelines being developed in countries around the world are shifting their emphasis towards a plant-based diet and reducing the consumption of meat. Diet is by far the biggest risk factor in the world for disease and early death. Diets high in salt., sugar and low in fruits and vegetables account for about 18 per cent of disease outbreaks and that's twice the impact of tobacco.

The global food system is responsible for human and environmental health*"syndemic". Of the types of food that have health impacts, ultra-processed foods are the worst. Sugar, confectionery, French fries and chocolate biscuits are plant-based but definitely not whole foods.

Plant-based needs to be qualified as whole foods. A massive

amount of international data showed that a diet high in red meat is, indeed, a risk factor for disease and early death. Processed meat is the worst

When people reduce meat, they typically eat far more plantbased foods if they can choose healthy options. Those food productions come at. Similarly, patients should lean on their medical providers to help them navigate the complex disease, including having a conversation around strategies for remembering to take their med-

Illegal timbers, crude oil, animals, consumer goods, electronics and vehicles confiscated

ON 14 July, at the Ywathagyi Dry Port, the Customs Department's special inspection team intercepted a Mitsubishi Fuso truck valued at around K40 million, transporting 150 Bonny track bicycles (worth K7.2 million) from Muse to Yangon. The quantity of bicycles exceeded the Import Declaration (ID) limit, leading to the action being taken under Customs procedures.

On 16 July, a joint team at the 16th-Mile Kyaukchaw checkpoint intercepted a Toyota Hilux approximately valued at K30 million, transporting various goods worth K4,347 million, including a teak settee without proper documentation, destined for Pyin Oo Lwin from Mandalay. The confiscated goods were handed over to the Patheingyi Township Forest Department, and appropriate action was taken under Customs procedures.

On 17 July, the on-duty

teams seized two types of goods valued at K14,831,313, which included 10,595 kilograms of solar mounting and accessories. These goods exceeded the 60-day validity of the VPA and lacked proper license approval. The seizure took place at the Myanmar International Terminals (Thilawa). Additionally, at the Yangon International Airport, two types of goods valued at K3.75 million, consisting of 50 East watches (women), were confiscated due to the absence of official documents. The actions were carried out by Customs procedures.

Furthermore, an unregistered Honda Odyssey vehicle (estimated value of K5 million) was seized near the entrance to Shwebo, and two unregistered Lifan tricycles were apprehended in Monywa township. The actions were conducted under the Export and Import Law.

Likewise, the inspection teams seized an Isuzu truck and a Hino truck (estimated value of K160 million) transporting smuggled cattle (25 buffaloes and 21 oxen) valued at K17 million at the Anawrahta Bridge checkpoint in Chauk township. Additionally, a Toyota Probox (estimated value of K3 million) carrying 144 gallons of illegal petroleum and crude oil (worth K342,000) was intercepted on Minbu-Kyauktan-Maungmakan Road in Minbu township, and a total of 0.265 tonne of illegal timber (worth K54,000) was discovered near Pathein-Monywa Road in Mindon township. These actions were taken under the **Essential Supplies and Service** Law, Public Property Protection Law, and Forest Law.

On 18 July, a joint team, headed by Bago Township Forest Department, confiscated a total of 9.321 tonnes of illegal teak and other timbers valued at K5,140,272 near the banks of Shwedaung Creek in Bago township. The action was carried out under the Forest Law.

According to the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee, a total of 17 arrests were conducted on 14, 16, 17, and 18 July, involving items with an estimated value of K291,964,585.

The Wall of the bedroom of the general is poised with the portrait picture of the general and the picture of him and his wife. The reading room lying next to it is also for observation. The hand-written script of Maung Aung San Linn who died on 16 January 1953, along with three bedsteads, a wardrobe, a dressing table, photographs and manuscript books of Maung Aung San Linn, toys and reading books are exhibited in the bedroom of the children.

The digital display shows documentary pictures of the general as well as his speech and history bilingually in the bedroom that reveals family photos and the photographs of the general's mother and family members. In the special meeting room next to the bedroom of children, a set of settees and excerpts from the speeches by the general are displayed. When you go downstairs from the corridor near the back door of the children's bedroom, you can see the statute of the general growing kitchen crops in the yard. Heavy rainfall causes only little damage to paddy cultivation in Shwebo



EL Niño might cause less rainfall and could disrupt the rice supply across Asia, which accounts for 90 per cent of global production of rice, experts warned. However, Myanmar has had heavy rainfall in recent days and only little damage occurs.

Flooding triggered by Cyclone Mocha in May 2023 negatively affected the crops stored along the river in the Sinphyukyun area, Magway Region, leaving some residents dead as well.

Heavy rainfalls usually lead to flooding, landslides, and damage to road systems and crops. However, it has been many years since flooding does not happen in delta regions. Flooding hindered road transportation before 2010 on Yangon-Pathein Road, Ko Phoe Cho, a former owner of Pathein's highway express, told the Global New Light of Myanmar.

Some delta regions experience two high tides and low tides a day. But the residents can use other roads instead.

There is normal rainfall in Myanmar's rice-producing areas Ayeyawady, Bago, Yangon and Sagaing regions. The paddy growing season is going to end and rice plants can survive floods for a few days.

Despite the El Nino climate pattern this year, Myanmar ex-

perienced heavy rainfalls as a consequence of Cyclone Mocha. Rainfalls fed well some upper Myanmar regions in need, making growing activities go well. However, there are some warnings for crops grown under an intercropping system which require a high irrigation water supply in the late monsoon season.

In early 2023, rainfalls destroyed some garlic at harvest time, pushing the price to the highest of K9,000-10,000 per viss in history.

Consumers have concerns over the possible inflation if the weather has an impact on the crops. – TWA/EM

3 children dead in floods in Mawlamyine, affecting 56 households in Mudon

FLOODING in Mawlamyine Township has tragically claimed the lives of three children, while 56 households in Mudon have been affected, as reported by social assistance organizations.

The heavy rains that per-

sisted since 17 July caused floods in Mawlamyine. A one-anda-half-year-old girl was found drowned in her yard after going missing while with her grandmother on 19 July around 10 am.

Similarly, two 13-year-old

children were reported missing after drowning in the lower part of Thirimyine 8 Street. After an extensive search by social rescue teams, their lifeless bodies were discovered after 3 pm. In Mudon, including Mawlamyine, Mon State, continuous rain since 18 July resulted in water entering houses in Myoma Ward 4, Okekyin Village, and Beyan Village. To provide emergency relief, 56 households comprising 230 individuals were temporarily relocated to Mudon Oo Basic Education Primary School and Aungthaindi Monastic School, as informed by Ko Latt, a member of the local social assistance association, to the Global New Light of Myanmar (GNLM).

Efforts are being made by responsible personnel, relevant administration bodies, social assistance members, and residents to support the affected people and their livelihoods. Additionally, the Health Department is actively providing healthcare services to the flood victims. — TWA/CT

US industrial output declines in June for second straight month



Production at US factories dropped for a second straight month in June as output of motor vehicles and a range of other goods declined, suggesting that higher interest rates were hurting the manufacturing sector. **PHOTO: AFP**

US industrial production fell by more than analysts expected last month, the Federal Reserve said Tuesday, with a sharp contraction in output seen in consumer durables like automotive products and carpeting. June marked the second consecutive monthly decline, reversing some of the positive figures seen earlier this year and providing further evidence of slowing production as the Fed prepares to weigh another inter-

est rate hike next week.

The 0.5 per cent dip in industrial production was driven by a steep contraction in the index for consumer durables—like appliances, furniture and carpeting—which fell by 2.7 per cent, according to the Fed.

Consumer nondurables also contracted by 0.9 per cent due to decreases in clothing, energy, as well as food and tobacco production. The monthly decline was below the median expectation of economists surveyed by MarketWatch. The only gain last month came from defence and space equipment, which rose by 1.5 per cent. "In short, overall industrial production and manufacturing output were weaker than expected" to end the second quarter, High Frequency Economics' chief US economist Rubeela Farooqi wrote in a note to clients. — AFP

EU digital chief urges TikTok to quickly adopt new rules

THE European commissioner overseeing the digital market on Wednesday urged Chinese video-sharing platform TikTok to accelerate its adoption of new EU standards.

Strict new European rules on transparency, data privacy, child protection, disinformation and hate speech come into effect next month, and internet giants are racing to comply.

On Monday, TikTok conducted a "stress test" on its systems at it European head-quarters in Dublin, to find out if it could adapt to comply with the EU Digital Services Act.

Afterwards, European Commissioner Thierry Breton called TikTok CEO Shou Zi Chew to hear how it went, warning him: "Now is time to accelerate to be fully compliant." In June, Breton sent the same message to US platform Twitter after it performed a similar stress test, designed to check its own ability to moderate suspect content.

The DSA became law in November, but the web's 19 biggest players — platforms such as Amazon, Apple, Google, Meta and Microsoft — have until 25 August to get in line. — AFP

Steep drop puts S Africa inflation back within target range

SOUTH African inflation dropped to the lowest level in 20 months in June, slipping back within the central bank's target range, official data showed Wednesday.

Annual consumer price inflation slowed to 5.4 per cent last month, down from 6.3 per cent in

May, national statistics agency StatsSA said in a statement.

The drop was the steepest since May 2020 and brought the rate within the Reserve Bank's three per cent to six per cent target range for the first time since April 2022, the agency said.

"The rate in June is the lowest reading in 20 months," it said.

Price rises for food and non-alcoholic beverages slowed to 11 per cent from a high of 14 per cent in March.

Prices of oils and fats also decreased for a tenth consecutive month. Wine and beer were instead on the up, pushing prices for alcoholic beverages and tobacco to 6.1 per cent from 5.9 per cent in May. — AFP

US economist renounces EU job after Macron doubts

A US economist has decided not to take up a job advising the European Commission, after French president Emmanuel Macron expressed doubts about hiring an American for the role.

Yale University professor and big tech expert Fiona Scott Morton had been hired as chief economist by EU competition commissioner Margrethe Vestager, to advise on anti-trust strategy.

But her appointment was later criticized by French politicians as well as by several EU lawmakers from both the right and the left. On Tuesday, Macron weighed in.

This was followed by the intervention of five of Vestager's colleagues on the commission, who broke ranks to urge EU chief Ursula von der Leyen to reconsider the appointment.

Macron said that the EU executive hiring an American had raised "many questions" — noting that neither the United States nor China would hire a foreigner to such a job.

He suggested that, whatever Scott Morton's qualifications, having her advise the commission on how to regulate US tech giants was not "coherent" with his vision of EU strategic autonomy. — AFP

Volvo Group truck sales jump, but orders drop

SWEDISH truck maker Volvo Group reported Wednesday a sharp uptick in quarterly sales that beat expectations, but orders for new vehicles declined.

The company, which also makes buses and construction equipment, reported an 18 per cent increase in revenue to 140.8 billion kronor (\$13.8 billion) in the second quarter, compared to the same

period a year earlier.

"We are gradually entering into a more normalized demand situation with record strong profitability and high operational performance," Volvo Group CEO Martin Lundstedt said. Analysts surveyed in separate reports by Bloomberg and financial data firm FactSet had forecast net sales of around 135 billion kronor. — AFP

Foreign arrivals to Japan top 10 mln, $1^{\rm st}$ time since pre-COVID era

FOREIGN arrivals to Japan from January to June topped 10 million for the first time since the same period in 2019 before the coronavirus pandemic, as the country sees a continued recovery in inbound travelers, government data showed Wednesday.

Japan saw 10.71 million arrivals in the six months, equivalent to 64.4 per cent of the level seen from January to June in 2019 and exponentially higher than the 507,630

logged in the same period in 2022, the Japan Nation-

al Tourism Organization said.

By country or region, the most arrivals came from South Korea at 3.13 million, followed by 1.77 million from Chinese Taipei, 972,200 from the United States and 909,700 from Hong Kong, it said.

Arrivals from China, which continues to restrict overseas group travel for its citizens, remained at 594,600, with a recovery level of 13.1 per cent compared to the January to June period in 2019, it said.

Hoping to attract tourists, Iran looks to neighbours

IRAN, largely shunned by western tourists, is making a push to attract visitors from wealthy Gulf Arab states and other nearby countries to boost its sanctions-hit economy.

The Islamic republic is also drawing more visitors from Russia and China to its ancient sites that date back to the Persian empire and the fabled Silk Road, industry figures say.

Iran's Beijing-brokered diplomatic thaw this year with Saudi Arabia paved the way for direct flights, and Tehran is also seeking closer ties with other countries from

Egypt to Morocco.

The slow but steady change is noticable at major tourist sights where more visitors can now be heard speaking not English, French or German, but Arabic, Chinese and Russian.

"In the past, we were receiving many tourists from Europe but now those numbers have seen a sharp decline," said one Tehran travel agency owner, 46-year-old Hamid Shateri.

Europeans are "afraid of visiting Iran", he said, after years of tensions over the country's contested nuclear programme and after Western government warnings against travelling there.

"These days, mostly Chinese and Russian people visit Iran's historical sites and spectacular scenery and Arab tourists, especially from Iraq, come to attend religious ceremonies." — AFP

Kidswear brand Catimini to close 44 stores

FRENCH childrenswear brand Catimini is set to close 44 stores across France, Belgium, and Luxembourg, as part of a business recovery plan.

On Tuesday, the brand announced plans to close 44 stores by December as part of a recovery plan proposed to reduce losses suffered by the company, which was already in financial difficulty when it joined the IDKIDS group in 2020.

"On 18 July, the management team presented staff representatives with a company recovery plan, which should reduce losses and allow the brand to be redeployed, "Catimini said in a press release. The plan foresees the closure

Thai reformist Pita's PM bid crashes on establishment opposition

THAI reformist leader Pita Limjaroenrat's bid to become prime minister ended Wednesday, despite his party winning the most votes in May elections, after the military and pro-royalist establishment blocked his bid for power.

Pita's Move Forward Party (MFP) has ridden high on the support of young and urban Thais frustrated by nearly a decade of army-backed rule, but its efforts to form a government have stumbled. The 42-year-old was dramatically suspended from parliament while seated in the chamber for discussions on his candidacy, which came to an end when law-makers voted to refuse considering him for a second ballot.

"I would like to say goodbye until we meet again," he said, raising his fist as he left the assembly floor to the cheers of party

Pita's suspension came when Thailand's Consitutional Court said it would proceed with a case that could see the leader disqualified from parliament altogether for owning shares in a media company.

Lawmakers are forbidden from doing so under Thailand's constitution, though the television station in question has not broadcast since 2007.

Pita, Harvard-educated and wealthy from a family-run agrifood business, has said the shares were inherited from his father. He has 15 days to respond to the case. After he left the parliament, lawmakers voted by a large margin to rule that he could not be considered for the post a second time. — AFP

Search for missing paused in Colombia after landslide kills 15

RESCUE teams temporarily suspended efforts to search for survivors Tuesday after a land-slide triggered by heavy rains left at least 15 people dead and more than a dozen missing in central Colombia, authorities said.

Several homes were destroyed and a major trade artery blocked after torrential rains hit the Quetame municipality in Colombia's Cundinamarca department late Monday.

"We have at this moment a count of 15 people who were found lifeless," firefighting captain Alvaro Farfan said in a video sent to the media Tuesday night, adding that there were six people injured.

Farfan said nightfall had forced rescue teams to suspend their search for potential survivors but that they would resume in the morning. Thirteen people remained missing.

As the death toll and number of missing rose throughout the day, civil defence director Jorge Diaz told AFP earlier Tuesday that authorities were trying to find out how many residents lived in the 20 houses that were razed in the deluge.

Ukraine says Russia targeting grain sites after deal exit

UKRAINE accused Russia on Wednesday of deliberately striking its Black Sea grain facilities—and destroying tonnes of food—since Moscow quit an export deal meant to stave off a global crisis.

Kyiv's allegations came as a fire of unclear origin broke out at a military site in Russian-annexed Crimea, prompting local officials to call for the evacuation of thousands of civilians.

Military sites on the peninsula, a key supply artery for Russia's war in Ukraine, have been hit repeatedly in recent months.

Russia, for its part, fired strikes at Ukraine's Odesa for the second night in a row, with the defence ministry claiming to have struck fuel and ammunition facilities near the Black Sea port.

But Ukraine President Volodymyr Zelensky claimed Russia was taking aim at the very basis of the now-lapsed grain deal, which was brokered last by the UN and Türkiye amid fears of food shortages in vulnerable nations. — AFP

US soldier who crossed into North Korea had served time in S Korean jail: official

A US soldier who served around two months in a South Korean jail on assault charges was believed to be in North Korean custody Wednesday after crossing the heavily fortified border without authorization, officials

The soldier — identified by the US military as Travis King, a private second class who has been in the army since 2021 crossed the border "willfully and without authorization," US Forces Korea spokesman Colonel Isaac Taylor said. The United Nations Command said he had been on a Joint Security Area (JSA) orientation tour, adding he was believed to be in North Korean custody and that it was working with Pyongyang's military to "resolve this incident". — AFP

Senior Chinese diplomat meets Henry Kissinger

WANG Yi, director of the Office of the Foreign Affairs Commission of the Communist Party of China (CPC) Central Committee, met with former US Secretary of State Henry Kissinger in Beijing on Wednesday.

Wang, also a member of the Political Bureau of the CPC Central Committee, said that Kissinger has made historic contributions to the ice-breaking development of China-US relations and played an irreplaceable role in enhancing mutual understanding between the two countries. "China cherishes its friendship with old friends."

China maintains a high degree of continuity in its policy towards the United States and follows the guiding principles of mutual respect, peaceful coexistence and win-win cooperation, Wang said.

"These three principles are fundamental and long-term, and are the way for China and the United States to get along correctly as two major countries," he added.

pointed out, adding that it is impossible to try to transform China, and it is even more impossible to contain China.

Expounding China's position on the Taiwan question, Wang emphasized that one China is the fundamental status quo of the Taiwan question.

"Taiwan independence" is incompatible with peace across the Taiwan Strait, and the one-China principle set out in the Shanghai Communique must be strictly adhered to, Wang said. "If the United States sincerely hopes for stability across the Taiwan Strait, it should clearly and openly oppose 'Taiwan independence' and draw a clear line with 'Taiwan independence' separatist activities."

Kissinger said both the United States and China have the ability to influence the world, and maintaining stable relations between the two countries has a bearing on world peace, stability and the well-being of humanity.

No matter how difficult it is, both sides should treat each other as equals and maintain contact, Kissinger said, adding that it is unacceptable to try to isolate the other side. — Xinhua

More than 700 sentenced to prison over French riots: minister

MORE than 700 people have already been jailed. been sentenced to prison over riots in France late last month, the country's justice minister said Wednesday, lauding the "firm" response of magistrates.

In total, 1,278 verdicts have been handed down, with over 95 per cent of defendants convicted on a range of charges from vandalism to attacking police

Six hundred people have

"It was extremely important to have a response that was firm and systematic," Justice Minister Eric Dupond-Moretti told RTL radio. "It was essential that we reestablish national order."

The most intense urban violence in France since 2005 began on 27 June after a police officer shot dead a 17-year-old boy with North African roots during a traffic stop west of Paris, in an incident recorded by a passerby.

The riots were contained after four nights of serious clashes thanks to the deployment of around 45,000 security forces, including elite police special forces and armoured vehicles.

Dupond-Moretti had led calls for courts to hand down harsh sentences as a deterrent, with some staying open over the weekend of the clashes to handle a backlog of cases. - AFP

Herzog to address US lawmakers amid anti-Israel tensions

THE US Congress prepared to welcome President Isaac Herzog Wednesday for a speech celebrating 75 years of Israeli independence, as a row over anti-Semitism highlighted fissures in Democratic Party support for the Middle Eastern ally.

Herzog holds a largely ceremonial role and is far less controversial than the country's Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, but President Joe Biden's party has nevertheless been convulsed by infighting over the visit. A handful of congressional Democrats are longstanding critics of the conservative-leaning Israeli government, accusing it of disenfranchising Palestinians, and have vowed to skip the joint meeting of the Senate and House. - AFP

Watchdog finds 'serious' Tunisia abuses against migrants

TUNISIAN security forces have committed "serious abuses" against black African migrants, Human Rights Watch said on Wednesday, calling on the European Union to suspend migration control funding to the country.

The New York-based watchdog said it had interviewed, since March, more than 20 migrants

and asylum seekers, almost all of whom reported suffering "human rights violations at the hands of Tunisian authorities".

Seven were among "up to 1,200 black Africans expelled or forcibly transferred by Tunisian security forces" to the country's desert border regions with Libya and Algeria this month.

AFP correspondents re-

ported on Sunday that Libyan border guards rescued dozens of migrants who were visibly exhausted and dehydrated, and who said Tunisian authorities had taken them there. This followed testimony from NGOs and witnesses to AFP a few days after hundreds were expelled from the Tunisian port city of Sfax in early July. — AFP

Senior Chinese diplomat meets Henry Kissinger

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The Republic of the Union of Myanmar State Administration Council: Twelve Objectives

1. Political affairs

- (a) To build a Union based on democracy and federalism, through a disciplined and genuine multiparty democratic system that is fair and just.
- (b) To prioritize the achievement of enduring peace for the entire nation in line with the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement (NCA).

- (d) To advance the socioeconomic life of the people, in order to ensure the country's prosperity and food security.

3. Social affairs

- (a) To ensure a strong and dynamic Union spirit, the genuine spirit of patriotism.
- (b) To respect and promote the customs and traditions of all National people and preserve and safeguard their faiths, beliefs, culture, and characteristics of patriotic nationalism
- (c) To strengthen basic health care in order to achieve the emergence of a health system that enhances the longevity and health of the entire
- (d) To comprehensively promote the education sector to make it capable of producing the human resources necessary for building a modern, developed, and progressive democratic nation.

Infantino says 'seize moment' in last-minute World Cup ticket plea

FIFA president Gianni Infantino on Wednesday urged fans to "seize the moment" and snap up Women's World Cup tickets, with most games yet to sell out on the eve of the tournament.

There have long been concerns about sales in New Zealand, which will stage the opening game on Thursday in Auckland when the co-hosts face Norway. Tickets were still available on Wednesday for the match.

Australia, the other host nation, face the Republic of Ireland in the second game on Thursday in a sell-out at Sydney's Stadium Australia, which can hold about 80,000 fans. FIFA secretary-general Fatma Samoura said that 1.375 million tickets have been sold for the month-long tournament in total, surpassing the overall figure for the 2019 Women's World Cup in France. That tournament however had 24 teams, compared with 32 for the upcoming one. — AFP

ANDRE Onana said that he couldn't resist the chance to play at Manchester United as the Cameroon goalkeeper prepares to join the Premier League giants after one season at Inter Milan.

Onana is set to sign for United in a deal worth a reported 55 million euros (\$62 million) after joining Inter last summer as a free agent and starring in their run to the Champions League final.

In an interview with the Gazzetta Dello Sport published on Wednesday he confirmed his transfer to Old Trafford, saying he couldn't wait to rejoin his former Ajax coach Erik ten Hag. "I really want to begin this new exciting adventure with a coach who as far as I'm concerned is a maestro," said Onana.

"I'm going to play in a great league and for a great club which has an enormous amount of history just like Inter. — AFP

Drawing-lots event for World Cup Qualifiers of Myanmar to kick-start on 27 July



A drawing-lots ceremony for the World Cup Qualifiers of team Myanmar will be convened on 27 July according to FIFA.

Myanmar, Indonesia, China Taipei, Maldives, Yemen, Afghanistan, Singapore, Nepal and Cambodia are falling in Pot 1 while Macao, Mongolia, Bhutan, Laos, Bangladesh, Brunei, Timor, Pakistan and North Mariana Island are placed in Pot 2.

The Asian Zone Qualifiers for the World Cup will be organized by the Asian Football Confederation and will be divided into stages.

According to the Asian Football Confederation, the lowest-ranked 18 teams released for July will play from the first round, while the nine winners qualify for the second round qualifiers.

The 27 teams that have the opportunity to play directly in the second-round qualifiers and the nine teams that participated in the first round totalling 36 will be divided into nine groups of four teams.

The Asian Football Confederation will hold the first and second rounds of the Asian Zone 2026 World Cup qualifiers together with the 2027 Asian Cup qualifiers, and only the third round qualifiers will be held separately.

The first-round qualifiers will be held on 12 October while the second round will be on 17 October. — Ko Nyi Lay/KZL
