Myanmar bags US\$166 mln from rice exports in past five months

The value of Myanmar's rice and broken rice exports crossed US\$166 million from over 380,000 tonnes in the past five months (April-August) of the current financial year 2023-2024, comprising

350,070 tonnes in maritime trade and 29,314 tonnes in border, according to the Myanmar Rice Federation (MRF).

The export volumes were registered at 87,648 tonnes worth \$36 million in April,

110,706 tonnes worth \$48 million in May, 62,725 tonnes worth \$28 million in June, 58,334 tonnes worth \$26 million in July and 59,971 tonnes worth \$28 million in August respectively.

18 more equal-sized votive tablets found at No 4 BEHS in Thaton township, Mon State

THE sacred tablets were found when the workers doing their soil work to construct a new building in the school compound located at Theingon Ward on 30 August. The tablets are currently placed on the shrine of the school, according to the General Administration Department, Thaton township.

“We had found such kind of votive tablets in Thaton four times in the past. In one of the events, we found more than 1,000 tablets,” an official from Thaton Township GAD said.

A similar event happened in a Baptist Church compound next to the above high school where a total of 240 votive tablets in different mudras (gesture or attitude) including damaged ones were found on 14 March 2019 while digging the soil to construct a new building, according to the official.

More than 650 votive tablets together with over 900 damaged pieces were found within a monastery precinct in the same ward of Theingon on 15 June, 15 July, 8

August and 15 September of 2015. Again, more than 1,000 votive tablets had been discovered in the compound of No 2 BEHS in Theingon Ward forty years ago, the official said.

The votive tablets found in different years carry the same design and size and are believed to have been crafted before the Bagan era while they are similar to the tablets made during the Pala-Sena era of South East India, now Bangladesh, archaeologists commented. — ASH/TH

Myanmar plans to export 24 containers of brooms to South Korea

MYANMAR will export 24 containers of brooms to South Korea this financial year, according to an official from Yangon Region General Trading Co-operative Union.

The organization also exported brooms that carry the note "Made in Myanmar" to the ROK since the 2022-2023 financial year and nearly two containers are being exported every month. A 40-foot container can carry nearly 35,000 brooms and about 840,000 are scheduled to be exported in 24 containers.

"The brooms are made with traditional methods using raw materials from broom grass (Thysanolaena) that naturally grow in forests. They win the foreign market because they can attract overseas buyers more than plastic brooms man-

ufactured employing modern technologies," said U Tin Myint, General Secretary of the Yangon Region General Trading Co-operative Union on 30 August.

Most of the brooms exported to ROK are manufactured by a cooperative in Shwepyitha township, Yangon Region. More cooperative firms will be formed in Hmawby and Taikkyi townships where most raw materials are available, to extend the business.

The brooms are currently exported to Malaysia, India and Thailand other than South Korea. The raw materials to make brooms are bought from Hmawby, Taikkyi townships in Yangon Region, Bago Region, Nay Pyi Taw and Rakhine State. — ASH/TH

Illegal medications, consumer goods, foodstuffs, motorbikes and vehicles confiscated

THE Customs on-duty teams conducted inspections on 29 and 30 August and captured nine kinds of goods worth K1,053,604,959 including 34,328 boxes of Metpure-XL without Import Licence and two kinds of goods worth K15,443,400 including 1,220 kilogrammes of Party Hat that were different from Import Declaration (ID) from containers at the Myanmar Industrial Port and 398 bicycle baskets that were not declared in the Import Declaration (ID) at the Asia World Port Terminal container checkpoint. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

On 30 August, the combined on-duty teams under the supervision of Mandalay Region Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force conducted inspections and nabbed a Higer bus (approximately K20 million), headed to Muse from Mandalay, carrying 1,140 kilogrammes of dried beef without official documents at the 16th-Mile Kyaukchaw checkpoint, a Mitsubishi Fuso truck (estimated value of K35 million), travelling from Muse to Mandalay, carrying four kinds of goods worth K8.3 million including 1,250 wallets that were not declared in the ID at the Milepost 21/4 on Muse- Mandalay road and a Nissan UD truck carrying 1,350 Peanut bags and 2,847 black sesame bags worth K196.35 million without official documents at the Than village police checkpoint on Mandalay-Han-

myintmo-Aungban-Taunggyi route. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

An unregistered Toyota ToyoAce Box truck (approximately K25 million) was seized near the No 2 market bus station on Thudamma road in North Oakkalapa township on 30 August. The action was taken under the respective Law.

The combined team confiscated a Higer bus (approximately K35 million), headed to Mandalay from Myawlamyine, carrying 15 kinds of goods worth K21,807,686 including 49.5 kilogrammes of Wai Wai instant rice vermicelli, 240 packages of M&D Cake and a Honda click 150 without official documents near Shwethanlwin Tollgate in Phayagyi on 30 August. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

The Myawady District Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force made a surprise check to a convenience store in Myawady on 31 August and confiscated two kinds of goods (estimated value of K950,000) including 1,000 M-150 energy drinks without official documents. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

A total of 20 arrests were made on three consecutive days from 29 to 31 August, with an estimated value of K1,461,052,045, as reported by the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee. — MNA/ MKKS

Aquatic product exports surge past US\$214 mln in just five months

ACCORDING to statistics provided by the Ministry of Commerce, the export of aquatic products to foreign countries generated US\$214.42 million between April and August this financial year.

During this period, approximately 70 per cent of foreign trade was conducted through sea exports. Simultaneously, it has been reported that exports to China, Thailand, Bangladesh and India occurred via border trade.

In the same period of the previous financial year (2022-2023), the export of aquatic products earned US\$239.21 million.

Myanmar's aquatic products are exported to foreign countries through both normal trade and border trade channels. These exports adhere to the rules established by the respective countries, and the production and export processes for aquatic products are systematically planned and executed to ensure they are free from pathogens.

Myanmar's aquatic products are exported to various foreign countries, including Japan and European nations, through regular trade channels. Aquatic products such as shrimp and fish are regularly exported through the Muse, Myawady, Kawthoung, Sittway, Myeik, and Maungtau land borders to China, Thailand and neighbouring countries. — TWA/KZW

Consumers have now access to reference prices of palm oil

SOME edible oil shops at Bayintnaung, and Nyaungpinlay wholesale markets in Yangon and wholesale markets in other regions are crowded with buyers as they started offering palm oil at reference prices from the last week of August 2023, the sellers involved at Bayintnaung and Nyaungpinlay markets said.

The oil importing companies distributed over three million visses of palm oil to the do-

mestic markets at the wholesale reference price of K4,155 per viss on 28-30 August.

Even one leading palm oil importing company sold over 1.7 million visses of palm oil those days.

The consumers get access to a reference price of K4,400 per viss at certain shops in the wholesale market, and photos are posted daily on social media.

An individual can buy up to

10 visses of palm oil if they can present a copy of the national scrutiny card and provide a contact number.

Approximately 8,000 tonnes of palm oil were imported in the country on 30 August and around 9,000 tonnes of oil were scheduled to arrive in the Port, citing the edible oil market reports. A tonne of palm oil is equivalent to around 600 visses.

The authorities have already

notified the public of lodging complaints for overcharging. The wholesalers are entitled to make a two-per-cent profit margin.

For the week ending 3 September, the CIF prices stood at US\$934 per tonne of palm oil. The original price of palm oil was K4,076 per viss when it was calculated at an exchange rate of K2,513. The wholesale reference price is set at K4,155 this week.

"We could buy two 10-viss containers of palm oil at wholesale reference price at Nyaungpinlay market," a trader who resells the palm oil in regions outside Yangon said.

The Union minister for Commerce attended the coordination meeting on the stability of the palm oil price held on the morning of 30 August and he gave a remark that it is necessary to strive to cut the palm oil price remarkably these days.

With oil shops selling palm oil at a fairer price, the market does not witness the price hike that occurred in mid-August. Consumers can enjoy the benefits of the price decline at present. — TWA/EM

Black gram price hits record high of over K2.5 mln per tonne

The high price of pulses raises export earnings in the 2023-2024 Financial Year.

OUT of the pulses and beans, one of the major agricultural products contributing to GDP, black gram price hit a fresh new peak above K2.5 million per tonne, whereas pigeon pea price peaked at nearly K3.9 million per tonne on 2 September.

The prices stood at K2.515 tonne of black gram (FAQ/RC), K2.725 million for black gram (SQ/RC) and K3.875 million for pigeon pea (red gram) on that day.

A total of 375 containers of black gram with loads of 9,000 tonnes were traded in the 20 days of market opening days in August, commodity depot data showed.

The prices of black grams and pigeon peas hit an all-time

high on 1 September 2023.

With the prices of pulses rocketing, the export earnings significantly rose in the 2023-2024 financial year.

The domestic consumption of black grams and pigeon peas is pretty low. The authorities concerned are focusing on commodity price stability. The

figures indicated an increase of over K400,000 per tonne of black grams and K1.7 million for pigeon peas this year compared to last year's prices.

Black gram accounts for 7.37 million acres of plantations. The yield of various pulses is estimated at 96.22 million baskets per year.

Myanmar conveyed 1.75 million tonnes of various pulses worth US\$1.324 billion to foreign trade partners in FY 2021-2022.

Rice, the staple food in Myanmar, covers 1.7 million acres of plantation across the country. That year, Myanmar shipped 1.66 million tonnes of rice and broken rice worth \$578.94 million to external markets. — TWA/EM

YRIC nods 45 domestic, foreign enterprises in eight months

THE Yangon Region Investment Committee (YRIC) endorsed 45 domestic and foreign enterprises in the past eight months (January-August) and the manufacturing sector topped the investment lineups, U Myo Khaing Oo, director of Yangon Region DICA said.

Those enterprises include manufacturing businesses, garment businesses, hotel businesses and service businesses. The majority of them are CMP businesses.

“YRIC gives the go-ahead to 45 wholly domestic and foreign businesses. The CMP garment businesses played a key player among those endorsed businesses in February-August, creating 18,603 jobs for residents,” U Myo Khaing Oo shared information.

China is the leading inves-

tor in Myanmar's CMP garment factories, followed by Chinese Taipei, Thailand, the Republic of Korea and Japan. The clothes and apparel are sent to Thailand, China, Singapore and European countries.

There are 505 garment factories, 48 footwear manufacturing enterprises, eight wig factories and 177 factories engaged in the production of bags, sportswear, sports shoes and socks on a CMP basis in the Yangon Region, in line with the existing rules and regulations.

Online registration platform for rice storage to commence in mid-September

ONLINE registration platform for rice storage will launch in mid-September, according to the Myanmar Rice Federation. It aims to steer rice and paddy storage systematically and prevent market manipulation.

Paddy is the backbone of Myanmar's agriculture. Beyond self-sufficiency, the surplus is shipped to foreign markets. There is a sufficient supply of rice and paddy in the country this year and mon-

soon paddy will be harvested soon.

Additionally, Shwebo Pawsan, Ayeyawady Pawsan, Pawsan from various regions, Ayeyamin, Ayeya Padaytha, Anyatha, and Pakhan varieties that are highly consumed domestically are prioritized for the domestic market only at present.

There is no export of those rice varieties and the federation is making a concerted effort with the stakeholders in the supply chain to stabilize the rice

price in the domestic market.

Next, Aemahta, Kayinma, Tunpu and Ngasein rice varieties are designated for export markets. Rice export has not been suspended. Rice exporting companies with 100 per cent cargo readiness are processed and after pre-shipment inspection, export licence will be granted.

The wholesalers were required to submit registration for rice storage for above 5,000 baskets of paddy and 1,000 rice bags (over 50 tonnes) by 26 June 2023, the Myanmar Rice Federation released announcement 1/2023 on 21 June 2023.

Under the directive of the Ministry of Commerce, MRF has been making efforts and participating in the development of the rice market, systematic registration for rice storage, fair market and price stability as the role of the private sector. MRF said in the announcement that digital registration service through Online registration (MyRO) is underway to facilitate the registration process.

While the MyRO online registration system is being constructed, trial operations of warehouse storage situations were conducted in Nay Pyi Taw Union Territory, Yangon, Ayeyawady, Bago and Mandalay regions in June and July 2023. — NN/EM

The rice export volume recorded the highest in May and declined in June, July and August.

MRF aims to achieve 2.5 million tonnes of robust rice export in the current FY, generating an income of US\$1 billion. Myanmar exported 2,261,203 tonnes of rice and broken rice to foreign trade partners in the past 2022-2023 FY (April-March), with an estimated value of \$853.472 million.

Last FY, China was the main buyer of Myanmar's rice and broken rice with over 775,000 tonnes, followed by Belgium with 323,000 tonnes, Bangladesh with over 239,000 tonnes and the Philippines with over 202,000 tonnes.

Myanmar has been exerting concerted efforts to grow 10 per cent yearly in the rice export. To increase foreign income, it has been prioritizing the exportation of high-grade rice and boosting export volume, MRF stated.

Myanmar pocketed over \$809.135 million from approximately 2.164 million tonnes of rice export in the 2021-2022 FY (April-March). — NN/EM

Save new generation youths from the dangers of narcotic drugs

THE 8th ASEAN Ministerial Meeting on Drug Matters (AMMD) convened in Vientiane, Laos on 10 and 11 August witnessed the Myanmar delegation ardently expressing its commitment to combat the perils of narcotic drugs among the youth. Characterizing drug eradication as a solemn national responsibility, Myanmar has taken a proactive stance in collaboration with the Tatmadaw, the Myanmar Police Force, and the Department of Customs. Their joint efforts have led to the apprehension of drug traffickers, the dismantling of drug transactions, and the confiscation of substantial quantities of drug manufacturing chemicals.

Amidst global concerns, the proliferation of synthetic drug trade has emerged as a dominant threat, giving rise to ancillary crimes such as money laundering, arms trafficking, and violence. The most disconcerting facet is the escalating jeopardy posed to the youth worldwide. The perpetuation of such drug networks undermines

regional stability and imperils the harmony of nations.

Myanmar's anti-narcotics drive extends beyond national borders, as it collaborates closely with international organizations, regional counterparts, and neighbouring nations, including the United Nations. This shared endeavour underscores the indispensability of collective action to address the multifaceted challenges of narcotics. A coordinated, apolitical exchange of intelligence and enhanced cooperation are deemed pivotal by the ASEAN member countries.

Embracing drug eradication as a shared national responsibility, the Tatmadaw, Myanmar Police Force, and Customs Department have synergized their efforts to initiate targeted anti-narcotic

operations. Recent successes include the interception of 12.63 kilograms of synthetic drugs, colloquially known as "happy water", in Tachilek of Shan State (East) on 4 August this year, valued at over K1.38 billion. Concerted action has led to prosecutions against culprits engaged in drug-related offences and proactive measures to curtail the distribution of narcotics in venues frequented by youth, such as KTV lounges, clubs, bars, and eateries.

Similar triumphs were replicated in Mandalay Region on 17 August, with authorities seizing narcotic substances and precursor chemicals valued at more than K2.95 billion. Ongoing investigations aim to apprehend those responsible for these criminal activities. These operations serve as pivotal safeguards, shielding the youth from the insidious threats of narcotic drugs.

Myanmar is unwaveringly dedicated to implementing alternative development strategies in areas plagued by opium cultivation, while concurrently uplifting households impacted by drug-related issues. In the pursuit of securing a promising future for generations to come, the collective responsibility transcends governmental boundaries and rests squarely on the shoulders of the populace. The steadfast commitment to reducing poppy cultivation is imperative for the nation's progress and the well-being of its youth.

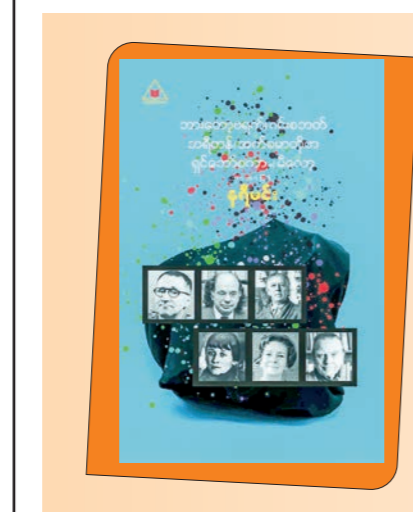
These SAPs preach the advancement of women. Hundreds of ladies protested in Niamey

His epic poem HOWL (1956) is considered to be one of the most significant products of the Beat movement. Then, there are two poems composed by Andre Breton, a French poet - Vigilance and Non-lien. Moreover, the readers can enjoy the taste of two poems composed by a Russian poet called Anna Akhmatova. One poem is titled 'Requiem' which was written as a response

to the imprisonment of Akhmatova's son. In addition to poetry, she wrote prose inclusive of memoirs. Another poem is titled, 'Love.'

There are also poems composed by a Polish poet named Wislawa Szyborska - Clothes; The Terrorist He Watches; Vermeer; Two Monkeys by Brueghel; The Museum; True Love; The Onion; Going Home; A Funeral; Poem In Honor Of; Some People; and Cat In An Empty Apartment.

There are also poems composed by another Polish poet called Czeslaw Milosz - Late Ripeness; Normalization; Account; and City Without Name.

Furthermore, Nari Min mentioned the brief biography of the poets in addition to his criticism and analyses of their poems. He has analysed and criticized the poem titled, 'Hope is the Thing with Feathers' by Emily Dickinson. He described this poem as an extended metaphor poem. Jack London - Thu Bhawa Thu Sarpay

THIS week, I would like to present a book for review published by Seikku Cho Cho. This time, it is a fourth impression. What makes this book distinct is that both the Myanmar writer and the one about whom the biography was written have close affinities in terms of their thinking and the way they have led their life. Myanmar writer is nobody but Bhamo Tin Aung whereas the person about whom the biography was written is a great American writer known as Jack London.

There is another interesting story behind the book. According to the one who wrote the foreword, Saya Bhamo Tin Aung had struggled hard to finish this book on the biography of Jack London. No sooner had he been discharged from the hospital where he was receiving medical treatment for cancer than he went back directly to the publishing house to finish his writing instead of going back home. Saya Aung Maw, the writer of the book review, said that Saya Bhamo Tin Aung passed away just one month after

finishing his writing. The readers can see his devotion to finishing his work.

In the foreword to the second impression, the publisher of Myint Myat Thu Sarpay said that Jack London and Saya Bhamo Tin Aung shared the same world outlook, embracing similar ideologies and beliefs. They both believe in materialism, advocating for the proletarians. Additionally, they are also activists for the cause of socialism. They have been undaunted in advocating for the cause of socialism and proletarians. They have brought benefits to the people of low stratum and their nation as a whole. Their literary works were generated based on good reasoning. They have been honest and loyal to the readers. Inasmuch as Jack London was loved and respected by the people of America, Saya Bhamo Tin Aung was highly cherished and respected by his people. They were both regarded as national heroes by their ardent readers.

Jack London has written about the tough life of the downtrodden workers, the

unemployed as well as the underemployed, the vagabonds, the beggars, the hooligans, the thieves, the pickpockets and the jailbirds. The writer could have chosen the most proper words to depict the nature, the habits and the customs of such people. He has used all the jargon commonly used in their world. Saya Bhamo Tin Aung could also have depicted the life of Jack London vividly. At 40, Jack London committed suicide. Although he has lived a rather short life, he is still remembered by readers around the world. It is said that life begins at 40. However, for Jack London, who died at 40, the saying is not true. Nonetheless, there are some who regard him as a revolutionary. Although he died a bit early, he had produced valuable books on such sensitive issues as religion, gender, socialism and communism about which only a handful of writers would dare to touch in those days. Among the translation works of Saya Bhamo Tin Aung, those on Einstein and Jack London are the most interesting.

Bengal tigers conserved at Htamathi Wildlife Sanctuary

The Environment and Wildlife Conservation Branch of the Forest Department conserves the world's endangered tiger species: Bengal tigers at the Htamathi Wildlife Sanctuary in Sagaing Region.

Myanmar has eight ASEAN Heritage Parks. The Bengal tigers mostly inhabit in the Htamathi Wildlife Sanctuary in the northern part of the country and Taninthayi Natural Reserve in the southern part of the country. The Htamathi Wildlife Sanctuary located in Khamti and Homalin townships covers 830.4 square miles (531,456 acres). It was designated as Htamathi Wildlife Sanctuary in May 1974 and the wildlife sanctuary warden office was established in Homalin on 1 September 1994. The Htamathi Wildlife Sanctuary was declared an ASEAN Heritage Park on 8 October 2019.

It also attracts local and foreign travellers who love nature-based tourism as they can study the rare bird species, wild animals, biodiversity, forests, and waterfalls, and enjoy nature rowing boats, jungle adventures, culture and living style of res-

ident Shanni and Naga ethnic people, and can also visit Htamathi research centre.

"In Htamathi Wildlife Sanctuary, we conduct patrol in 20-unit areas with three staff and one worker per unit. Three patrol units patrol daily from three stations. The rare tiger is only can be seen in northern and southern parts of Myanmar. In the north, there is the Hukaung Valley Wildlife

Sanctuary and Htamathi Wildlife Sanctuary. We installed cameras at Htamathi last year and we got the movements and images of tigers. We set up camera traps in four kilometres containing 15 points with two cameras per point. The experts of WCF estimated that there would be 15-20 tigers there. We need technical tools to get exact estimation. Then, public participation

plays a key role in conserving the natural environment and wildlife animals. Being the 8th ASEAN Heritage Park, all should protect the Htamathi Wildlife Sanctuary as national heritage of the country," said U Win Hlaing, warden of the Htamathi Wildlife Sanctuary.

The wild animals and birds that help the environment die yearly due to human beings and natural disasters. Some of the wild animals are likely to disappear and the developed countries conserve the tigers and elephants while Myanmar conserves rare tiger species. The wildlife parts, bones and skins are marketable in the illegal wildlife trade and the populations of elephants and tigers are decreasing year by year. The WCF works with 13 countries where tigers live to launch the conservation of rare animal and bird species. A tiger has a home range of its own, which averages between 250 and 300 square kilometres. The Bengal tigers live in the northern part of Myanmar while the Indochinese tigers in the Taninthayi Natural Reserve in the southern of Myanmar. — Nyein Thu (MNA)/KTZH

Gabon's strongman vows more democracy after coup

The political changes and the new leader's efforts to address issues of democracy, corruption, and engagement with both domestic and international stakeholders in Gabon following the coup

GABON'S new strongman General Brice Oligui Nguema on Friday vowed the country's institutions would be more democratic, two days after heading a coup that ended 55 years of rule by the Bongo family.

"The dissolution of the institutions" decreed on Wednesday during the coup "is temporary", he said in a speech. "It is a question of reorganizing them in order to make them more democratic."

Oligui also stepped up contacts with national groups and foreign interests, meeting members of civil society a day after a speech to 200 businessmen, whom he lectured on corruption.

Broadcast on state television earlier Friday, he sternly warned business leaders in the oil-rich state against "over-billing" and told them to commit to the "development of the country."

"It is difficult to perceive, at this stage, your commitment or patriotism when it comes to the development expected by our

compatriots," Oligui said.

He vowed to make sure the overcharged money "comes back to the state."

"This situation, for me, cannot continue, and I will not tolerate it".

He also invited foreign donors, diplomats and members of international organisations to meet with him. Details of that meeting remained unclear.

Embassies of countries or organisations that have condemned the coup told AFP that they did not send their senior-most representatives, but rather officials of a lesser rank.

Bongo overthrown

Oligui, the head of the elite Republican Guard, on Wednesday led officers in a coup against President Ali Bongo Ondimba, scion of a family that had ruled for 55 years.

The ouster came just moments after Bongo, 64, was proclaimed victor in presidential elections at the weekend — a result branded a fraud by the opposition. — AFP

More Brazil Supreme Court judges vote on Indigenous land rights case

BRAZIL'S Supreme Court on Thursday ended its latest deliberations on whether to restrict native peoples' rights to claim their ancestral lands — seen as key buffers against climate change — with four votes against and two in favour.

There are 11 judges in total, which left five still to vote in the case that the Supreme Court began hearing in 2021,

but which has been adjourned several times.

The court, meeting in the capital Brasilia, is weighing the legality of the so-called "time-frame argument," which holds that native peoples should not have the right to lands where they were not present in 1988, when the current constitution was ratified.

Indigenous groups say

that violates their rights, given that many were forced from their ancestral lands, including during the military dictatorship that ruled Brazil from the 1960s to 1980s.

One of the judges who voted against the measure, Cristiano Zann, said that "no type of 'time-frame' can be imposed to the detriment of the Indigenous people." — AFP

N Korea fires cruise missiles into Yellow Sea: S Korea

NORTH KOREA fired several cruise missiles towards the Yellow Sea on Saturday, the South Korean military said, just days after the end of joint US-South Korea military drills.

The missile launches began at around 4 am, South Korea's Joint Chiefs of Staff said, adding that "while strengthening our monitoring and vigilance, our military is maintaining a full readiness posture in close cooperation with the United States."

North Korea launched two ballistic missiles toward the Sea of Japan on Wednesday as part of a tactical nuclear strike drill in response to the deployment of US strategic bombers to the Korean Peninsula, according to the North's state media. — Kyodo

Iceland to resume whaling under stricter conditions

ICELAND'S government said that whaling could resume Friday with stricter conditions and monitoring, after it decided not to extend a temporary two-month ban imposed amid animal welfare concerns. Iceland is one of just three countries that allow commercial whaling, along with Norway and Japan, in the face of fierce criticism from environmentalists and animal rights' de-

fenders. "Whaling can resume tomorrow... (with) detailed and stricter requirements for hunting equipment and hunting methods, as well as increased supervision," the fisheries ministry said in a statement to AFP on Thursday.

Animal protection charity Humane Society International called it "a devastating and inexplicable decision".

Iceland suspended its whale

hunt on 20 June after a government-commissioned report concluded the hunt does not comply with the country's Animal Welfare Act. Recent monitoring by Iceland's Food and Veterinary Authority on the fin whale hunt, in which explosive harpoons are used, found that the killing of the animals took too long based on the main objectives of the Animal Welfare Act. — AFP

Swedish bankruptcies reach highest level in decade

The widespread impact of bankruptcies across various sectors in Sweden, with particular emphasis on the challenges faced by the building and construction industry due to changes in interest rates

THE number of bankruptcies in Sweden has reached the highest level in a decade, according to statistics released here on Friday. Nearly 5,500 businesses went bankrupt between January and August, an increase of 35 per cent year-on-year, the business and credit reference agency UC said in a press release.

Bankruptcies were recorded across all business sectors, with their number increasing by 49 per cent among companies selling and servicing motor vehicles; by 40 per cent in the transportation sector; and by 39 per cent in the retail, hotel and restaurant sectors.

Building and construction was the sector with the highest number of bankruptcies — just over 1,000, up 35 per cent year-on-year, the UC said in the press release.

In August, the number of bankruptcies in the building and construction sector increased even more, by 48 per cent year-on-year. The slump in the building and construction sector came after Sweden's central bank Riksbank raised its key interest rate to 3.75 per cent after keeping it at zero or sub-zero level for more than seven years, which had a cooling effect on the housing market. — Xinhua

Japan business leaders to make 1st China visit after COVID in Jan

JAPANESE business leaders will visit China in January for the first time since 2019 following disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, with preparations underway for a meeting with President Xi Jinping's leadership, sources familiar with the bilateral relationship said Friday.

Despite ongoing tensions stemming from various issues, such as the release of treated radioactive water from the Fukushima nuclear power plant into the sea, the business group aims to emphasize the significance of economic cooperation between the two Asian neighbours. — Kyodo

African climate summit seeks to showcase green power potential

KENYA next week hosts a flagship climate conference designed to showcase Africa as a potential powerhouse for green energy, in the first of a flurry of big meetings ahead of crunch UN talks.

With the world far adrift of its goal of slashing carbon emissions and communities battered by extreme weather events, the November climate summit in oil-rich United Arab Emirates will be dominated by clashing visions for energy.

Kenyan President William Ruto says he wants the first African Climate Summit, running in Nairobi from Monday to Wednesday, to help “deliver African solutions”.

The goal is to transform the continent into the source of the world's revolution in green power—but to achieve this, it needs an influx of funding and help for its debt burden. Ruto and other African leaders have sought to show that “Africa is not a victim but a critical player in solving the world's climate crisis,” said Mavis Owusu-Gyamfi of the African Centre for Economic Transformation (ACET). Africa, home to

1.2 billion people spread across 54 nations, is famously diverse, politically and economically.

Despite this, said Owusu-Gyamfi, its leaders have homed in on a set of climate priorities, from debt relief and low-carbon development to overhaul of the global financial architecture.

The hope is to generate momentum for a series of key international meetings leading up to COP28. These include G20 negotiations in India, the UN General Assembly, and the World Bank and International Monetary Fund annual meeting in Marrakesh. — AFP

Pakistan shopkeepers strike nationwide over inflation

THOUSANDS of Pakistan traders shuttered their shops on Saturday, striking over soaring energy and fuel bills stirring widespread discontent ahead of national elections.

Decades of mismanagement and instability have hobbled Pakistan's economy, and this summer Islamabad was forced into a deal with the International Monetary Fund (IMF) to avert default.

However, the global lender demanded that popular subsidies cushioning living costs be slashed. Petrol and electricity prices have rocketed.

There were widespread market closures on Saturday in Lahore, Karachi and Peshawar, where abandoned bazaars were posted with placards decrying “the unreasonable increase in electricity bills and taxes”. — AFP

UK rail workers strike again in pay dispute

A fresh round of widespread strikes was set to disrupt rail services in the United Kingdom (UK) on Friday and Saturday amid an ongoing dispute over pay and working conditions, once again affecting families' travel plans.

ASLEF, the train drivers' union, has announced a one-day industrial action on Friday and a ban on working overtime across the UK rail network on Saturday.

The strike will force companies to cancel all services in the country and the ban will seriously disrupt the network, it said.

"We don't want to take this action but the

train companies and the government, which stands behind them, have forced us into this place because they refuse to sit down and talk to us and have not made a fair and sensible pay offer to train drivers, who have not had one for four years," Mick Whelan, ASLEF's general secretary, said.

ASLEF has so far called 11 one-day strikes during this 15-month dispute.

Adding to the chaos, 20,000 members of the National Union of Rail, Maritime and Transport Workers (RMT) will go on strike on Saturday across 14 train operators. — Xinhua

Japan fair trade body probes scandal-hit Bigmotor over subcontracts

JAPAN'S Fair Trade Commission has launched an investigation into Bigmotor Co's business practices as the scandal-hit used

car dealership and repair chain is suspected of infringing on the profits of subcontractors, sources familiar with the matter

said Saturday.

Bigmotor, embroiled in a scandal over excessive repair fees and auto insurance fraud, may

have forced its subcontractors to lower prices and have their company vehicles undergo periodic inspections at its workshops, according to the sources. The fair trade watchdog could issue an advisory if a violation of the subcontract law is confirmed. The law stipulates fair business transactions between prime contractors and subcontractors.

The transport ministry in late July conducted on-site inspections at Bigmotor dealerships across the country amid allegations that the Tokyo-based company charged excessive fees after intentionally damaging vehicles and made fraudulent insurance claims. — Kyodo

US hiring rises unexpectedly but labour market shows signs of cooling

HIRING in the United States logged a surprise jump last month, government data showed Friday, but unemployment rose to the highest level since early 2022 as the economy shows signs of cooling. The world's biggest economy added 187,000 jobs in August, according to the Labour Department, but wage growth slipped and the jobless rate climbed to 3.8 per cent.

The uptick in job gains came as employment figures for June and July were

both revised downwards, and the numbers overall signal a steady pace of hiring while the labour market shows signs of easing. Policymakers have been struggling to lower demand and rein in stubborn inflation, with the Federal Reserve lifting interest rates rapidly — recently bringing them to the highest level in more than two decades.

But the central bank has also vowed to be data-dependent in its upcoming decisions.

A relatively strong

labour market has added to hopes that the United States can bring inflation

THE latest mission in India's ambitious space programme blasted off Saturday on a voyage towards the centre of the solar system, a week after the country's successful unmanned Moon landing.

Aditya-L1 launched shortly before midday, with a live broadcast showing hundreds of spectators cheering wildly against the deafening noise of the rocket's ascent.

"Launch successful, all normal," an Indian Space Research Organization official announced from mission control as the vessel made its way to the upper reaches of the Earth's atmosphere.

The mission is carrying scientific instruments to observe the Sun's outermost layers in a four-month journey.

The United States and the European Space Agency (ESA) have sent numerous probes to

the centre of the solar system, beginning with NASA's Pioneer programme in the 1960s.

Japan and China have both launched their own solar observatory missions into Earth's orbit.

But if successful, the latest mission from the Indian Space Research Organization (ISRO) will be the first by any Asian nation to be placed in orbit around the Sun.

"It's a challenging mission for India," astrophysicist Somak Raychaudhury told broadcaster NDTV on Friday.

Raychaudhury said the mission probe would study coronal mass ejections, a periodic phenomenon that sees huge discharges of plasma and magnetic energy from the Sun's atmosphere. These bursts are so powerful they can reach the Earth and potentially disrupt the operations of satellites. — AFP

New airborne collision avoidance system boosts Russia's tech independence

RUSSIA'S unique airborne collision avoidance system (ACAS) SPSV has successfully undergone tests, lifting the nation to the next level of technological independence and dodging Western sanctions.

The proximity warning system SPSV by Russia's Navigator Company has been

tested on the Let L-410 Turbolet, a twin-engine short-range transport aircraft, and is due to be installed on the Sukhoi Superjet 100 type civil planes.

Previously, Navigator Company CEO Sergei Baburov said in an interview with Sputnik that Russia had created its first domestic unique mid-air collision avoidance

system for all types of aircraft: Il-96, SJ-100 (Superjet-100), Il-114-300, MS-21, etc. Prior to that, all Russian civil planes were equipped with the ACAS system by the American company Collins, which possesses a global monopoly in the field.

"The main task of the system, its functionality, [is to prevent collision]: if one plane approaches another at a dangerous distance during the flight, [the system] gives commands which aircraft to send where. One plane goes down; the other goes up to safely disperse. The uniqueness of the system lies, among other things, in the fact that for the first time in Russia such a domestic system has been created, regardless of the supplies of the American company Collins," Viktor Pryadka, aviation expert, CEO of the Alliance of Aviation Technologies Avintel, told Sputnik. — SPUTNIK

LUCIANO Spalletti on Saturday urged Italy to forget the pain of failing to qualify for the past two World Cups as he takes charge of the Azzurri's Euro 2024 bid following the departure of Roberto Mancini.

Italy face North Macedonia and Ukraine in two matches crucial for their chances of qualifying from Group C for next summer's tournament in Germany.

Spalletti took charge of the European champions last month after the shock resignation of Mancini, who was then hired as Saudi Arabia coach in a mega-money deal.

Mancini won Euro 2020 but also presided over play-off defeat to North Macedonia which kept them out of last year's World Cup in Qatar. “We need to forget the bitterness of two results which left scars on us and play a style of football that people like, a style of play that brings together an important footballing nation,” Spalletti told reporters at Italy's Coverciano training centre. “To be here as the national team coach is a special feeling, a long-held dream of mine. I was 11 years old for the 1970 Mexico World Cup, when I asked my mother to make me flag as big as possible after the 4-3 (semi-final) win over Germany.”

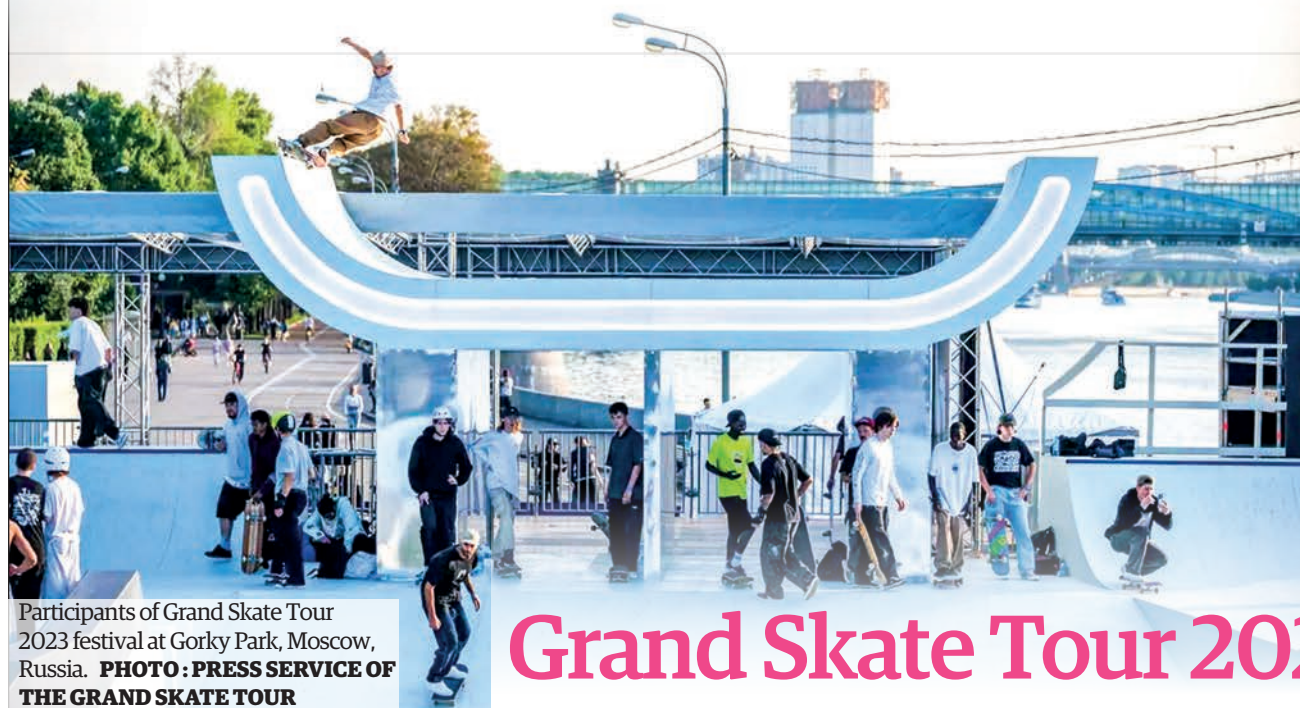

At the moment, more than a thousand skaters from 41 countries of the world have taken part in sports, cultural and educational events of GST. Skaters

from 13 countries (Argentina, Armenia, Belarus, Bulgaria, Brazil, Iran, Israel, Kazakhstan, Colombia, Madagascar, Russia, US, Uzbekistan) made it to the men's and women's semi-finals.

"It is amazing that now we are hosting foreign athletes from 41 countries

in Moscow. Looking at the scale of GST and its programme, we can say that skateboarding is still a socio-cultural phenomenon, rather than a sports one, because in sports there is the International Olympic Committee (IOC), which conducts its own policy and forces it upon national sports federations, whereas there is no such unified international body in the realm of culture. Therefore, the Grand Skate Tour is so successfully held at Gorky Park, thanks to the Department of Culture of Moscow. All GST events and activities are covered not only in Russian but also in foreign media. — SPUTNIK

hancing our climate action by adopting low-carbon and efficient transportation systems through the application of innovations including clean, efficient, and sustainable energy technologies," Ruto said at the launch ceremony in the Indian Ocean port city of Mombasa.

Ruto said Kenya currently had 1,000 of the new e-bikes,

with another 10,000 on their way, and that Spiro had established a plant with the capacity to assemble 1,000 of the vehicles daily.

About two million motorbikes are on the roads in Kenya, he said, mostly "boda bodas" or two-wheeled taxis that are commonly used across the continent.

"The adoption of electric mobility is a high-priority interven-

tion to address the challenges of pollution, adverse health effects, and fuel costs," Ruto said.

Kenya, he said, aimed to eventually phase out the combustion engine-powered motorbikes, warning that the increasing use of such vehicles across the continent had "serious implications" for climate change and air quality.—AFP

Burna Boy breaks UK record by topping albums chart

NIGERIA's Burna Boy has become the first international Afrobeats artist to secure a number one album in Britain with "I Told Them...", the UK's Official Charts Company said on Friday.

The Nigerian-born global star, whose real name is Damini Ebunoluwa Ogulu, shot straight to top spot in the British charts with his fifth full-length release.

He had come close to earning the accolade with last year's "Love, Damini", which climbed to second in the UK album rankings. Homegrown British talents making Afrobeats music, such as J Hus, have enjoyed chart-topping success but Burna Boy is the first foreign artist to do so. The feat marks the continued rise of the Afrobeats genre in Britain and around the world, as artists like Wizkid and Davido also enjoy mainstream success and increasingly shape segments of popular culture.—AFP

Catalysts of Growth: Exploring MSME Trade Fairs' Role in Nurturing Local Development

The government should organize MSME trade fairs to provide the local Micro-, small-, and medium-sized enterprises (MSME), said the businessmen.

The government currently provides sector-wise activities including loans to promote the sector of MSMEs.

On the other hand, the entrepreneurs face certain obstacles regarding capital, local market shares and penetration of the international market. It also needs to provide technical assistance to those who run small-sized businesses hardly applying modern techniques to ensure market shares, advertising and market penetration on social networks.

"When the technologies are developing, the authorities should provide the MSME business people with the innovative and quality technologies to manufacture, distribute and promote the market in the local," Ma Khin Mar Win, who sells organic shampoo and cosmetics online told The Global New Light of Myanmar (GNLM).

When it comes to the development of MSMEs, the government organizes trade fairs to showcase the local products of respective regions including foodstuffs, commodities and materials of SMEs.

When business people participate in trade fairs and introduce their products, they can grab proper market shares and the customers can buy the things they want in one place. Therefore, the MSME trade fair is such as win-win situation.

"I visit the SME trade fairs and consider what benefits I did get from that. I meet the entrepreneurs and receive proper advice like what kind of manageable scale business should I run," Ko Lwin Ko Oo from Tamway Township told The GNLM.

Most of the SMEs running on social networks are foodstuffs and commodities such as shampoo, soap and handmade products and most of them are export outlets and used household items. "The people are interested in online sales of local products and food, especially fish paste, dried fish and seasonal fruits. The sale rate of handmade products is low as well as the textiles from looms. The live sales of foreign products and garments are on the rise. The people buy used bed sheets, blankets, clothes, kitchen utensils and shoes knowing that they can get them at cheap prices. The locally-produced Mutra mat, blanket, handkerchief and aluminium pots do not have market shares. The influence of foreign-made products becomes wider



and the people might not know to value the products of their country. Therefore, the fairs to display local products from various regions should be held frequently. The pagoda festival in countryside areas offers different products of different regions and it is just a kind of festival concentrated on SMEs," he added. Those run SMEs should make a fine packaging system before distributing in the market, as it can guarantee market share and public interest besides the market penetration locally and internationally, a businessman considered.

"Product's packaging should be unique to penetrate the domestic market. If the product is cheap but the quality is better than the existing products in the market, the people will mostly choose the local product instead of imported products. If so, it can penetrate the market soon," Ko Aung Naing Thu, an MSME analyst told the GNLM. *Translated/KTZH*

In pursuit of its economic policies, the government has embraced three key objectives: to enhance agriculture and livestock production with modern technologies, to invigorate Micro-, Small- and Medium-Sized Enterprises (MSMEs) for elevating the export sector, leveraging the momentum for sustained economic growth, and to spur the cultivation of oil crops to meet targeted production levels, thereby achieving domestic self-sufficiency in edible oil while striving towards the export of surplus oil. The cornerstone of this effort lies in the early-stage small- and medium-scale enterprises that underpin MSME businesses.

Diverse MSME Categories

Government intervention in various sectors of economies worldwide is a common phenomenon, varying based on each country's unique circumstances. MSMEs manifest in four primary categories: productivity, trading, services, and others. Among these, manufacturing businesses serve as the practical foundation, as trading and service enterprises depend on manufacturing for operation. Myanmar passed the SME law rooted in MSMEs in 2015, adopting policies and regulations to facilitate effective task execution and business operation.

Myanmar's ample raw materials enable prioritization of desired products, yet investments and technology infusion are needed for chemical and similar production. With more than 40,000 MSMEs within the country, achieving success demands market access and provision of services through trade. This underscores the significance of collaborating with the international community and ensuring a seamless flow of information and commodities.


Supporting MSME Growth

The relevant ministry must facilitate adequate electricity supply to MSME industries in respective regions, employing small-scale power generation to avoid straining the national grid. Additionally, cultivating technicians and skilled workers across different levels is crucial for the advancement of MSMEs. Initiatives like vocational courses conducted by the Labour Ministry and the Small-scale Industries Department under the Ministry of Cooperatives and Rural Development should effectively equip youths in relevant regions and states to secure livelihoods through gainful employment.

Central to this endeavour is the acquisition of human resources. Standardization of domestic MSME products and adherence to international quality standards for export products are imperative. Scaling up manufacturing contributes significantly to the national economy, with emphasis on agriculturally-based, livestock-related, and natural resource-driven production.

Key Aspects of SME Business

Salient features of SME businesses centre on the 2015 SME Development Law, providing businesspersons with

Five ways are currently being prioritized to improve domestic rice production, according to the Myanmar Rice Federation.

In carrying out this priority, MSME Engagement and Integration have been developed by linking the market and credit to enable rice trading MSMEs to survive.

Enhancing the productivity of Big Farmers as Micro Entrepreneurs is also being implemented with the participation of farmers who own 10 acres of land or more. They also discussed the Inter-Private Sector – Institutional Developments and Coordination of sub-associations related to rice by region, state, district and township. guidelines for entity establishment and liabilities. A comprehensive understanding of this law empowers entrepreneurs to navigate business operations successfully.

Defining Small and Medium Enterprises

The Small Enterprise encompasses the following categories: manufacturing enterprises with fewer than 50 permanent employees or a capital investment not exceeding K500 million; labour-intensive or piecework enterprises with under 300 permanent employees or a capital investment within K500 million; wholesale enterprises with under 30 employees or the previous year's annual income not exceeding K100 million; retail businesses with less than 30 employees or annual income not surpassing K50 million; service enterprises with under 30 employees or previous year's annual income below K100 million.

Similarly, the Medium Enterprise includes manufacturing operations with fewer than 300 permanent employees or a capital investment between K500 million and K1,000 million; labour-intensive or piecework businesses with fewer than 600 permanent employees or a capital investment ranging from K500 million to K1,000 million; wholesale enterprises with fewer than 60 employees or previous year's annual income between K100 million and K300 million; retail businesses with under 60 employees or annual income within K50 million to K100 million; service enterprises with fewer than 100 employees or previous year's annual income ranging from K100 million to K200 million.

Driving Economic Imperatives

Sustainable socioeconomic development hinges on robust economic, political, and defence drives in any nation. A strong economic drive positively impacts political and defence agendas. Myanmar's core economic driver is its agri-based sector, particularly agriculture and livestock. Thus, promoting MSMEs anchored in these domains to produce value-added products becomes crucial for generating state revenue.

Following the instruction of the Central Committee for Development of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises, the MSME Development Agencies have been established in various regions and states, contributing to a conducive environment for MSME growth. Currently, the government disburses loans to MSME businesses from the State economic promotion fund whereas the Myanmar Agricultural Development Bank issues loans to farmers through the JICA two-step loan.

Presently, MSME processes have evolved from SMEs due to their pivotal role in national development. These enterprises can reduce import volumes and foreign exchange outflows by domestically manufacturing essential products, thereby contributing to the overall economic growth of the nation.

Illustrative MSME Ventures

Entrepreneurs invest resources in micro-, small-, and medium-sized enterprises across the nation. More than 40,000 MSMEs are operating their businesses, most of which manufacture products for domestic consumption. So, these products cannot compete with imported goods due to a lack of standardized quality, packaging process and advertisement techniques. As such, the majority of Myanmar's MSME industries need to expedite their efforts

for the production of quality goods for the purpose of domestic consumption with a plan to export the surplus ones. Whatever it may be, running these MSMEs will be an initiative for handling the heavy industries on which the State can rely by creating job opportunities for local people and relevant technicians. As such, they have to march

towards the goal of the industrial sector, from their startup of the manageable scale industries. For instance, Ywathit Kaingtar village in Bago Township operates 18 iron melting industries, producing ironware for domestic use, raw metals, and export products. Similarly, Thabyu Smart Village in Kawa Township manufactures auto parts, electronic machinery, vessel fans, sewing machines, and personal goods. These small-scale industries follow the 4R principles namely 'reduce', 'reuse', 'recycle', and 'recover' in their production processes.

In terms of industrial techniques, many Myanmar foundries rely on conventional processes using coarse sand moulds, resulting in lower product quality. Collaboration between relevant departments and local businesses involves training in modern iron casting techniques, leading to improved product quality. This also creates opportunities for local youths to access advanced technologies and employment prospects.

Foreign Assistance and Institutional Support

International organizations contribute significantly to Myanmar's MSME sector. Denmark's commitment of K2 billion and the Responsible Business Fund's support through calls for proposals address challenges such as power supply, energy costs, and production drops. Over the past five years, Denmark has provided K19.576 billion to 609 MSMEs across regions. Likewise, the European Union's ARISE Plus programme aids sustainable trade and global opportunities for SMEs.

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Optimal Timing for Collective Progress

The present juncture is opportune for reopening closed industries and enhancing existing ones to accelerate production capacity. Private industries, if nurtured, can swiftly flourish and help transition the nation into an industrialized powerhouse through collaborative efforts and the innovative spirit of young industrialists. Fostering diverse technician levels within technical institutes and technological universities is essential. Passing down techniques to the younger generation ensures the nation benefits from the expertise of technicians, industrialists, and entrepreneurs.

The path forward beckons for Myanmar to seize the moment, revitalizing industries and capitalizing on youthful creativity to drive transformative industrial growth.

If MSME entrepreneurs apply for an AYA Micro Loan with collateral, the maximum loan amount is K30 million and the interest rate is 9.5 per cent per annum and 0.79 per cent per month. When presenting collateral, it must be a deeded car, apartment, or deeded shop, and the loan term is at most one year and the loan repayment system is monthly.

If someone applies through the CGI (loan guarantee) system without collateral, the loan amount is K1 million, the interest rate is 10.5 per cent per year and 0.87 per cent per month, and the premium paid to the Myanmar insurance company is three per cent of the approved loan amount. The loan term is a maximum of one year and the loan repayment system is monthly.

“Like AYA Bank, UMFCCI has notified MSMEs of applying for loans from 1 to 31 August. There are also rules. Venture capitalists including UMFCCI and Chambers of Commerce and In-

dustry from Mandalay, Shan, and Mon states and Ayeyawady Region have been asked to submit applications,” a businessman from Bayintnaung Commodity Warehouse told the Global New Light of Myanmar (GNLM).

If MSMEs can produce enough domestically needed goods and consumables, they will save foreign currency and contribute to national development.

MSMEs, which are the pillars of private businesses, can create employment opportunities with entrepreneurship and innovation, reduce poverty, meet market needs, and have a direct impact on the country’s GDP growth.

The progress of MSME businesses is important, said Daw Than Than Lin, Deputy Minister for Planning and Finance, at the (1/2023) coordination meeting of the MSME Development Reporting Group.

Currently, there are more than 40,000 MSME enterprises in Myanmar, according to the ministry’s statistics.

Fuelling Entrepreneurial Dreams: Unveiling Domestic MSME Loans as a Catalyst for Success

Local MSMEs and entrepreneurship are interdependent as entrepreneurs need decent support to progress MSME businesses.

MSMEs, which are the backbone of private businesses, have the ability to innovate and create employment opportunities, reduce poverty and meet market needs through entrepreneurship.

MSME also has a direct impact on the country’s GDP growth. Obtaining the necessary loans for entrepreneurs also plays an important role in the development and long-term sustainability of these businesses.

A programme was implemented by the MSME development committee of the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry-UMFCCI in August to improve domestic MSME-specific production and value-added import substitution.

AYA Bank introduced a new type of

loan to local entrepreneurs at UMFCCI last June that allows MSMEs to borrow for one year with a small amount of collateral.

“With the aim of bringing MSME and SME businesses into the banking system, as our first step, we started issuing MSME Micro Loans in 2022 in consultation with UMFCCI. By getting different types of loans, you will be able to connect to the banking system and access the market for additional opportunities.

“We have earmarked a large amount of loans in the coming year. Since the interest rate has been reduced and the documents have been relaxed, I admit that it will be the best, fastest and most effective loan,” U Toe Lin Nyunt, SME Banking and Bancassurance Director of AYA Bank commented.

Intending to promote local small businesses, AYA Bank introduced the AYA Micro Loan to provide loans with



UMFCCI to allocate initial K2 bln loan to support value-added production by MSMEs

The Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry’s MSME Development Committee will offer a K2 billion initial loan to the Micro, Small and Medium-sized Enterprises (MSMEs) contributing to value-added production activities, in cooperation with the AYA Bank.

The committee is assisting in enhancing the MSME production and value-added import substitution busi-

nesses. Those MSMEs that meet domestic needs and are engaged in import substitution production and export production are eligible for this loan.

Those businesses to take out loans must be solvent firms to be capable of repaying loans, businesses to keep it running with loans, companies or businesses that were not suspended or struck off by the registrar or from government departments, companies or businesses that have

paid income tax/ commercial tax/ special goods tax, presenting guarantee that board of directors of the company or business owner are liable to repay the debt, businesses holding licences or permits from the related department before 31 March 2021, businesses with annual income in the past two years and businesses or companies that were not sued for failure to repay the loan.

They will face legal action under the existing laws if

they fail to repay the loan.

The applicants must verify compliance with the details contained within the loan application form. The applications must be submitted to the UMFCCI and its affiliated associations within office hours by 30 September.

Those applications submitted after the deadline will not be considered, the UMFCCI’s MSME Development Committee highlighted.

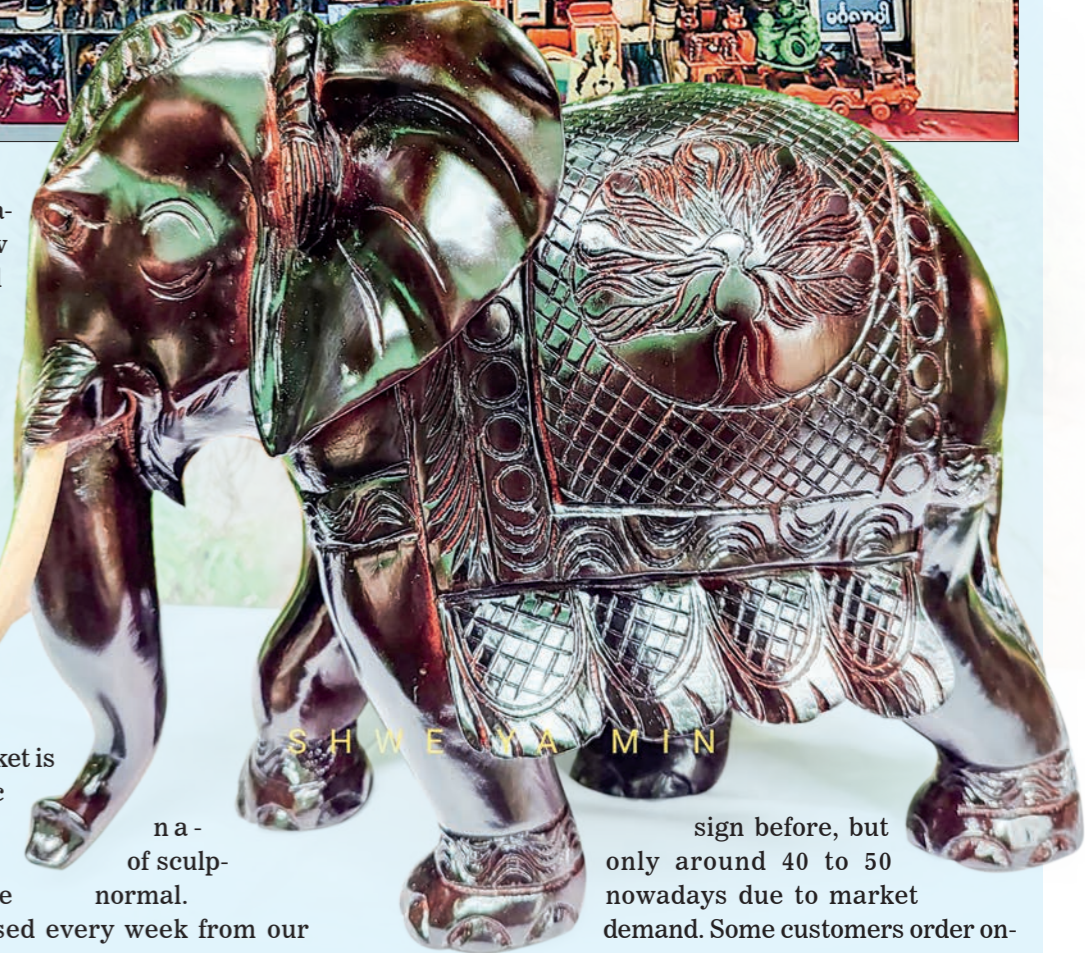
Sculpting Creativity: Unveiling Bago Region’s Latest Artworks Destined for National Sculpture Market

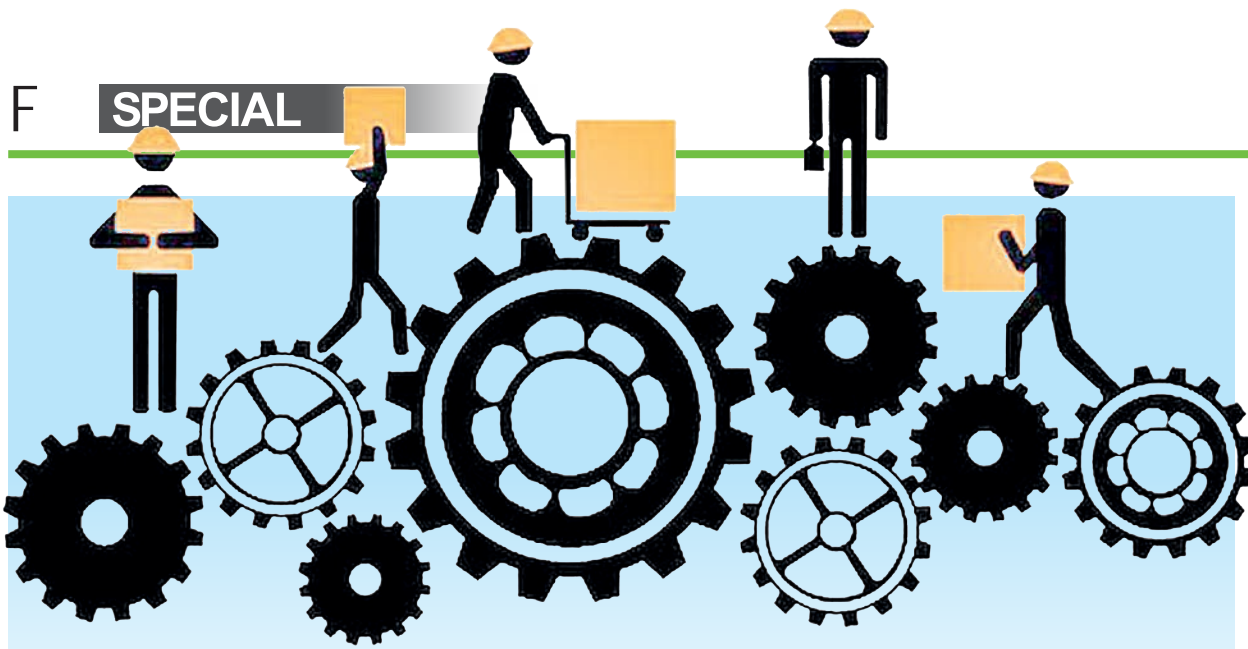

A new Mingala versatile elephant design that came out this week is 11 inches long, six inches wide, and nine inches high. It is carved from hardwood and painted. The release price is K110,000 per pair. — ASH/CT



The **Role of Micro-**, Small- and Medium-sized Enterprises

“The strength of a country lies within and I always encourage just to rely on foreign countries as a last resort out of my experiences through various regimes. In our tenure, we are striving for the economic development of the country and our main focus is on production businesses of micro-, small- and medium-sized enterprises (MSME), agricultural and livestock businesses.”

Excerpt from the speech of Chairman of the State Administration Council Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing, at the Union Government Meeting 7/2022

In striving for economic development and bringing better socioeconomic life for the people, small- and medium-sized enterprises are among the major driving forces. Therefore, the MSME Development Centre under the Ministry of Industry has been operating since 4 April 2012 to be able to provide SMEs with long-term and short-term support. The proposal to operate the SME Development Centre was confirmed at the Union Government meeting 13/2012 on 29 March 2012 and the centre was first opened at No 35B/15, New University Avenue, Bahan Township, Yangon Region.

Then the centre was placed under the Directorate of Industrial Supervision and Inspection under the Ministry of Industry on 1 April 2014 and branches were formed in Union Territories, Nay Pyi Taw, 14 States and Regions, 38 districts totalling 53 that are providing services to SMEs.

To support SMEs in their efforts to ease difficulties and enhance their competency, the SMEs Development Law was enacted in April 2015 and the SMEs Development Policy was adopted in December 2015. The by-law of the SMEs Development Law entered into force in October 2016.

SME (Small and Medium Enterprise)

Small and Medium Enterprises Development Law (2015) divides enterprises into six categories.

- Production
- Cutting, Making and Packing
- Wholesales
- Retails
- Services
- any other businesses

SME Development Agency was formed to carry out necessary measures for the development of small and medium enterprise development. Any business involved in one of the above six business categories can be registered as an SME business and entitled to receive an SME member card and support from the agency.

MSME refers to micro, small and medium enterprises and the term microenterprise means businesses that are in smaller capacity than that of small business by definition. A law for small and medium enterprises has already been enacted, however, no similar legal instrument has been in place for micro businesses.

Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs)

SME Development Centre was formed to support SMEs in their efforts to develop their businesses to be able to transform into heavy industries in the future.

The Directorate of Industrial Supervision & Inspection under the Ministry of Industry has developed a database of Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs) to be able to provide information, registration process, necessary things for getting loans, general consultation and information for

those who are trying to start a business and training in collaboration with local and international organizations. The department is also responsible for online servicing of connecting local SMEs to the ASEAN SMEs Portal, conducting business matching to establish connections between local SMEs and their overseas counterparts and forming export consortia teams and clusters to win overseas markets.

Implementation stage

Central Committee on Micro, Small and Medium Enterprise Development and Work Committee on Micro, Small and Medium Enterprise Development have been formed to step up the implementation measures for the development of MSMEs. Under the management of the two committees, working bodies including regional MSME development agencies, fund management and evaluation teams were formed across the country.

SME Development Agency is carrying out the development of MSMEs by organizing trade fairs for MSMEs, honouring MSMEs with the National MSMEs Award, disseminating technology, conducting business matching meetings, arranging capacity building training courses for MSME staff, providing financial aids, assisting in registration of MSMEs and offering consultation.

Empowering Growth: MoST's Initiative to Support MSMEs in Food Production Sector

Research, technologies, and the knowledge of standards needed by micro-, small-, and medium-sized enterprises (MSMEs) in the food manufacturing sector will be provided by the Ministry of Science and Technology, the ministry stated.

The Food Production Technology Dissemination Programme was activated to use international-level technologies to produce food products with high quality and standards following the guidelines of the Central Committee for Development of Micro-, Small-, and Medium-sized Enterprises.

It is also known that 100 MSME entrepreneurs from Yangon Region, Bago Region, Ayeyawady Region, Kayin State, Mon State, and Taninthayi Region will be provided with knowledge on six new food production technologies and standards. — ASH/CT

Original owners to gain authorization for music copyrights

ACCORDING to the Myanmar National Music Copyright Owners Association of the Myanmar Music Association (Central), official permission must be obtained from the copyright holders for the music to be performed on stage, broadcast on television, and online.

Regarding the unauthorized use of music, permission must be obtained from the copyright holders, such as the producer, the organizations and individuals to whom the song and band was recorded (or have been legally assigned).

When bands and singing performances are done including cover songs, there is a

sense of disrespect for copyright. The composer's permission is required. In addition, performers who play music-only tunes must obtain permission from copyright holders. If these songs are used in stage performances, you must obtain official permission from the concert organizers and copyright holders," said U Lwin Myint, Chairman of the Myanmar Music Association (Central).

The user shall be responsible for any issues arising from such unauthorized access and use, and if there is no solution, the relevant organizations will continue to act according to the rules and regulations set by the existing law. — ASH/KZL
