Use of chemicals planned to clear vegetation from Bagan Pagodas

HEMICALS will be used to remove the plants on the pagodas in Bagan, World Heritage Site depending on the values of history and architectural works, according to the Department of Archaeology and National Museum (Bagan Branch).

The department cooperates with the Bagan Heritage Trust (BHT) to remove the vines on the ancient buildings using herbicides as per the priorities.

"The department will work together with the BHT to conserve the ancient heritages in Bagan successively. We also conduct emergency responses to natural disasters that can be sudden in World Heritage Site. In removing the plants on the pagodas, we will work with BHT as there is not enough staff in the laboratory division. We will also conduct capacity-building training for the new generation of BHT," said U Kyaw Myo Win, director of the department.

The plant removal operation will be conducted monthly. It is reported that it will make regular monitoring procedures on the upper part of the pagoda and research paper reading sessions by cooperating with the department. — ASH/KTZH

Russian Federation's humanitarian assistance for Mocha victims received

BASED on the friendship between Russia and Myanmar, a cargo plane carrying humanitarian assistance from the Russian Federation for Mocha victims landed at Yangon International Airport yesterday early morning.

An official from the AHA Centre, Director U Than Soe of the Disaster Management Department of Yangon Region accompanied by officials and officials from the Russian Embassy to Myanmar checked the supplies. Included in the relief supplies that arrived yesterday were 13.95 tonnes of preserved fish, 10.5 tonnes of macaronl, 2.9 tonnes of 25 tents (10-person group) and a mobile electric power station (2.8 tonnes).

The government provides humanitarian assistance items in time to the Mocha-affected people by upholding the principle that no one should be left behind by joining respective ministries and the region/state governments under the supervision of the Natural Disaster Management Centre. — MNA/ MKKS

In the regional development sector, the Senior General disclosed that currently, preparations are being made to run trains on the Lasio-Mandalay railway whereas construction of the Lashio-Muse-Lashio-Chinshwehaw railway is also under preparation.

Only when the flow of commodities is swift and smooth will it contribute to the development socioeconomic life of local people. Hence, the runway of Lashio Airport is being improved to ensure better transport, he added.

The Senior General underscored that if transport facilities are developed, Shan State (North) and its residents can enjoy the fruits of improved socioeconomic life, and all-out efforts aim for region-wise development and then nationwide improvement.

He pointed out that as Shan State (North) is endowed with fascinating natural beauties including the Gokteik Viaduct attracting travellers, efforts should be made for the restoration of peace and stability and the rule of law for the development of the tourism industry.

The Senior General gave guidance after inspecting progress in upgrading the runway of Lashio Airport for the purpose of admitting the landing of jets.

Regarding the economic sector, the Senior General highlighted that as domestic manufacturing industries based on agriculture and livestock farms are being encouraged to raise the GDP of the State, the government helps boom MSME businesses. On the other hand, he continued to say that it is necessary to decline commodity prices and adjust consumption and production. Potato prices rise while onion prices plummet in commodity market

IN the commodity market, the wholesale price of Chinese potatoes, which dropped to K2,100 per viss, rose to K2,450 per viss on 7 September. Onions that were valued up to K3,700 per viss, faced falling prices on 8 September, fetching K3,250 per viss.

The Yangon potato market announced the price of Chinese potatoes, and the wholesale price of Chinese potatoes fell to K2,100 per viss on 28 August. The prices rose to K2,300 on 4 September, K2,400–K2,450 on 5 September, and K2,400 on 8 September.

In the onion market, which has a lot of interest in trading, the wholesale price of a viss of onions was only K2,600 on 17 August 2023. The price went up to K3,700 on 29 August.

The onion price is decreasing de-

On 8 September, 28,000 visses of onions entered the Pakokku market, and the highest price for a viss of onions was only K2,850. According to market price reports, the highest price of a viss in local markets was above K3,000 in the previous days.

On 8 September 2022, which is the same period as last year, the wholesale price of Chinese potatoes was K2,150– K2,200 per viss, and the wholesale price of onions was between K2,900 and K3,500 per viss.

Therefore, at the start of the second week of September this year, the prices of onions and potatoes were still remarkably low compared to the same period last year. Thus, the price of onions and potatoes has not yet risen for consumers, Ko Aung Moe, a seller of onions and potatoes from the Lanmadaw Nyaungpinlay Market, told the Global New Light of Myanmar (GNLM). — TWA/CT

Rice prices drop approximately 7% compared to last week

THE price of rice has dropped by seven per cent due to the fact that rice is being sold at a lower price in the Wahdan and Bayintnaung commodities markets and designated retail stores. U Nay Lin, chairman of the Myanmar Rice Traders Association, said that trading in the Yangon rice market is currently slow.

MRESA warns of counterfeit documents in real estate market

IN real estate transactions, cases of false sales and purchases using counterfeit documents often occur. Those involved in such fraudulent activities may not necessarily be real estate agents; some fraudsters use fake grant papers, and they create bogus receipts through technology, often avoiding collateral acceptance contracts. During the election of the new central executive committee of the Myanmar Real Estate Service Association at Yuzana Hotel, executive U Yin Htwe told to the media on 5 September.

TWO fires broke out in two townships, in Yangon Region on 9 September.

A fire broke out at the Muslim Charitable Hospital on Maha Bandoola Park Road, Kyauktada Township, at around 1:30 pm on 9 September, according to the Myanmar Fire Brigade Headquarters.

Zaw Zaw told The Global New Light of Myanmar (GNLM) that the fire lasted for about 10 minutes and was extinguished in time by officials. In addition, members of the Social Welfare Association, including those from Lawkahita Charity, assisted in relocating both the hospital's patients and those who had come to the hospital to escape from the fire.

And, another fire broke

out in a garage located in Ward 63 of Dagon Myothit (South) Township at around 1:30 pm. The fire brigade responded promptly, extinguishing the fire at Level 1, and it was completely put out by 3:35 pm. The root cause of the fire and the extent of the damage are currently under investigation by a combined team. — TWA/KZW

Over 2,700 EVs registered in first eight months of 2023

IN 2023, more than 2,700 electric vehicles (EVs) were registered, according to a statement from the Road Transport Administration Department.

From January to August this year, 2,779 EV vehicles motorcycles and tricycles were registered. There are more than 600 EV vehicles, which include two EV light truck and one EV cargo (truck), allowed to be registered until the end of August. More than 1,800 two-wheeled EV motorcycles and over 230 three-wheeled EVs have also been registered.



Expanding markets via international maritime trade routes

IN 2023, more than 50 container ships docked at Yangon port, and in the first eight months alone, over 400 ships arrived. During September, 53 international cargo ships entered the port for trade, as reported by the Myanma Port Authority.— Htun Htun/KZW According to the Road Transportation Administration Department, Yangon's licensing authority is planning to issue an average of 10,000 EV vehicle registrations per year for imported electric vehicles (EVs).

The EV pilot project is scheduled to run until 31 December, allowing for the importation of EV vehicles through both sea and border ports. Reports are coming in from the Myanmar-China border, specifically the Wang Ding side.

During this pilot project, the Ministry of Commerce has

announced that importing EV vehicles from third party countries will not be allowed.

To develop the EV sector, the National Electric Vehicle and Related Industries Development Steering Committee has set the tax rates for electric vehicles to be reduced to zero per cent. — TWA/KZW

This compels all Myanmar citizens to embrace the responsible management of forest resources, environmental greenery, climate change mitigation, and natural disaster prevention.

In light of these pressing concerns, tree-planting ceremonies have become a ubiquitous tradition across the nation during the monsoon season when the soil is primed for sapling growth. These ceremonies symbolize acts of compassion and nobility, reaffirming our commitment to a greener and more sustainable future for all.

LOBAL rice prices reached a 15-year high in August after top exporter India banned some overseas sales of the grain, the Food and Agriculture Organization said Friday.

While global food prices eased in August, those of rice rose 9.8 per cent compared to the previous month, "reflecting trade disruptions in the aftermath of a ban on Indica white rice exports by India", the FAO said in a monthly report.

"Uncertainty about the ban's duration and concerns over export restrictions caused supply-chain actors to hold on to stocks, re-negotiate contracts or stop making price offers, thereby limiting most trade to small volumes and previously concluded sales," the UN agency said.

Rice is a major world food staple and prices on international

markets have soared in the wake of the Covid pandemic, the war in Ukraine and the impact of the El Nino weather phenomenon on production levels.

India announced in July a ban on exports of non-basmati white rice, which account for around a quarter of its total.

The consumer affairs and food ministry said at the time that the move would "ensure adequate availability" and "allay the rise in prices in the domestic market".

The ban was expected to hit African nations, Turkiye, Syria and Pakistan, all of which were Rice, a vital global food staple, has experienced surging prices due to the Covid pandemic, the Ukraine conflict, and El Nino's production disruptions.

KFC, Colonel Sanders and the American Dream

THE original writer of this book under review is Josh Ozersky, who is contributing articles on food and culture to American magazines. And this book was published by the University of Texas under the title, "Colonel Sanders and the American Dream". The translator of this book is Yee Lwin, who said in his foreword to the translated version that the extreme eulogies of Colonel Sanders have been cut off.

Colonel Harland David Sanders was an American businessman, best known for founding fast food chicken restaurant chain Kentucky Fried Chicken and later acting as the company's brand ambassador and symbol. His name and image are still symbols of the company.

He was born in Henryville, Indiana, United States on 9 September 1890. He died on 16 December 1980 in Louisville, Kentucky in the

United States.

In his youth, Sanders held a variety of jobs, including steam engine stoker, insurance salesman and gas station operator. He started selling fried chicken at a streetside restaurant in North Corbin, Kentucky, during the Great Depression. During that time, Sanders developed a "secret recipe" and a patented method of cooking chicken in a pressure fryer. Sanders saw the potential of the restaurant franchise concept, and in 1952, the first KFC franchise opened in South Salt Lake, Utah. After the original restaurant closed, Mr Sanders devoted himself full-time to franchising fried chicken across the US and internationally has been overwhelming for Sanders. In 1946, then 73, he sold the company for US\$2 million (18.9 million today) to a group of investors led by John Y Brown Jr and Jack C Massey. Nevertheless, he retained operational control in Canada and became a paid brand ambassador

for Kentucky Fried Chicken. In his later years, he became highly critical of the food served at KFC restaurants, believing that they cut costs and allowed lower quality.

Concerning public image and personality, Sanders began dressing up, growing a goatee and wearing a black frock coat (later changed to a white suit), and lace ties, and called himself colonel. According to the biographer Josh Ozzerski, his peers "first jokingly and then seriously" agreed with the title change. For the last 20 years of his life, he wore nothing else in public, and in the winter, he wore a heavy woollen suit. A light cotton suit is perfect for summer. He bleached his moustache and goatee to match his grey hair. John Y Brown Jr recalled Sanders as "a great man with gourmet food taste, visionary vision, great motivation, the style of a showman and the discipline of an artist". Vince Lombardi: Sanders was a Freemason.

The FAO's global food price index, which tracks monthly changes in international prices of a basket of food commodities. averaged 121.4 points in August, down 2.1 per cent from July.

The index was 24 per cent below the summit it reached in March 2022.

Prices of cereal, meat, dairy and vegetable oils all fell in August.

Interview with Mr Vasily Pushkov, Director of International Cooperation, Sputnik

GNLM: Mr Vasily, could you tell us the purpose of your visit? **Mr Vasily Pushkov:** The purpose of my visit is a very specific, singular purpose to actually, finally, personally sign a new cooperation agreement with our new partner in Myanmar—the newspaper Global New Light of Myanmar. So, this is such an important occasion for our media group that just for this purpose alone, I decided to come to Myanmar.

GNLM: Yesterday, I saw you at the signing ceremony. So, after the signing ceremony, how do you feel about our cooperation? Mr Vasily Pushkov: I feel very optimistic because when you start talking to your new partners, you immediately understand whether you are on the same page or not. As I mentioned yesterday, I know that we are experiencing the same problems, we have the same challenges, and we have the same goals and values. So, I just see that there will be no difficulty for us to move forward with this cooperation. Now all we have to do is to find the best way to communicate, the best way to conduct logistics, and I think that it will just grow naturally from there.

I understand that it's not very simple, it's not very easy to put a correspondent in Moscow, being a Myanmar media company. So, we are ready to provide you with our own news products about Russia that you can use in your work. Also, the second thing is that we, an international media group, Broadcast Sputnik broadcast 32 languages worldwide, and part of our audience lives in Myanmar. So, for us, it's very important to actually understand the local audience there, the interest, media, culture and so on and so forth. We hope to learn that from you. At the same time, we are ready to share any of our expertise with you. **GNLM:** With our cooperation,

do you believe that can we promote the friendship between our two countries?

MR Vasily Pushkov: Well, the most possible direct way, because Russian people, I'm sorry to say that Russian people are now are only learning in general, are only starting to learn about Myanmar.

THE government has been working on creating closer ties with Myanmar for quite some time now. General audience, the general public only starts to learn about Myanmar. In order for the government to conduct its work at a steadier pace, the public has to support them. So, we are here also to provide our Russian-speaking audience with news about Myanmar. GNLM: Another one is the rise of social media and also the rise of so-called citizen journalists. So the mainstream media is facing a lot of problems with fake news and other uncorrected information. So what is your opinion about how we fight for the fake news? Mr Vasily Pushkov: Well, I'm going to be honest with you, it is my personal opinion, but I don't treat fake news as some sort of new disease that you can't actually find a cure for. Fake news has been around for centuries, actually.

In this particular form, you are the first partner in Myanmar.

GNLM: Why did you decide to make a cooperation with The Global New Light of Myanmar? **MR Vasily Pushkov:** Actually, well, I am personally not a big expert on Myanmar media, so I have talked to several people, and we had good advice from the Russian embassy to Myanmar. 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So, all we can do is actually provide a balance with professional news. Modi opens G20 summit as PM of 'Bharat'

INDIAN Prime Minister Narendra Modi made his opening address to the G20 summit Saturday with his country nameplate labelled "Bharat" — an ancient Sanskrit word — in the biggest signal yet of a potential official change.

The gesture came days after invitations to the summit dinner were sent out in the name of the "President of Bharat", prompting rumours that official usage of the country's English name would be scrapped.

Modi himself typically refers to India as "Bharat", a word steeped in Hindu religious symbolism and dating back to scripture: in the Mahabharata, King Dushyant and Shakuntala's son was named "Bharat" and the kingdom he inherited came to be known as "Bharatvarsha".

India and Bharat are both official names for the country under its constitution, in which Article 1 opens with the phrase: "India, that is Bharat".

The plaque in front of PM Modi at the G20 Summit said "Bharat".

PM Modi on Saturday called upon the international community to transform the global trust deficit into one of trust and reliance. He stressed that it is time for the world to move together.

In his address at Session-1 on 'One Earth' during the G20 Summit being hosted under India's Presidency, PM Modi said, "Following the COVID pandemic, the world faced a new challenge of trust deficit and unfortunately, the wars have further deepened this.

But we must remember that if we can defeat a pandemic like COVID, we can also win over the challenge of this trust deficit.

Today, as the President of the G20, India calls upon the entire world to transform this global trust deficit into trust and confidence. This is the time for all of us to move together."

"India's G20 presidency has become a symbol of inclusion, of 'sabka saath' both inside and outside the country.

This has become People's G20 in India. Crores of Indians are connected to this. In more than 60 cities of the country, more than 200 meetings have taken place. With the sense of 'Sabka Saath', India had proposed that the African Union be granted permanent membership of G20. I believe that all of us agree to this proposal," he said.

PM Modi also invited the head of the African Union to take his seat as a member of the G20. — AFP /ANI

Group of 20 expands as African Union joins bloc

The African Union was granted permanent membership in the G2O summit, bolstering the representation of the continent in the group, as Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi aimed to position India as a voice for the Global South.



THE African Union joined the Group of 20 leading economies at its summit on Saturday, giving the continent broader representation in the often-divided bloc as host Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi seeks to portray his country as a voice for the Global South.

"With everyone's approval, I request the African Union head to take his seat as a permanent G20 member," Modi said in his opening address, banging a ceremonial gavel. Modi, who has painted the summit as India's diplomatic coming of age and is pushing for a permanent seat on the UN Security Council, said it turned the grouping into a "people's G20".

The African Union at full strength has 55 members but six junta-ruled nations are currently suspended. Collectively, it has a GDP of \$3 trillion with some 1.4 billion people.

As the G20, the grouping included 19 countries and the European Union, representing 85 per cent of the world GDP, with South Africa its only member state from the continent. "As a continent, we look forward to further advancing our aspirations on the global stage using the G20 platform," Nigerian President Bola Ahmed Tinubu, who is at the summit, posted on X, formerly known as Twitter. The G20 was conceived in the throes of the 2008 financial crisis as a way to manage the global economy, but finding consensus among members has been increasingly difficult in recent years. — AFP



Gotion builds EV lithium battery manufacturing plant in Illinois

GOTION announced on Friday that it is building a new electric vehicle (EV) lithium battery manufacturing plant in Manteno, US state of Illinois. Covering approximately 150 acres, the plant will focus on lithium-ion battery cell, battery pack production, and energy storage system integration, according to a press release issued by the Illinois governor's office.

The plant is expected to begin production in 2024, to produce 10 GWh of lithium-ion battery packs and 40 GWh of lithium-ion battery cells, and will create over 2,600 jobs for local residents, the press release said.

Illinois Governor JB Pritzk-

er and local leaders and officials joined the EV battery maker's groundbreaking ceremony in Manteno, a township about 80 kilometres south of Chicago, on Friday, hailing the project as a significant step forward for Illinois in growing its EV ecosystem and supply chain.

"With 2.600 new jobs. a 2-billion-dollar gigafactory, and the most significant new manufacturing investment in Illinois in decades, it's the most recent proof that we are in a new paradigm. Illinois is on the rise, and we're open for business," Pritzker said. "This new facility will be a game-changer in our state's economy, creating new

THE Czech unit of Japanese automaker Toyota said Friday it would suspend its production for another week following a fire at the factory of its plastic parts supplier.

The world's top-selling carmaker halted production at its plant east of Prague on 22 August, a week after the factory of local car-parts maker Novares was destroyed by fire.

"I can confirm the shutdown will be extended until next Friday, that is, 15 September," Tomas Paroubek, a spokesman for Toyota Motor Manufacturing Czech, told AFP. He declined to comment on the impact on production at the car

Israel to lift 5-day ban on exports from Gaza at main crossing

THE Israeli authorities have decided to reopen the Kerem Shalom border crossing for commercial goods leaving the Gaza Strip after a five-day closure, Palestinian authorities said on Friday.

"Israel has officially informed us that goods exports through Kerem Shalom will restart on Sunday," the coordinating commission run by the Palestinian Authority said in a press statement to Xinhua.

Israel on Tuesday halted commercial goods leaving Gaza through Kerem Shalom, the sole crossing point for exports from Gaza to Israel, after thwarting an attempt to smuggle explosive materials at the crossing, according to Palestinian and Israeli sources.

Israel accused the armed Palestinians in Gaza of assisting the militants in the West Bank in manufacturing explosives for use in attacks against the Israelis.

During the five-day suspension, the Gaza-based businessmen, workers, and human rights organizations have called on the international community to pressure Israel to revoke its decision and reopen the crossing. — Xinhua

The North Korean leader Kim Jong-un and his daughter attended a paramilitary parade held in Kim Il-sung Square in Pyongyang to mark the 75th anniversary of the country, state media reported on Saturday.

North Korea, officially the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK), was established on 9 September 1948.

To mark the founding day, rocket launchers towed by trucks and tractors traversed the square in the capital that bears the name of the founder of North Korea, while planes lined up in the sky to depict the number "75" to the strains of music played by a military orchestra, according to the official Korean

Central News Agency (KCNA).

A solemn ceremony of raising the national flag of the DPRK took place, and columns of the Workers and Peasants' Red Militia also marched across the square. At the end of the parade, there was a fireworks display.

Coming as North Korea is set on enhancing ties with Moscow and Beijing, diplomats from both countries stationed in Pyongyang had been invited to attend the celebrations.

A Chinese delegation led by Vice-Premier Liu Guozhong, as well as the Russian Army Academic Song and Dance Ensemble named after Alexandrov, which is visiting the DPRK, were also in attendance. — SPUTNIK

UK police arrest escaped terror suspect in London

UK police on Saturday arrested a terror suspect who escaped from a London prison earlier this week, sparking a nationwide manhunt.

"Metropolitan Police officers have arrested Daniel Khalife. Officers apprehended him just before 11 am (1000GMT) today in the Chiswick area, and he is currently in police custody," the force said in a tweet.

Prime Minister Rishi Sunak, currently in India at the G20 summit, told UK media he was "very pleased with the news".

"My thanks to the police officers for their fantastic work over the past couple of days," he added. The 21-year-old former soldier fled from Wandsworth prison in south London on Wednesday morning, probably by clinging to the bottom of a delivery van.

His disappearance triggered a major hunt with extra security checks introduced at ports and airports amid fears he may try to flee the country. But following confirmed sightings in south west London, he was eventually apprehended in the Chiswick neighbourhood on Saturday. He last appeared in court in London on 28 January and was remanded in custody over two incidents at the Royal Air Force base in Stafford, central England, near the army barracks where he lived. — AFP

US confirms April seizure of Iran oil shipment

In April, the US confirmed seizing an Iranian oil tanker, the Suez Rajan, and its cargo for alleged sanctions violations, imposing a fine on the vessel's owner.

THE United States confirmed Friday that it seized a tanker load of Iranian oil in April, just before Iran seized two vessels in the Gulf region, in the Justice Department's first official statement on the incident.

The department said that it had seized the Suez Rajan, a Greek-managed tanker, and its cargo of 980,000 barrels of crude oil, allegedly being sold by Iran's powerful Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps to China.

At the time US authorities would not confirm it was taking control of the cargo and that the ship was sailing to the United States

But Iran's seizure of two tankers - the Marshall Islands-flagged Advantage Sweet as it sailed toward the United States in the Gulf of Oman, and then the Greek-owned Niovi, as it travelled from Dubai to Fujairah — came just days later.

At the time the United States accused Iran of "harassment" and "interference with navigational rights in regional and international waters".

The seizures elevated tensions in the Gulf region. — AFP



No call for phase-out of fossil fuels in G20 statement: text

A G2O leaders' statement issued at their summit in New Delhi on Saturday contained no pledge to phase out fossil fuels, the text showed, despite multiple warnings of a climate crisis.

The leaders said they recognized the importance of "accelerating efforts towards phasedown of unabated coal power", a day after a key UN report said phasing out all unabated fossil fuels was "indispensable" to reaching net zero. - AFP

Myanmar has one point from one game and Kyrgyzstan has one point from two games. The Myanmar team will play against the South Korean team on 12 September as a final group game. — Ko Nyi Lay/KZL

Djokovic schools Shelton to reach 10th US Open final

NOVAK Djokovic earned himself another shot at a record-equalling 24th Grand Slam title after beating unseeded American Ben Shelton in straight sets on Friday to advance to his 10th US Open final. Djokovic ended the run of the 20-year-old Shelton, winning 6-3, 6-2, 7-6 (7/4) to set up a potential repeat of his Wimbledon final against Carlos Alcaraz, who faces Daniil Medvedev in the other semi-final.

"Another Grand Slam final. I cannot be happier with where I am," said Djokovic, who signed off victory in his 100th US Open match by imitating Shelton's hang-up-thephone celebration.

Two-goal Neymar breaks Pele's record as Brazil crush Bolivia 5-1

NEYMAR surpassed Pele as Brazil's all-time top scorer with two second-half goals in a 5-1 win over Bolivia in South America's 2026 World Cup qualifiers on Friday. The 31-year-old striker went into the game level with Pele on 77 goals and had a golden opportunity to break the record in the 17th minute when Brazil were awarded a penalty.

But he looked distraught after his soft spot-kick was easily saved by Bolivia keeper Guillermo Viscarra to keep the scores goalless. Seven minutes later, Brazil got in front when Rodrygo reacted quickly to slot home after a shot from Raphinha was parried out by Viscarra. Brazil doubled their lead just after the break when Raphinha cut in from the left and his low shot took a slight deflection as it flew into the bottom corner. Neymar had a hand in Brazil's third, with a clever chipped pass that was flicked on by Bruno Guimaraes into the path of Rodrygo who confidently drilled home.

Then came Neymar's moment to enter the history books as he pounced on a loose ball inside the box and tucked away his 78th goal in his 125th game for his country — raising his hands and his

o gaze to the skies.

Victor Abrego pulled a goal back for Bolivia, bustling through a disorganized Brazil backline before blasting an unstoppable shot past Ederson. —AFP

Miyazaki's likely swan song charms Toronto as film fest opens

THE Toronto International Film Festival opened Thursday with admiring applause for "The Boy and the Heron", Japanese animation master Hayao Miyazaki's likely last movie — a meditation on love, loss and the horrors of World War II.

Cinema buffs crowded into the 2,000-seat Princess of Wales theatre to be the first outside Japan to catch Miyazaki's first feature film for the storied Studio Ghibli in a decade and, at age 82, perhaps his farewell to the industry.

The film tells the story of young Mahito, who moves to the countryside with his father after his mother dies in a fire-bombing during World War II. It takes viewers on a surreal journey as Mahito searches for his mother, encountering talking animals and fantastical creatures along the way.

The film, showcased at the Toronto International Film Festival (TIFF), is seen as a brilliant expression of director Hayao Miyazaki's vision. — AFP

How ancient city on Silk Road attracts global fans

Pronkina Olga, a 37-year-old Russian professor at the Gansu University of Political Science and Law, is a huge fan of Dunhuang and has a strong bond with this ancient city on the Silk Road.

Her connection with Dunhuang began 16 years ago when she watched a performance of Dunhuang dance in her hometown in Russia's Penza. The dance performance drew inspiration from the murals in the Mogao Grottoes, a UNESCO World Heritage Site in Dunhuang, northwest China's Gansu Province.

The thrilling performance piqued her interest in Dunhuang culture, and so she later travelled to China to study Dunhuang culture. This year, she was invited to an academic symposium on the global significance of Dunhuang Studies in the city.

"Culture can connect different countries, religions, and nationalities. My life is rich and colourful because it is connected by cultures," she said. She is not alone. The study of cultural relics based on the Dunhuang grottoes and related documents has inspired the formation of an internationally distinguished discipline of Dunhuang studies since the cultural treasures of Dunhuang were rediscovered at the beginning of the 20th century.

Dunhuang studies and the preservation of Dunhuang's cultural relics have vigorously developed, and the ancient city with more than 2,000 years of history has gradually evolved into a world-renowned cultural and artistic treasure house. With collaborative efforts of academic circles both at home and abroad, a wealth of outstanding academic achievements and a large number of international academic cooperation projects have emerged. —Xinhua

Japan city to use robots to tackle rising school truancy



Japanese city plans to use robots to enable pupils to attend classes virtually, as truancy rates surge due to anxiety and bullying, officials said Wednesday. Children will be able to use devices at home to remotely manoeuvre robots that represent them at school, allowing them to take part in classes and discussions with schoolmates, the southern city of Kumamoto said. Like other countries, Japan has seen a rise in children not attending school following the Covid-19 pandemic, with reasons for being absent ranging from difficulty fitting in to bullying, according to a government probe. The one-metre (threefoot) tall robots will be self-propelling, with pupils able to move them within the school grounds and even participate in events, reports said. "Communicating through these robots is not completely real-life, but can at least give a certain sense of reality to kids who are still unsure and afraid of interacting with others," Maki Yoshizato, a Kumamoto city official, told AFP. "We hope this undertaking will help alleviate their psychological fears." Across Japan, the number of truant pupils at elementary and middle school levels hit an all-time high of 244,940 in fiscal year 2021, according to the latest education ministry survey. - AFP
