Myanmar delegation attends 2023 Global Public Security Cooperation Forum



The symposium was jointly organized by the Department of Research and Innovation, the National Standards and Quality Department and the National Institute of Metrology (Myanmar).

At the event, the Myanmar delegates discussed the standardization of national-level infrastructure and the National Institute of Metrology (Myanmar), and the Chinese experts focused on the Myanmar-China bilateral research, Dimensional Metrology and Temperature Metrology.

discussed effective measures for manufacturing industries through metrological activities.

Water from Kyeeohn Kyeewa Dam overflows from spillway

THE Kyeeohn Kyeewa Dam in Pwintbyu Township, Magway Region, which local farmers rely on for agricultural water, has seen an increase in the inflow of rainwater due to recent rains

Rainwater inflow into the dam increased yesterday morning and the water overflowed from the spillway about 5.3 feet above the 340 feet high of the full

point of the dam, according to U Soe Tint, assistant engineer of the dam

As the rainfall decreased at the beginning of September, the overflow from the dam's excess

water gradually decreased, and now, due to the rains, the inflow of rainwater increased again.

Although there is overflow from the spillway, there is no concern for the local people downstream the dam, and the spillway and related buildings are strong and in good condi-

Regarding the overflow from the spillway of the dam, the staff on duty take turns to monitor the water level and inform the residents of the villages downstream the dam about the situation of rainwater entering the dam daily in a timely manner according to the natural disaster prevention plan.

The Kyeeohn Kyeewa Dam

in Pwintbyu Township is one of the dams that can store the most irrigation water in Minbu District, providing sufficient water for agriculture and crops for the local people.

If there is an increase in rainwater in the dam due to the rainfall, the hydropower plant will operate 24 hours a day, and the electricity generated will be sent to the national grid, benefiting the electricity supply.

Due to the good rainfall this year, rainwater can be stored in the dam, and the water can be sent to the Mezali diversion weir and distributed it to the farmers in the region to grow crops. — Hlaing Win Lay (Pwintbyu Myay)/KZL

207 construction permits issued in three weeks of September

IT is known that 207 construction permits were issued within the municipal areas of the Yangon City Development Committee during the three weeks of September.

According to the Engineering Department (Buildings), 207 construction permits and 49 building comple-

tion certificates (BCCs) were granted in the three weeks of September.

In addition, to allow the construction of the building, 13 letters of recommendation were sent to the Department of Fire Services, 48 letters to the Engineering Department (Water and Sanitation), eight letters

to the Department of Urban Land Management, one to the Engineering Department (Roads and Bridges), two to the Engineering Department (Water Course Management), and four to the Department of Urban and Housing Development. — TWA/CT

YCDC initiates four-week training for garbage vans operation & maintenance

THE Yangon City Development Committee launched a training programme focused on the systematic operation and maintenance of garbage vans on 20 September.

This initiative aims to improve knowledge and skills related to garbage truck maintenance and operation, ensuring their prolonged use in preserving Yangon's cleanliness. The training programme has several objectives, including enforcing departmental work rules among drivers, enhancing safe driving practices in compliance with traffic regulations, and proficiency in managing hydraulic systems. The primary goal is to prevent major vehicle weaknesses through daily checks of critical components like oil, water, air and lubricant.

The course covers various essential aspects, such as effective ground cleaning techniques, economical use of vehicle maintenance supplies, ve-

hicle maintenance procedures, and strict adherence to traffic regulations. Instruction on engine operation in the currently employed garbage vans will be provided by experienced motorists and engineers from the Department of Urban Environmental Conservation and Sanitation.

This comprehensive training programme is attended by 45 trainees from township offices under the Department of Urban Environmental Conservation and Sanitation, spanning four weeks. — TWA/KZW

MRF declares paddy reference price during monsoon paddy harvest season

MYANMAR Rice Federation announced on 19 September the reference prices of various monsoon paddy varieties produced in 2023.

The floor prices and the ceiling prices are set at K1.3-1.5 million per 100 baskets of low-grade monsoon paddy (Ngasein/Aemahta) varieties, K1.6-1.8 million for Ayeyawady Pawsan and Ayeya Padaytha paddy varieties, K1.8-2 million for Shwebo Pawsan paddy. The federation urged the traders not to offer higher prices than the reference prices.

To have a decent price during the harvest season of monsoon paddy, the MRF set the reference prices upon the decisions of the related non-governmental organizations, officials of the MRF, and rice exporting companies, to have a certain profit for the stakeholders in

the supply chain including millers, traders and producers and to ensure the fair price for the consumers, under the guidelines of the State for the commodity price stability.

However, the MRF has not revealed the measurement for one basket. Normally, it is measured at 46 pounds per basket of paddy. Depending on the moisture content, the measurement increased to 50 pounds and above per basket while traders were buying them from farmers.

The reference price of paddy was set at K320,000 per 100 baskets (a basket is equivalent to 46 pounds) in the 2012-2013 financial year. The price soared to K1.5 million per 100 baskets after a decade.

The yield rate of monsoon paddy is estimated at 70 baskets per acre, allowing the farmers to earn K1 million. Before the monsoon paddy harvest season, the paddy prices surged to K1.8-2.8 million per 100 baskets of low-grade monsoon paddy and Ayeyawady Pawsan paddy in early September from K1.45-1.9 million recorded in early February 2023. The price of Shwebo paddy jumped to K3.7 million per 100 baskets in September from K2.5 million in early January 2023.

Flooding market causes drop in peanut prices amid weak global demand

THE prices of peanuts tumbled down in the Mandalay market owing to the excess supply of peanuts when the global demand faltered.

It is the harvest season of peanuts so they are flooding the Mandalay market. At present, demand by the main buyer China is also slowing.

Moreover, oil millers' demand is also sluggish, as per the Mandalay Commodity Centre.

The peanut prices hit a high of K11,000 per viss on 18 August on the back of strong foreign and domestic demand.

The prevailing prices move in the range between K6,450 and K8,800 per viss depending on the varieties, indicating a one-month drop of K1,100-2,200 per viss.

Nonetheless, the peanut

Myanmar has been export-

ing oil seeds (sesame and peanuts) to foreign countries. In April 2022, the world's top palm oil exporter Indonesia, which is one of the main oil suppliers to Myanmar, declared an export ban on cooking oil to reduce domestic shortage. Consequently, Myanmar's Trade Department under the Ministry of Commerce temporarily suspended exports of oil crops (peanut and sesame) from 9 May 2022 to ensure oil self-sufficiency.

Exports of Myanmar's edible oil crops resumed as the world's top palm oil exporters returned to normalcy, according to a notification dated 5 July 2022 released by the Trade Department.

The country conveyed about 90,000 kilogrammes worth US\$14.503 million to foreign markets through seaborne and border trade channels over the past five months of the current financial year 2023-2024 beginning 1 April.


Mandalay Thiri Marlar market sees influx of China's carrots

MANDALAY Thiri Marlar market is bustling with trading activities of China's carrot, said U Aung Moe Naing, an owner of Mandalay's Aung Depot.

There is an inflow of three to four 12-wheel trucks loaded with China's carrots to Mandalay market daily. A 6-viss carton of carrots fetches K27,000-35,000.

"The market sees only carrot supply from neighbouring China. The inventory of locally produced carrots is pretty low.

"Moreover, the acreage of carrot cultivation is decreasing. The price of imported carrots is rising. Tomato, cauliflower, potato, Chinese mustard, French bean,

Fuel oil prices indicate a three-day decrease of over K100 per litre

FUEL prices showed a three-day decrease of over K100 per litre in the domestic market.

Fuel prices were K2,440 per litre of Octane 92, K2,565 for Octane 95, K2,650 for diesel and K2,725 for premium diesel on 18 September and then, the prices slipped to K2,330 per litre for Octane 92, K2,435 per litre for Octane 95, K2,530 for diesel and K2,610 for premium diesel on 21 September, indicating a decline of 11-130 per litre depending on types of oil.

The price index set by Mean of Platts Singapore (MOPS), the pricing basis for many refined products in southeast Asia, weighs on the domestic fuel prices, according to the Supervisory Committee on Oil Import, Storage and Distribution of Fuel Oil.

Last August 2022, the oil prices touched the highest of K2,605 per litre for Octane 92, K2,670 for Octane 95, K3,330 for premium diesel and K3,245 for diesel.

The committee is therefore steering the fuel oil storage and distribution sector effectively so as not to have a shortage of oil in the domestic market and to ensure price stability for energy consumers.

The Petroleum Products Regulatory Department, under the guidance of the committee, is issuing the daily reference rate for oil to offer a reasonable price to energy consumers. The reference rate in the Yangon Region is set on the MOPS's price assessment, shipping cost, premium insurance, tax, other general costs and health profit per cent.

The rates for regions and states other than Yangon are evaluated after adding the transportation cost and the retail reference rates daily covered on the state-run newspapers and are posted on the media and official website and Facebook page of the department daily starting from 4 May.

The committee is inspecting the fuel stations whether they are overcharging or not. The authorities are taking action against those retailers of fuel stations under the Petroleum and Petroleum Products Law 2017 if they are found overcharging rather than the set reference rate.

As per the statement, 90 per cent of fuel oil in Myanmar is imported, while the remaining 10 per cent is produced locally. The domestic fuel price is highly correlated with international prices. The State is steering the market to mitigate the loss between the importers, sellers and energy consumers. Consequently, the government is trying to distribute the oil at a reasonable price compared to those of regional countries.

Some countries levied higher tax rates and hiked oil prices compared to that of Myanmar. However, Malaysia's oil sector receives government subsidies and the prices are about 60 per cent cheaper than that of Myanmar.

Every country lays down different patterns of policy to fix the oil prices. Myanmar also levies only a lower tax rate on fuel oil and strives for energy consumers to buy the oil at a cheaper rate. — NN/EM

ENRY Crookshank (1893-1972) was born in Dublin the son of Charles Henry Crookshank and Elizabeth nee Stokes. His mother was related to the bacteriologist Adrian Stokes and archaeologist Margaret Mc-Nair Stokes. He was educated at St Columba's College and then Trinity College, Dublin where he studied mathematics but World War I interrupted his studies. He joined the Dublin Fusiliers in 1914 and served in the Middle East and France. He returned in 1918 to study

engineering and joined the Geological Survey of India in 1929. The geological work began with oil surveys near Karachi and later studied sapphires in the Vizag area, and studied in the Satpura Gondwana Basin. Crookshank returned from the field on the 16th of May 1933. Appointed to officiate as Superintendent from the 27th of March to the 21st of September, 1933, and again from the 6th of October to the 22nd of December 1933. Placed in charge of the Southern Circle till the 22nd of December 1933. Crookshank served in the Northwest Frontier in the early 1940s but was shot in both legs and flown back to Rawalpindi. After recovering he was posted in charge of mica production in Rajputana.

He became the superintending geologist in 1944-45 and worked on the geology of the northern slopes of the Satpuras between the Moraud and Sher rivers. He was a fellow of the Indian National Science Academy. Almost a month before Clegg's death, H Crookshank was asked telegraphically, when he was on the point of going on leave out of India, to take officiating charge of the post of Director, as Clegg had been suddenly taken ill. He continued to officiate in the post on Clegg's death until he was able to avail himself of leave. Crookshank published his 'Memoirs of the Geological Survey of India' in 1936.

Geological Surveys of Burma Circle

Crookshank mainly worked in India and no record has been found of his geological activity in Burma, therefore, some geological surveys of Burma Circle, in the 1936-37 field season, during his term in GSI, could be described as follows:

From the 1st of April 1937, a separate Burma Geological De- Kyanigan Hills

partment was created, consisting of Messrs. Clegg, Bradshaw, and Dutt, who were placed on foreign service with the Government of Burma. During the field season, Mr Clegg continued the extension of his survey of the Mogok Stone Tract by examining various outcrops in sheets 93 B/4, 93 B/3, and 93 B/2 between Mandalay and Thabeikkyin, and then continued mapping in sheets 93 A/4 and A/8 north of Thabeikkyin.

Mandalay Hill

The area south of Thabeikkyin is included in La Touche's map of the Northern Shan State but no attempt was made by La Touche to divide the rocks into the calcareous and granitic rocks which were known to exist. Mr Clegg found that all the isolated outcrops which protruded from the alluvium in the southern area consisted of either metamorphosed calcareous rocks, metamorphosed calcareous rocks intruded by granite, or solely granites. The exposures commence at Mandalay Hill, which consists essentially of crystalline limestones and diopside calciphyres, penetrated on the eastern flank by granite and pegmatite dykes. The granite, which is excellently exposed in the quarries on the east side of the hill, varies from fine aplitic to coarse porphyritic metamorphosed calcareous rocks with acid igneous intrusions on the south-west. Dr L A N Iyer continued the geological survey of the Amherst district begun by him in the 1935-36 field season, northwards in sheets 95 E/11 and 15, 95 E/14 and 95 I/1, 2, 6, and 7. Many of the observations recorded in the General Report for 1936, naturally apply with equal force to the area mapped during this field season. The main geological formations mapped were as follows: -

- 1. Laterite and laterite with gravel. 2. Moulmein limestone
- 3. Granite intrusions and contact altered rocks.

It has been reported that a riverbank collapse occurred at Thamata bank in Saphachaung Kyaungsu Ward, Dala Township, Yangon Region. This incident resulted in the sweeping away of six houses and two women, leading to one fatality.

Members of the rescue team from Dala Fire Station rushed to the scene to conduct rescue operations after receiving a report that a 1,300-foot-long and 60-foot-wide sagment of land had collapsed, and a house was washed away at the zero-mile mark of the Twantay Canal in Saphachaung Kyaungsu Ward, Dala Township. This incident occurred around 5:20 pm on 20 September.

The two women who fell into the water during the collapse were successfully

rescued, but unfortunately, a 42-year-old woman among them succumbed to her injuries at the township hospital.

According to the Myanmar Fire Brigade, Dala Fire Station facilitated the relocation of 297 people from 68 households who resided near the riverbank to the monastery in Tagyi Ward and Aungtawmu Monastery in Kyansittha Ward. — TWA/CT

Mingaladon, Shwepyitha seize stimulant tablets valued at over K720 mln

 $\rm OVER\,K720$ million worth of 720,000 stimulant tablets were captured in Mingaladon and Shwepyitha townships, the Myanmar Police Force stated.

Acting on a tip-off, a combined team consisting of members of the Anti-Drug Task Force arrested Zaw Min Htun (aka) Ko Nay, Thant Zin Oo, Zaw Lwin, Kyin Thein (aka) Maung Soe and Antawno with a saloon and 200,000 stimulant tablets at the Khayaypin Yeikmon street in Chitteegon ward of Mingaladon at 6 pm on 14 September.

After interrogating them, police seized 520,000 stimulant tablets from a house rented by Thant Zin Oo, in ward 3 of Shwepyitha township at 9 pm on the same day. Offenders admitted the captured drugs were carried from Shan State (South) to Yangon. Police have taken legal action against offenders and an investigation is underway to identify perpetrators of the crime chain. — MNA/MKKS

Confiscation of illegal items: lead, consumer goods, industrial materials and vehicles

The combined on-duty teams under the supervision of Mandalay Region Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force confiscated a Mitsubishi Fuso bus (estimated value of K33 million), headed to Mandalay from Muse, carrying 21 kinds of goods worth K15.687 million, including four pieces of sofa chairs and 23,000 lighters (made in China) without official documents, at the Milepost 21/6 on Muse-Mandalay Road on 18 September. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

The combined teams under the management of Shan State Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force captured 330 Wi-Fi routers worth K6.6 million that were smuggled and piled up by the side of road over the Sinphyu checkpoint in Muse township and a Toyota HiAce vehicle (estimated value of K30 million), travelling from Muse to Lashio, carrying eight kinds of goods worth K5.04 million, including 12 luggage without official documents, at the detour in Lashio township on 19 September. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

The Customs teams conducted inspections on 18 and 19 September and impounded three

kinds of goods worth K19.746 million, including 957 kilogrammes of paper cups that were not declared in the Import Declaration (ID) from a container at the Myanmar Industrial Port, 16,118 metres long polyester fabric worth K37.232 million and 58,000 kilogrammes of solar mounted structure worth K281,358,000 that exceeded the quantity mentioned the ID from six containers at the Asia World Port Terminal container checkpoint and 5,808 kilogrammes of Garuda lubricants worth K12.196 million that exceeded the quantity mentioned in the ID from three containers at the MITT. The action was taken under Customs procedures.

A combined team seized K2,606.855 million worth of illegal items — 185 charcoal bags, 81,852 kilogrammes of lead and a wooden boat — on the Myinse island in Kawthoung township. The action was taken under Customs procedures and the Forest Law. A total of 12 arrests were made on three consecutive days from 18 to 20 September, with an estimated value of K3,047.716 million as reported by the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee. — MNA/MKKS

Paris petanque paradise makes pitch to avoid eviction

The players oversee the upkeep of the 765 square metres (8,200 square feet) of grounds, a rare remnant of the vegetation that once covered the butte, with the city giving tacit approval by hooking up water and electricity.

Even amid rapid gentrification and a surge of tourism the club maintained its Montmartre

The European Union's 27 member states will discuss the proposal on Friday. It has to be approved by a weighted majority of countries during a meeting on 13 October.

Current authorization expired in December 2022 but was

extended by a year pending a scientific study of the herbicide, one of the most widely used weed-killers in the world.

The proposal comes after the European Food Safety Authority in July said it had not found "any critical areas of concern" preventing glyphosate from being reauthorised, sparking a backlash from environmental groups.

Environmental activists said there was scientific evidence that glyphosate may cause cancer, poison aquatic life and can be fatal to key pollinators like bees.

The commission's proposal would authorise its usage until 15 December 2033, double the previous five-year authorisation but less than the 15-year period initially planned.

The text says the use of glyphosate must be accompanied by "risk mitigation measures".

For example, there must be a "non-sprayed buffer strip" of five to 10 metres (16 to 33 feet) in a field and equipment used to drastically reduce "spray drift".

The EU agency's report noted there were gaps in the data in some areas, and "identified a high long-term risk to mammals" in 12 of 23 of the proposed uses of glyphosate. — AFP

US drops anti-whaling wording opposed by Japan in Indo-Pacific pact

Japan resumed commercial whaling after leaving the International Whaling Commission in 2019. Anti-whaling language in the trade pact would have hindered Japan's ability to continue whaling.

THE United States has abandoned efforts to include anti-whaling language in its Indo-Pacific trade pact following fierce opposition from Japan, sources familiar with the matter said Wednesday.

The resolution of the main point of contention between two key members of the Indo-Pacific Economic Framework has paved the way for a comprehensive agreement to be reached at a summit in San Francisco in November.

After withdrawing from the International Whaling Commission in 2019, Japan resumed commercial whaling in waters off its shores. The inclusion of anti-whaling language in the trade pact would have made it difficult for Japan to continue such practices.

The administration of US President Joe Biden had been pushing for the inclusion of anti-whaling language in the IPEF since launching the framework in May 2022, according to the sources.

Gold and mercury, not books, for Venezuela's child miners

AT 10 years old, Martin cannot read, but he is an old hand at detecting traces of the gold he and his young cousins dig for at an open-pit mine in southeastern Venezuela.

In the town of El Callao, extracting gold from soil starts as a kid's game, but soon becomes a full-time job that human rights activists slam as dangerous exploitation.

Small and agile, the children's size helps them shimmy into narrow wells to hack out muddy earth, hoping it will contain gold — which has become ever more precious as Venezuela's oil production has plummeted. Doubled over, they carry heavy bags of earth under the relentless sun to murky puddles of water where they rinse it

in wooden trays.

Martin explains that "whatever is gold gets stuck to the mercury," a poisonous and environmentally toxic substance they use for its ability to extract gold from ore.

He is one of around a thousand children in the region involved in illegal gold mining, a booming industry in the resource-rich country that has been battered by multiple economic crises.

Martin — not his real name — lives in El Peru, a nearby hamlet. He has never been to school.

Carlos Trapani of the Cecodap children's rights NGO, told AFP that the backbreaking work and its associated dangers have become "normalized" in these communities. — AFP

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Strike standstill in Greece over labour bill

GREEK unions on Thursday staged a 24-hour walkout paralyzing services and snarling public transport over labour legislation that will allow greater job flexibility.

Civil servants, hospital workers, school teachers and dock workers joined the strike, which also shut down the Athens subway and left buses operating on reduced hours.

A key part of the bill, which is expected to be approved by parliament later Thursday, is that private sector staff will be allowed to work at more than one employer daily.

Businesses will also be able to require staff to work six days a week in an emergency. Opposition

parties and unions have accused the conservative government of empowering employer exploitation in a poorly-supervised labour market where many workers are afraid of losing their jobs.

The labour ministry says the purpose of the

legislation is to "boost employment" and "increase the number of viable and justly paid jobs".

The bill also forbids strikers to prevent other staff from working during a walkout, and disallows layoffs linked to discrimination. — AFP

French Apple workers call strike on iPhone 15 debut

WORKERS at Apple stores in France are set to strike and disrupt the launch of the iPhone 15 in a battle over pay, trade unions told AFP on Wednesday. The unions called for two days of action on social media beginning on Friday, when the new handset is due to launch, saying Apple management had ignored their "perfectly legitimate" demands.

Apple has faced a rough time in France lately, with the government blocking sales of the iPhone 12 last Tuesday after it returned illegally high readings for radiation emissions.

The global launch of

the iPhone 15 was also overshadowed by the firm's capitulation to European Union demands for smartphones to be kitted out with universal charging ports rather than Apple's proprietary "lightning" ports.

Apple workers in France have been campaigning for a seven percent pay rise but management have offered 4.5 per cent — which the unions say is too low given vast increases in the cost of living. — AFP

After Niger coup, sanctions pain strikes at shutdown Benin border

LINES of hundreds of trucks stretch back many kilometres close to Benin's northern border with Niger, their cargo wasting and their drivers going broke after weeks stranded at the closed frontier.

Almost two months since a coup ousted Niger's president, the trucks blocked in Malanville at Benin's border are the most striking symbol of the fallout Niger's neighbours are suffering from sanctions imposed on Niamey.

After 15-member West African bloc ECOWAS banned trade with Niger and threatened military action to restore democracy, the new junta also blockaded a bridge border

crossing with Benin. Nigerien driver Mahamat Kabirou Amadou left Benin's economic capital Cotonou for Niamey 50 days ago and now sits stuck in Malanville. Not only has the coup and border closure cut him off from his country and family, but weeks of rain and sun have rotted his cargo of rice. — AFP

Syria's Assad visits China seeking funds

The Syrian civil war, which began in 2011, has resulted in a death toll exceeding half a million people, with millions more displaced and extensive damage to Syria's infrastructure and industry.

SYRIAN President Bashar al-Assad on Thursday began his first official trip to China in almost two decades, with Beijing saying the visit will take ties to a "new level" as the Arab leader seeks financial support to help rebuild his devastated country.

China is one of only a handful of countries outside the Middle East that Assad has visited since the 2011 start of a civil war that has killed more than half a million people, displaced millions more, and battered Syria's infrastructure and industry.

He arrived Thursday in the eastern city of Hangzhou, where he will attend the opening ceremony of the Asian Games on Saturday.

The Syrian president's Air China plane was greeted on the tarmac by jubilant music and rows of performers wearing colourful costumes, as Chinese and Syrian flags flapped in the sky, footage from state broadcaster CCTV showed.

He and other foreign leaders will meet Xi in Hangzhou, CCTV said. According to the Syrian presidency, Assad will also travel to Beijing. The visit is his first to China since 2004.

China's foreign ministry said the visit will serve to take ties to a "new level". "China and Syria have a traditional and deep friendship," foreign ministry spokesperson Mao Ning told a regular briefing. — AFP

Germany says not in favour of idea to deprive Russia of veto power in UN Security Council

During his UN Security Council address, Zelensky criticized the organization's deadlock caused by Russia's veto power.

GERMANY does not support Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky's initiative to deprive Russia of the right of veto in the UN Security Council and is not always in favor of ideas voiced by Kyiv, German Foreign Minister Annalena Baerbock stated.

"No, we do not support this, and I have told my negotiating Ukrainian partners about this on many occasions. I think the issue is important for the discussion in Germany: not everything that Ukraine offers to our government is supported by us," Baerbock told German a broadcaster on Wednesday. She also stressed the need to protect the UN Charter and consider ways to modernize the organization. During his address to the UN Security Council on Wednesday, Zelensky said the United Nations was at a "dead end" due to Russia having the right of veto in the organization. In this regard, he urged the reform of the UN, including its veto

power mechanism, saying that the UN General Assembly should be enabled to override a veto by two thirds majority vote.

The UN General Assembly should examine the reasons why the previously adopted UNSC resolutions were not implemented instead of discussing the veto decisions under pressure from Western countries, Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov stressed in response to the statement of the Ukrainian president.

South Korea parliament clears way for opposition leader's arrest

Lee Jae-myung, leader of the Democratic Party, is accused of bribery in connection with a firm suspected of sending \$8 million to North Korea and of breaching his duties, which resulted in a \$15 million loss to a Seongnam city-owned company during his mayoral term.

IN a surprise move, South Korea's opposition-controlled National Assembly voted Thursday to strip the leader of the opposition of his parliamentary immunity, potentially allowing his arrest over corruption allegations.

Lee Jae-myung, leader of the Democratic Party, has been accused by prosecutors of bribery in connection with a firm that is suspected of illicitly transferring \$8 million to North Korea.

He is also accused of breaching his duties, which allegedly resulted in a loss of 20 billion won (\$15 million) for a company owned by Seongnam city during his term as its mayor.

Despite his party's majority in the 300-member parliament, the motion to lift Lee's immunity passed by a 149-136 vote.

Lee has denied all the allegations against him, and on Wednesday asked his party members to reject the motion,

which he called "clearly illegal and unjust".

This triggered escalating criticism from within the Democratic Party, local reports said, as Lee's stance contradicted his earlier promises to relinquish immunity if needed.— AFP

Koepka gets major-level thrill from playing for USA at Ryder Cup

FIVE-TIME major champion Brooks Koepka says playing for the United States in next week's Ryder Cup will bring the same thrill as battling for top individual titles.

The 33-year-old American, who captured his third PGA Championship in May at Oak Hill, will compete in this week's LIV Golf Chicago tournament before joining the US squad next week in Italy for the Ryder Cup.

Koepka, who has a history of playing his best at majors, has been preparing for weeks to face holders Europe as the Americans seek their first victory on European soil in 30 years.

He sees the Cup as an equal test to a major in those terms.

"I think it is," Koepka said Wednesday. "My whole mindset has been to practice for that the last few weeks.

"I think it's one of the top six, seven, biggest sporting events you can have, so I like it when there's a little bit more eyeballs, a little bit more pressure.

"It's obviously different with the whole team thing. Sometimes you don't play every match so you are just cheerleading from the side, which can be quite fun as well.

"I've enjoyed it. It has been great and I'm looking forward to it."

Koepka was a selection by US captain Zach Johnson after barely missing out on an automatic qualifying spot despite being banned from the PGA Tour after defecting to LIV Golf last year.

Being on the opposite side of the PGA-LIV divide did not give Koepka any problem on a trip two weeks ago to Rome to see the host course before next week's showdown.

MANCHESTER United goalkeeper Andre Onana said he had let his teammates down after a howler set the tone for a 4-3 Champions League defeat to Bayern Munich.

A third consecutive defeat ramps up the pressure on United manager Erik ten Hag and two late goals from Casemiro masked the gulf in class between the sides at the Allianz Arena on Wednesday.

However, United had started brightly until Leroy Sane's strike slipped through Onana's grasp on 28 minutes.

"After my mistake we lost control of the game. It's a difficult situation for us, for me especially because I'm the one who let the team down," Onana told TNT Sports.

The Red Devils have now conceded three or more goals in three consecutive games for the first time since 1978.

Biggest-ever Asian Games ready for liftoff in China after Covid delay

THE biggest Asian Games in history, boasting about 12,000 competitors — more than the Olympics — will open on Saturday in the Chinese city of Hangzhou after a year's delay because of Covid.

Athletes including world and Olympic champions will fight for medals in 40 sports from athletics, swimming and football to eSports and bridge. Nine sports, among them boxing, break dancing and tennis, will serve as qualifiers for next year's Paris Olympics. The Games were supposed to take place last September but were postponed because of China's strict zero-Covid rules, before China's ruling Communist Party abruptly abandoned the policy.

The 19th edition of the Games, which were first held in New Delhi in 1951, throws together competitors from 45 countries and territories across Asia and the Middle East.

For China, which hosted the 2022 Winter Olympics in a Covid-secure "bubble" in Beijing, it is a chance to show off its organizational, sporting and technological prowess after the pandemic years cut the country off from the sporting world. — AFP

India's lower house votes to reserve third of seats for women

NDIA'S lower house of parliament passed a bill Wednesday that would more than double the number of women lawmakers in its ranks, following several failed attempts to enact the measure stretching back decades.

The proposed law would reserve one-third of seats in India's lower house and state assemblies for women once it takes effect, which could take until at least the end of the decade.

It would not take effect before national elections next year but will be a further fillip to the already commanding position of Prime Minister Narendra Modi's party ahead of that poll.

A total of 454 lawmakers voted for the bill, with only two against.

"The proposal has been passed with more than a twothirds majority of the members present in the house," said Om

Birla, the speaker of parliament. Modi, calling himself "de-

lighted" on X, formerly Twitter, thanked lawmakers who voted across party lines and said it would "further boost" women's empowerment.

When Indira Gandhi took office to lead India in 1966 as prime minister, she became the world's second woman head of government in a parliamentary democracy, following Sri Lanka's Sirimavo Bandaranaike six years earlier.—AFP

Biden, Netanyahu mend fences with Saudi deal in mind

Joe Biden and Benjamin Netanyahu met Wednesday to smooth over months of tension, eyeing a deal to normalize Israel's ties with Saudi Arabia despite US concerns over the state of Israeli democracy. Biden said the pair had a "candid, constructive conversation" in New York, their first talks since the Israeli prime minister was reelected in December at the head of a hard-right government.

The fence-mending meeting comes as the US president pushes Netanyahu to agree on a potentially historic deal to end decades of enmity with Riyadh, one of Washington's main regional allies.

And while Netanyahu was not hosted at the White House this time due to Biden's concerns over his government's controversial judicial overhaul, he won a coveted invitation to Washington later this year. — AFP

Venezuela seizes control of gang-run prison with pool, disco

VENEZUELA said Wednesday it had seized control of a prison from the hands of a powerful gang with international reach, in a major operation involving 11,000 members of its security forces.

The Tocoron prison had served as the Tren de Aragua gang's headquarters, where it had installed amenities such as a zoo, a pool and gambling rooms, according to an investigative journalist recently interviewed by AFP. In a statement, the government congratulated law enforcement officers for regaining "total control" of the prison in the northern state of Aragua, adding the operation had "dismantled a centre of conspiracy and crime".

Poland no longer arming Ukraine: Polish PM

POLAND said Wednesday it will no longer arm Ukraine and instead focus on its own defence, as the two allies clashed at a key moment in Kyiv's fightback against Russia.

In a mounting row over grain exports from Ukraine, Poland summoned the Ukrainian ambassador to protest remarks at the UN by President Volodymyr Zelensky.

The Ukrainian leader said some countries were only pretending to support his nation as it wages a counteroffensive to retake land taken by Russia. Warsaw took offense at this.

Poland has been one of Ukraine's staunchest supporters after Ukraine war in February 2022, and is one of Kyiv's main weapons suppliers.

Much of the weaponry that the United States and other countries send to Ukraine

passes through Poland, which borders Ukraine to the west.

Poland also hosts some one million Ukrainian refugees, who have benefited from various kinds of state aid. Tensions between Warsaw and Kyiv were sparked by a Polish ban on Ukrainian grain imports, with the goal of protecting its own farmers.
