# Myanmar researchers discover new rare species of begonias flower

A new species of begonias flower believed to be found only in Myanmar was discovered on Kayin State's Zwekabin mountain by Native Species Conservation and Identification in Myanmar (NSCI) in 2019 and verified to be a new species in 2023.

The peculiarity of the new species named Begonia kayinensis is that the colour of the leaf changes according to the colour of the limestone mountain where it grows. The flower comes out from the tip of the stem. There are more than 2,000 species of begonias flower in the world, and more than 90 species of the flower are identified in Myanmar, according to the research. The new species of the flower found on Zwekabin mountain was identified by a group of researchers

NSCI employs local and expatriate experts to conduct

on-ground works to record Myanmar's biodiversity species and also to carry out services such as the identification of species and publishing articles on the conservation of biodiversity as well as myths and facts about some plants and animals. — ASH/TH

# Seafarers required to submit advance income tax payment certificate

THE Myanmar Seafarers Federation (MSF) will request the Internal Revenue Department to reconsider the advance income tax payment of seafarers before their passport renewal, U Soe Min Aung, the federation president told the media at the MSF office on 2 November.

The Myanmar seafarers

encounter delays in the renewal and extension of their passports when they receive calls from their respective companies, and they miss job opportunities, so the advance income tax payment is not convenient for them.

Myanmar passport issuing board made a statement on 16

October that migrant workers and seamen must bring tax clearance certificates granted by the Internal Revenue Department to renew PJ and PS passports. A similar request was also submitted to the Internal Revenue Department for the first time on 20 October, according to MSE.—TWA/KTZH

# MoFA seeks lower division clerk for recruitment

# Myanmar Navy to commence new sea exercise on 7 Nov

ON 7 November, the Myanmar Tatmadaw (Navy) will commence a series of exercises in the northern waters of the Andaman Sea. These exercises, which will include aerial and underwater drills, and maritime security exercises with live firing, will continue until 9 November. As a safety precaution, ships will be restricted within a 5-mile radius of the exercise area, and aircraft are advised not to fly below an altitude of fifteen thousand feet. Tatmadaw (Navy) has issued a warning against aircraft and helicopter flights over the exercise zone. — Htun Htun/KZW

# Pigeon pea price falls below K4 mln/tonne after one month

THE pigeon pea price decreased to below K4 million per tonne in the Yangon market on weak demand after the price stayed unchanged for over one month, according to the Bayintnaung Commodity Wholesale Centre.

The pigeon pea has remained unchanged at K4.075 million per tonne since the end-September and then, the price started to decline to K3.9 million per tonne on 4 November.

The sluggish market caused the price to decrease.

Myanmar primarily exports black gram, green gram and pi-

geon peas to foreign markets. Of them, black gram and pigeon peas are mostly conveyed to India while green grams are shipped to China and Europe.

India has growing demand and consumption requirements for black gram and pigeon peas. According to a Memorandum of Understanding between Myanmar and India signed on 18 June 2021, India will import 250,000 tonnes of black gram and 100,000 tonnes of pigeon peas (tur) from Myanmar for five consecutive years from 2021-2022 financial year to 2025-2026 FY. This G-to-G pact will not affect the pulses' annual

quota set by India. Myanmar's exporters are also entitled to deliver the pulses to India under that annual quota.

Myanmar shipped more than 930,000 tonnes of various pulses, with an estimated value of over \$778 million, to foreign countries in the past six and half months during the 2023-2024 financial year beginning 1 April, according to the Ministry of Commerce.

Myanmar's pulses exports topped over US\$1.47 billion from over 1.9 million tonnes in the past FY 2022-2023, the Ministry of Commerce's statistics indicated. — NN/EM

# Black gram price nearly reaches K3 mln per tonne

THE price of black gram (Fair Average Quality/RC) is near to K3 million per tonne in early November and the FOB price is also relatively higher than those recorded in late October.

The prices were registered at K2.972 million per tonne of black gram (FAQ/RC), K3.207 million per tonne of (SQ/RC) and K4.075 million per tonne of pigeon pea (red gram) on 2 November. Pigeon pea price has remained unchanged for over a month.

The FOB prices increased to US\$1,090-1,110 per tonne of black gram on 2 November from \$1,045-1,065 per tonne on 26 October.

India's Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers' Welfare notified that black gram output

is expected to fall by 15 per cent and green gram yield is down by 18 per cent in 2023 compared to those in 2022 while pigeon pea production is likely to increase by 3.3 per cent.

Despite the harvest season of black gram (urad in India), the inferior quality is found. Demand for Myanmar's black gram surpasses the supply, raising the CNF price in India by \$55 compared to the previous days.

The black gram prices stood at 95 rupees per kilo in the Chennai market and 97 rupees in the Deli market at the end of October. Pigeon pea (tur) fetched 177 rupees per kilo in October 2023, which surged from 117 rupees in the corresponding period last year. — TWA/KK

# Spice prices: Imported Kyukok garlic price jumps after border transport hurdle

KYUKOK garlic imported by China doubled after a week of transport obstacles at the border

On 26 October, Kyukok garlic fetched K7,800 and Shan garlic's price was only K9,000-9,800. The prices reached a two-time high after one week of trade situation.

The price of Kyukok garlic in the domestic market went up amid the low stocks.

The price gap between Kyukok garlic and onion nearly quadrupled this week ending 3 November.

Housewives mostly consume onion rather than garlic. The exorbitant price of garlic does not pose a big burden on the food cost of the house-

Onion prices stood at K2,900-K3,800 per viss at the Bayintnaung market on 3 November. Meanwhile, Kyukok garlic prices moved in the range between K16,000 and K17,000 per viss and Shan garlic prices were K12,000-K15,000 per viss, Ko Thein Myint, a garlic seller, told The Global New Light of Myanmar (GNLM).

The retail price of Kyukok garlic at Lanmadaw market was K17,500 per viss, Ko Kyin Thein from Lanmadaw told the GNLM.

In the corresponding period last year, garlic prices were K3,000-K4,100 per viss and K3,700-K3,800 per viss, whereas onion prices were

K3,200-K3,900 per viss.

Shan garlic price followed the price rise of Kyukok garlic yet it has not reached the level of Kyukok garlic, said a trader.

The imported Kyukok garlic has grasped a firm market share in the domestic market for over two decades. It is mostly used in the food industry as it is easier to peel. Local garlic is primarily grown in Taunggyi and Aungban, Shan State. It is also found in Pakokku and Mandalay areas.

The local garlic flows into the market in February while Kyukok garlic floods in the market in May and June. The high price of garlic might prompt the growers to expand the cultivation acres. — TWA/KK

# AI anxiety as computers get super smart

ROM Hollywood's death-dealing Terminator to warnings from genius Stephen Hawking or Silicon Valley stars, fears have been fuelled that artificial intelligence (AI) could one day destroy humanity.

Tech titans are racing toward creating AI far smarter than people, pushing US President Joe Biden to impose emergency regulation and the European Union seeking major legislation to be agreed by the end of this year. A two-day summit starting Wednesday in London will explore regulatory safeguards against AI risks such as those below. Job stealer?

The success of ChatGPT

from OpenAI has ignited debate about whether "generative AI" capable of quickly producing text, images and audio from simple commands in everyday language is a tremendous threat to jobs held by people. Automated machinery is already used to do labour in factories, warehouses, and fields. Generative AI, however, can take aim at white-collar jobs such as lawyers, doctors, teachers, journalists, and even computer programmers. A report from the McKinsey consulting firm estimates that by the end of this decade, as much as 30 per cent of the hours worked in the United States could be automated in a trend accelerated by generative AI. Boosters of such technolo-

gy have invoked the notion of a universal basic income in which machines generate wealth that is shared with people freed of the burdens of work. But it is also possible companies would reap profits of improved efficiencies, leaving those out of work to fend for themselves. Copycat?

Artists were quick to protest software such as Dall-E, Midjourney and Stable Diffusion that are capable of creating images in nearly any style on demand.

Computer coders and writers followed suit, critiquing AI creators for "training" software on their work, enabling it to replicate their styles or skills without permission or compensation.

AI models have been taught

using massive amounts of information and imagery found

"That's what it trains on, a fraction of the huge output of humanity," OpenAI co-founder Sam Altman said at a conference in September. "I think this will be a tool that amplifies human beings, not replace them." **Disinformation tools?** 

Fake news and deepfakes have been around for years but being able to easily crank it out using generative AI raises fears of rampant online deception.

Elections run the risk of being won by those most adept at spreading disinformation, contends cognitive scientist and AI expert Gary Marcus.



# Iraq inches towards solar-powered future

Solar panels are being used on most homes in this village as an effort to harness solar energy.

IN a small village in the mountains of Iraqi Kurdistan, solar panels adorn most homes, part of a small but growing effort to harness the sun's energy in Iraq, where electricity is scarce.

"Solar covers all our needs: the refrigerator, television, air cooler, washing machine, vacuum cleaner," said Daniar Abdallah, 33, a resident of Hazar Merd who converted to solar and hasn't looked back.

"It has helped us a lot," said the father of two, who spent \$2,800 in 2018 to install photovoltaic panels for his family home.

Despite its vast oil wealth, Iraq struggles to provide enough electricity to its 43 million people after decades of conflict and sanctions, as well as rampant corruption and crumbling infrastructure.

And even though it is blessed

with more sunshine than most other countries, it has proved difficult to wean Iraq's economy off fossil fuels — one of the themes of the upcoming COP28 climate talks in Dubai.

Although it receives a third of its energy needs from neighbouring Iran, there are still daily power cuts, which worsen in the hot summer months when temperatures approach 50 degrees Celsius (120 Fahrenheit).

The tranquil silence of Hazar Merd is striking in a country where the roar of large neighbourhood generators used to provide back-up power is ever-present. "Before, we had a generator that broke down all the time" to overcome power cuts which can sometimes last 12 or 13 hours a day, said Abdallah, who works as a soldier for local Kurdish forces.

# Plastic waste in rivers may carry dangerous microbes: study

Plastic litter in rivers can serve as a breeding ground for microorganisms, potentially carrying disease-causing bacteria and viruses downstream

PLASTIC litter in rivers might be allowing dangerous pathogens to hitch-hike downstream, a new study published Wednesday found. The research, which focused on one UK river, found that dumped plastic, wooden sticks and the water itself were a breeding ground for communities of microorganisms, potentially providing a reservoir for bacteria and viruses known to cause human diseases and antibiotic resistance.

"Our findings indicate that plastics in freshwater bodies may contribute to the transport of potential pathogens and antibiotic resistance genes," said lead author Vinko Zadjelovic of the University of Antofagasta in Chile.

"This could have indirect but significant implications for human health," he told AFP.

Antibiotic resistance is a growing public health threat. In 2019, infections related to antibiotic resistance are estimated to have killed 2.7 million people worldwide.

By 2050 they are predicted to cause 10 million deaths worldwide, according to the study, published in the journal Microbiome.

When plastic ends up in water its surface is overrun within

minutes by nearby microbes.

The researchers submerged samples for a week in the River Sowe in Warwickshire and West Midlands England, downstream from a wastewater treatment plant.

They found significant differences in the microbe communities depending on the material sampled.

### **Water worries**

Wastewater is required to be treated and disinfected to reduce microbial hazards and any adverse impacts they might have on human and environmental health. — AFP

# Mexico announces recovery plan for hurricane-hit Acapulco

MEXICO'S government announced Wednesday an aid and reconstruction plan worth nearly \$3.5 billion for victims of a hurricane that devastated the beachside city of Acapulco.

"Together we will very soon be able to put the beautiful and nostalgic port of Acapulco back on its feet," President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador said at his daily news conference. Otis smashed into Acapulco a week ago as a scale-topping Category 5 hurricane packing winds of 165 miles (270 kilometres) per hour. The storm left a trail of destruction and at least 46 people dead, with 58 others unaccounted for. The 61.3-billion-peso recovery plan includes the delivery of groceries to nearly 250,000 affected families for three months, as well as cleaning, painting and rehabil-

itation of damaged homes, Lopez Obrador said.

The government will provide interest-free loans for small businesses and a budget for improving urban services such as water, drainage and lighting.

There will also be support for hotels and money to rehabilitate roads connecting Acapulco with Mexico City and surrounding municipalities. — AFP

# Death toll from earthquake rises to 128 in western Nepal

THE death toll from a strong, shallow earthquake in western Nepal has risen to 128 as the rescue operation is going on, government officials said on Saturday.

The 6.4-magnitude quake hit Jajarkot and Rukum West districts in western Nepal at 23:47 local time on Friday night (1802 GMT), killing 128 people in the districts and wounding 140 others, Nepal Police spokesman Kuber Kadayat told Xinhua.

It is difficult for the rescue teams to reach some places as bridges were damaged, and roads were blocked by landslides triggered by the quake, he said.

The depth of the earthquake is between 10 to 15 kilometres,

and an additional four aftershocks above magnitude 4.0 have been

recorded by Saturday morning, according to Lok Bijay Adhikari from Nepal's National Earthquake Monitoring and Research Centre.

"The aftershocks continue," he added.

The Nepali government is focusing on the rescue and treatment of the injured after the earthquake.

"The rescue and treatment of the injured is the first priority," Home Ministry spokesman Narayan Prasad Bhattarai told Xinhua.

Nepali Prime Minister Pushpa Kamal Dahal went to the affected area Saturday morning along with health workers, and helicopters were being mobilized for the rescue operation, he said.

"We have not yet taken details about houses and other infrastructure damaged as the focus is to rescue," said Bhattarai. "So far, there is no report of casualties from other districts". In October, three quakes above magnitude 4.0 jolted the Dhading district in central Nepal, with one measuring 6.1-magnitude. A 7.8-magnitude earthquake in 2015 killed some 9,000 people and damaged more than half a million houses in the mountainous country. — Xinhua

### Donald Trump 'fired up' to testify in New York fraud case: son

DONALD TRUMP'S son Eric wrapped up his testimony on Friday in the civil fraud case against the family business empire and said his father is "fired up" to take the stand next week.

The 77-year-old former US president is expected to testify on Monday in the trial in which the Trump Organization is accused of inflating the value of its assets by billions of dollars to obtain more favourable bank loans and insurance terms.

Leaving the Manhattan courtroom after concluding

his second day of testimony, Eric Trump denounced the case as a "big charade" and a "huge waste of taxpayer money".

"We've done absolutely nothing wrong," he told reporters. "We have a better company than they could have ever imagined." Eric, 39, and his elder brother Donald Jr, 45, are executive vice presidents of the Trump Organization, a sprawling network of companies managing residential buildings, office skyscrapers, luxury hotels and golf courses around the world. — AFP

# Latest developments in the Gaza war

HERE are key developments from the past 24 hours:

### Blinken in Jordan

US Secretary of State Antony Blinken was in Jordan on Saturday for talks with counterparts from five Arab countries, after visiting Israel in his efforts to secure humanitarian "pauses" in the war.

Amman said the foreign ministers of Egypt, Jordan, Qatar, Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates as well as a representative of the Palestinian Authority — led by president Mahmud Abbas, a rival of Hamas — would meet Blinken about the conflict.

### **South Gaza incursion**

The Israeli army said Saturday its forces carried out an overnight "targeted raid" in southern Gaza, where it has struck before but rarely sent in troops.

Soldiers "operated to map out buildings and neutralize explosive devices", the army said without specifying the location. It said "troops encountered a terrorist cell exiting a tunnel shaft. In response, the troops fired shells towards the terrorists and killed them."

### Nasrallah blames US

Hassan Nasrallah, leader of Lebanon's Hezbollah movement, a Hamas ally, on Friday said the United States was "entirely responsible" for the Hamas-Israel war as he broke his silence on the conflict amid concerns of a broader regional conflagration. — AFP

# Tunisian prison escapees suspected of robbing bank

TWO of the five convicts who escaped from a Tunisian prison this week are suspected of staging an armed bank robbery near the capital, police said on Friday.

The robbery took place at a bank branch in the southeastern Bou Mhel suburb of Tunis. A police statement said initial evidence showed it was likely that two of five from the jailbreak were probably involved in the bank heist. Five prisoners the interior ministry said were serving sentences "related to terrorist cases" escaped from Mornaguia prison outside Tunis at dawn on Tuesday.

The five are considered "dangerous" and have affiliations with the jihadist groups Ansar al-Sharia and Al-Qaeda, the ministry said. — AFP

# Portuguese economy grows 1.9% in Q3

The country's GDP experienced a 0.7 percentage point decrease, following a 2.6 per cent growth in the previous quarter, primarily due to a notable drop in exports caused by reduced external demand.

THE Portuguese economy grew by 1.9 per cent year-on-year in the third quarter (Q3) of 2023, the **National Institute of Statistics** (INE) said on Tuesday.

There was a slowdown of 0.7 percentage points in the country's gross domestic product (GDP), compared to a 2.6 per cent increase recorded in the second quarter. This slowdown resulted from a "significant slow-

down in exports of goods and services", due to reduced external demand, INE said.

"Conversely, imports of goods and services recorded a moderate reduction," it added.

Portuguese Finance Minister Fernando Medina said that the latest GDP data reinforces the importance of stimulating domestic demand.

Speaking in the Portuguese

Parliament about the proposal for the State Budget for 2024, Medina said that the GDP figures reflect "the recession abroad" that affects "external demand".

In the forecasts underlying the proposal for the State Budget for 2024, the government expects 2.2 per cent growth in the economy for the entirety of this year. — Xinhua

### Turkish inflation rate nears 61%

TÜRKIYE'S annual inflation rate held steady near 61 per showed Friday, highlighting government efforts to ease a historic cost of living crisis.

The rate inched down to 61.36 per cent in October from 61.53 per cent in September, the TUIK state statistics agency said.

The pace of month-onmonth increases also slowed to 3.43 per cent from 4.75 per

Central bank chief Hafize Gaye Erkan said Thursday that the rate will likely peak between 70 and 75 per cent

She expects inflation to cent last month, official data reach 65 per cent by the end of the year and drop to 36 per cent by the end of 2024.

> Türkiye is suffering the worst bout of inflation of President Recep Tayyip Erdogan's two-decade rule. The official annual inflation rate peaked at 85 per cent in October last year and climbed back up above 60 per cent in September.

> After winning a May election, Erdogan appointed a new team of market-friendly economists that was given the freedom to sharply hike its policy setting rate.

Analysts blame Erdogan for provoking the crisis by forcing the nominally independent central bank to slash borrowing costs far below the rate at which prices were rising.

Erdogan had been a longtime supporter of the unorthodox theory that the high interest rates cause — rather than cure — consumer price spikes.

Erkan has lifted the bank's policy rate to 35 per cent from 8.5 per cent since the May vote.

Most analysts expect her to raise rates to 40 per cent or higher in the coming months.

# Poland extends Slovak border checks to curb migration

Slovakia reported that it has identified over 46,000 undocumented migrants within its borders in the current year.

POLAND'S government is to extend border checks set up to curb migration via neighbour Slovakia, a senior minister said Thursday, as the official journal of laws announced a 20-day extension.

"These checks have been yielding results," Polish Deputy Interior Minister Maciej Wasik told public radio on Thursday.

"They are also making Slovak authorities aware that they need to take action — which they have been," he added.

The move came in response

to a recent rise in Slovakia in the number of migrants and asylum seekers, largely from Serbia via Hungary, heading to wealthier Western European countries.

Austria, the Czech Republic and Poland introduced checks on their border with Slovakia in early October, then extended them to 2 November. Poland's official Journal of Laws showed that the border checks, which had been to expire Thursday, had been extended to 22 November.

# Uber, Lyft to pay \$328 mln to drivers after New York state probe

Uber and Lyft will pay \$328 million to settle allegations that they mistreated drivers in New York.

UBER and Lyft will pay \$328 million to settle a New York probe alleging that the companies "cheated" drivers, in an accord that also establishes paid sick leave, state officials announced Thursday.

The agreement follows state investigations that concluded the companies improperly deducted sums from drivers that should have been charged to passengers, according to New York Attorney-General Letitia James, whose office brought the case.

"For years, Uber and Lyft systematically cheated their drivers out of hundreds of millions of dollars in pay and benefits while they worked long hours in challenging conditions," said James in a statement.

"These settlements will ensure they finally get what they have rightfully earned and are owed under the law."

Uber praised the agreement as a "land-mark" that would ad-

vance the company's flexible employment system, while Lyft characterized it as a welcome "win" for drivers that "we are proud to have achieved with the New York Attorney-General's Office." "That's \$328 million back into the pockets of drivers!" said the New York Taxi Workers Alliance on X. — AFP

# Anti-obesity drugs fatten Novo Nordisk profits

DANISH drugmaker Novo Nordisk reported Thursday a sharp rise in third quarter sales and profits driven by the success of its anti-diabetes and anti-obesity treatments Ozempic and Wegovy.

Net profit rose to 22.5

billion kroner (\$3.2 billion) in the period from July to September, a 56 per cent increase from the same time last year. Sales meanwhile rose 29 per cent to 58.7 billion kroner.

The results came in slightly better than analyst

forecasts of a net profit of around 21.5 billion kroner on sales of 57.7 billion.

Over the first nine months of the year, sales rose by 33 per cent to 166.4 billion kroner at constant exchange rates, with a 58 per cent jump in sales for Ozempic and a near five-fold increase for Wegovy.

"We are very satisfied with the sales growth in the first nine months of 2023, which is reflecting that more people than ever are benefiting from our innovative diabetes and obesity treatments," chief executive Lars Fruergaard Jorgensen said in a comment.

# BMW profits slide despite better sales

GERMAN car giant BMW said Friday its third quarter net profit slipped 7.7 per cent year-on-year despite improved sales, as interest rate hedges hurt earnings.

Net profit for the three months ending September stood at 2.9 billion euros (\$3.1 billion) as "fair value assessment in interest rate hedging transactions" trimmed the bottom line.

Revenues for the third quarter meanwhile rose 3.4 per cent to 38.46 billion euros compared to the same period last year.

BMW chairman Oli-

ver Zipse said the result "puts us right on track to meet the higher targets we set ourselves in August".

Growth in car deliv-

eries reached 5.8 per cent, said the group, which manufactures vehicles of the eponymous BMW brand, as well as Mini and Rolls-Royce. — AFP

# World agrifood conference in Beijing focuses on innovation

The three-day event will facilitate sharing of agricultural technology, discussing global agricultural modernization, and fostering new science and tech cooperation in agriculture.

AN international conference on agrifood innovation opened in Beijing on Thursday, drawing more than 300 scientists and entrepreneurs from over 60 countries. With the theme of "Food Security and Future Agrifood", the 2023 World Agrifood Innovation Conference consists of one main forum, four thematic forums, an expo featuring agrifood science and technology, as well as multiple sub-forums and parallel forums.

The three-day event will serve as a platform for participants to share the latest agricultural technology achievements, discuss the development of world agricultural modernization and create a new pattern of agricultural science and technology cooperation, said He Xiongkui, a professor at the China Agricultural University (CAU).

# 'Mother of all reforms': Italy seeks to directly elect premier

The bill aims to enable direct elections for the prime minister to address Italy's ongoing political instability.

ITALIAN Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni presented a constitutional reform bill Friday that would allow voters to directly elect the premier, a move designed to curb chronic political instability.

Meloni's right-wing government, which has been in office for a year, is Italy's seventh in the past decade — a fact the premier said should justify the change in the constitution.

"This is the mother of all reforms," Meloni told journalists after a cabinet meeting introducing the bill, which would fix the office of prime minister at five years and increase its power to govern.

That would favour "the stability of the government and (its) political direction", said a statement.

Currently, Italian voters choose party lists, with the head of government — who does not necessarily need to be a politician — then chosen according to results and parliamentary alliances.

The government also wants the list linked to the prime minister to be assured of at least 55 per cent of seats in parliament "so as to ensure governability".

### No technocrats

Should the prime minister need to be replaced, in case of sickness or death, for example, he or she could only be replaced by a parliamentarian from the majority, and "only for the purpose of continuing the implementation of the same government programme", said the statement.

Meanwhile if the elected prime minister receives two consecutive votes of no confidence in parliament, the body will be dissolved and new elections organized.

# Storms kill three, displace thousands in southern South America

In Paraguay, two elderly individuals and an 11-year-old girl died due to house collapses caused by extreme weather linked to the El Niño phenomenon.

THREE people have died and thousands have had to leave their homes due to heavy rains and flooding in southern South America this week, according to officials who pointed to the El Nino weather phenomenon.

All three deaths — of two elderly people aged 70 and 84 and an 11-year-old girl — were reported due to collapsed homes

in two towns in Paraguay, which has been battered by downpours accompanied by tornadoes and rainstorms.

"We are doing our best to reach families in need. We have reports of major damage in about 40 locations," the head of the national emergency office Arsenio Zarate said Friday. — AFP

### Djokovic beats Rune to reach ninth Paris Masters semi-final

NOVAK Djokovic edged out Holger Rune on Friday to avenge his defeat in last year's Paris Masters final and reach the last four, while Stefanos Tsitsipas set up a meeting with Grigor Dimitrov. World number one Djokovic missed a match point in the second set but eventually claimed a 7-5, 6-7 (3/7), 6-4 win over Denmark's Rune in the quarter-finals after more than two-andthree-quarter hours on court at Bercy Arena. The Serbian star is playing in his first ATP Tour event since lifting a record 24th Grand Slam title in New York in September. Djokovic, the record six-time Paris champion, will face Andrey Rublev for a place in the final after the Russian defeated Alex de Minaur 4-6, 6-3, 6-1.

"It was quite a similar match to last year's final, it was anybody's game in every set," Djokovic said. — AFP

### Star FC to 6th place DAGON Star FC beat ISPE FC 1-0 at the Week-19 match of the Myanmar National League 2023 season played

# Sabalenka downs Rybakina to reach WTA Finals semis

WORLD number one Aryna Sabalenka defeated Elena Rybakina 6-2, 3-6, 6-3 in a rain-disrupted group match on Friday to book a semi-final clash with Iga Swiatek at the WTA Finals.

The Belarusian, who finished second in her group behind unbeaten American Jessica Pegula, kept her bid for the yearend number one ranking on track with a victory that took two days to complete.

She had won the first set but was trailing in the second when play was halted Thursday night after multiple rain delays.

Some 16 hours later, she and Rybakina returned to the outdoor hardcourts in Cancun, where fourth-ranked Rybakina of Kazakhstan calmly served out the second set to level the match in a matter

Australian Open champion Sabalenka dug deep to halt Rybakina's momentum in the opening game of the third set, surviving nine deuces and two break points to hold serve.

She used a pair of ferocious forehands to break Rybakina in the fourth game.

World number two Swiatek then downed sixth-seeded Ons Jabeur 6-1, 6-2 in just 67 minutes to finish top of her group with a perfect 3-0 record.

US Open champion Coco Gauff closed out group play with a 5-7, 7-6 (7/4), 6-3 victory over Wimbledon winner Marketa Vondrousova and advanced to the semi-finals — her place secured after Swiatek's win. — AFP

# YouTube takes aim at teens bingeing on body image videos

YOUTUBE on Thursday said it tweaked its recommendation system in the United States to prevent teens from bingeing on videos idealizing certain body types.

The move comes about a week after dozens of US states accused Facebook and Instagram owner Meta of profiting "from children's pain", damaging their mental health and misleading people about the safety of its platforms.

YouTube's video recommendation engine has been targeted over time by critics who contend it can lead young

viewers to dark or disturbing content.


Google-run YouTube has responded by ramping up safety measures and parental controls on the globally popular platform.

Working with an advisory committee, YouTube identified "categories of content that may be innocuous as a single video, but could be problematic for some teens if viewed in repetition," YouTube director of youth and kids product James Beser said in a blog post Thursday.

Categories noted included "content that compares physical features and idealizes some types over others, idealizes specific fitness levels or body weights, or displays social aggression in the form of non-contact fights and intimidation."

YouTube now limits repeated recommendations of such videos to teens in the United States and will extend the change to other countries over the coming year, according to Beser.

"Teens are more likely than adults to form negative beliefs about themselves when seeing repeated messages about ideal standards in content they consume online," Beser said. — AFP

After dates in England and Ireland, the "Cantona sings Eric" tour reached Lyon on Friday. Cantona in red sports shoes and trousers, a long black coat and a small hat and making an effort that left him drenched in sweat, performed about 20 of his own compositions to a largely sold-out audience in the small Comedie Odeon theatre.

"I do this to be on stage and for the audience. That's what I enjoy," he told AFP before the concert. "On stage, I become someone else through the interaction" with the audience. He said he is "interested" first and foremost in "this moment of sharing". His tour kicked off at the end of October in Manchester and will soon take him to Geneva, Marseille and Paris, before a second tour scheduled for spring 2024. — AFP

# Elon Musk issues warning about 'humanoid robots' in AI 'age of abundance'

Elon Musk, owner of SpaceX and Tesla, foresees an AI-driven future marked by universal high income and the possibility of humanoid robots, believing that a time may come when jobs are no longer necessary.

THE owner of X Elon Musk on Thursday predicted the future with AI would be an "age of abundance" with a "universal high income" instead of a universal basic income but warned of "humanoid robots" that might chase humans.


Musk was speaking during a conversation with British Prime Minister Rishi Sunak following a world-first AI summit at Bletchley Park in the UK. The SpaceX and Tesla CEO said there would come a point when "no job is needed" in the one-to-one with Sunak which was held later in London. Jobs instead would be just

for those who wanted one for "personal satisfaction".

AI was like "a magic genie" that gives you any wishes you want, Musk added, quipping however that those fairy tales rarely end well. "One of the future challenges is how do you find meaning in life?" he said. Musk cautioned that "we should be quite concerned" about humanoid robots that "can follow you anywhere".

The tech billionaire stressed the importance of having a physical off switch.

"A humanoid robot can basically chase you anywhere," he said. — AFP
