Myanmar imports 58,000+ tonnes of fertilizer worth US\$23 mln in Oct

YANMAR brought in 58,350 tonnes of fertilizer worth US\$23.872 million in October 2023, comprising 53,650 tonnes worth \$22.323 million via seaborne trade and 4,700 tonnes worth \$1.549 million via border checkpoints according to the Ministry of Commerce.

Myanmar imported 41,000 tonnes from China, 4,000 from the Republic of Korea, 3,600 from Uzbekistan, 2,000 from Iran, 1,000 from Viet Nam, 500 each from Canada, England and Laos, 400 from Thailand and 150 from Germany by sea.


Meanwhile, the country imported 3,500 tonnes of fertilizer from China and 1,200 from Thailand through cross-border channels.

With the winter crop season arriving in Myanmar, fertilizer that is utilized in agriculture is in high demand at present.

Myanmar Rice Producers and Planters Association also offered a fair rate of fertilizer during the summer crop season in March this year. Also, the farmers had a chance to buy the seeds and fertilizer at a fair rate during the monsoon season in June 2022.

Myanmar imported more than 75,000 tonnes of fertilizer valued at \$46.847 million by sea in October

Working Committee to address the impact of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19)

Notification No 2/2023 14 November 2023

Notification on one-year extension of COVID-19 loan repayment period for livestock breeding sectors including Myanmar citizen-owned fish and prawn breeding industries

The Working Committee to address the impact of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) disbursed loans to the worst COVID-hit livestock breeding sectors including Myanmar citizen-owned fish and prawn farming industries for one year at one per cent interest rate using the COVID-19 fund to recover the COVID-hit businesses as one of its duties on 16 November 2021 and granted K7.63 billion loans of the COVID-19 Fund to 327 companies/industries.
It has already been announced that the government extended the repayment period of loans granted to 327 companies/industries further one year when the loan period reached one year on 30 November 2022 under the guidance of the State Administration Council Chairman.
At present, businesses are still hampered by the COVID-19 pandemic and the State Administration Council instructed for an extension of another year starting its due date to streamline the circulation of currency flows of local businesses.

4. Therefore, it is here announced that the loan repayment period will be extended for another year from the date it reaches two years to 327 companies and industries from livestock breeding sectors including Myanmar citizen-owned fish and prawn farming businesses that received COVID loans if they meet the following conditions:

(a) they must have paid the first interest of the first year

(b) they must have paid the second interest of the second year on the due date

(c) they must be the companies/industries that perform their operations using the loans effectively

5. In the notices of the working committee for loans, it stated, "If it fails to repay, action will be taken under the law," and so if the companies and industries that took loans from the Myanma Economic Bank fail to pay back the principal and interest, they will face legal action as per the terms and conditions of the loan contract and they must repay the outstanding loan completely within the period of extension.

Appointment of Egyptian Ambassador agreed on






PEOPLE can study the structure of the No 1831 Cave Pagoda in the Bagan Ancient Cultural Heritage Zone of Mandalay Region including its architecture, stupas inside the temple and mural paintings, according to the Department of Archaeology and National Museum (Bagan Branch).

The cave pagoda, No 1831 edifice in the Bagan region, is located in the Khayminga pagoda compound beside NyaungU-Bagan old road. There are five archways at the cave pagoda, there is a sitting Buddha image in the east archway while four standing Buddha images at the remaining four sides respectively.

The No 1831 Cave Pagoda with five archways was Eainyarkyaung constructed in the housing compound of King Narapati Sithu's son Prince Kinkathu and his wife Nyaungyankyi Thamee (daughter of Nyaungyan Kyi).

It is also called Eainyarkyaung Ngamyathna Cave Pagoda. It has distinctive features of the Sinhalese-type structure.

Visitors can read the stone inscriptions of Nyaungyan Kyi Thamee at the Archeological Museum (Bagan). These are also depicted on the wall of the Eainyakyaung Ngamyathna

The Khayminga pagoda is located in the south of No 1831 Cave Pagoda while Htilominlo pagoda, Shwelatetuu pagoda, Shweleikpauk pagoda, Thikya pagoda, Thikyahit pagoda, Upalithein in the east, Satumukha pagoda and Yinmana pagoda in the north, Min-Oh-Chantha pagoda, Minmhaw Yaza pagoda and Ananda temple in the west. — Dipa Lin/KTZH

VISITORS can go to the No 262 pagoda of the Bagan Ancient Cultural Zone and explore its mural paintings in NyaungU Township of Mandalay Region, according to the officials of the Department of Archaeology and National Museum (Bagan Branch).

The No 262 Cave pagoda is located beside the road to old Bagan from NyaungU, in the eastern part of the Htilominlo pagoda and Shwelatetuu pagoda. A sitting Buddha statue can be seen on an altar facing east that is surrounded by two Agga

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

Price of pigeon peas falls by over K100,000



Black beans.

THE price of one tonne of RC black bean was K2.9 million and one tonne of SQ/RC black bean was high at K3,145,000 while the price of one tonne of pigeon peas decreased to K3,750,000 in the Yangon bean market on 14 November.

One tonne of RC black bean reached below K2.9 million from 6 to 13 November and rose to K2.9 million on 14 November in the Yangon bean market.

The price of pigeon peas was at K4,075,000 per tonne from 29 September to 3 November, and the price dropped to K39,000 from 6 to 13 November.

The price of one tonne of pigeon peas dropped to

K3,750,000 on 14 November, and a day later, the price dropped by K150,000 per tonne.

These two types of beans are still at high prices this month due to the demand for Myanmar's beans and pulses from India, which is the main buyer. A bean price analyst said that the price changes between 2022 and 2023 of these two types of beans are unique.

The price of one tonne of RC black beans reached K1,690,000 on 2 January.

The price of black bean hit K2,937,500 on 31 October, the highest price until now in 2023.

The price of one tonne of pigeon peas reached the highest price of K1,755,000 on 2 January and K4150,000 on 8 September but the price dropped to K3,750,000 on 14 November. This year, the price of one tonne of pigeon peas has increased by K2,975,000 compared to last year in 2022. — TWA/KZL

Illegal timbers, industrial materials, foodstuffs, consumer goods, wooden boats and vehicles confiscated

A total of 74.388 tonnes of illegal timbers, valued at K8,460,066, was seized on 10 November in Yekyi township. Additionally, 14.124 tonnes of illegal timbers worth K988,694 were captured on 11 November in Thaboung township. These actions were taken under the Forest Law.



During inspections on 12 and 13 November, a Nissan Diesel truck (approximately K25 million) heading to Mandalay from Myawady was intercepted at the Mayanchaung permanent checkpoint. The truck was carrying four types of goods worth K5.13 million, including 500 pairs of Three Mountain rain boots that were not declared in the Import Declaration (ID). Additionally, 188,860 kilogrammes of plastic scrap worth K111,585,573 were submitted to abandon by the owner from nine containers at the Myanmar Industrial Port, and 55,020 kilogrammes of plastic scrap worth K36,973,440 were submitted to abandon by the owner from two containers at the Thilawa Port Terminal container checkpoint. These actions were conducted under Customs

procedures.

On 13 November, combined teams captured six wooden boats used in illegal fishing, valued at K10.8 million, in Kyunsu township of Myeik district. Another Nissan Diesel truck (estimated value of K30 million) carrying seven types

In Tatkon Township on 13 November, a total of 4.279 tonnes of illegal timbers worth K299,544 was seized under the Forest Law. On the same day, the on-duty teams impounded an unregistered Toyota Ipsum in Magway township, an unregistered Suzuki Carry car (estimated value of K8 million) in Pwintphyu township, 5.277 tonnes of illegal teak worth K3,483,348 in Mindon township, and 0.199 tonne of illegal teak and 2.468 tonnes of other timber worth K645,046 in Sedoktara and Ngaphe townships. These actions were taken under the Export and Import Law and the Forest Law. A total of 32 arrests were made over four consecutive days from 10 to 13 November, with an estimated value of K340,237,311, as reported by the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee. - MNA/MKKS

Applicants who have completed the course in basic industrial technologies offered by the School of Industrial Training and Education (SITE), those who have finished AGTI (EC, EP, Mech, IE) courses, and holders of BTech and BE (EC, EP, Mech, MC) can apply for the course in industrial automation.

All applicants must have a technical and professional orientation, be in good health, and possess the capability to conduct fieldwork at factories/ companies. Preliminarily selected candidates will be required to undergo an interview. Each course has a duration of four months.

CNG price holds steady at K273.25 per kilogramme

MYANMAR Oil and Gas Enterprise (MOGE) (CNG Department) continues to distribute almost 20 million cubic feet of Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) daily at the unchanged price of K273.25

per kilogram. CNG refilling stations in Yangon Region receive their supply from onshore natural gas processing plants in Nyaungdon, Maubin, Apyauk, and the Zotika offshore natural gas plant.

A total of over 30,000 vehicles, including taxis, YBS vehicles, and others, regularly visit the 40 CNG filling stations TWA/MKKS

Bhamo-Lweje export route damages watermelon shipments to China

SHIPPING watermelons to China via the Bamao-Lweje border affected physical damage to watermelons, according to the Khwanyo Fruit Depot.

Myanmar's watermelon export route to China shifted to the Mandalay-Shan State (North)-Kengtung-Mongla route amid trade disruption at the Muse border.

"The closure of the Muse border forced some watermelon exporters to move to the Bhamo-Lweje route. However, most of the monsoon watermelons cannot bear transport hurdles including long transport hours. If so, only watermelon of high quality should be exported," said an official of the Khwanyo Fruit Depot.

Additionally, Myanmar's watermelon trucks cannot directly enter China and Chinese short-haul transport service is used. Only direct trade access can facilitate the trade.

Myanmar's watermelon is

primarily exported to China. However, traders have a series of challenges amid policy changes in China, fruit traders stressed.

In early February, tight inspections of Chinese Customs hindered truck transport. Therefore, only 20-30 trucks were able to pass the checkpoint despite high demand.

Consequently, watermelons were sold out at the depots on the China side, and more than 500 trucks queued in line on the Myanmar side. In 2021, the COVID-19 restrictions hindered Myanmar's watermelon and muskmelon exports to China. The Chinese Customs Regulation increased delay. Long delays of trucks caused harm to watermelon quality and only one in five trucks heading to China remained undamaged with quality watermelons.

Traders need to contemplate delivery time, price and profitability as watermelon is a perishable fruit while trying to explore new markets beyond China. — NN/EM

Onion prices decrease as market shifts to solely rely on domestic demand

THE onion market is heavily reliant on domestic markets owing to the absence of foreign markets in mid-November. Additionally, new monsoon onions are soon to enter the Yangon market, as per onion depots in Yetama Street at Bayintnaung Wholesale Market.

Salt to be produced from 4,500 acres in Mon State

FOR the salt production season of 2023-2024, salt will be produced from 4,500 acres or 90 of salt plots in Mon State, according to U Khin Win, the head of the Mon State Salt Industry Office.

Raw salt produced in Mon State is sent mostly to the Taninthayi Region and Yangon Region, not only within Mon preparing salt production technology from the Internet, listening to weather reports and watching, so the loss in salt production has gradually decreased and the quality of the product has increased. This year's salt season has more blocks than last year's salt season", U Khin Win said.

Beware of silence-killer diabetes for the global populace

EWARE of the insidious threat posed by diabetes, a silent killer that, alongside malaria and HIV/AIDS, stands as one of the most perilous health challenges worldwide. These chronic disease manifests either when the pancreas fails to produce sufficient insulin or when the body cannot effectively utilize the insulin it generates. Insulin, a critical hormone, regulates blood glucose levels.

The International Diabetes Federation issued a report in 2021, stating that approximately 537 million adults are living with diabetes. It predicts that the total number of people living with diabetes is projected to rise to 643 million by 2030. The federation reported 6.7 million deaths worldwide among adults with diabetes as a result of diabetes or its complications in 2021.

Physical fitness since childhood predicts cerebellar volume in adolescence

Teenagers with larger cerebellar grey matter volumes, as per a study from the Universities of Jyvaskyla and Eastern Finland, exhibit better neuromuscular fitness, including strength, speed, and agility, since childhood.

HE volume of cerebellar grey matter in teenagers is proportional to their level of physical fitness since childhood. According to a new study from the Universities of Jyvaskyla and Eastern Finland, adolescents with higher Crus I grey matter volumes were also stronger, faster, and more agile — that is, they had better neuromuscular fitness since childhood.

Uncertainties persist regarding the relationships between physical fitness and cerebellar volume in teenagers, despite the importance of the developing cerebellum on cognition and learning. This study investigated whether there were gender differences in the relationships between physical fitness and the grey matter volume of cerebellar lobules linked to cognition in teenagers.

Neuromuscular fitness

Those adolescents with better neuromuscular fitness since childhood had larger Crus I grey matter volume. However, adolescents with better cardiorespiratory fitness

had smaller total cerebellar grey matter volume. Moreover, males with better neuromuscular fitness since childhood had smaller Crus II grev matter volume

"Our study highlights the importance of physical activity through childhood and adolescence, leading to better physical fitness, as it might be relevant to cerebellar volumes related to cognition and learning. However, the associations we observed are in part contradictory," says Doctoral Researcher Petri Jalanko from the Faculty of Sport and Health Sciences at the University of Jyvaskyla.

China's AI robotic chemist synthesizes catalysts for oxygen production on Mars

AN AI-driven robotic chemist, developed by Chinese scientists, has automatically synthesized and intelligently optimized catalysts for the oxygen evolution reaction from Martian meteorites, offering a highly efficient and energy-conserving solution for the production of oxygen on Mars.

Using a machine-learning model, the AI chemist automatically and swiftly identifies the optimal catalyst formula from more than three million possible compositions. This groundbreaking discovery demonstrates the feasibility of the AI chemist in the automated synthesis of chemicals and materials for Mars exploration, according to the study published in the journal Nature Synthesis on Monday.

Living on Mars requires the ability to synthesize chemicals that are essential for survival, such as oxygen, from local Martian resources. However, this is a challenging task.

Recent evidence of water activity on Mars has raised the prospect of large-scale oxygen production through solar power-driven electrochemical water oxidation processes using an oxygen evolution reaction catalyst. Considering the high cost of transporting catalysts from the Earth, extraterrestrial catalysts developed from local materials on Mars become a key technical issue.

Researchers from the University of Science and Technology of China (USTC), in collaboration with their counterparts from Chinese research institutes including the Deep Space Exploration Laboratory, analyzed and extracted components from Martian meteorites with a robotic AI chemist and synthesized a new catalyst in just six weeks.

Given five different local Martian ores as feedstocks, there are over 3.76 million possible formulas, which would cost 2,000 years of human labour to finish such a screening for the optimal formula. — Xinhua

New Zealand launches interactive map for biodiversity restoration

A new interactive map was launched on Tuesday to restore a minimum of 15 per cent local biodiversity within every catchment in New Zealand in the next nearly 100 years.

The interactive map from Eco-index includes information on the type of habitat that existed there historically and targets for restoring 15 per cent of biodiversity in each area.

The free, open access-resourced tool will help community groups, businesses, government and land managers to set restoration priorities for areas where local biodiversity is most at risk, said Eco-index, a programme aiming at tackling the challenge of biodiversity decline in New Zealand. The launch of the ecosystem restoration map provides a tool for those seeking to make strategically significant investment decisions on biodiversity redress, said Bruce Burns, associate professor of the School of Biological Sciences of the University of Auckland.

The tool identifies those areas and ecosystems that are locally impoverished, and therefore "offer the best bang for the buck in terms of actions," Burns said. — Xinhua

Brazil judge investigated for AI errors in ruling

BRAZILIAN authorities confirmed Monday they are investigating a federal judge who made mistakes in a ruling that was written using artificial intelligence, saying it was the first such case in the country.

The National Justice Council (CNJ), an oversight body for the courts, summoned Judge Jefferson Rodrigues to explain how he came to publish a decision strewn with legal errors formulated by online AI tool ChatGPT.

Rodrigues, a judge in the

northern state of Acre, included incorrect details on previous court cases and legal precedent in his ruling, wrongly attributing past decisions to the Superior Court of Justice, according to case records seen by AFP.

The judge said in documents filed with the oversight body that the ruling was written by a "trusted advisor", with help from AI. Rodrigues called the situation a "mere mistake", blaming "the work overload facing judges".— AFP

Sperm whales are the largest toothed predators on Earth, living in matrilineal societies with distinct cultures and dialects.

Growing up to 50 feet (16

"Numerous young people in Viet Nam actively engage with TikTok and are well-informed about the big discounts offered during China's 'Double 11' shopping extravaganza," said the 27-year-old, who works for Guangxi Haina Zhongpin Technology Co Ltd.

China's "Double 11" shopping spree took place from 31 October to 11 November this year, and has mainly been a domestic affair since its debut in 2009. However, in recent years, with Chinese e-commerce giants such as Alibaba, JD.com, Pinduoduo and others expanding into international markets, it has been transformed into a global celebration for consumers and businesses alike.

The growth of cross-border e-commerce has also boosted the popularity of imported goods among Chinese consumers during the shopping festival.

The first four hours of sales on Tmall Global on 31 October saw transactions of 1,540 international brands increase over 100 per cent from those last year, with 268 new brands experiencing a 10-fold increase. — Xinhua

Vodafone drops into first-half net loss

BRITISH mobile phone giant Vodafone said Tuesday that it sank into a first-half loss and revenue dipped after one-off gains from asset sales were not repeated as it undergoes a vast overhaul.

Net losses totalled 346 million euros (\$370 million) in the six months to the end of September, Vodafone said in a results statement.

That compared with profit after tax of 945 million euros in the same period a year earlier.

Revenues fell 4.3 per cent to 21.9 billion euros, hit by adverse foreign exchange rate moves as well as the sale of Vantage Towers, Vodafone Hungary and Vodafone Ghana last time around. But services revenue grew 4.2 per cent to 18.6 billion euros.

Vodafone added that its transformation plan was "progressing", two weeks after it announced the sale of its Spanish division to investment fund Zegona for up to 5.0 billion euros. In a further streamlining, Vodafone in June agreed to merge British operations with Three UK, owned by Hong Kong-based CK Hutchison, to create Britain's biggest operator with 27 million customers, as it targets an acceleration in faster 5G connectivity. "During the first half of the year, we have delivered improved revenue growth in nearly all of our markets and have returned to growth in Germany in the second quarter," said chief executive Margherita Della Valle. — AFP

Indonesia seeks investors to build residential complexes in new capital city

THE Indonesian government is seeking investors to build residential complexes in its ongoing project for a new capital city named Nusantara, said a senior official on Monday.

The new capital, located on the island of Borneo in the East Kalimantan province, will require at least 16,000 residential units, Iwan Suprijanto, the Public Works and Housing Ministry's directorgeneral of housing, said. For phase one, 2,500 units will be built using the state budget, and 30,000 units will use cooperation schemes between the government and business entities. "The need for houses and related properties in our new capital is very high because we will move the central governmental offices and the civil servants.

Therefore, we would like to open up investment opportunities in housing and properties," Iwan said in a written statement.

He said that the country needs investors who could be committed to sustainability and environmental protection as

The Indonesian government, he said, will make it easier for investors to do business in the country through fiscal and non-fiscal support, including tax incentives and facilitation of land provision. Japan chipmaker Rapidus to open business base in Silicon Valley

JAPANESE chipmaker Rapidus Corp will open a business base in Silicon Valley by the end of March, its chief executive officer said Monday, as it seeks to expand its sales network in the United States in anticipation of demand growth.

Rapidus CEO Atsuyoshi Koike said Silicon Valley is critical for the Japanese government-backed developer of next-generation chips due to its ability to provide access to customers.

The company is planning to mass produce state-of-the-art 2-nanometre chips in 2024 in partnership with US tech giant IBM Corp.

Koike unveiled the plan at a meeting organized by the Japanese government of chip and AI firms in San Francisco.

Officials from 21 Asia-Pacific economies and business leaders are gathering in the city this week to discuss how to make supply chains more robust for crucial items such as semiconductors after many nations were hit by parts shortages caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Japanese industry minister Yasutoshi Nishimura said at the meeting, "It is critically important to boost the supply capacity of cutting-edge semiconductors, not only for achieving carbon neutrality but for ensuring economic security."

"We have seen more and more examples of (private-sector) cooperation between Japan and the United States. We believe that the government should further accelerate this momentum," Nishimura added. — Kyodo

Horn of Africa faces severe challenges as extreme weather, food insecurity persist: WHO

COUNTRIES in the Horn of Africa are facing severe challenges as extreme weather events and food insecurity persist, the World Health Organization (WHO) has warned.

The WHO, in its latest Horn of Africa food insecurity and health situation report issued Monday, warned that Horn of Africa countries are grappling with a combination of extreme weather events, widespread food insecurity and health crises.

It said the region has continued to face extreme weather events including drought and flooding, and the impacts of these events are likely to be exacerbated by the onset of El Nino.

According to the WHO, over

61 million people in the region are in a state of crisis and above, facing elevated levels of acute food insecurity. "The region is battling with multiple outbreaks of diseases including cholera in four countries, measles and malaria in all the seven countries and dengue fever in Ethiopia and Djibouti," the report read.

It said the deterioration of the nutritional situation has led to an estimated 30 per cent increase in the number of children with acute malnutrition in hotspot areas. It said the displacement to the neighbouring countries has also increased the humanitarian needs, especially in South Sudan and Ethiopia.

The WHO, citing the World Meteorological Organization's confirmation regarding the onset of El-Nino in the region, said all the countries in the region are expected to face its health impact, either through below or above average rains in the last quarter of 2023. — Xinhua

Iran rejects accusation of directing regional resistance groups to attack US bases

IRANIAN Foreign Ministry spokesman Nasser Kanaani stressed on Monday that the resistance groups in the Middle East "do not take orders from Iran and act independently". He made the remarks in a weekly press conference in the Iranian capital Tehran, responding to allegations of some US officials, who accused Iran of "directing and giving orders to regional resistance groups" to target American bases in a number of regional countries.

"These groups decide independently and take the necessary actions based on their calculations and interests as well as those of their countries and peoples," Kanaani said. — Xinhua

North Korea condemns G7 statement on nuke programme

NORTH Korea on Tuesday slammed a joint statement by G7 foreign ministers that criticized the country's nuclear programme, arguing the grouping of rich democracies should be "dismantled immediately".

In a statement issued last week, the top diplomats of Canada, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Britain, the United States and the European Union reiterated their longstanding call for the "complete denuclearization of the Korean Peninsula".

The G7 foreign ministers also demanded that Pyongyang abandon its nuclear weapons, and strongly condemned recent arms transfers from North Korea to Russia, asking the two countries to "immediately cease all such activities".

North Korea last year de-

clared itself an "irreversible" nuclear power and has repeatedly said it will never give up its nuclear programme, which the regime views as essential for its survival.

Jo Chol Su, a high-ranking official at Pyongyang's foreign ministry, said he "resolutely" rejects and "most strongly" condemns the recent G7 statement, calling it "groundless". — AFP

on Tuesday to release thousands of containers of imports it said were stuck at Karachi port since Islamabad clamped down on transnational cargo.

Pakistan authorities say they have lost millions of dollars in taxes because goods are being sent duty-free from its ports to land-locked Afghanistan, and then smuggled back across the border.

Afghan authorities say Pakistan has stopped more than 3,000 Afghanistan-bound containers at more tax and duty payments, causing millions of dollars in losses to traders.

The issue was raised Tuesday by Nooruddin Azizi, Afghanistan's minister of industry and commerce, in a meeting with Jalil Abbas Jilani, Pakistan's caretaker minister of foreign affairs.

They spoke about "the transit problems and challenges of the two countries" a statement from the Afghan embassy said. — AFP

THE Myanmar national football team has been training in Osaka, Japan since the night of 14 November to play an away match against the Japanese national team as the first group match of the 2026 World Cup second qualifying round.

Team Myanmar left for Japan from Yangon International Airport on 13 November and arrived in Osaka on 14 November.

The Myanmar national team began training on the night of 14 November and will have two days of preparation time in Japan before the match against the Japanese team to be played at Panasonic Stadium Suita in Osaka on 16 November.

Team Myanmar is falling in the same group as Japan, Syria and North Korea for the second-round World Cup Qualifiers.

Hajime Moriyasu, whose side kick off their campaign against Myanmar in Osaka, warned that a Group B also featuring Syria and North Korea would not be easy.

"They are teams that wouldn't look out of place in the final round," the coach said, despite Japan thrashing Myanmar 10-0 at home when they met in

Italy, Netherlands, Wales aim to secure Euro 2024 qualification

REIGNING champions Italy are preparing for a decisive qualifier with Ukraine for a place at Euro 2024, while former winners the Netherlands and 2016 semi-finalists Wales are also aiming to book their tickets to the finals in Germany. The last two rounds of qualifying matches take place over the next week, and a total of 12 countries will secure their spots in next month's draw in Hamburg for the tournament to go with nine who are already guaranteed to be there.

Continental heavyweights Spain, France, England, Belgium and Portugal have already qualified along with hosts Germany, Türkiye, Scotland and Austria for the 24-nation finals which will run 14 June to 14 July next year.

Italy, who beat England on penalties at Wembley in the final of the last European Championship in 2021 to claim the title for the second time, still have work to do to avoid missing another major tournament.

Having failed to qualify for either of the last two World Cups, there is a danger the Azzurri will not be in Germany to defend their title after a qualifying campaign during which coach Roberto Mancini quit either side of defeats home and away to England. — AFP



APEC finance chiefs agree to grow economies with eye on sustainability

EADERS of Asia-Pacific economies want to boost output with an eye on issues like reducing inequality and protecting the environment, US Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen said on Monday.

Her comments at a press conference come at the end of talks with finance ministers of the 21-member Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) forum. Citing legislation like the Inflation Reduction Act — a signature achievement of US President Joe Biden — Yellen told reporters "APEC economies recognize the potential of this strategy and are pursuing similar policies."

Economic development and environmental action need to work together if the world is to combat global warming, Yellen said.

"We need to further improve our

long-term economic outlook by boosting labour supply, innovation, and infrastructure investment, in ways that are also sustainable and reduce inequality," Yellen said in San Francisco.

After several years focused on post-pandemic recovery, 2023 was a "pivotal year" for APEC, said Yellen, a time where governments could refocus on "advancing fiscal reforms to build our economies over the long run". — AFP

World severely off track to limit planetheating emissions: UN

THE world is "failing to get a grip" on climate change, the UN warned Tuesday, as an assessment of current climate pledges shows only minor progress on reducing emissions this decade.

In a report released just weeks before high-stakes climate negotiations, the United Nations climate change organization said the world was failing to act with sufficient urgency to curb greenhouse gas emissions.

With temperatures soaring and 2023 expected to become the warmest year so far in human history, scientists say the pressure on world leaders to curb planet-heating greenhouse gas pollution has never been more urgent. The UN found that combined climate plans from nearly 200 nations would put the world on a path for 2030 carbon emissions just two per cent below 2019 levels.

That is far short of the 43 per cent fall that the UN's IPCC climate panel says are needed to limit warming to the Paris deal target of 1.5 degrees Celsius since the preindustrial era. "Every fraction of a degree matters, but we are severely off track. COP28 is our time to change that," said UN Climate Change chief Simon Stiell.

He called for climate talks in Dubai this month to mark a "clear turning point" for a world already wracked by increasing floods, heatwaves and storms.

Scientists have warned that humanity is dangerously close to blowing past the 1.5C global heating limit, risking intensifying impacts. "The world is failing to get a grip on the climate crisis," said UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres, warning countries were not acting fast enough to avoid climate catastrophe. – AFP

Israel shows 'evidence' Hamas held hostages at hospital

ISRAEL'S army cited a discarded baby bottle, makeshift toilet and bullet-scarred motorbike as evidence Hamas held hostages in a Gaza hospital, as an Israeli soldier was declared killed in captivity Tuesday. civilians - according to Israel. Hagari did not say how many hostages the army believes were held at the hospital in the north of the besieged Gaza Strip. However in a video recorded on site, he walked through various scenes alleging they "indicate that Hamas held hostages here". Hagari said a bullet-marked motorbike used to transport hostages was in the basement, alongside a chair with rope near the legs and discarded women's clothing. An improvised toilet was also cited as evidence hostages were held downstairs. "You don't need to build something improvisedly in a hospital, in the basement, unless you want to hold someone in the basement and you don't want anyone to see him," Hagari said. — AFP



On Monday evening, army spokesman Daniel Hagari said troops "found signs that indicate that Hamas held hostages" in the basement of Al-Rantisi children's hospital in Gaza City.

AFP was not able to independently confirm the allegation, and Hamas has consistently denied using hospitals as hideouts as it battles Israeli troops.

Some 240 people were taken hostage by Hamas fighters who surged through the heavily militarised Gaza border on 7 October and killed 1,200 people — mostly
