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Counter-argument to false information

Misinformation: Steel mill accused of producing ammos, storing radioactive materials

FAKE news circulating on social media platforms, including Facebook, falsely claims that the No (2) Steel Mill in Pangpet, Taunggyi Township, Shan State, is involved in producing ammunition and stockpiling radioactive materials.

These unsubstantiated reports also allege that the project poses a threat to the livelihoods of local farmers residing on the banks of the Namtabat Creek. They further claim that middle-aged residents are suffering from lung cancer due to the project, citing the Pa-O Youth Organization as their source.

A relevant official at the Ministry of Industry refuted these baseless claims, explaining that the mill exclusively uses hematite and limonite iron ores, along with raw materials such as silica and alumina in small percentages. The official emphasized that there is no discovery of uranium or plutonium, essential materials for producing nuclear weapons. Therefore, the official reassured the public that these claims are nothing more than fake news.

The mill, which produces 200,000 tonnes of pig iron annually, aims to meet the country's demand for iron and steel. Its objectives include reducing the need for importing iron, supporting the local economy, and creating job opportunities.

The spread of false information on social media is attributed to "malicious media outlets", which are considered an attempt to damage the country's economy and create misunderstandings among the public. — MNA/ NT



Terrorist attacks on infrastructure threatens peace and socio-economic stability

ARMED insurgents and PDF terrorists are engaging in the acts of burning and destroying government banks, private banks, departmental offices, State-owned and private property, factories and industries, telecom towers, and electicity transmission towers with the intention of undermining the country's peace, stability and rule of law.

Due to their violent actions, a total of 81 electricity transmission towers were destroyed between 2 February 2021, and 16 November 2023. The most crucial transmission towers, constructed for the development of the country and the improvement of people's socio-economic life, are being destroyed through mine explosions and arson by the

terrorists, causing significant damage and loss for citizens who rely on electricity daily.

It is reported that citizens can secretly communicate news of terrorist activities to nearby security forces, and the security forces will continue anti-terrorism operations in cooperation with the public to maintain state peace, tranquility, and the rule of law. — MNA/ TRKM

Illegal immigrants handed over to relevant authorities

THE government is focusing on peace and stability as well as rule of law in all regions and states, including the border areas. As some foreign nationals are illegally entering and residing in Myanmar through land borders, administrative organizations conduct necessary checks and repatriate them to relevant countries under the law.

A total of 648 illegal immigrants, comprising 580 males and 68 females, were repatriated to China through Chinese officials. Therefore, a total of 8,641 illegal immigrants, including 7,846 males and 795 females, were repatriated to China from 31 October to 26 November.

The government will continue the process of screening and repatriation for foreign nationals who have illegally entered and resided in the border areas. — MNA/KZW

Chief Minister of Yangon Region U Soe Thein opened the auspicious ceremony of Tazaungdine Lighting and the 23rd golden lotus robe weaving contest of Thirimingala Kaba Aye Pagoda yesterday evening.

The Chief Minister of Yangon Region offered donated cash for the weaving looms and observed the contest. There were seven looms at the contest at Thirimingala Kaba Aye Pagoda. The first prize will be awarded K700,000 while K600,000 for the second prize, K500,000 for the third prize, and K400,000 for a consolation prize. Trophies and honour certificates will also be awarded.

The 39th golden lotus robe weaving contest took place at Botahtaung Kyaikdeatt Pagoda yesterday evening.

The Chief Minister donated cash for the looms. There are 24 looms at the contest at Botahtaung Kyaikdeatt Pagoda. The first prize will be awarded K1.5 million while K1 million for the second prize, K800,000 for the third prize, and K400,000 for each consolation prize.

Likewise, the 42nd golden lotus robe weaving contest and Tazaungdine Lighting Festival was held at Kyaikkasan Pagoda yesterday evening.

MRF plans K40 billion loan for summer paddy season to support farmers

IN the upcoming summer paddy season, approximately K40 billion will be lent to farmers with around 50 acres of farmland in the Ayeyawady, Bago, and Yangon regions, as well as the Nay Pyi Taw Council Area, according to the Myanmar Rice Federation (MRF).

To initiate the project, the list of farmers in the Ayeyawady, Bago and Yangon regions, and Nay Pyi Taw Council Area working on about 50 acres of farmland has been compiled, and the loan will be initially disbursed for 100,000 acres.

In Myanmar, there are 17 million acres of monsoon paddy and summer paddy fields, yielding 14 million tonnes of rice annually. Of this, 11 million tonnes are for local consumption, and 2.5 million tonnes are for export, according to the Myanmar Rice Federation (MRF). — ASH/ TRKM

The tender will encompass service provisions across 11 sectors for 12 months in 2024, catering to visitor needs such as restrooms, market stalls, fish and tortoise feed, Myanmar handicraft shops, sale of offerings for the spirits and more.

Bidders can learn the rules and acquire the proposal forms

at the trustee's office starting from 1 December. The winner will be announced in the presence of the bidders on 11 December.

However, the bidders whose proposed prices fall below the minimum bid will not receive a refund of their deposit, according to the announcement.

The pagoda is famous for its Buddha image called Loka Chantha Abhaya Labha Muni and is located on Mindhamma Hill in East Gyogon Ward. — TWA/NT

Yangon-based pilgrim services required to obtain tourism certification

THE service businesses for domestic pilgrims based in the Yangon Region must apply for tourism service business certification

According to the Domestic Pilgrim and Tour Operator Association, only domestic pilgrims and tourism service members must apply for the certification, therefore business operators who have not yet joined the association must apply for membership by 31 December.

Starting from 1 January 2024, the relevant departments will monitor whether Yangon-based domestic pilgrimage tourism businesses are providing services in line with the requirements.

According to the Domestic Pilgrim and Tour Opera-

tor Association, 603 members are operating in domestic pilgrimage services. — TWA/ TKO

Taunggyi Weaving and Vocational Training School announces 6-month weaving course

STARTING from 1 January 2024, a six-month weaving course will be conducted at the Weaving and Vocational Training School in Taunggyi. The course will admit only 10 trainees for each of the two six-month courses per year, providing a comprehensive curriculum encompassing both theoretical and practical aspects.

The course will cover subjects such as textile design, textile analyses, hand threading, traditional weaving, and colour bleaching and dyeing. Applicants must be between 16 and 25 years old and have completed basic education at the primary school level. During the six-month training period, the government will arrange accommodation, providing an allowance of K30,000 per month. Upon completion of the course, job opportunities will be made available for the trainees in weaving businesses operating in Taunggyi and Inlay regions. — TWA/TKO

OWIC cards issued to about 1,700,000 workers aboard

ACCORDING to the Department of Labour, Overseas Workers Identification Cards (OWIC) have been issued to approximately 1,684,934 workers employed in foreign countries during the 33-year period from 1990 to 2023. OWIC cards are issued at the Migrant Workers Unit of the Department of Labour in Dagon Myothit (North) Township. For those who return home on leave, the cards are issued at the Department of Labour in Mayangone Township. OWIC cards have been issued to 1,110,595 workers in Thailand, 52,035 in Singapore, 64,364 in Korea, 60,013 in Japan, and 385,566 in Malaysia.-TWA/ TRKM

Bago Region attracts substantial foreign investments, approves additional funding for industrial business

IN November 2023, Bago Region received a foreign investment project worth \$1.622 million, as stated by U Ko Ko Latt, the Director of the Bago Region Directorate of Investment and Company Administration.

"Bago Region Investment Committee allowed a foreign investment valued at \$1.622 million in November. Additionally, the committee approved the currently-operating foreign business to add \$7 million to its original investment at meeting No. 7/2023," said U Ko Ko Latt.

Furthermore, regional authorities are eager to invite external investors to invest businesses related to manufacturing agricultural machinery and equipment, producing fer-

tilizers, and establishing cold storage facilities to promote the development of multi-functional agriculture and the manufacturing of farming products. Relevant departments will provide necessary assistance in line with the law.

There were \$197.117 million worth of foreign investments and K 75,456.275 million in domestic investments in Bago Region between February 2021 and November 2023, consequently generating job opportunities for more than 11,281 labourers. — ASH/TMT

December sees increase in imported edible oil tonnage

ACCORDING to the oil market in Yangon, about 70,000 tonnes of edible oil will be imported from abroad starting December.

In 2022, the average monthly import was only around 40,000 tonnes, but in July, the maximum was imported with around 58,000 tonnes, and in February and September, only around 32,000 of edible oil is K4,990 per viss tonnes were imported, according to the statistics.

294,457 tonnes of edible oil worth US\$294.58 million were imported from abroad

In addition, it is reported that 33 companies will import oil in bulk and 27 companies will import ready-packaged consumer oil in December of this year. This week from 20 to 26 November, the wholesale price

In December, local oil sellers are expecting to buy more oil imports from abroad at around the wholesale price in the market. They also wish to have a normal situation where they buy as usual in the market.

The oil market will return to normal if there are systematic actions against selling oil at more than the set price and storing more than the limit. If so, it is expected that the scenes of time-consuming queues for buying edible oil

Russian pharmacy firms prepping to enter **SEA** market

RUSSIAN pharmaceutical companies eye Southeast Asia including Myanmar for market expansion, according to Myanmar's Commercial Attaché in Moscow. Russian pharmaceutical company Binnopharm Group is considering entering the Southeast Asian market in early 2024, said CEO Mr Rustem Muratov of Binnopharm Group.

Binnopharm Group has already planned to enter the markets of Viet Nam, Malaysia, Indonesia, Thailand and the Philippines and they are observing market potential in Myanmar as well. They will start registration procedures in all countries as soon as they are ready. Muratov noted that the company will open a representative office in Southeast Asia in the coming months. Binnopharm Group opened a representative office in China and a list of pharmaceuticals for launching in China has been determined.

The leading Binnopharm Group in Russia was formed in 2020. There are five production factories in Russia and 20 per cent of the products are made from the group's own pharmaceutical ingredients. The group is one of the leading companies in Russia's retail pharmaceutical market, exporting its products to 14 countries. On 23 November, the officials of the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and

Ensuring lifelong lung health in controlling pneumonia

neumonia, an infectious disease with swift repercussions, poses a grave threat to both children and the elderly worldwide. Its impact on children surpasses the combined mortality rates of AIDS, measles, and malaria, earning it the designation of a formidable health adversary. The World Health Organization (WHO) alarmingly reported that, in 2019 alone, 2.5 million individuals globally, including 672,000 children, succumbed to pneumonia. This underscores the urgency of addressing the critical issue of lung health across all age groups.

Air pollution emerges as a primary culprit, wielding detrimental effects on populations globally. WHO identifies air pollution, stemming from various sources such as smoke from cooking, heating, and the use of firewood and charcoal, as a leading cause of lung-related diseases. In particular, pneumonia infections are exacerbated by

Daily lifestyle choices, especially concerning air pollution, directly impact lung health Efforts to curtail air pollution are paramount for enhancing the longevity of lung function and ensuring a healthier, disease-resistant life.

inhaling pollutants from cooking, lighting, and the burning of mosquito coils and joss sticks. A collective effort is imperative to mitigate the impacts of air pollution, as it continues to claim lives across the globe.

Preventive measures against pneumonia must be adopted not only by healthcare professionals but also by individuals. Efforts to reduce air pollution, which plays a pivotal role in triggering pneumonia, are essential for safeguarding the health of children and older individuals. Over 50 per cent of deaths among the elderly can be attributed to the detrimental effects of air pollution, as they lack the resilience to access clean air for optimal respiratory function.

The researchers analyzed the chemical composition and the morphology of the COFs, determining that the larger diameter of BB-COF enabled rapid ion transport and more effective utilization of the active sites

The list of challenges includes the following key areas: which characteristics of nanomaterials are relevant with respect to toxicity; how nanotechnology will change the practice of medicine; what scientists will learn about nanomaterials at their surface and interface using new visualization technologies; how

nanotechnology will change how we make catalysts and the types of catalysts we can make; and how nanotechnology can transform electronics.

According to the Chinese institute, these areas reflect current international frontier research, future sci-tech development and the common needs of humankind. Experts hope these major challenges will stimulate the curiosity and exploration enthusiasm of researchers in nanoscience and technology. — Xinhua

Every industry should be 'held accountable' on climate: COP28 president

COP28 in Dubai, 30 November - 12 December, expects 70,000 attendees, including world leaders, activists, and Pope Francis, becoming the largest UN climate summit.

THE president of a pivotal UN climate summit defended on Saturday the large presence of industry representatives at the negotiations, saying private sector engagement was essential to curb global heating.

"Everyone needs to be part of this process and everyone needs to be held responsible and everyone needs to be held accountable," COP28 president Sultan Al Jaber, of the oil-rich United Arab Emirates, told AFP in an interview.

"That includes all industries and in particular heavy emitting industries like aviation, transportation, aluminium, cement, steel, as well as the oil and gas industry," he added.

World leaders, country negotiators, activists, lobbyists and figures including Pope Francis will be among the 70,000 attendees expected at COP28 in Dubai from 30 November to 12 December, making it the largest United Nations climate change summit ever.

More than 1,000 businesses and philanthropic organisation leaders have registered for a twoday forum on 1-2 December on the sidelines of the negotiations between political leaders on preventing the planet's climate tipping unstoppably out of control.

Businesses and industries are to announce a score of com-

Germany on brink of recession, Q3 GDP down 0.1 pct: Destatis

In a year-on-year comparison, consumer spending fell by 2.0 per cent, attributed to high price levels.

GERMANY'S economy is on the brink of recession as the country's gross domestic product (GDP) in the third quarter (Q3) of 2023 declined by 0.1 percent compared to the previous quarter, according to confirmed figures published by the Federal Statistical Office (Destatis) on Friday.

"After the weak economic development seen in the first half of 2023, the German economy began the second half of the year with a slight drop in performance," Destatis President Ruth Brand said. Economic output almost stagnated in the first two quarters of the year. While government spending rose slightly by 0.2 per cent compared to the previous quarter, private consumption dropped by 0.3 per cent, according to Destatis. In a year-on-



Argentina president-elect discusses economic crisis with IMF chief

ARGENTINA'S president-elect Javier Milei and IMF chief Kristalina Georgieva had a first meeting via video call on Friday, in which they discussed the country's economic crisis.

Argentina has had a \$44 billion credit program with the IMF since the government of ex-president Mauricio Macri requested financial assistance in 2018.

The outgoing administration of Alberto Fernandez renegotiated the loan, but the recession that accompanied the Covid-19 pandemic and a severe drought this year made it difficult for Argentina to meet the targets agreed with the IMF.

"Today I had an excellent conversation with the director of the IMF, @KGeorgieva, in which we talked about the great economic challenge facing our country," Milei said on X, formerly known as Twitter.

"I told her about different aspects of our fiscal adjustment plan and our monetary program. The Fund was collaborative in finding the structural solutions that Argentina needs." — AFP

Türkiye delivers another major interest rate hike

TÜRKIYE 's central bank on Friday surprised the market with a larger-than-expected interest hike as it ramped up its fight against inflation and efforts to support the slumping lira.

The bank lifted its policy rate by 5.0 percentage points to 40 per cent on the sixth month of a belt-tightening cycle that has more than quadrupled borrowing costs.

Most analysts had expected the bank to raise its rate by 2.5 percentage points.

"Really impressive move by the (central bank) ... getting well ahead of expectations," emerging markets economist Timothy Ash remarked in an emailed note.

But the bank also gave a strong signal that it was reaching the limits of how high its policy rate will go.

"The current level of monetary tightness is significantly close to the level required to establish the disinflation course," the bank said in a statement.

"Accordingly, the pace of monetary tightening will slow down and the tightening cycle will be completed in a short period of time." - AFP

Kenya's Ruto pledges action to tackle deadly flood emergency

KENYA is drawing up measures to tackle a flood disaster that has killed 70 people and driven tens of thousands from their homes, President William Ruto said on Saturday, describing it as an "emergency situation".

Kenya and neighbouring Somalia and Ethiopia, countries that are only just emerging from the worst drought in four decades, are now experiencing devastating flooding caused by torrential rainfall linked to the El Nino weather pattern.

Ruto said after holding talks with various emergency response teams that the cabinet would meet on Monday to discuss recommendations on how to manage the crisis. "Unfortunately we have lost 70 people across Kenya because of these rains and about 36,160 households have been displaced so far," he said in an address from State House.

India bid to free 41 trapped workers in collapse highway tunnel enters third week

The Indian air force is actively involved, providing support and flying in multiple loads since the tunnel's partial collapse on 12 November in Uttarakhand.

INDIA'S military brought in specialized equipment Sunday as efforts to free 41 trapped workers entered a third week, with digging ongoing in three directions after repeated setbacks to the operation.

The Indian air force said Sunday that they were "responding with alacrity", as they flew in their third load since the partial collapse of the under-construction Silkyara road tunnel on 12 November in the Himalayan state of Uttarakhand.

Rescue officials said they called for a superheated plasma cutter to be brought to the remote mountain location, after engineers driving a metal pipe horizontally through 57 metres (187 feet) of rock and concrete ran into metal girders and construction vehicles buried in the earth.



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"Kenya is already soaked," he said, adding that the Meteorological Department was forecasting more rains, heightening the risk of further flooding.

"Therefore we need to prepare ourselves for the emergency situation that is going to ensue," he said. — AFP A giant earth-boring machine snapped just nine meters from breaking through.

Thick metal girders in the rubble are blocking the route, and using conventional oxyacetylene cutters to clear them is tricky from inside the confined pipe, only wide enough for a man to crawl through. The air force said the "critical" kit came from the country's Defence Research and Development Organization, the government's defence technology research arm, without giving further details. — AFP

Cargo ship sinks with 14 aboard off Greece's Lesbos

A Comoros-flagged cargo ship with 14 people on board has sunk off the island of Lesbos in gale-force winds, the Greek coast guard said Sunday prompting a major rescue operation. Ert state-run television reported that a navy helicopter had picked up one crew member.

Five cargo ships, three coast guard vessels, air force and navy helicopters as well as a navy frigate had joined the rescue effort.

The state-run Athens News Agency (ANA) reported that the cargo ship had 14 crew members and was loaded with salt. Citing the coastguard, ANA said it went down 4.5 nautical miles (8.3 kilometres) southwest of Lesbos early Sunday. The ship had sailed from Dekheila, Egypt, heading for Istanbul.

The crew members include two Syrian nationals, four Indians and eight Egyptians, ANA said. Ships had remained in dock across several parts of Greece on Saturday with wind speeds reaching 9-10, a strong gale to storm force, on the Beaufort scale.

An emergency weather warning by the Hellenic National Meteorological Service (EMY) had been upgraded on Saturday from "worsening weather" to "dangerous weather phenomena", as Storm Oliver (also called Bettina) moved from the Adriatic Sea toward Greece.—AFP

Japan rushes to contain bird flu spread in 1st outbreak of season

Detection of a highly contagious strain triggers task forces with cooperation from neighbouring prefectures and national authorities



AUTHORITIES in southwestern Japan on Saturday rushed to contain the season's first avian influenza outbreak, identifying around 40,000 birds for culling and implementing quarantine measures for nearby farms.

A highly contagious strain of the virus was detected on a poultry farm in Kashima, Saga Prefecture, prompting neighboring prefectural and national authorities to convene task forces. The Saga prefectural gov-

ernment said Saturday morning that bird flu cases were confirmed at a farm in Kashima, with the culling of all 40,000 birds expected to be completed by Sunday morning. The movement of about 255,000 birds at 12 poultry farms located within a 10-kilometer radius of the outbreak's epicenter and related products such as eggs was restricted, while vehicle disinfection sites were set up across the prefecture. Agriculture, Forestry, and Fisheries

Minister Ichiro Miyashita said at his ministry's task force meeting that swift action will be taken to combat the virus, including by dispatching an epidemiological survey team.

According to Saga prefectural authorities, an increasing number of dead chickens were reported on Friday, with the results of two basic tests coming back positive. Genetic tests later confirmed the presence of the virus. — Kyodo
