### Bagan Ancient Cultural Zone draws 500,000 visitors during two holiday periods

ACCORDING to travel agencies, the number of visitors to the Bagan Ancient Cultural Zone has increased significantly this year, mainly due to local tourism.

Similarly, more foreign tourists visited Bagan this year compared to last year, with Chinese, Russians and Thais leading the increased numbers.

"We expect to receive more visitors in the upcoming 2024 travel season. Previously, people used to come only on weekends. On Mondays, Bagan was mostly deserted. But now, we have visitors on Mondays, Saturdays, and Sundays. The number of visitors has increased again. It is more than that of post-Covid 2021-2022 because we see many visitors even on weekdays without any break," one agency official said.

A senior officer from the Ministry of Religious Affairs and Culture also said that about half a million local and foreign travellers came to Bagan to enjoy the Thadingyut and Tazaungdine holidays, citing a record of arrivals.

"During these holiday periods, visitor arrivals exceeded the capacity of major hotels in Bagan, and so, it was necessary to arrange for those who did not have a reservation to share accommodations in the monasteries," the official said.

The Shwezigon Pagoda is packed with devotees and travellers, attracting many local and foreign visitors with a traditional religious festival, local food courts and stalls, and fun fairs. — Thit Taw/ZN

He continued that as the government could emphasize the public health sector, the maternal death rate could be reduced to 60 per cent in 2020 rather than the per cent in 1990 and the mortality rate by 53.2 per cent in 2021 from 2000. With regard to the success of the health sector, the Senior General underscored that the infant death rate plunged to 42.1 per cent in 2021 in comparison with that of 2000.

The infection rate of TB declined to 20 per cent in 2020. As such, Myanmar is the only country in Southeast Asia that succeeded in reaching the end TB milestone, he added. Moreover, the country remarkably reduced HIV/AIDS and malaria

outbreak rates.

He highlighted that the government has been increasing the allocation of funds for the health sector year after year on the purchase of medications for vaccination, TB and HIV treatments, maternal and child nutrition development, and purchase of medicines for hypertension, diabetes and heart diseases.

The Senior General recounted that under the leadership of the government, health staff, well-wishers, and people joined hands in controlling the COVID-19 pandemic in a short time with the lowest casualties.

He remarked that Myanmar could post a milestone in the health sector without spreading infectious diseases in the post-COVID-19 period and in the aftermath of cyclone Mocha, which occurred in May

The Senior General urged all to analyze experiences and knowledge from the conference, apply them in the public healthcare services, and strive to ensure the promotion of public healthcare services to increase life expectancy.

The conference is held under the title of "Improving the longevity and health of the nation". More than 1,800 local public health experts will participate in the conference with 30 international experts online until 7 December.

After the opening ceremony, the Senior General visited the booths of relevant ministries and the Directorate of Medical Services.

The conference was also attended by SAC Joint Secretary Lt-Gen Ye Win Oo, council members, Union ministers and officials. — MNA/TTA


E-Lock system and the future integration of x-ray machines for inspections at dry ports. The Union minister encouraged adherence to rules and regulations in

# 4,828,202 CSCs issued in Pankhinn Project Phases I & II

ACCORDING to the Ministry of Immigration and Population, the first and second phases of the pilot project have issued registration cards, a legal requirement for everyone, totalling 4,828,202 people.

The Ministry of Immigration and Population, in collaboration with the Department of National Registration and Citizenship, has urged those living without a household list or citizenship scrutiny card to register before the end of December.

The first phase, targeting a population of 3.4 million since

2021, has achieved over 99 per cent completion. Similarly, the second phase, initiated in August 2022 with a target of 1.7 million, has completed 78 per cent. Temporary migrants discovered during field censuses, lacking a genuine household population list or any type of citizenship card, will be processed promptly by a five-member committee comprising departmental staff.

Field census statistics from September to 26 November 2023 indicate the collection of information from more than 12 million families in the household list and over 2.8 million households gathered on blank forms, totalling more than 14.9 million households.

The collection is 100 per cent complete in nine regions and states, while the remaining six regions are still in progress, with 89.053 per cent of these processes finished.

The National Registration and Citizenship Department, in collaboration with pilot project phases I and II, is actively working to enable all eligible individuals aged 18 and above to vote in the next election under the law. — TWA/TKO

# 77 construction permits issued during Nov last week-Dec first week

A total of 77 construction permits were issued in the area of the Yangon City Development Committee in the last week of November and the first week of December, and a total of 17 building completion certificates (BCC) were granted, according to the Engineering Department (Buildings) of the committee.

In addition, recommendation letters for 65 buildings that have applied for construction permits have also been sent – four to the Fire Services Department, four to the Engineering Department (Water and Sanitation), four to the Department of Urban Land Management, and one to the Department of Urban Planning.

The Yangon Electricity Supply Corporation will carry out the installation work for electricity supply to the buildings that have been granted BCC. — TWA/MKKS

### Weekly market update of dry groceries at Bayintnaung Wholesale Centre

FOR the week from 29 November to 6 December 2023, the prices of onion, Shan garlic, sugarcane candy, jaggery and black gram climbed, whereas potato and Kyukok garlic prices dipped at the Bayintnaung Wholesale Centre.

Onion

The Bayintnaung Wholesale Market saw the supply of 120,000 visses of onions on 6 December. The wholesale prices moved in the range of K2,400 and K4,200 per viss depending on the quality, size and producing areas (Seikphyu, Taungtha and Myingyan) that day.

#### **Garlic**

The garlic prices from Aungban, Shan State, stood at

K11,500-K13,500 per viss depending on varieties and qualities, whereas Kyukok garlic fetched K10,800-K11,000 per viss on 6 December.

#### Potato

Chinese potato price declined

further to K2,800 per viss on 6 December from K3,200-K3,300 per viss registered on 28 November. **Chilli pepper** 

The wholesale prices of chilli peppers were K7,500-K10,500 per viss for long chilli pepper

and Moehtaung variety on 6 December. Those red chillies processed in cold storage fetched K14,500-K15,000 per viss. The prices of bell peppers from the Sinphyukyun area and delta regions were K15,000-K23,000 per viss.

#### Rice

The prices hit K65,000-66,000 per sack of low-grade monsoon rice, K88,000 for short-mature old rice (90 days), K75,000 per sack of old rice grown under the intercropping season and K90,000 per sack for Pawkywe variety. The high-grade old Pawsan rice prices were K135,000-K160,000 per sack depending on producing areas (Pyapon, Myaungmya, Shwebo)

on 6 December.

#### Palm oil

For a week from 4 to 10 December 2023, the wholesale reference price of Yangon Region was set at K4,920 per viss, down by K80 per viss compared to last week.

#### Pulses

The prices of various pulses stood at K2,941,000 per tonne of black gram (Fair Average Quality/RC), K3,191,000 per tonne of black gram (Special Quality/RC), K3,100,000 per tonne of pigeon pea (red gram) RC, K3,430 per viss of green gram and K5,800 -6,000 per viss of chickpea in Yangon's wholesale markets.—TWA/KK

### YGEA lowers gold reference price amid spot gold price dip

YANGON Region Gold Entrepreneurs Association (YGEA) dropped the reference price to K3.209 million per tical (0.578 ounce or 0.016 kilogramme) on 6 December, tracking a slight decrease in spot gold price at US\$2,033 per ounce.

Spot gold price hit a high of US\$2,086 per ounce, driving the YGEA to set the reference price higher to K3.28 million per tical on 4 December.


The pure gold market price fluctuated upward to K3.73 million per tical in the grey market. The gap between the YGEA's reference price and the unauthorized market's rate widened to over K520,000 per tical.

The YGEA switched to the interbank transaction rate in calculating the reference price for pure gold. The US dollar is currently exchanged at approximately K3,530 at the over-thecounter market.

The US dollar exchange rate influences the domestic gold market value gap and YGEA's reference gold price.

When the dollar exchange rate surged to K4,000, the gold price peaked at K4 million per tical in late August 2023. — NN/EM

Myanmar primarily exports black grams, green grams and pigeon peas to foreign markets. Black grams and pigeon peas are mainly shipped to India, while green grams are exported to China and Europe.

Myanmar's various pulses export earnings were estimated at over US\$884 million from 1,046,000 tonnes in the nearly eight months of the current financial year 2023-2024 beginning 1 April. Myanmar's pulses exports bagged over US\$1.47 billion from over 1.9 million tonnes in the previous FY 2022-2023, the Ministry of Commerce's statistics indicated. — NN/EM

### Kyat weakens to over K3,500 against US dollar

KYAT depreciated to over December. K3,500 against the greenback at the over-the-counter market.

The Kyat-dollar exchange rate was only K3,380 on 1 December, and the rate surged to K3,550 on 6 December in the forex market.

### Preserve the cultural legacy of ancient religious monuments in Bagan

AGAN is the heart of all Myanmar people regardless of religion, race, political doctrine, age, gender and so on, as Bagan is full of cultural heritage, attracting travellers at home and abroad. As such, all nationalities are responsible for the preservation of ancient cultural heritage in Bagan.

The Bagan cultural heritage site stands as a collective treasure, encompassing 3,837 ancient structures that hold immense value for the entire nation. However, from 2010 to 2020, this revered site faced the wrath of earthquakes on 22 occasions, resulting in damage to 389 religious monuments.

A concerted effort has been underway to safeguard this historical site, with notable progress achieved during the initial phase. While a total of 388 stupas and temples, excluding the Thabyatnyu Stupa, have been successfully maintained, urgent renovations to the Thabyinnyu Stupa were completed with the assistance of Chinese experts.

Recognizing the perpetual threat of natural disasters, the government has issued directives to officials, emphasizing the systematic preservation of ancient works within the cultural heritage of Myanmar, particularly in the Bagan Ancient Cultural Zone. This proactive approach seeks to shield these invaluable structures from the year-round impacts of natural calamities, ensuring that future generations continue to marvel at the historical significance encapsulated within Bagan's ancient

religious monuments.

Ground inspections revealed that an additional 110 religious edifices require renovation, and quick action has been taken to address the impact of adverse weather conditions. In a short span, 41 more ancient buildings and 119 damaged structures have undergone renovation, underscoring the commitment to preserving the cultural heritage of Bagan.

To fortify the site against the challenges posed by heavy rains, meticulous land preparations have been carried out. A well-designed drainage system ensures the proper flow of water, enhancing the site's resilience. Furthermore, in a bid to mitigate the danger of lightning strikes in the raining season, 11 religious buildings in the region will be equipped with lightning conductors, further securing these invaluable structures.

International collaboration plays a pivotal role in preservation efforts. The Chinese government, in partner-

ship with its Myanmar counterpart, has committed to a nine-year plan for the renovation of the Thatbyinnyu Stupas. Simultaneously, the Archaeological Survey of India (ASI) is actively implementing a ten-year plan, spanning from 2018 to 2028, aimed at renovating 92 ancient religious monuments. These collaborative initiatives underscore the global importance attached to conserving the rich cultural heritage of Bagan.

Recognizing the perpetual threat of natural disasters, the government has issued directives to officials, emphasizing the systematic preservation of ancient works within the cultural heritage of Myanmar, particularly in the Bagan Ancient Cultural Zone. - Nearly 30 per cent of all oil and gas production comes from offshore drilling, which generates greenhouse gas emissions throughout the entire process that contribute to global warming.
- Trees absorb and store carbon dioxide. If forests are cleared or even disturbed, they release carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases. Forest loss or damage is the cause of around 10 per cent of global warming. There's simply no way to fight the climate crisis if we don't stop deforestation
- 7. Franking contributes to the worst kind of climate change at the top of the list. Climate instability is a threat to millions of lives across our planet, and we simply can't let the fossil fuel industry push for more franking. Many people really know what franking is. ## Montreal research hub spearheads global AI ethics debate

Professor warns of the rapid pace of AI developments, posing a risk of creating a new species capable of making decisions that could potentially harm humans.

artificial intelligence and recent turmoil at industry powerhouse OpenAI — have brought fresh attention to a key hub of ethics research related to the technology in Montreal, led by Canadian "godfather of AI" Yoshua Ben-

Bengio — who in 2018 shared with Geoffrey Hinton and Yann LeCun the Turing Award for their work on deep learning — says he is worried about the technology leapfrogging human intelligence and capabilities in the not-too-distant future.

Speaking to AFP at his home in Montreal, the professor warned that AI developments are moving at breakneck speed and risked "creating a new species capable of making decisions that harm or even endanger humans.'

OpenAI's recent dismissal and then rehiring a few days later of chief executive Sam Altman - who has been accused of downplaying risks in his push to advance its ChatGPT bot illustrates some of the turmoil in the startup sector and fierce competition in the race to commercialize generative AI.

For some time, Bengio has con Valley giant's AI subsidiary been warning about companies moving too fast without guardrails, "potentially at the public's

It is essential, he said, to have "rules that'll be followed by all companies".

At a world-first AI summit in Britain in early November, Bengio was tasked with leading a team producing an inaugural report on AI safety.

The aim is to set priorities to inform future work on the security of the cutting-edge technology.

#### **Society and AI**

The renowned AI academic has brought together a "critical mass of AI researchers" (1.000+) through his Mila research institute, located in a former working-class neighbourhood of Montreal.

His neighbours include AI research facilities of American tech giants Microsoft, Meta, IBM and Google.

"This concentration of experts in artificial intelligence, which is greater than anywhere else in the world," is what attracted Google, says Hugo Larochelle, the hoodie-wearing scientific director of the Sili-

Deepmind.

Early on, these researchers began thinking about the future of AI, and consultations with the public and researchers from all disciplines led in 2018 to a global AI charter called the Montreal Declaration for a Responsible Development of Artificial Intelligence.


"We knew early on that the scientific community needed to think about the integration of AI into society," explained Guillaume Macaux, vice-president of OBVIA, an international observatory studying the social impacts of AI.

Its 220 researchers advise government policies and raise public awareness of the possible positive effects and negative impacts of this cutting-edge technology.

## Europe, China should boost trade relations, says ESM managing director

THE managing director of the eurozone bailout fund, the European Stability Mechanism (ESM), told Xinhua on Monday he was positive about the outlook for China's economy in 2024 and that an increase in trade between China and Europe will have a positive impact on global growth.

"We are at a time when it's important to try to do everything to strengthen bilateral relations between China and the European Union, and in particular, with the European Stability Mechanism," Pierre Gramegna said in an online interview. Last month was the first time he visited Beijing since 2019.

"We had very fruitful meetings with the Ministry of Finance, the People's Bank of China, and Chinese investors in our ESM bonds. We also had a meeting with Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB) President Jin Liqun."

The ESM is the permanent crisis resolution mechanism for the countries of the eurozone. Like its predecessor, the temporary European Financial Stability Facility (EFSF), it provides financial assistance to eurozone member states experiencing or threatened by financing difficulties. — Xinhua

### EU approves ban on destruction of unsold clothing

THE European parliament and EU member states announced on Tuesday (5 December) new rules to crack down on fast fashion and reduce waste, including a ban on destroying unsold clothes.

The new rules, first proposed by the European Commission last year, impose tougher rules on products to ensure they last longer and are easier to repair and recycle.

The law bans the destruction of unsold textiles and footwear, and will apply two years after the law enters into force. Medium-size companies will have a six-year exemption, while smaller companies are wholly exempt from the ban.

The commission, the EU's executive arm, will also have the power to extend the ban to other unsold products beyond clothing and footwear.

"It is time to end the model of 'take, make, dispose' that is so harmful to our planet, our health and our economy," said MEP Alessandra Moretti who spearheaded the legislation through parliament. "New products will be designed in a way that benefits all, respects our planet and protects the environment," she added. — AFP

EQUITIES rose Wednesday after a tepid start to the week

as data pointing to a softening US labour market restoked hopes the Federal Reserve will cut interest rates in the new year.

The below-forecast job openings figure bolstered optimism ahead of the closely watched non-farm payrolls report due Friday, which investors hope will confirm the economic slowdown sought by the central bank.

Markets rallied in November on growing hope that with inflation continuing to fall and other parts of the economy easing, the Fed will be able to slash rates in 2024, with some suggesting as soon as the first quarter. — AFP

### High speed rail between LA and Las Vegas gets \$3 bln boost

PROPOSED high-speed rail lines in the western United States moved a step closer to reality Tuesday with the announcement of \$6 billion in government grants.

The cash will come from President Joe Biden's signature infrastructure bill aimed at revamping the country's creaking railways, roads and bridges, and is part of a plan to double the number of people taking the train by 2040.

Half of the cash will go towards the construction of a highspeed line spanning 218 miles (350 kilometres) between Las Vegas and downtown Los Angeles, slashing the current five-hour car journey time to two-hours and 40 minutes.

The rest will be used to support a long-touted line linking Los Angeles with San Francisco.

While high-speed rail is the norm in much of Europe and Asia, particularly in China and Japan, the United States has long lagged behind.

But there has been a renewed emphasis on projects like this as the United States hurries to overhaul its polluting transport sector and make it more environmentally friendly and give them an alternative to gas-guzzling cars. — AFP

# German travel group TUI books record year for sales

TUI, the world's largest tourism operator, reported record sales in its 2023 summer season, indicating confidence for the upcoming year. The German group recorded a net profit of €305.8 million (\$330 million) in its last financial year.

THE world's largest tourism operator TUI said Wednesday it had seen record sales on the back of a strong 2023 summer season and signalled confidence for the coming year.

The German group booked a net profit of 305.8 million euros (\$330 million) in its last financial year, which ran from October 2022 to September 2023, TUI said in a statement.

The figure was more or less on a par with

its results before the spread of the coronavi-

rus pandemic in 2020, when heavy restrictions on international travel weighed heavily on the economy and especially the tourism sector.

The return to form came on the back of record sales totalling 20.7 billion euros, a 25-percent increase on the previous year.

TUI, which offers everything from hotel stays to cruises and charter flights, welcomed 19.1 million guests over the course of the year, up from 16.7 million the previous year. — AFP

### US antitrust regulators probe ExxonMobil's Pioneer deal

US antitrust officials are seeking additional information related to ExxonMobil's megadeal to acquire Pioneer Natural Resources for about \$60 billion, according to a securities filing Tuesday.

The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) lodged a second request for "additional information and documentary materials" with both companies on Monday, Pioneer said in the filing.

"Pioneer and Exxon-Mobil continue to work constructively with the FTC in its review of the merger and continue to expect that the merger will be completed in the first half of 2024, subject to the fulfillment of the closing conditions, including receipt of required regulatory approvals and approval of Pioneer's stockholders", the filing said. — AFP

# German electric car sales plunge in November

SALES of new cars fell in Germany in November, official data showed Tuesday, dragged down by plummeting demand for electric vehicles as government incentives ran out.

A total of 245,701 new cars hit the road in Europe's largest economy last month, a drop of 5.7 per cent on a year earlier, according to the KBA federal transport authority.

The setback was driven by a 22-per-cent plunge in sales of battery-powered electric cars, to just under 45,000 vehicles in November.

Customers had raced to buy electric cars late last year to take advantage of government incentives before they were phased out, and demand has declined sharply since

Uncertainty about whether there would be new subsidy schemes risked placing Germany's target of putting 15 million electric vehicles on its roads by 2030 even further out of reach, said EY analyst Constantin Gall. — AFP

## UNESCO to list ceviche, opera as 'intangible heritage'

UNESCO is considering various global traditions for recognition as intangible cultural heritage, including Italian opera, Bangladeshi rickshaw art, and the Peruvian dish ceviche.

DOZENS of global traditions are candidates for inscription as intangible global heritage by UNESCO this week, ranging from Italian opera singing and Bangladeshi rickshaw art to the Peruvian delicacy of ceviche.

The UN cultural agency's Intangible Cultural Heritage Committee is expected to examine and approve 55 nominations in total as it meets in the town of Kasane in Botswana.

These include a bid from Italy to include opera singing, an art "transmitted only orally" between maestro and pupil that attracts many students from abroad.

Bangladesh is hoping to inscribe the art of painting the

three-wheeled rickshaws that ply its capital's streets, contributing to a "roving exhibition of paintings" that is an "emblematic feature of urban life in Dhaka".

Peru has put forth the "preparation and consumption of ceviche", a traditional dish of raw fish marinated in lemon and seasoned with chilli, pepper and salt, for which the recipe is "inherited from generation to generation".

Azerbaijan, Iran, Uzbekistan and Türkiye are together pushing for iftar, the meal shared by Muslims at the end of a day of fasting during the month of Ramadan, and its traditions to be recognized.

Other applicants include the "traditional skills of loincloth

weaving" in Ivory Coast, as well as bolero — "identity, emotion and poetry turned into song" from Cuba and Mexico.

The UNESCO Convention for the Safeguarding of the Intangible Cultural Heritage and its list were adopted in 2003, then ratified by 30 member states in 2006. In the beginning, there was initial reluctance from some countries who feared certain states would seek to hog shared traditions for themselves, UNESCO Assistant Director-General for Culture Ernesto Ottone said.

But two decades on, 181 countries are signatories, and many have instead put forward joint petitions for traditions they share. — AFP

### Indonesia rescuers find last missing hiker on volcano, toll rises to 23

THE last hiker missing after a volcano eruption in Indonesia was found dead Wednesday, rescuers said, raising the death toll to 23 three days after the disaster.

Mount Marapi on the island of Sumatra in Indonesia's west spewed an ash tower 3,000 metres (9,800 feet) — taller than the volcano itself — into the sky on Sunday as 75 people hiked in the area.

Hundreds of rescuers have worked tirelessly to find the

missing hikers, who have been carried down the mountain in bodybags in an arduous search effort hampered by further eruptions and bad weather that sometimes forced workers to

"The joint search and rescue team has found one victim of the Mount Marapi eruption, who is now in the process of being evacuated," Abdul Malik, head of the Padang Search and Rescue Agency, told reporters on Wednesday evening.—AFP

# US facing growing Middle East crisis tied to Israel-Hamas war

Feltman expressed concern that incremental escalation could unintentionally lead to a regional conflagration.

WASHINGTON is facing an increasingly complex and dangerous crisis resulting from the Israel-Hamas war, which has sparked repeated militant attacks and drawn US military attention and assets back to the Middle East.

The United States has deployed two aircraft carriers and other forces in a bid to deter a devastating region-wide conflict. But the current violence in the Middle East — while not rising to that level — still carries significant danger.

Iran-backed Huthi rebels in Yemen raised the stakes over the weekend by striking commercial vessels in the Red Sea, while a US Navy destroyer shot down several inbound drones as it operated in the area and responded to distress calls.

"Without question there's been escalation," but all parties, especially the United States, "are trying to manage

these clashes in ways that do not explode into a regional war," said Jeffrey Feltman, a visiting fellow at the Brookings Institution and former US assistant secretary of state for near eastern affairs. However, "I think we should be deeply, deeply worried that step-by-step escalation, while perhaps no party intends it to turn into a regional conflagration, could lead us there," he said. — AFP

New sliding track in Cortina for 2026 Olympics back on table

Milan-Cortina chief Giovanni Malago stated that the Italian government has ordered the relocation of bobsleigh, luge, and skeleton competitions due to rising costs.

ITALIAN deputy prime minister Matteo Salvini has insisted a new track for sliding events at the 2026 Milan-Cortina Olympics could be built at Cortina d'Ampezzo, despite the plans previously being shelved.

Milan-Cortina chief Giovanni Malago told an International Olympic Committee Session in Mumbai in October his organization had been effectively ordered by the Italian government to move the bobsleigh, luge and skeleton competitions due to spiralling costs.

Malago had said the events would likely be held outside Italy.

But Salvini, also transport minister, told a steering committee for the 2026 Games on Tuesday evening that a new proposal for a track at Cortina could be made.

"The ministry of transport will develop a proposal that will not cost Italians a cent more," the ministry said at the end of the meeting.

"The aim is to present a project to decision makers as soon as possible."

## Newcastle 'keeper Pope out for 'around four months' with injury

NEWCASTLE goalkeeper Nick Pope will be sidelined for "around four months" with a shoulder injury, manager Eddie Howe said on Wednesday as his list of absentees continued

England's Pope, who needed surgery on his same left shoulder in 2018 while a Burnley player, suffered a dislocation when diving during last weekend's 1-0 Premier League victory over Manchester United.

He joins Newcastle's lengthy injury list which has left Howe making very few substitutions in recent matches, with several youth-team players on the bench.

"There's no doubt he needs an operation so he will be out for a period of time, we think around four months," Howe told a press conference ahead of Thursday's league game at Everton.

"It's the same shoulder (as 2018 injury) but a different part of the shoulder. There was no

reason for that happening."

Media reports have linked Newcastle with both out-offavour Arsenal 'keeper Aaron Ramsdale and former Man United number one David de Gea, who is a free agent.

But Howe was keen to play down speculation of signing a short-term replacement in January. "I've seen a lot of the media headlines and press spec-

ulation regarding goalkeepers and other players," said Howe.

"We've not made any enquiries or decisions regarding our recruitment leading into January and I have said many times that is because if we were to recruit now we would probably be recruiting in every position on the pitch because we have injuries everywhere throughout the squad. — AFP

### US returns \$8 mln of stolen treasures to Türkiye

UNITED States authorities have returned \$8 million of stolen antiquities – some of which were plundered as far back as the 1960s - to Türkiye, a prosecutor said on Tuesday.

Among the 41 pieces returned were two Heads of the Roman emperor Caracalla and the Bust of a Lady which were trafficked from Bubon, a Roman-era site in southwest Türkiye which was extensively looted in the 1960s.

"During my administration we have returned 90 antiquities to Turkiye, valued at more than \$60 million," said Manhattan district attorney Alvin Bragg, announcing the returns.

The pieces were returned at a ceremony attended by Türkiye's Deputy Culture Minister Gokhan Yazgi.

"Together I believe we can put an end to the blows dealt to the identity and history of nations," he said. – AFP

# Putin arrives in Abu Dhabi for talks with UAE President

Russian President Putin visits UAE to discuss bilateral, regional, and international affairs with President Al Nahyan, focusing on Gaza conflict, Middle East crises, and progress of Russia's military operation in Ukraine.

PUTNIK is live as Russian President Vladimir Putin arrives in the United Arab Emirates to meet with UAE President Mohammed bin Zayed Al Nahyan and discuss bilateral, regional, and international affairs.

The talks will cover the ongoing conflict in the Gaza Strip and other crises in the Middle East, including Syria, Yemen, and Sudan. The progress of Russia's special military operation in Ukraine is also expected to be on the agenda.

Both Gulf monarchies have received an invitation to join BRICS this year, and their accession during Russia's upcoming chairmanship in the organization is also expected to be discussed. With Saudi Arabia's leader, Putin will discuss energy cooperation within the OPEC+ format.

Russian President Vladimir Putin has not travelled to the Middle East since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic — the last time he was in the region was in 2019, when he also visited the United Arab Emirates and Saudi Arabia. - SPUTNIK

### Southeast Asia banks on aviation boom

MAJOR airport expansion projects are taking off across Thailand, Cambodia and Viet Nam, and a new airline is set to launch next year — all banking on an expected boom in air travel in Southeast Asia, fuelled by Chinese and Indian tourists. Thailand's Really Cool Airlines is expected to start flying between Bangkok and Japan around mid-2024, but CEO Patee Sarasin — a veteran of the region's cutthroat budget sector — says it has been a battle to launch a new carrier just after a pandemic.

Patee ran budget carrier Nok Air for more than a decade, but while he is coy about the finer details of the new venture, he claims it may yet "change the aviation paradigm". He added: "Southeast

Asia is going to be probably one of the centres of the universe in the future, with the slowdown in Europe, and in the US".

Flying took a hammering globally during the pandemic as international travel all but shut down, but the industry is bullish about its bounceback, evidenced by a flurry of big-ticket orders at this month's Dubai Air Show and bumper profit jumps for the likes of Air France-KLM and Ryanair. **Airport boom** 

Southeast Asia is becoming a hot property, with private and public players competing for an expanding market.

The region currently accounts for 10 per cent of global traffic — more than 500 million passengers in 2019. — AFP
