Diplomats have to enhance political, economic and cultural exchanges in assigned countries



State Administration Council Chairman Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing addresses the meeting with ambassadors and chargés d'affaires ad interim who serve diplomatic duties abroad yesterday in Nay Pyi Taw.

ENIOR General Min Aung Hlaing said diplomats have to effectively utilize their endeavours in relevant arenas to enhance political, economic and cultural exchanges in assigned countries.

Yesterday morning, Chairman of the State Administration Council Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing explained the necessary measures to ambassadors and chargés d'affaires ad interim serving duties abroad at the SAC Chairman Office in Nay Pyi Taw.

At the meeting, the Senior General clarified terror acts of CRPH, NUG and PDF terrorist groups, terror acts of PDF terrorists in some townships of the nation

in 2023, acts of some ethnic armed organizations to give terrorist training, sell arms and ammunition and blow up bridges and roads together with PDF terrorists while killing innocent people with different attitudes, cooperation between Tatmadaw and Myanmar Police Force and people in launching counter-terrorism operations in some areas of EAOs, eradication of online gambling and scams in which some EAOs are involved.

Speaking on the occasion, the Senior General noted diplomats serving duty abroad are responsible for implementing the State's independent and active non-aligned foreign policy. It is necessary to monitor neighbouring and global countries' situations while successfully implementing Myanmar's policies. They have to disseminate past correct incidents and present actual Myanmar situations to the international community in their respective countries. Depending on experiences, those diplomats have to take appropriate measures for the interests of the nation, he noted.

He pointed out that service personnel can cast votes for their favourite parties, but it must not affect their duties, thoroughly understanding party politics and serving the State's duties. Ambassadors, chargés d'affaires ad interim, and staff members have to realize that they are serving the State, not the government.

The Senior General underscored that diplomats must effectively utilize their endeavours in relevant arenas to enhance political, economic and cultural exchanges. Personal and working fraternities can contribute to success in their duties. Those diplomats have to serve their duties with loyalty to the State and the national spirit. They have to emphasize boosting the economy of the State and citizens, he added.

Salient points from the speech made by the Senior General at the meeting with diplomats: -

- Diplomats have to effectively utilize their endeavours in relevant arenas in order to enhance political, economic and cultural exchanges.
- They have to disseminate past correct incidents and present actual situations of Myanmar to the international community in respective countries.
- An appropriate number of individuals within the designated age range will be recruited to minimize the burden on the State.
- Necessary number of war veterans will be recruited to assign duties to them.
- Myanmar is ready to accept those who arrived in Bangladesh if those persons are in line with the designated issues.



Myanmar, Brazil discuss collaboration in technology, sports and culture

THE Ministry of Foreign Affairs announced that on 12 February, Myanmar and Brazil discussed closer collaboration in technology, sports, and culture.

in bilateral trade, investment, health, agriculture, sports and culture, renewable energy, natural environment conservation, climate change, and the enhancement of mutual understanding not only between the peoples but also between the governments of the two countries. — ASH/TMT

He stressed that as Myanmar citizens abroad are also Myanmar people, diplomats have to solve their difficulties as much as possible. The government allows entitlements and allowances for Myanmar diplomats abroad. So, they can submit their difficulties in their respective assigned countries.

He continued that ambassadors and chargés d'affaires ad interim must submit their efforts for education promotion and encouragement in their assigned countries, and they have to take examples from respective countries that are appropriate for Myanmar. As such, they need to participate in the country's education promotion sector.

The Senior General noted that the People's Military Service Law and the Reserve Forces Act had been issued due to the nation's conditions. As all citizens are responsible for defending the country, the People's Military Service Law was issued in the past. It is indispensable to safeguard Our Three Main National Causes. In compliance with the law, all relevant measures will be carefully considered. An appropriate number of individuals within the designated age range will be recruited to minimize the burden on the State. Under the Reserve Forces Act, war veterans will not be enlisted; only the necessary number will be recruited to fulfil assigned duties. As such, ambassadors and chargés d'affaires ad interim have to clarify matters related to these laws in their assigned countries.

Deputy Prime Minister and Union Minister for Foreign Affairs U Than Swe reported on the implementation of the State's foreign policies and diplomatic relations with the international community.

They also discussed the enhancement of bilateral relations with relevant countries, the attitudes of these countries towards Myanmar, and other diplomatic measures.

In his speech, the Senior General said that the State Administration Council is striving to successfully hold a multiparty democratic general election as its ultimate mission in order to hand over the State responsibilities to the elected party. As such, he stressed the need to hold a prestigious election and to convene a prestigious Hluttaw. If so, the election will be reputable, and Hluttaws will have a check and balance system taking a lesson from voting fraud in the 2020 general election.

He highlighted that Myanmar is ready to accept those who arrived in Bangladesh if those persons are in line with the designated issues. So, efforts will be made to ease the problems in accord with the agreements of both countries.

To implement Our Three Main National Causes, the government conducts measures on armed conflicts and different opinions under the law. As the instigation of media may cause the disintegration of the unity of the Union, diplomats have to manage the international community to know the nation's actual situation.

The Senior General urged diplomats to look after scholar-ship students in their respective countries while solving the problems of scholarship students and those who arrive abroad for various reasons. They must manage a smooth international relations and cooperation process to contribute to the motherland properly.

Also present at the meeting were SAC Joint Secretary Lt-Gen Ye Win Oo, Union Minister at the SAC Chairman Office Ministry No 1 U Ko Ko Hlaing and advisers to the SAC Chairman. — MNA/TTA

UEC meets registered political parties

THE meeting of the Union Election Commission and the political parties that have been approved for registration was held yesterday afternoon at the meeting hall of the Union Election Commission office.

Union Election Commission Chairman U Ko Ko and officials from 43 political parties attended the meeting.

At the ceremony, UEC Chair U Ko Ko said that he would spare no effort with the political parties to hold the next election successfully.

He said that in accordance with the amended and enacted Political Parties Registration Law, the commission is preparing the rules for the registration of political parties and publishing them

If there are any requirements for opening party offices, the commission coordinates with relevant ministries and region/

state governments. The collection, maintenance, and use of political parties' funds should also be appropriately documented. Section 17 (b) of the Political Parties Registration Law stipulates that party funds shall be used following the order or instruc-

tions issued by the commission. According to this provision, the commission will release the necessary instructions as soon as possible, and the parties must use them as per the instructions. The election will be successful only if the commission, political parties

and the voters work together.

The commission must supervise the political parties under the laws and regulations enacted by the commission and assist the political parties' needs under the law. For all those who have the right to vote, officials must co-

ordinate and cooperate with the relevant ministries to ensure that the voter list is complete and correct, and voter education activities must also be coordinated with the appropriate organizations.

For the parties to be strong and for the voters to vote for their party and their parliamentary candidates, it is necessary to conduct a proper election campaign. To get the correct voting choice of the voters, people must choose only those who are really qualified to choose the candidates who will compete in parliament.

He added that the commission will supervise the election according to the laws and regulations enacted to ensure free and fair elections.

Afterwards, the persons responsible for the event had discussions, and the UEC Chair clarified and gave a closing speech to conclude the meeting. — MNA/KZL

First, the Union minister said that AI is used in different fields today, and developed countries have introduced driverless cars, drones and domestic robots. AI technology can provide innovative services to understand emotions and cognition processes in the human community. Therefore, the seminar intends to share the usefulness and risks of AI.

He continued that AI replaces the human workforce, whereas the demand for professionals with expertise in AI is on the rise. Moreover, online search engines, entertainment and trading use AI in this digitalization era. The

AI can replace both the physical activities and human intelligence.

Therefore, the Foundation Course for Public Opinion Mining Analysis (AI) was conducted for the officers and staff of the Media Development Department to conduct data analysis on human resource development, misinformation and news flow. A total of 12 trainees sat for the placement test, and eight who passed the test were trained under a threemonth online course.

He then urged the staff to promote HR according to the technology trend and apply the knowledge gained at the seminar for the department.

YGEA chair urges trust in official gold price announcements amid online misinformation

FALSE news about gold prices has been circulating online. Therefore, people should only believe official announcements, said Yangon Region Gold Entrepreneurs Association Chairman U Myo Myint.

He was responding to news that an internet user wrote a post on a social media Facebook group that the gold price had risen to K4 million, which drew some attention on 13 February.

"We have made daily announcements on the official prices as well as on the digital platform UAB Pay and CB's One Pay by connecting with banks," said U Myo Myint. He urged the public not to fall for such false news.

"Respective government departments have been dealing with the spread of rumours. We are just making sure that the public should only believe official announcements, but the departments are dealing with the management," he said.

Myanmar aims to export over 5,000 tonnes of raw salt to ROK next FY 2024-2025

MYANMAR will ship over 5,000 tonnes of raw salt to the Republic of Korea in the 2024-2025 financial year.

Myanmar's raw salt fetches a good price in the ROK. Currently, salt produced from Mon State is exported to external markets, according to Mon State's Salt Farmers Association.

A container loaded with 20 tonnes of salt was sent to the ROK on a trial basis in September 2023. The experts from South Korea have already visited the salt ponds and salt processing businesses. South Korea and

Japan proposed to purchase Myanmar's raw salt.

Myanmar's salt production is estimated at over 400,000 tonnes. Mon State, Rakhine State and Ayeyawady Region are the leading producing areas in Myanmar. Myanmar also exported a container carrying 20 tonnes to Japan in August 2023 on a trial basis. Then, Japanese trade partners ordered about 30 containers (600 tonnes of raw salt) during the salt farming season in December 2023.

Mon State is the second-highest salt-producing state

in the country, with over 4,500 acres. The salt output in Mon State exceeds 50,000 tonnes per

The locally produced salt is widely and primarily distributed in the domestic market. Foreign demand like that might

have an impact on the salt price. Myanmar's salt will become a worldwide commercially valued product. — TWA/KK

CBM sells US\$5.38M into forex market in Feb

THE Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) announced the sale of an additional US\$5.38 million into the foreign currency market on 14 February.

This latest transaction brings the total amount of dollars sold in February to \$24.38 million, as reported.

Moreover, alongside the

sale of \$5.38 million, CBM has also sold 313.5 million Thai baht and 4 million Chinese yuan in the foreign currency market during February. — TWA/TKO

Myanmar's mineral exports generate over US\$230 mln in 10 months

MYANMAR earned over US\$233.197 million from exporting mineral products during the ten months from April 2023 to 2 February 2024, as reported by the Ministry of Commerce.

In the previous year, mineral product exports had generated \$289.257 million during a similar timeframe. Consequently, the current figure represents a decline of \$56 million compared to the previous year. Within this financial year, approximately \$200 million was generated from the private sector, while the State-owned industry contributed around \$32 million.

According to the Department of Trade under the Ministry of Commerce, most of the \$233.197 million earned in the ten months of this fi-

nancial year resulted from the export of minerals and ores, followed closely by the export of jade. The exported minerals include jade, diamond, gold, pearl, lead, tin, tungsten, copper, silver, coal, and zinc. — TWA/ TMT

18 accidents on Yangon-Mandalay Expressway in January

ACCORDING to the office of the expressway police commander, a total of 18 traffic accidents occurred on the Yangon-Mandalay Expressway in January, resulting in 15 fatalities and 37 injuries.

These accidents were attributed to various causes, including speeding, reckless driving, driver fatigue, negligence of pedestrians, negligence of motorcycle riders, and tyre punctures. The

total loss amounted to K50 million. Measures are implemented to penalize vehicles exceeding the Yangon-Mandalay Expressway's speed limit.

From January to December 2023, there were a total of 163 crashes, resulting in 326 injuries and 86 fatalities. Additionally, action was taken against over 13,000 vehicles for speeding during this period. — TWA/MKKS

Myanmar rice body to introduce subsidy programme across Yangon Region on 16 Feb

MYANMAR Rice and Paddy Traders Association will roll out rice sales at affordable prices in Yangon Region starting 16 February, covering 18 townships.

Under the guidance of the Myanmar Rice Federation, the association will sell Aemahta rice at K3,300 per pyi (2.13 kg or 4.69 lb) on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays through 58 member retailers in 18 townships in the region, the notification stated.

This rice subsidy scheme will include 18 townships: Hlaing-thaya, Shwepyitha, Dagon Myothit (South), North Okkalapa, Dagon Myothit (North), Dagon Seikkan, Dagon Myothit (East), Hmawbi, Thingangyun, Thakayta, Pazundaung, Dawbon, Dala, Kyimyindine, Ahlon, Seikkyi Khanaungto, Mingaladon and Insein.

At present, rice prices are surging. The non-premium rice moved between K72,000 and K84,000 per sack depending on varieties (Aemahta, rice grown under the intercropping system). Premium Pawsan wholesale prices are K100,000-K135,000 per sack depending on producing

areas (Myaungmya, Pyapon and Shwebo) on 14 February, as per the association.

Next, the reasonable market prices set for January are K70,000-K72,000 per 108-pound sack of Aemahta rice (25 per cent broken), K72,000-K75,000 for Aemahta rice (15 per cent broken), K75,000-K78,000 for Aemahta (10-5 per cent bro-

ken), K80,000-K85,000 for 90-day short matured rice, Pakan, Anyatha, special Aemahta rice varieties (5-10 per cent broken), K95,000-K100,000 for Ayamin, Ayeya Padaytha, Ayamin (5-10 percent broken), K100,000-K110,000 for Ayeyawady Pawsan rice and K90,000-K100,0000 for normal Shwebo Pawsan, K110,000-K115,000 for Ayeyawady

Kyapyan (5-10 percent broken) and K125,000-K135,000 for premium Shwebo Pawsan (5-10 percent broken).

The federation determined reasonable market prices by considering the following factors: fair profit for the farmers, millers and distributors, reasonable prices for consumers, last year's market price, global market prices and other commodities prices. Yet, the market price is way higher than the reasonable prices. Therefore, the federation rigorously reflected on high market rates.

Consequently, MRF encouraged the affiliated associations, members of commodity depots, exporters and rice companies to follow the price.

Nonetheless, according to the MRF, the price difference is five to ten per cent between the retail and wholesale markets and 10-20 per cent for modern trade with consumer packaging at mini-marts. MRF stated that those reasonable market prices only influence the new monsoon paddy produced this year.

MRF urged the buyers to contact the MRF and the relevant wholesale centres to have a smooth trade.

The federation notified on 21 September paddy reference price for 2023 monsoon paddy and called for its affiliated companies, millers and traders to buy it at a reasonable market price during the monsoon paddy harvest season. — NN/EM

YGEA sets pure gold price lower to K3.58 mln on weak global trend

WITH the spot gold price dip below US\$2,000 per ounce, the Yangon Region Gold Entrepreneurs Association (YGEA) accordingly lowered the gold reference price to K3.587 million per tical (0.578 ounce or 0.016 kilogramme).

Pure gold market price hit K3.87 million per tical in the grey market. There is a large gap of over K280,000 per tical between the YGEA's reference price and the unofficial market's rate.

The YGEA switched to the Central Bank of Myanmar's exchange rate for interbank transactions in calculating the reference price for pure gold.

Last 5 December, the CBM allowed authorized dealers (private banks) to operate forex exchanges freely as per the market rate determined by the supply and demand market forces.

Additionally, the CBM notified that outward remittance must comply with the rules and regulations of the Foreign Exchange Management Committee.

The dollar gained to around K3,540 on 19 August 2023.

Along with the US dollar gain and record high gold price in August 2023, the domestic gold price hit K4 million per tical, and the Kyat-dollar exchange rate hit K4,000. — NN/KK


Sino-Myanmar border trade surges in past ten months

THE border trade value between Myanmar and China surpassed US\$2.839 billion in the past ten months (April-January) of the current financial year 2023-2024, rising from \$2.42 billion recorded in the year-ago period, the Ministry of Commerce's statistics showed.

The figures reflected a remarkable increase of \$412.146 million this FY compared to last FY.

Myanmar conducts cross-border trade with neighbouring China via Muse, Lweje, Chinshwehaw, Kampaiti, and Kengtung. The Muse border saw the highest trade figure of \$1.836 billion.

The trade values stood at \$703.066 million via Chinshwehaw, \$36.266 million via Kampai-

ti, \$98.566 million via Lweje, and \$64.435 million via Kengtung.

Myanmar has been conducting border trade with the four neighbouring countries: China, Thailand, Bangladesh and India.

Export items are agricultural produce, livestock products,

fisheries products, minerals, forest products, manufacturing goods and other goods. In contrast, capital goods, intermediate goods, manufacturing goods and raw materials by CMP enterprises are imported. — NN/EM

 ORMAN Rockwell created some of the most iconic images of 20th-century America. His paintings, such as the "Four Freedoms series from World War II" and "The Problem We all Live with from the Civil Rights Movements, were intended to evoke the best in people who saw them: hope, solidarity, courage, justice. Besides, they intended to get peace, love and joy. Moreover, they intended to live without worry. Much of his work also inspired happiness, capturing scenes of light-hearted joy. His work helps him gain confidence

And yet Rockwell himself struggled with happiness. In 1953, he moved to a small, rural town, not for its natural beauty and peace but because it was home to a psychiatric hospital where he and his wife could receive treatment for chronic depression. There, he was a patient of a famous psychoanalyst, with whom Rockwell racked up large bills.

That a man with such significant happiness problems would be known for painting images of undeniable happiness might seen as iconic. In truth, it's not strange at all. Research shows that you can bring joy to others even if you're unhappy and that doing so is a reliable feeling, at least for a while.

way to improve your well-being. So, you try to get away for happy. Think out the happiness things several times. Don't think about unhappiness matters.

The key is to act like a happy person, even if you don't feel like it. In 2020, researchers at the University of California at Riverside asked people to behave in either extroverted or introverted ways

Those who purposely acted extroverted, which decades of research have shown is one of the most common characteristics of happy people, saw a significant increase in well-being. Meanwhile, acting introverted led to a decrease. So, try to be happy people.

Similarly, spending money on others and volunteering have been shown to raise one's own happiness levels. Singing songs is one of the ways to get happiness.

One plausible explanation is that prosocial behaviours induce cognitive dissonance. I feel unhappy, but I am acting unhappy – which people resolve subconsciously by feeling happier. Psychologist Richard Wiseman calls this the "As If Principle": if you want to feel a certain way, act as if you already do, and your brain will grant that

This is not a substitute for traditional medical treatment for

depression, of course. Rockwell was in formal therapy most of his adult life. But his happy paintings were clearly part of his treatment. Rockwell's biographer, Deborah Solomon, states, "He was painting his longing". Playing sports and other games also brings happiness. happiness naturally - and give the Even if not literally, you can use the Rockwell formula to bring joy to yourself and the people around

you when you are down. First, think about what happy people in your situation would do to improve things for themselves and others. How would they greet someone on the first call of the day? How would they call just to check in? If

you are stuck, ask happy people you

know about what they do for others. Next, make a plan to follow through on everything you just imagined. Write three ideas for extra-king greetings on some note pa-

per and consult them before making a phone call. Draft a sample email in the voice of a happy person and use it as a template.

By deliberately preparing yourself to cheer up the people around you the way a happy person would, vou'll create the conditions by which you can produce your own gift of joy to others as well. You will eventually produce your own happiness by behaving like a happy person. Moreover, you will get happiness by watching humourous films and writing poems and short stories also give you pleasure and enjoyment. When your manuscripts are published in a journal, you will be happy.


This happiness is not like other happiness. Your heart shakes when you see your poems and short stories are published in journals, magazines, and newspapers.

KYAIKTO People's Hospital has made arrangements for the future of a baby abandoned by its mentally ill mother, according to the hospital. Born underweight, the baby is now over one month old and in good health thanks to special care from the hospital.

The hospital posted on Facebook on 9 February, when she turned one month old, that it had arranged for a safe and happy future for the baby named Ma Swe Nyein.

"We wish Baby Ma Swe Nyein many happy returns of the day on her one-month birthday. Although she has no parents, the doctors and nurses at the hospital are like second parents. We have ensured the girl's safety, continued survival, and bright future. We wish you happiness, our daughter," wished the hospital staff.

After giving birth to the girl

at Kyaikto Hospital on 9 January 2024, the mother, who appeared to be mentally ill, left the hospital after saying she would bring her relatives from Kadike village in Paung township on 13 January.

If her relatives do not come back until the girl's health becomes stable and safe, the hospital will systematically arrange for the promising future of the abandoned girl, the hospital has informed. — MT/ZN

Counter-argument to false information

Fake news: Over 100 youths forcibly recruited as porters in Thanlyin

THE rebellious Khit Thit media deliberately concocted false news alleging that Tatmadaw, police, and administrative body forcibly conscripted

youths as porters, demanding at least one from each household in Ngwethanwin Ward, Thanlyin Township, Yangon Region, on 12 February. These forced porters were detained in the military compound located near Thanlyin Phayagon. Furthermore, the misinformation also falsely claimed that the Tatmadaw demanded at least 20 young men from each ward in Yangon Region.

The youths underwent disaster rescue training for two weeks in Thanlyin, and no underage individuals were involved in the training, as confirmed by an official from the Yangon Region government.

Similarly, the malicious media outlets are propagating that over 100 people were arrested by the security forces within four days in Yangon, Mandalay, Monywa, and Sagaing starting from the date of the enforcement announcement of the People's Military Service Law.

The State Administration Council Information Team provides clarifications and disseminates accurate information about the People's Military Service Law through State-owned media to reassure the public and the security forces never unlawfully apprehend civilians. — MNA/TMT

Malicious media outlets circulating fake news

MALICIOUS media outlets have been circulating false news claiming that Tatmadaw killed twelve Pa-O ethnic people who refused to go to the military front line in Hsihseng Township, Shan State (South).

However, an official from the regional security forces

has refuted this fake news. According to their statement, Tatmadaw is collaborating with members of the Pa-O militia in security operations within and around Hsihseng Township, all in the interest of peace and stability in the area.

These malicious media outlets are deliberately spreading false information on social media platforms, intending to cause misunderstanding and undermine unity between ethnic communities and Tatmadaw. — MNA/TKO

Mizzima allegedly spreading misinformation on Obo Prison inmate's death

THE malicious media outlet Mizzima has been disseminating false news on social media regarding the death of a female inmate due to inadequate medical attention at Obo Prison in Mandalay on 4 February.

The unsubstantiated news report also alleges that the inmate, named Ma Yin Moe, was transferred between external hospitals and the prison multiple times and was discharged prematurely due to security concerns.

An official at the prison has refuted this false news by clarifying that the inmate

exhibited signs of heart disease, hypertension, anaemia, and laboured breathing. She received treatment from 1 to 10 July 2023 at the prison hospital in Myingyan. Subsequently, she was transferred to the Myingyan District General Hospital on 10 July and later to the Mandalay General Hospital based on the physician's recommendation. She was discharged on 21 July.

For medical access, she was transferred to Mandalay Prison on 7 August. However, her condition did not improve, leading to her admission to the Mandalay General Hospital on five occasions since 14 September. Tragically, she passed away on 4 February 2024 at the hospital due to kidney failure and lack of urination.

The inmate had been serving a prison sentence for charges related to burning tyres on public roads, involvement in a riot, and acting as an accomplice.

Officials emphasized that they provided medical attention under prison laws. Allegations suggesting that the patient's discharge was due to security concerns are simply false news aimed at misleading people. — MNA/NT

Bali US\$10 tourist e-tax comes into force

The tax, payable electronically through the "Love Bali" online portal, applies to foreign tourists entering Bali from abroad or other parts of Indonesia.

THE Indonesian resort haven of Bali began imposing a 150,000 rupiah (\$10) tax on arriving tourists Wednesday to preserve the culture of the "Island of Gods", officials said.

Tourist-dependent Bali attracts millions of foreign visitors annually and the beach-dotted island is trying to capitalize on its popularity to boost its coffers and protect its tropical allure.

"This levy is aimed at the protection of the culture and the environment in Bali," Bali's acting governor Sang Made Mahendra Jaya said at a launch ceremony Monday. The fee will have to be paid electronically through the "Love Bali" online portal and will apply to foreign tourists entering Bali from abroad or from other parts of Indonesia, according to a press release.

The levy will not apply to domestic Indonesian tourists.

Nearly 4.8 million tourists visited Bali between January and November last year, according to official figures, as the island continued to rebound from the Covid-19 pandemic after imposing a zero-tolerance policy on rule-breakers. — AFP

Bitcoin breaks US\$50,000 for first time since 2021

BITCOIN spiked above US\$50,000 Tuesday for the first time in more than two years as investors grow optimistic that US approval of broader trading in the unit will ramp up demand.

The cryptocurrency has enjoyed a strong run in recent months, fuelled by expectations US lawmakers would allow the creation of exchange-traded funds (ETFs) that track the price and let the public invest in crypto without directly purchasing it.

After initially dropping in reaction to last month's green light by Washington, bitcoin has rallied about 25 per cent since 22 January.

That advance saw it hit as much as \$50,328, according to Bloomberg data, its highest level since late 2021.

And observers were optimistic about the outlook.

"Enthusiast buyers bring in more enthusiast buyers pushing prices further up," Fadi Aboualfa, of Copper Technologies, said.

"The cryptocurrency has momentum on the back of several green weeks and has a large chance of going up further when markets see weekly movements upwards of 10 per cent (as we saw last week)."

By 0330 GMT Tuesday, bitcoin had dropped slightly, to \$49,950.

The currency remains well below its record value of almost \$69,000 in 2020, but the rally marks a recovery following a series of high-profile scandals and collapses that rocked the crypto industry.

FTX, the world's second-biggest crypto exchange, dramatically went under last year, and its boss Sam Bankman-Fried faces up to 110 years in prison for what prosecutors described as "one of the biggest financial frauds in American history". — AFP

From tourism to energy, Senegal economy braces for fallout

SENEGAL'S hotels have seen a wave of cancellations since political unrest hit the West African country and many foreign companies are nervous about the deadly troubles.

At least three people have died and scores more have been arrested in demonstrations across the country since President Macky Sall postponed an election planned for 25 February. Tourism — together with oil — is one of the cornerstones of Senegal's economic development plan.

The tourism sector accounted for 10 per cent of gross domestic product before the Covid-19 pandemic, according to World Bank figures.

"We have seen a large number of cancellations because of the crisis," Pape Berenger Ngom, president of the Senegal Hotel and Restaurant Professionals' Association, said.

Searches for flights to Senegal, which relies heavily on the winter sunshine trade, fell 17 per cent in the week of 2 to 8 February compared to the previous week, according to the Forward-Keys consultancy that monitors travel industry trends.

Nevertheless, the Club Med holiday village operator indicated that there had not been much impact so far:

'Positive perception' affected

Multinational corporations such as BP, Woodside, Nestle, Philip Morris, and TotalEnergies are maintaining their presence in Senegal amid political turmoil.


Despite concerns among some employees, no foreign staff have requested to leave yet. However, tensions may escalate in the near future.

Body Shop's UK business slides into administration

The UK branch of The Body Shop, known for ethical cosmetics, has entered administration, placing thousands of jobs at risk.

THE UK arm of The Body Shop, the near 50-yearold cosmetics company renowned for ethical hair and skin products, has entered administration, administrators said Tuesday, placing thousands of jobs at risk.

The retailer has appointed experts from FRP Advisory to oversee

administration — a UK process where financial experts are drafted in to try and save parts of a firm.

"Today, the directors of The Body Shop International Limited have appointed Tony Wright, Geoff Rowley, and Alastair Massey of FRP as joint administrators of the company, which operates The Body Shop's UK business," said an FRP statement.

Bitter year for Heineken as inflation hits profits, beer sales

DUTCH brewer Heineken on Wednesday reported a drop in annual profits as beer volumes declined in "challenging market conditions" including high inflation.

The world's second-biggest brewer after AB InBev said its net profit in 2023 came in at 2.3 billion euros (\$2.5 billion), compared to the 2.7 billion euros of profit it made the year before. Beer volume overall dipped by 4.7 per cent, with 60 per cent of that decline driven by sharp falls in Nigeria and Viet Nam, the firm said. — AFP

Sony Group lifts profit forecast, aims to list financial unit in 2025

Sony cut its annual sales target for PlayStation 5 to 21 million units from 25 million, citing slower-than-expected sales during the Christmas season.

SONY Group Corp on Wednesday lifted its net profit forecast for the year ending March to 920 billion yen (\$6.1 billion) from an earlier estimate of 880 billion yen thanks to its robust finance business and a weak yen, while announcing that a planned spinoff and the listing of its financial unit is scheduled for 2025.

The sales projection for fiscal 2023, however, was lowered to 12.3 trillion yen from its November forecast of 12.4 trillion yen, overshadowed by lackluster performance in the gaming sector.

The Japanese conglomerate cut its annual

sales target for its mainstay PlayStation 5 games console to 21 million units from 25 million, citing slower-than-expected sales around the Christmas holiday season, even as a new model hit the shelves in November.

The downgrade brought its gaming business's annual sales forecast down to 4.15 trillion yen from 4.36 trillion yen, the company said, adding that console sales will continue to slow in the next fiscal year onward. — Kyodo

Year of Dragon sees closer air links between China, Europe

Air China's announcement of daily flights between Barcelona and Beijing starting from 31 March reflects this trend, following a three-year absence due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

THE Chinese Lunar New Year of the Dragon began not only with festive celebrations across Europe, but also with closer air links to China — a sign of economic recovery. Air China has announced that it will launch daily flights between Barcelona and Beijing starting from 31 March. The company returned to the Spanish city with three weekly flights in June 2023, following a three-year absence due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Marta Ortiz, a Spanish representative for Air China, said the company has noticed "a big change ... the prospects for the next few months are good".

China's new initiative ex-

empting Spanish passport holders from the need for a visa for short-term travels to China has also boosted the recovery of flights between the two countries, Ortiz added.

Air China already has a daily flight to Beijing from Madrid airport, where Hainan Airlines runs two weekly flights to Chongqing, and China Eastern Airlines runs five weekly flights to both Shanghai and Wenzhou.

Meanwhile, Cathay Pacific will resume direct flights to Hong Kong in June. The first direct flights between Barcelona and Hong Kong began in 2017, but were suspended due to the pandemic. — Xinhua

US homeland security secretary impeached by Republican-held House

ONE week after a failed impeachment vote, the Republican-held US House of Representatives on Tuesday voted to impeach Homeland Security Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas, making him the first cabinet member to be impeached in nearly 150 years.

On 6 February, Mayorkas narrowly survived an impeachment vote in the House, with a vote tally of 214 to 216. In the latest development, the lower chamber voted 214 to 213, with three Republicans defecting from their party to join Democrats to vote against the impeachment against the Biden administration's top border official. — Xinhua

Farmers' protest: Heavy traffic as security ramped up at borders

Rapid Action Force personnel, police, and riot control vehicles were deployed at the Singhu Border in Delhi to manage the situation.

LONG traffic jams hit the Delhi-Ghaziabad border were seen on Wednesday due to the farmers' protest and security checks put in place by the authorities.


Rapid Action Force personnel, Police personnel and Riot Control Vehicles are deployed at the Singhu Border in Delhi in view of the farmers' protest.

DSP Anil Kumar of Jhajjar, Haryana said that the traffic has been diverted and currently the atmosphere is peaceful.

Punjab Kisan Mazdoor Sangharsh Committee General Secretary Sarwan Singh Pandher said that they want the Prime Minister to step forward and speak with the farmers.

"There are reports in the

media that the MSP guaranteeing law can not be formed so soon. All, we are saying is to give us a legal guarantee on that (MSP) so that we don't sell crops below that MSP. So, there is no question of a Committee. We would want the PM to step forward and speak with the farmers," Pandher said. — ANI

Storms knock out power to 174,000 homes in Australia

STORMS packing powerful winds toppled trees, killed one person and knocked out power to 174,000 homes and businesses in eastern Australia, officials said Wednesday.

The wild weather hit large swathes of Victoria on Tuesday, dumping torrents of rain and unleashing gusts of more than 150 kilometres per hour (90 miles per hour), the state government and emergency services said.

A 50-year-old man was killed in the storm, dying on the scene after being struck by debris while working on his property in Darlimurla, southeast of Melbourne, Victoria police said in a statement.

The winds also fanned bushfires in the Grampians

region west of Melbourne, burning an unknown number of homes in one small town, the state's Country Fire Authority said At its peak, 530,000 homes and businesses lost power, the Australian Energy Market Operator said in an update. — AFP

S Korea's Son hurt finger in brawl before Asian Cup loss: **KFA**

TOTTENHAM Hotspurs captain Son Heung-min injured his finger in a brawl with a teammate on the eve of South Korea's humiliating loss to Jordan at the Asian Cup, the Korean football body said, with one player involved issuing an apology on social media Wednesday.

South Korea, ranked 23rd in the world, was beaten 2-0 by 87thranked Jordan in the semi-finals of the Asian Football Confederation competition in Qatar.

According to a report from British newspaper The Sun, Son dislocated his finger in a "bust-up" that erupted at dinner the night before the game.

The incident reportedly

happened after some younger players on the team — including Lee Kang-in of Paris Saint-Germain — rushed through their meal so they could leave early to play table tennis.

This displeased Son, the team's captain, and some of the older players, as meals on the eve of big games are traditionally seen as a time for bonding.

An unnamed source told the newspaper that when Son asked his younger teammates to sit down, "some disrespectful things were said to him".

"Within seconds, the row spilled into the dining area and

players were being pulled apart," the source was quoted as saying. "Son badly injured his finger trying to calm everyone down."

Lee acknowledged the incident on his Instagram account in a post on Wednesday and apologized for "disappointing" his fans. — AFP

Ex-Dutch international gets six years for coke smuggling

A Dutch court sentenced former Ajax and international winger Quincy Promes to six years in prison Wednesday, convicting him of smuggling more than one thousand kilogrammes of cocaine. The 32-year-old, now playing for Spartak Moscow, was not in court to hear the sentence, a spokesperson told AFP.

Previous attempts to extradite him from Moscow have failed.

Summing up in court, presiding judge M Vaandrager said Promes was an example to many, especially young people, due to his footballing talent.

"The suspect is regularly in the news, is active on social media, and has fans worldwide," the judge said. "This makes it even worse that he has tried to increase his wealth... by participating in major international drugs trafficking." — AFP

Man City fret over Grealish after injury blow

"In honour of Kenya's departed world marathon record holder, a true national hero, the government will support Kiptum's family in according him a befitting heroic farewell," Kenya's cabinet said in a statement on Wednesday. — AFP



Global South aspires for multipolar world with fair economic governance: economist

HE developing states of the Global South aspire for a multipolar world order free from US hegemony and just global economic governance under which they can achieve sustainable development via fair, win-win partnerships, said an economic expert in a recent interview with Xinhua.

"In a just global economic system, all parties would prioritize common interests,

peaceful settlement of conflicts and cooperation for sustainable development," said Diaa Helmy, secretary-general of the Cairo-based Egyptian-Chinese Chamber of Commerce. Developing countries and emerging economies engage in international forums to advocate unity, cooperation, reform, and collaboration for global peace and justice.

In recent years, representatives of developing countries and emerging economies took part in various important meetings of the BRICS, the Non-Aligned Movement, the Group of 77, and other forums, during which they voiced their calls for unity, cooperation, reform and collaboration to build a peaceful, just and sustainable world.

"These meetings indicate the awareness of developing countries of the need for a new multipolar world," Helmy, also a member of the economic committee of the Egyptian Council for Foreign Affairs, told Xinhua. Helmy considered the recent expansion of BRICS to include more members as one of the indicators that the world is heading toward a multipolar global system. — Xinhua

TRACK TEMPERATURE SOARED TO 48°C

Train services in New Zealand's Auckland cancelled due to heat

COMMUTERS in New Zealand's Auckland city were faced with disruptions and travel delays as authorities cancelled multiple trains in the city due to soaring summer heat, which led to "hot tracks", local media reported.

Kiwi Rail, which owns the tracks on Auckland's Rail Network imposed speed restrictions in place as temperature of the tracks reached 48 degrees Celsius in some places leading to the cancellation of many train services, including those during peak hours, on Monday.

A spokesman from KiwiRail, was cited by the New Zealand Herald as saying that heat causes the steel in the rail lines to move if the trains pass over them too quickly. "This means trains must go much more slowly in hot conditions.

Trains are often cancelled to prevent a major backlog," he said.

KiwiRail general manager for metros Jon Knight was cited by the news daily as saying that temporary speed restrictions are put in place once the steel rails reached 40C and lifted once the track dropped below this temperature. — ANI

Fears that pirates are returning to seas off Somalia

Six incidents have been recorded by the UK Marine Trade Operations since mid-December, ranging from armed approaches to successful hijackings.

THE daring attack in December bore unsettling hallmarks of the piracy that once terrorised global shipping off eastern Africa: a cargo vessel hijacked, its crew taken to Somalia, and disappeared.

The successful capture of the foreign vessel was the first by Somali pirates since 2017, and follows a spike in armed seaborne attacks around the Horn of Africa not seen in years.

Analysts caution that Somali piracy poses nowhere near the threat it did in 2011, when navies around the world had to deploy warships to beat back the scourge and restore order at sea. — AFP
