ACCORDING to the observations at 17:30 hours MST today, the low-pressure cell over the North Andaman Sea still persists. It is likely to move northwestwards and may intensify into a low-pressure area over the Eastcentral Bay of Bengal and adjoining North Andaman Sea around 21 October 2024 and Depression around 23 October 2024.

Due to the low-pressure cell and which may form lowpressure area, rain or thundershowers are likely to be fairly widespread to widespread in Nay Pyi Taw, Sagaing, Mandalay, Magway, Bago, Yangon, Ayeyawady and Taninthayi regions and Chin, Rakhine, Kayin and Mon states with likelihood of regionally heavyfalls, isolated heavyfalls and strong winds from tonight to 24 October 2024.

Squalls with rough seas are likely at times off and along Myanmar Coasts. Surface wind speed in squalls may reach (35-40) miles per hour and wave height will be about (8-10) feet off and along Myanmar Coasts.

Residents Urged to Prioritize Public Safety Amid Armed Terrorist Threats

ARMED terrorists have been launching attacks by using residential homes and administrative buildings in towns and villages as cover, where they have forcibly settled. They aim to shield themselves from Tatmadaw counterattacks while also persuading temporarily displaced persons to return to their native areas and recruiting new members. 

During the meeting, they discussed matters related to the development of the Yadanabon Industrial Zone with government officials. The discussion also covered strategies for achieving self-sufficiency in domestic edible oil

and the progress made in the cotton sector.

The Chief minister provided a detailed update on the region's efforts to boost oil crop production to ensure a sufficient domestic supply of edible oil, develop the cotton industry, and implement solar-powered double roller cotton gins.

The meeting also focused on future strategies for fostering the growth of MSMEs and establishing well-organized industrial zones.

Following the meeting, the Union minister visited the Mandalay Region Industrial Supervision and Inspection Department office to meet with employees and provide them with rice and oil.



NACU (Mandalay) to launch postgraduate courses on 2 Nov

THE National University of Arts and Culture (Mandalay) will open a one-year post-graduate diploma course and two-year master courses for the 2024-2025 Academic Year.

NUAC will offer an extensive range of one-year Post-graduate diploma courses in Music, Performing Arts, Art, Sculpture, Acting and Theatre. Those who hold a bachelor's degree, government staff with the approval of the respective department's head, and those who are passionate about arts and have a basic knowledge of applied subjects are eligible to apply for admission between 15

October and 13 November. The oral entrance exam will take place on 18 November.

Two-year master's courses related to music, performing arts, arts, sculpture, acting and theatre will be offered. Those who have qualifications to attend master courses are eligible to apply for it. Civil service personnel need the approval of the related department's head. They must not currently attend any other classes at the university. The applications are to be submitted from 1 to 14 November. The written test will be held at 9-12 am on 18 Novem-

ber for English and 1-4 pm for the relevant art subjects. The oral test will take place from 9 am to 4 pm on 19 November.

Those who pass the entrance exam will be announced on the notice board of the NUAC Mandalay and www.nuacmdy.edu.mm on 20 November. Application is available at NUAC (Mandalay), Shwesaryan Pagoda Road in Patheingyi Township, Mandalay. Bachelor's degree and grading certificates must be provided. Individuals can enquire about details through 09 250762203 (Day Class) and 09 400404172 (University Registrar). — NN/KK

Illegal trade crackdown nets K207M in three days

UNDER the supervision of the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee, efforts to combat the illicit trade continue effectively by the law.

On 15 and 18 October, the combined on-duty teams nabbed a kind of consumer goods worth K47.642 million without official documents from four containers at the Asia World Port Terminal container checkpoint, consumer goods and jewellery valued at K69.301 million without official documents at the Yangon International Airport (Import Desk) and consumer goods that were smuggled and piled up by the side of road over the Sinphyu border, valued at K32.4 million in Muse Township. The action was conducted following Customs procedures.

The combined teams supervised by the Kayin State Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force conducted inspections in the seizures of a Mitsubishi Canter (approximately K25 million), heading to Myaingkalay from Hpa-an, car-

rying industrial materials worth K9.72 million without official documents at the Thanlwin bridge combined checkpoint (Tayokhla side) and a Daihatsu Hijet (estimated value of K15 million), travelling from Hpa-an to Mawlamyine, carrying a kind of industrial materials valued at K3 million without official documents at the Zathapyin combined checkpoint. The action was carried out according to Customs procedures.

On 19 October, illegal teak weighing 7.249 tonnes, illegal hardwood weighing 4.660 tonnes and illegal other timbers weighing 3.511 tonnes were captured in Bago Region. The action was taken under the Forest Law.

The Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee reported 11 arrests on 15, 18 and 19 October, resulting in the seizure of illegal goods worth approximately K207 million. — MNA/MKKS

FORECAST VALID UNTIL NOON OF THE 20 October 2024: Rain or thundershowers will be isolated in northern Shan State, scattered in Nay Pyi Taw, Sagaing, Mandalay and Magway regions and Kachin, (southern and eastern)Shan, Chin, Rakhine and Kayah states, fairly widespread in Bago Region and Kayin State and widespread in the remaining regions and states with likelihood of isolated heavyfalls in Yangon, Ayeyawady and Taninthayi regions and Kayin and Mon states. Degree of certainty is 100%. THE CONDITION OF CUMULONIMBUS CLOUD: The Cumulonimbus clouds are developing in Nay Pyi Taw, Bago, Yangon, Ayeyawady and Taninthayi regions and (Southern and Eastern) Shan, Rakhine, Kayah, Kayin and Mon states. The area along the cumulonimbus clouds movement, the weather phenomena such as strong winds accompanied with rain, thunder, lightning and hail may occur and therefore it is recommended to be aware in advance these phenomena.

STATE OF THE SEA: Squalls with rough seas are likely at times in Deltaic, Gulf of Mottama, off and along Mon-Taninthayi Coasts. Surface wind speed in squalls may reach 35-40 miles per hour. Wave height will be about 8-10 feet in Deltaic, Gulf of Mottama, off and along Mon-Taninthayi Coasts. Sea will be moderate elsewhere in Myanmar waters. Wave height will be about 5-7 feet in off and along Rakhine Coasts.

Myanmar's manufacturing attracts FDI of \$81M in H1 this FY

FOREIGN direct investments of more than US\$81.7 million were pumped into Myanmar's manufacturing sector from 25 enterprises in the first half of the current financial year 2024-2025, beginning 1 April, as per the statistics released by the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration (DICA).

Chinese companies primarily made investments in the manufacturing sector. The manufacturing enterprises that need a large labour force are prioritized to create job opportunities for the locals.

The Myanmar Investment Commission gave the green light to 30 foreign projects from seven countries (China, Chinese (Taipei), Hong Kong SAR, India, Indonesia, Singapore and Thailand) to make investments of \$223 million in the past six months, adding increased capital by the existing enterprises.

The Transport and Communication sector pulled \$87.7 million with the capital expansion of \$82.66 million this FY. The manufacturing sector drew \$81.225 million, and the services sector received \$44 million. The power sector brought in an FDI of \$8.5 million, while investments of less than one million flowed into the agriculture sector respectively.

Singapore stood as the largest foreign investor in Myanmar, with \$87.74

million of FDI in the H1 of the current FY, followed by Thailand and China.

Myanmar's manufacturing sector is concentrated mainly in garment and textiles produced on a Cutting, Making, and Packaging basis, and it contributes to the country's GDP to a certain extent.

Myanmar Garment Manufacturers Association (MGMA) is committed to accelerating its effort to keep improving Myanmar's garment sector, joining hands with international brands and partners, as per the MGMA's statement on its commitment re-

leased on 25 August 2023. MGMA also offers an HR management course, an occupational safety and health (OSH) course, and basic and advanced sewing machine operator training to enhance the capacity of the staff.

There are 548 active factories operated under the MGMA as of September 2024, comprising 323 from China, 56 from South Korea, 17 from Japan, 16 from other countries, 63 domestic factories and 25 joint ventures. Forty-eight are temporarily closed for now, according to the MGMA's monthly Newsletter. — KK

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CBM sells \$33M, 260M Thai baht, 3M yuan within 20 days

THE Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) injected over US\$33 million, over 260 million Thai baht and three million yuan into the financial sector within 20 days.

It sold \$6 million and 200 million baht on 15 October, \$730,000 on 11 October, \$12.4 million and 38.7 million baht on 10 October, 660,000 yuan on 9 October and over 10 million baht on 7 October into the private sector.

CBM also pumped \$13.1 million and 288,000 yuan on 4 October, \$780,000, 1.2 million yuan and one million baht on 3 October and over 1.2 million yuan and 10.2 million baht into the financial market on 2 October.

CBM also injected over \$76 million, 86 million baht and 4.8 million yuan into financial markets in September. Moreover, CBM sold over \$190 million, 19 million yuan and 79 million baht in August.

CBM aims to curb the instability in the foreign exchange market and the currency devaluation. According to CBM's notification on 15 March, it has been joining hands with law enforcement agencies to combat and prosecute those who attempt to manipulate the currency market under the existing laws. CBM allowed authorized dealers (private banks) to operate online foreign exchange trading freely as per the market rate depending on supply and demand, starting from 5 December 2023. — NN/KK

A leading group for the protection of farmer rights and enhancement of their benefits announced a paddy reference price at K960,000 per 100 baskets (a basket is equivalent to 46 pounds), according to its notification 1/2024.

In accordance with the provisions of the Law of Protection of the Farmer Rights and Enhancement of their Benefits, the leading group set the reference price of the paddy at K950,000 per 100 baskets, which meets the prescribed criteria: a 14-per-cent moisture content and a fixed percentage of impurities such as sand, dust, and small stones in order

to ensure fair market and fair price for the growers.

The transaction must be made according to the reference price if the market price exceeds it and sits below it.

This price is designated for monsoon paddy produced in 2024 and summer paddy that will be made in 2025 to have a decent price during the harvest season. Those farmers who have difficulty in selling them as per the reference price can link with township representatives of the Myanmar Rice Federation or dial MRF's contact numbers: 01 2301128, 01 2301129, and 01 218266. — NN/KK

Scheme family plans for reproductive health

HE rapid increase in the global population has created significant challenges in areas like poverty, education, healthcare, and food security. Addressing these issues through family planning and reproductive health measures is crucial for enhancing individual well-being and contributing to socioeconomic development.

According to the United Nations, the global population is expected to reach 8.2 billion by 2024 and grow to 10.3 billion by the 2080s. Modern birth-spacing techniques have seen increasing adoption, rising from 52 per cent usage in 1994 to 58 per cent in 2019. Despite this progress, challenges remain globally. Societies with gender inequality, religious extremism, or cultural restrictions imposed by husbands or family members can prevent the implementation of effective reproductive health measures. These barriers make it difficult for people to access or use birth control, limiting their ability to manage family

size and plan pregnancies.

In Myanmar, the Ministry of Health's 2015-2016 population and health survey found that 97 per cent of married women aged 15 to 49 were aware of modern birth-spacing techniques. However, only 51 per cent were actively using them. An additional 16 per cent expressed a desire to use these methods but were unable to access them. Higher birth rates tend to occur in regions where family planning services are less accessible.

To address these disparities, ongoing efforts to promote reproductive health, improve access to contraceptives, and raise awareness about family planning are essential. By supporting these initiatives, countries can better manage population growth, reduce the strain on resources, and improve the quality of life for future generations.

As such, the right to choose the number of offspring and control birth spacing is fundamental for every woman. Contraceptive pills play an essential role in this effort. Implementing systematic family planning and reproductive health measures can reduce maternal and child mortality, prevent illnesses, and avoid unintended pregnancies. It contributes to stabilizing the socioeconomic sector so that it can thrive in a healthier and happier environment.

CONCERNING Dana, the writer provides his own presentation with main ideas based on the Buddhist canonical texts. With regard to Sila, the writer has quoted the book written by Mingun Sayadawgyi Reverend Vicittasarabhivamsa titled "Maha Buddhawun Anudipani. When it comes to Bhavana, the writer has quoted Mahasi Sayadaw, Shwedaunggon Sayadaw, Saddammaramsi Sayadaw and Chanmyay Sayadaw.

As the readers are all aware, there are three stages or three age groups in the life of us human beings: in the first stage – i.e. people belonging to the age group of childhood and teenage, they have to pursue education; and in the second stage - i.e. those belonging to the age group of adult,

they have to earn a livelihood and continue to pursue further studies at the same time. When people can earn an income regardless of the earnings being small, medium or large, they must not be forgetful of Dana – i.e. giving or donation, for the effect of Dana will follow the donor throughout his existence hereafter until he attains Nibbana.

The writer also reminds the readers of the saying, "Health is wealth", the Pali equivalent of which will be Arogyam paramam labham." He has advised the readers to be health conscious leading a healthy, happy life.

After discussing Dana - donation, the writer deals with Sila – morality or observance of Five Precepts, at the least, for Sila is genuine wealth. When a person

observes the Five Precepts, Eight Precepts, Nine Precepts and Ten Precepts, the effect of his observance of the moral characters or Sila will follow him throughout the Samsara – the cycles of rebirths until he becomes the Fourth Elect - i.e. Rahanta.

Only after he has discussed Dana and Sila does he come to Bhavana-the meditation, which is a prerequisite for a yogi to be enlightened. When people meditate, they will find it extremely difficult to have complete control over their minds. Naturally, people tend to be indulged in desires. They will definitely give in to their wishes, aspirations or desires. Matter-of-factly, he who can control his mind, exercising utmost restraint, will have peace of mind. As long as people yield to their desires, they will be in big trouble. To be able to control one's mind,

one must practice mindfulness - i.e. Satipatthana. Before practising Satipattha-

na, one must commence by saying

the prayers, reciting the Eleven Holy Discourses, listening to the sermons delivered by the great Sayadawgyis and propagating and disseminating Metta (loving-kindness). Afterwards, one can turn to concentration (Samatha) practice or go directly to Vipassana (meditation) – i.e. being invariably mindful of whatever is occurring. Samatha is keeping one's mind at a single target, not letting one's mind drift, bringing the drifting mind back to his target. Both Samatha and Vipassana involve mindfulness of breathing in and breathing out. For this purpose, the Yogis should approach the Sayadawgyis like Mogok or Mahasi Savadawgvis, who are widely regarded as Rahantas or Ariyas - at least Sotapana, the First Elect. Only when the masters are Ariyas can their disciples attain the Sotapanahood, from which they can go up to the level of Fourth Elect, the rahanta. People need to be possessed with a high level of Samadhi (concentration power) to reach this first level of attainment. Only when people can concentrate will they be able to attain wisdom, which will help them reach enlightenment.







Despite the 104th Myanmar Film Day and the 47th Respect-Paying Ceremo-


ny being held on 16

Drone attack from Lebanon targets Netanyahu's residence in Caesarea

Netanyahu addressed the situation, stating that the conflict with Hamas could end if they agree to lay down arms and return hostages.

ISRAEL Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's private residence in Caesarea was targeted in a drone attack from Lebanon earlier this morning, The Times of Israel reported, citing Israel PM's Office, The Times of Israel reported.

In a statement, the Israel Prime Minister's Office said that Netanyahu and his wife Sara were not at home at the time of the attack and there were no injuries reported in the incident.

Two other drones that were fired from Lebanon this morning were downed by Israel's air defences, triggering sirens in Tel Aviv, according to The Times of Israel report. Meanwhile, sirens sound again in several northern communities in the Haifa Bay area, warning of incoming rocket fire from Lebanon.

Japan youth sue utilities over climate impact

A group of 16 Japanese young people is suing utility firms over their carbon emissions, in the latest case worldwide of activists using courts to press for action on climate change.

The plaintiffs, all in their teens and 20s, say it is the first such case brought by young people in Japan, which advocates say has the dirtiest energy mix among G7 nations.

The lawsuit was filed in August against 10 operators of power plants burning fossil fuels whose emissions are incompatible with Japan's climate commitments, their lawyers said. The first hearing is set for 24 October.

The aim of the suit is to protect the young "from the dangerous and negative impacts of climate change" which is a "violation of their human rights and those of future generations", the lawyers said in a statement.

The defendants' self-imposed 2030 emission reduction targets are "extremely inadequate" and rely on "technically unproven technologies" like burning coal mixed with ammonia or storing carbon dioxide underground, they added. — AFP

NATO must not be party to war: Scholz

GERMAN Chancellor Olaf Scholz on Friday reaffirmed his unwavering support for Ukraine during a joint press conference with US President Joe Biden in Berlin, but Scholz stressed that the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) must not become a party to the war.

"We stand with Ukraine, as long as it is needed," Scholz said, adding that actions have been very closely coordinated across the Atlantic. – Xinhua

US regulator probes Tesla's self-driving mode after crashes

THE US auto safety regulator said Friday that it has opened an investigation into Tesla's Full Self-Driving (FSD) software after receiving four reports of crashes, one of which involved a pedestrian being struck and killed.

The crashes all occurred when "a Tesla vehicle travelling with FSD engaged entered an area of reduced roadway visibility conditions (sun glare, fog, dust) and Tesla's FSD continued operating," the statement from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) said. — AFP

Japan's 2024 new rice price rises to 31-year high after summer heat

Rice from each year's harvest typically appears on store shelves around September in Japan.

THE price of newly harvested rice has surged 48 per cent from a year earlier to the highest level in 31 years, reflecting a shortage caused by extreme summer heat that reduced the previous season's harvest, the farm ministry's data showed Friday.

The average price of unpolished rice sold by the National Federation of Agricultural Cooperative Associations and other supplier bodies to wholesalers was 22,700 yen (\$151) for 60 kilo-

grammes in September, the Ministry of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries reported. In Japan, rice from each year's harvest begins appearing on store shelves around September.

This year's price is the highest since 1993 when it reached 23,607 yen, according to data from the National Rice Exchange and Price Formation Centre, though the ministry's data only goes back to 2008. — Kyodo



Canada reduces credit card fees by 27% for small businesses

THE Canadian federal government announced Thursday that new credit card fee reductions for small business owners will come into effect this Saturday.

More than 90 per cent of Canadian businesses that accept credit cards will receive lower rates and see interchange fees reduced by up to 27 per cent, the Federal Eco-

nomic Development Agency for Southern Ontario said in a press release.

These fee reductions, which the federal government negotiated with Visa and Mastercard, will save eligible small businesses about 1 billion Canadian dollars (US\$720 million) over five years, the release said. — Xinhua

THE successful connection of the Ethiopia-Djibouti railway line to Ethiopia's Dire Dawa Free Trade Zone is set to pave the way for economic growth, the Ethio-Djibouti Standard Gauge Railway Share Company (EDR) has said.

According to the EDR, linking the free trade zone with the railway infrastructure is expected to enhance trade and commerce in the region, effectively benefiting businesses with an efficient transport network, the state-affiliated Fana Broadcasting Corporate reported Wednesday. — Xinhua

Pakistan's foreign exchange reserves increase by US\$215 mln

THE State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) said Thursday that its foreign exchange reserves had increased by US\$215 million.

During the week ending on 11 October , the total foreign exchange reserves of the bank reached around \$11 billion, the central bank said in a statement.

Net foreign reserves held by commercial banks came at around 5.1 billion, it added. — Xinhua

Malaysia's trade up 10.2% on year in January-September

MALAYSIA'S trade during the period from January to September 2024 rose 10.2 per cent year on year to 2.14 trillion ringgit (US\$497 billion), official data showed Friday.

The Ministry of Investment, Trade and Industry (MITI) said in a statement that Malaysia's trade remained buoyant, mainly thanks to the export of palm oil-based agricultural products. — Xinhua

International ceramic expo starts in China's "porcelain capital"

Environmental activist addresses challenges after BioLab chemical fire

IN the wake of a devastating fire at a BioLab chemical plant in Conyers, Georgia, local environmental activist Rachael Thompson discussed the ongoing challenges faced by communities in transitioning from heavy industries despite public health concerns.

The fire, which erupted in late September, forced the evacuation of over 90,000 residents due to a plume of toxic smoke.

Chemicals released, including chlorine and chloramine, posed serious health risks, particularly for individuals with preexisting conditions.

Thompson highlighted that this incident was not an isolated event; similar fires have occurred at BioLab and other chemical facilities in neighboring cities, including Brunswick, which experienced two major incidents leading to mass evacuations in the past two years.

She criticized local authorities for their inadequate responses to such chemical disasters, emphasizing the need for more effective safety regulations and a shift away from reliance on hazardous industries to protect public health and the environment. — SPUTNIK

Vistara, Air India flights receive hoax bomb threats

THREE international flights of Vistara airline and one belonging to Air India received bomb threats that turned out to be hoaxes, officials said Saturday.

Of the three Vistara flights, one was diverted to Frankfurt, Germany as a precautionary measure.

According to officials, the flights to London, Paris and Hong Kong from the national capital New Delhi received bomb threats on social media on Friday.





Greeks welcome China's new visa-free policy

Travel agents and cultural figures praise the initiative for simplifying travel and promoting cultural exchanges.

GREEK citizens have warmly welcomed China's new visa-free policy, which took effect earlier this week, offering easier and more affordable travel opportunities.

Starting from 15 October and lasting until 31 December 2025, Greek citizens with ordinary passports can visit China for up to 15 days without a visa for tourism, business, family reunification, or

transit, according to Pan Ziyang, an official from the Consular Department of China's Embassy in Greece. A new visa-free policy facilitates travel between Greece and China, praised by travel agents and cultural figures.

It simplifies travel, reduces costs, and promotes cultural exchanges. — Xinhua

Coca production in Colombia hits record levels

COLOMBIA, the world's biggest cocaine exporter, set a new record last year for production of the drug and cultivation of the coca leaf it is made from, a United Nations report said Friday.

Coca leaf cultivation was 10 per cent higher last year than in 2022, while cocaine production rose 53 per cent from 1,738 tonnes to 2,600, according to the UN Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC).

Colombia's coca leaf production reached record levels, covering 253,000 hectares in 2023, primarily aimed at the US and Europe. This increase persists despite ongoing US drug war efforts since 2014. Notably, the Cauca and Narino departments saw the most significant growth, influenced by dissident FARC guerrilla groups. — AFP

17 OCTOBER

Sinwar's death marks a major blow

CHIEF ARCHITECT of the 7 October 2023 attack on Israel, the deadliest in its history, Sinwar was killed during an operation in Gaza, Israel's military said on Thursday.

Hamas has yet to confirm his death.

Sinwar was the head of Hamas in Gaza during the 7 October attack, and rose to become the group's overall leader in August after the killing of political chief Ismail Haniyeh.

Hamas leader Sinwar's death was celebrated by Israeli Prime Minister Netanyahu as a significant blow to Hamas. In July, Israel was implicated in the killings of Haniyeh and claimed responsibility for Mohammed Deif, though his death remains unconfirmed.

The conflict has resulted in significant casualties on both sides. $-\operatorname{AFP}$

16 OCTOBER

Students protest funding cuts outside universities

ARGENTINE university professors and students took their classes onto the streets of Buenos Aires on Wednesday to protest President Javier Milei's veto of a funding increase for cash-strapped public universities.

Literature students from the University of Buenos Aires, the country's most prestigious school, brought their desks out onto the sidewalk in the centre of the city as professors lectured loudly over the din of the traffic.

The protests come a week after social science AFP

Senate that envisaged regular funding increases for public universities, whose budgets he slashed.

The law also provided for university instructors and other staff to receive pay increases to offset Argentina's stubbornly high inflation rate.

Annual inflation stood at 209 per cent in September.

At the University of Buenos Aires, the faculties of law, medicine, philosophy and arts, economy, science and social science all took their classes outside. — AFP

15 OCTOBER

China promotes international collaboration in space science

CHINA will pursue extensive and in-depth international cooperation in space exploration, according to a press conference held on Tuesday unveiling the nation's mid and long-term space science development programme.

Wang Chi, director of the National Space Science Centre under the Chinese Academy of Sciences, said that international cooperation in space science can significantly multiply scientific output and foster mutual understanding and friendship among countries worldwide.

China aims to encourage multinational

collaborations in space science projects to enhance scientific achievements and data sharing. Notable initiatives include the Advanced Space-based Solar Observatory and the Einstein Probe.

Yang Xiaoyu from the China National Space Administration revealed that China has signed cooperation agreements with 17 countries for the International Lunar Research Station (ILRS). The focus will be on joint verification, design, and data sharing, emphasizing the importance of space technology in supporting the development of emerging nations. — Xinhua

14 OCTOBER

Iraq struggles to control pro-Iran factions

THE Iraqi government is facing challenges in controlling pro-Iran factions that could drag the country into a wider regional conflict amid escalating tensions in Gaza and Lebanon.

The Islamic Resistance in Iraq, an alliance of Iran-backed groups, has launched drone attacks against Israel in solidarity with Hamas, although most have been intercepted. A recent drone strike from Iraq

resulted in the deaths of two Israeli soldiers, prompting Israeli Prime Minister Netanyahu to declare a defence across multiple fronts, including against Shiite groups in Iraq.

Despite its Iran-aligned leadership, Iraq seeks to prevent further violence from spilling over. Iraqi Foreign Minister Fuad Hussein emphasized opposition to any use of Iraqi airspace for attacks against Iran or Israel. — AFP

13 OCTOBER

Biden praises Japanese atomic bomb survivors' advocacy

US PRESIDENT JOE BIDEN on Sunday commended Nihon Hidankyo, Japan's leading atomic bomb survivors organization, for serving as a "human testament" to the tragedy of nuclear weapons for decades and telling a story that the world needs to hear.

In a statement released to congratulate the group on its receipt of the 2024 Nobel Peace Prize, Biden touched on his visit last year to Hiroshima, when he met on the sidelines of the Group of Seven summit with a survivor of the world's first atomic bomb attack.

Biden said he was powerfully reminded that "we must continue making progress towards the day when we can finally and forever rid the world of nuclear weapons." – Kyodo

Japan prioritizes financial education for children after adulthood age change

Parents seek early financial literacy for their children, reflecting their own missed opportunities.

FINANCIAL education for children in Japan has gained importance since the legal age of adulthood was lowered to 18 in 2022

Major securities firms are now expanding programmes aimed at teaching responsible money management to elementary school students.

These initiatives incorporate games and activities to make learning enjoyable, while also training teachers to conduct lessons independently.

For example, SMBC Nikko Securities invited around 1,500 elementary students and their families to participate in interactive sessions where they learned about money fundamentals and stocks. Parents, eager for their children to acquire financial literacy, expressed their desire for early education in this area, citing their own lack of opportunities.

In addition, Mitsubishi UFJ Morgan Stanley Securities and Daiwa Securities Group are offering similar programmes and teacher training to promote financial understanding. Daiwa has even created a game using toy money to help children learn asset allocation for future life events. As a result, junior high students can now trade stocks with parental consent, providing practical experience and enhancing their understanding of investment risks. — Kyodo

Barcelona turns against surging tourism

BARCELONA, renowned for its Belle Epoque architecture and vibrant beaches, attracts about 170,000 visitors daily, contributing to 13.5 per cent of its GDP.

However, a municipal survey indicates that tourism has become the third most pressing concern for its 1.6 million residents.

The aggressive post-pandemic tourism rebound has sparked protests against the city's tourism-centric economy, highlighted by graffiti reading "Tourist go home" and confrontations involving locals

The city is at a critical juncture, trying to protect its cultural fabric while managing a vital economic sector.

and tourists. Residents complain of housing shortages, noise, and disturbances linked to short-term rentals, prompting legal battles over property conversions

Mayor Jaume Collboni plans to eliminate licences for approximately 10,000 short-term rentals by 2028 to combat rising rents. Critics argue that current

measures, including potential cruise ship restrictions, fail to address "overtourism" adequately.

Traditional shops are disappearing, replaced by tourist-focused businesses, prompting calls for a more sustainable tourism strategy that balances economic growth with social and environmental considerations.

As Spain approaches record tourist arrivals, the tension between tourism and local life intensifies. — AFP
