

Myanmar attends 12th ASEAN Ministerial Meeting on Disaster Management

THE Myanmar delegation led by Dr Soe Win, Union Minister for Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement, attended the 12th ASEAN Ministerial Meeting on Disaster Management-AMMDM, held from 23 to 25 October in Brunei. On 24 October, the meeting discussed the completion of the Asia-Pacific Ministerial Conference on Disaster Risk Reduction, humanitarian assistance of the ASEAN Secretariat to Myanmar, disaster information sharing programmes of the AHA Centre in 2024, training programmes of ASEAN's Emergency Coop-

eration Centre (EOC), relief items for ASEAN countries including Myanmar, plan to supply relief items at warehouses of ASEAN, meeting of three organizations that implement the ASEAN Agreement on Disaster Management and Emergency Response and other matters. The ASEAN-China disaster cooperation meeting was held, and the leaders discussed the establishment of the ASE-AN-China emergency response centre, sending of MoU on cooperation to China, progress in the implementation of 23 key points of AADMER Work

Programme and drafting of the ASEAN-China disaster risk reduction framework.

Myanmar continues 46th ASEAN Ministers on Agriculture and Forestry Meeting

MYANMAR hosted the online 46th ASEAN Ministers on Agriculture and Forestry Meeting (AMAF) and its related meetings. Union Minister for Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation U Min Naung presided over the 24th Meeting of ASEAN Ministers on Agriculture and Forestry Plus Three yesterday.

The meeting was cochaired by Agriculture and Forestry Ministers and superior officers from China, Japan and Korea and attended by representatives of ASEAN countries, Timor-Leste, China, Japan and Korea, Deputy Secretary General of ASEAN and officials of the ASEAN Secretariat.

The meeting emphasized implemented works in 2023-2024 under the ASEAN Plus Three Cooperation Strategy on Food, Agriculture and Forestry (2016-2025), such as the ASEAN Plus Three rice reserve, information system for ASEAN food security, development on bio-energy, sustainable forestry management, health control on plant and animals, human resource development, quality agricultural product production and market operations and research development programmes.

Moreover, they approved the joint statement.

Then, they announced that the Philippines would host the 24th ASEAN Ministers on Agriculture and Forestry in person in 2025, and tourism promotion video clips of the Philippines were screened.

At noon, the Union minister led the eighth ASEAN India Ministerial Meeting on Agriculture and Forestry. Mr Shri Shivraj Singh Chouhan, Indian Minister for Agriculture and Farmers' Welfare, co-chaired the meeting.

The meeting discussed the progress in the Medium-Term Plan of Action for ASEAN-India Cooperation in Agriculture and Forestry (2021-2025), scholarships for agriculture-related science subjects, ASEAN-India Cooperation in Smart Farming and Soil Health Card, AI, utilizing cutting-edge technologies such as artificial intelligence, the Internet of Things, and machine learning. Then, they approved the joint statement. The Indian delegation leader announced the ninth ASE-AN India Ministerial Meeting on Agriculture and Forestry in 2026. — MNA/KTZH

YCDC to publish YGN map book with demographics

THE Yangon City Development Committee (YCDC) will publish the Yangon Map book, including population statistics, according to U Aye Min Oo, leader of the Yangon Map Publishing Team.

The Yangon Map book will feature maps and population data for the Yangon Region, as well as detailed information on the area of each township, main roads, street names, rivers, creeks, lakes, water canals, sluice gates, railways, bridges, and flyover bridges. The team has connected with relevant organizations down to the ward level to ensure accuracy.

"In addition to the map book, detailed data can be easily viewed on a mobile phone. Currently, the first step is to use the QR code system, and the second step will allow the public to download the information," said U Aye Min Oo.

The Yangon Map Publishing Team was set up by the Public Relations and Information Department of the YCDC to produce a new map of Yangon city for the Visit Myanmar Year in 1996. Design Printing Services Company published the Yangon Map book for the 1996 Myanmar Tourism Year.

CBM sells US\$100,000, 8.2M Thai baht on 24 Oct

THE Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) sold over US\$100,000 and 8.2 million Thai baht on 24 October 2024.

CBM sold over \$2.5 million and 16.5 million baht after announcing upcoming sales of 20 million baht to importers on the foreign exchange trading platform on 23 October.

It pumped over \$7.5 million and about 150 million baht in the private sector on 22 October, again after sales of \$2.2 million and 1.5 million yuan on 21 October.

CBM announced the sale of \$35 million for those engaged in the fuel oil and edible oil sectors as per its notification dated 20 October.

CBM injected \$6 million and 200 million baht on 15 October, \$730,000 on 11 October, \$12.4 million and 38.7 million baht on 10 October, 660,000 yuan on 9 October and over 10 million baht on 7 October into the private sector.

CBM also pumped \$13.1 million and 288,000 yuan on 4 October, \$780,000, 1.2 million yuan and one million baht on 3 October and over 1.2 million yuan and 10.2 million baht into the financial market on 2 October.

CBM also sold over \$76 million, 86 million baht and 4.8 million yuan in September. Moreover, CBM sold over \$190

Furthermore, there is a capital expansion and an increase in the labour force of the existing enterprises in October. The regional investment committee has rules and regulations under the Myanmar Investment Law to spur investments and create more job opportumillion, 19 million yuan and 79 million baht in August.

CBM aims to curb the instability in the foreign exchange market and the currency devaluation. According to CBM's notification on 15 March, it has been joining hands with law enforcement agencies to combat and prosecute those who attempt to manipulate the currency market under the existing laws. CBM allowed authorized dealers (private banks) to operate online foreign exchange trading freely as per the market rate depending on supply and demand, starting from 5 December 2023. — NN/KK

CBM offers petty cash special sales to those going abroad

THE Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) announced on 24 October 2024 that it has been selling foreign currencies for those going abroad as petty cash under a special programme in Yangon, Mandalay, Nay Pyi Taw and Taunggyi, in cooperation with authorized banks and money changers, according to its notification on 14 June.

With a view to facilitating the purchase of foreign currencies in addition to internationally accepted debit cards and credit cards and curbing forex market manipulation by illegal money changers, those studying abroad, working abroad and travelling abroad for medical treatment are entitled to buy foreign cur-

rencies that are equivalent to US\$300-500 per person at the authorized banks' foreign exchange counters and money changers at the Yangon International Airport starting from 31 May 2023, while those going on a pilgrimage and those leaving for the designated countries to attend the meeting as per the invitations of the foreign governments and institutions are allowed to buy the petty cash from 18 August 2023. Those authorized money changers sell a US dollar by adding K10 to the daily online trading rate of the CBM.

Additionally, CBM also sells foreign currencies under a special programme for those going abroad for other purposes to

stabilize the foreign exchange market.

CBM joined hands with three domestic banks (KBZ, AYA Bank PCL, and UAB) and registered money changers (Eastern

Lad Co Ltd and Golden Money Services Co Ltd) for those going abroad to buy foreign currencies in Nay Pyi Taw, Yangon, Mandalay and Taunggyi cities under the special scheme.

Authorized dealers (private banks) announced their branches were available to buy foreign currencies as petty cash on their websites and Facebook pages. Authorized foreign exchange companies also revealed the details on their respective pages.

Additionally, CBM has been arranging for those MoU workers working abroad under the Ministry of Labour's plan to purchase foreign currencies for their flight tickets on CBM's foreign exchange online trading platforms. CBM also injected over \$1 billion into the private sector for importers, edible oil and fuel oil dealers between April and October 2024 through its foreign exchange online trading platform. - NN/KK

No price hike urged for gold dealers following misinformation

YANGON Gold Entrepreneurs Association (YGEA) asked on 24 October 2024 gold dealers not to escalate prices in the belief of misinformation.

Domestic gold prices have risen, tracking the uptick in global gold prices. Some unscrupulous people are manipulating the foreign exchange market because of the closure of Chinese borders. The statement revealed that the kyat depreciated at K4,750 against the US dollar on 24 October in the black market, pushing up the gold prices. There is widespread false information on social networks that gold price is expected to stay at K8 million per tical (0.578 ounce or 0.016 kilogramme) when the

dollar is stable in the local foreign exchange market. If the dollar gains against the kyat, the gold price is likely to soar up to K10 million per tical.

Consequently, YGEA requested gold dealers not to hike the gold prices because of malicious news, and their cooperation would be highly appreciated, YGEA stated.

YGEA urged gold shops to strictly adhere to the set reference prices when making gold transactions. The spot gold price hit a record high of \$2,740 per ounce, while the YGEA set the reference gold price at K5.6 million per tical on 25 October 2024. – NN/KK

They have delivered up to 102.24 tonnes of coffee beans to international markets as of

Wash hands with soap to control infectious diseases

INCE around 80 per cent of virus transmission from communicable diseases occurs through hand contact, individuals Not need to wash their hands carefully to reduce the spread of infectious diseases among people, as well as the risk of infection from clinics and hospitals. Hence, everybody needs to recognize that the hand-washing process is the best way to prevent the spread of infectious viruses among people.

Unclean hands can lead to outbreaks of diseases such as cholera. dysentery, diarrhoea, hepatitis, polio, and worm-borne diseases. Similarly, unclean skin can cause scabies, dandruff, itching, abscess-

es, and other conditions. The Ministry of Health frequently notes that these communicable diseases are not easy to treat, and people need to take proper preventive measures to avoid infection.

The World Health Organization (WHO) urges people in all parts of the world to prioritize proper hand-washing. However, the majority of people around the globe do not maintain appropriate hand hygiene, which can lead to various diseases. According to records, around 3.5 million children die each year due to diseases caused by a lack of hand-washing.

In 2018, statistics showed that one-fourth of the 40 per cent mortality rate among children under five years old in Myanmar was due to preventable diseases like cholera and pneumonia. These tragic outcomes were primarily attributed to the carelessness and lack of health knowledge among adults responsible for the children.

Surveys indicated that currency notes used daily in society can harbour E coli bacteria, highlighting the importance of washing hands thoroughly with soap after handling these currency notes. Proper hand-washing is an effective practice to prevent viral infections and save many lives. It is a simple yet powerful step for individuals. These surveys showed that hand-washing can reduce pneumonia infections by 23 per cent, diarrheal infections by 30-50 per cent, and respiratory tract infections by 20-45 per cent.

Actually, everyone needs to wash their hands carefully using the correct technique. Simply rinsing hands with water, without soap, and not taking enough time to wash their hands are not effective hand-washing practices. That is why hands should be washed for at least 20 seconds to remove viruses from their hands effectively.

Most viruses that cause communicable diseases are invisible, yet humans come into contact with them daily, often without realizing it. Therefore, it is essential to wash hands thoroughly with soap to prevent disease transmission. Everyone should be aware that clean hands significantly contribute to overall health.

Theemwe banana trade increases in Toungoo

DESPITE the supply shortage, Theemwe banana trade has increased in Bago Region's Toungoo Township.

Most banana farms located along the Sittoung River in Toungoo were destroyed by this year's flood, leading to a decrease in banana production. However, the trade of Theemwe bananas produced from the highland area has been good.

"Banana supply has been short here. All banana farms by the Sittoung River were covered in water, but others

located in the highland area were not affected. Banana prices have risen about one-fold this year compared to last year. This year's harvest season is late. At present, all bananas freshly harvested have been sold; the production is low. We grow Theemwe," said Ko Myo Min, a banana farmer in Toungoo.

Pheegyan banana, mainly grown in the highland area, was affected the least by the flood.

"Pheegyan banana farms were not

damaged much because they are located at the highland. The price is high. Banana production peaks in winter beyond Tazaungine. Theemwe price will be the same with this month over next months. Banana market was not good last year, but it is fine this year," he said. — Thit Taw/ZS

Thai climbing perch fish farmers increase amid handsome prices plus quick money

THERE are more breeders of Thai climbing perch as they are marketable in a short period, according to the fish hatchery market.

It is marketable in 90 days from breeding half-inch-size fishes, and a small-scale farmer can start a business from hundreds of thousands.

"Retailers farm catfish. The big businesspeople farm carp and river catfish. Lately, people have also been farming Thai climbing perch. These fish have a good price. If you breed small fish of five or four ticals, you can get more than K10,000 per viss at the market. You can earn within three months from the start of breeding. If you can feed them enough for 90 days, their weight can go up to four, five, six, seven, or eight ticals. People can start on a small scale. If you farm 1,000 fish, it will cost K250,000-K300,000. So, it is profitable in a small investment," said the official of Ko Zaw Moe fish hatchery in Kayan Township.

At present, carp, river catfish and pomfret are selling briskly in the fish hatchery market, and people from various regions are also buying Thai climbing perch, which is good for a short-term business.

"Currently, carp, river catfish and pomfret are selling well.

Thai climbing perch are quick to get money. Then river catfish is also profitable in a short time. The maximum time is two and a half to three months. Thai climbing perch is farmed in many regions, such as Mandalay, Nay Pyi Taw, Magway, and Ayeyawady. There are many breeders in Wakema, Eainme and Mawgyun. Such farmers have increased," he explained. — Thit Taw/ZN

Illegal trade crackdown seizes goods worth over K477M

EFFORTS to combat illegal trade, overseen by the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee, are being carried out effectively by the law.

On 22 and 24 October, the combined on-duty teams impounded industrial materials worth K44.770 million without official documents from three containers at the Asia World Port Terminal container checkpoint and a Yutong express bus (estimated value of K60 million), heading to Mandalay from Hpa-an, carrying foodstuffs valued at K6.4 million without official documents at the Mayanchaung permanent checkpoint. The action was conducted in line with Customs procedures.

Similarly, on 23 October, the combined teams conducted inspections with the seizure of five kinds of consumer goods and two kinds of industrial materials valued at K56.624 million without official documents from a warehouse at the Industrial Zone 1 in Hpa-an Township, three kinds of industrial materials worth K12.104 million without official documents from a warehouse in Thamanya area, industrial materials and two types of foodstuffs worth K9.216 million without official documents from a warehouse in a rubber plantation in Thamanya area, six kinds of industrial materials and foodstuffs worth K29.2 million from two warehouses in Tha-

manya area and a Mercedes Benz bus (estimated value of K70 million), travelling from Hpa-an to Mandalay, carrying two kinds of foodstuffs and six kinds of consumer goods valued at K45.564 million without official documents at the Thanlwin Bridge (Tayokhla side) combined checkpoint. The action was conducted as per Customs procedures. Furthermore, on 24 October, the combined team confiscated consumer goods worth K6.6 million that were smuggled and piled up by the side of the road over the Sinphyu border in Muse Township and industrial materials worth K11 million that were smuggled and piled up by the side of the bank in Kawthoung Township, following Customs procedures.


The combined on-duty teams managed by the Mandalay Region Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force captured a Nissan AD station wagon (estimated value of K29 million) heading to Mandalay from Muse, carrying five kinds of industrial materials worth K16.052 million at the 16th-Mile Kyaukchaw checkpoint and a Jin Bei mini-bus (estimated value of K45 million) that was parked carrying 21 types of consumer goods and 14 kinds of industrial materials worth K25.963 million in Paleik. The action was conducted according to Customs procedures.

Additionally, illegal timbers weighing 2.946 tonnes worth K1.178 million were seized from a vehicle (approximately K8.5 million) in Taikkyi Township. The action was taken under the Forest Law. Overall, from 22 to 24 October, 41 arrests were made, leading to the seizure of illegal items worth approximately K477 million. The Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee has reported that unlawful trade poses a significant obstacle to the country's economic development and significantly impacts the socioeconomic sector. Consequently, the committee has stated its commitment to intensifying efforts against illegal trade. - MNA/MKKS

Cambodia, China-ASEAN Information Harbour sign MoU to boost digital infrastructure, economy

The agreement seeks to leverage advanced digital infrastructure and technologies to promote economic development and improve the quality of life in the region.

CAMBODIA and the China-ASE-AN Information Harbour Co Ltd. (CAIH) have signed a memorandum of understanding (MoU) to boost technological innovation, digital infrastructure, and digital economy, said a news release on Thursday.

The deal was inked here on Wednesday between Cambodia's Ministry of Industry, Science, Technology & Innovation (MIS- TI) and the CAIH under the presence of MISTI's Undersecretary of State Hul Seingheng.

The MoU marks a significant step for Cambodia towards enhancing technological innovation and connectivity in the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN), the news release said.

"This agreement aims to leverage advanced digital infra-

structure and cutting-edge technologies to promote economic development and improve quality of life across the region," the news release said. Seingheng said the partnership builds on years of collaboration, which gained momentum after a MIS-TI delegation visited the CAIH in June 2024 and that the visit laid the groundwork for this formalized agreement. — Xinhua

India provided financial support to its neighbours much before IMF

UNION Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman has said that India provided financial support to its neighbours in times of distress with no conditions attached much before the International Monetary Fund (IMF) reached some countries in the neighbourhood.

While participating in a panel discussion on the 'Bretton Woods Institutions at 80: Priorities for the Next Decade', organized by the Centre for Global Development, Sitharaman spoke on how India has extended a line of credit to many African nations to build their institutions, bridges, secretariats and railway stations.

Pointing towards the slow process adopted by the IMF, she said, "Much before the IMFs of the world reach some countries in our neighbourhood and I'm not saying this with a sense of boast.

I'm saying it more with a sense of responsibility and again, sorry, I have no axe to grind with the IMF. But with no conditions attached, we have given sums of money, which I don't want to name here, number here, because my neighbours are very dear to me." - ANI

Stopping gas transit through Ukraine will increase European prices: Vulin

THE Ukrainian occupation of the Russian town of Sudzha and the possible cessation of gas transit through Ukraine may lead to higher gas prices in Europe, but Belgrade will not suffer thanks to a long-term contract with Moscow, Serbian Deputy Prime Minister Aleksandar Vulin said in an interview with Sputnik.

There is a gas metering station in Sudzha in the Kursk Region, through which Russian energy giant Gazprom supplies Russian gas for transit through Ukrainian territory.

"That can be a problem. That can be a problem for all of us, for entire Europe, not just for Serbia. But speaking [about it], we can do nothing about it. If you expect that Ukraine will listen to what Serbia said - no, it will not happen. But are we expecting [an] increase in price for gas? Yes, of course. But luckily, we have an agreement with Russia. So we will not be damaged by that," Vulin said on the sidelines of the BRICS summit, answering a relevant question. — SPUTNIK



Vietnam considers abolishing credit growth quota

THE State Bank of Vietnam is studying a roadmap to gradually abolish the credit growth quota policy following the National Assembly and the government's directions, Vietnam News cited the bank's Deputy Governor Pham Quang Dung as saying on Thursday.

Credit growth quota has been allocated to commercial banks in Vietnam since early this year.

Some banks registered high credit growth rates, even doubling the growth rate of the entire system, while some saw slow credit growth, even negative growth. This unevenness is a problem of the credit growth quota policy, Vietnam News reported. – Xinhua



Trump has threatened tariffs on imports to the United States if he wins a second term in office. This spells danger for industry in Germany, for which the United States is now the top trade partner.

US-German relations took a hit under Trump's 2017-2021 presidency. He berated it and other allies on trade issues and for what he said was insufficient spending on the NATO defence alliance.

"Companies with close economic ties to the USA in particular expect negative consequences if Trump wins the election," said Ifo researcher Andreas Baur. — AFP

New models help Renault maintain sales in third quarter

RENAULT said Thursday it managed to post an increase in third quarter revenue, weathering the overall slowdown in auto sales better than many rivals thanks in part to the introduction of new models.

Overall revenue at the French carmaker edged 1.8 per cent higher to 10.7 billion euros (\$11.6 billion) in the third quarter, although auto sales dipped 0.5 per cent to 9.3 billion.

The results beat analyst expectations.

"The product offensive is becoming visible," said the group's chief financial officer, Thierry Pieton.

Renault recently launched an electric version of its Scenic MPV and Symbioz and Rafale SUVs.

Its budget Dacia brand rolled out an updated version of its Duster SUV

After 10 new models in 2024, Renault plans to launch seven in 2025.

"This appealing and competitive line-up, with

both electric and ICE & hybrid vehicles, demonstrates our flexibility to adapt whatever the pace of EV transition and remains a key support for the Group's performance together with cost reduction," Renault said in a

statement. Renault shares revved more than seven per cent higher during morning trading on the Paris stock exchange.

Unlike other automakers, Renault maintained its 2024 financial guidance of a group operating margin of 7.5 percent or higher and a free cash flow 2.5 billion euros or higher. — AFP

SOUTH Korea's biggest automaker Hyundai Motor logged its record third-quarter revenue thanks to strong demand in domestic and North American markets as well as favourable currency rates, the company said Thursday.

Revenue increased 4.7 per cent from a year earlier to 42.93 trillion won (US\$31.1 billion) in the July-September quarter, marking the highest third-quarter figure in the carmaker's history.

S Korea's Hyundai Motor logs record

Hyundai sold 1,011,808 units across the world in the third quarter, down 3.2 per cent compared to the same quarter of last year.

Despite the overall sales decrease, the reve-

nue gained ground on the back of stronger demand for high-end vehicles and favourable currency rates. Hyundai's domestic automotive sales rose 1.8 per cent to 169,901 units, and sales in North America grew 9.3 per cent to 300,319 units.

Sales of electrified models, including hybrids, plug-in hybrids, battery

electric vehicles and fuel cell electric vehicles, jumped 19.5 per cent to 201,849 units.

German Chancellor Olaf Scholz emphasized the potential for a thriving partnership in skilled labour and sustainable technologies, marking a significant milestone in the 25-year collaboration between India and Germany.

AFTER meeting with PM Narendra Modi, German Chancellor Olaf Scholz said that Germany supported India's stance on peace and stability in the region.

Spokesperson of the Ministry of External Affairs, Randhir Jaiswal said on Thursday that PM Modi and Scholz's valuable guidance on India-Germany B2B engagements is critical to scaling up the partnership.

Chancellor Olaf Scholz emphasized Germany's respect for a rules-based international order and commended India's commitment to achieving lasting peace, particularly in South Asia. Scholz highlighted the urgency of achieving a ceasefire and a political process leading to a two-state solution in the Middle East, while also advocating for the freedom of maritime trade in the Indo-Pacific.

Rice prices hit record rise as inflation key issue in Japan election

TOKYO rice prices in October soared a record 62.3 per cent from a year ago, government data showed Friday, as rising living costs have become a key issue in Japan's general election being held this weekend.

The surge in rice prices, the largest increase since comparable data became available in 1971, comes as farmers pass rising labor and fertilizer costs on to consumers. Rice prices have been trending upward in recent months, particularly in urban areas, also due to short

With little time to rest, he has been a shadow of himself after playing 69 games for club and country last term.

But Guardiola hopes his second goal this season in Wednesday's 5-0 rout of Sparta Prague in the Champions League was a sign he is finally getting back in the groove.

"I'm not concerned at all about how long it takes. When he is fine he will get it. He is a natural, incredible talent who solves the game for himself," Guardiola told reporters on Friday.

Russia's State Duma ratifies Russia–N Korea comprehensive strategic partnership treaty

Russia and North Korea during a plenary session on Thursday.

Russian President Vladimir Putin submitted to the Russian State Duma a bill to ratify the Comprehensive Strategic Partnership Treaty between Russia and North Korea earlier in October.

The Treaty on Comprehensive Strategic Partnership between Russia and North Korea, which provides for mutual military assistance, is defensive and is not directed against third countries, Russian Deputy Foreign Minister Andrey Rudenko said on Thursday.

The document includes the provision of mutual military assistance "in accordance with Article 51 of the UN Charter in the event that one of the parties is attacked by any state, thus finding itself in a state of war," the diplomat said during his address to the lower house.

"The content of the mentioned article clearly indicates that the treaty is defensive in nature, is not directed against the security of third countries, and is aimed at maintaining stability in the Northeast Asian region," Rudenko said. — SPUTNIK The treaty includes provisions for mutual military assistance in accordance with Article 51 of the UN Charter, applicable in the event of an attack on either party.

Venice to continue tourist entry fee in 2025

VENICE authorities said Thursday they would extend to next year a controversial experimental system that charges day tourists an entry fee to visit the floating city.

Considered one of the most beautiful cities on

the planet, Venice is a top tourist destination — but is drowning under the droves of sightseers who visit each year.

A trial of entry fees for day visitors began in April, when tourists who were not staying overnight in hotels were required for the first time to buy a five-euro (\$5.4) ticket for entry into the UNESCO World Heritage site.

Bolivia joining BRICS as partner nation

BRICS member states have approved Bolivia's admission to the organization as a partner nation, Bolivian President Luis Arce said on Friday.

The Bolivian president added that this step represented

"Next year it will start on 18 April and will be active on 54 specific days," Brugnaro wrote on social media.

Tourists who book at least four days in advance will pay 5 euros, while last-minute bookings will increase to 10 euros. Venice's Mayor Brugnaro describes this as a "first step" to manage tourist flows and encourage visitors to choose less crowded times. — AFP the most significant achievement of Bolivian foreign policy, with the results being multidimensional.

"Our Plurinational State of Bolivia is taking a fundamental step towards its entry into BRICS, having been informed of the acceptance of the member states to become an associated state," Arce wrote on Telegram.

Russian President Vladimir Putin said earlier that BRICS member states had agreed on a list of partner states during the summit in Russia's Kazan.

The BRICS Summit was held in Kazan from 22-24 October. The event focused on strengthening multilateralism, integrating new members of the bloc and addressing regional challenges. On Wednesday, the leaders of the BRICS member states issued a joint declaration. – SPUTNIK
