

Two-day illegal trade crackdown seizes goods worth K1.058B

UNDER the supervision of the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee, efforts to combat the illicit trade continue effectively by the law.

On 30 October and 1 November, the combined teams seized four kinds of industrial materials worth K858.495 million without official documents from 16 containers at the Asia World Port Terminal container checkpoint, a Hino Profia truck (estimated value of K30 million), heading to Yangon from Tachilek, carrying auto parts valued at K16 million without official documents at the Ywathagyi Dry Port and a Scania express bus (estimated value of K70 million), travelling from Mawlamvine to Yangon, carrying foodstuffs (approximately K6 million) without official document at the Mayanchaung permanent checkpoint. The action was conducted as per Customs procedures.

Similarly, on 1 November, the combined teams conduct-

ed inspections, resulting in the seizures of a Hino Ranger truck (estimated valued at K25 million) carrying two kinds of industrial materials and consumer goods worth K9.7 million without official documents at the Yetha temporary vehicle checkpoint, a Mitsubishi Canter truck (estimated value of K30 million) that was parked carrying foodstuffs worth K10 million without official documents in Bago and illegal teak weighing 0.606 tonne, illegal hardwood weighing 4.357 tonnes and other timbers weighing 1.004 tonnes worth K3.239 million in Bago, Nyaunglebin and Thayawady Districts. The action was taken under the Forest Law and Customs procedures.

The Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee reported 16 arrests on 30 October and 1 November, seizing illegal goods worth approximately K1.058 billion. — MNA/ **MKKS**

Myanmar migrant workers to receive EV import permits for 25% income remittance

MYANMAR overseas workers who transferred 25 per cent of their income to local authorized banks will be granted import permits for electric vehicles (EVs) and electric motorcycles, the Myanmar Embassy in Bangkok, Thailand, notified on 31 October.

Myanmar migrant workers in Thailand can now easily remit foreign-sourced income to their families through formal financial institutions.

Central Bank of Myanmar announced lists of companies with remittance business licences, authorized banks and their international banking partners on its website www.cbm.gov.mm.

The exchange rates for inward remittance are declared on the websites of authorized banks with foreign exchange licences, and the banks also offer the cheapest banking service fees, as per the statement.

Myanmar citizens, including seafarers who transfer foreign earnings to local banks, are eligible to import one electric vehicle (EV) valued at up to five per cent of an annual remittance exceeding US\$200,000. Except for those receiving monthly salaries, others were allowed to import electric vehicles or electric motorcycles, which is equivalent to five per cent of the remittance if they made inward remittance worth \$50,000 per year.

If an individual's remittance does not meet the amount of the EV or electric motorcycles, they can import them collectively. Individuals can enquire about details through 067 3408433 and email dottraining2008@gmail.com of the related department. - NN/KK





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Myanmar delegation attends 17th HLTF-ACV Meeting in Vietnam

THE Myanmar delegation led by Dr Wah Wah Maung, Eminent Person (EP) of Myanmar for the High-Level Task Force on ASEAN Community's Post-2025 Vision and Deputy Minister for Investment and Foreign **Economic Relations attended** the 17th Meeting of High-Level Task Force on ASEAN Community's Post-2025 Vision (17th HLTF-ACV) and the Regional Consultation on Reviewing ASE-**AN Community Blueprints 2025** and Charting Directions for 2045, which were held in Hoi An, Vietnam, on 28 October-2 November 2024, accompanied by two officials from the Department of ASEAN Affairs, Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Drafting sessions of the High-Level Representatives were also held on the sideline of the 17th HLTF-ACV Meeting, and the third reading concluded with 92.9 per cent completion of the draft of the ASEAN Political and Security Community (APSC) Strategic Plan.

The 17th HLTF-ACV Meeting was co-chaired by Mr Chatoulong Bouasisavath, Eminent Person (EP) of Lao PDR as the ASEAN Chair and Mr Dato' Zainuddin Yahya, Eminent Person (EP) of Malaysia, as the permanent shepherd Member State, and it was attended by Eminent Persons, High-Level Representatives and officials from ASEAN Member States as well as ASE-

At the Meeting, the HLTF-ACV had an interface with the ASEAN Coordinating Centre for Humanitarian Assistance on Disaster Management (AHA Centre) and the Centre for Strategic Studies and International Relations Development (CSSD). The respective stakeholders have updated their works and contributions to the ASEAN Community Vision 2045, shared the priorities and challenges to be addressed in the future ahead and provided their recommendations. The Meeting exchanged views on the emerging challenges and

recommendations made by the respective stakeholders on the development of the APSC Strategic Plan in a friendly, cordial and candid manner.

At the Regional Consultation hosted by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Vietnam, the HLTF-ACV also had a candid discussion with representatives of the **ASEAN Economic Community** (AEC), Ad Hoc Working Group on the Development of ASE-AN Socio-Cultural Community (ASCC) Post-2025 Strategic Plan, and the ASEAN Connectivity Coordinating Committee (ACCC) on the implementation progress of the ASEAN Community Blueprints 2025, and exchanged views on matters arising during crafting respective Strategic Plans and work progress. The Regional Consultation was convened with the objective of coming up with innovative ideas and a way forward for the implementation of the ASEAN Community Vision 2045 based on the best practices, experiences and lessons learned in the implementation of the ASEAN Community 2025.

During the 17th HLTF-ACV Meeting and the Regional Consultation, MIFER Deputy Minister Dr Wah Wah Maung commended the overall implementation status of the three ASEAN Community Blueprints, which stands above 95 per cent of completion on average. She stressed the importance of the

implementation of the blueprints, which is not to be merely ensured at the superficial level but to be beneficial at the grassroots level for all peoples of ASEAN. Afterwards, the vision of "people-centred and people-oriented ASEAN" laid down by ASEAN Leaders will be effectively realized. Moreover, the deputy minister highlighted the need to link the national priorities of each ASEAN Member State with the ASEAN's regional action plans and programmes to promote the efficient and effective realization of the ASEAN Community Vision 2045. Besides, she underscored the principles of equity and inclusivity in the implementation of the projects and programmes of the ASE-AN Community Vision 2045, as well as the necessity for further strengthening the "ASEAN Centrality" through consolidating the ASEAN's principles such as cohesiveness, unity and mutual respect.

Among the successful outcomes of the Meeting, the 17th HLTF-ACV agreed to continue to discuss the APSC Strategic Plan at the upcoming 18th and 19th HLTF-ACV meetings with a goal to finalize it together with other Strategic Plans as well as all Strategic Plans to be adopted at the 46th ASEAN Summit which will be hosted by Malaysia in 2025. — MNA

Continuous education project advances with 45 study groups

CONTINUOUS education, which includes three programmes — strengthening the habit of reading, establishing networks to increase income, and providing knowledge for overall well-being — is being implemented in designated townships in the Nay Pyi Taw Union Territory, as well as in Ayeyawady Region and Shan State (East).

As part of the implementation of continuous education in Nay Pyi Taw, the Ministry of Education and the Nay Pyi Taw Council have collaborated to train 45 study groups involving 449 students, supported by 107 volunteer demonstrators and supervisors. The area along the cumulonimbus clouds movement, the weather phenomena such as strong winds accompanied with rain, thunder, lightning and hail may occur and therefore it is recommended to be aware in advance these phenomena.

STATE OF THE SEA: Sea will be slight to moderate in Myanmar waters. Wave height will be about 3-6 feet off and along Myanmar Coasts.

OUTLOOK FOR SUBSEQUENT TWO DAYS: Likelihood of slight decrease of night temperatures in Shan and Chin states.

EU donates US\$1.34M for flood relief through WFP

ACCORDING to a joint statement released on 31 October by the World Food Programme (WFP) and the European Union (EU), the EU has announced an additional funding contribution of €1.2 million (equivalent to US\$1.34 million) to the WFP to support the people of Myanmar battered by

flooding.


The statement notes that approximately 13.3 million people in Myanmar are currently facing food insecurity, with 2.7 million experiencing severe food insecurity, while the prices of basic food commodities have increased by 50 per cent compared to last year.

As a result, the EU's additional funding of €1.2 million (or \$1.34 million) to the WFP is aimed at assisting these vulnerable populations. WFP will work closely with local NGOs and its staff to ensure that assistance reaches those affected by the flooding directly. — ASH/TMT

Bay of Bengal low pressure may bring heavy rain to Shan State on 6-7 Nov

DUE to a possible low-pressure area in the Bay of Bengal, there is a likelihood of high rainfall in Shan State on 6 and 7 November, said meteorologist U Win Naing. It is forecast to rain around two inches in Shan State; however, it is just one-third of the rain in the last flood, and there is no danger level, he said.

"Due to the impact of the low-pressure area, it will rain on 6 and 7 November in 24 hours in northern and southern Ayeyawady and Yangon regions and later in Nay Pyi Taw, Magway, Mandalay and southern Sagaing Regions, but rainfall will be just above an inch. But rainfall will be high, above 60 millimetres or around two inches in eastern Myanmar, Shan State," he said.

According to updated data at noon today, a low-pressure area forming southwest of the Bay of Bengal has become strong but is not certain to transform into a depression.

"It is the latest update issued at around 1:45 pm today.

The low-pressure area will start from the whirlwind and become strong, but becoming into depression is not sure. It will go to the Arabian Sea after passing west India and the edge of western most of Sri Lanka Island," U Win Naing added. — Thit Taw/ZS

Myanmar rubber exports projected to hit 320,000 tonnes in 2024-25FY

MYANMAR aims to meet a rubber export target of 326,000 tonnes in the current financial year 2024-2025 beginning 1 April, according to the Myanmar Rubber Planters and Producers Association.

Myanmar has conveyed around 100,000 tonnes of rubber so far. Myanmar's annual rubber production is estimated at 300,000 tonnes. Seventy per cent of rubber produced in Myanmar goes to China. It is also shipped to Singapore, Indonesia, Malaysia, Vietnam, the Republic of Korea, India, Japan, and other countries.

Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry,

Myanmar Rice Federation, Myanmar Pulses, Beans, Maize and Sesame Seeds Merchants Association, Myanmar Garment Manufacturers Association, Myanmar Industries Association, Myanmar Rubber Planters and Producers Association and Myanmar Fisheries Processors and Exporters Association are exerting concerted efforts to meet the export target and tackle challenges in export.

Global demand for rubber, rubber production in Southeast Asian nations, and the market supply influence Myanmar's rubber prices.

Rubber is commonly cultivated in Mon and Kayin states and Taninthayi,

Bago, and Yangon regions in Myanmar. As per 2018-2019 rubber season data, there are over 1.628 million acres of rubber plantations in Myanmar, with Mon

Brisk sales of pigeon peas at Mandalay market

THERE is a roaring trade of Myanmar's agricultural produce (pigeon pea) in Mandalay market, Mandalay traders said.

Newly harvested pigeon peas will start flowing into the market in December. Foreign solid demand drove the sales up in the Mandalay market. The pigeon peas fetch a handsome price as well," said U Soe Win Myint, a depot owner in Mandalay.

"The old stocks of pigeon peas are in high demand in the market. The growers have already cultivated pigeon peas. Fresh new ones will enter the market soon. Pakokku's pigeon peas are of high quality in central Myanmar, and pigeon peas from Kayah State are also of good quality in the mountainous region.

Thanks to the favourable region, a good yield of pigeon peas is expected. Pigeon pea production is designated for exports as it has grasped a firm foreign market share in India.

Furthermore, Nepal, Bangladesh, and Pakistan purchase Myanmar's pigeon peas every year. It is a winter crop. Sown acreage of pigeon pea plantation might increase in 2025 on account of high prices. It is the third main crop that generates foreign incomes," he elaborated.

There are three types of pigeon peas produced in Myanmar. They are commonly cultivated in central Myanmar regions (Mandalay, Magway and Sagaing regions). They are also found in Kayah, Shan, and Chin states.

Growers are advised to ramp up pigeon pea production by increasing the number of acres. — Min Htet Aung (Mandalay Sub-Printing House)/KK

Sustain polio immunization for the safety of children

LTHOUGH the World Health Organization has declared that the world is free from polio, the disease can still resurge in remote areas where children lack access to the polio vaccine and where health authorities are absent. Therefore, all families with children need to be vigilant about the potential dangers of a polio outbreak.

Since 1988, the global outbreak of polio has declined by more than 99 per cent. The number of polio cases dropped from 350,000 at that time to just six in 2021, according to the WHO. However, the organization has noted that individuals in Pakistan and Afghanistan remain at risk for poliovirus transmission. Additionally, some countries that have declared themselves polio-free continue to report new cases of the virus.

On 27 March 2024, the WHO declared Myanmar a polio-free country. However, due to lapses in immunization efforts, particularly in remote areas, polio has reap-

peared among children. In June 2019, a derived Poliovirus Type 1 was detected in a child residing in Papun Township, Kayin State. In response, the Department of Public Health initiated extensive immunization campaigns in 12 townships to curb the spread of the infection.

Polio can be effectively controlled through the immunization of children with the oral polio vaccine. It is essential for parents to ensure that their children receive this vaccination consistently to prevent infection from the polio virus. Moreover, people need to raise their health knowledge and awareness about polio infection measures and ways to avoid the infection of such a virus with the help of health staff. In fact, polio is caused by a highly contagious virus, and oral polio immunization is crucial for keeping Myanmar's children safe from infection.

Online applicants can collect test vouchers for Dec 2024 JLPT examination

THE JLPT Examination Organizing Committee of the Myanmar Association of Japan Alumni (MAJA) has informed that those who have applied online for the December 2024 JLPT examination will be able to collect their test vouchers from 1 November.

On the examination day, test vouchers printed in colour must be brought. It cannot be shown over the phone, and test vouchers can be accessed and retrieved from the website link: https://jlpt-maja.org.mm/.

To extract a test voucher, the applicant needs to copy the above link first, open it in the browser, click the login button, fill in the login ID and password, click the application data button, and click the "Download all PDF" button.

The test voucher consists of three pages, and the number, date, time and place to take the examination are described on page 1, and the test centre location map is on page 3. All three pages must be printed out and brought.

It is necessary to keep the Application Form (Form C) and to view the online result; students must enter the 8-digit passcodes that were filled in Form C. If the login ID is not remembered, the applicant can enter "Login" > "Forget Password & Login ID", input the email address, and click on "Show Login ID" to get it.

If the applicant does not have any of the identification cards (original) such as national scrutiny card (either 10 or 18 years old), valid passport, valid driver's licence (motorcycle licence with no date of birth is not valid), birth certificate (only for those under 10), religious identification cards (only for novice, monk, nun), along with the test voucher print on the day of the examination, they will not be allowed to take the examination, it said. — MT/ZN

AI to accelerate new deposit discoveries, boost efficiency, Saudi Minister affirms

THE 8th Future Investment Initiative conference was held in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, on 29-31 October dubbed 'Infinite Horizons: Investing Today, Shaping Tomorrow'.

Saudi Arabia's Minister of Industry and Mineral Resources Bandar Alkhorayef highlighted the importance of developing all sectors of economy in an interview with Sputnik on the sidelines of the 8th Future Investment Initiative conference. "For the past 70 years, our economy has been based on oil and gas. And we have achieved great success in this field. But we need to move on. According to [the] Vision 2030 project, we will launch and develop other sectors of our economy, including mining. We are already engaged in research, and we are launching a programme of extensive geological surveys. This is a new direction for us, we have not

US job growth slowed drastically in October, hit temporarily by hurricanes and labor strikes, in

The world's biggest economy added 12,000 jobs last month, far below expectations and down from a revised 223,000 in September, said the Department of Labour. The unemployment rate was unchanged at 4.1 per cent.

The hiring and unemployment data will be scrutinized by the teams of both presidential candidates — Democrat Kamala Harris and Republican Donald Trump — but employment numbers would have been higher if not for devastating hurricanes and worker strikes. — AFP

UK budget brings 50-year record tax hike in pursuit of stability

THE British government unveiled its much-anticipated budget on Wednesday, aiming to bring more certainty to the country's economy through increased borrowing and one of the largest tax hikes in five decades.

Market reactions were mixed: Britain's domestically-focused FTSE 250 index rose by one per cent initially after Chancellor Rachel Reeves' address before levelling out. Meanwhile, the 10-year gilt yield hit a high of 4.362 per cent, indicating concerns about government debt and spending, though some economists suggested the global interest rates might be influencing the rise more than domestic policy.

Bolivia's breadbasket squeezed by pro-Morales blockades

IN Cochabamba, Bolivia, farmer Damaris Masias watches in despair as 10 tonnes of her tomatoes, which she fought to transport through roadblocks, are discarded.

These blockades, instigated by supporters of ex-president Evo Morales to protest against his potential arrest on rape charges, have turned an eighthour journey from her hometown of Omereque into a nine-day struggle, leading to the rotting of her produce.

Since 14 October, when Morales was accused of rape, politi-

cal tensions have escalated. The former president, who denies the allegations, claims to be a victim of political persecution.

In response to the blockades, President Luis Arce ordered an immediate cessation, citing the blockades' estimated cost of over \$1.7 billion and their damaging effects on food and fuel prices. With 24 roadblocks established across the country, food producers are now resorting to air transport to save their goods, leading to long queues at the state airline's parcel office.

Nvidia to join Dow Jones Industrial Average, replacing Intel

Nvidia will join the Dow Jones Industrial Average on 8 November replacing Intel, highlighting the growing significance of artificial intelligence in the US economy.

CHIP giant Nvidia will join the Dow Jones Industrial Average, the iconic Wall Street index announced Friday, underscoring the importance of artificial intelligence in the US economy. The addition of Nvidia, which will take effect on 8 November, also marks a historic moment for the semiconductor industry, as the AI chip leader replaces

struggling rival Intel, which has been on the Dow index since 1999.

S&P Dow Jones Indices, the company that runs the index, also said it would add paint manufacturer Sherwin-Williams, replacing chemical giant Dow.


Shares of Nvidia have climbed over 180 per cent this year as tech giants clamour for its powerful and high cost processors that power generative AI, the technology that is widely seen as the next phase of innovation.

Intel, one of Silicon Valley's most iconic companies, has seen its shares fall 50 per cent so far this year as the company struggles to meet the AI boom.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average, created

by Charles Dow in 1896, is often used as a bellwether for the state of the US stock market, the biggest in the world.

Unlike the S&P500 that weighs companies by market capitalization, the 30-stock Dow is price-weighted, meaning higher-priced stocks have more influence on its movements. — AFP

Indonesia adds Google Pixel phones to ban list with iPhone 16

INDONESIA has banned the sale of Google Pixel phones over the tech giant's failure to meet investment regulations, its industry ministry said, days after blocking sales of Apple's iPhone 16. Jakarta is seeking to boost investment from foreign tech companies with restrictive measures that require their phones to be 40 per cent sourced from parts in Indonesia.

"We declared that as

long as those products don't... meet the scheme we have required, they cannot be sold in Indonesia," industry ministry spokesperson Febri Hendri Antoni Arif told a press briefing Thursday. "For Google Pixel, they have not obtained the TKDN certificate," he added, using the acronym of the scheme that imposes the 40 percent rule. Google Indonesia did not immediately respond to an AFP request for comment. — AFP

ExxonMobil profits dip as it gives back almost US\$10 bln to investors

ExxonMobil reported a dip in third-quarter profits Friday on lower earnings from its refining business, but the results were strong enough to enable nearly US\$10 billion in shareholder distributions.

The big US oil company, which saw upstream oil production rise following its acquisition of Pioneer Natural Resources, pointed to the benefits of \$11.3 billion in "structural cost savings" as a driver of the results.

The oil giant returned \$9.8 billion to investors in the three-month period, up from \$9.5 billion in the second quarter. ExxonMobil lifted the dividend by four per cent, in addition to making share repurchases.

Net profits in the third quarter were \$8.6 billion, down 5.1 per cent from the year-ago period.

While earnings were higher in upstream and chemical products, ExxonMobil saw a big drop in energy products results due to weakened refinery margins. – AFP

Heavy rain briefly halts all Tokyo-Hakata shinkansen bullet trains

HEAVY rain briefly halted all shinkansen bullet train services between Hakata in southwestern Japan and Tokyo on Saturday morning, with the weather agency urging caution as the intense rainfall is forecast to continue during the first half of the three-day weekend. The Japan Meteorological Agency said atmospheric conditions are likely to be unstable in the west on Saturday and

in the east the following day, warning of the risk of landslides, overflowing rivers, lightning strikes and tornadoes.

JR West, the operator of the Sanyo Shinkansen Line, said rain gauges in some sections had reached their maximum levels for safe operation, adding services resumed later Saturday after safety checks were completed.

Russia's pipeline gas exports to Europe rise 15%

In 2023, Russia's gas exports to Europe via Ukraine reached 12.85 billion cubic metres, increasing 7%.

RUSSIA'S pipeline gas exports to Europe rose by over 15 per cent to 26.52 billion cubic metres in the first 10 months this year, Russia's TASS news agency reported on Saturday.

For the entire year of 2023, the figure amounted to about 28.15 billion cubic metres, said the report.

In the first 10 months this year, Russia's pipeline gas exports to Western and Central Europe via Ukraine totalled 12.85 billion cubic metres, up by seven per cent year on year.

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky announced that Ukraine would not renew its transit agreement with Russia's gas giant Gazprom, which is set to expire at the end of this year. Experts suggest EU countries may secure Russian gas through auctions and capacity bookings despite tensions. — Xinhua

Roof collapse in Novi Sad kills 12

SEVERAL people were killed Friday after part of an outdoor roof collapsed at a train station in the Serbian city of Novi Sad.

The death toll from the roof collapse in Novi Sad has risen to 12, according to Serbian Interior Minister Ivica Dacic, who warned that the number could increase. Three individuals pulled from the debris are in serious condition, with two undergoing surgery. Rescue operations remain ongoing

and challenging, involving over 80 responders and heavy machinery.

The Serbian government announced an official day of mourning on Saturday, and the Blood Transfusion Institute urged residents to donate blood.

Prime Minister Milos Vucevic emphasized the need for an investigation into the accident's cause, expressing condolences to the victims' families. — AFP

Strasbourg university cuts ties with Israeli institution

A French university has severed ties with an Israeli higher education institution accusing it of "warmongering" stances over the Gaza war, French media has reported, sparking criticism from Paris.

The move comes after students at several French universities have, like some of their peers in the United States, protested or held sit-ins demanding a ceasefire in Gaza over the past year.

The Political Studies Institute in Strasbourg severed ties with Israel's Reichman University due to perceived warmongering stances related to the Gaza conflict.

Students and faculty initiated the decision, criticizing the university's lack of a humanist perspective. Despite opposition from the institute's director, a board vote led to the split. – AFP

THE DUBAI POLICE has announced the establishment of the 'Digital Transformation and Artificial Intelligence Council', which aims to accelerate digital transformation within the force by enhancing digital capabilities and boosting global competitiveness.

The Council will be overseen by Lieutenant-General Abdullah Khalifa Al Marri, Commander-in-Chief of Dubai Police, and chaired by Major-General Khaled Nasser Al Razooqi, Director of the General Department of Artificial Intelligence, with Brigadier Turki Abdul Rahman Bin Fares serving as Deputy Chairperson.

The Council will also include senior officers from various departments and police stations and representatives of private technology companies.

Al Razooqi emphasised that the Council's establishment aligns with the Dubai Digital Strategy, which aims to digitise life in Dubai. – ANI

US repatriated over 1,100 Indian nationals in 2024

THE UNITED STATES repatriated over 1,100 Indian nationals in fiscal year 2024, which concluded at the end of September, marking a notable rise in deportations of Indian nationals over recent years, according to US Assistant Secretary for Border and Immigration Policy Royce Bernstein Murray.

"In fiscal year 2024 which just concluded at the end of September, the United States repatriated over 1,100 Indian nationals. That has been part of a steady increase of removals from the United States of Indian nationals over the past few years, which corresponds with a general increase in encounters that we have seen of Indian nationals in the last few years as well," Murray said during a media briefing on Tuesday.

This cooperation with India aims to reduce irregular migration and human smuggling. She warned that unlawful entry into the US carries serious consequences. — ANI

Additionally, the initiative seeks to pool expertise worldwide and establish a cooperative paradigm to tackle common challenges faced by humanity, according to the CAS, China's top institution in terms of natural sciences.

Philippines' Tropical Storm Trami death toll reaches 110

AFTER Tropical Storm Trami swept through the Philippines, leaving hundreds of thousands displaced, rescue teams are diving into lakes and combing isolated villages to locate people still unaccounted for.

Rescuers in the Philippines searched a lake and scoured isolated villages on Sunday to locate dozens of missing people as the death toll from Tropical Storm Trami hit 110.

Typhoon Trami struck the Philippines on 24 October displacing over half a million people and causing at least 110 fatalities. President Ferdinand Marcos pledged ongoing support for affected regions, particularly in Camarines Sur, as rescue efforts continue amid missing persons reports. – AFP

IN the 2024-25 AFC Challenge League, Myanmar's Shan United ended the group stage on top, progressing to the quarterfinals following a 2-2 draw with Chinese Taipei's Tainan City yesterday at Thuwunna Youth Training Centre. Both teams had already qualified for the next round, but the draw allowed Shan United to advance as group winners.

Shan United, adjusting their lineup from the previous match against Laos, faced an early challenge as Tainan City's Matheus Port to scored in 12 minutes. In the second half, Shan United raised their offensive pressure, with Ye Yint Aung scoring in 70 minutes to give them a brief lead. However, Tainan City's

WHAT Olympic legacy has Paris 2024 left on France? More profoundly, he sees the legacy as an unprecedented surge in sports enthusiasm across the country.

"France already had a rich sports culture, but hosting the Paris Olympics brought this enthusiasm to a new height," Lappartient said in an interview with Xinhua.

"In a post-Olympics survey, 82 per cent of French people expressed a positive attitude towards hosting the Games. More tangibly, our sports clubs and associations have seen a 20 per cent increase in registrations across various disciplines." — Xinhua

Yangon Region to compete in 24 sports at 5th National Sports Festival


YANGON Region will participate in 24 sports at the upcoming 5th National Sports Festival, according to the Department of Sports and Physical Education. After hosting the Yangon Region Sports Festival from 14 to 24 September 2024, outstanding athletes have been selected for intensive training camps to win medals in all events and target at least one-third of the top awards.

Yangon's strengths include swimming, Taekwondo, futsal, and table tennis, alongside other sports. Training is held at 15 locations across the region, divided by sport, with athletes training daily except weekends. The festival aims to foster new talent for Myanmar's participation in the 33rd Southeast Asian Games in Thailand in 2025. "This national festival is essential for developing the next generation

of athletes and preparing them for the SEA Games, making it an important event for our teams and the country," said U Kyaw Min Than, Director of Yangon Region Department of Sports and Physical Education.

In total, 620 representatives from Yangon Region, including officials, coaches, and athletes, will participate in the festival. Myanmar held national sports festivals in 1992, 1994, 1997, and 2015. This Fifth National Sports Festival, organized under the State Administration Council, will be held in Nay Pyi Taw from 9 to 20 December 2024 to revitalize Myanmar's sports standards. The event will feature six sports from various ministries, 23 sports from regional levels, and para-sports, with over 200 medals awarded. — Arkar Lin/ **KZL**

Planned Mt Fuji light rail line to transport 3 mln hikers per year

proposed light rail transit service connecting the foot of Mount Fuji to its 5th station would be capable of transporting 3.36 million passengers annually, a recent report by a local government showed.

Yamanashi Prefecture is proposing a double-track line operating two-car trains every six minutes for 10 hours per day to disperse the summer influx of tourists while reducing vehicle emissions, according to its interim report.

The line would run along the Fuji Subaru Line, the toll road to the 5th station that serves as the starting point to one of the mountain's most popular hiking trails.

The prefecture projects capital investment would total 148.6

The plan includes a double-track line with two-car trains running every six minutes for 10 hours daily, aimed at managing summer tourist traffic and reducing emissions.

billion yen (\$970 million), deeming it optimal for the prefectural government to construct the tracks while a private company operates the trains.

Assuming three million passengers per year at 10,000 yen per person, the transit system is expected to yield a profit of 184.8 billion yen for the prefecture and 420.7 billion yen for the operator

over a 40-year period, according to the report. Due to opposition from local residents, the prefecture plans to outline the project's future direction by the end of the year after receiving feedback.

100 couples tie knot in mass wedding ceremony in N Afghanistan

Economic challenges, high dowries, and unemployment often delay weddings in Afghanistan.

AROUND 200 grooms and brides tied the knot at a mass wedding event in northern Afghanistan's Sari Pul province on Friday, the provincial information and culture department said in a statement on Saturday.

The ceremony was funded by a wealthy individual, and each newlywed received household appliances valued at about US\$600, the statement added.

Unemployment, the economic crisis, the high cost of lavish dowries and expensive gifts often force young people to wait for years to hold their wedding ceremonies in the impoverished country.

The Afghan caretaker government has called on people to prevent irrational marriage customs and avoid wasting money on wedding ceremonies. — Xinhua

French brushmakers pivot to luxury markets for survival

Facing rising costs, French brushmakers are shifting to luxury markets to preserve their craft and attract a new clientele.

FRENCH brushmakers are adapting to survive rising costs and the threat of extinction of their centuries-old craft by shifting focus to luxury and niche markets. Daniel Desjardins, who operates a family workshop that has produced brushes since

1834, emphasizes that competition from cheaper synthetic alternatives and imports from Eastern Europe poses significant challenges.

"It's becoming a lost craft," he laments, as the industry struggles to attract younger artisans.



The brushmaking tradition flourished in the northern Oise valley, benefiting from proximity to Paris, but has dwindled drastically.

Frederic Brigaud notes that in his grandfather's time, there were 12 brush shops in his village; now only three remain in all of France. These surviving manufacturers are pivoting toward high-end clients, including luxury shoemakers like Berluti and Weston, which Desjardins credits as crucial for their survival. — AFP
