Indonesia becomes Myanmar's largest rice trading partner from Apr to Oct

NDONESIA is the top importer of Myanmar's rice, with over 360,000 tonnes in the past seven months of the current financial year 2024-2025, beginning 1 April, according to the Myanmar Rice Federation (MRF).

China is the second largest importer of Myanmar rice with over 276,400 tonnes, followed by 219,400 tonnes to Belgium, over 114,700 tonnes to the Philippines, over 44,300 to Senegal, 30,000 to Spain, over 27,100 to Cameroon, over 26,500 to Mozambique, 17,500 to the Netherlands, over 13,900 to Ivory Coast, over 13,300 to Italy and over 12,300 to Poland.

Myanmar's rice and broken rice exports hit over 1.36 million tonnes in the past seven months of the current financial year 2024-2025, beginning 1 April, with an estimated value of \$647 million, according to statistics from the Myanmar Rice Federation (MRF).

The federation aims to achieve 2.5 million tonnes of rice exports in the 2024-2025 financial year (April-March).

The Ministry of Commerce has been cooperating with departments and institutions concerned to achieve export targets and beyond depending on the supply volume of rice, broken rice, pulses, corn, rubber and fisheries from the respective companies.

The Ministry of Commerce is working together with the Union of Myanmar and Industry, Myanmar Rice Federa- export targets and facilitate exports.


tion, Myanmar Pulses, Beans, Maize and Sesame Seeds Merchants Association, Myanmar Garment Manufacturers Association, Myanmar Industries Association, Myanmar Rubber Planters and Producers Association, Myanmar Fisheries Products Processors and Ex-Federation of Chambers of Commerce porters Association to meet monthly

The federation was projected to achieve 2.5 million tonnes of rice export in the FY 2023-2024, generating earnings of \$1 billion. However, rice exports fell short of the target with 1.6 million tonnes worth \$845 million.

The Central Bank of Myanmar's monetary policy to control export earnings impeded rice exports, hurting ex-

porters financially. The El Nino weather condition also hampered rice export, the Myanmar Rice Federation president

Myanmar exported 2,261,203 tonnes of rice and broken rice to foreign trade partners in the past 2022-2023 FY (April-March), with an estimated value of \$853.472 million. — NN/KK

Taunggyi Tazaungdine hot-air balloon festival ongoing

THE 74th Tazaungdine Hot-Air Balloon Festival in Taunggyi is being held at the Awayar Balloon Field under the supervision of the Shan State government.

The festival runs from 11 to 17 November and features day and night hot air balloon competitions, fire lantern processions, traditional Mathoe robe-weaving contests, trade promotion events, and musical performances. Ongoing celebrations continued into the fifth day as of 15 November.

The Taunggyi Tazaungdine Hot-Air Balloon Festival originated in the Myanmar calendar year 1302 (1941) during the Tazaungmone month. It began with the abbot of Konetha Monastery leading the launch of a giant hot-air balloon, approximately 50 feet in diameter. By 1950, the festival had evolved into an annual competition, with awards given to participants.

In the Myanmar calendar year 1386 (2024), the traditional festival continues to be celebrated from 11 November onward. On the fifth day of the festival, participating teams launched 35 daytime decorative balloons, two Seinnaban balloons, and four grand nighttime balloons in a competitive display.

From 11 to 15 November, during the first five days of the festival, a total of 174 hot-air balloons were launched for competitions. That included 16 Seinnaban balloons, 17 grand nighttime balloons, and 139 daytime decorative balloons. The remaining balloons - six Seinnaban balloons, nine grand nighttime balloons, and 70 daytime decorative balloons, totalling 85 balloons — will be launched for competitions until the festival concludes on 17 November. — Shan State IPRD/TMT

Myanmar's fresh pineapple that meets the rules and regulations of China will be allowed to be imported starting from 11 November.

Myanmar's pineapple has a unique flavour and tastes sweet, sour, fresh and juicy inside, which can attract many consumers, according to its statement. — NN/EM

China grants Lancang-Mekong visa to eligible Myanmar businesspeople

CHINA will issue a type of visa which will enable Myanmar nationals to stay 180 days as of 18 November, according to the Embassy of the People's Republic of China to Myanmar.

This is a type of five-year multiple-entry visa with a maximum stay of 180 days per visit for eligible Myanmar business personnel and their spouses and children travelling to China. Applicants will need to meet the requirements.

The decision to allow this

visa to eligible business personnel in Myanmar, Cambodia, Thailand, Laos, and Vietnam in the Mekong region was made on 7 November at the Eighth Greater Mekong Subregion Summit

YU to offer three-month cosmetic technology course on 3 Dec

THE Department of Industrial Chemistry, University of Yangon, will conduct a three-month course for cosmetic technology starting on 3 December.

Those who pass the matriculation exam are eligible to apply for this course. Interested individuals can apply for it at the Student Affairs Department of YU with the specified form between 11 and 22 November 2024.

This three-month course will start on 3 December 2024 from 7 am to 9 am on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. The course fee is K100,000. Only 100 trainees will be accepted at most. Trainees will receive completion certificates in Cosmetics Technology.

THE Taninthayi Region Department of Agriculture, under the Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation, is providing assistance to farmers who are struggling to harvest monsoon paddy by coordinating with the Agricultural Mechanization Department.

In the 2024 monsoon paddy season, 22,396 acres of rice were planted in Taninthayi Region, and harvesting began at the end of October. In addition to increasing the yield of monsoon paddy, 2,820 acres of model plantations have also been established to benefit farmers.

"Monsoon paddy is being harvested from late October. If farmers face difficulties harvesting in groups, we connect them with the Agricultural Mechanization Department. Since there is a shortage of rice in our region, we have planned 8,012 acres of summer paddy after the monsoon paddy season. We will also continue planting mung beans and sunflowers as winter crops," said an official from the Taninthayi Region's Agriculture Department.

During the last rainy season, thousands

of acres of farmland were destroyed due to record flooding of the Taninthayi River. However, paddy was able to be replanted in time. One official added, "If we can close the creeks and drains in areas where there is a shortage of fresh water for summer rice cultivation, we can expand cultivation even further."

Last year, only 1,125 acres of mung beans and 105 acres of sunflowers were planted as winter crops. This year, in addition to 2,003 acres of mung beans and 169 acres of sunflowers, efforts are being made to expand the cultivation of other types of beans.

Taninthayi Region has 222,396 acres of monsoon paddy: 100,528 acres in Dawei District, 117,064 acres in Myeik District, 3,571 acres in Bokpyin District, and 1,233 acres in Kawthoung District.

There is a 73 per cent shortage of rice in the region. Therefore, rice is imported from Yangon, Bago, and Ayeyawady regions. The average yield per acre was 72.42 baskets, and a total of 16,129,409 baskets of rice were produced last year. — Myint Oo (Myeik)/TKO

Deeply follow provisions of copyright laws

INCE joining the World Trade Organization in 1995 and the World Intellectual Property Organization in 2001, Myanmar has enacted laws to protect intellectual property rights. Additionally, Myanmar is responsible for implementing intellectual property agreements related to trade processes.

As the Trademark Law, Industrial Design Law, and Intellectual Property Rights Law came into effect in 2023, the relevant authorities are now accepting applications for copyrights. Similarly, with the Patent Law taking effect on 31 May of this year, applications are also being accepted for innovations. The doctors also explained metastasis, the development of secondary malignant growths at a distance from a primary site of cancer, and cancer invasion, which is the process by which the tumour cells spread into nearby tissues. That can happen through collective or individual cell migration, where the cells pass through the basement membrane and extracellular matrix. Invasion is the process by which cancer cells directly extend and penetrate neighbouring tissues in cancer. It is generally distinguished from metastasis, which is the spread of cancer cells through the circulatory system or the lymphatic system to more distant locations.



"We are in the same boat": Xi dynamizes G20 cooperation in uncertain world

AS a representative mix of the world's major economies, the Group of Twenty (G20) has become the premier forum the world looks up to today in moments of global economic turmoil and crisis.

With a thorough grasp of the G20's unique role, Chinese President Xi Jinping has consistently championed the G20's joint efforts to follow the spirit of sailing in the same boat and join hands to live up to their respective duty.

"All G20 members should take the responsibility inherent in being major international and regional players, and should lead by example in promoting development of all nations, improving the well-being for the whole mankind, and advancing progress of the entire world," he once said.

Now as Xi joins other leaders for the 19th G20 summit in Brazil, the international community is keen to see how they will address the great uncertainties troubling today's world, particularly what solutions China will propose for building a better future for all. When G20 leaders met for their first summit in November 2008, they confronted an unprecedented global financial crisis. By working together, the group helped avert economic collapse and set the stage for recovery. In recent years, China, alongside other G20 nations, has faced an even greater challenge — the COVID-19 pandemic and its devastating economic fallout.

President Xi Jinping emphasized that the impact of the pandemic was worse than the 2008 crisis. At the 2021 G20 summit, Xi called for stronger inter-

national cooperation, urging nations to stabilize supply chains,

reduce trade barriers, and apply effective solutions to address

both immediate and long-term global challenges. — Xinhua

Oil execs work COP29 as NGOs slam lobbyist presence



OIL executives and lobbyists descended on COP29 in Baku for "energy day" Friday, as environmental groups denounced the presence of the fossil fuel industry at the UN climate talks.

While negotiators haggled over the key goal of an increase in climate funding, a former UN chief said the talks were "no longer fit for purpose".

The head of France's To-

talEnergies, Patrick Pouyanne, told AFP the sector is "part of the problem", but insisted it was making "continuous progress" on transition.

The "Kick the Big Polluters Out" (KBPO) coalition of NGOs analyzed accreditations at the annual climate confab, calculating that more than 1,700 people linked to fossil fuel interests are in attendance.

The presence of fossil fuel interests at climate talks has sparked intense criticism.

Environmental campaigner Makoma Lekalakala condemned the industry's role in global destruction, while former US vice-president Al Gore called it "absurd" for petrostates to host COP conferences, citing their conflict of interest. — AFP

Stirring 'haka' dance disrupts New Zealand's parliament

INDIGENOUS Maori lawmakers disrupted New Zealand's parliament with a stirring "haka" dance, voicing opposition to a race relations bill that has ignited protests across the country.

A contentious bid to reinterpret a centuries-old treaty between New Zealand's Maori and European settlers was set to be debated in parliament on Thursday.

But proceedings were derailed when 22-year-old Maori Party MP Hana-Rawhiti Maipi-Clarke took to her feet, ripped the bill in half, and launched into the haka.

The rest of her party strode onto the floor of parliament to join her in the Ka Mate haka, a fierce ceremonial challenge popularized by the country's All Blacks rugby side. — AFP

Dutch coalition survives political turmoil

THE Netherlands' right-wing government averted collapse on Friday after a junior minister resigned over alleged racist comments by cabinet colleagues related to last week's attacks on Israeli football fans.

Deputy Finance Minister Nora Achahbar handed in her resignation late Friday, setting in motion crisis talks between leaders of the four-party Dutch coalition government.

Achahbar decided to exit the government after a heated cabinet meeting discussing the violence that flared on the streets of Amsterdam after a football match between local club Ajax and Maccabi Tel Aviv. "The polarizing interactions of the past weeks made such an impact on me that I am no longer able to effectively carry out my duties as deputy minister," Achahbar said in her resignation letter to parliament. — AFP

China-LAC goods trade expected to continue growing at high speed: spokesperson

China expects continued high-speed growth in trade with Latin America and the Caribbean, achieving win-win results.

CHINA believes that trade in goods between China and Latin America and the Caribbean will continue to grow at a high speed and achieve win-win results at a higher level, a foreign ministry spokesperson said on Thursday.

Spokesperson Lin Jian made the remarks at a daily press briefing when commenting on the trade and economic cooperation between China and Latin America and the Caribbean.

According to a report recently released by the United Nations Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC), China is an important trade partner and the fastest-growing export market for Latin America and the Caribbean.

Mutual benefit and win-

win results are the overarching principle for the growth of the relations between China and the region, said Lin. He noted that in the first three quarters this year, trade in goods between both sides hit 427.4 billion US dollars, up by 7.7 per cent year on year, and the total amount for the whole year is expected to exceed 500 billion US dollars. — Xinhua

India's wholesale inflation rises to 2.36% in October

INDIA'S wholesale price index (WPI) inflation increased to 2.36 per cent in October, official data showed on Thursday.

The increase was primarily due to hike in prices of food items, machinery and equipment, motor vehicles, trailers and semi-trailers.

WPI food inflation increased

from 9.47 per cent in September to 11.59 per cent in October.

WPI inflation was 1.84 per cent in September and 1.25 per cent in August.

WPI inflation, an indicator of prices in the wholesale market, rises or falls mainly due to steep fluctuations in global commodity prices. — Xinhua

UK plans mega pension funds to unlock £80 bln investment

BRITAIN plans to create mega pension funds, potentially boosting investment in the country by around £80 billion in a move mirroring schemes in Australia and Canada, finance minister Rachel Reeves announced.

Labour's "megafunds" plan could unlock the equivalent of \$104 billion "for infrastructure projects and businesses of the future", the Treasury said in a statement late on Wednesday.—AFP

Swedish police seize nearly \$1M in luxury goods

ONE week after being given the power to seize luxury items from people not suspected of a crime, Swedish police said on Friday they had already confiscated items worth nearly \$1.0 million.

The law, which was passed by parliament on 2 October and came into force on 8 November, is part of the right-wing government's crackdown on organized criminal gangs.

It allows police to seize cars, gold watches and other designer goods from people — including minors — suspected of having ties to criminal gangs, when the items are believed to have been bought with money earned from illicit activities, even if the person is not formally suspected of a crime. — AFP

Lebanon economic losses top \$5B in year of clashes: World Bank

MORE than a year of clashes that recently escalated into war have cost Lebanon more than \$5 billion in economic losses, with actual structural damage amounting to billions more, the World Bank said on Thursday.

Since 23 September Israel has ramped up its air campaign in Lebanon, later sending in ground troops following almost a year of limited, cross-border exchanges initiated by Hezbollah over the Gaza war.

Lebanon's health ministry on Thursday said more than 40 people had been killed in Israeli strikes on the south and east, including on a civil defence centre in the Baalbek area.

Intensified Israeli strikes also hit in and around Damascus, where the Syrian



Observatory for Human Rights war monitor reported 20 people killed including Palestinian Islamic Jihad militants and Iran-backed fighters. Islamic Jihad has fought alongside Hamas against Israeli forces in Gaza and has been at war with Israel before. In its Lebanon report, the World Bank provided estimates for damage between 8 October 2023 and 27 October 2024, saying "the conflict has caused \$5.1 billion in economic losses", with damage to physical structures amounting to "at least \$3.4 billion" on top of that.

The losses are "largely concentrated in the commerce and tourism and hospitality sectors... as well as in the agriculture sector", the report said. — AFP

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LG to pump extra \$1 bln into Vietnam plant

Vietnam, aiming to attract more international companies, hosted a licensing ceremony in Hai Phong, where LG produces TVs, mobile, and automotive displays.

LG Display will inject another \$1 billion into its factory in Vietnam, the local authorities there said Friday, pushing the firm's total investment in the country to more than \$5.5 billion.

The announcement comes as Vietnam looks to boost its appeal as an investment destination for international companies.

A ceremony for a licence to increase capital for LG — whose products include TVs, and mobile and automotive displays was held in the northern port city of Hai Phong, Thursday, a local official confirmed to AFP.

With the extra money, LG

Display's total investment in Vietnam is now worth \$5.65 billion.

Vietnam's Hai Phong industrial city is home to more than 1,000 foreign-invested projects worth more than \$32 billion.

Korea is the biggest investor in the city with \$11 billion, followed by China and Japan, the city said in an online statement.

The display factory, one of LG's largest projects in Vietnam, opened in 2017.

In October, Korean conglomerate Hyosung Group said it plans to double its investment in Vietnam to \$8 billion, creating 10,000 jobs. — AFP

Toyota aims for hydrogen-electric hybrid van public road test in 2025

TOYOTA Motor Corp said Saturday it plans to begin public road tests of a commercial van in Australia next spring, aiming to roll out what could be the world's first vehicle powered by both a hydrogen engine and an electric motor.

The hydrogen-electric hybrid HiAce van was unveiled to the media the same day, with its driving range extended by 20 per cent to 250 kilometres compared with when it runs only on hydrogen, the carmaker said.

The test is part of Toyota's "multi-pathway strategy," through which the automaker aims to provide a range of green vehicles, including gasoline-electric hybrids, hydrogen-powered fuel cells and battery electric vehicles, to reduce carbon dioxide emissions and

SpaceX plans 400 Starship launches under Trump

AMERICAN space technology company SpaceX President Gwynne Shotwell said the company plans to significantly increase the number of Starship launches during US President-elect Donald Trump's second term: the number could reach 400 in the next four years, the Wall Street Journal reported.

Shotwell, US entrepreneur Elon Musk's longtime second-in-command, made the statement at an investor event on Friday, the report said.

The first Starship test launch in April 2023 ended in failure when the spacecraft rotated uncontrollably and was destroyed.

The second test in November 2023 also failed after stage separation, but before reaching orbit. The third test in March 2024 was successful, and the fourth test took place in June 2024. Elon Musk aims for an unmanned Mars flight within four years. –SPTUNIK

CHINA-JAPAN relations are in a critical period of improvement and development, as the current international and regional situations face changes and turbulence, said Chinese President Xi Jinping on Friday.

As close neighbours and important countries in Asia and the world, the relationship between China and Japan holds significance that goes beyond the bilateral scope, Xi said while meeting Japanese Prime Minister Shigeru Ishiba on the sidelines of the 31st APEC Economic Leaders' Meeting.

He noted that China is willing to work with Japan to uphold the important consensus that the two countries should "be partners, not threats", comprehensively advance the strategic relationship of mutual benefit, and endeavour to build a constructive and stable China-Japan relationship that meets the requirements of the new era. — Xinhua

Kennedy joins Trump, promoting controversial health agenda

ROBERT F Kennedy Jr, a longtime conspiracy theorist and vaccine opponent, now has the ear of President-elect Donald Trump to promote what he's calling the "Make America Healthy Again" agenda. It's an unlikely alliance between the Kennedy family scion, once a celebrated environmental champion who called for prosecuting climate change deniers, and the returning Republican leader. What they share, however, is a profound distrust of institutions. Trump announced Thursday he would nominate Kennedy to become the next secretary of Health and Human Services, fulfilling a campaign promise to award the 70-year-old a "big role in healthcare" that raised alarm in public health circles.

Robert F Kennedy Jr, former climate attorney turned independent candidate, has stirred controversy with vaccine conspiracies, bizarre personal revelations, and anti-fluoridation views, aligning with Trump's "Make America Healthy Again" movement. — AFP

Anglican Church criticized for abuse cover-up

ANGLICAN leaders faced pressure Wednesday to speed up reforms following Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby's resignation over a damning report concluding the Church of England covered up a serial abuse case.

Welby announced his resignation Tuesday after a chorus of criticism about his role in the decades-spanning scandal, prompted by the release last week of an independent probe's findings. It concluded that the Church of England — the mother church of Anglicanism — covered up "prolific, brutal and horrific" abuse" by John Smyth, a lawyer who organized evangelical summer camps in the 1970s and 1980s.

A report criticized Archbishop Justin Welby for failing to report abuse allegations against John Smyth in 2013. Despite ongoing reforms, Church leaders acknowledge persistent institutional issues. —AFP

20th anniversary of Arafat's death marked

THE 20th anniversary of the death of late Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat, who passed away on 11 November 2004, was marked by a significant event.

A speech festival was held at Arafat's tomb in the Palestinian Presidential Compound in Ramallah, central West Bank, organized by the Palestinian National Liberation Movement (Fatah) and attended by both officials and the public.

Participants in the event, including dozens of children, raised Palestinian flags, Fatah's yellow banners, and the keffiyeh that the late leader was often pictured wearing.

Mahmoud Al-Aloul, Fatah's deputy leader, said in his speech that this year's anniversary of Arafat's death came at a "difficult time" for the Palestinian people due to the ongoing Israeli "aggression". —Xinhua

China leads climate efforts at COP29 Pavilion

THE China Pavilion at COP29 was launched on Monday in Baku, Azerbaijan.

The China Pavilion will host 10 themed days featuring various side activities during COP29, or the 29th session of the Conference of the Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change, scheduled to run from 11 to 22 November.

Speaking at a side meeting that marks the opening of the pavilion, Zhao Yingmin, head of

the Chinese delegation to COP29 and vice minister of China's Ministry of Ecology and Environment, said China has become an essential participant, contributor, and leader in global ecological civilization in recent years. China is willing to work with the international community to strengthen political mutual trust, practice multilateralism, enhance global cooperation, and build a prosperous, clean, and beautiful world, he added. — Xinhua

Dozens detained in Amsterdam after protest ban

DUTCH police detained dozens of pro-Palestinian protesters in Amsterdam on Sunday after they defied a demonstration ban put in place in the wake of violence against Israeli football supporters.

Amsterdam's mayor banned protests after violence involving Maccabi Tel Aviv fans and scooter riders. Despite this, hundreds gathered in Dam Square, chanting "Free Palestine" and holding placards. Police in riot gear intervened, detaining dozens. Detainees were later released after being transported to other city locations, local media reported. —AFP

Tyson beaten by Youtuber Paul in heavyweight return

MIKE Tyson's controversial return to boxing ended in a one-sided defeat on Friday, with Youtuber-turned-prizefighter Jake Paul cruising to victory by unanimous decision against the heavyweight icon in Texas.

Tyson, 58, barely landed a punch during the eight-round bout at the AT&T Stadium in Arlington, with Paul winning by big margins on all three cards — 80-72, 79-73 and 79-73.

Paul, 27, used his superior speed and movement to dominate the ageing Tyson with ease, and had the former undisputed heavyweight champion in trouble after landing a flurry of punches in the third round.

Yet the younger fighter was unable to land the knockout blow he had promised to deliver during Thursday's ill-tempered weigh-in, where Tyson slapped him across the face.

Tyson, however, looked every bit of his 58 years, managing to land only a handful of meaningful punches during the fight, watched by a live crowd of around 70,000 spectators with an estimated millions more tuning in around the world.

Final statistics showed Tyson connected with just 18 of 97 punches thrown while Paul threw some 278 punches and landed 78 of them.

As the final seconds of the eighth round counted down, Paul could even afford to bow in respect to Tyson before the bell sounded.

"First and foremost, Mike Tyson, it's such an honour: Let's give it up for Mike," Paul said after embracing Tyson following his win.

"He's the greatest to ever do it. He's the GOAT, he's a legend. I'm inspired by him and we wouldn't be here today without him.

"This man is an icon and it's just an honour to be able to fight him. He's obviously the toughest, baddest man on the planet; it was really tough like I expected it to be." — AFP

ASEAN Women's Futsal: Myanmar draws with host Philippines

THE 2024 ASEAN Women's Futsal Championship began on 16 November in the Philippines, where team Myanmar played a competitive opening match, resulting in a 2-2 draw with the host nation.

On the first day of group matches, Thailand defeated Indonesia with a single goal, finishing 1-0, while Myanmar and the Philippines held each other to a 2-2 tie. Returning to the international arena after a break of more than two years, the Myanmar women's futsal team put forth a strong effort and secured one point from the draw. As the Philippines prepares to host the Women's Futsal Championship, they have made extensive preparations, and Myanmar showed impressive responses during this opening face-off.

Despite trailing by one goal in the first half, Myanmar's Lwin Lwin Thet and Yoon Mie Mie Lwin each scored in the second half, briefly bringing Myanmar ahead 2-1. However, just minutes after securing their lead, Myanmar conceded a goal, ending the match in a draw.

Alongside host Philippines, Myanmar is competing with Thailand, Vietnam, and Indonesia in a five-team, round-robin format

Ronaldo at double as Portugal reach Nations League quarters, Spain win

CRISTIANO Ronaldo scored twice as Portugal thrashed Poland 5-1 thanks to a rampant second-half display on Friday to reach the Nations League quarterfinals, while already-qualified Spain beat Denmark.

Roberto Martinez's Portugal wrapped up top spot in Group A1 with a game to spare, securing their place in the next round in March.

France, Germany and Italy are also already through to the last eight. Poland were the better side early on but failed to take their chances in Porto and the home side made them pay, netting four times in the last 20 minutes.

"We couldn't impose ourselves on the game in the first half," said Portugal goalscorer Rafael Leao.

"(Coach) Roberto Martínez's approach in the locker room was important; it was the key to changing the pressure at half-time."

Ronaldo volleyed over from close range shortly before the interval, as Portugal failed to register a shot on target in the first half. Dominik Marczuk almost broke the deadlock in the 58th minute, but Portugal goalkeeper Diogo Costa produced a brilliant fingertip save to deny him.

The hosts broke from the resulting corner to score less than 60 seconds later, as Leao powered forward before finding Nuno Mendes, then continuing his run to meet the Paris Saint-Germain full-back's cross with a powerful header.

Portugal were awarded a penalty when Diogo Dalot's strike flicked off Jakub Kiwior's hand at point-blank range and was saved by Marcin Bulka. Ronaldo stepped up to dink home a 'Panenka' spot-kick. — AFP

Greece's ambitious 'smart city' by the sea takes shape

HIGH above Athens' coastline, cranes tower over the Saronic Gulf, marking the construction site for Greece's ambitious eight-billion-euro "smart city" project.

Backed by private funds, the development, set to be completed by 2036, aims to revitalize the nation after years of economic stagnation.

The Ellinikon "smart city" project, backed by private funds, aims to revitalize Greece and will span 6.2 square kilometres, featuring villas, hotels, shopping centres, a marina, and Athens' tallest skyscraper.

Critics, however, warn it risks becoming an exclusive "ghetto for the rich".

The Ellinikon project will span 6.2 square kilometres, incorporating villas, hotels, shopping centres, a marina, and the Riviera Tower, which will be Athens' tallest skyscraper.

Despite its grandeur, the development has sparked debate, particularly due to the exclusionary pricing of luxury apartments that could cost up to 25 million euros.

Once a site for Athens' international airport, the area has a history of abandonment, with refugees and community initiatives filling the gap after the financial crisis.

However, the privatization of the site to Lamda, a property development company, has drawn criticism, with some calling it an "offshore colony". Supporters argue it will create thousands of jobs and enhance Greece's global reputation. — AFP

Cyber-Rodent: Russian lab wires rat's brain to AI in world first

Russian scientists connect rat brain to AI, providing answers to questions.

RUSSIAN scientists have become the first in the world to connect a rat's brain to artificial intelligence that suggests the right answers to any question.

The Neiry Biotech Laboratory told Sputnik that the brain of the laboratory rat Pythia was connected to a neurointerface, the device works in tandem with the AI.

"Russian Neiry Biotech Laboratory together with scientists from Moscow State University presented the first results of a unique experiment: for the first time in the world, scientists and developers have connected a rat's brain to artificial intelligence (AI). The rat is able to answer any questions using a keyboard," the lab said.

The electrodes on the neurointerface allow specific areas of the rodent's brain to be stimulated so that it understands when to answer "yes" or "no". — SPUTNIK
