Bagan thrives during Tazaungdine festivities despite reduced crowds

N the full moon of Tazaungmone, the Bagan Ancient Cultural Zone bustled with pilgrims and tourists, creating a vibrant scene reminiscent of the Thadingyut Festival. Although fewer visitors travelled to Bagan from other parts of Myanmar due to competing attractions like the Taunggyi hot-air balloon festival, Bagan remained lively, welcoming both pilgrims and tourists.

The secretary from the board of trustees from the Hti-lominlo Pagoda observed that while the Tazaungdine celebrations were busy, they did not match the crowds of Thadingyut. Approximately 10,000 visitors explored Bagan's eminent pagodas this year, slightly down from the 15,000 recorded last year. Foreign tourists, including families with children, have

N the full moon of started arriving in November, Tazaungmone, the Bagan Ancient Cullandmarks and warm hospitality.

Bagan continues to be one of Myanmar's most popular tourist destinations, attracting domestic and international visitors and playing a crucial role in supporting the local economy. Festivals like Tazaungdine significantly boost local businesses, especially souvenir shops, traditional craft vendors, and horsecart services. Around 70 per cent of visitors engage in activities such as traditional painting and purchasing keepsakes, which particularly appeal to younger travellers.

Following Tazaungdine, other prominent festivals, such as the Shwezigon Pagoda Festival and the Ananda Temple Festival, are expected to draw both local and distant travellers to the region. — Nyein Thu (MNA)/KZL

THE people of Myanmar have been playing Chinlone, or cane ball, as a traditional physical activity since ancient times, continuing to this day. While the exact origin of Chinlone in Myanmar is unknown, a silver Chinlone was excavated from the Bawbawgyi Pagoda in the ancient Pyu city of Sri Ksetra, where it was built and revered by King Duttabaung. This suggests that Chinlone would have been played since ancient times.

A historical account also mentions

that during the reign of King Bagan, who ascended the throne in 1208 ME, a sculptor from Thailand created a Chinlone carved from ivory, which the king became very fond of. The king then instructed the sculptor to create Chinlones made of hand-wo-

ven rattan and asked the courtiers to play by kicking them with their feet. At that time, they played only in circles, and the act of playing in circles was believed to help bring one's mind together. As a result, a slogan for playing Chinlone emerged: "Compromise, Consensus, and Equality".

There are two ways to play Chinlone: single-player and team. In single-player play, the player uses various parts of his body to control the Chinlone. The player may even use one to six Chinlones at the same time.

In team play, four to five people play the same Chinlone together in a circle, with the goal of controlling the cane ball using various parts of the body and movement, so that it doesn't fall to the ground.

The traditional way of playing Chinlone now involves not only the feet but also other body parts, including the knees, shoulders, head, back, and elbows, attracting the attention of overseas enthusiasts.

Kachin State CM provides flood relief and oversees Injan Creek sluice gate construction

IN response to record-breaking water levels caused by heavy rainfall upstream of the Ayeyawady River on 31 June and 1 July 2024, flood-affected communities in Kachin State have continued to receive relief aid. On the morning of 16 November, Kachin State Chief Minister U Khet Htein Nan led a relief distribution ceremony in Naungchein village-tract, Waingmaw Township, for the remaining flood-affected house-

During the ceremony, the Chief Minister reaffirmed the government's commitment to ensuring comprehensive support for all affected residents. He encouraged villagers to report any unmet needs, assuring them that no household would be overlooked.

Tazaungdine hot-air balloon festival in Taunggyi: A vibrant celebration of tradition and joy

THE 2024 Tazaungdine Hot-Air Balloon Festival is being held at Awayar Balloon Field in Taunggyi, under the supervision of the Shan State government. Running from 11 to 17 November, the event features a variety of activities, including daytime and nighttime hot-air balloon competitions, lantern processions, traditional Mathoe robe-weaving contests, trade promotion events, and musical performances. As of 17 November, the celebrations continued into their seventh day.

Visitors to the festival have shared their impressions of the lively event. Ma Aye Chan Moe, a local from Taunggyi Township, described her excitement: "I came to enjoy the hot-air balloon festival. During the day, you can see decorative balloons, and at night, there are grand nighttime balloons, including the stunning Diamond Earrings-shaped balloons. The daytime balloons were crafted

into various shapes, such as two-legged or four-legged animals, and they were incredibly intricate and captivating. Watching them brought immense joy. The festival also was bustling market stalls, adding to the vibrant atmosphere".

A male visitor shared his experience, saying: "The daytime balloons soaring into the sky were breathtaking. I saw balloons shaped as single figures, pairs, or even groups of three, designed as two-legged or four-legged creatures. Although some balloons caught fire during launching, the lively atmosphere and the audience's excitement were unforgettable".

Between 11 and 16 November, the festival saw 271 hot-air balloons launched as part of the competitions. These included 19 'Seinnaban' Diamond Earrings-shaped balloons, 22 grand nighttime balloons, and 174 decorative daytime balloons. The remaining 42 balloons —

Bagan Plastic Campaign prioritizes plastic cleanup activities



WITHIN the Bagan Ancient Cultural Zone, weekly plastic cleanup activities are being carried out by the Bagan Plastic Campaign as part of efforts to maintain a plastic-free environment. At 7:00 am on 16 November, a plastic waste collection drive was conducted starting from Sakura Traffic Point.

In NyaungU Township, Mandalay Region, within the Bagan Ancient Cultural Zone, efforts to achieve a plastic-free environment were undertaken by the Bagan Plastic Campaign Group in collaboration with staff from the Department of Archaeology and National Museum (Bagan Branch). Participants included municipal staff, personnel from the District Environmental Conservation Department, employees from hotels, motels, and guesthouses in NyaungU Township, staff from Balloons providers, members of the Tour Guides Association, members of the Restaurant Owners' Association, and staff from the Hotelier Association (Bagan Zone).

The cleanup activity involved collecting plastic waste, such as discarded bottles and other debris, along both left and right sides of the road to Bagan Myothit from Sakura Junction to Sein Nyet Nyima Pagoda. — Dipa Linn/TMT



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Illegal goods worth K547.04 million seized in nationwide crackdown in two days

UNDER the supervision of the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee, legal action continues to be taken against illicit trade across the country.

On 14 November, the combined teams impounded consumer goods worth K54.39 million without official documents from nine containers at the Asia World Port Terminal container checkpoint, consumers goods worth K23.88 million from a passenger at the Yangon International Airport, and a Hino truck worth K30 million carrying consumer goods and

materials and foodstuffs worth K6.5 million at Nyaungkhashay X-ray check point, and a Dong Feng tractor worth K70 million carrying auto parts valued at K9.3 million without official documents near Shwe Thanlwin Tollgate in Phayagyi. In Toungoo District, the teams seized illegal timber weighing 1.303 tonnes worth K886,176. The action was taken under the Forest Law and Customs procedures.

Similarly, the combined teams from Sagaing Region seized 35 barrels of petrol and 50 barrels of diesel (estimated

industrial materials valued at K12.8 million without official documents at the dry port in Ywathagyi. The action was conducted under the Customs procedures.

Similarly, on 15 November, the combined teams from Bago Region seized a Toyota Hiace and Kia Bango worth K40 million carrying industrial

worth K19.85 million) at the Yadanabon bridge combined checkpoint in Sagaing Township on 16 November. The action was conducted under the Petroleum and Petroleum Products Law.

On 16 November, a team led by the Customs Department conducted inspections at Yangon International Airport. Industrial materials worth an estimated K2.61 million were seized from a passenger's luggage, and legal proceedings are underway in accordance with customs regulations.

On 17 November, combined teams under the management of the Bago Region Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force inspected the Nawade

Bridge toll gate in Padaung Township. A Nissan diesel truck valued at K250 million was seized, carrying 3,200 gallons of illegal crude oil worth K24.18 million. Legal action was taken under the Petroleum and Petroleum Products

Additionally, 1.612 tonnes of illegal teak and 8.709 tonnes

of hardwood, with an estimated value of K2.62 million, were confiscated in Bago, Nyaunglebin, and Pyay Districts.

From 14 to 17 November, a total of 19 cases were reported, with illegal goods worth K547.047 million confiscated, according to the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee. — MNA/TKO

Myanmar national died on the spot after jumping off 19th floor in Malaysia

A Myanmar citizen who was trying to return to Myanmar died after jumping from the 19th floor of a building in Malaysia, according to the Lovely Heart Parahita Blood Donor Group (Kuala Lumpur-Malaysia).

The deceased's elder sister said the victim Ko Nay Lin Naing, 34 years old, who lived in 5th ward, East Hlinethaya Township, Yangon Region, was a person with mental health problems.

As there were cases among Myanmar migrants of visiting hospitals only after having serious health issues, and suffering a mental illness after drinking too much alcohol and over-gaming, people with poor health are advised to the clinic as soon as possible, the group said.

The parahita group helped bring the dead body together with the friends of the bereaved family to the funeral at the Puchong cemetery in Malaysia. — MT/ZN



Inwa receives more tourists during Tazaungdine than Thadingyut

THE number of tourists visiting Inwa during Tazaungdine has increased significantly compared to Thadingyut period and continues to be crowded, according to Bo Shake (Yadanapura), a historical researcher and writer.

Tourist arrivals in Inwa started on 14 November during Tazaungdine, and on 15 November, it became much crowded until 16 November.

"Tazaungdine is the period crowded with domestic tourists. Compared to Thadingyut, it is more crowded. Thadingyut was an example. As it is peaceful now, there are even more people. It was crowded from 14 to 16 November," he said.

People especially visit Mei Nu Brick Monastery, Bagaya, elephant moat fort, Myintmotaung Pagoda cluster and Layhtetgyi pagoda. Compared to last year, there has been a significant increase in the number of tourists visiting Inwa, and he welcomed it as the large number of visitors helps the livelihood of locals.

There is a significant increase in tourist arrivals on religious holidays in Inwa, and it is

expected to be crowded during the coming New Years period as well, he added. Major destinations of domestic tourists during Tazaungdine include Bagan-NyaungU,

Number of commercial growers of all-season grafted Gangaw increases

THE number of commercial growers of the all-season grafted Gangaw (Mesua ferrea) flower is rising, according to the nursery market.

With many orders for these grafted Gangaw plants from cultivators as well as hotels, gardeners and decorators, it is among the flowers that sell well.

"Grafted Gangaw plants bloom one batch after another. There are many people who grow it commercially. There are also people who grow it for decoration at home. Its price is good. People sell three flowers for K 1,000. The market demand for Gangaw flower is high. Hotels buy a lot of flowers.

A hotel at Ngapali in Thandwe orders a lot.

Sales are good," said Ma Htar Htar Naing, a nursery garden trader in Kyaukpadaung Township.

The Gangaw planted from seeds and nursery takes years to grow and blooms only in its own season, so people prefer to grow grafted Gangaw plants.

"The grafted Gangaw planted in the ground blooms while being short. It blooms one batch after another for all seasons. Grafting can be repeated. Seed growing takes years. So, people prefer to grow grafted Gangaw plants," she added.

All-season grafted Gangaw plants are grown commercially in Bagan-NyaungU. Some 20-25 flowers can bloom at each plant in the first batch, but as the plant ages, depending on the weather, the plants can bear many number of flowers, she explained. — Thit Taw/ZN



Dried Yacon tea leaves get popular this year

DRIED yacon tea leaves have gained popularity this year and there is likelihood that the sale will increase.

Previously, dried yacon tea leaf was used in Shan State and it is produced from yacon leaves which becomes widespread popularity on the internet this year.

"Yacon also produces dried tea leaves. So it is expected that it will get a lot of attention and widespread consumption. Yacon gets popularity online and the sale becomes increased. So there is likelihood that dried yacon leaves will also be well-





known. Now we've started trading it," said Ma Sandi Tayar who sells dried yacon leaves.

It smells good and medicnal.

"Yacon roots are dug after picking leaves first and yacon tea leaves are made from its dried leaves. Its taste doesn't differ from ordinary tea leaves but medicinal and has scent," she said.

The digital platform is

seeing a daily rise in information sharing, but not all of it is reliable. Social media, in particular, often contains incomplete or fake news and even intentionally misleading stories. Some details may align with genuine news, but personal interests, biases, unverified claims, and mixed or incorrect data influence much content. Therefore, internet users must be cautious and critically evaluate the information they encounter to determine its accuracy and applicability. This careful approach is essential to avoid being misled by false or biased content online.

It is essential to close the digital technology gap to advance global information technology. However, misinformation can have severe social impacts. Internet platforms and social media are not solely responsible for inaccuracies; instead, users should critically evaluate information from various sources, especially on social media. Internet users must approach media content thoughtfully, considering and analyzing it carefully before accepting or sharing it.

NE of the remarkable achievements of the first Asian Buddhist Summit was the successful organization of the two parallel forums, each offering an array of insightful perspectives. The arrangements of these forums allowed for a rich convergence of ideas, with one focusing on the foundational teachings of the Buddha and their modern-day applications, while the other explored the ways in which Buddhist principles can contribute to sustainable development, social harmony, and international cooperation.

tions that offered unique alternatives, perspectives, and some 'out of the box' approaches, looking at philosophical knowledge as a means for application and practical usage for the betterment of society. Seminars and Conferences, hitherto, had been mainly concerned with the religious aspects and its associated discourse. This Summit threw up many innovative ideas emanating from the ancient philosophy and science of Dhamma.

The First Asian Buddhist Summit was organized by the Ministry of Culture and the International Buddhist Confederation (IBC), themed 'Role of Buddha Dhamma in strengthening Asia'. It saw participation from 32 countries with over 160 international participants. Members of the Mahasangha, patriarchs of various monastic traditions, monks, nuns, members of the diplomatic community, professors of Buddhist studies, experts and scholars, and around 700 participants engaged enthusiastically with the topic.

Professor Ceon Ramon from

the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering at the University of Washington, the USA, drew a comparison between the duration of Mental Cognition from Neuroscience and the Buddhist Perspectives of meditation in their Clinical Applications. Reflecting on the nature of arousal and cessation of thought (the Dhyanmoment), measurements showed that these time frames are what meditators inferred centuries ago without a clock. This can be useful in the treatment of mental disorders based on Buddhist practices of paramitas and meditation combined with neurofeedback and visualization techniques.

A unique contribution of Buddhist practice was introduced in

First Asian Buddhist Summit throws up innovative ideas

Mongolian prisons by Mr Shirendev Dorlig, Director of the Vipassana Research Center in Mongolia. After some initial hiccups, Vipassana meditation courses are giving very good results even in prisons with hardened criminals.

In his presentation, Mr Dorlig stated that he insisted on certain working conditions from the prison authorities before initiating the courses. This included training of the prison officials in vipassana practice, a strictly regimented menu that was in line with the practice and tradition, and a daily 'group sittings' for the inmates at the end of the day to get a realistic assessment of the success rate.

assessment of the success rate.

Many presentations highlighted the vast areas in Central Asia, East Turkestan and the Russian Autonomous Republics of Kalmykia, Buryatia and Tuva that Buddhism had impacted, such as its influence in architecture, worshipping practices and the philosophical way of life, traces of which were evident archaeologically as well in ancient texts still available.

Dr Jagbir Singh from the Department of History, Dyal Singh Evening College, University of Delhi, spoke about the Buddhist Influences on the Evolution of Chinese Architecture. He traced its development from the Han Dy-

nasty to the present day.

In the 1st century, the Han emperor Ming constructed the white horse monastery in honour of the first two Indian monks who went from India to China – Kashyap Matanga and Dharmaratna.

This was the birth of Chinese Buddhist architecture.

This form of architecture was subsequently woven into pure Chinese architecture, resulting in a unique architectural heritage that reflects the spiritual and aesthetic values of Buddhism.

Professor Dr Shobha Rani Dash, Head of the Department of Buddhist Studies at the Otani University, Kyoto, Japan, mentioned the Hindu deities worshipped in Japanese Buddhism. She explained the pantheon of Hindu deities who were introduced to Japan with Buddhism as the Devas of the Buddhist pantheon. Gradually, many of them have been assimilated with the Japanese native cult of Shintoism as well. She made a special mention of the goddess Saraswati, who is known as Benzaiten in Japan and is revered by

Dr Yalcin Kayali, Associate Professor of Eastern Languages and Literatures at Ankara University, Turkiye, brought out the less-known fact about the presence of Buddhism in the Uighur Turkish cultural world.
This study focused on the
Buddhist text known in
Sanskrit as the Suvarn-

abhāsa Sūtra, which was transferred from the Chinese translation of the Dharmakshema to the Uyghur-Turkish Buddhist heritage area and named Altun Yaruq (Golden Light Sūtra).

Dating back to the 4th century, its Chinese translations and those into Japanese and other European languages are thought to have contributed to incorporating ancient Buddhist doctrine into the world's cultural heritage.

Similarly, Dr Baatr U Kitinov, a Research Fellow from the Institute of Oriental Studies, Russian Academy, mentioned how Buddhism had spread to eastern Turkestan and the role of the Uyghurs in sustaining Buddhism for long periods. He mentioned that Buddhism is still being practised by certain smaller population groups in east Turkestan, who are expanding in number.

Venerable Dr Polgolle Kusaladhamma, HoD, Pali and Buddhist Studies, SIBA Campus from Sri Lanka, explained the role of neurological research on Buddhist meditation to identify the utility of mindfulness practices to overcome physical infirmity and other sufferings, especially nega-

tive forces in emotions that create mental unrest, unhappiness, fear, and frustration etc.

He explained in detail how Buddhism studies the nature of the mind and examines the rational description of the mind, guiding the followers to develop wholesome mental behaviours and healing mental afflictions.

Venerable Dr Ugyen Tsher-

ing, a lecturer at the International Buddhist Studies College (IBSC) of Mahachulalongkornrajavidyalaya University in Bhutan, spoke about the famous concept of Gross National Happiness (GNH) and how the Buddhist philosophy and principles underpin the concept of GNH, influencing Bhutan's policies and societal values. It was Buddhism that played a significant role in enabling Bhutan to attain a high degree of GNH and explained how others could emulate the model.

Venerable Nguyen Ngoc Anh, a Vietnamese PhD Scholar at the University of Colombo, Sri Lanka, explained the challenges that Buddhism faced in Vietnam during different periods, such as feudalism, colonialism and modernization. However, engaged Buddhism had a profound impact on Vietnamese society, as the philosophy of liberation (Moksha), peace and happiness (Nibbana) held Vietnamese society firmly together as the country went through several conflicts. Introduced in Vietnam in the 2nd century AD, Buddhism forms the essence of Vietnamese society.

Mr Ruslan Kazkenov from Kazakhstan mentioned that even though Kazakhstan was not a Buddhist country, there was a strong fondness for Buddhism and Buddhist philosophy in the country, especially since Buddhism has several similarities or commonalities with Tengrianism. Moreover, Buddhism has influenced art, architecture and cultural traditions of the region (Central Asia), including elements of Buddhist art and historical monuments. He suggested hosting the next Asian Buddhist Summit in Kazakhstan.

In the same spirit, scholars from Tajikistan and Uzbekistan mentioned how the people of these countries were becoming increasingly aware of their Buddhist heritage, which the locals accepted in the early years of its spread in the region. They emphasized that there was significant scope for the excavation of Buddhist sites that yet remain unexplored in these two countries. The representatives expressed keenness to engage Indian experts on excavation and also academicians who could help string the essence of Buddha's teachings and their application in this part of the world.

Climate finance can be hard sell, says aide to banks and PMs

TRILLIONS of dollars are needed to make poorer nations more resilient to climate change, and studies have estimated that every \$1 invested today will save at least \$4 in future.

So why is it so hard to raise this money, and what are some

of the innovative ways of going about it?

Developing countries will require \$1 trillion annually by 2030 to reduce carbon emissions and adapt to climate change, according to UN experts.

Funding could come from governments, global institu-

tions like the World Bank, or the private sector, but some projects, such as solar farms and wind turbines, attract more investment due to returns on energy sales. However, long-term adaptation projects like defensive sea walls are less appealing to investors, requiring significant public funding.

To bridge the gap, innovative solutions, like taxes on polluting industries, are necessary, but translating climate science into finance is essential for effective global action.

Trump taps fracking magnate and climate skeptic as energy chief

US President-elect Donald Trump nominated fracking magnate and climate change skeptic Chris Wright as energy secretary on Saturday, tasking him with "cutting red tape" which the new administration hopes will drive investment in fossil fuels. "As Secretary of Energy, Chris will be a key leader, driving innovation, cutting red tape, and ushering in a new 'Golden Age of American Prosperity and Global Peace," Trump said in a statement.

Wright is a founder of Liberty Energy, which serves the

energy companies that have massively increased US fossil fuel production in recent years by extracting oil and gas from shale fields in a process known as "fracking."

"My dedication to bettering human lives remains steadfast, with a focus on making American energy more affordable, reliable, and secure," Wright said on X after Trump's announcement.

"Energy is the lifeblood that makes everything in life possible... I am looking forward to getting to work". — AFP

Super Typhoon Man-yi batters Philippines' most populous island

SUPER Typhoon Man-yi slammed into the Philippines' most populous island on Sunday, with the national weather service warning of flooding, landslides and huge waves as the storm sweeps across the archipelago nation.

Man-yi was still packing maximum sustained winds of 185 kilometres per hour (115 miles per hour) after making its first landfall late Saturday on lightly populated Catanduanes island.

More than 1.2 million people fled their homes ahead of Man-yi as the weather forecaster warned of a "life-threatening" impact from the powerful storm, which follows an unusual streak of violent weather.

Man-yi uprooted trees, brought down power lines and smashed flimsy houses to pieces after hitting Catanduanes in the typhoon-prone Bicol region.

No deaths have been reported, but there was "extensive" damage to structures on Catanduanes, civil defence chief Ariel Nepomuceno said.

Man-yi remained a super typhoon as it hit heavily populated Luzon—the country's economic engine—forecasters said, warning of a "potentially dangerous" situation in Aurora province.—AFP

Fifth of dengue cases due to climate change: researchers

CLIMATE change is responsible for nearly a fifth of the record number of dengue cases worldwide this year, US researchers said on Saturday, seeking to shine a light on how rising temperatures help spread disease.

Researchers have been working to swiftly demonstrate how human-driven climate change directly contributes to individual extreme weather events such as the hurricanes, fires, droughts and floods that have battered the world this year.

But linking how global warming affects health — such as driving outbreaks or spreading disease — remains a new field

Rising temperatures are expanding the range of dengue, a climate-sensitive disease transmitted by mosquitoes. A study estimates that 19 per cent of current dengue cases are linked to climate change.

In the next 25 years, areas in Latin America and Asia could see a 200 per cent rise in cases due to warming, affecting over 257 million people. — AFP

Vienna turns up Christmas glitter to lift shopping gloom

Vienna boosts Christmas lights to support struggling retailers amid economic downturn.

VIENNA will splash the cash on lighting up its famed Christmas markets to bring festive cheer to struggling retailers.

Chandeliers, glittering stars and sparkling red globes are among the designs illuminating 31 Viennese streets since Friday, with the capital boosting spending on its end-of-year light displays as Austria's economy flounders. "It's just beautiful. It makes the city a bit more beautiful as a whole," Kateryna Baranovska, a 23-year-old student, told AFP.

As local businesses struggle with rising costs, Vienna's economic chamber is covering 75 per cent of the city's Christmas lighting expenses this year, totaling about 700,000 euros.

This shift comes as Austria's economy faces challenges, especially due to its reliance on neighboring Germany. Dieter Steup, a representative from the chamber, emphasized the importance of festive lighting for retail, as it enhances the shopping experience during the crucial pre-Christmas period.

To minimize environmental impact, Vienna uses energy-efficient LED lights powered by renewable sources. Despite increased energy costs, the city's Christmas lights continue to create a cherished ambiance, with 64 per cent of Austrians praising them in a recent survey. — AFP

A team of researchers, including from Japan, will begin a clinical study later this month to study whether transmitting vibration to the skin through a facial mask device can improve one's mental health.

Researchers from Nagoya University and London Trusted Therapy, an education and research company aim to eventually establish a drug-free, noninvasive approach to mental health care.

Their joint clinical study at a medical institution in London will involve around 30 people suffering from such conditions as ADHD, PTSD and depression. — Kyodo

Denmark's Victoria Kjaer Theilvig crowned Miss Universe 2024

VICTORIA Kjaer Theilvig was crowned Miss Universe on Saturday, the first contestant from Denmark to achieve the honor.

The 21-year-old dancer, entrepreneur, and animal rights activist beat out more than 120 contestants in the pageant's 73rd edition held in Mexico City.

First runner-up was Chidimma Adetshina, a law student representing Nigeria, followed by Maria Fernanda Beltran of Mexico, Suchata Chuangsri of Thailand, and Ileana Marquez of Venezuela.

Marquez, 28, had earlier made history as the first mother to be crowned Miss Venezuela.

After the 2023 competition included married, plus-sized and transgender contestants, this year's featured women older than 28 - the cutoff in previous pageants.

Among them was Beatrice Njoya of Malta, who at 40 became the oldest woman to reach the grand finale.

Adetshina was formerly a Miss South Africa finalist before she was hounded over a nationality row which forced her to represent Nigeria. – AFP

Dutch police use hologram to try and decode sex worker's murder

IN Amsterdam's red-light district, a hologram of Bernadett "Betty" Szabo, a sex worker murdered in 2009, aims to solve her brutal killing and raise awareness about violence against sex workers.

The hologram, displayed in a canal-side window, shows Betty in revealing clothes, tapping the glass and fogging it with her breath as the word "HELP" appears.

Police hope it will trigger memories and encourage tips, with a €30,000 reward for information. Despite a large-scale investigation, the case went cold until new clues prompted a reopening. – AFP

Xi says Chancay Port to consolidate Peru's position as gateway that connects land and sea, Asia and Latin America

THE Chancay Port will strongly consolidate Peru's position as a gateway that connects land and sea, Asia and Latin America, said Chinese President Xi Jinping on Thursday.

Xi made the remarks when attending the opening ceremony of the Chancay Port via video link with his Peruvian counterpart Dina Boluarte.

The Chancay Port is not only a good deep-water port, but also the first smart port and green port in South America, which, when completed, will also bring Peru huge rev-

enues and create a large number of jobs, Xi said.

In his talks with Boluarte on Thursday, Xi said that China is ready to work with Peru to build a new land-sea corridor between China and Latin America with Chancay Port as a starting point.

The corridor, to connect the Inca Trail with the 21st Century Maritime Silk Road, will open up a road of common prosperity and happiness for Peru and other Latin American and Caribbean countries, Xi said. — Xinhua

Fitch upgrades Argentina debt rating amid economic pain

CREDIT ratings agency Fitch upgraded Argentina's sovereign debt rating to "CCC" from "CC" on Friday, citing improved ability to meet upcoming foreign debt payments and successful economic reforms under President Javier Milei.

Fitch said the upgrade, which maintains the country in junk status, reflects growing confidence in Argentina's financial stability, bolstered by significant dollar inflows from a tax amnesty programme that has already brought over \$20

billion into the economy.

The government of self-described "anarcho-capitalist" Milei has applied a drastic austerity programme aimed at erasing the budget deficit and taming the high inflation that has plagued Argentina for years.

Yet Milei has maintained popular support despite implementing the tough economic adjustments, including cuts in energy and transport subsidies and thousands of public sector jobs. — AFP

Germany's healthcare sector hit by skilled labour shortages

GERMANY'S healthcare sector faces the most severe skilled labour shortages among all industries, according to a study released Saturday by the Competence Centre for Securing a Skilled Workforce at the German Economic Institute.

Approximately 47,400 positions in the healthcare sector could not be filled with suitably qualified candidates between July 2023 and June 2024, it said.

According to the report, the shortage is particularly acute in physiotherapy, with nearly 11,600 vacant roles. Dental assistants and healthcare and nursing staff are also in high demand, with shortfalls of over 7,340 and nearly 7,100 positions,

Uzbekistan continues gas accounting, control to ensure stable supply

UZBEKISTAN will "resolutely" continue gas accounting and control in industries to ensure a stable supply and reduce losses, Uzbek President Shavkat Mirziyoyev said.

At a meeting on energy supply Friday, Mirziyoyev emphasized the need to reduce and optimize costs, accelerate reforms in the gas

sector, and expand exploration efforts by engaging leading foreign companies, according to the president's press service.

Though gas losses have decreased due to "the modernization of industries" and improved energy efficiency, "there is still a lot of work ahead", the press service said. — Xinhua

China's request for International Organization of Vine and Wine membership accepted

China's membership in the International Organization of Vine and Wine (OIV) strengthens its global wine influence.

THE International Organization of Vine and Wine (OIV) on Friday announced on its website that China's application for membership had been formally accepted, which means that China will play a more important role in setting international standards for wine production and consumption.

The application was submitted by China's Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Affairs on 14 May, initiating the statutory 6-month consultation period which has now been successfully concluded.

Acceptance of the application must be ratified by Chinese authorities within one year, during which time China will be entitled to participate fully in the work of the OIV, according to the statement on its website.

The OIV, founded in November 1924, thus welcomes its first new member following its centenary celebration.

China is ranked third globally in terms of planted vineyard surface area, while it is also the 8th largest consumer of wine and the top producer of table grapes in the world.

The addition of China takes the total number of OIV member countries to 51 and extends the representativity of the organization to 85 per cent of the total world planted vineyard surface area. —Xinhua

Foreign tourists showing appetite for Japan's art of food replicas



AT a workshop in Tokyo, a dozen or so tourists watched as green and white wax was poured into warm water. As the liquid turned into a sheet, they were then asked to slowly pull it up and roll it, gasping at its transformation into a lettuce.

Hands-on lessons in the art of creating food replicas

have caught on with foreign visitors keen to learn more about a distinctive Japanese craft that has evolved for over 100 years. An exhibit of food replicas has even been held in London this year.

The lessons were offered by Iwasaki Group, which is believed to have been the first to commercialize the production of food replicas in 1932.

Food replicas, originating in Japan in the 1910s-1920s, were initially used in restaurant displays but have evolved into training tools for farmers and souvenirs.

As Western culture spread, replicas helped introduce foreign dishes to Japanese consumers. — Kyodo

US airline says plane apparently hit by gunfire on Dallas runway

SOUTHWEST Airlines said one of its planes was apparently hit by gunfire while preparing for takeoff at an airport in the US city of Dallas on Friday.

The plane "taxied safely back to the terminal at Dallas Love Field after a bullet apparently struck the right side of the aircraft just under the flight deck", the airline said in a statement.

The incident happened as the crew was preparing for take-

off, it said. No one was injured and the plane has been removed from service, the airline added.

The incident happened at around 8:30 pm Friday (0230 GMT Saturday), with the flight headed from Dallas, Texas to Indianapolis, Indiana.

The Federal Aviation Administration said the Southwest Airlines flight was taxiing for takeoff when it was "reportedly struck by gunfire near the cockpit".—AFP

Japan to strengthen measures against illegal part-time jobs

THE Japanese government was mulling over enhanced crime prevention measures against "dark part-time jobs", a growing social issue, local media reported Sunday.

New measures could include subsidies for high-security residential installations and financial support for community groups conducting patrols.

The government will also seek to strengthen cyber patrols to monitor and address online recruitment of illegal activities, collaborate with job sites and social media platforms to remove illegal recruitment posts based on requests from investigative authorities, according to the public broadcaster NHK. The move will be finalized in the coming week, aiming to ensure public safety and address the rising concern over illegal part-time job-related crimes. — Xinhua

Pacific leaders intensify efforts to improve regional connectivity

PACIFIC leaders are intensifying efforts to link tourism and aviation, aiming to boost economic growth and advance sustainable development goals.

Fijian Deputy Prime Minister and Chair of the Pacific Tourism Council of Ministers Viliame Gavoka said connectivity between Pacific Island countries remains a significant challenge. — Xinhua

India conducts successful flight trial of long-range hypersonic missile

THE Defence Research and Development Organization (DRDO) successfully conducted a flight trial of its long-range hypersonic missile on 16 November 2024, from Dr APJ Abdul Kalam Island, off-the-coast of Odisha. This hypersonic missile is designed to carry various payloads for ranges greater than 1500 km for all the Services of the Indian Armed Forces. The missile was tracked by various range systems, deployed in multiple domains. The flight data obtained from down-range ship stations confirmed the successful terminal manoeuvres and impact with a high degree of accuracy.

This missile has been indigenously developed by the laboratories of Dr APJ Abdul Kalam Missile Complex, Hyderabad along with various other DRDO laboratories and Industry Partners. – ANI

Russia restricts uranium exports to the US after Biden's ban

THE Biden administration enacted legislation banning supplies of "unirradiated, low-enriched uranium that is produced in the Russian Federation or by a Russian entity" earlier in the year, turning a deaf ear to concerns voiced by US nuclear operators and nuclear fuel market participants.

The Russian government has imposed temporary restrictions on the export of enriched uranium to the United States. Companies can still export uranium to the US under one-off licences issued by the Federal Service for Technical and Export Control.

This was a tit-for-tat move after the Biden administration signed a law banning Russian uranium imports until 2040,

with exceptions allowed until 2028, despite warnings that the move could backfire on the American economy. Russia is the world's largest supplier of enriched uranium. It accounts for about 44 per cent of the global capacity to separate the uranium isotopes needed in

nuclear reactors. Its share of the enriched uranium market boasts an estimated export value of \$2.7 billion.

Russia's measure may generate potential supply risks to utilities operating American reactors. — SPUT-NIK

China to host 2026 APEC summit, championing Asia-Pacific cooperation

WHEN China first hosted the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) summit in 2001, the nation stood at a crossroads, poised to join the World Trade Organization.

It was a moment of transformation that signaled China's readiness to step fully into the global economic arena.

By the time China hosted APEC again in 2014, the story was markedly different.

The country had become an economic powerhouse, with its deeper integration into the world economy fueling a decade of breathtaking growth.

Now, China is set to play host again with a significant mission: to unite Asia-Pacific countries to champion open economic and trade cooperation while rejecting protectionist and confrontational trade tactics. — Xinhua

Tennis: Japan loses to Italy in Billie Jean King Cup q'finals

JAPAN lost to Italy 2-1 in the Billie Jean King Cup women's team tennis quarterfinals Saturday in Malaga, Spain.

After Ena Shibahara won her 2-hour, 44-minute opening singles match for Japan, world No 4 Jasmine Paolini defeated 56th-ranked Moyuka Uchijima 6-3, 6-4 and returned to the court for a doubles win by the same score.

After being down 5-1 in the second set against Paolini and Sara Errani, Shuko Aoyama and Eri Hozumi kept Japan's semifinal hopes alive by winning three straight games but came up short in the end at Martin Carpena Arena.

Italy was last year's Billie Jean King Cup runner-up to Canada. Japan had come into the 12-team finals for the first time under the current tournament format that was introduced in 2020.

"I couldn't win points at crucial moments," Uchijima said. "I didn't play that bad. I think I gave her a good fight. This experience of playing one of the world's top players will definitely help my career."

Former world No 1 Naomi Osaka was unable to play for Japan in the finals because of injury. In the first match of the Japan-Italy tie, Shibahara came from a set down to beat Elisabetta Cocciaretto 3-6, 6-4, 6-4. — Kyodo

Netherlands into Nations League quarter-finals as Germany hit record seven

NETHERLANDS outclassed Hungary with a 4-0 victory in their winner-takes-all Nations League encounter on Saturday while record-setting Germany hammered Bosnia and Hercegovina 7-0.

Netherlands and Hungary went into the match tied on five points each and with the winner set to join Germany in ensuring their progress from Group A3 to the quarter-finals.

First-half penalties by Wout Weghorst and Cody Gakpo sent the

Oranje on their way, before Denzel Dumfries and Teun Koopmeiners made the game safe in the second period.

"There are always things we can improve upon," Dutch captain Virgil van Dijk told SBS6. "But in the end, we deserved to win."

The match at the Johan Cruyff Arena was briefly interrupted in the seventh minute following a medical emergency on the Hungarian bench.

The referee stopped play for

some 10 minutes while Hungary's assistant coach Adam Szalai received treatment, shielded from view by huddled players and staff members, as well as a large white sheet

Szalai, 36, was stretchered off to applause from spectators and players alike, the Hungarian FA later released a statement saying he was "conscious" and in a "stable condition" at an Amsterdam hospital. — AFP

Xi meets Biden in Lima

Xi acknowledged the ups and downs in China-US relations over the past four years but emphasized stable dialogue and cooperation under their leadership.

CHINESE President Xi Jinping on Saturday met with US President Joe Biden on the sidelines of the 31st APEC Economic Leaders' Meeting in Lima, Peru.


Noting that he was pleased to meet with Biden again, Xi said China-US relations over the past four years have gone through ups and downs, but under the joint stewardship of the two presidents, the two sides have also been engaged in fruitful dialogue and cooperation and their relationship has remained stable on the whole.

Xi said that the trajectory of China-US relations has proved the validity of these experiences and inspirations

from the past 45 years of diplomatic ties.

When the two countries treat each other as partner and friend, seek common ground while shelving differences and help each other succeed, their relationship would make considerable progress. But if they take each other as rival or adversary, pursue vicious competition and seek to hurt each other, they would roil the relationship or even set it back, he added.

Xi Jinping emphasized the importance of cooperation over competition to address global challenges, advocating for mutual benefits rather than decoupling or supply-chain disruptions. He

Cambodia's water festival attracts over 6.2 mln visitors

CAMBODIA'S three-day traditional Water Festival attracted more than 6.2 million spectators, the Ministry of Tourism said on Sunday.

Celebrated from Thursday to Saturday, the festival was one of the most joyful festivals in the Southeast Asian country. On the occasion, people from across the country flocked to the capital's riverfront to enjoy boat races, the festival's centerpiece.

The festival received an estimated 6.2 million local visitors and 52,498 foreign tourists during the three-day festival, the ministry said.

CANCELLATION OF

income declines amid regional conflict

JORDAN'S tourism revenue for the first 10 months of this year reached US\$6.1 billion, down 4.4 per cent from the same period last year, the state-owned Al Mamlaka TV reported Sunday.

This decline is attributed to a 6.6-per cent drop in the number of tourists, according to official figures

"The main reason for the decline in tourism is the cancellation of many flights by European airlines to Jordan due to the war in Gaza and Lebanon," Ilham Saeed, an economic news editor and analyst, told Xinhua.

The regional conditions forced airlines to cancel flights, leading to significant cancellations by tourist groups from Europe, he said.

"It is essential to diversify tourism markets and attract tourists from other countries such as China and major East Asian markets as an alternative," Saeed said, adding that Jordan is safe and stable and the country needs to reach out to new markets. — Xinhua
