Panamei saltwater prawn farming to be expanded in Taninthayi Region to boost exports

yanmar exports Panamei saltwater prawns annually, with 5,946.187 tonnes exported by December in the 2024–2025 financial year, according to the Taninthayi Region Fisheries Federation.

"To penetrate international markets, it is crucial to raise global awareness of Panamei saltwater prawns. During the 2024-2025 monsoon season, the salinity levels in breeding farms decreased, which slowed prawn growth and led to some disease outbreaks. As a result, prawn farmers are planning to scale back production during the monsoon season of 2025-2026 and increase farming during the summer months. With expanded farming, export volumes are expected to rise. We also anticipate further growth in international market demand," said U Thet Soe, Secretary of the Taninthayi Region Fisheries Federation.

Currently, prawns are exported to China in a boiled form and to Japan in a frozen form. To increase export capacity, breeders

aim to focus more on farming rather than relying solely on marine capture.

Moreover, as Myanmar annually imports prawn larvae and feed from Thailand, producers are trying to establish domestic hatcheries working with technical support of the government. This effort aims to ensure long-term benefits for both the country and local producers.

In the Taninthayi Region, Panamei white prawns are farmed on 2,217.56 acres using the Good Aquaculture Practices (GAqP) system in Dawei, Kyunsu, Palaw and Kawthoung townships. Expansion is also underway, with an additional 2,662.68 acres in Thayetchaung Township of Dawei District, Myeik, Palaw and Kyunsu townships of Myeik District, Bokpyin Township of Bokpyin District, and Kawthoung Township of Kawthoung District. Furthermore, Kyunsu Township alone has seen an additional 390.12 acres allocated for prawn farming. — Nyein Thu (MNA)/KNN




Morning fog in four regions, including Yangon; Travel warnings issued

METEOROLOGIST U Win Naing said fog in the early morning is forecast in the southern Ayeyawady Region, along Yangon River and Bago River, and southern districts of the Yangon and Bago regions and along Thanlwin River in Mon State. Travel by air and water should be cautious.

Low-level clouds will happen within 2,000 metres (6,500 feet) above the ground in those areas on 26 January from 4 am to 7 am, leading to foggy weather, he said. Fog in the morning generally happens in late January, early February and early March, he said. Due to low-level clouds and fogs, visibility will decline, causing dangerous travel by air and water, he warned.

A chance of a weak La Nina is 59 per cent from February to April and a 60 per cent chance for a neutral climate

This year, the examinee Sayadaw successfully passed two profound and intricate treatises namely Yamaka and Pathana which are the two last treatises of Abhidhamma Pitaka during the 77th examination. As a result, the examinee Sayadaw will receive the esteemed title of Tipitakadhara Tipitakakovida, along with the exam pass certificate, and a religious flag bearing the picture of honorary three-tier white umbrella with a yellow pivot. This brings an immeasurable sense of pride and joy, akin to experiencing boundless delight.

According to information from the Ministry of Religious Affairs and Culture, the revered monk was born in Ywabugyi village, YeU Township, Sagaing Region. In 1361 Myanmar Era, he was ordained as a noble monk under the preceptor Venerable Bhaddanta Indacara of the Sawbwalay Monastery, located at 7th-mile in Mayangon Township, Yangon Region. He inspected the booths of the exhibits in the Zoo, the stalls and the beautification measures.



Illegal goods and vehicles worth more than K700 million seized nationwide

UNDER the supervision of the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee, efforts continue to effectively prevent and take legal action against illegal trade in accordance with the law.

On 24 January, a combined team under control of the Taninthayi Region Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force conducted inspections near Sandawut Village, Myeik Township, seizing 5.825 tonnes of illegal hardwood (estimated value at K582,520) and is processing legal action under the Forest Law.

On the same day, the Rakhine State Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force seized 20 barrels of illegal diesel (approximately K20 million) near Inndin Village, Maungtaw Township. Legal action is underway in line with the Petroleum and Petroleum Products Law.

Similarly, the Sagaing Region Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force seized three species of prohibited wildlife (estimated value at K8 million) in Tinteik Ward, Sagaing, Sagaing Region on 24 January under the Conservation of Biodiversity and Protected Area Law. On the same day, an unlicensed Honda Vezel vehicle (estimated value of K18 million) was seized in Tagaung Ward, Sagaing under the Import and Export Law.

Furthermore, an unlicensed Mitsubishi Canter truck (estimated value at K20 million) was seized at the Yadanabon Bridge checkpoint on 25 January. The total value of seized goods and vehicles is estimated at K46 million and legal proceedings are ongoing.

On 25 January, under the management of the

Customs Department, various inspection teams made significant seizures. At Thilawa Port, equipment worth K28.63 million lacking valid documentation was confiscated. Similarly, at the Asia World container checkpoint intermediate materials valued at K81.8 million were seized. Likewise, three vehicles transporting 13 types of equipment, two types of consumer goods and one type of foodstuff worth K114.48 million were intercepted at Ywathagyi Dry Port.

In Shan State, inspections near the Malipakaw detour in Tachilek found five types of raw chemical materials worth K103.69 million transported by three Nissan Diesel trucks (approximately K115 million). The total value of the seizure reached K218.69 million, with action taken under customs regulations.

In Bago Region, inspection teams near the Shwe Thanlwin Tollgate in Bago seized five types of foodstuffs (valued at K5 million) transported in a vehicle traveling from Myawady to Pyay. Legal proceedings are ongoing in compliance with relevant laws. One King Long bus worth K30 million carrying these illegal foodstuffs was also seized. Two unregistered vehicles worth K22 million were confiscated in Toungoo District while 3.65 tonnes of teak, 0.074 tonne of hardwood and 4.95 tonnes of other timber worth K2.58 million were also seized in Bago, Toungoo and Nyaunglebin districts.

On 24 and 25 January, illegal goods and unregistered vehicles worth more than K719 million were seized in 26 cases. — MNA/KZL

Myawady orders most ginger from Naungtaya

MYAWADY made the most orders for ginger from Naungtaya in the southern Shan State, according to the ginger market in the town.

Yangon, Mandalay, and Myawady are making ginger orders, and Myawady tops among them.

"The price of old ginger is K 2,800 per viss, and that $\,$

of new ginger is K 2,000. Sales are good, and we send it to Mandalay, Yangon, and Myawady. Myawady ordered more. The selling price has not increased. Ginger season nearly ends," said a ginger trader in Naungtaya.

Ginger's price may rise slightly in the coming months as its season nearly ends. "I think the price of ginger will

improve a little in the coming months. Its season nearly ends. If it goes up, it can be around K 3,100-3,200 from K 2,800 a viss. Not very much," he said. Ginger farmers said that the price they sold to the warehouses in last October fell slightly, and they are relying more on the local market due to the low export. — Thit Taw/ZN

Over 240,000 international visitors, 1.9 million domestic tourists visit Yangon in 2024

FROM January to December 2024, over 240,000 international visitors and approximately 1.9 million domestic tourists travelled to destinations across Yangon Region, according to U Aung Thet Htun, Deputy Director of the Yangon Region Directorate of Hotels and Tourism.

Most international visitors, primarily from China, Thailand, and South Korea, arrived via air through Yangon International Airport, holding various types of visas. U Aung Thet Htun stated, "In 2024, Yangon Region received over 240,000 international tourists, with the majority arriving by air. Visitors from China, Thailand, South Korea, Japan, India, Vietnam, the United States, Chinese (Taipei), and Singapore contributed to the largest numbers".

Regarding domestic tourism, over 600,000 tourists arrived in Yangon by air, primarily as returnees to the region. Moreover, around 1.9 million domestic tourists entered Yangon via various modes of transport, including rail, road, and air, during the year.

Qualified applicants for Thilawa housing apartments announced

meeting these goals. Between 2005 and 2020, India reduced its emission intensity of GDP by 36 per cent, demonstrating a rare ability to decouple economic growth from greenhouse gas emissions. More than 46 per cent of India's installed electricity generation capacity comes from non-fossil fuel sources, with renewable energy capacity - including large hydropower-reaching 203.22 GW. Forest and tree cover now span 25.17 per cent of India's land, with an additional carbon sink of 2.29 billion tonnes of CO2 equivalent created between 2005 and 2021.

The International Solar Alliance (ISA), launched by India in 2015, exemplifies this leadership. In 2023, during its G20 presidency, India launched the Global Biofuels Alliance (GBA) to accelerate the global adoption of biofuels. With 24 member countries and 12 international organizations, the GBA champions sustainable energy alternatives that reduce emissions while bolstering energy

security

Columbia Engineering team discovers key immune cells crucial for successful immunotherapy in relapsed acute myeloid leukemia (AML) treatment. **ILLUSTRATION: CONCEPT ART**

Immune cells found to boost cancer treatment in acute myeloid leukemia: Study

The study utilized DIISCO, a machine learning approach, to analyze the interactions between immune cells in the leukemia bone marrow microenvironment. This method helped identify key cellular interactions that may explain why some patients respond better to immunotherapy.

research team from Columbia Engineering and the Irving Institute for Cancer Dynamics achieved a significant finding in cancer immunotherapy.

The team discovered a unique population of immune cells that is important to the successful treatment of relapsed acute myeloid leukemia (AML). This investigation was done in partnership with the Dana Farber Cancer Institute (DFCI).

AML, which affects four out of 100,000 patients in the US every year, according to the National Cancer Institute, is a type of cancer that first attacks the bone marrow before moving to infect the blood. The current treatment plan includes targeted chemotherapy followed by a stem cell transplant. Unfortunately, up to 40 per cent of these patients relapse after transplant and have a median survival

of six months. At that stage, the only hope for remission is through immunotherapy.

Led by Elham Azizi, associate

professor of biomedical engineering at Columbia Engineering, the research explores how coordinated immune networks in leukemia bone marrow microenvironments influence responses to cellular therapy, raising the question: why do some patients benefit from immunotherapy while others do not? The current treatment for relapsed AML, donor lymphocyte infusion (DLI)—a therapy involving donor immune cells—has a 5-year survival rate of only 24 per cent, according to research conducted by Pfizer.

This new study finds that a unique population of T cells found in patients who are responding to DLI might be the key. These cells fight leukemia by boosting the immune response. Addition-

ally, the study shows that patients with a healthier, more active and diverse immune environment in the bone marrow are better able to support these cells and their cancer-fighting abilities.

Utilizing the team's proprietary computational DIISCO approach, the researchers discovered key interactions between the unique T cell population and other immune cells may lead to patient remission. They also traced these T cells back to the donor product. However, it was discovered that the donor's immune cell composition has little to no effect on the patient's success. In fact, the success of this treatment is determined by the patient's immune environment. DIISCO is a machine learning method used to analyze how cell interactions change over time with a focus on cancer and immune cells profiled in clinical specimens.

The study's findings can lead to new intervention options such as improving the immune environment before starting the standard DLI treatment and exploring combinations of immunotherapies. This will help patients who don't typically respond well to find a personalized option that

works for them. "This research exemplifies the power of combining computational and experimental methods through close collaboration to answer complex biological questions and uncover unexpected insights," said Azizi, who is a member of the Irving Institute for Cancer Dynamics, the Herbert Irving Comprehensive Cancer Centre, and Columbia's Data Science Institute. "Our findings not only shed light on mechanisms underlying successful immunotherapy response in leukemia, but also provide a roadmap for developing

effective treatments guided by in-

"Seeing our findings validated through functional experiments is incredibly exciting and offers real hope for improving cancer immunotherapy," said Cameron Park, a PhD student in the Azizi lab, who co-led this study with Katie Maurer at the Catherine Wu Lab at Dana Farber-Cancer Institute. Park was also a co-developer of the DIISCO algorithm.

In this particular research's future, the team plans to explore interventions that enhance the effectiveness of DLI while focusing on modulating the tumor microenvironment. Although exciting, much more work has to be done before the team can head to clinical trials with the hope of improving outcomes for patients with relapsed AML.

US falling behind on wind power, think tank warns

In 2023, wind power provided around 10% of US electricity, slightly above the world average of 7.8%. Trump's policies favor oil and gas over wind energy.

THE United States is falling behind the European Union in the rollout of wind power and risks being overtaken by China, a think tank said Thursday, days after Trump announced a crackdown on new wind projects.

Shortly after his inauguration on Monday, Donald Trump signed an executive order pausing the development of new wind energy projects, following up on a campaign promise to no longer fund the sector.

"The United States is diverging from global trends on wind power," said Dave Jones, a director at climate think tank Ember.

"Major economies are embracing wind as a source of cheap, clean electricity. The United States risks being left behind in the clean industrial revolution," he added.

About 10 per cent of the United States' electricity came from wind power in 2023, or just above the world average of 7.8 per cent. Trump has favoured oil and gas over wind power.

Trump also declared Monday a national energy emergency to significantly expand oil and gas drilling in United States after pledging in his inauguration speech that we will "Drill, baby, drill!".

China is currently right behind the United States, with nine percent of its power coming from wind farms in 2023.

But Beijing is speeding up the building of wind turbines, setting up China "to overtake the Unites States in the coming years" according to Ember. — AFP

Spain govt to cover full cost of repairing flood-damaged buildings

SPAIN'S central government will cover the full cost of rebuilding schools, libraries and other municipal buildings damaged in last year's deadly floods, Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez said Thursday.

The central government had initially said it would cover 50 per cent of the estimated cost of 1.7 billion euros (\$1.8 billion). But it will now pay 100 per cent, Sanchez said after meeting mayors from the hardest-hit municipalities in the eastern region of Valencia.

"We are talking about 100 administrative centres, more or less 45 nursery

schools, 58 libraries, 55 sports centres, 40 day centres, 16 markets and many more damaged buildings," the Socialist prime minister said.

"The media spotlight may have shifted to other issues, but as we said from the beginning of this crisis, the government of Spain will not look away from Valencia," he added. The central government will also pick up the full 500-million-euro tab to repair the damage done to water treatment, supply and sanitation infrastructure by the floods, Sanchez said. — AFP



OpenAI unveils 'Operator' agent that handles web tasks

OPENAI on Thursday introduced an artificial intelligence programme called "Operator" that can tend to online tasks such as ordering items or filling out forms.

Operator can look up web pages and interact with them by typing, clicking, or scrolling the way a person might, according to OpenAI.

"Operator can be asked to handle a wide variety of repetitive browser tasks such as filling out forms, ordering groceries, and even creating memes," OpenAI said in an online post.

"The ability to use the same interfaces and tools that humans interact with on a daily basis broadens the utility of AI, helping people save time on everyday tasks while opening up new engagement opportunities for businesses."

An AI "agent," the latest Silicon Valley trend, is a digital helper that is supposed to sense surroundings, make decisions, and take actions to achieve specific goals.

Google in December announced

agent capabilities with the launch of Gemini 2.0, its most advanced artificial intelligence model to date.

AI race rival Anthropic two months earlier added a "computer use" feature to its Claude frontier AI model in an experimental public beta phase.

"Developers can direct Claude to use computers the way people do—by looking at a screen, moving a cursor, clicking buttons, and typing text," Anthropic said in a post at the time, cautioning that it was a work in progress.

OpenAI described Operator as one of its first AI agents capable of doing work for people independently, designed to complete tasks it is given. — AFP

Fired IT worker partly shuts down British Museum

THE British Museum said it had closed a number of exhibits after a fired IT contractor "shut down" some of its systems, in one of several unrelated incidents targeting European museums on Saturday.

The London venue, one of the UK capital's biggest tourist draws and best known for housing the Rosetta Stone and the Parthenon Marbles, said police had arrested the suspect.

"An IT contractor who was dismissed last week trespassed into the museum and shut down several of our systems," a museum spokesman said.

"We are working hard to get the museum back to being fully operational but with regret our temporary exhibitions have been closed today and will remain so over the weekend."

Meanwhile in the Neth-

erlands, the Drents Museum in Assen said it was closed for the weekend after robbers used explosives to break in and steal three antique bracelets and a gold helmet.

Police were alerted to an explosion early Saturday, with the thieves stealing the golden helmet of Cotofenesti, dating from the mid-fifth century BC, the museum said on its website.

The helmet — the centrepiece of a temporary exhibition — was on loan from Romania's National History Museum in Bucharest.

And in Paris, the world-famous Orsay Museum was forced to disable its own ticketing system for several hours Friday after falling victim to a fraudulent scheme involving "mirror sites", it told AFP Saturday. — AFP

Sticking with tradition: Vietnam's glutinous 12-hour Tet cake

She values the process, as it preserves the Tet atmosphere and connects her to the cultural significance of the holiday, even though ready-made versions are available.

EXHAUSTED after 12 hours of cooking, Nguyen Thi Thuy Hong gently unpeels the last of five leaves encasing a squishy, sticky rice cake known as "banh chung" — a Lunar New Year delicacy in Vietnam.

The wrapped cakes of glutinous rice, green beans and pork belly have for centuries been one of several dishes prepared in a frenzy at home specially for Tet, the Vietnamese New Year which begins on Wednesday.

Hong, 55, has laboured over the dish — which must

be boiled for 12 hours over a wood fire — almost every year for the last four decades.

"We can buy ready-made banh chung but it doesn't create that Tet atmosphere," she said, explaining she enjoyed the process of cleaning leaves, soaking rice and pre-cooking beans in the very early morning.

"It keeps me busy, and it's tiring, but I still love making the cake myself."

According to an oft-told legend, the banh chung recipe was first prepared thousands of years ago by a Vietnamese prince who wanted to impress his father in a bid for the throne.

Impressed by his son's respect and the cake's flavor, the king passed down his crown. In Vietnam, banh chung cakes are offered to ancestors at family altars, honoring Confucian traditions. While many no longer make them from scratch, elders typically maintain the tradition. However, Nguyen Dao Anh Khoi, 23, worries about preserving it amidst modern challenges. — AFP

Rubbish roads: Nepal explores paving with plastic

IN Nepal's Pokhara, cars drive over roads constructed using discarded plastic, an innovative solution to the country's growing plastic waste problem. With urban areas generating around 5,000 tonnes of solid waste daily, of which 13 per cent is plastic, much of it ends up in landfills.

High-value plastics like bottles are recycled, but low-value plastics, such as multi-layered packaging, often go unutilized. This challenge presented an opportunity for young Nepali entrepreneurs like Bimal Bastola, founder of Green Road Waste Management, who found a way to use low-value plastics as a raw material in road construction.

The method, which involves shredding plastic waste and using it to coat road aggregates before adding bitumen, has been proven to make roads more durable, with studies showing plastic roads can last

twice as long as traditional roads.

The initiative aligns with global efforts, as neighboring India has been paving plastic roads since the early 2000s, and countries like Bhutan and Bangladesh are following suit.

Despite initial success, with about 10 small-scale projects completed, Bastola stresses the need for government-led projects to scale up. While some environmental concerns remain,

such as potential microplastic release, experts like Bhushan Tuladhar see plastic roads as a practical solution to both waste management and infrastructure needs in Nepal. — AFP

China's foreign investment, cooperation remain stable in 2024: official



Investments in ASEAN countries rose by 12.6%. Key sectors driving growth included leasing, business services, manufacturing, and wholesale/retail.

CHINA'S foreign investment and cooperation saw steady growth in 2024, an official with the Ministry of Commerce (MOC) said Sunday.

The country's non-financial outbound direct investment rose 10.5 per cent year on year to US\$ 143.85 billion last year, with investments in the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASE-AN) countries increasing by 12.6 per cent year on year, according to the official.

Investments in leasing, business services, manufacturing, and wholesale and retail sectors drove the growth. The turnover

of China's foreign contracted projects totaled US\$165.97 billion in 2024, an increase of 3.1 per cent year on year, the official said

In 2024, the number of workers dispatched abroad reached 409,000, a 17.9 per cent increase year on year, with a total of 594,000 Chinese workers employed overseas by the end of the year.

Non-financial investment in countries along the Belt and Road increased by 5.4 per cent year on year to US\$33.69 billion last year, MOC data showed. — Xinhua

India, Indonesia mutual funds industry collaborate to share best practices

INDIA and Indonesia's mutual funds industry have signed an MoU to enhance bilateral financial and economic best practices through cooperation.

A delegation of 12 top CEOs from Indonesia's mutual fund industry accompanied the Indonesian President on his state visit to India. The MoU was signed on Saturday evening in the presence of India's G2O Sherpa and Former CEO of Niti Ayog, Amitabh Kant.

As per the scope of the MoU, this partnership is set to strengthen the mutual fund sectors in both countries, enrich industry standards, and promote investor education and financial literacy, paving the way for a more dynamic, transparent, and globally integrated mutual fund ecosystem. — ANI

Mexican president says no upcoming trade war with US

MEXICAN President Claudia Sheinbaum said Friday that there is no trade war on the horizon with the United States, after US President Donald Trump's conciliatory remarks on trade with Mexico the day before.

"I do not see a trade war. The US president spoke differently about Mexico yesterday," Sheinbaum told a daily press conference.

Responding to questions at the World Economic Forum on Thursday, Trump said: "We're dealing with Mexico, I think, very well. We just want to be treated fairly." Trump has threatened to impose a 25 per cent tariff on Mexican imports starting 1 February. Sheinbaum also expressed willingness to strengthen collaboration with Washington and work with Trump on some priority issues, such as the distribution of fentanyl and migration. — Xinhua

UK to make case to Trump against whisky tariff: finance minister

BRITAIN will make the case to US President Donald Trump that Scotch whisky and other goods should be spared from any tariffs by the new administration, UK finance minister Rachel Reeves said Thursday.

During Trump's first term, his tariffs in 2019 against the European Union — which then included Britain — also targeted the UK's whisky industry.

Now outside the bloc, Reeves said Britain would strive to avoid a similar situation

"I know that President Trump is very proud of his Scottish roots and Scotch whisky is obviously a really important part of the Scottish economy. And so we'll make that case very strongly," Reeves told AFP in an interview at the World Economic Forum.

Rankled by trade gaps not in the United States' favour, Trump on the campaign trail last year threatened to introduce blanket customs duties, which could include Britain.

"I recognise President Trump's concern about countries that run large and persistent surpluses with the US. But the UK is not one of those countries," Reeves said at the forum in Davos, Switzerland.

"We're not part of the problem that President Trump and the new administration are trying to address and we'll make that case," she said.

Reeves was hopeful that trade ties between London and Washington could be even better than during his first presidential mandate.

Asked if there would be opportunities to increase trade again, she said: "Trade between our two countries and investment flows between our countries increased. I've no reason to believe that that can't happen again in a way that works for both of our economies." — AFP

Trump casts chill over US wind energy sector

DONALD Trump has long ranted against wind energy—claiming turbines are unsightly, dangerous to wildlife and too expensive—with him threatening to upend decades of industry progress just a few hours after resuming power.

"We're not going to do the wind thing," Trump said Monday as he returned to the Oval Office for the first time in four years as commander-in-chief.

"Big, ugly windmills," he said as he signed a series of executive orders that has brought the sector into crisis, adding that "they kill your birds, and they ruin your beautiful landscape."

Among the measures were a temporary freeze on federal permitting and loans for all offshore and onshore wind projects.

Jason Grumet, president of the American Clean Power Association (ACP), quickly slammed the move, saying it "increases bureaucratic barriers, undermining domestic energy development and harming American businesses and workers."

After the announcements, wind-related stocks fell into the red.

"It's had a real cooling effect on the sector," Elizabeth Wilson, an offshore wind specialist at Dartmouth University, told AFP. — AFP

Greek parliament fails to elect country's president in 1st round of voting

Outgoing President Katerina Sakellaropoulou's term ends in March, and presidents serve five-year renewable terms.

THE Greek parliament on Saturday failed to elect the country's next president.

None of the four candidates secured the required minimum 200 votes out of the total 300 members of the assembly in the first round. 297 members participated in the

Constantine Tassoulas, former parliament speaker and nominee of the ruling New Democracy party, received 160 votes, the most. The other three candidates each secured less than 50 votes.

A second round is scheduled for 31 January with the threshold also being 200 votes, according to the Greek constitution.

If no candidate achieves the required votes in the second round, the threshold will drop to 180 votes in the third round, and to a simple majority of 151 votes in the fourth

round. In the final round, the president will be elected with a relative majority.

The term of outgoing President Katerina Sakellaropoulou, former head of Greece's highest administrative court, expires in March.

According to the constitution, the country's president is elected for a five-year term and can be re-elected only once. — Xinhua

NEWS IN BRIEF

N Korea conducts cruise missile test, 1st since Trump inauguration

NORTH Korea said Sunday it test-fired strategic cruise missiles the previous day, with leader Kim Jong Un overseeing Pyongyang's first missile test since the inauguration of US President Donald Trump.

The examination of the sea-to-surface cruise guided weapons was aimed to "raise the effectiveness of strategic control against potential enemies in conformity with the changing regional safety circumstances," the official Korean Central News Agency said.

The country's Foreign Ministry also criticized the United States and South Korea over their recent joint miliary drills in a statement carried by KCNA on Sunday, warning such moves would be met with "the toughest counteraction from A to Z" as long as Washington refuses to recognize North Korea's sovereignty and security interests. This is the "best option" for dealing with the United States, the ministry added. - Kyodo

Mexico blocks US deportation flight

MEXICO refused to permit a deportation flight from the United States to land, marking an obstacle in US President Donald Trump's intensified immigration enforcement measures, the New York Post reported.

The denial on Thursday (local time) followed Trump's renewed efforts to strengthen border security, conduct mass deportations, and execute raids since returning to the White House.

The blocked flight came after two US Air Force C-17 flights successfully transported approximately 160 deportees to Guatemala earlier that day. However, Mexico's refusal to accept the plane raised questions, with no immediate clarification provided.

The White House attributed the issue to an administrative mix-up. A White House official stated via text that "the flights thing was an administrative issue and was quickly rectified." Separately, Fox News' Bill Melugin cited a senior State Department official who clarified that the misunderstanding was related to the Department of Defence flight manifest. – ANI

Red Cross: 2nd phase of Hamas-Israel prisoner-hostage deal completed

THE International Committee of the Red Cross from Israeli detention centers and transported (ICRC) announced Saturday the completion of the second phase of a prisoner-hostage exchange between Hamas and Israel, implemented under the initial terms of a ceasefire agreement.

The second phase, including the release of 200 Palestinian prisoners and four Israeli hostages, was carried out after thorough coordination and review procedures conducted by the ICRC, a neutral intermediary that ensured the smooth and secure implementation of the exchange, it said.

The Israeli hostages were transferred safely, with their well-being prioritized, whereas the Palestinian prisoners were released to Gaza and the West Bank following ICRC's interview with them, during which it verified their identities, evaluated their health conditions, and confirmed their readiness for travel, it said.

The ICRC urged ongoing dialogue between the parties and their continuous humanitarian commitments, so as to create the necessary conditions for the safe execution of future operations. — Xinhua

Athletics: Ethiopia's Edesa wins 2nd straight Osaka Women's Marathon

ETHIOPIA'S Workenesh Edesa ran the final 15 kilometres alone and unchallenged en route to winning the Osaka Women's Marathon for the second straight year Sunday.

Edesa crossed the finish line in 2 hours, 21 minutes at Yanmar Stadium Nagai, 19 seconds ahead of surprise runner-up Kana Kobayashi.

"I'm so happy that I won this race again," the 32-year-old Ethiopian said. "I'll just try to run a better time. That's my goal".

Yuka Suzuki, who placed sixth at last summer's Paris Olympics, finished third in 2:21:33.

The race doubled as a selection event for Japanese runners to September's world athletics championships in Tokyo. Kobayashi and Suzuki ran under the qualifying standard time set by athletics' international governing body of 2:23:30.

Israel's Lonah Chemtai Salpeter was fourth in 2:24:03. Threetime champion Mizuki Matsuda was seventh in 2:27:11.

At last year's Osaka Women's Marathon, Honami Maeda finished in 2:18:59 to break Mizuki Noguchi's 19-year-old national record and finish second behind Edesa. — Kyodo

China's highways to see record-high EV charging volume during Spring Festival holiday

Eight-day holiday sees 52% rise in highway charging demand.

THE electric vehicle (EV) charging volume on China's highways is set to hit a record high during the upcoming Spring Festival holiday, according to data from the State Grid Corporation of China.

Daily highway charging volumes are expected to average over 7.5 million kilowatt-hours during the eight-day holiday which starts on 28 January, marking a 52-per-cent year-on-year increase, the data showed.

The single-day peak charging volume during the holiday period is projected to exceed 9 million kilowatt-hours expanding by 34 per cent from the same period last year.

Peak travel days ahead of the holiday, namely 26 and 27 January, will see charging demand spike between 9 am and 9 pm, as millions of travelers hit the roads, the data revealed.

To meet rising charging demand, China has accelerated the construction of charging infrastructure. By the end of 2024, 98 per cent of highway service areas had charging facilities — with 35,000 charging poles in place. — Xinhua

CANDIDATES OFFICIALLY REGISTERED

Presidential election kicks off in Belarus

THE presidential election kicked off in Belarus on Sunday with polling stations opening at 8:00 am (0500 GMT) and closing at 8 pm (1700 GMT).

Five candidates, including incumbent President Alexander Lukashenko, have been registered for the presidential election.

Voters will cast their ballots at 5,325 polling stations nationwide and the number of voters stands at about 6.9 million, according to the country's Central Election Commission. Elections are considered valid if more than half of the citizens included in the voter list cast their ballots. The head of state is considered elected if a candidate is supported by more than half of the voters who took part in the voting. – Xinhua
