MCEF to hold one-day post-quake building assessment training in Yangon, Mandalay

MYANMAR Construction Entrepreneurs Federation (MCEF) will conduct a one-day training for post-earthquake building assessments and repair techniques free of charge on 5 May in Mandalay and on 12 May in Yangon, with registered architects from Engineering Ministries International and professional engineers.

MCEF has been carrying out three agendas: rescue, resettlement and raising awareness efforts.

The course “Post-earthquake building assessments and repair technique” will be offered by trainers; Mrs Sarah Dunn, a Registered Architect holding a Master’s degree in International Cooperation in Sustainable Emergency Architecture from University International de Catalunya and a Bachelor of Architecture from Auburn University, Mr Samuel Carrara, a Professional Engineer with Civil Engineering degree from Norwich University and MBA from Queens University, Mr Craig Cole, Structural Engineer with Master’s degree in science from the University of California, and Mrs Jaclyn Miller, an Architect.

Myanmar debuts first QR code toll system at Thanlyin Bridge 3

The Thanlyin Bridge 3 is 8,638 feet long and located about 125 metres (around 410 feet) away from Thanlyin Bridge 1, which was inaugurated in 1993.

Myanmar’s first QR code system is adopted at the Bago River-Crossing Thanlyin Bridge 3 for the collection of the road usage fee.

The bridge offers services to the vehicles using the cash collection system at the tollgate and also the QR code system, which is the very first in Myanmar. As this system is being introduced in Myanmar, if

it is used successfully, the QR code system based on AI technology could reduce the service fees at tollgates compared to the traditional direct cash payment method.

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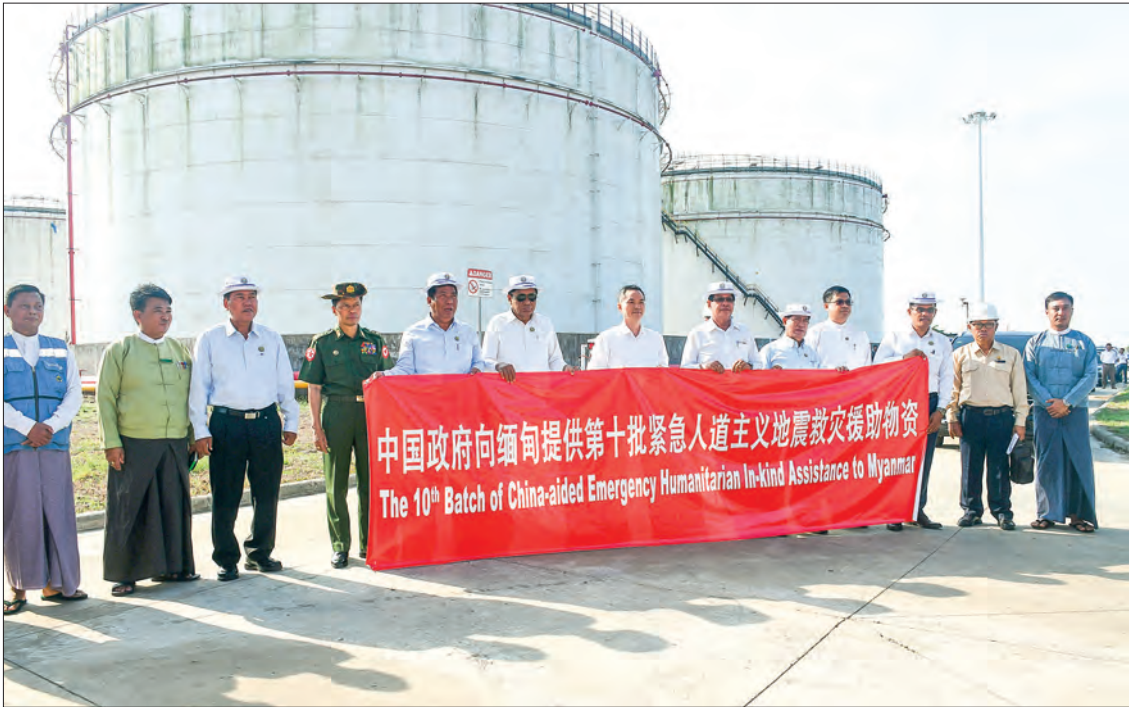

## China donates 18,000-MT diesel for Mandalay quake relief



CHINA donated 18,000 metric tonnes of diesel to assist in the rehabilitation efforts following the recent major earthquake in Mandalay Region. The diesel handover ceremony took place on the morning of 2 May at the Brighter Energy Port in Kyauktan Township, Thanlyin District.

Yangon Region Chief Minister U Soe Thein, along with officials, attended the event. Mr Ouyang Daobing, Counsellor of the Chinese Embassy to Myanmar also participated in the handover, together with members of the Thanlyin District Administration Body, officials from the Kyauktan Township Administration Body and officials.

According to sources, the donated diesel will be transported by the Ministry of Energy for use in the recovery and reconstruction efforts in areas affected by the earthquake. — Zwe Htet Ko (IPRD)/KZL

## China donates 340 prefab homes for Mandalay quake relief

THE People's Republic of China made its 11<sup>th</sup> batch of donations – modular (prefabricated) houses – to Myanmar as part of recovery efforts following the recent major earthquake in Mandalay. A total of 340 units, weighing 1,355 tonnes, arrived at the Thilawa (MITT) Port at 4:35 pm on 2 May aboard the vessel MV Dkillos.

Yangon Region Chief Minister U Soe Thein received the donation from Mr Ouyang Daobing, Commercial Counsellor of the Chinese Embassy at Thilawa Port.

The Yangon Region chief minister and his delegation also inspected the unloading process, during which the



prefabricated houses were being transferred from the ship to trucks using cranes. They further observed the process of transferring the units from trucks to rail wagons, which will be used to transport them to earthquake-stricken areas via Myanma Railways. Coordination was made on-site to address necessary logistical requirements. — Zwe Htet Ko (IPRD)/KZL

Residents Urged to Prioritize Public Safety Amid Armed Terrorist Threats

ARMED terrorists have been launching attacks by using residential homes and administrative buildings in towns and villages as cover, where they have forcibly settled. They aim to shield themselves from Tatmadaw counterattacks while also persuading temporarily displaced persons to return to their native areas and recruiting new members. That enables terrorists to use civilians as human shields. Tatmadaw is committed to safeguarding the sovereignty of the State and will respond to these threats based on intelligence and prevailing conditions. Therefore, residents in areas where terrorists have taken control must prioritize their safety and protect themselves from being exploited by these groups.

Homes for flood victims handed over

The housing was constructed with the help of hotels and tourism-related organi-

zations under the leadership of the Myanmar Tourism Federation and supervision of the Ministry of Hotels and Tourism.

Speaking at the event, the Union minister highlighted the buildings for flood victims in Nyaungpintha village-after the 2024 flood, and the construction that included 22 houses,

including a Community Centre. He also talked about the training courses for the villagers to create job opportunities.

Afterwards, the Nay Pyi Taw Council chairman and relevant officials talked about the education, small-scale manufacturing sectors and rehabilitation processes. — MNA/KTZH

Rescue and relief efforts ongoing for Myanmar quake survivors

AS of 3 May, six regions and states impacted by the Mandalay earthquake have reported 3,778 deaths, 5,105 injuries, and 93 missing individuals.

Search and rescue teams from the Myanmar Fire Brigade, alongside domestic and international responders, have been conducting rescue missions in the affected areas. These efforts have successfully rescued 653 survivors

trapped under collapsed buildings and recovered the bodies of 788 deceased individuals.

Local donors have provided financial support and essential supplies to those affected, while international communities, organizations, and individual contributors have extended additional assistance. Between 5 pm on 2 May and 5 pm on 3 May, baby accessories weighing 0.777

tonne donated by the Danish Red Cross, tents and clothes weighing at 1.349 tonnes donated by the Myanmar-Chinese Taipei Traders Association and kitchen utensils weighing 10.1 tonnes provided by UNHCR arrived at Yangon International Airport.

These relief supplies are being distributed swiftly to earthquake victims to ensure timely support. — MNA/KZL

ME to Czech Republic seeks donations for quake-hit religious sites

## Tireless efforts underway to rescue and rehabilitate earthquake-affected areas

TATMADAW members, Myanmar Police Force members, firefighters, rescue teams from foreign countries, departmental personnel, social organizations and residents are repairing damaged bridges and roads caused by the Mandalay earthquake.

Chief Minister of Sagaing Region U Myat Kyaw and Lt-Gen Thet Pon from the Office of the Commander-in-Chief (Army) inspected the salvage of iron frames from the damaged Inwa Bridge (Sagaing) led by Myanmar Economic Corporation. They also viewed the learning of 1,280 students who will sit the Grade 12 examination under the teaching of professors and associate professors at Sagaing University of Education in Sagaing.

They also inspected collapsed and damaged religious buildings in Sagaing and on Sagaing

Hill, where Tatmadaw members, police members, firefighters and residents participated in the removal of debris.

At the No 3 Basic Education High School in Ywahtaung Ward of Sagaing, the Chief Minister of the region and Lt-Gen Thet Pon presented foodstuffs to teachers and then looked into the clearing of debris at collapsed buildings at the District Agriculture Department and residential houses in Sagaing.

Lt-Gen Myo Moe Aung from the Office of the Commander-in-Chief (Army) inspected the repair of pagodas, the Gandakuti chamber, the lift and the escalator on Mandalay Hill.

He instructed officials to remove debris from the damaged parts of the eastern stairway and swiftly carry out reconstruction tasks. At Sky Villa in Aung-

myaythazan Township, Lt-Gen Myo Moe Aung overviewed the progress of removing debris at the collapsed building and left necessary instructions.

Lt-Gen Soe Tint Naing from the Office of the Commander-in-Chief (Army) looked into the progress of clearing debris at collapsed buildings of Maha Wizayaranthi Stupa in Amarapura Township and Htilin Monastery in Chanayethazan Township and urged officials to rebuild pagodas and stupas in their original states.

In Pyigyidagun Township, he viewed preparations for enabling students to happily learn education in the 2025-26 academic year after inspecting the removal of debris at the damaged parts of BEMS No 20 in the township.

Union Minister for Religious Affairs and Culture U Tin Oo Lwin and Lt-Gen Myo Thant

Naing from the Office of the Commander-in-Chief (Army) inspected the condition of Kyaukthitta Pagoda at Shwemuhtaw Pagoda's Dhammayon and discussed prioritized tasks to be done in accord with the work procedures sent by the Engineering Council. They also looked into the supply of water along the Minye and Tamok canals from the Minye Dam in Kyaukse, damage to the remaining walls of the dam, and requirements for repairing the retaining walls of the Zawgyi River before the monsoon season.

They inspected the clearing of two dangerous buildings in Zaytan Ward of Kyaukse with the use of heavy machinery and instructed officials to prioritize worksite safety and ease traffic congestion.

The inspection boards have examined 5,607 earthquake-affected buildings under the standard operation procedure in Kyaukse District. They have classified 5,323 buildings to be repaired for public residence. A total of 219 out of 284 dangerous buildings have been cleared, and there remain 65 dangerous buildings.

They inspected the Technical, Vocational Education and Training Teacher Training College (Bilin) in Shankan Village-tract of Singaing Township and urged officials to seek approval from the relevant ministry to repair the damaged buildings as quickly as possible. — MNA/TTA

K10.8M in raw opium, K86M in drugs seized across Ywangan, Amarapura, Tachilek

THE Myanmar Police Force seized K10.8 million worth of raw opium in Ywangan and Amarapura Townships and K86 million worth of psychotropic drugs in Tachilek Township, according to the Myanmar Police Force.

A combined team, including members of the Anti-Drug Police Force, conducted a search a motorbike driven by Ma Thida Hmwe near Myogyi village in Ywangan Township at 10:30 am on 1 May. The operation resulted in the seizure of 15 kilogrammes of raw opium, valued at K4.5 million.

According to the investiga-

tion, police arrested Maung Pu (aka) Maung Nyunt with 21 kilogrammes of raw opium valued at K 6.3 million in Amarapura Township.

Similarly, the Police Force searched a motorbike driven by Lausi Kham (aka) Kyashi Pah in Tachilek Township at 8:30 am on 2 May and seized two kilogrammes of ketamine worth K20 million and 0.6 kilogramme of Happy Water worth K66 million.

Legal action has been taken against the offenders, and an investigation is underway to identify the perpetrators of the crime chain. — MNA/MKKS

Security forces neutralize terrorist IEDs in Monywa operation

PDF terrorists intentionally exploded townships, villages, wards, roads and bridges, aiming to impose difficulties and fear among the public.

The dutiful people reported to the security force members regarding the homemade mines planted at Monywa (South) Jetty (Monywa-Nyaungbingyi Jetty) in Monywa (South) Ward,

Monywa, Sagaing Region. The security forces inspected that place and found five homemade bombs planted by terrorists yesterday. Security forces deactivated and exploded these mines systematically later.

Security forces accelerated security measures in the vicinity of that place. — MNA/KTZH

Two-day illegal trade crackdown seizes goods worth K2.985 bln

UNDER the supervision of the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee, efforts to combat the illicit trade are continued effectively by the law.

On 1 and 2 May, the combined teams impounded 19 vehicles, travelling from Tachilek to Taunggyi, carrying 65 kinds of industrial materials, 26 kinds of consumer goods and a kind of foodstuff without official documents valued at K600.823 million in Hopong Township, a Toyota Noah (estimated value of K35 million), heading to Mandalay from Monywa, carrying a kind of consumer goods valued at K1.56 million without official documents at the Yadanabon bridge (Mandalay) checkpoint, two vehicles (estimated value of K74 million), heading to Mandalay from Taunggyi, carrying 14 kinds of consumer goods worth K23.383 million without official documents and five trucks

(approximately K187 million) carrying 41 kinds of industrial materials worth K337.413 million without official documents at the Htonbo (7<sup>th</sup>-mile) checkpoint. The action was conducted as per Customs procedures.

Similarly, the combined on-duty teams nabbed a kind of industrial materials valued at K13.5 million without official documents from a warehouse by the side of Kawka-reik-Myawady Asia Highway, three kinds of industrial materials worth K203.018 million without official documents from six containers at the Myanmar Industrial Port, five kinds of consumer goods worth K2.132 million without official documents from a passenger at the Yangon International Airport and a Yutong bus (approximately K50 million), travelling from Hpa-an to Mandalay, carrying five kinds of foodstuffs worth

K5.05 million without official documents at the Nyaung-klashay xray station. The action was taken following Customs procedures.

In additionally, the combined teams seized a kind of foodstuffs worth K9.69 million without official documents from a warehouse in Inlaymyaing Industrial Zone in Myeik Township and five vehicles (approximately K355 million) carrying 16 kinds of industrial materials and four kinds of consumer goods valued at K138.418 million without official documents near the Milepost Zero and 26/4 on the expressway. The action was taken in line with Customs procedures.

The Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee reported 74 arrests on 1 and 2 May, seizing illegal goods worth approximately K2.985 billion. — MNA/MKKS

Prison sentences for trafficking women to China for forced marriages

TWO individuals involved in trafficking women to China for forced marriage have been sentenced to 10 years in prison each.

The Myanmar Police Force reported that Zaw Min San and Ma Thawda Min, from Htantabin Village in Dekkhinathiri Township, Nay Pyi Taw, transported a 42-year-old woman from the

same village to China in 2024. The offenders were charged under Section 38(A) of the Anti-Trafficking in Persons Law, and their cases were submitted to the court. On 29 April, the District Court of Lewe sentenced the two arrestees, Zaw Min San and Ma Thawda Min, to 10 years each for their roles in the human

trafficking scheme.

It was also reported that the absconding accused, Ma Ohmar Htwe (also known as Ma Htwe or Yoon Nge), was declared an absconder under Sections 87/88 of the Law of Criminal Procedure.

In a separate case, the Myanmar Police Force reported that Aung San Oo, from Swansaw

Ward in Mengwong area, Muse Township, had transported a 17-year-old girl from Yeyan Village in Kutkai District, Shan State (North), to China in 2024. The offender was charged under Sections 38(A)/44 of the Anti-Trafficking in Persons Law, and the case was submitted to the court. On 28 April, the District Court of

Muse sentenced Aung San Oo to 20 years in prison for his role in the human trafficking scheme.

Additionally, it was reported that the absconding accused, Daw Wint Wah Htun and Daw Nan Aye Say, were declared absconders under Sections 87/88 of the Law of Criminal Procedure. — MNA/MKKS

Foundations and lobby groups that have betrayed for the sake of money

However, his thoughts and actions were not in harmony with Myanmar’s politics, religion, and culture. Due to the influx of dollar donations favouring the opposition, Myanmar’s political situation became even more chaotic, leading to the deterioration of the country. It is evident that the true intention behind the so-called support for democracy was to systematically wedge Myanmar’s society, ultimately aiming for the complete destruction and collapse of both the State and the entire society.

Since 1994, most of the scholars produced by the Burma Project have primarily served as resources to oppose the Myanmar government and to destabilize and destroy Myanmar. The headquarters of the Burma Project is OSI (Open Society Institute), and through the Open Society Foundation, established by George Soros, illicit funds flow to NGOs, INGOs, CSOs, and media organizations in Myanmar and other countries.

In Myanmar, it is known as Open Society Myanmar (OSM). There were a total of six interactions, both domestically and internationally, between Daw Aung San Suu Kyi and George Soros senior and

junior. Illegal financial activities refer to the depositing and withdrawal of foreign currencies into and from Myanmar banks without reporting to the government, whether through OSM or OSF (Open Society Foundations). The situation worsens if those foreign entities are involved with DCS (Disloyal Civil Servants) movements. In this context, it was found that although the Daw Khin Kyi Foundation, led by Daw Aung San Suu Kyi as Chairperson in 2013, was established as a domestic charitable social organization, it also engaged in political activities. Without being able to properly document banking transactions, it has been observed that all the foundation’s funds were transferred by Moe Zaw Oo from the NUG (National Unity Government), showing that the funds were used for subversive activities.

There have been criticisms directed at the foundation regarding the use of domestic and international donations, both in ways unrelated to its original objectives — education, health, and social sectors — as well as regarding the use of State-owned land and property. Looking at the Myanmar Disloyalty Civil Servant (DCS) movement, it is evident that every successful revolutionary movement around the world relies heavily on the financial resources provided by supporting

organizations.

Because of the lure of money alone, many popular artistes, charity organizations, influencers, and media groups are actively lobbying for a national destruction plan. Famous artistes have been pressured with massive amounts of money — millions of dollars deposited into their bank accounts — and no matter what kind of person are, it’s hard to withstand

such financial temptation. These huge sums of money could have been enough to provide daily meals for the hundreds of thousands of unemployed citizens in the country. Some government officials, who had become closely connected with the NLD group, also believed that if the NLD formed a government again, they would benefit from the prestige and personal gains that would come with promotions and influential positions. But now, realizing that such prospects are lost forever, they have turned to participating in the nation’s destruction efforts without hesitation or shame.

Effects based on causes

No matter what, everything must have a cause and effect. Why did they act this way? They did so because it served their interests. They would not act without some benefit. If the ultimate goal is said to be the encirclement, blockade, and destruction of China, then destabilizing neighbouring Myanmar — creating unrest and turning it into a battlefield — would be one stage of a broader plan aiming for the total collapse, designed by those who wish to see China’s downfall. To bring about the collapse of Myanmar, the first stage would be to incite mass public uprisings, stage protests, and provoke conflicts between the people and Tatmadaw. If necessary, the plan would escalate to arming internal armed groups to fight Tatmadaw. If

further escalation were needed, foreign intervention under the pretext of R2P (Responsibility to Protect) could follow.

For such cases, it is necessary to recall and consider how political games were played by Tatmadaw, leading to the accusation of war crimes at the ICJ. To achieve this, electoral frauds were committed. The country’s destruction was intentionally carried out according to the desires of the Western bloc and George Soros. It can be said that they violated the Constitution of the nation and betrayed the country.

It caused the loss of billions in foreign currency and corruption; the collapse of national security systems; the decline and deterioration of religious and cultural values; the breakdown of unity among the people; and the deterioration of diplomatic relations with some countries leading to a loss of trust; and even the revocation of previously awarded honors and recognitions, resulting in a significant loss of leadership credibility.

Currently, as you know, people are experiencing the consequences and facing numerous new challenges while striving to maintain stability and rebuild unity. The mistakes made before the election are now turned into errors as consequences and all are bearing these consequences made by CPRH and NUG. The experiences and lessons learned by the people have

become the foundation for any change they wish to bring about.

The future of Myanmar’s political issue is whether it will once again be swept by turbulent waves like in 1988 or the post-2021 period. At this moment, it is time to deeply consider the priorities. People are now fearful that they may once again face bitter consequences, whether the mistakes were committed knowingly or unknowingly, intentionally or unintentionally, and many would prefer to leave behind those who were responsible

for past wrongs. From the breakdown of individuals to the collapse of the whole system, if the country is lost, the people and even the religion may disappear along with it. We, the people of Myanmar, must begin to worry and reflect on this reality.

Looking at the situations in Syria and Ukraine, it is clear that Myanmar should not become a battlefield. All must strive to save the country from becoming a failed state without allowing it to descend into war. Just as the pre-2020 conditions are no longer acceptable, the worsening post-2021 conditions are also something the people no longer wish to endure. Rather than constantly preparing for conflict, it is now crucial to hand over power to those who envision peace and development for the country. The people themselves must no longer be easily swayed or manipulated into rising without clear thought and awareness.

Most of the Myanmar people tend to follow someone simply when they are persuaded by others, without carefully considering whether that person is truly capable, appropriate, or even right. This tendency is likely to swallow a coconut by applying lubricant to it, and such a mindset must now be abandoned. Especially among the youth, whose inexperience and energy make them vulnerable to manipulation, awareness is essential. What

is truly important is for institutions that are vital to the nation to rise above ego, pride, and dismissive attitudes toward one another. Instead, it is time to genuinely understand and build respectful, cooperative relationships among them. Only then can the country move toward meaningful progress.

All, especially, should understand the duties of Tatmadaw that defend the Constitution. Whether it is liberal or democratic, one is right or one is wrong, while suspending democratic rights, and narrowing the media freedom, such doings make one a dictator.

When self-interest is prioritized, democracy and human rights are often cast aside — this is a lesson that must be recognized. It leads one to wonder whether a form of nationalist democracy might be more suitable for Myanmar than a loosely liberal, overly permissive version of democracy. Nationalism, being inherently at odds with globalism, is particularly relevant in today’s multipolar world, where a shift from globalization to regionalization is taking place. This evolving trend, as pointed out by the State Head, is something we must pay closer attention to.

It is important to note that, starting with “America First”, nationalist politics are gradually gaining strength in some parts of the world, with nationalistic leaders, parties, and governments becoming more prominent. Looking at how the American people continue to protect and preserve their national identity; we can see the need for many individuals in our own country who will strive to prevent issues — such as child adoption rights.

It is necessary to prevent the emergence of traitors who would surrender their own sovereignty or pledge allegiance to foreign interests and organizations, potentially turning others into slaves. “Study learned” is more valuable than “lesson learned”; only by opening our eyes and ears to the experiences of others, by learning for ourselves, and by making our own efforts to act accordingly, can we ensure that our nation’s future history will be clear and beautiful.

## Myanmar debuts first QR code toll system at Thanlyin Bridge 3

“When we collect fees at Thanlyin Bridge 3, we use the cash collection system and the MyanGo toll app – QR code system. With the QR system, payments can be made by simply scanning with a mobile phone, and there is no need to carry cash. This allows tollgates to have better control over financial transactions. For travellers, using the cash collection system often requires handling and carrying receipts, so moving to a QR-based system encourages cooperation and convenience for both sides,” said U Htin Kyaw, director of the Department of Highways.

The QR code system is a technology that allows

vehicles entering the tollgate on a bridge to have their licence plate read by an ANPR system. Drivers can use the MyanGo toll application installed on their mobile phones to scan the QR code displayed on the display board at the tollgate. After scanning, they can make a payment using their preferred option among AYA Pay, KBZ Pay, Wave Pay, or uab Pay. Once the payment is completed, the barrier automatically opens, allowing the vehicle to pass through.

Compared to the traditional direct cash payment system used at toll gates, this system is more efficient. With faster internet connectivity and the use of mobile

payment methods, it eliminates the need to carry cash, wait for service charges to be processed, or wait for receipts. As a result, it is being adopted internationally.

“We are proud to be the first to implement the QR code system in Myanmar. We are actively working to raise public awareness and understanding of the system. As AI technology continues to advance, we are pleased to see it being practically applied in ways like this,” said U Lin Htut Ko Ko, manager of TollTech Company. The Thanlyin Bridge 3 is 8,638 feet long and located about 125 metres (around 410 feet) away from Thanlyin Bridge 1, which was inaugurated in 1993. — Nyein Thu (MNA)/KTZH



Emphasize preparations to avoid untimely climatic conditions

THE Department of Meteorology and Hydrology has advised that, during appropriate times and conditions, various types of natural disasters such as thunderstorms, hailstorms, squalls, lightning strikes, heavy rain, strong winds, and tornadoes may occur in some parts of Myanmar. Therefore, the department has recommended that people take precautionary measures in advance.

Due to the strength of the monsoon winds blowing from the Bay of Bengal and the Andaman Sea, and the interaction with the strong wind from the Indian Ocean and the South China Sea, there is likely to be intense weather activity. These conditions may lead to increased rainfall and thunderstorm activity from the evening of 29 April to 4 May in the following regions: Yangon, Mandalay, Bago, Magway, Sagaing, Ayeyawady and Taninthayi regions, Chin,

This story will guide the children to explore new friends and neighbours to adapt to the new environment. The Pooh's Helping Hands teach children how to approach and overcome challenges by fostering a sense of community, empathy and problem-solving through collaboration.

The story highlights how to engage in society as children, human beings, students and neighbours. It will help children under-

stand emotion and social interactions, introduce the value of assisting others as basic life skills, and build courage and confidence.

Next, the "Be Patient, Pooh" story describes how waiting is hard, no matter how they rush through the day. Yet, they need to be reminded of the good things that will come to those who wait.

For instance, if one waits for his friend, parents should guide them to clean the room to take responsibility with real-life tests before friends visit and encourage patience and preparation while waiting for rewards to play along with games and stuff.

This book gives dual language learning with original English text alongside Myanmar translation, developing emotional intelligence, independence, and problem-solving skills through strategies. Elders need to introduce them to stories and stimulate them to foster reading habits to help them understand their needs, likes and self-thinking.

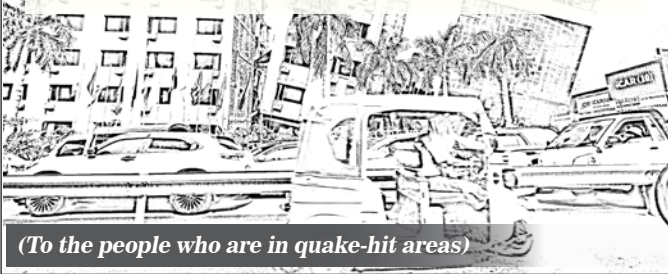
Where the Earth Could Not Win

# New mandate: All exports require automatic or non-automatic licensing

The Trade Department has already notified that, according to Bulletin 3/2025 of the Trade Department. While filling in declarations through MACCS, additional information on the licence declaration and licence balancing must be carried out according to the previous procedures.

The Trade Department notified on 1 April that export activities were allowed without seeking licences for the whole of April, following a post-earthquake network connecting error in quake-stricken regions. — NN/KK

# Fisheries enforces May-to-July fishing moratorium

THE Department of Fisheries puts a three-month halt to the fishing season in the Myanmar Sea from May to July

in the current financial year 2025-2026. Last year's close season was in April-June. This year, the fishing clo-

sure season was changed. Offshore fishing trawlers must shut down their operations during the Q2 to protect fish species and marine resources. However, inshore trawlers and boats are allowed to keep running the business.

As the close season has already started, all kinds of offshore fishing trawlers have suspended their operations and returned to the shores.

There are several fishing blocks in Ayeyawady, Taninthayi and Yangon regions and Mon and Rakhine states. About 1,500 large offshore fishing trawlers are put out to sea in Taninthayi Region during the open season. — ASH/KK

The main roads of Mandalay, which were damaged by the earthquake, have been cleared of building debris to prevent road blockages and ensure the safety of road users, with the clearance of the Golden City building completed on 1 May. The clearance of damaged buildings along 26<sup>th</sup> streets from 75<sup>th</sup> to 82<sup>nd</sup> streets has been completed for two buildings, bringing the overall clearance of earthquake-damaged buildings in Mandalay to more than 80 per cent.

Similarly, in the ongoing cleanup of buildings damaged by the earthquake in Sagaing, heavy machinery has been reported to have been used to remove the debris of high-rise buildings, such as large Buddhist learning centres and

other religious structures on higher ground, resulting in 50 per cent completion. — ASH/TH



# Trump’s 25% auto part tariff takes effect, in latest blow to Japan

To mitigate the impact on the auto industry, the administration is assisting manufacturers in relocating supply chains for car parts within the US over the next two years.

THE US administration of President Donald Trump on Saturday imposed a new 25 per cent tariff on key auto parts such as engines, in another blow to Japan’s mainstay car industry already slapped with the same rate of tariff on automobiles.

However, in a bid to ease the impact of the tariffs on the auto industry, the Trump administration has taken steps to help manufacturers relocate supply chains for car parts used in the United States over the next two years.

The new 25 per cent duties on imported passenger vehicles and light trucks took effect on 3 April targeting all countries around the world.

Trump’s car tariffs could have a particularly huge impact on Japan, a key US ally, as the auto industry has been a major driver of the broader economy. — Kyodo

# Indian manufacturing booms in Apr as exports see biggest leap in 14 years

INDIA’S manufacturing sector gained fresh momentum in April, driven by a sharp increase in output and robust international demand, according to the latest HSBC India Manufacturing Purchasing Managers’ Index.

The seasonally adjusted PMI edged up marginally to 58.2 in April from 58.1 in March, marking the strongest improvement in the sector’s health in ten months.

Pranjul Bhandari, Chief India Economist at HSBC, said, “The notable increase in new export orders in April may indicate a potential shift in production to India, as businesses adapt to the evolving trade landscape and US tariff announcements.”

Bhandari added, “Manufacturing output growth strengthened to a ten-month high on robust orders. Input prices increased slightly faster, but the impact on margins could be more than offset by the much-faster rise in output prices, of which the index jumped to the highest level since October 2013.” — ANI

# China sees 47.6% rise in NEV charging infrastructure facilities

THE number of charging infrastructure facilities in China increased 47.6 per cent year on year by the end of March 2025, as the country further expanded its charging infrastructure network for new energy vehicles (NEVs), according to the National Energy Administration (NEA).

The cumulative number of charging infrastructure facilities nationwide reached nearly 13.75 million at the end of March, Zhang Xing, an NEA official, said at a recent press conference.

This figure included 3.9 million public charging points for NEVs and 9.85 million private charging installations, he noted. Highways now feature 38,000 charging points across 98 per cent of service areas nationwide, while 13 provincial-level regions in the country have extended coverage to all townships, lifting the township-level penetration rate to 76.91 per cent. — Xinhua

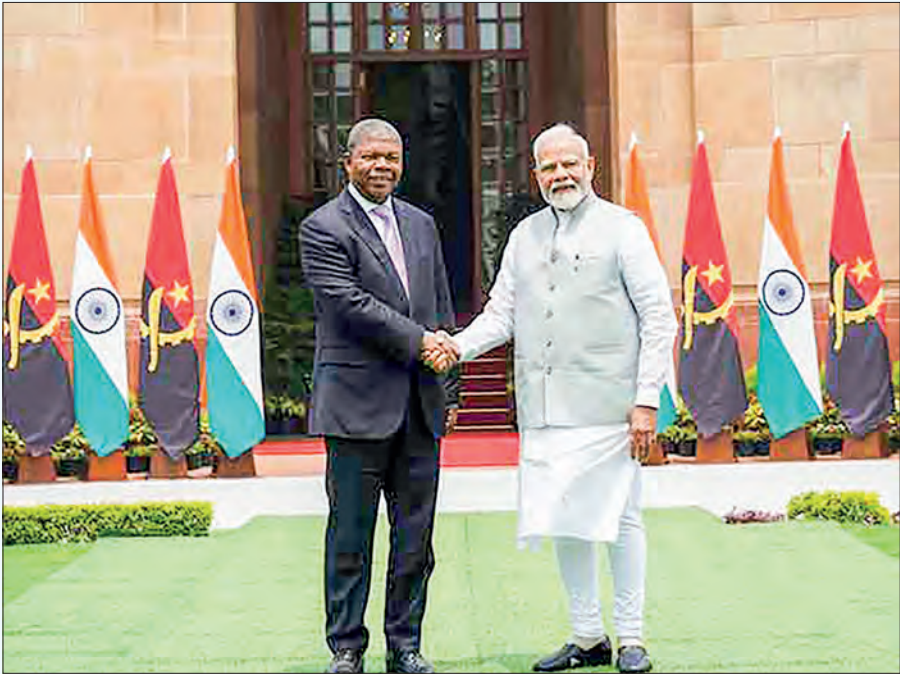

## PM Modi holds bilateral meeting with Angolan President Lourenco at Hyderabad House

*The discussions aimed to foster the special relationship between India and Angola.*

PRIME Minister Narendra Modi on Saturday met President of Angola, Joao Manuel Goncalves Lourenco, at Hyderabad House. PM Modi, along with External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar and Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri, also held a bilateral meeting with President Lourenco at Hyderabad House. Sharing a post on X, Ministry of External Affairs spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal wrote, “Fostering India-Angola special relationship. PM @narendramodi warmly received President Mr Joao Manuel Goncalves Lourenco of Angola at Hyderabad House ahead of their bilateral talks.” Earlier, EAM Jaishankar had also met with Angolan President during his State Visit to India. He further said that the meeting between PM Modi and Angolan President is expected to strengthen cooperation not just between India and Angola, but also boost India-Africa relations. — ANI

## Swiss court bans animal names for plant-based products

A court in Switzerland ruled Friday that animal names cannot be used to describe vegan products and that terms such as “plant-based chicken” or “vegan pork” constitute consumer deception. “The term ‘chicken’ refers to poultry, that is, an animal,” the federal court said in a statement, adding that under Swiss law “all information about food products must be in keeping with reality”. As such, “a plant-based product which refers to the term ‘chicken’ and does not contain meat is a deception”, it added following a public hearing about overturning a lower court ruling. The ruling comes in a long-running case involving the Swiss company Planted Foods, which manufactures pea-based meat substitute products such as burgers, steaks and sausages. — AFP

## Masked protesters attack Socialists at France May Day rally

All-black-clad protesters harassed marching lawmakers and supporters of France’s moderate left Socialist Party (PS) on Thursday, marring Paris’s Labour Day procession as hundreds of thousands rallied across the country. International Workers’ Day rallies across France drew more than 300,000 on Thursday, including 100,000 in Paris, the CGT trade union told AFP, while police put the total figure at 157,000. Police said the Paris procession, where an AFP journalist saw protesters covered up in black clothing roughly jostling PS politicians and activists, drew 32,000. While the march in the capital largely passed off without incident, Socialist lawmakers complained of being assaulted in with punches and flares, leading to dozens of arrests in the afternoon. — AFP

## 40% of Japan prefectures offer financial aid over US tariffs

Nearly 40 per cent of Japanese prefectural governments are offering or have decided to offer financial assistance to businesses as the economy feels the impact of tariffs imposed by the United States, a Kyodo News survey showed Wednesday. Currently, 18 out of Japan’s 47 prefectures have moved to offer such assistance to small and medium-sized firms as well as agriculture, forestry and fisheries operators, with nine more prefectural governments considering providing aid, according to the survey. Of the 18, 15 are providing financial support, while three said they will start providing support in the near future, as concerns grow over the repercussions of the tariffs by US President Donald Trump’s administration on industries such as auto and semiconductor manufacturing, and rice production. — Kyodo

## Afghan refugees return home from Pakistan, Iran

A total of 1,414 Afghan families with 6,619 members returned to their homeland from neighbouring Iran and Pakistan on Sunday and Monday, Afghanistan’s High Commission for Addressing Returnees Problems reported on Tuesday. The refugees have come home via the Torkham border crossing in eastern Nangarhar province, the Spin Boldak border crossing in southern Kandahar province, the Islam Qala border point in western Herat province, and the Abrisham border crossing point in western Nimroz province, it said. Nearly 120,000 Afghan refugees have returned to their homeland from Pakistan from 1 to 24 April the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) reported on Thursday. About 7 million Afghan refugees, most of whom are undocumented migrants, are currently living abroad, with most living in Afghanistan’s Pakistan and Iran. — Xinhua

## China honours model workers, exemplary individuals

China on Monday celebrated the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the founding of the All-China Federation of Trade Unions by honouring national model workers and individuals. A total of 1,670 people were honoured as national role model workers, while 756 were recognized as exemplary individuals. Apart from those working in the traditional sectors like agriculture and manufacturing, the honourees also include inheritors of fine traditional Chinese culture and representatives from new professions such as delivery workers and domestic service trainers. This year’s event is the 17<sup>th</sup> edition of its kind, which showcases the patriotism and creativity of workers in the new era. — Xinhua

## China unveils draft of its first-ever environmental code

China is poised for a significant enhancement in its green efforts as a draft of the country’s first-ever environmental code was unveiled on Sunday. The draft, submitted to the Standing Committee of the National People’s Congress (NPC) for a first reading, comprises 1,188 articles in five chapters including the general provisions, pollution prevention and control, ecological protection, green and low-carbon development, legal liability and supplementary provisions. Once adopted, it will become China’s second formal statutory code, after the Civil Code, which was adopted in 2020. The compilation of the environmental code was initiated in 2023. — Xinhua

The club has appointed 25-year-old Spanish fitness coach

Ferran Fernandez, who is currently pursuing a postgraduate degree in Sports Science. Prior to this, he served as a fitness coach at a third-tier Spanish club.

Shan United has also added Japanese defender Yuki Izu to its lineup. Izu, who can play both centrally and wide, is the first of three planned foreign player signings for the new season. The club has already recruited three local players and is set to finalize more international additions.

Ryu stretches lead at LPGA Black Desert Championship

RYU Hae-ran shook off a slow start with an eagle and four birdies in a five-under par 67 on Friday that gave her a two-stroke lead midway through the LPGA Black Desert Championship in Utah.

Ryu started the day with a one-shot lead after a bogey-free nine-under opening round.

She struggled to get going, dropping a shot before back-to-back birdies at the fifth and sixth and an eagle at the par-five ninth. She added two more birdies coming in for a five-under par 67 and a 14-under total of 130.

"Yesterday was so amazing for me, but today started a little bit tough," she said. "But I just wait for my first

birdie and I made a chip-in and it's an amazing birdie.

"Then today is a good day again because I got an eagle and a chip-in birdie — lots of things today that were good for me".

Ryu has wasted no time in contending after a disappointing finish in the first major of the year last week. She shared the 54-hole lead at the Chevron Championship but faded on Sunday and missed out on the five-woman playoff won by Japan's Mao Saigo. Playing a new course for the LPGA, she is focusing on managing the course and the conditions as she chases her third victory after one win each in 2023 and 2024.

"Maybe tomorrow and final round I think will be a little bit windier than the first two rounds. I think here it's a little bit narrow because there are a lot of rocks outside the fairway. I'm just thinking more about keeping (in) the fairway and keeping (on) the green — just waiting for the chance," she said. — AFP

Ancelotti says he will reveal future plans at end of season

REAL Madrid coach Carlo Ancelotti, who has been heavily linked with the Brazil post, said Saturday he will reveal his future plans on 25 May after their final La Liga game.

The immediate goal for the 65-year-old Italian, who has one year left on his Madrid contract, is with five matches remaining to overhaul bitter rivals Barcelona's four point lead and retain the La Liga title.

Achieving that would make up somewhat for losing to Barcelona in the Copa del Rey final, and the defence of their Champions League crown ended by Arsenal in the quarterfinals.

"I have a lot of affection for my club, my players and our fans, and also a lot of respect," Ancelotti told reporters ahead of Madrid's La Liga clash against Celta Vigo on Sunday.

"So I will speak about my future on the 25<sup>th</sup> (of May) and not before".

Real Madrid host Real Sociedad on 25 May in their final La Liga match of the season — they then leave for the United States and the Club World Cup which starts on 14 June.

Ancelotti said the day he leaves Madrid will be a "beautiful" one and he has never had a single problem with the club across two spells at the helm.

"It will be a fantastic goodbye, because I have a lot of affection for the club and it does for me too, I will never fight or argue with the club," said the veteran coach. — AFP

WHEN Burger King announced the sale of caviar with chicken nuggets in its French restaurants on 1 April, many initially thought it was an April Fool's joke. However, the unique pairing quickly gained traction on social media, leading to a rush of customers eager to try this extravagant offering for 19 euros (\$22), which included seven nuggets, mayonnaise, and a 10-gramme pouch of Chinese caviar.

This marketing strategy not only went viral but also highlighted the evolving perception of caviar as a luxury item.

Influencers and celebrities, such as Rihanna and chef David Chang, have contributed to the trend of pairing caviar with more casual foods, making it more accessible.

While some producers embrace this "demystification" of caviar, others caution against its regularization, emphasizing the high costs associated with its production. The shift in consumption patterns reflects a broader cultural change, with caviar becoming less associated with opulence and more with casual enjoyment. — AFP

## India's first Transmedia Entertainment City to be set up in Andhra Pradesh

**C**reativeLand Asia (CLA) and the Government of Andhra Pradesh (GoAP) have signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to develop India's first Transmedia Entertainment City, Creatorland, in Andhra Pradesh. This ambitious project will feature immersive theme parks, gaming zones, and global cinema co-production areas, aiming to drive job creation, skill development, tourism, and digital

innovation. The announcement was made during the WAVES Summit in Mumbai, inaugurated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

The partnership involves key figures, including Kandula Durgesh, Minister of Tourism and Entertainment, and global advisory board members from the entertainment industry. CLA is in discussions with over 20 studios worldwide to establish India as a production hub, with expected

investments of Rs8,000 to 10,000 crore over the next five-six years.

Creatorland will include a Virtual Studio Complex utilizing AI technologies, an academy for skilling youth in VFX and gaming, and aims to create over 150,000 jobs. This initiative represents a significant step towards enhancing Andhra Pradesh's profile in the global creative landscape and fostering cross-border collaboration in media and entertainment. — ANI

## 'No dumping ground': Tunisia activist wins award over waste scandal

*She discovered hazardous household waste in the containers.*

TUNISIAN environmentalist Semia Labidi Gharbi, recently awarded the Goldman Environmental Prize, has become a prominent voice against waste dumping in developing countries.

She gained recognition for her activism after Italy shipped over 280 containers of waste to Tunisia in 2020, falsely labelled as recyclable plastic. Upon discovering hazardous household waste, Gharbi campaigned vigorously, leading to Italy's agreement to return 6,000 tonnes of illegally exported waste in February 2022.

Her efforts not only resulted in the return of the waste but also prompted

significant legal actions, including the sacking and imprisonment of Tunisia's then-environment minister and the prosecution of 26 individuals, including customs officials.

Gharbi emphasizes that developing nations like Tunisia should not be treated as dumping grounds for wealthier countries, which often offload their waste due to limited capacity in poorer regions.

Her activism has spurred reforms within the European Union regarding waste shipment regulations. Gharbi hopes her recognition will elevate the profile of Tunisian civil society and in-

spire advocacy across Africa, stating, "The prize is theirs too," as it amplifies their collective message for a healthier environment. — AFP
