CBM warns: Illegal forex traders face stiffer action

he Central Bank of Myanmar announced on 12 June that it would intensify the clampdown on illegal foreign current trading without a valid licence and take action against individuals and institutions involved in the grey market.

In order to facilitate the purchase of foreign currencies and curb foreign exchange market manipulation, those studying abroad, working abroad, travelling abroad for medical treatment and going on a pilgrimage are entitled

to buy foreign currencies (petty cash) at the authorized banks' foreign exchange counters.

CBM conducted legal proceedings against those who want to manipulate the forex market and disseminate misleading information under the Foreign Exchange Management Law, Anti-Money Laundering Law, Financial Institutions Law and the existing laws. Investigating and prosecution against illegal foreign exchange traders are ongoing.

Pay accounts and banking ac-

counts of those spreading false information via social media platforms (Facebook, Viber, Myanmar Market Price) to cause severe fluctuations in the forex market have been frozen. The SIM associated with them are also cancelled. Those who were convicted of illicit acts faced legal action as well.

Therefore, CBM has been joining with law enforcement agencies to combat and prosecute those who attempt to manipulate the currency market under the existing laws, CBM notified. — NN/KK


MAI boosts international capacity with October schedule expansion

o celebrate Myanmar Airways International's 32nd anniversary, MAI will increase international flights from October to make travel more convenient for passengers, MAI said.

From historic cities to bustling urban areas to beautiful beaches, MAI will fly more flights, it stated. The flight to Hanoi will increase from four times a week to seven times a week, starting from 26 October, and the Chiang Mai flight will increase from four times a week to 16 times a week (from Yangon and Mandalay), starting 27 October.

Moreover, the flight to Da Nang will increase from two times a week to four times a week from 27 October, Kolkata flight from two times a week to three times a week from 28 October, Chennai flight from once a week to two times a week from 28 October, and Guangzhou flight from three times a week to four times a week from 31 October.

For tickets purchased with MAI's $32^{\rm nd}$ Anniversary Deals, the travel validity period has also been extended until 31 December 2025. — MT/ZN



Wave height will be about 9-11 feet in the Deltaic, Gulf of Mottama, off and along the Mon-Taninthayi Coasts.

BAY INFERENCE: Monsoon is strong to vigorous over the Andaman Sea and Southeast Bay and moderate elsewhere over the Bay of Bengal.

SPECIAL Features: According to the observations at 5:30 pm MST today, the Severe Tropical Storm"(WUTIP)" over near west coast of the Hainan Island, China, has moved north-northeastwards and may reach near coast of Southern China on 14 June 2025.

FORECAST VALID UNTIL NOON OF 14 June 2025: Rain or thundershowers will be scattered in Upper Sagaing Region and Kachin, northern Shan States, fairly widespread in Chin, eastern Shan States and widespread in the remaining Regions and States with likelihood of isolated heavy falls in Yangon, Bago, Ayeyawady and Taninthayi Regions and Kayin, Mon States. Degree of certainty is 100 per cent.

THE CONDITION OF CUMULONIMBUS CLOUD: The cumulonimbus clouds are developing in Mandalay, Bago, Magway, Taninthayi Regions and Kayah, Kayin, Chin, Mon, Rakhine and Shan State. The area along the cumulonimbus clouds movement, the weather phenomena such as strong winds accompanied with rain, thunder, lightning and hail may occur and therefore it is recommended to be aware in advance these phenomena.

STATE OF THE SEA: Occassional squalls with rough seas will be experienced in the Deltaic, Gulf of Mottama, off and along the Mon-Taninthayi Coasts. Surface wind speed in squalls may reach 35 miles per hour. Wave height will be about 9-12 feet in the Deltaic, Gulf of Mottama, off and along the Mon-Taninthayi Coasts. Squalls with moderate to rough seas are likely at times off and along Rakhine Coasts. Surface wind speed in squalls may reach 25-30 miles per hour. Wave height will be about 6-9 feet off and along the Rakhine Coasts.

OUTLOOK FOR SUBSEQUENT TWO DAYS: Likelihood of isolated heavy rain or thundershowers in Yangon, Bago, Ayeyawady and Taninthayi Regions and Kayin, Mon and Rakhine States.

Therefore, residents in areas where terrorists have taken control must prioritize their safety and protect themselves from being exploited by these groups.

Myanmar attends 5th Global Biosecurity Conference opening in Sochi

AT the invitation of Deputy Foreign Minister of the Russian Federation Mr Sergey Ryabkov and Head of the Federal Service for Surveillance on Consumer Rights Protection and Human Well-being Dr Anna Popova, Myanmar's delegation led by Deputy Minister for Science and Technology Dr Aung Zeya attended the opening ceremony of the fifth International Scientific and Practical Conference on "Global Biosecurity Challenges, Problems and Solutions," held at the Novotel Hotel in Sochi, southern Russia on 10 June.

The ceremony commenced with a flag salute to the Russian national flag. Dr Anna Popova then read a message from Russian President Mr Vladimir Vladimirovich Putin. Following this, Deputy Foreign Minister Mr Sergey Ryabkov delivered opening remarks. Dr Popova presented an address on modern global biosecurity challenges and stra-

tegic responses under a multilateral global approach, while Mr Ryabkov highlighted the role of emerging technologies, including Artificial Intelligence (AI), in addressing global biosecurity threats and requirements.

A video message from UN Under-Secretary-General Ms Izumi Nakamitsu was played, in which she emphasized the importance of technology in global biosecurity efforts.

During the subsequent plenary session, Mr Frederico Meyer, Permanent Representative of Brazil to the Biological Weapons Convention (BWC), discussed international cooperation among BWC members and preparations to prevent future threats from biological and toxic weapons. Uganda's Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Health Ms Diana Atwine shared her country's cooperation with Russia in controlling domestic biological epidemics, including the

deployment of mobile research laboratories and collaboration with Russian scientists.

European Representative to the World Organization for Animal Health (WOAH) Mr Budimir Plavsic, addressed international standards for countering biological threats. Director at the Russian Ministry of Defence Mr Sergey Kuznetsov elaborated on Russia's implementation efforts in line with the BWC. Dep-

uty Director General at China's Ministry of Foreign Affairs (Department of Arms Control and Disarmament) Mr Wang Daxue stressed the risks of manipulating biological data with AI, while Director at Rospotrebnadzor Mr Vadim Govorun, urged that AI-driven bioengineering should be used only after thorough scientific scrutiny and only when truly necessary.

Deputy Foreign Minister

Mr Ryabkov concluded the plenary session by summarizing key points and adding further remarks.

After the session, the deputy minister visited both indoor and outdoor exhibitions showcasing advanced laboratory equipment and mobile research labs from Russian biosecurity organisations, where he observed and discussed relevant technologies on display. — MNA/KZL

Global aid pours into Myanmar as quake toll hits 3,749

AS of 13 June, a total of 3,749 people died, 5,104 were injured, and 57 remain missing in six regions and states of Myanmar that were severely affected by the powerful earthquake that struck on 28 March.

Search and rescue teams

from the Myanmar Fire Brigade, along with local and international rescue organizations, have been carrying out emergency operations in the affected areas without delay. So far, 653 people have been rescued alive from collapsed buildings,

and the bodies of 830 deceased persons have been recovered.

Local and foreign donors have been providing financial and material support to the affected people, with further announcements on donations forthcoming. — MNA/MKKS

Flash floods inundate Shwenyaung areas

IT has been flooding in most wards of Shwenyaung in northern Shan State, according to residents.

Due to a mountain stream flood resulting from continuous rain starting on 10 June, it has been flooding in Taunggyi, Shwenyaung and Yaksawk cities.

"It has rained non-stop. Shwenyaung encounters floods every year, and it happened earlier this year," said a resident With heavy rain, the stream has flooded, leading to houses and streets covered in water in Yadana ward, Shwebontha ward, Taryaw ward, Mingalar Shwebo ward, Kwanbon and Hesei.

It has also rained heavily in Nyaungshwe, Kalaw and Inlay, and a slight flood has happened too. Fire Services Department's members and social workers have helped evacuate residents from flooded wards and villages in Shwenyaung to a temporary flood relief camp set up at monasteries.

"Water hasn't decreased in Shwenyaung today, even going up more. It has still been raining. We heard the road between Taunglaylone and Shwenyaung has flooded now," said a resident. Flood happens in Shwenyaung in every monsoon season, but normally in September and October; however, it has started earlier in June this year. — Htun Htun/ZS

Aid reaches Sagaing, Mandalay communities amid ramp-up rehab efforts

RECOVERY and rehabilitation activities are energetically carried out in areas affected by the recent strong earthquake, with various organizations cooperating closely with local communities to restore religious structures and civilian buildings.

On 11 June, Lt-Gen Thet Pon from the Office of the Commander-in-Chief (Army) and relevant officials inspected restoration activities at religious buildings in Sagaing that had sustained damage due to the earthquake. The team visited the Razamani Suhla Kaungmudaw Pagoda, Yadana Zedi Hsinmyashin Pagoda and the SunU Ponnyashin Pagoda to observe reconstruction progress and cleanliness efforts within the compounds. Refreshments were provided to volunteers, and assistance was coordinated to fulfil their needs.

Lt-Gen Thet Pon and officials also inspected debris clearance efforts using heavy machinery at earthquake-damaged religious buildings and civilian structures in Swanchakyak Ward and surrounding areas of Sagaing, including Shwezaydi Pariyatti Monastery, Affiliated Basic Education High School and other religious sites. Coor-

dination was made on the necessary arrangements.

Furthermore, the delegation paid respects to the abbot of Dhammasila Monastery in Sagaing and donated 100 bags of cement for the reconstruction of religious buildings damaged by the earthquake.

In a similar effort to ensure the safety and success of students preparing to retake the 2025 matriculation examination, which was postponed due to fire damage caused by the 28 March earthquake, a coordination meeting was held at the Central Command headquarters in Mandalay. The meeting was attended by Mandalay Region Chief Minister U Myo Aung, Lt-Gen Myo Moe Aung and Lt-Gen Soe Tint Naing from the Office of the Commander-in-Chief (Army), Commander of the Central Command Brig-Gen Kyaw Ko Htike, regional ministers and departmental officials.

The meeting discussed the storage and safeguarding of examination papers and answer sheets, readiness of exam centres, security and healthcare arrangements and inter-departmental cooperation to ensure smooth and safe exam conduct for all students. The meeting

concluded with agreements on collaborative implementation.

Following the meeting, Lt-Gen Myo Moe Aung, accompanied by officials from the Mandalay Region Education Office, Mahaaungmye District and Township Education Officers, inspected examination centre preparations in Chanayethazan and Maha Aungmyay townships. They reviewed readiness for safe and smooth examination conditions, as well as healthcare

support plans, and coordinated necessary adjustments.

Similarly, Lt-Gen Soe Tint Naing and officials inspected preparations in Amarapura Township, Mandalay, focusing on the environmental cleanliness of exam centres, proper storage of examination documents, student safety and comfort and assistance with timely transportation during the exam period. Coordination was carried out with the responsible per-

sonnel.

The team also visited the U Pwa Pagoda and the Ananda Buddha Image in Kyunlone Ooshaung Ward, Chanmyathazi Township, which were damaged by the earthquake. They inspected the reconstruction progress of religious buildings, debris clearance by Tatmadaw men, the construction of temporary monastic housing for monks and cleaning operations within pagoda compounds. — MNA/KZL

Artillery strike claims six lives in Kawkbaw, Kayin State

SIX innocent civilians, including two children aged four and nine, were killed when members of the KNLA and PDF terrorists launched an unprovoked heavy weapon attack on Kawkbaw Village in Kyondoe, Kawkareik Township, Kayin State, according to reports.

The incident occurred at around 5:30 pm on 12 June, when the insurgents fired heavy weapons from a location approximately 2,700 metres northeast of Kawkbaw Village. Artillery shells landed and exploded inside the village, instantly killing three civilians, including a four-year-old child. Three more villagers, including

a nine-year-old child, sustained critical injuries from shrapnel.

These three injured victims were transported to Hpa-an General Hospital for medical treatment, however tragically succumbed to their wounds on the way, bringing the death toll to six.

Reports indicate that such indiscriminate attacks by insurgents are frequently targeted at towns, villages and communities that do not support their violent campaigns. As a result, civilian casualties continue to rise. Local communities have condemned the attacks, and security personnel are reportedly working with

residents to implement necessary security measures in the area. — MNA/KZL

4 civilians injured in car bomb explosion in Mon State

KNU and PDF terrorists exploded a vehicle carrying one male and two female passengers driven by Myo Min Khant heading to Kyaikto from Theinzayet of Mon State on 12 June morning.

The explosion occurred near Baikkar village on the Yangon-Mawlamyine Road, and four civilians were injured. They were taken to Kyaikto People's Hospital for medical treatment.

The malicious media outlets intentionally spread false information claiming that during the mine attack on the Tatmadaw convoy, a vehicle that carried civilians exploded and the civilians were wounded. The terrorists frequently planted various homemade mines and

remote-controlled mines on public roads, resulting in casualties and injuries. The security forces conducted mine clearance operations and security measures to ensure the safety of the people.

CBM sells US\$1.3M to fuel oil importing companies on 12 June

THE Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) sold over US\$1.3 million that were bought from companies working on a Cutting-Making and Packaging basis, to fuel oil importing companies on 12 June 2025.

CBM sold over 290,000 yuan and one million baht on 11 June. Moreover, CBM sold US\$1.096 million that were bought from CMP companies, to fuel oil importing companies on that day.

CBM announced on 10 June that it would sell US\$32 million to fuel oil importers. CBM sold 600,000 yuan, 694,750 baht and over US\$730,440 from CMP companies to fuel oil importers on that day.

CBM pumped over 400,000 yuan on 9 June, over \$501,000 on 6 June and 364,400 yuan on

5 June into the FX market.

CBM announced on 4 June that it would sell US\$30 million to fuel oil importers. CBM

pumped US\$422,000, 345,850 yuan and over 2.1 million baht on that day into the forex market.

CBM injected over 600,000 yuan and 2.6 million baht on 3 June, 579,900 yuan and 4.7 million baht on 2 June, over

610,000 yuan and 2.4 million baht on 30 May after sales of 4.3 million baht on 28 May into the financial market.

CBM announced on 27 May that it would sell US\$30 million to fuel oil importers.

CBM aims to curb the instability in the foreign exchange market and currency devaluation. According to CBM's notification on 15 March, it has been collaborating with law enforcement agencies to combat and prosecute those who attempt to manipulate the currency market under the existing laws.CBM allowed authorized dealers (private banks) to operate online foreign exchange trading freely as per the market rate, depending on supply and demand, starting from 5 December 2023. — NN/KK



Rejecting hope and filling both the body and mind with negativity - inside and out — can lead a person to become emotionally and socially discon-

Pessimism is not something that must be completely eradicated. Sometimes, it can simply be a perspective. However, that view should not be tightly held onto and allowed to cloud our vision. This article presents why that is something worth keeping

One of the reasons this happened is that those who uphold an extremist pessimism have had to go through life bitterly. Since their childhood, they may suffer from the impacts of too much bullying, poverty, pressure, coercion, scolding, severe punishment, more than faults, and the pessimism attitude of seniors

Moreover, those holding on to pessimism intentionally organize followers with the dissemination of their pessimism. While talking about some topics based on pessimism, they support their pessimistic discussions with each other and draw conclusions based on pessimism. Hence, their talking points and critical thinking cannot break through the pessimism. Consequently, they cannot see or consider anything beyond pessimism.

What is Pessimism?

Pessimism is the belief that nothing good can be expected in the future and that everything happening now is likely to result in negative outcomes. The content we often see in newspapers, social media, and on TV tends to reinforce this pessimistic outlook. Whether it's the economy, politics, or physical or mental 2. health, people tend to focus only on the negative aspects.

Pessimism can harm a person's mindset and emotions. When people stop expecting anything positive from the future, they are more likely to experi-

Actually, it's not always a bad thing. In some situations, it simply acts as a step up — a kind of expectation that prompts us to be more cautious about the

duties at a governmental department, a friend of mine worked together with me in the same workplace. But he joined such a workplace after me. So, he was a junior in my section automatically. He could show off his outstanding skill at work due to his higher concentration on the functions of the workplace. Despite the duties of a junior, he was more skilful than me as well as other seniors. In our workplace, we did not discriminate between the posts of junior and senior, although these were not set by

the departmental rules. However, my friend forgot the provisions related to the hierarchical rules of the department. All of us worked at night, so we all raised relations with one another, setting aside the strict departmental rules. At that time, as he was skilful in working, he had to be assigned to a higher post. He deserved to secure the senior post. Albeit not a personal attack on me, I knew he was never satisfied with the criteria for junior and senior posts. As such, he always scolded higher seniors and searched for faults in their work. He never talked about optimistic topics and did not praise others for their work results.

Indeed, I was very sorrowful to know the root causes of sparking his attitude. Since his childhood, he had lived in a staff quarter of an organization where his father served duties. He had known that some officers assigned his father heavily. If his father failed to accomplish the assignments, his father was scolded by those officers. My friend had bitterly seen such occurrences since his childhood. Such occurrences became scars on his soul. Moreover, their family was very poor due to the low income of his father. Consequently, my friend sought the best outlet for the mind to take a depend-

scolding of those officers and took revenge on them.

When he became an adult, he did not meet with those officers, but his revenge did not disappear from his mind. Therefore, he sought a third-party person on whom he would take his revenge. When he joined the workplace, he searched for prey to utilize his trauma. However, the organizational setup of relevant organizations did not allow bullying someone as prey. As such, he unintentionally disseminated his pessimism to others in the

workplace. First, his pessimism was useful in analyzing some events. His assessments of some occurrences were right, but these ideologies were based on pessimism. However, he forgot all occurrences and all things can be reviewed with two or more perspectives. The truth can be sought in the right things or in the wrong things, or in both right and wrong things. Except for four universal truths discoursed by

the Lord Buddha, even truths identified by society can change depending on the situation and


Gradually, my friend could not accept everything as he assessed these with pessimism. So, his soul was very tired. In the worst situation, the heads of the department who had handled the organization did not trust my friend because his attitude was not usual in the society of coworkers. Those officials accepted that my friend was dangerous to the workplace due to holding up productivity in all work processes. It was a time of failure in my friend's life. Officials of the organizations in successful eras did not count the successful work of my friends. Consequently, he lost all measures, including promotion of ranks in the workplace. His pessimism brought a great loss to his life. Finally, he left the workplace and waved to us, leaving a valuable lesson.

London museum opens vast 'on-demand' storehouse to public

THE V&A Museum in London has launched an innovative exhibition space called the V&A Storehouse, allowing visitors to explore a vast collection of around 250,000 objects. Opened on 31 May, this revolutionary concept enables guests to order items for private viewings in a specially converted warehouse, free of charge. Senior curator Georgia Haseldine emphasized that the museum's collection belongs to everyone and should be accessible to all.

The Storehouse features one-fifth of the museum's total

collection, including ceramics, tapestries, and even a 15th-century gilded wooden ceiling. Notably, there is no protective glass, allowing visitors to engage directly with the artifacts. The space resembles a large warehouse, providing an informal atmosphere for exploration.

New T-Rex ancestor discovered in drawers of Mongolian institute

FORGOTTEN fossils tucked away in a Mongolian institute for 50 years have turned out to be a newly identified ancestor of the T-Rex, offering fresh insights into the predator's tangled lineage.

Misidentified bones that languished in the drawers of a Mongolian institute for 50 years belong to a new species of tyrannosaur that rewrites the family history of the mighty T-Rex, scientists said Wednesday.

This slender ancestor of the

massive Tyrannosaurus Rex was around four metres (13 feet) long and weighed three quarters of a tonne, according to a new study in the journal Nature.

"It would have been the size of a very large horse," study co-author Darla Zelenitsky of Canada's University of Calgary told AFP.

The fossils were first dug up in southeastern Mongolia in the early 1970s but at the time were identified as belonging to a different tyrannosaur, Alectrosaurus. – AFP

Rick Moranis to reprise his role in 'Spaceballs' sequel

Driven by AI and Cloud computing, Digital Economy of India is projected to grow by 13.4%

Broadband connections surged by 1452 per cent, increasing from 61 million (6.1 crores) in March 2014 to 949.2 million (94.92 crores) in August 2024.

INDIA has made remarkable progress in last 11 years in its journey to becoming a digitally empowered society and knowledge economy, according to release by Press Information Bureau.

According to the release, the digital economy, which contributed 11.74 per cent to the national income in 2022-23, is projected to grow to 13.42 per cent by 2024-25, fuelled by advancements in AI, cloud computing, and digital infrastructure.

Over the past 11 years, India has experienced a significant expansion in mobile networks and improved internet connectivity, particularly in rural areas. Total telephone connections increased from 93.3 crores in March 2014 to over 120 crores in April 2025.

Additionally, Internet connections saw a remarkable 285.53

Broadband connections also surged by 1452 per cent, from 6.1 crores in March 2014 to 94.92 crores in August 2024. The cost of wireless data has plummeted from ₹308 per GB in 2014 to just ₹9.34 in 2022, making digital services more affordable.

Furthermore, the BharatNet project has connected over 2.18 lakh Gram Panchayats with highspeed internet as of January 2025.

The Unified Payments Interface (UPI) has emerged as the backbone of digital transactions over the last 11 years, with over 1,867.7 crore transactions worth ₹24.77 lakh crore in April 2025 alone. India accounted for 49 per cent of global real-time payments in 2023. — ANI

How \$100T debt time bomb fuels America's looming fiscal crisis

THE \$34 trillion US debt is just the tip of the iceberg — unfunded obligations make the insolvency crisis far worse, Marc Ostwald, chief economist at ADM Investor Services International, told Sputnik.

The unfunded liabilities —over \$100 trillion — from Medicare and Social Security don't show up on traditional debt balance sheets, but they are very real long-term obligations, he emphasized, noting: "No one wants to talk about it in political circles, because the problem is so large and no one has a clue how to resolve it." Unsustainable pay-as-you-

There is no pool of funds for these programmes, as payments going into them by workers are used to pay out the benefits for retirees, Action Economics Principal Director Michael R. Englund explains.

Airlines halt many Middle East flights after Israel hits Iran

GLOBAL airlines on Friday cancelled flights to Tel Aviv, Tehran and other Middle East destinations, or rerouted planes, as airspaces shut following Israeli strikes on Iran.

Israel, Iran, Iraq, Jordan and Syria closed their airspaces after Israel hit military and nuclear facilities in Iran. Israel said Tehran launched drones in retaliation.

Air India's New Delhi-Vienna and Mumbai-London flights were about to enter Iranian airspace when Israel launched its attack, forcing the planes to turn

SRAEL on Friday carried out dozens of airstrikes in Iran, hitting nuclear and military sites and killing several commanders and nuclear scientists.

Iran immediately responded by launching drones against Israel, and called the Israeli attack "a declaration of war".

US President Donald Trump although saying his country was not involved — warned Iran there will be more "death and destruction".

International calls for restraint are multiplying, as fears grow the Middle East could be on the threshold of a broader conflict.

Here is what we know:

What was hit?

The attacks started in the early hours of Friday - a day of rest and prayer in Iran.

Israel hit a key underground nuclear site in Natanz several times, Iranian state television said, reporting that most damage was at "surface level".

Other key nuclear sites at Fordow and Isfahan were not immediately struck, said the UN nuclear watchdog, the International Atomic Energy Agency, citing Iranian authorities.

Additional strikes were reported against sites in Iran's northwest.

The head of Iran's Revolutionary Guards, Hossein Salami, and the chief of staff of its armed forces, Mohammad Bagheri, were killed, with replacements

The Israeli raids will "continue as many days as it takes", Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said.

Iran's response?

Iran launched some 100 drones in retaliation, according to the Israeli military, which said "most" were intercepted outside Israeli territory.

The bigger concern is Iran's sizeable arsenal of ballistic mis-

Khamenei warned Israel faces a "bitter and painful" fate over the attacks.

Iran's foreign minister called the Israeli attacks "a declaration of war" and urged UN Security Council action.

Iran had previously warned it would hit US military bases in the Middle East if conflict occurred. The United States pulled out non-essential personnel from several sites days ahead of the Israeli attack.

Internet restrictions were imposed across Iran, the country's communications ministry said, adding they would be lifted "once normalcy returns".

US involvement?

Trump said Israel warned him of its raids ahead of time. but insisted the United States was not involved. He warned Iran that the "next planned attacks" will be "even more brutal" and said Tehran should cut a deal to roll back its nuclear programme "before there is nothing left". The US leader has repeatedly said he will not allow Iran to develop nuclear weapons.

Tehran has long denied seeking atomic bombs, but had been enriching uranium to a level very close to be able to make them.

The United States and Iran had been holding talks on the issue. The next round, scheduled for Sunday in Oman, now looked to be cancelled. — AFP

Beyond the startups he hopes to boost, many long-standing European companies "have a really strong appetite for transforming themselves with AI", he added, citing luxury giant LVMH, which had a large footprint at Vivatech.

'Safe by design'

Mistral — founded only in 2023 and far smaller than American industry leaders like OpenAI and Anthropic — is nevertheless "definitely in the conversation" in the industry, Krieger said. — AFP

Liverpool agree club-record deal to sign Wirtz

Iran says Israel attack 'declaration of war'

Iran described the strikes as a "declaration of war," with Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei warning of severe consequences for Israel.

A major escalation in the Middle East, Israel has launched strikes on Iran targeting nuclear and military sites, killing senior commanders and scientists, as both sides warn of imminent retaliation.

Iran called Israel's wave of strikes on Friday a declaration of war, while US President Donald Trump warned Tehran of "even more brutal" attacks if it does not make a deal on its nuclear programme.

Israel said its air strikes had killed most of the senior leadership of the Revolutionary Guards' air force, while hitting about 100 targets including nuclear facilities.

Iran's supreme leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei warned Israel it faced a "bitter and painful" fate over the attacks, while Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi described the attack as a "declaration of war". The Israeli military said Iran launched around 100 drones, with air defences intercepting them outside Israeli territory, while neighbouring Jordan said it intercepted drones and missiles that violated its airspace.

Trump urged Iran on Friday to "make a deal", warning that there will be more "death and destruction" after Israel launched deadly strikes targeting Iranian nuclear facilities.

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said Israel struck at the "heart of Iran's nuclear enrichment programme", taking aim at nuclear scientists and the main uranium enrichment facility in Natanz.

The strikes killed Iran's highest-ranking military officer, armed forces chief of staff Mohammad Bagheri, and the head of the Revolutionary Guards, Hossein Salami, Iranian media reported.

Iran confirmed the Guards aerospace commander had been killed, along with "a group of brave and dedicated fighters". — AFP

King Tut gold mask to leave Cairo museum after nearly 100 years

AFTER nearly a century in the Egyptian Museum in Cairo, King Tutankhamun's iconic gold mask and remaining treasures are set to move to the new Grand Egyptian Museum near the Giza Pyramids.

Visitors have just days left to see the boy king's world-famous gold funerary mask before it joins more than 5,000 artefacts from his tomb at the GEM, a \$1-billion megaproject opening on July 3.

"Only 26 objects from the Tutankhamun collection, including the golden mask and two coffins, remain here in Tahrir," said museum director Ali Abdel Halim.

"All are set to be moved soon," he told AFP, without confirming a specific date for the transfer.

The government has yet to officially announce when or how the last artefacts will be relocated.

Still on display are the innermost gold coffin, a gilded coffin, a gold dagger, cosmetic box, miniature coffins, royal diadem and pectorals.

Tutankhamun's treasures, registered at the Egyptian Museum on Cairo's Tahrir square in 1934, have long been its crown jewels.

SAFETY FIRST FOR ISRO

Elon Musk raises concerns over ISS safety, urges de-orbiting within 2 years

ELONMUSK has voiced serious concerns over the long-term safety of the International Space Station (ISS), citing the ageing condition of its components, and called for its de-orbiting within two years despite SpaceX's ongoing involvement.

"There are potentially serious concerns about the long-term safety of the @Space_Station. Some parts of it are simply getting too old, and that risk grows over time.

"Even though @SpaceX earns billions of dollars from transporting astronauts & cargo to the ISS, I nonetheless would like to go on record recommending that it be de-orbited

within 2 years," Musk posted on X.

The Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) is collaborating with Axiom Space, NASA, and SpaceX to address safety concerns related to the ISS Zvezda module, which has caused a delay in the Ax-4 mission.

ISRO Chairman V
Narayanan emphasized that
safety and mission integrity
are top priorities. SpaceX announced the postponement of
the Falcon 9 launch for Ax-4,
originally scheduled for June
11, 2025, due to a liquid oxygen
leak that requires additional repair time. — ANI
