


### Special Weather News

ACCORDING to the observations at 4:30 pm MST today, monsoon will be strong over the Andaman Sea and Bay of Bengal, due to the easterly waves and westerly waves, rain or thundershowers are likely to be scattered in Mandalay, Magway and lower Sagaing regions and Kayah State, fairly widespread to widespread in Nay Pyi Taw, Yangon, Bago, upper Sagaing, Ayeyawady and Taninthayi regions and Kachin, Kayin, Chin, Mon, Rakhine and Shan states with likelihood of regionally and isolated heavy falls during today evening to 4 July 2025. Occasional squalls with rough seas will be experienced off and along the Myanmar Coasts. Surface wind speed in squalls may reach 35 miles per hour. Wave height will be about 11-13 feet off and along the Myanmar Coasts.

They aim to shield themselves from Tatmadaw counterattacks while also persuading temporarily displaced persons to return to their native areas and recruiting new members. That enables terrorists to use civilians as human shields. Tatmadaw is committed to safeguarding the sovereignty of the State and will respond to these threats based on intelligence and prevailing conditions. Therefore, residents in areas where terrorists have taken control must prioritize their safety and protect themselves from being exploited by these groups.

He went to the Sai Thiha broiler farm in Maubin Township. The farm was developed with 12,000 broilers in 2015, and expanded to 24,000 broilers starting from 2016. In 2019, the farm was upgraded into a cold storage farm and has bred 155,000 to date, creating job opportunities for locals.

The Union minister and the chief minister went to Shwe Naga Min Company on the Yangon-Pathein highway in Maubin, and general manager U Zaw Min explained the work processes.

to cooperate with the Myanmar Motion Pictures Organization in a notice dated 27 June.

A total of 200 acres of land in Mington village, Hlegu Township,

Yangon, have been granted to the MMPO for this project.

The Expression of Interest (EOI) forms can be bought at and further details are available

at the MMPO office to submit before the deadline of 11 July 2025.

"If the project is successful, the filming can be done only near Yangon, making it considerably convenient for the artists. The Film City Project is important not only for the industry but also for the State as well as the people. As the film industry is also an important sector for a country, we must make every effort to ensure that advanced movies can be filmed and systematically shown in cinemas," said Union Minister for Information U Maung Maung Ohn at the monsoon planting ceremony held at the project site on 15 June.

The project will include

restaurants, parking lots, recreation halls, offices, studios, one-stop-service outdoor shooting sites, ethnic model houses, cities' landmarks such as Maymyo Clock Tower, Mandalay Palace and Moat, playgrounds, cinemas, amusement park, resort hotel, small villages, palm trees, pagodas, lakes, wards, urban areas, forests, trees, creeks, hills and miniature golf course.

The land, approximately 20 miles and four furlongs from the Yangon-Nay Pyi Taw expressway, was permitted by former President U Thein Sein in 2014. The State Administration Council approved its land use for 30 years, from 2024 to 2054, on 2 February 2024. — Htun Htun/ZN



60 container vessels slated to enter Yangon Port in July

A total of 60 container vessels are scheduled to call at Yangon Port in July 2025, the Myanma Port Authority (MPA) announced.

Eleven container vessels run by Cosco Shipping Line, eight by SITC Shipping Line, seven each by CMA CGM Line, six by Maersk A/S line and Samudera Shipping Line, five by MSC Line, four each by Ocean Line and Ti2 Container Line and three by RCL Line, two each by Evergreen Line, and PIL Line, and one each by BLPL Shipping Line and Land and Sea are scheduled to call at Yangon Port next month.

MPA has arranged maritime trade channels to handle increasing imports to meet domestic demand, to bolster exports, and to improve port capacity for significant arrivals of ships. MPA also notified that it would inform exporters and importers of ship arrival schedules promptly upon an extended schedule. A total of

62 container vessels in January 2025, 53 in February, 58 in March, 62 in April, 65 in May and 62 in June arrived at Yangon Port. Yangon Port handled 633

container vessels in 2024 and 629 in 2023. Thanks to the draft extension, the international ocean liners can access the inner port for now, according to the Myan-

ma Port Authority's statement on 22 June 2022.

After the new navigation channel (Kings Bank Channel) accessing the inner Yangon

River had been found, the draft extension work was accelerated. Afterwards, the port can now handle larger ships. The container vessel MV SITC Zhaoming (185.99-metre LOA, 35.25-metre Beam, 29,232 GRT and 2,698 TEUs) of Hong Kong-based SITC Shipping Line docked at the Asia World Port Terminal for the first time on 22 June, which is the largest ship that AWPT Port has handled.

From May 2021, the arrival of the ships at terminals in Yangon has increased again. Three new container vessels by Maersk Line Myanmar (SeaLand Maersk) started to run to fulfil the seaborne trade requirements in 2021. Earlier, the larger ships had draft problems, preventing sailing on the Yangon River. With the draft being extended up to 10 metres, the larger ocean liners can enter the Thilawa Port. — NN/KK

Palm oil reference prices plunge to six-month low

PALM oil reference price fell to a six-month low at K6,080 per viss in a week ending 29 June as weak global palm oil prices are closely tied to domestic palm oil reference prices, according to the Supervisory Committee on Edible Oil Import and Distribution under the Ministry of Commerce.

Myanmar imports edible oil to meet the growing domestic demand. The imported CIF price (Cost, Insurance and Freight) for palm oil has been declining since January 2025. The wholesale reference price declined to K6,080 per viss in the week ending 22 June from K7,280 in the first week of January.

The Supervisory Committee on Edible Oil Import and Distribution under the Ministry of Commerce has been closely observing the FOB prices in Malaysia and Indonesia, adding transport costs, tariffs and banking services to decide the wholesale market reference rate for edible oil weekly.

The committee issues reference prices weekly every Monday through the website www.doca.gov.mm of the Department of Consumer Affairs and the Facebook pages of the department and the Myanmar Edible Oil Dealers' Association. Despite the reference price, the market price is

way too high.

To control overcharging, the Consumer Affairs Department under the Ministry of Commerce informed consumers of lodging complaints for overcharging through the call centre hotline.

The department urges consumers not to buy palm oil at high prices.

The Committee notified that any person who is involved in price gouging and oil storage to attempt market manipulation will face legal action under the Essential Goods and Services Law.

The department is working together with the Myanmar Oil Dealers' Association and the cooking oil importing companies to offer affordable rates of imported palm oil for consumers.

The complaints for overcharging can be lodged over hotline 1535 of the call centre of the Consumers Affairs Department, or sent to the Facebook page of the department and the region and state departments concerned.

The domestic palm oil consumption is estimated at one million tonnes per year. The local palm oil production is just about 400,000 tonnes. About 700,000 tonnes of palm oil are yearly imported through Malaysia and Indonesia to meet domestic demands. — NN/KK

CBM sells US\$500K, CNY400K on 27 June

THE Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) sold US\$500,000 to commodities importing companies on 27 June, in addition to a 400,000-yuan injection into the market and \$845,000 purchased from CMP companies into the edible oil industry.

CBM sold \$1 million to commodity-importing companies after the injection of 160,000 yuan into the market on 26 June. Furthermore, CBM sold \$400,000 to edible oil-importing companies.

CBM made \$1.479 million injection from foreign currencies purchased from the CMP businesses into the edible oil-importing sector on 25 June

CBM sold over 700,000 yuan on 24 June. Furthermore, CBM sold \$870,000, which was purchased from the CMP companies, to edible oil-importing companies on that day.

CBM announced on 23 June to pump \$30 million into the fuel oil sector. CBM sold \$464,500 to edible oil-importing companies and over \$496,000 to commodity-importing companies on that day after the injection of over 16,540 yuan into the market.

CBM sold over \$600,000 and 387,000 yuan on 20 June. Furthermore, it sold \$800,000 to edible oil-importing companies and over \$503,000 from its desig-

nated injection to commodity-importing companies.

CBM pumped over \$577,000 out of its designated \$10 million injection to commodity-importing companies on 19 June.

Moreover, CBM sold \$1.524 million from the companies working on a Cutting-Making and Packaging basis to edible oil importing companies on the same day.

CBM sold over one million dollars out of the designated \$10 million injection to commodity-importing companies on 18 June 2025. Furthermore, CBM also sold \$1.68 million from CMP companies to edible oil importing companies on that day. CBM aims to curb the instability in the foreign exchange market and currency devaluation. According to CBM's notification on 15 March, it has been collaborating with law enforcement agencies to combat and prosecute those who attempt to manipulate the currency market under the existing laws. CBM allowed authorized dealers (private banks) to operate online foreign exchange trading freely as per the market rate, depending on supply and demand, starting from 5 December 2023. — NN/KK

Create masterpiece songs for the benefit of the people

IN MYANMAR, memorable and significant days are officially commemorated. Among these, a specific day has also been designated to honour musicians, known as Myanmar Music Day. As such, a central executive meeting of the Myanmar Music Association held on 4 June 2013 officially designated 27 June as Myanmar Music Day.

This date was chosen to commemorate 27 June 1936 — the day the second “Doh Bamar” Conference was held in Myingyan of Mandalay Region, where the “Doh Bamar Song” was recognized as the national anthem. This year, 27 June marks the 12th anniversary of Myanmar Music Day.

In line with the saying “the power of music is profound,” those in the music community must contribute their strength toward the development of the nation. As members of the music world, talents, skills, and knowledge of musicians should not be used for party politics, but rather for the benefit of the nation and the people as a whole. Their creative expressions and performances must be directed solely toward the public good and the welfare of the country.

In the past, due to involvement in party politics, unity and mutual affection among musicians deteriorated, leading to a decline in the entire artistic community, almost to the point of collapse. A true artiste is someone who rises to prominence through the support and admiration of the people, and since they are cherished by the public, they must live and conduct themselves as role models for the people.

The history of Myanmar music traces back to its origins, encompassing the Royal Court music of the monarchical era, rural folk music, colonial-era gramophone music, music from the independence

Myanmar music continues to stream unceasingly. The great musicians had created masterpieces of songs for the sake of the people. 
Sunday at sea points out the undeniable working hours without a break on Sundays. “All four seafarer short sto-

Collection of Short Stories by Dagon Taya: Volume I

THE Seikku Cho Cho Publishing House releases two new books in June 2025. They are the collective short stories, volume I and volume II, by Sayagyi Dagon Taya. The literary works of Sayagyi are considered classics. His writing style, structure, presentation, choice of words, and sentence construction are innovative, unlike those of other writers. His works are masterpieces for those who seek the full richness of aesthetic literature.

When the entire nation praised Bogvoke Aung San, the writer boldly wrote about him under the title “Aung San (or) The Wild One” in his ‘Yokponhlwa Aphwet Anwet’.

In the preface of the novel ‘May’ by Sayagyi Dagon Taya, Thakin Ba Hein, who established the Burma Communist Party, stated, “He is a revolutionary. He goes against the conventional writing styles and creates something

new.”

The renowned poet and writer Sayagyi Dagon Taya lived a life dedicated to politics, literature, poetry, music, painting, and other forms of art until the age of 94. According to a recent survey, the total number of short stories he wrote between 1919 and 2013 amounts to 107. These short stories, created by the many historical eras he lived through, certainly carry the scent and essence of those times.

Especially in today’s literary landscape, where such elements have become quite rare, Sayagyi’s short stories often depict the beauty of nature, scenic landscapes, and the wide vistas experienced during travels. These vivid portrayals draw readers into vast open fields, allowing them to feel as though they were breathing fresh, clean air and immersing themselves in a deep sense of

peace and tranquility.

Readers can read the belief of Sayagyi “in many of his stories, one can find critical reflections, whether related to political ideologies or artistic forms. However, these were presented exactly as they were, without editing, because I believed it was important to record both the times and my age as they truly were. I never abandoned the literary principle that one must portray the historical era in which they live. I held onto it even more firmly and consistently.” A total of 107 short stories have been republished into two volumes: Volume I and Volume II. This current book not only compiles previously published collections such as Sabei Oo short stories, Collected Short Stories (1937-67) – Kyayeik Pann Nu, Rain and Earth, and Water and Lotus, but also includes three newly discovered stories. According to the producer, any additional

stories found in the future will be incorporated as well.

The ‘Independence’ story in this book starts with “Man is by nature a political animal.” Aristotle.

The white clouds with silver linings were drifting lightly across the blue sky. The cool breeze was gently blowing. When Ba Maw suddenly turned and entered the zoo gate, he was immediately overwhelmed by the thought that this must be the true beauty of nature. The soft green grass was fresh and lush. The trees looked moist and alive. The earth lay in quiet radiance, fragrant and aglow. The sky was bright. In his sense of hearing, he heard the music being played softly by a nature fairy. In the second preface included in this book, Sayagyi wrote: “Literature is something that constantly changes. It flows continuously like a stream. The style and structure of my expressions from more than 50 years ago may or may not resemble today’s usage. There may be similarities, of course. The same goes for the readers. The readers from over 50 years ago and today’s young, blossoming readers may or may not share the same literary appreciation. I have come to recognize this.”

Drugs worth K300 million seized in Kalay

AUTHORITIES seized stimulant tablets worth K300 million in Kalay and tablets worth K40 million in Dawbon Township, according to reports.

On the evening of 26 June at around 5 pm, a combined team including members of the Drug Enforcement Division of MPF stopped and searched a motorcycle driven by a man named Mon Mon Aung in Ward 2, Chanmyayaungsi Ward, Manawthukha Road, Kalay. They found 150,000 stimulant tablets, each valued at K2,000 in the area, totalling an estimated street value of K300 million. The

suspect, Mon Mon Aung, 35, has been charged under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Law.

Similarly, on the morning of 27 June, authorities searched a pedestrian named Phue Pwint Thwe (aka) San San Htwe (aka) Thay Thay on Bo Myat Htun Road, Bo Htun Zan Ward, Dawbon Township. They discovered 40,000 stimulant tablets valued at K1,000 each in that area, totalling K40 million. The suspect, Phue Pwint Thwe, 29, has also been charged under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Law. — MNA/KZL

Mobile market offers low-price food in Nay Pyi Taw, Sagaing, Mandalay

THE Ministry of Commerce, in coordination with UMFC-CI, the Myanmar Livestock Federation, and the Myanmar Fisheries Federation is running mobile market trucks selling rice, oil, salt, beans, fish, shrimp paste, dried fish, meat, eggs and vegetables at reduced prices in Nay Pyi Taw, Sagaing and Mandalay since 30 March 2025 as yesterday marks the 87<sup>th</sup> day of the programme.


On 28 June, in Nay Pyi Taw, earthquake-impacted staff and locals purchased various essentials including rice, oil, salt, beans, shrimp paste, dried fish, dried prawns, chicken and duck eggs, and dried noodles. Similar sales were conducted in Sagaing, where two sacks of rice, 50 visses of oil, salt, beans, shrimp paste, dried fish, dried prawns, and eggs were sold. In Mandalay, 10 bags of 24-Pyi rice, 1,100 visses of oil, salt, beans, dried fish, dried prawns, and over 1,000 eggs were sold.

Sales will continue daily to assist earthquake-affected communities. — MNA

Two-day illegal trade crackdown seizes goods worth K283M

UNDER the supervision of the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee, efforts to combat the illicit trade are continued effectively by the law.

On 26 June, the combined teams impounded two Hyundai Stare (approximately K70 million), heading to Yangon from Myawady, carrying industrial materials and consumer goods valued at K8,547,500 without official documents on the Yangon-Mandalay expressway, industrial materials worth K151.2 million without official documents from a container at the Asia World Port, consumer goods worth K2.34 million without official documents from a luggage of a passenger

from Singapore to Myanmar at the Yangon International Airport and illegal teak weighing 0.164 tonne, 0.690 tonne of illegal hardwood and other timbers weighing 4.458 tonnes valued at K1,474,759 in Bago, Toungoo and Pyay districts. The action was conducted under the Forest Law and Customs procedures.

On 27 June, the combined on-duty teams seized consumer goods worth K15 million without official documents from a warehouse in Myeik Township, industrial materials and consumer goods valued at K35.04 million that were smuggled and piled up by the jetty in Kawthoung Township and 14 unregistered vehicles and 41 unregistered motorbikes. The action was taken as per Customs procedures and the related laws.

The Steering Committee reported 14 arrests on 26 and 27 June, seizing illegal goods worth approximately K283 million. — MNA/MKKS

## AI drives smart upgrade of China's manufacturing industry

*This advancement has led to a 70% increase in efficiency and improved product yield through smarter equipment operations.*

ARTIFICIAL intelligence has accelerated the transformation of traditional manufacturing in China, helping the country shift from a manufacturing giant to an innovation powerhouse, said industry leaders at the ongoing Summer Davos Forum in north China's Tianjin Municipality.

Li Dongsheng, co-chair of this year's Davos and chair-

man of Chinese electronics giant TCL, said technologies, such as AI and robots will lead a new round of industrial transformation and transform economic growth models.

TCL is investing heavily in key technologies, including edge intelligence, AI, and digital twins to strengthen digital manufacturing capabilities, according to the company.

For instance, its China Star Optoelectronics Technology (CSOT) has applied an AI-based detection system in the production of liquid-crystal displays (LCDs) to monitor processes in real time. With smarter equipment operations, the company has enhanced product yield and increased efficiency by 70 per cent. — Xinhua

#### Indian diamond industry faces continued struggles amid demand slump and tariff woes

INDIA'S cut and polished diamond (CPD) industry is set for another challenging financial year, with the recent report ICRA projecting a 7-10 per cent decline in exports in FY2026, following a 17 per cent contraction in FY2025, weighed down by weak global demand and increasing competition from lab-grown diamonds (LGDs), the sector's outlook remains negative.

The report by ICRA indicates CPD exports fell to a 20-year low of US\$13.3 billion in FY2025, impacted by a global macroeconomic slowdown and a growing consumer preference for cheaper, ethically sourced LGDs. These now constitute eight per cent of polished diamond exports, up from just one per cent in FY2019. Additionally, the recent imposition of a 27 per cent reciprocal tariff by the US, a key market accounting for over a third of India's CPD exports, adds further pressure. Although currently paused with a 10 per cent interim tariff, exporters remain wary. Many are rerouting shipments through low-tariff hubs like Dubai and Belgium to mitigate the impact.

ICRA's report also highlights that operating profit margins for CPD firms fell by 400 basis points in FY2025 to approximate four per cent, with ICRA predicting a further dip to 3.6-3.7 per cent in FY2026. The working capital cycle also remains stretched, burdened by high inventory amid declining sales and cautious rough diamond procurement. — ANI

#### Germany's export outlook worsens

EXPORT expectations among German manufacturers deteriorated in June as US tariff policies continued to weigh on sentiment across key industries, a survey by the ifo Institute showed on Wednesday.

The ifo Export Expectations index fell to -3.9 points in June from -3.0 in the previous month, signalling an overall decline in confidence within Germany's export-driven economy.

The apparel sector reported the bleakest outlook, while sentiment also weakened significantly among food and beverage producers, automakers, and metal product manufacturers.

Germany's automotive sector, a cornerstone of its industrial base, has faced persistently weak export expectations and remains especially exposed to trade tensions. The United States has already imposed a 25-per-cent tariff on cars and auto parts imported from the European Union (EU). — Xinhua

## Trump ends trade talks with Canada over tax hitting US tech firms

PRESIDENT Donald Trump said Friday he is calling off trade negotiations with Canada in retaliation for taxes impacting US tech firms, adding that Ottawa will learn of their new tariff rate within a week.

Trump was referring to Canada's digital services tax, which was enacted last year and forecast to bring in Can\$5.9 billion (US\$4.2 billion) over five years.

While the measure is not new, US service providers will be "on the hook for a multi-billion dollar payment in Canada" come 30 June, noted the Computer & Communications Industry Association recently. The three per cent tax applies to large or multinational companies such as Alphabet, Amazon and Meta that provide digital services to Canadians, and Washington has

previously requested dispute settlement talks over the matter.

"Based on this egregious Tax, we are hereby terminating ALL discussions on Trade with Canada, effective immediately," Trump said in a post on his Truth Social platform Friday. Canada may have been spared some of Trump's sweeping duties, but it faces a separate tariff regime. — AFP

## China’s Xinjiang opens first direct cargo flight to Africa

THE first direct air cargo route from northwest China’s Xinjiang Uygur Autonomous Region to Africa was launched on Friday as a Boeing 777 freighter departed from Urumqi, the regional capital, for Addis Ababa, Ethiopia.

The new link, operated by Ethiopian Airlines, will see two to three weekly flights. It promises to seamlessly integrate Xinjiang’s exporters into African and global logistics networks, while bringing premium African goods such as beef, lamb, specialty coffee, and horticultural products directly to Chinese consumers.

Customs authorities have implemented streamlined procedures, including direct sorting and distribution upon arrival, to enhance logistics efficiency.

“The route is expected to attract more enterprises across the supply chain, foster related industries, and create new jobs,” said Liu Jingyi, an official with the airport customs in Urumqi.

The route will provide robust logistics support for trade between China and Africa, paving the way for deeper and broader cooperation, said Dereje Derero Dimenso, who is in charge of the cargo and logistics services at Ethiopian Airlines. — Xinhua

## Sri Lanka to renovate 100 railway stations

THE Sri Lankan government has launched the “Dream Destination” project to renovate 100 railway stations around the country, the President’s Media Division (PMD) said in a statement on Saturday. The project was launched during a ceremony on Friday evening, which was attended by President Anura Kumara Dissanayake, the PMD said, adding that the Road Safety Action Plan 2025-2026 was formally presented to Dissanayake by transport minister Bimal Ratnayake during the event.

This project aims to create a clean and attractive railway station network that ensures the safety and comfort of all passengers, including those with special needs, the PMD said. — Xinhua

## EU probes Mars takeover of Pringles maker Kellanova

THE European Union said Wednesday that it had opened an antitrust investigation into Mars’s multibillion-dollar acquisition of the snack food business Kellanova over concerns it would lead to higher prices for consumers.

The European Commission said a preliminary assessment indicated the deal would increase the bargaining power of Mars, the maker of M&M’s and Snickers, against retailers in the 27-nation bloc.

“By acquiring Kellanova, Mars will add several very popular brands of potato chips and cereals to its already broad and strong product portfolio,” EU competition chief Teresa Ribera said.

“As inflation-hit food prices remain high across Europe, it is essential to ensure that this acquisition does not further drive up the cost of shopping baskets,” she said.

The in-depth investigation will assess the deal’s impact on the price of products sold by the two companies, she added.

Mars said it was cooperating with the probe and remained confident that the acquisition would “deliver more choice and innovation to consumers”. — AFP

## Foreign envoys highlight cooperation in peaceful uses of nuclear technology

AMBASSADORS and envoys from the permanent missions to the United Nations and other international organizations in Vienna of eight countries highlighted cooperation in peaceful uses of nuclear technology during a tour in China.

Foreign envoys from Ghana, Brazil, Namibia, Bangladesh, Nigeria, Pakistan, Venezuela and Indonesia visited nuclear technology demonstrations and innovation facilities in east China's Shandong

Province and Beijing.

They engaged in exchanges with Chinese officials and experts and attended a symposium in Beijing on cooperation in peaceful uses of nuclear technology.

The activity, held from 22 to 27 June, was co-organized by the China Atomic Energy Authority (CAEA) and the Permanent Mission of China to the United Nations and Other International Organizations in Vienna. — Xinhua

## Italy issues red alert for heatwave

ITALY'S health ministry has issued a red alert for 21 cities this weekend due to soaring temperatures, warning residents and tourists of extreme heat.

Major cities like Rome, Milan, and Venice are expected to experience temperatures reaching 37 degrees Celsius (99 degrees Fahrenheit).

The ministry advises avoiding outdoor activities between 11 am and 6 pm and seeking shelter in air-conditioned

spaces. In Venice, temperatures are forecasted to hit 32°C, feeling like 36°C due to humidity, coinciding with the wedding celebrations of Amazon's Jeff Bezos.

Florence is already on red alert, with temperatures expected to reach 37°C. The warnings highlight the increasing frequency and intensity of heatwaves, attributed to climate change, as 2024 is projected to be the warmest year on record. — AFP

## Bear disrupts flights at Japanese airport

A black bear caused significant disruption at Yamagata Airport in northern Japan on Thursday, leading to the cancellation of multiple flights and the airport's closure to passengers.

The bear was first spotted early in the morning, prompting a temporary runway closure and delays for four flights. By noon, the bear reappeared on the runway, necessitating another closure and resulting in 12 flight can-

cellations.

Airport officials stated that the situation made it impossible to accommodate incoming flights. Hunters were called in to set a trap, while police surrounded the area to prevent the bear from escaping. Human encounters with bears in Japan have surged, attributed to climate change and demographic shifts, leading to increased bear sightings in urban areas. — AFP

## ABC unlawfully dismisses journalist over post

AUSTRALIA'S public broadcaster, ABC, unlawfully dismissed journalist Antoinette Lattouf over a social media post regarding the Israel-Gaza conflict, a court ruled.

The Federal Court found that ABC violated employment law by terminating Lattouf for expressing political opinions against the Israeli military campaign. The dismissal occurred in December 2023, just three days into her casual contract, after she shared a Human Rights Watch video on Instagram, commenting on the use of starvation as a war tactic.

The court ordered ABC to pay Lattouf Aus\$70,000 (US\$45,000) in compensation, with additional penalties pending.

Justice Darryl Rangiah noted that ABC's senior management reacted with "panic" to her post, leading to her swift removal from the air.

ABC managing director Hugh Marks expressed regret over the handling of the situation, acknowledging that it did not align with the organization's values and caused distress to Lattouf and concern among staff and the public. — AFP

## Ecuador's cocoa boom: Farmers reap rewards

ECUADORIAN farmers are experiencing a financial windfall by shifting focus from bananas to cocoa, as global cocoa prices surge due to shortages caused by climate change and disease in major producing countries like Ivory Coast and Ghana.

Cocoa has become a billion-dollar industry in Ecuador, rivalling traditional exports such as gold and bananas. Farmers like Cergio Lema have seen their incomes triple, with prices rising from \$100 to \$350 for a 100-kilo sack of cocoa beans.

This newfound wealth is enabling farmers to invest in their operations, modernizing equipment and expanding land. In 2024, cocoa exports reached \$3.6 billion, surpassing banana exports for the first time in 60 years.

Marco Vasquez, another farmer, has used his profits to improve his farm infrastructure, highlighting the transformative impact of the cocoa price surge on local agriculture and the economy. — AFP

## Belgium seeks flexibility from NATO spending targets

BELGIUM on Monday said it was seeking "maximum flexibility" from NATO on ramped-up defence spending targets to be agreed at a summit this week after fellow laggard Spain insisted it had won an exception.

Madrid said it would not need to hit the five per cent of GDP demanded by US President Donald Trump.

"We may not have done so by making a noisy statement like Spain, but I can assure you that for weeks our diplomats have been working hard to obtain the flexibility mechanisms... that could help to lighten the burden of the Belgian effort," he told RTBF radio. "We're asking for maximum flexibility". — AFP

## Water levels plummet at Iraqi reservoir

WATER levels at Iraq's vast Dukan Dam reservoir have plummeted as a result of dwindling rains and further damming upstream, hitting millions of inhabitants already impacted by drought with stricter water rationing.

Amid these conditions, visible cracks have emerged in the retreating shoreline of the artificial lake, which lies in northern Iraq's autonomous Kurdis-

tan region and was created in the 1950s.

Dukan Lake has been left three quarters empty, with its director Kochar Jamal Tawfeeq explaining its reserves currently stand at around 1.6 billion cubic metres of water out of a possible seven billion.

At the end of May, the country's total water reserves were at their lowest level in 80 years. — AFP

Myanmar kicks off AFC Women's Asian Cup Group C today

MYANMAR will begin hosting the Group C matches of the 2026 AFC Women's Asian Cup Qualifiers today, as the Myanmar women's football team is set to open their campaign against Turkmenistan this evening.

On 2 July, Myanmar will face Bangladesh at 4 pm, and Bahrain will take on Turkmenistan at 7 pm. The final group matches on 5 July will see Myanmar play Bahrain at 4 pm and Bangladesh meet Turkmenistan at 7 pm.

Chelsea boss Maresca hails Fernandez ahead of Benfica Club World Cup clash

CHELSEA coach Enzo Maresca on Friday hailed the contribution of playmaker Enzo Fernandez as the Argentinian prepares to come up against his old team Benfica at the Club World Cup.

"I am very pleased with Enzo especially because first

of all he is a nice and polite boy, and then with us since we started he has been working very well in every aspect on and off the pitch," Maresca told reporters in Charlotte.

That is where the sides will face off on Saturday in the last 16 of FIFA's expanded

competition.

Fernandez was a vital cog in the Chelsea side that finished fourth in the Premier League to qualify for next season's Champions League, and also featured in their run to the UEFA Conference League title.

At the Club World Cup he came off the bench at half-time to score the second goal in the 2-0 win over Los Angeles FC in their opening game.

The 24-year-old has started both matches since, and laid on two goals in the 3-0 victory against Esperance of Tunisia in Philadelphia which clinched Chelsea's place in the last 16.

Fernandez was signed from Benfica in February 2023 for a British transfer record fee at the time of £107 million (\$147 million).

In 2025 he has scored and assisted a total of 14 goals. — AFP

PSG Club World Cup reunion with Messi recalls unhappier times

PARIS Saint-Germain have come to the Club World Cup as newly crowned champions of Europe, but a meeting with the Inter Miami of Lionel Messi in the last 16 this Sunday brings back memories of unhappier times for the French club.

PSG's stunning 5-0 demolition of Inter Milan in Munich at the end of last month which allowed them to win the UEFA Champions League for the first time completed an incredible season for the Qatar-backed side under the coaching of Luis Enrique.

It is no coincidence that PSG achieved their crowning glory in their first season after definitively shifting their focus away from signing superstar players to instead allow a brilliant coach to work with a hungry, dynamic young team.

Kylian Mbappe's move a year ago to Real Madrid followed the departures in 2023 of Neymar, the world's most expensive signing when he joined in 2017,

and Messi, in the same summer Luis Enrique was appointed.

When PSG pounced in August 2021 to sign Messi after a cash-strapped Barcelona were unable to keep him, the French side logically thought the Argentinian could be the man to deliver elusive Champions League glory.

Messi, who was 34 at the time, thought the same thing. — AFP

**A**T first light, dozens of surfers were already in the water off El Salvador's El Tunco beach in the town of La Libertad.

Local businesses have flourished, enhancing public security and community pride. Surfing has shifted perceptions, turning a once-unsafe environment into a thriving economy, showcasing how sports can drive social and economic growth. — Xinhua

## France bans smoking in beaches, in parks and bus shelters

FRANCE will ban smoking on beaches and in parks, public gardens and bus shelters from Sunday, the government said. The decree, published in the official government gazette on Saturday, will also ban smoking outside libraries, swimming pools and schools, and is aimed at protecting children from passive smoking. The decree did not mention electronic cigarettes. Violators of the ban will face a fine of 135 euros (\$158).

"Tobacco must disappear from places where there are children," Health and Family Minister Catherine Vautrin had said in May, underscoring

"the right of children to breathe pure air". Cafe terraces are excluded from the ban. Some 75,000 people are estimated to die from tobacco-related complications each year in France. — AFP

## Dying breed: Tunisian dog lovers push to save age-old desert hound

TUNISIAN dog lovers are rallying to save the endangered Sloughi, an ancient desert hound known for its speed and slender physique, which has accompanied nomadic societies across North Africa for centuries.

With fewer than 200 pure-bred Sloughis remaining in Tunisia, the breed faces threats from unregulated crossbreeding, urbanization, and the decline of traditional nomadic lifestyles.

Advocates like veterinarian Olfa Abid emphasize the Sloughi's cultural significance, stating it is "part of our heritage, our history". The Tunisian
