Lt-Gen Aung Htwe inspects agricultural, livestock breeding tasks, runway of Lashio Airport

YANGON, 20 June— Member of the State Peace and Development Council Lt-Gen Aung Htwe of the Ministry of Defence, accompanied by Chairman of Shan State (North) Peace and Development Council Commander of North-East Command Maj-Gen Myint Hlaing, Deputy Minister for Agriculture and Irrigation Brig-Gen Khin Maung and officials, arrived at 600,000 coffee saplings nursery of the command headquarters on 18 June morning.

They were welcomed there by senior military officers of Lashio Station and national race leaders of Shan State (North) Special Regions.

Lt-Gen Aung Htwe inspected coffee saplings at the nursery and told the national race leaders that local farmers and local national race leaders are to extend cultivation of coffee as a opium-substitute crop for development of the regions. The Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation will provide agricultural technology to them. And cultivation of macadamia and oak trees are to be extended.

Then, Lt-Gen Aung Htwe proceeded to Central Section Farm of the command headquarters and inspected groundnut plantations in the farm areas, breeding of 1,200 domestic chickens, raising of 1,200 layers and 1,200 broilers, modern incubators, running of domestic poultry farm and process of the feedstuff factory which can produce 25 tons of feedstuff a day.

Lt-Gen Aung Htwe also saw over pig breeding section where piglets were kept in cages, and raising of 45,000 layers in the cages. He gave instructions to the national race leaders on extension of agriculture as well as livestock breeding tasks to be carried out for regional development. Afterwards, Lt-Gen Aung Htwe and party went to the site for extended construction of the runway of Lashio Airport. MPs call Campbell over Iraq dossier

LONDON, 20 June — Alastair Campbell, the prime minister's communications director, faced a second call from the foreign affairs committee yesterday to give evidence over his role in the preparation of Iraqi intelligence dossiers

The committee's normally loval Labour MPs backed the call for the first time after receiving further evidence of the extent of Mr Campbell's involvement in September's joint intelligence committee (JIC) dossier and the so-called dodgy dossier published in February by Downing Street but allegedly based on intelligence sources

Mr Campbell could refuse and the committee could appeal to the Commons to vote to summon him.

In evidence yesterday, Ibrahim al-Marashi, the former Iraqi PhD student whose evidence was heavily plagiarised to form the basis of "dodgy dossier", demanded an apology from the government and said his life and that of his family had been endangered by Downing Street's "reckless use" of his material. He said he had been "shocked" by Downing Street's behaviour

Dr Marashi, who is a researcher at the Centre for Nonproliferation Studies in Monterey, California, said Downing Street had perverted his work to imply that Iraq was backing terrorist groups outside Iraq.

He said his thesis had said Iraq was supporting foreign opposition groups. "By changing the words, they are distorting the meaning and it looks like they [Iraq] are supporting groups like al-Qaida.

He said the four government staff who put together the dossier had discovered his research by using a search engine and keying in the words "Iraq" and "intelligence"

"Mine was the top piece of information that came up," he said, adding: "I have already lost two relatives to the Saddam regime, and any mention connecting me and the UK, and the case for going to war could have disastrous effects on my family back home

"Given that I think the least they owe me is an apology."

He said 90% of the dossier praised by Tony Blair in the Commons and hailed by the US secretary of state,

Colin Powell, at the UN had come from three published articles, each of which relied on open sources. Andrew Gilligan, the defence cor-

respondent for Radio 4's Today programme, claimed that a senior intelli-

gence officer responsible for the September file blamed Mr Campbell for transforming the JIC document.

Gilligan was questioned by MPs who pointed out that his allegations impugned the integrity of the JIC chairman, John Scarlett, and implied that the foreign secretary, Jack Straw, was lying to parliament.

Sir John Stanley said: "What you are saying is the JIC and its chairman, under improper pressure from Downing Street, sexes up their original assessment at the last moment and introduces material which, according to your source, is unreliable. You are saying that the whole of the JIC connives in the embellishment of a JIC assessment for political purposes.

Gilligan insisted that his source was a mainstream intelligence figure.

Conservatives on the committee plan to question Mr Straw next Tuesday as to whether Downing Street officials had asked for the insertion of the claim that Iraq could deploy its alleged weapons of mass destruction in 45 minutes, and whether any complaint had been made to the JIC by MI6 officers. Russia not to send peacekeepers to Iraq, Afghanistan

Moscow, 20 June-Russian Defence Minister Sergei Ivanov on Wednesday ruled out the possibility of Russian troops' participation in peacekeeping operations in Iraq and Afghanistan, Russian news agencies reported.

"Even having a vivid imagination, I cannot imagine our military performing peacekeeping functions in Iraq," Ivanov was quoted as saying, adding that Russia will not send a peacekeeping contingent to Afghanistan. "Russia sends its peacekeepers only when the UN gives an appropriate mandate," he noted. However, the Defence Minister stressed Russia's intention to establish new military bases abroad.

'We have plans to create new military bases abroad. including in Kyrgyzstan," he said. "This is above all aimed at ensuring our national security interests.'

Russian troops are now stationed in all the member countries of the Commonwealth of Independent States (CIS). the former Soviet republics. Commenting on Russian peacekeeping troops' withdrawal from the Balkans, Ivanov said it did not mean that Moscow lost its interest in the region. MNA/Xinhua

Belgium gets war crimes cases against Bush, Blair

BRUSSELS, 20 June - Belgium said on Thursday it had received lawsuits against US President George W Bush and British Prime Minister Tony Blair under a controversial war crimes law

But it said it had forwarded the cases to the defendants' countries, reducing their chances of reaching a court. Belgium has come under harsh criticism especially from the United States for the law, which empowers its courts to try foreigners for serious war and human rights crimes no matter where they were committed.

In an effort to discourage so-called "propaganda" cases, it reformed the law to allow a lawsuit to be sent to a defendant's country if that country were democratic with a legal system that could handle it properly. One

lawsuit accused Bush, Blair, US Secretary of State Colin Powell, US Defence Secretary Donald Rumsfeld and US General Tommy Franks of crimes against humanity in the recent Iraq war, a Belgium Justice Ministry statement said. A second lawsuit was against Powell, also regarding the Iraq war.

A third was against Bush, Rumsfeld, US Attorney General John Ashcroft, US national security adviser Condoleezza Rice and Deputy Defence Secretary Paul Wolfowitz for crimes against humanity in Afghanistan and Iraq.

General Abizaid nominated to head US Central Command

WASHINGTON, 20 June-President George W Bush has nominated Army Lieutenant-General John Abizaid, an Arabic speaker and scholar, to succeed retiring General Tommy Franks as head of the US Central Command, the Pentagon said on Wednesday.

Abizaid would follow the man who planned and directed the US-led invasions of Iraq and Afghanistan and become head of American military operations in the Middle East. His command area would include the Gulf and Afghanistan.

Bush's nomination of Abizaid, who is of

Lebanese descent and is currently Franks' deputy, had been widely expected. The promotion to four-star general and succession require approval by the US Senate.

US soldiers shoot civilians, kill the wounded in Iraq

LONDON, 20 June — American combattants in Iraq shot people in civilian clothes, killed the wounded and left Iraqis to die on the battlefield.

There was no dilemma | Bagho

when it came to shooting people who were not in uniform, I just pulled the trigger... If they were there, they were enemy, whether in uniform or not. Some were, some weren't," Specialist Corporal Michael Richardson told the British *Evening Standard* newspaper.

Richardson, 22, serves with the 3/15th US Infantry Division in Fallujah, 50 kilometres (30 miles) west of Baghdad. "When there were civilians there, we did the mission that had to be done. When they were there, they were at the wrong spot, so they were considered enemy,"said Anthony Castillo, who is also in Richardson's company.

Referring to a battle south of Baghdad, without giving the exact date, the soldiers said that 70 percent of the 400 combattants on the Iraqi side were dressed in civilian clothes. According to Sergeant John Meadows, 34, the US army distributed leaflets in the days leading up to the action telling civilians to avoid the area. "So basically anyone who was there was a combatant," Meadows said before adding that US troops killed women and injured on the ground.

"The worst thing is to shoot one of them, then go help him," he said. "You

NY suspects \$15m stolen from ATMs after September attacks

New YORK, 20 June —Investigators suspect more than 15 million US dollars was stolen from automated teller machines that malfunctioned after the September 11 2001 attacks on New York, officials said on Wednesday.

Up to 118 people have been arrested or are being sought on suspicion of using the machines, which are run by a credit union for city employees, Manhattan's top prosecutor Robert Morgenthau said at a news briefing.

The money was allegedly stolen in cash and by credit card when the Municipal Credit Union's machines were damaged in the collapse of the twin towers of the World Trade Centre after the hijacked plane attacks.

The machines lost the computer link with the New York Cash Exchange that administers bank-to-bank transactions, including automated withdrawals, Morgenthau explained. The exchange was unable to check the credit union's account balances to make sure there was enough to money to cover a member's ability to make withdrawals.

Morgenthau said the credit union de-

cided "not to shut down its entire ATM operation because of the hardship it might impose on members, particularly those affected by the tragedy. Unfortunately, a lot of people took advantage".

Of the 118 people, Morgenthau said 74 were arrested and charged with grand larceny on Wednesday, and 44 others were being sought by police. Those charged so far are accused of stealing a total of 730,518.68 US dollars but the probe continues into as many as 4,187 other people and the theft of 15 million US dollars, he said. One worker made 25 withdrawals, collecting \$5,899 from 13 September to 31 October, 2001, — yet his highest balance before the attacks was only 7.33 US dollars. Another worker whose balance before the attacks was 111 US dollars is charged with stealing 7,336.50 US dollars. *MNA/Reuters* didn't want any prisoners of war. You hate them so bad while you're fighting and you're so terrified, you can't really convey the feeling but you don't want them to live," Richardson said.

The soldiers told The Evening Standard how they killed civilians in their cars because they were afraid that they might be attacked. "When they use white

flags we were told to stop them at 400 metres out and then strip them down naked, then bring them through. Most obeyed the order," Meadows said. We knew about others who had problems with (Iragis) carrying white flags and then opening up on our guys ... Then they'd use cars to try and drive at us. They were men, women and children. That day, we shot up a lot of cars,' Meadows said. "At night you think about all the people vou killed. It just never gets off your head, none of this stuff does. There's no chance to forget it. We're still here, we have been here so long. Most people leave after combat but we haven't." Richardson said.

"They've already seen psychiatrists and the chain of command has got letters back saying 'these men need to be taken out of this situation'. But nothing happened," Meadows said.—Internet

American soldier killed in attack in Iraq

BAGHDAD, 20 June—An American soldier was killed and two others injured today when a rocket propelled grenade was fired at a US military ambulance in Iraq.

It was the third attack on American personnel or their offices in the last 24 hours – and an indication of a spiralling series of attacks and counter–attacks in the occupation of Iraq. The ambulance was transporting a wounded soldier to a medical facility when it was hit at noon in Iskandariyah, about 20 miles south of Baghdad. The injured soldier who was being transported was not the one killed, said Captain John Morgan, a US military spokesman in Baghdad. The dead and wounded were members of a US army medical brigade.

The military announced that a mortar shell exploded outside a coalition-run humanitarian aid office in Samarra, north of Baghdad, killing an Iraqi bystander and wounding 12 others. No US forces were hurt in that attack. Also today ambushers fired a rocket-propelled grenade that struck a US tank in Samarra. A second tank fired at the attackers, killing one and wounding another. There were no American casualties. In another attack in west Baghdad, an Army truck was hit by what witnesses said was a rocket-propelled grenade. The torn-apart truck sat burning on the edge of the highway.

Witnesses in the area said there were casualties, but US military police at the scene said the vehicle had earlier broken down and was set on fire after it was left alone while soldiers prepared to remove it. Meanwhile, scores of angry mourners fired Kalashnikov assault rifles into the air and shouted curses at the United States during a procession for two Iraqis who were shot dead by US troops at a protest by disgruntled former army officers.

Shouting "Death to Bush!" and "Revenge," mourners marched with the body of 32-year-old former army officer Tareq Hussein Mohammed, killed by US troops, from his house in northern Baghdad to a mosque. Mohammed was one of two men shot outside the gate of the coalition headquarters in Baghdad during yesterday's demonstration of ex-soldiers demanding their salaries.—Internet

Blix amazed US hoped to find WMDs in Iraq

New YORK, 20 June — Chief UN weapons inspector for Iraq, Hans Blix, said in an interview that he was amazed Washington and London expected to find large quantities of weapons of mass destruction in Iraq after UN inspectors were unable to find any.

"What surprises me, what amazes me, is that it seems the military people were expecting to stumble on large quantities of gas, chemical weapons and biological weapons," Blix said in an interview with the *New York Times* published Thursday.

"I don't see how they could have come to

such an attitude if they had, at any time, studied" existing reports by UN inspectors, he said. Is the United Nations on a different planet? Are reports from here totally unread south of the Hudson?" Blix asked, in reference to the river that flows through New York, where UN headquarters is based.—Internet

Peacekeeping duties in Iraq frustrate some US soldiers

BAGHDAD, 20 June-Facing daily assaults from a well-armed resistance, US soldiers in volatile central Iraq say they are growing frustrated and disillusioned with their role as postwar peacekeepers.

Iraq, soldiers complained they have been insufficiently equipped for peacekeeping and too thinly deployed in areas where they are under attack from fighters evidently loyal to deposed President Saddam Hussein.

Others questioned whether the armed opposition to the US presence in Iraq may be deeper and more organized than military commanders have acknowledged.

"What are we getting into here?" asked a sergeant with the US Army's 4th Infantry Division who is stationed near Baquba, a city northeast of Baghdad. "The war is supposed to be over, but every day we hear of another soldier getting killed. Is it worth it? Saddam isn't in power anymore. The locals want us to leave. Why are we still here?

Thursday, a soldier from the 804th Medical Brigade was killed when a rocket-propelled grenade struck a military ambulance carrying a soldier wounded in another incident, said Capt John Morgan, a military spokesman here. The attack, about 20 miles south of Baghdad, produced the third US fatality from hostile fire in four days. Two other soldiers were wounded in Thursday's ambush.

Most armed assaults on US military personnel have occurred in an arc of towns and cities to the north and west of Baghdad, where support for Saddam was deepest.

US forces also have mounted a huge counterinsurgency drive in the region. South of the city, where no such counterattack has been launched, has been quiet until Thursday. The weapons used against the Americans also have been

Australian oppn leader says war on Iraq not iustified

SYDNEY, 20 June — The war in Iraq would not have been justified regardless of whether or not weapons of mass destruction were found, Opposition Leader Simon Crean said today.

United States Ambassador to Australia Tom Schieffer told SBS TV last night the war would still have been justified even if no such weapons existed, but Mr Crean rejected the comment.

"First of all, the ends never justify the means. I think that's an important starting principle," Mr Crean told Perth radio 6PR. "Second, the prime minister of this country said that the reason that we were going into this war was to rid the regime of the weapons of mass destruction."

Mr Crean said the United Nations should have been left to determine if there were such weapons, and he said questions about the Howard Government's truthfulness now needed to be asked.

Mr Crean was speaking in Perth before welcoming home the Australian troops who served during the war, a conflict that centred on the pretext of eliminating such weapons. -Internet

Mahathir accuses West of 'attacking Muslim countries'



US analysts say Saddam likely alive

WASHINGTON, 20 June -US intelligence analysts now think Saddam Hussein is much more likely to be alive than dead, a view strengthened in recent weeks by intercepted communications between fugitive members of the Saddam Fedayeen and the Iraqi intelligence service, according to US government officials.

The officials said the recently obtained | remains that he is almost certainly still in intelligence had reintensified the search for Saddam and his sons, Odai and Ousai, The search is being led by Task Force 20, a secret military organization that includes members of the Army's highly specialized Delta Force and of the Navy's elite counterterrorism squads, with support from the CIA.

The intercepted communications between some of Saddam's supporters have included credible discussions indicating that the former Iraqi president is alive and must be protected, two Defence Department officials said. Military officials indicated Thursday night that new operations in the hunt for him were under way.

If Saddam is alive, the prevailing view among intelligence analysts is that he is still in Iraq. These officials said they suspect that he would feel safer seeking refuge among his supporters in familiar surroundings, rather than risk fleeing to another country, where he could be at greater risk of discovery by US intelligence.

Beyond the intelligence officials, aides to President Bush have begun to express less certainty about the question, saying they do not know whether Saddam is dead or alive. They include those aides who in the immediate aftermath of the war said Saddam was probably dead. Increasingly, other officials in the United States and Britain have said publicly that Saddam probably survived the war. Gen Richard Myers, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said on Fox News Channel last weekend that "probably the majority opinion is that he is alive."

The British defense secretary, Geoff Hoon, said in Australia this week that "my judgment and the judgment of the coalition Iraq.' Saddam a factor in unrest

Saddam's fate is a factor in the civil unrest still breaking out in Iraq, endangering US soldiers, some administrators say, as Saddam supporters try to organize a continued resistance. On Monday, the arrest of Saddam's closest confidant, Abid Hamid Mahmud, who was No 4 on a US mostwanted list, raised some hope of obtaining more conclusive information about the former Iraqi leader, on the presumption that Mahmud was more likely to have detailed knowledge about what happened to him than almost anyone else in the former government. At the same time, US officials' optimism about Mahmud's capture, near Saddam's stronghold of Tikrit, has been mixed with disappointment that he was not found to have been hiding with the former president, as some intelligence analysts had suspected.

Mahmud's success in eluding capture for nearly two months in a country occupied by nearly 150,000 US soldiers underscored what intelligence officials said was the reality that Iraq still offered many hiding places - even for a figure of the prominence of Saddam. Also contributing to the thinking that Saddam may be alive is that the authorities have so far failed to recover specific physical evidence, such as his body or DNA material, from the sites of two US bombing raids that tried to kill him.

The uncertainty about Saddam has complicated US efforts to stabilize Iraq. Administration officials said that the conviction that he may be alive appears to be an important factor in the surge of armed opposition against US forces in Iraq. Internet

Typhoon Soudelor douses southern Japan

Токуо, 20 June — Typhoon Soudelor, which pounded the Philippines and brought heavy rain to Taiwan, headed north on Wednesday, causing high winds and rain in southern Japan. Soudelor lashed the northern Philippines for four days, killing at least nine people, and has been upgraded to a typhoon from tropical storm.

Japan's Meteorological Agency said that as of 8.00 pm (1100 GMT), Soudelor was about 200 kilometres (125 miles) northwest of Kumejima, an island 90 kilometres west of southern Okinawa, which is home to about half the US military presence in the country.

Packing winds of up to 144 kilometres per hour, the typhoon was heading north-northeast at a speed of 35 kilometres per hour, it said.

The typhoon was expected to head towards Japan's southernmost main island of Kyushu and then move along Japan's western coast on Thursday, the agency said. -MNA/Reuters

WASHINGTON, 20 June — Inside the Bush administration, where top officials resolutely emphasize postwar progress in Iraq while playing down the setbacks, the rising American death toll and the increasing number of attacks on US troops are causing increasing worry.

The death of a US soldier yesterday near Baghdad brought to nine the number of troops killed in Iraq this month in a string of sporadic rocket and sniper attacks. Fifty-four Americans have died in accidents or military action since President Bush declared the war ended on 1 May, equal to more than one-third of the 139 wartime deaths.


Bush and his top military and foreign policy officials define the casualties as a necessary cost of a successful military occupation. They say the deaths, while painful, are secondary to recent progress on economic and security issues. As one said yesterday, "Are we better off today than we were a month ago? Yes."

Yet senior aides and members of Congress are talking warily of the dangers ahead, as well as the potential political and diplomatic fallout, amid evidence that Iraqi renegades are determined to fight. Indeed, the commanding general of the US Army's 4th Infantry Division charged this week that anti-American forces are paying Iraqis to kill troops.

The perils are significant. It has become clear that US troops will form the majority of the international force in Iraq for many months. Some voices on Capitol Hill, describing the casualties and the extent of the armed Iraqi opposition. have begun to argue that the

"American troops are being killed daily. UN agrees seafarer ID cards anti-terror move

GENEVA, 20 June — More than one million seafarers will be fingerprinted for new identity cards in a bid to prevent the maritime industry being infiltrated by terrorist groups, a United Nations agency agreed on Thursday.

The move was approved by the annual conference of the International Labour Organization (ILO), which groups government, employer and worker representatives from 176 states.

Since the September 11 attacks in the United States, the multi-billion dollar maritime industry. which transports more than 90 per cent of the world's trade, has been seen as vulnerable to militant infiltration. The United States one of the driving forces behind the new ID cards, is particularly worried some nuclear or biological device, or "dirty bomb", could be smuggled into the country through one of its ports.

"9/11 was an obvious kick but everyone understood that we all had an interest in dealing with this. Ensuring security, trade and workers' rights is important for everybody," ILO Director General Juan Somavia told a news conference.

Under a fast-track entry scheme, the convention should come into force six months after the first two countries ratify it.



CAPE CANAVERAL (Florida), 20 June-NASA is likely to launch its first space shuttle since the Columbia tragedy in the first three months of next year and expects to announce a launch date in about six weeks, a top space agency official said on Wednesday.

That scenario would mean a one-year stand down after the February 1 Columbia crash, compared to a nearly threeyear wait following the 1986 Challenger accident.

"You ask for a gut feeling? We can put this together in the first quarter of '04," Michael Kostelnik, NASA's deputy associate administrator for the shuttle and space station programmes, told reporters.

The agency had previously targeted December for the launch of Atlantis on a flight to the International Space Station.

But a recent decision to launch the mission during davlight limited the number of available days in that month to just two.

"Right now, almost all the technical fixes can be done in the December time frame." Kostelnik said at the Kennedy Space Center. But "there are only certain windows when you can get a daylight launch, and they're very small windows, when we have to launch to be able to rendezvous with the station." The agency has other worries besides those related to available launch days in December.

Among them, NASA wants to have a plan for inspecting the shuttle while it is in orbit to check for damage to critical surfaces that may have occurred at liftoff.

Such a plan might involve training astronauts to make repairs during spacewalks while still in orbit.

Columbia's left wing was struck by debris that broke off from its fuel tank 81 seconds after liftoff on 16 January. Although NASA passed on several opportunities to in-

spect the orbiter during its flight - decisions that will no doubt go the other way in the future - the seven astronauts had no way of repairing the craft even if the damage had been found.

Columbia broke apart during reentry, killing all seven crew members. An independent commission has investigated the accident and is expected to release its final report next month.-MNA/Reuters

Preliminary plans for second phase of Iraq reconstruction

UNITED NATIONS, 20 June - Governments hoping to pitch in and help rebuild Iraq will get a sneak preview next week of the plans being drawn up in Washington and London and at the United Nations, officials said on Wednesday.

With sufficient funding now in view to address urgent humanitarian needs, UN agencies and the United States and Britain - the occupying powers - are preparing to unveil on Tuesday their preliminary plans for the second phase of postwar aid, focusing on recovery and reconstruction.

While London and Washington hope to use the proceeds from Iraqi oil sales to pay for much of the reconstruction, the interna tional community will be invited to UN Headquarters to see what they can do to help pay for the rest.

"It will be a presentation to current and perspective donors about what's going on in Iraq under UN aegis, and what funding might be needed for the next stage of collective UN activity," said one Security Council

diplomat.

Washington and London have set up a Development Fund for Iraq, fed by oil sales, to pay for their reconstruction work, but the funding to be explored on Tuesday will be treated separately for the time being. It is not yet clear whether the United States and Britain will ask that part of that money eventually be channelled through the Development Fund.

On stage at the New York meeting will be officials from the UN Development Programme and other UN agencies, the US State and Treasury departments and the World Bank. They will be accompanied by a group of Iraqi civil servants representing an eventual Iraqi interim administration.





In the past, paddy was cultivated once a year in Ayeyawady Division, which has good potentials for progress. Generally, sown acreage then was between 3.1 million acres and 3.2 million acres. At present, monsoon paddy sown acreage has increased. In 1997-98, the sown acreage was 3.229 million acres, in 2000-2001 3.369 million acres, and in 2001-2002 3.372 million acres. In 2002-2003, monsoon paddy sown acreage in the division reached 3.375 million acres. This is **over 25 per cent of the total monsoon paddy sown acreage of the nation**.

With the encouragement of the government, summer paddy cultivation has been extended in the whole nation since 1992-93 to increase the sown acreage. The division put 1.277 million acres of land under summer paddy in 1997-98, 1.619 million acres in 2000-2001, 1.625 million acres in 2001-2002. The division is cultivating over 50 per cent of the total summer paddy sown acreage of the nation.

Thus, the total monsoon and summer paddy sown acreage has reached over 4.9 million acres from over 3.3 million acres. Increase in the summer paddy cultivation has led to increase in the income of the farmers and contributing much to boosting the paddy production of the entire nation. Moreover, the division can stand firmly as the rice bowl of the nation. **Increase of 1.6 million acres of paddy can be said a significant success on the division's agriculture.**

Above-stated table shows the success in extending paddy cultivation in the division. Average per acre yield in the division was about 65 baskets in 1997-98; 70.84 baskets in 2001-2002; and 73 baskets in 2002-2003. Similarly, the nation's total paddy output increased to 1,070 million baskets in 2002-2003 from 803 million in 1993-94, 872 million in 1994-95, over 1,022 million in 2000-2001, and 1,050 million in 2001-2002.

Paddy output of over 1,000 million baskets is a record in the history of Myanmar's agriculture. It is 400 million baskets more than the old output record of 680 million baskets of the previous governments. Rice is the staple food of the nation and it has relationship with the politics and economy of the State.

In this regard, Head of State Senior General Than Shwe during his tour of the Ayeyawady Division on 7 June 2003 said, "Ayeyawady Division plays a vital role in the nation's economic sector. It is important to fully utilize the rich natural resources of the division to contribute more towards the national economic development.

"If paddy per acre yield can be increased significantly by utilizing the ideal conditions of the division, the nation's paddy production will actually increase to 1.2 billion baskets. The nation's paddy

output at present in hovering around over 1 billion baskets. Strenuous efforts will lead to reaching the production volume to 1.2 billion baskets."

He gave guidance to increase the per acre yield in Ayeyawady Division for the national paddy output to reach 1.2 billion baskets, assigning duties to officials to realize the targets of other major crops. **All in all, he was giving assignments to boost agricultural production.**

The division possesses the most fertile soil in the nation. Thus, giving special attention to cultivation will lead to raising the crops yield.

Except from two crops — cotton and sugarcane — of the ten major crops — paddy, long staple cotton, green gram, pedisein, pigeon pea, groundnut, sesame, sunflower, sugarcane and maize — of the nation the other eight can be cultivated on commercial scale in the division.

The division has put over 1.3 million acres under beans and pulses, over 300,000 acres under edible oil crops, nearly 100,000 acres under maize, over 200 acres under cotton and about 2,000 acres under sugarcane. Efforts will be made for raising the crop yield in accord with the guidance of the Head of State. And in doing so, the four methods — correct cultivation method, use of quality strains, use of chemical and natural fertilizers, and extension of sown acreage — must be adopted. The government has been rendering assistance for the division's agricultural sector to reach one stage higher.

Thanks to the Nankathu Dam, Nankathu Diversion Weir, Panhline Sluice Gate, Wadaw Sluice Gate and Htani Sluice Gate, double-cropping or triple-cropping areas can be extended. Efforts are being made for completion of the Konchaung Dam, Ma-mya Dam, Kanyint Dam, Ngapi River Water Pumping Station and Gazungon River Water Pumping Station. The irrigation facilities will help raise the sown acreage of crops. In the past, it was believed that the division, which gets much rain, did not need irrigation facilities. But now the irrigation projects are being implemented with a new vision to raise the agricultural sector one level higher.

The government has been building irrigation facilities all over the nation including Ayeyawady Division, upper Myanmar, lower Myanmar and the regions where rain is less. Up to now it has built 146 irrigation facilities and 265 river water pumping stations. In one way or another, most of the irrigation facilities have relationship with the Ayeyawady River. They are relying on the Ayeyawady, its tributaries or the watercourses which split from the mighty river near the end of its course. So, we can say that the rise in the sown acreage in Myanmar is made possible thanks to the mother Ayeyawady. And because of the mighty river that is depositing a large layer of rich soil annually, a delta which is called the Ayeyawady Division was formed.



10th ASEAN Regional Forum ends in Phnom Penh

PHNOM PENH, 20 June — The 10th ASEAN Regional Forum (ARF) ended here Wednesday after issuing the Chairman's Statement.

Participants from over 20 nations had open and frank discussions on the current major security issues and the war on international terrorism

In the statement, they committed their countries to more effective measures of confidence-building and preventive diplomacy.

They stressed that ARF, as a multilateral consultative forum, "must play a key role for security dialogue and cooperation in the region"

They stressed that the ARF "must keep pace with the times by adapting itself to the evolving situation, develop a greater sense of common security and build a more effective regional security framework"

On the nuclear issue of the Korea Peninsular, one of the major concern of the session, they supported the denuclearization of the peninsular and "urged North Korea to resume its cooperation with the International Atomic Energy Agency and to reverse its decision to withdraw from the Non-Proliferation Treaty".

On Indonesia, they reaffirmed their sup-

port for its sovereignty, territorial integrity and national unity, and recognized its efforts to restore peace and order in Aceh.

They welcomed the peace talks between the Sri Lanka Government and the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam, and appreciated the international support to the country in its peace efforts

They reaffirmed that the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty remained the cornerstone of the pursuit of nuclear disarmament, and stressed the importance of "promoting the universalization of non-proliferation and disarmament agreements"

They welcomed the proposal by China on convening an ARF Security Policy Conference in which high military officials would be invited to take part, and looked forward to the concept paper to be given to the countries.

Foreign ministers or representatives from the ASEAN members, from over 10 regional nations (including China), and the European Union attended the forum.

ternational Society of the Peforming Arts (ISPA) Congress which began here Wednesday, Singaporean Ambassador-at-Large at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Tommy Koh made three "provocative" message which aroused heated discussions on Asian and Western values among over 100 participants from more than 20 countries and areas.

The first message Tommy Koh made is that globalization of economies and technology has not abolish difference between countries and peoples based on their histories and their culture affirming that he neither agrees to American scholar

Speaking at the 17th In- | Francis Fukuyama's conclusion that there is no longer a contest of idea with the end of the Cold War nor consents to US scholar Samuel Huntington's prediction that future wars will be fought along civilizational lines.

Stressing his belief in Asian Values, Tommy Koh, who is also Director of the Institute of Policy Studies of Singapore said that Asian values are deeply rooted in many Asian histories and cultures just as there are values which unite the European family derived from the Enlightenment and the Renaissance.

He stressed that Asian values are neither superior nor inferior to Western values reaffirming that "my simple thesis is that there are good Asian values and good Western values just as there are bad Asian values and bad Western values".

Tommy Koh, a veteran diplomat who was former Singapore Ambassador to the United States and representative to the United Nations, hailed that Asia is rising. 'Asia is today the fastest growing region in the world and the region is driven by a sense of optimism, vigour and hope which are the hallmarks of a rising civilization," he said.

He expects in 20 years from now East Asia will have a combined GDP which will exceed those of Europe and America. MNA/Xinhua

adding that rubber acreage will be enlarged by 2005 to 120,000 hectares; cashew 31,000 hectares; cotton 25,000 hectares; and tea, 23,000 hectares by 2005. Top priority will be given to cotton, one of the major hard

currency earners of the region. Cotton acreage will be developed to 50,000 hectares in Dac Lac Province of the Central Highlands in the next seven years.

Further efforts will be made to boost large-scale and high quality livestock breeding.

The Vietnamese Government will also invest capital to build medium- and small-size irrigation works in the region to help farmers, especially ethnic minority people living in far-flung areas, settle down for sedentary farming

Beckham apologizes for creating media frenzy

Токуо, 20 June — David Beckham apologized to his new Real Madrid teammates for creating a media frenzy in the Spanish title run-in and said he had been promised his switch from Manchester United would not affect his England career.

"To join a massive club like Real Madrid is a dream," the England captain told reporters on Thursday.

"I want to apologize to the (Real) players because all this is not caused by me. I don't want to distract them... they're fighting to win the league and I didn't want to upset that."

Beckham agreed to join Real from Manchester United on Tuesday in a deal worth up to 35 million euros (41 million US dollars). Beckham said he would have had second thoughts if his move had put his England place at risk.

"I wouldn't have done it if it would have affected my England career," said the 28year-old, on a promotional tour in Japan with pop-star wife Victoria.

"Thave spoken to Mr. (England manager Sven-Goran) Eriksson about it all because I think he's an important part of my career

and... he just said to me 'Whatever you do, it doesn't matter what club you play for, it doesn't affect you being England captain."

Beckham declined openly to criticize Manchester United manager Alex Ferguson after the English champions announced last week they had agreed a conditional deal to sell the midfielder to Barcelona.

"Of course it could have been done differently but I don't want to talk about that now," he shrugged.

"Real said they wanted me and it is a chance to play with a great club, so I'm looking forward to it. I'm very excited to become part of Real Madrid."

Beckham insisted he did not care that he could not wear his trademark number seven shirt at his new club. Spain striker Raul currently wears that number.

"I don't even think of taking that off Raul. For me, he is the king of Real Madrid," said Beckham.

"Whatever number they give me I will be happy. I have not even discussed with Real Madrid where they want me to play... but it is going to be a good challenge for me, on the field and off it."—*MNA/Reuters*

Guti ready to leave Real after Beckham signing

MADRID, 20 June — Frustrated Real Madrid midfielder Guti believes the signing of David Beckham will leave him with no option but to leave the club.

"It won't make me happy to leave my lifelong team but I don't think there's any alternative," Guti said in an interview with *El Mundo* on Thursday.

"I'm tired of banging into walls all the time."

Guti, who offered his first hint that he could leave Real in a radio interview over the weekend, missed Real's training session on Wednesday, the day after the Beckham signing from Manchester United was confirmed.

The 26-year-old Guti is a Spanish international regular but finds it difficult enough to get into the Real team as it is. The arrival of England captain Beckham will create even

more competition for places in the centre of the field and appears to have strengthened Guti's determination to leave. "The doors are all closing for me," said Guti.

"I was improving as a midfielder when the club signed

Zidane. Then I started to come on as a forward and along came Ronaldo. At the moment, I'm in the national team as a midfielder and Beckham's coming.

"I'm a professional and I want to play football. If it's not here it will have to be somewhere else."

Asked about his preferred destination, Guti said he would be interested in a move to Italy.

"I like to get to know new places and Rome, especially, and Milan are interesting," he said. — MNA/Reuters

Sanli sees Turkey through against United States

ST ETIENNE (France), 20 June — Striker Tuncay Sanli celebrated his debut for Turkey by scoring the winner in a 2-1 victory over the United States in their Confederations Cup opener on Thursday.

DaMarcus Beasley headed the US into a 37th-minute lead against the run of play, but Okan Yilmaz levelled from the penalty spot three minutes later and Sanli neatly tucked in the second in the 73rd minute to seal the win in Group B.

With neither coach fielding anything like the quality that enabled Turkey to finish third at the 2002 World Cup and the United States to reach the quarterfinals, the encounter at half-empty stadium was never going to be memorable.

Turkey, who could have been three goals ahead by the break, deserved their win, though were let down by supporters who booed and whistled the United States sporadically throughout the game at the Stade Geoffroy Guichard. Turkey coach Senol Gunes drew heavily on the Under-21 squad and without top striker Nihat Kahveci, still on club duty in Spain with title-chasing Real Sociedad, defenders Alpay Ozalan and Bulent Korkmaz were the only ones to start both Thursday's game and April's Euro 2004 qualifying defeat by England.

However, the young squad were still good value for the win.

Though the Americans had plenty of first-half possession, it was Gunes' men who predictably created the scoring chances.

Ahmet Yildirim put Yilmaz clean through, only for his effort to be blocked by the advancing Tim Howard in goal, Yildirim then hit the crossbar with a 20-metre free kick and Howard did well again to stop Sanli in another one-on-one.

As Yilmaz smacked another effort just wide, a goal was clearly on the cards — with the only surprise being that it came from the United States. — *MNA/Reuters*



Then, Dr Daw Khin Win Shwe in her explanation of the visit, said that the MNCWA is taking measures on a national scale for developing the health, education and cultural sectors and preventing violence against women for betterment of women's life. Although Bago Division is not a border region, efforts must be made to ward off the trafficking in women. Myanmar women must be patriotic and are to maintain the national culture from the infiltration of alien culture. Illegal going to foreign countries is full of danger, and there is no certainty of getting a job there. Myanmar women should not fall prey to the persuasion of human traffickers. Thirst for good looks and money can lead Myanmar women astray, she said.

Next, Dr Daw Khin Win Shwe presented exercise books, pencils, medicines and medical equipment, and K 50,000 for the fund of the small loans industry donated by the MNCWA to officials. Discussions were also held with local populace, and sound advice was given to them to solve out their problems.

Commander, A&I Minister inspect agricultural tasks for greening 30-mile perimeter of Yangon International Airport

YANGON, 20 June- To cultivate monsoon and summer paddy, cold season and other crops for greening 30mile perimeter of Yangon International Airport, Chairman of Yangon Division Peace and Development Council Commander of Yangon Command Mai-Gen Mvint Swe and Minister for Agriculture and Irrigation Maj-Gen Nyunt Tin this afternoon inspected dams and sluice gates under construction and supply of water and the site for carrying out agriculture and livestock breeding tasks in Yangon Division by helicopter.

Accompanied by deputy ministers, the vice-mayor and officials, the commander and the minister inspected tasks of Paunglin Dam Project being implemented by the Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation. They then arrived at Mahuya Dam Project where they were welcomed by Director U Khin Maung Yu and officials of Construction-1 of Irrigation Department.

At the briefing hall, Director U Khin Maung Yu reported on progress of the project. Minister Maj-Gen Nyunt Tin gave instructions on timely completion of the project tasks. Then, Director-General U Kyaw San Win of ID reported on conditions of dams in Yangon Division.

Next, the commander, the minister and party inspected construction tasks of the dam and gave necessary instructions. Paunglin Dam,

which is one of the regulating dams of Ngamoeyeik Dam, will be of 1,900 feet long and 100 feet high earth embankment. Storage capacity of the dam will be 105,600 acre feet.

The dam will have two 6' by 4' conduits built of concrete. Mahuya Dam, an earth embankment, will be 675 feet long and 100 feet high. It will have 54,000 acre feet of storage capacity and one reinforced concrete 6' by 4' conduit.On completion, the two dams can supply water to summer paddy, cold season crop and other plantations in Yangon Division through Ngamoeyeik Dam. In addition, arrangements are being made for supplying drinking water to the city dwellers

Then, the commander and the minister arrived at Shwehlay Sluice Gate Project at the fork of Bago River and Hsema Creek near Shwehlay Village in Yangon South District. Construction-6 Director U Khin Maung Myint of ID reported on facts about the implementation of the project. The director-general gave a supplementary report. Then, the minister attended to their needs.

Next, the commander met local farmers. Speaking on the occasion, the commander said that the Government is building Shwehlay Sluice Gate spending a large sum of money to be able to cultivate double and triple croppings of monsoon and summer paddy, cold season and other crops in Kawa Township in Bago Division and Kayan Township in Yangon Division. The local farmers are to systematically use assistance provided by the State for uplift of their living standard. The commander then explained requirements in agricultural tasks to be fulfilled by the Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation and Yangon Division Peace and Development Council.

Then, the minister said that Shwehlay sluice gate is being built with a view to ensuring prevention of floods in the rainy season and prevention of entering salty water into the farmlands and others. The commander and the minister inspected construction tasks of the sluice gate with the use of heavy

machinery.

Shwehlay Sluice Gate is located on Hsinma Creek at the border of Bago and Yangon Divisions. The sluice gate will have 406 feet long and 16 feet high valves. The inlet canal will be 2,200 feet long and the outlet canal 2,700 feet long. The sluice gate will have 22 feet wide gate for water craft. On completion, the sluice gate will irrigate 35,000 acres of land in Kawa and Kayan townships.

Afterwards, the commander and the minister went to the fish breeding farm of Yangon City Development Committee at Yangonpauk-Kyaikthale wetland areas in Twantay Township. They met local farmers. First, the commander explained agricultural matters. Officials reported on arrangements being made for providing irrigating facilities and other assistance to the local farmers. Then, the minister gave a speech.

The commander and party inspected fish breeding tasks at Kyaikthale wetland areas. Vice-Mayor Col Maung Pa reported on fish breeding tasks and plans to cultivate monsoon paddy in the land. Later, the commander and the minister gave necessary instructions.
